SELECTMEN'S LETTER

We have the lowest total tax rate in New Hampshire notwithstanding that 58% of our total rate is the State Education Tax. As we write, there are a few bills working their way through the legislature which hold more promise of relief for "Donor Towns" than anything else we have seen for some time. Let's hope!

We shall continue to do everything possible to hold down the Town tax rate which, as you can see on the facing page, is now the smallest part of your overall tax bill.

While the proposed budget for 2004 shows an increase of \$36,000 over last year, that amount will be offset by grants to be received.

Our two major additions – The Wentworth Hotel and the UNH Marine Research Facility – continue to move forward, albeit slowly. As of this writing the planned opening date for the hotel is May 15th. We still anticipate another formal UNH presentation to the Town, followed by a presentation to our Planning Board.

The new Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief has replaced the Education Property Tax Hardship Relief which means the State has reduced the amount of relief which New Castle residents can obtain. Claim forms and instructions for the new relief have been received and we shall be pleased to assist anyone who may have questions.


Property owners eligible for relief must meet all of the following eligibility criteria:

- · Own a "homestead", or an interest in a "homestead", subject to the education property tax;
- Have resided in such homestead on April 1st of the year for which the claim is made; and
- · Had total "household income" of:
 - \$20,000 or less if a single person;
 - \$40,000 or less if married or head of a NH household.

The filing period is May 1st through June 30th and the claim must be accompanied by a copy of your 2002 property tax bill and 2002 Federal income tax return.

Again, we sincerely thank all of you who volunteer your time and talent to keep our Town the special place it is!

TOWN OF NEW CASTLE, NEW HAMPSHIRE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING HELD AT THE GREAT ISLAND COMMON MAY 14, 2002

Articles I through XI were voted by ballot with the results indicated. Moderator Wayne Semprini opened the polls at 10 AM and declared them closed at 7 PM.

ARTICLE I: Balloting for town officers produced the following results:

ARTICLE II: Zoning Amendment # 1 as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 264 YES and 83 NO.

ARTICLE III: Zoning Amendment # 2 as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 232 YES and 97 NO.

ARTICLE IV: Zoning Amendment # 3 as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 232 YES and 100 NO.

ARTICLE V: Zoning Amendment # 4 as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 269 YES and 62 NO.

ARTICLE VI: Zoning Amendment # 5 as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 223 YES and 110 NO.

ARTICLE VII: Zoning Amendment # 6 as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 239 YES and 89 NO.

ARTICLE VIII: Zoning Amendment # 7 as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 246 YES and 74 NO.

ARTICLE IX: Elderly Warrant Article as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 313 YES and 24 NO.

ARTICLE X: Disabled Resident Article (72:37-c) as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 300 YES and 35 NO.

ARTICLE XI: Veterans Disability Article (72:35-a) as specified in the warrant was ADOPTED by a ballot vote of 299 YES to 30 NO.

Moderator Semprini convened the business meeting at 2PM in the Recreation Building of the Great Island Common and announced that the polls would remain open throughout the business meeting but would be closed at 7PM. He asked that the meeting recall in a silent moment members of the Community who had died in the previous year. He asked for approval of the rules for the conduct of the meeting, including a prohibition of smoking, a requirement that a motion to reconsider be made immediately after the vote at issue and another that any amendment be submitted in writing. Only registered voters would be permitted to engage in discussion unless the meeting made specific exception. A motion to end discussion would require a two-thirds vote, and that the speakers would ordinarily be permitted to speak not more than twice on any motion. Following a motion duly seconded, the Moderator rules were ADOPTED by a voice vote.

ARTICLE XII: On the petition of W. Bradford Greeley and 52 other legal voters of New Castle to see if the Town will vote to hold the Annual Town Meeting at 7PM on the regular day for the meeting in 2003. After a great deal of debate a proposal was made and seconded to revised the ARTICLE to delete the words "in 2003". This amendment was approved after which the revised ARTICLE WAS ADOPTED by hand vote.

ARTICLE XIII: To see if the Town will vote to create a Conservation Fund pursuant to RSA 36-A:5. All of any part of the funds appropriated in any year and any gift of money received pursuant to RSA 36-A:4 may be placed in the Conservation Fund and allowed to accumulated from year to year. The Conservation Commission may expend monies from the Conservation Fund for any purpose spelled out in RSA 36 without further approval of Town Meeting. The ARTICLE was ADOPTED by voice vote.

ARTICLE XIV: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions RSA 41:14-a (Laws 2001, ch. 187, 2001 Supp), authorizing the Board of Selectmen to acquire land or buildings, provided that they shall receive the recommendation of the Planning Board and Conservation Commission and hold two public hearings at 10 days, but no

more than 14 days apart. Pursuant to this statute, 50 registered voters may petition for a Town Meeting vote on any sale or acquisition of land. Once adopted, these provisions shall remain in effect until specifically rescinded by the Town at a duly noticed meeting. The ARTICLE was ADOPTED by voice vote.

ARTICLE XV: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to petition the Court to remove the deed restriction on the old library property at 120 Main Street to allow a use other than a library. And to authorize the Selectmen to lease the former library building to a non-profit New Castle historical organization that will restore the building with private funds. Russell Cox presented an amendment to separate the Article into two (2) sections. This amendment was defeated by voice vote and the ARTICLE was then ADOPTED by voice vote.

ARTICLE XVI: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be needed to defray town charges for the ensuring year. The ARTICLE was ADOPTED by voice vote.

ARTICLE XVII: To hear the reports of agents, officers, committees, boards, and others here to fore chosen and to pass any vote in relation there to. The ARTICLE was ADOPTED by voice vote.

ARTICLE XVIII: To transact such business as may legally come before the meeting. A question was raise about the published day and time of the School Board Meeting. Moderator Semprini indicated the warrant was correct thus the error has no impact on the Election. The ARTICLE was ADOPTED by voice vote.

At 3pm a motion was made and seconded to adjourn the meeting. The majority of the 189 people in attendance agreed thus the meeting was adjourned. A true and correct record of the Town Meeting of the Town of New Castle, May 14, 2002, attest:

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Board of Selectmen Town of New Castle New Castle, New Hampshire

I have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of New Castle, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended June 30, 2002. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. My responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on my audit.

I conducted my audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe that my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In my opinion, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of New Castle, New Hampshire, at June 30, 2002, and the results of its operations and the changes in financial position of its proprietary and non-expendable trust funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

TOWN OF NEW CASTLE, NEW HAMPSHIRE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2002

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES:

The accounting policies of the Town of New Castle, New Hampshire conform to generally accepted accounting principles for local governmental units except as indicated hereinafter. The following is a summary of significant policies.

A. Basis of Presentation

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds and account groups, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts which comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balances, revenues, and expenditures.

The Town does not maintain a record of general fixed assets, and accordingly a general fixed asset group of accounts, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not presented.

B. Basis of Accounting

The accrual basis is used for the enterprise and the fiduciary fund types. Governmental fund types utilize the modified accrual basis whereby revenues are recorded when measurable and available. Expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred (accrual basis) except for:

- a. Disbursements for inventory items (materials and supplies) which are considered expenditures at the time of purchase.
- b. Prepaid expenses which are not normally recorded.
- c. Interest on long-term debt which is recorded as an expenditure when due.

C. Investments

Investments are stated at cost.

2. PURPOSE OF FUND AND ACCOUNT GROUPS

The Town reports its activities in individual funds to comply with the limitations and restrictions placed on both the resources made available to the Town and the services provided. Individual funds and account groups summarized in the accompanying financial statements are classified as follows:

A. Governmental Fund Types

These funds are intended to provide recurring general services. They are controlled by a budget approved by the voters of the town.

<u>General Fund</u> – used to account for all revenues and expenditures which are not accounted for in other funds or account groups.

<u>Capital Projects Funds</u> – used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities.

B. Enterprise Fund Types

<u>Water and Sewer Funds</u> – used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent is that the cost of providing services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges.

C. Fiduciary Fund Types

<u>Trust Funds</u> – used to account for assets held by the Town in a fiduciary capacity. Proprietary type trust funds are reserved as endowments and as such are non-expendable as to principle. Expendable type trust funds are reserved for specific purposes. Receipts and expenditures are governed by statute, local law, or by the terms of individual bequests.

D. Account Groups

<u>General Long-Term Debt</u> – used to account for all long-term debt of the Town.

4. ACCOUNT GROUP NOT INCLUDED IN THIS FINANCIAL REPORT

General Fixed Assets

The Town has not maintained a record of general fixed assets and accordingly a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

5. ENTERPRISE FUNDS

Property, Plant, and Equipment

Various depreciable long-term assets (except services and meters which are expensed) have been fully recorded and accounted for in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Sewer and water plant assets were constructed or acquired over a number of years from the proceeds of general obligation bonds and federal grants. Historical costs were determined to the extent possible, and the fair value determined in those instances whereby historical cost could not be readily ascertained.

Depreciation

Water Fund assets are being depreciated by use of the straight-line method based on the estimated useful lives of the assets. The cost of maintenance, repairs, and minor renewals and betterments is charged to income; the cost of major renewals and betterments is capitalized.

Sewer Fund assets, beginning with the year ended June 30, 1996, are not being depreciated. The accumulated depreciation taken prior to that year has been closed out to the Retained Earnings account as of the year ended June 30, 1996. The cost of maintenance, repairs, and minor renewals and betterments is charged to income; the cost of major renewals and betterments is capitalized.

ARTICLE II: Zoning Amendment Number 1: Section 1.0 Authority and Purpose

Are you in favor of adopting Zoning Amendment Number 1, as proposed by the Planning Board, with the following new text?

Pursuant to the authority conferred by Chapter 674:16 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, and for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, and general welfare of the community and the intent of the Town Master Plan, this Ordinance is hereby adopted by the Town of New Castle.

No bonds or notes shall be issued with a term of maturity of less than ten (10) years and the authority conferred by the passage of this Article shall be non-lapsing until its purpose is accomplished in accordance with RSA 32:7,III,VI.

The purchase of land with funds appropriated pursuant to this Article shall be permitted only if all of the procedural requirements for the purchase of land spelled out in RSA 41:14-a are satisfied, which, among other things, require review and recommendation of both the planning board and conservation commission, followed by two public hearings.

The passage of this Article requires a 3/5 vote.

ARTICLE XVII: On petition of Nancy McArdle and 26 other legal voters of New Castle are you in favor of the following resolution from "New Hampshire for Health Care?"

Whereas New Hampshire pays the 12th highest cost of insurance, cost of insurance premiums have increased 45% and many NH residents have no health covers....:

That we, the citizens of New Castle, New Hampshire, call on our elected officials from all levels of government, and those seeking office, to work with consumers, businesses, and health care providers to ensure that:

- Everyone, including the self-employed, unemployed, un- and underinsured, and small business owners, has access to an affordable basic health plan similar to what federal employees receive;
- Everyone, including employers, consumers, and the state, local and federal government, makes a responsible and fair contribution to finance the health care system;
- Everyone receives high quality care that is cost efficient and medically effective; and
- That these efforts help control the skyrocketing cost of health care.

ARTICLE XVIII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be needed to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE XIV: To hear the reports of agents, officers, committees, boards, and others heretofore chosen and to pass any vote in relation thereto.

ARTICLE XX: To transact such business as may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE TOWN CLERK

Minutes of the Annual Town Meeting of May 2002, a report of the Clerk's receipts for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2002, and the annual compilation of vital records are printed elsewhere in this volume.

As our population has grown, now reaching over 1,000 residents, the volume of work in the Clerk's Office has likewise expanded. In the past decade, motor vehicle permits have grown from 923 to 1265, a 37% increase. The number of dog licenses has increased by 44%.

In 1992, there were 700 registered voters in New Castle, now there are 966, a 38% increase. Preparation for elections is more time consuming and a much larger number of voters are voting by absentee ballot.

We make every effort to improve procedures and serve the town with maximum efficiency. Expansion of car and dog registration by mail is progressing and provides a convenience to many of our residents.

My Deputy Louis Klotz and I appreciate the assistance of everyone in the Town Office and give special thanks to Rosemary York, our dedicated volunteer from the R.S.V.P. program in Portsmouth.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

The past year has been busy and interesting, to say the least. There is much activity currently in progress and much more to come.

Wentworth Hotel Project:

At last, the Wentworth Hotel Project is in progress and there is an end in sight. We are hoping that the hotel will be an asset to the Town as the years go by.

As far as police issues go, we are not sure what is going to happen. There is no doubt that the activity for us will increase, but at what level and intensity, we are not sure. We will give it a year and come back to you with a report with any needs or requests. The management has been great so far as communication with the police and I see no reason that this should not continue.

UNH Project:

This project looks like it's going to add a great deal to the town. The project manager has addressed the police areas of concern of noise, parking, traffic and security. We do not see this project becoming another "Woods Hole" but something that is in keeping with the character and nature of New Castle. Time will tell, but so far, so good. If this project has any significance effect on police activity, we will again report back to you.

Seacoast Emergency Response Team (SERT):

The New Castle Police Department is involved in and very supportive of the Seacoast Emergency Response Team (SERT). The team is a collation of seacoast towns that have banded together for mutual aid and protection. We are proud to be a "plank owner" of the team and support the team is its mission of police protection services and homeland security.

The SERT team is the first responding agency to any threats to the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant and Pease Trade Port. In the past year, the team has been involved with events in Hampton, Portsmouth, Newmarket, and Stratham when the incidents have been beyond the capabilities of the local police department. All incidents were handled professionally and happily without injury to anyone involved. We all sleep safer knowing the team can respond to anywhere on the New Hampshire Seacoast with fifteen minutes or less.

We are also working in complete cooperation with the Coast Guard and New Hampshire Marine Patrol in safety and security missions. We must never forget that New Castle is an island town.

Fire Lieutenant/Police Officer David Blanding:

We are delighted to have David Blanding as our new Public Safety Officer. David Blanding comes to us from the Coast Guard and is highly qualified in many areas for both police and fire science. The hiring of a multi-skilled person for the Town of New Castle show creative thinking that along with inter-department cooperation can go along a long way to increasing services at little expense to the taxpayer.

Emergency Medical Services:

We are proud to announce that Sgt. Douglas Cummings has just completed his certification to become an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT). Now 75% of the Police Department officers are EMT's - an incredibly high percentage of which we are extremely proud. We stand ready to assist the Fire Department in their Emergency Medical mission.

REPORT OF THE ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

The town licensed 163 dogs during the year 2002, licenses and fines brought in approximately \$1,067 in revenue to the town. Dog licensing for this year has already started and as most of you are already aware, there is a new procedure for licensing dogs in place. So far, the new procedures have been well received. I'm hoping to achieve 100% compliance this year and avoid having to issue civil forfeitures for unlicensed dogs, so if you haven't already licensed your dog, please do so before April 30th.

In 2002, we only had to process and test one deceased bird for the West Nile Virus compared to five in 2001. I'm very happy to report that all tested negative for the disease. As a reminder, the town has taken steps to minimize the community's exposure to this disease; however, the best method is for residents to not allow water to stand for any length of time as this helps breed the mosquitoes that carry the disease. FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Department Membership:

The year 2002 saw a change in how the Town provides fire and emergency medical services to your community. In the past, volunteers who received a stipend wage for their services provided these services. This past year a full time Public Safety Officer was hired to benefit both the fire and police departments. David Blanding who is retired from the US Coast Guard and a long time member of the fire department was hired in this position upon his retirement. David joined the Rye Police Department once he retired and become one of their full time police officers. Still a member of the New Castle Fire Department, he rose to the rank of Lieutenant and became an emergency medical technician. When this Public Safety Officer position was being created (New Hampshire certified firefighter, emergency medical technician and police officer) we realized David Blanding had the certifications for the position. Dave works as a Fire Lieutenant on Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday and as a Police Officer on Sunday.

The primary task as Fire Lieutenant is to handle the daily business of running a Fire Department. This allows the volunteers to focus on training and responding to emergency calls. His duties as a Fire Lieutenant include maintenance on the apparatus, equipment, building and protective clothing. Additionally, he coordinates and participates in teaching fire training both in the classroom and outside drills. He participates in fire prevention with inspections at homes, public buildings, marinas, and the Wentworth Hotel construction. He issues permits for oil burners installations and burning permits. His hours are as follows: *Monday noon to 5pm & 6 to 9pm*

Tuesday 8am to 4pm Wednesday 8am to 4pm.

I cannot stress enough the need for new members. Let me be honest with you all. The familiar faces you all have seen responding to emergencies over the many years are getting older. We have a handful of new younger faces who participate; however most of these members live out of town and have a 7 to 10 minute drive into Town. I know I sound like a broken record; however we either find younger people in town to volunteer or the Town will need to look at other avenues to provide fire and emergency medical services. To this end, the Fire Department will embark on a "long range study" of New Castle's fire and emergency medical services. These avenues may include part time pay for members, more full time personnel and I'm sure contracted services. The two most important factors will be <u>cost</u> and <u>level of service</u> desired by the citizens of New Castle. Does this these mean changes will happen soon? No, however I believe you will see gradual change in how fire and emergency medical services are provided. We can stay on the same path as in the past, keeping costs down if we can fill the member needs with volunteers.

Wentworth Hotel Project:

The renovations of old and the construction of new have seen the Wentworth Hotel project come to fruition. This project has been twenty plus years in the making for many serving. The department has had a fire protection engineer on staff during the design and construction of this project. The department has participated in the review of plans and the construction phase with meetings, inspections and continuous tours of building. Additionally, we have studied neighboring hotels of similar size, costs and services as to the demands placed on the Fire Department. We believe this establishment will increase the number of emergency calls by the department by 35 annually. Additionally, we expect 1 or 2 visits per month providing fire prevention services.

War on Terrorism:

Locally, the war on terrorism has been quiet, as the general public has been able to deal with this issue on a personal level. I am happy to report that the New Castle Fire Department has not responded to any terrorist type incidents during 2002.

On December 13, 2002, the President announced a smallpox vaccination plan to better protect the American people against the threat of a smallpox attack by hostile groups or governments. This plan is completely <u>voluntary</u> and is broken into three phases as follows.

- Public health and hospital workers who would be charged with conducting any initial investigation and treatment of a suspected smallpox outbreak.
- 2. Emergency services and health care workers including the fire service.
- 3. General public.

This Presidential plan has been widely covered by our local and national press. As implementation of plan begins more information will be made to all. Your fire department will be a part of the overall process.

September 11, 2001, has changed our way of life as we know it individually. The firefighters and emergency medical technicians have hung our country's flag on the front of the Fire Station making a statement "WE WILL NEVER FORGET". Each year on September 11th, a new flag will replace the old. I hope you will join us in changing of the colors. Thank you for continual support of the New Castle Fire Department.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands cooperate and coordinate to reduce the risk of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ALL outside burning. Fire permits are mandatory for all outside burning unless the ground where the burning is to be done (and surrounding areas) is completely covered with snow. Violations of RSA 227-L: 17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail, plus suppression cost. However, please note that due to the proximity of our homes in New Castle, burning permits are required at all times, even if it is raining or there is snow on the ground.

A new law effective January 1, 2003 prohibits residential trash burning (RSA 125-N). Contact New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services at (800) 498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information.

Help us to protect you and our forest resources. Most New Hampshire wildfires are human caused. Homeowners can help protect their homes by maintaining adequate green space around the house and make sure that the house number is correct and visible. EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REPORT

As we reflect back on the events of 2002, we see a world that continues to challenge our senses. It seems as not a week goes by that doesn't contain a news story about some terrorism related event or new threat. Locally, we have heard about smallpox and anthrax vaccinations against possible biological weapons and potassium iodide tablets in case of radiation exposure. We've even heard of the use of duct tape and plastic sheeting in case of attack.

We must realize that preparing ourselves for a possible terrorism event is only one part of our overall personal readiness. Are you ready for that winter storm that keeps us homebound for several days? What about a power failure? Wind event? While the past several years have been relatively mild with respect to hurricane visits, is this going to be "our year"? Do you carry comfort / survival items in your vehicles? You will know what I mean if you've ever been stuck in a snow bank and had to wait for several hours for a tow truck.

Maintaining a stockpile of canned goods and bottled water is always advisable. Try to have spare medications on hand. If you have medical devices, such as, oxygen generators in your home, ensure that they can function when the power goes off. If you have backup batteries for these devices, ensure that they are checked and capable of giving you the protection you need.

You can be assured that the New Hampshire Office of Emergency Management and New Castle's Emergency Management team are working closely together to make sure that New Castle is as prepared and informed as possible for any manner of event which may happen. You remain a key cog in the wheel of protection. Have you noticed individuals or activities that appear out of character? We must remain vigilant and report what we have noticed to the authorities. It costs nothing to call. Vigilance on the part of everyone will prove to be one of the most productive intelligence sources. Don't let vigilance become paranoia. Live a normal life. Be safe, be prepared. We'll keep you informed.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The present Planning Board has continued to review the current Zoning Ordinance, Building Code Ordinance, Subdivision Regulations, Site Plan Review Regulations and with input from the Selectmen, the Board of Adjustment, Conservation Commission, the Building Official, Historic District Commission, the Rockingham Planning Commission and the general public and has made changes to some of the zoning ordinances which will appear on the ballot of the up coming May 2003 Town Meeting for your consideration.

During the Year 2002 the Planning Board has stayed informed on the on-going dialogue between the Town of New Castle and UNH's Director of Facilities, Design & Construction at UNH regarding the New Castle Marine Research Facility and Pier.

Mid-Year the Planning Board approved a four unit condominium development submitted and requested by Appleton Wentworth, LLC to be constructed off of Route 1B. Such approval carries several terms and conditions imposed by the Planning Board.

During the year W.W. Resort LLC submitted and requested approval of 18 Extended Stay Units to be constructed within the footprint of the "The Ship" next to the Wentworth Marina. After several meetings the approval was granted with certain terms and conditions set by the Planning Board.

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT

The responsibility of the Public Works Department is to manage all maintenance, administration, and capital expenditures relating to the water distribution system, as well as the sewer collection system that are owned by the town. The City of Portsmouth owns part of the water system from the Wentworth Hotel down the Wentworth Road to the corner of Main Street

Last spring, we replaced the standby generators in the three pumping stations. The old generators were approximately 25 years old and had reached their life expectancy. The new generators are quieter and more energy efficient.

The department will continue to spot check various indoor residential meters to see if there are any problems which need to be corrected. We will also be checking to make sure that no sump pumps are discharging into the town sewer, as this is a violation of Section 5 Paragraph H of the Sewer & Water Ordinance of the Town of New Castle. We appreciate your cooperation in both these matters.

During this year, we will continue to install new, state-of-the-art residential water meters. These are more accurate than the present remote meters that are currently being used.

We have now installed 263 meters and hope that all meters will be installed by the end of this year.

We are sorry to report that after more than 10 years, we are forced to increase the sewer rate by 16%. The minimum rates are now as follows: The minimum rate for water: \$34.80 per 15,000 gallons The minimum rate for sewer: \$48.84 per 15,000 gallons (Combination for sewer & water: \$83.64)

The water/sewer bills are issued three times a year. Your bill reflects usage for the four months prior to the billing date. Bills are sent around the first of April, August and December. The minimum usage is 2,000 cubic feet or 15,000 gallons.

We would like to remind residents that you have the option of applying for a separate water meter for outdoor water usage. This can be for watering the lawn, washing vehicles, etc. Water pumped through this secondary meter will only be charged for the water used; not for sewer usage, since no sewer is involved in this venue. All costs for this separate meter are born by the resident. Applications and full instructions are available at the Town Hall. An application must be filed and accepted prior to installing the second meter.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT REPORT

The New Castle Zoning Board of Adjustment held five meetings in 2002 and heard four cases. There were two Special Exception requests, one for a pier, granted, and one for a fence taller than 6 feet, withdrawn by the applicant at the hearing.

In Special Exception the Board is determining if prescribed requirements have been met or not. If the requirements are met, the Board must grant the request. If not met, the Board must deny the request.

There were two requests for variances, one for construction within 50 feet of a tidal zone, approved. The other was for a small second floor deck within the 10 feet side setback, approved with some changes.

In variance requests the Board is primarily determining whether or not complying with the zoning ordinance would result in an unnecessary hardship considering the purpose of the ordinance terms and the physical characteristics of the lot as compared to other lots of the same size and similarly located.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUND

The town's trust funds totaling \$692,698 at 12/31/02 represented the aggregate of permanent endowments, capital reserves, and temporary escrows established by town votes, gifts, and town departments. The funds are merged into one pool and the aggregate return allocated proportionately. Each fund has separate restrictions on withdrawals of principal or income.

The funds are invested 64% in Government Agency bonds and 36% in bond mutual funds. The Agency bonds yield from 4.95% to 6.75% and the bond funds average yield has been over 5.37%. The income is disbursed annually to the Library, for cemetery maintenance, and for improvements at the Common from the Road Race funds. The income is accumulated in the reserves for town capital requirements including sewer and water capital improvements.

The three trustees meet as needed for investment or appropriation purposes and determine the asset allocation of the investments. Low interest rates currently make it difficult to find attractive rates in individual bonds, hence the recent investment in bond funds with a more diversified portfolio.

CEMETERY TRUSTEES' REPORT

RIVERSIDE CEMETERY:

Cemetery Trustee Bill Lanham has completed a new cemetery layout which will accommodate additional cremation lots and a limited number of traditional lots which will be made available by late spring. These lots will be available to those who are presently full time residents and those who have been residents and declared New Castle his or her residence for at least 10 consecutive years.

In the fall of this year a new tool shed was built at Riverside Cemetery to centralize all tools, equipment, and supplies in one location from which all other town cemeteries will be serviced.

OCEANSIDE CEMETERY:

During this year a major portion of the construction of the new cemetery was completed, all granite posts were installed, curbing was installed at the front entrance, service road leading to the cemetery entrance was paved, the inner road of the cemetery received a final cost of hot top, loam was brought in and placed through out the cemetery including the center island all of which will be hydro seeded in the spring of 2003.

Items to be completed during the year 2003 are the installation of heavy chain between the granite posts, the installation of water spigots, electricity to center island, and flag pole within the center island and the completion of landscaping.

Estimated cost to complete construction of the new cemetery is approximately \$19,000 of which \$12,191 remains as a balance within the FY2003 budget and \$7,000 from trust funds allocated for new cemetery construction.

Keeping within the budget allocation each year for new construction beginning July 1, 1999 thru January 8, 2003, the total cost is as follows:

She was instrumental in building and diversifying the Library's book collection and developing children's programs. Most notably, Judy's stewardship resulted in a significant increase in the Library's circulation. The Trustees wish Judy well.

On a happier note, the Trustees are pleased to announce that Gene Fox of York, Me. assumed the Director's position on February 4, 2003. Gene and Judy worked together for a period of two weeks before Judy's departure on February 14, 2003. The overlapping work schedule permitted Judy to familiarize Gene with the operation of the Library and resulted in a seamless transition.

Prior to assuming the Director's position, Gene served as the Public Services Librarian at the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge, Massachusetts. He has a M.L.I.S., Library and Information Science degree, from Simmons College in Boston, Massachusetts. When not otherwise engaged in library work, Gene writes poetry.

The Library is presently open Tuesdays 1-7, Wednesdays 1-5, Thursdays 9-3 and Fridays 1-5. Ultimately, the Trustees would like to see the hours of operation of the Library expanded further. This possibility is being explored through the Experience Works program which is housed within the New Hampshire Department of Employment Security in Portsmouth, NH. The Experience Works program funds part time positions for qualified older workers who wish to continue participating in the workforce.

The Trustees meet in the Macomber Room at the Library every third Tuesday of the month. The meetings commence at 4PM and typically last one hour. Any resident of New Castle is welcome to attend such meetings to offer ideas and suggestions on improving the delivery of library services to the Town and its residents.

Finally, it must be noted that the operation of the Library would not be possible without the services of the Library's many dedicated volunteers. The volunteers are a key component to the ongoing success of the Library.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Conservation Commission was established for two main reasons. First, for the protection and proper utilization of the town's natural resources and second, for the protection of the watershed resources of the town. Currently, the commission consists of seven regular members and two alternates. The Commission meets every month and schedules extra workshops as needed to handle special projects.

Much of this year's work has been a continuation of projects started in 2001. We continued working with the State on a project studying the effects of beetles imported to control the spread of the invasive plant, Purple Loosetrife. Beetles were released into specific wetlands sites which were monitored and the resulting studies were then turned over to a NH State entomologist. This project should be completed by the end of this summer. Towns throughout NH have been involved with this project and the conclusions derived from this three-year project should help develop methods of controlling the spread of this invasive plant. Once again we are grateful for the financial support of the Great Island Garden Club, which underwrote the cost of this project.

The Commission, having received a grant from the NH Estuaries Project, has been able to complete the second phase of the Bull Toad Pond project. Working closely with the Rockingham County Conservation District, we have monitored the salinity of the pond (located between Beach Hill Road and the Common) and scientists have studied the area and made recommendations for restoration efforts. Under the direction of Commission member, Linda Ball, who enabled us to get the Estuaries Project grant, more than twenty volunteers have contributed more than 100 hours working various aspects of this project. In order to continue onto the next phase, we are in the process again of looking into grants. There is grant money available which we hope to receive so, hopefully, work in the pond area will commence this summer.

Working with the Selectmen and the Rockingham Planning Commission, the Commission is in the process of up-dating the 1984 Master Plan for the Common to include the Bull Toad Pond area.

The Commission is also investigating restoration of all the salt marshes on the island. At one time, these marshes were probably connected and were filled by tidal waters. With development, access to salt water has become clogged and many of the marshes have become predominately fresh water marshes, thus allowing the influx of invasive exotic plants such as the Common Reed (Phragmites australis), Cat Tails and Purple Loosetrife. When these wetlands are restored they will again support the native plants that once thrived in the salt marshes. These wetlands provide breeding, nesting and feeding habitats for waterfowl, shorebirds and other wildlife. The Commission, working with the USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), will be working with landowners and the Town on this project. The restoration of New Castle salt marshes will complete the chain of healthy salt marshes on the Seacoast, following the lead of Rye and North Hampton. The first marsh area to be dealt with is the small

one on River Road. The culvert under River Road that used to allow tidal waters to flow in and out of the marsh is undersized and is filled with sediment. Specialists will survey the property, perform flood and flow surveys, get an elevation survey and then the Town will fill out a Wetlands Reserve Application (WRA) with NRCS to get the ball rolling. We hope that this process will begin as soon as the snow is gone.

The Commission continues to spearhead recycling "green waste" and the Town's compost pile supplies the Department of Public Works with essential organic amendments to use around the plantings at the Library and Recreation Building.

And, finally, the Commission has dealt with 11 wetlands applications pertaining to building houses or docks adjacent to protected shore lands and wetlands. We have also looked into two possible wetlands violations and we continue to work closely with the State's Department of Environmental Services.

TOWN HISTORIAN'S REPORT

In the 310 years since our incorporation, the official records of the town have been kept by a variety of individuals elected each year to the office of Town Clerk. The first of these was Theodore Atkinson, for whom our Atkinson Street was named. Many of the records are works of art, and reflect the care and pride with which they were kept. Some are difficult to read, because of the quality of ink and paper used in early times. As time went on other records were added in increasing numbers by an ever expanding list of office holders and appointees. Today we have volumes of records compiled by individuals who serve the town in various capacities.

While the volume of record keeping has continued to increase, the storage area needed has not. Perhaps seventy-five per cent of the records retained are those whose retention is not required by law; yet their historical significance gives pause to their destruction.

It is for this reason that I have given my wholehearted support to the effort by the New Castle Historical Society to save the old library. Not only will it become a needed home for the Society, but an ideal repository for the many archives surplus to the needs of the town. Much has to be accomplished before the building is made adequate. Sufficient safeguards for preservation of such materials is necessary, but I believe our townspeople will see that this effort succeeds.

NEW CASTLE MOSQUITO CONTROL REPORT

Spring mosquito development in roadside ditches, woodland pools, and red maple swamps was controlled in April and early May of 2002 with bacterium applications. There were sites scattered throughout the town that required control. The woods were very dry in the spring of 2002, as in the previous three springs. The large amount of snow this winter will likely result in a wet spring with above average mosquito breeding. There are several salt marshes in New Castle that provide ideal habitat for mosquito breeding. The salt marshes required periodic attention during the summer and fall months of 2002 due to continual flooding from thundershowers, spring tides, and storm tides. Salt marsh mosquitoes can readily fly three miles from their breeding areas and therefore affect everyone in New Castle. All neighboring communities control their salt marshes.

There were numerous site visits to New Castle salt marshes and freshwater wetlands by state and federal authorities in 2002. The Board of Selectmen and Conservation Commission are actively pursuing potential wetland restoration sites. Grace Bottitta from Ducks Unlimited, Inc. has been instrumental in aiding the town's efforts. One of the benefits in restoration projects is the control of mosquito breeding by minnows.

West Nile Virus (WNV) was present in the seacoast in 2002. Portsmouth had its first confirmed dead bird from WNV in September. Statewide, the number of dead birds identified with WNV rose four times the previous year. Nationwide, WNV spread rapidly across the Great Plains and now is near the West Coast. Illinois and Mississippi had severe WNV outbreaks with many human fatalities.

West Nile Virus (WNV) is becoming endemic to the seacoast area. It is alarming that the state had identified native mosquito populations with WNV in 2001 and in 2002. The number of different mosquito species capable of vectoring WNV has grown in the northeast and now includes salt marsh species. As a result of WNV, the number of mosquito control programs statewide and nationwide has increased dramatically.

We have adapted our program to control mosquitoes in catch basins and other freshwater habitats of mosquito species known to vector WNV. One of them, the Asian Bush Mosquito, was found in Portsmouth and Dover in 2002. The CDC in Atlanta advises that mosquito populations be substantially reduced during WNV outbreaks; therefore we have developed an emergency plan for a WNV response that can be quickly enacted, if necessary.

It is important to survey your property for mosquito breeding. A pool cover holding water and leaves can harbor over 100,000 mosquito larvae at any one time. Tires without rims should be covered to prevent rainwater from entering. There are three species of mosquitoes that prefer to develop in tires and small containers holding water and all three are prime candidates for transmitting WNV. Clean out the gutters and prevent them from holding water. Change bird bath water every five days.

RECREATION COMMITTEE REPORT

January 1st marked the grand opening of the outdoor skating rink at the Great Island Common. Over 100 people attended the event. Our timing was perfect, as we ran out of hot dogs just as the ice started to sink, due to the warm weather and heavy load! Despite one of the warmest winters on record, the skating rink was a big success. All proceeds for the rink were raised through the Great Island Road Race. Our thanks go out to all who helped plan and implement the rink. In particular, I would like to thank Stu Levenson, Roger Epstein and Bob Stevens.

The Easter Egg Hunt in the spring drew over 90 children, who were thrilled to run around the Common and gather candy filled eggs. In addition, each child received a special gift. Our special thanks go out to Pamela Stearns for helping to coordinate the activities, and the Fire Department, which once again provided transportation throughout the town, for the Easter Bunny.

Halloween proved to be full of Tricks and Treats! Over 100 brave souls had enough courage to enter a haunted Town Hall to collect a bag full of treats. Our thanks go out to Jessica McCormack and friends who provided just the right amount of fright to a wide variety of ghoulish children.

Much of our effort in 2002 went into conducting the Ninth Annual Great Island road race. 1000 people registered for the race including over 60 hearty New Castle residents who ran or walked the 5K course. The Kids Fun Runs were the highlight of the day for many, as over 250 kids from 1 - 12 years of age took part. In appreciation for all of the great Fun Run artwork created by the kids at MHT Elementary School, over 50 MHT students were able to participate in the Fun Runs, free of charge. Once again we are thankful for all of you who were an integral part of the race, through baking food, making a personal donation and/or volunteering your time and resources. We would also like to thank the Police and Fire Departments for all of their effort to ensure the safety of all who participated. Please be sure to join us this October 12th, for our 10th anniversary race!

The Recreation Committee also gave \$125 each to the Rye Little League and the Rye Recreation Youth Soccer and Basketball programs. Many New Castle children participate in these activities year in and year out. We are very grateful to participate with Rye in these programs, as well as the indoor tennis lessons.
