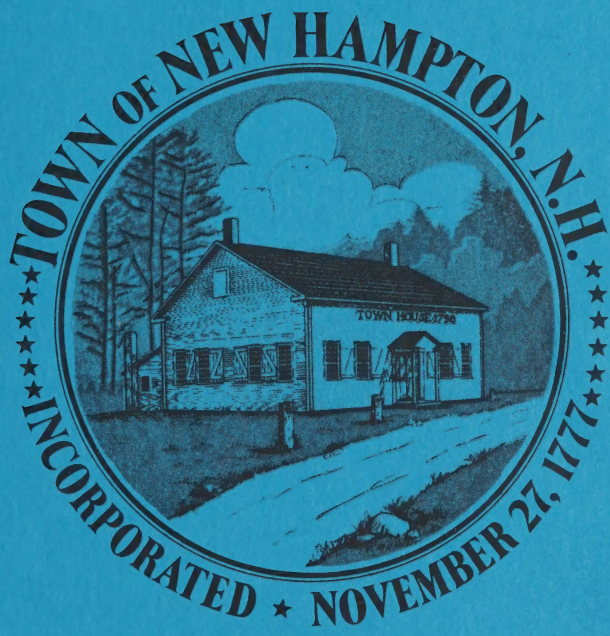

# Town Warrant

## The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton, New Hampshire, in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Hampton Town House on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town Officers and for questions required by law to be on the ballots. Polls to close not later than 7 P.M.

1. Shall the Town adopt the zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board.
2. Shall we adopt the Provisions of RSA 654.34A permitting application for changes in party affiliation to be made with the Town Clerk.

The remainder of the Warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Saturday, March 14, 1981 at 10:00 A.M.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be put into the Capital Reserve Fund for a new Fire Truck and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2200.00 for the balance of repairs of Two Town Bridges (1) on Blake Hill Road over Prescott Brook No. 031-023 (2) on Blake Hill Road over Blake Brook No. 66-061 and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purchase of a one ton dump truck and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$98,000.00 for the construction of a Town office building on 3B South, known as the old school house and the old Town shed, and to further authorize and empower the Selectmen to issue serial notes or bonds in the name of the Town and on the credit of the town and to fix time and place of payment, the rate of interest

terms and maturities and provide for the sale thereof for a period not exceeding ten years and to further authorize and empower the Selectmen to perform all other acts necessary to accomplish the raising of such voted sum all in accordance with the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, Chapter 33, known as the Municipal Finance Act and any amendments applied thereto.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Lakes Region General Hospital, The Franklin Regional Hospital, The Sceva Spear Hospital and the Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$102,300.00 for the maintenance and repair of Highway & Bridges. Such sum with the Highway Subsidies and Duncan Fund would total to \$130,861.92.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1181.97 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$7879.81 for a total of \$9061.78 in joint funds.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for the care of cemeteries.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,105.00 for Regional Associations. NANA \$4000.00; Bristol Community Center \$1,011.26; Community Action Program \$925.00; Lakes Region Planning \$917.00; Lakes Region Family Service \$200.00; Lakes Region Association \$52.50.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$28,000.00 to hard surface Pinnacle Hill Road from the end of the present hard surface at the Larry Blood residence to Sinclair Hill Road, a distance of 2816 feet.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 as its share of the cost for improvements to West Shore Road, Lake Winona provided the Winona Improvement Association contributes \$800.00 as its share of the cost. Said improvements to be made by private contractors under the Supervision of the Selectmen.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize expenditures for improvements and maintenance necessary to provide year round access to Seminole Avenue on Lake Waukegan and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 as its share of the cost provided the Seminole Avenue Association



contributes \$800.00. Said improvements to be made by private contractors under the supervision of the Selectmen.

16. To see what action the Town will take to raise and appropriate a sum of money to upgrade and repair the balance of the road beyond the Scribner Fellows State Forest on the property of George Ulrich, formerly Wilfred Taylor property. Such sum not to exceed \$500.00 and would be matched by George and Judith Ulrich. Said improvements to be made by private contractors, under the supervision of the Selectmen.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for the establishment of reservoirs for fire protection under the supervision of the Selectmen.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$325.00 for patriotic purposes.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the New Hampton Community Kindergarten.

20. To see if the town will vote, under RSA 31:105, to indemnify and save harmless any employee, member or officer of the Board of Selectmen, Administrative staff, board or other agencies, who suffer personal financial loss or expense, including reasonable legal fees and costs, that may occur after the date of this vote which loss or expense arises out of any claim, demand or judgement by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to or destruction of property provided the indemnified person at the time of the accident was acting in the scope of his or her employment or office.

21. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in property taxes to five percent and to limit the annual increase in spending by the State or any city, town or other governmental unit of the State to five percent. (Petition)

22. To see if the Town will vote to postpone any more zoning ordinances outside the village precinct for (3) years if zoning is defeated at the 1981 town meeting. (Petition)

23. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a gift a parcel of land on Lake Pemigewasset formerly known as the Walker Boat Landing, such property to be administered by the New Hampton Conservation

Commission.

24. To see if the Town will vote to continue a permanent Conservation Fund as approved in March 1975, to which annual appropriations and other accumulated funds will be credited and allowed to accumulated from year to year. This fund is established in accordance with the provisions of RSA 36-A:5.

25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State funds which may be made available during 1981. Further, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated with applicable Federal or State regulations.

26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.

28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collectors deed as justice may be.

29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

# New Hampton Police Department

## 1980 Annual Report

The highlight of 1980 was the addition of a second full-time police officer as was authorized at the annual town meeting. On July 1st Merritt Douglas Salmon, formerly of Vernon, Conn., was hired to fill this position. Officer Salmon's prior experience included serving with the Connecticut State Police auxiliary force and a special officer with the Tolland, Connecticut Police Department. This fall Officer Salmon attended an eight week course at the New Hampshire Police Academy which he successfully completed and is now a certified police officer.

Criminal statistics for 1980 showed a slight decrease with 12 burglaries to seasonal homes, one burglary at a year round home and six burglaries to businesses. There were 16 thefts and 16 acts of vandalism reported. The dispatch center recorded 1797 telephone calls and complaints to the department. There were no fatal motor vehicle accidents for the town of New Hampton during the past year.

There is an article in the 1981 town warrant concerning the remodeling of the old town shed into a town office building. I hope that you will support this article. The Police Department has basically had to work out of the cruiser as the department has no office facility. The officers do not have any place to conduct a proper interview or interrogation at present. Department records are presently kept at the Chief's home as there is no other reasonably secure place for them.

Once again thank you for the excellent cooperation and support you have given the Police Department.

# **New Hampton Fire Department 1980**

The New Hampton Fire Department would like to express its appreciation to the New Hampton residents for their cooperation in fire control and prevention.

The town once again had relatively few fire calls caused by the residents, except for chimney and grass or brush fires.

The Fire Department would like to offer its assistance in attempting to reduce these calls by suggestions and inspections relative to woodstove and chimney installations and maintenance.

New Hampton fire fighters are still maintaining their better than average response time in relation to Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid Association's unmanned departments.

The 1980 Fire Department year recorded 82 fires or fire related calls: 18 grass or brush, 19 chimney, 3 forest, 5 Mutual Aid at scene, 10 Mutual Aid cover truck assignments, 4 structure, 5 car fires, 8 car accidents with 10 miscellaneous including again one controlled permit to burn not reported.

Due to the fire fighters' efficiency in the handling of fire calls the fire fighting time was held to a minimum in spite of the increase in calls. This allowed the budget to accommodate a 10 percent hourly pay rate increase which is still below the Federal minimum wage.

The New Hampton muster team's first attempt at sponsoring a muster was a success. Another will be held this June 28th.

The Fire Department Bylaws Committee is spending many hours in rewriting and reorganizing the bylaws, rules and regulations, and procedures to better facilitate the Fire Department organization.

# Forest Fire Report

## Report Of Forest Fire Warden And State Forest Fire Service New Hampton

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town-city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town-city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

## **New Hampton Rescue Squad**

More than 900 man hours were spent in training and certification by members of the rescue squad in 1980. Nine people were trained in Advanced First Aid, eight people in Cardiac Pulmonary Resuscitation, and currently two people are training as Emergency Medical Technicians. One Advanced First Aider was added who moved in from another town. In 1981 we will sponsor C.P.R. and first aid courses in conjunction with the American Red Cross. These will be offered to the public.

In 1980 we responded to a wide variety of calls ranging from heart attacks to cut fingers; including broken hips, Grand Mal seizures, and injuries sustained in auto accidents.

Our members now number in the low teens, people who respond day or night, whenever the need arises. If you require our services call the emergency fire number, 1-524-1545 which is manned 24 hours a day by Lakes Region Fire Dispatch and we will come at no expense to you or to the Town.

# Highway Department 1980

Last Spring's interaction of this group with selected New Hampton students reporting on their Projects Period experiences was very rewarding to all the ages involved. The New Hampton Garden Club continues to maintain flower arrangements upstairs, and to plant and care for the big iron pot at the lower entrance. The New Hampton School is continuing the "Writers on Writing" series held in the Judge Nash Room for all interested persons. These cooperative efforts produce a very special quality for your library as do the individuals who share their arts and collections for exhibits. Many fine books, two original paintings, two of Fritz Robbins own newspaper plates, some monies, and the memorable program given by Rev. and Mrs. William Kitto, Priscilla Humbert's lecture on China and Ginger Armstrong's flute concert are further examples of gifts shared.

Two lasting building improvements this year were the installation of storm windows on the older section of the library and the repair-refinishing of all the oaken chairs.

A growth of 100 percent started the decade of the eighties for the Newfound Area Nursing Association.

The 8,838 visits were made to people living in the Bristol, Bridgewater, Alexandria, and New Hampton area. By comprehensive delivering of health care, we have been able to treat many of our people at home instead of in a more costly institutional setting. Visits to New Hampton alone totalled 1,569.

The addition of 24 hour a day seven day a week service was the major accomplishment of 1980. Hospice was started as a new component in August. In November we added a new professional dimension of social service.

As executive director of the agency, I feel we've only begun our enormous task of bringing optimum wellness to our citizenry. It is my fervent hope that we can continue to meet the needs of the people entrusted to our care.
