

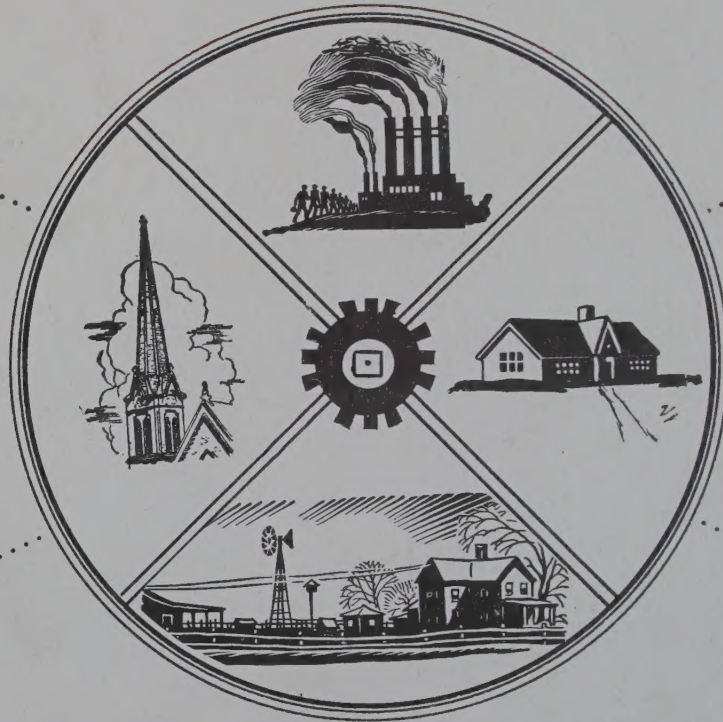

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PEMBROKE IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN THE TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after September 1, 1958, on all unpaid poll taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.
6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of beano in this Town.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of cemetery lots indicated:

(a) The Jeremiah Morgan Fund of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Jeremiah Morgan Lot in the Pembroke Street Cemetery.

(b) The E. W. Forrest Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the E. W. Forrest Lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.

(c) The Minnie Bradbury Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the John C. Bradbury Lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.

(d) The Kenneth M. Woodbury Fund of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Kenneth M. Woodbury Lot in the Pembroke Street Cemetery.

(e) The F. W. Saltmarsh Fund of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the F. W. Saltmarsh Lot in Evergreen Cemetery.

(f) The Albert Gage Fund of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Albert Gage Lot in Evergreen Cemetery.

(g) The Lyman E. Warren Fund of Six Hundred (\$600.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Lyman E. Warren Lot in the Pembroke Hill Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase for the Town a load packer truck for use in rubbish collection and other purposes; and for this purpose to authorize said Selectmen to borrow, on the credit of the Town, a sum of money not exceeding Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars by the issue of serial notes, and to determine the time and place of payment and the rate of interest thereon and provide for the sale thereof. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee).

9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the following roads as open highways and make said roads subject to gates and bars, as provided in Chapter 238, Section 2 of the Revised Statutes Annotated.

(a) Bear Brook Road, so-called, from the approach to the first bridge on said road to the Allenstown line, including the bridges.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer the funds now in the Class IV Road Fund to the Class V Road Fund.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a committee of seven men to act as a Bicentennial Committee to arrange for an appropriate celebration of the two hundredth anniversary of the incorporation of the Town of Pembroke; and to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars for that purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee).

12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Noyes Avenue, near the residence of Romeo Hebert; and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds therefore. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee).

13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Broadway at a location to be determined by the Board of Selectmen between poles 28 and 33; and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds therefore. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee).

14. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a hydrant on Academy Road, at a location to be determined by the Board of Water Commissioners; and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds there-fore. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and funds have been included in the Budget).

15. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a hydrant on Rowe Avenue, at a location to be determined by the Board of Water Commissioners; and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds there-fore. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and funds have been included in the Budget).

16. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to install parking meters in the business district of the Town, and to establish reasonable charges for parking to be paid through such meters; and to authorize the Selectmen to use the revenue derived from the use of meters for the purchase, maintenance and policing of such meters.

17. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of recon-structing Pembroke Hill Road and Fourth Range Road from the residence of Henry J. Cote on Pembroke Hill Road to the residence of Earl McCormack, a distance of one and one-half miles. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee).

18. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

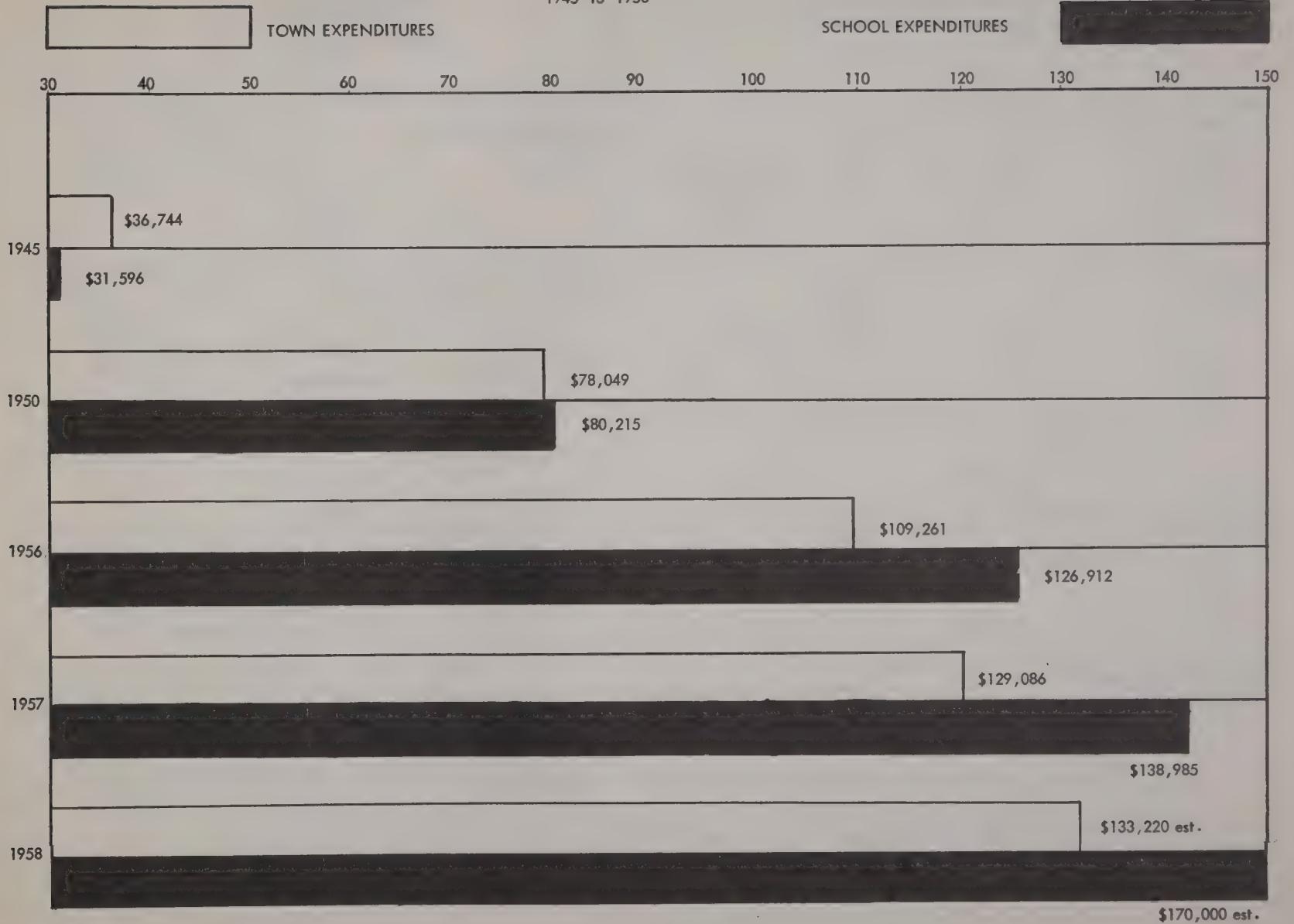

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

Thanks to the constant attention given fire prevention by you, the people, fire losses during the past year continued at a minimum. No serious fire occurred and this can also be attributed in part to the immediate notification of fire department personnel when a blaze is discovered, or as was the case on several occasions this year, when fire is suspected on the premises.

Strong emphasis was placed on drilling on the various categories of fire department problems. This program will be continued and to further this effort, plans are being made for a drill tower and allied equipment which will be built in the town-owned Memorial Field in the near future. Only through complete knowledge of practical and technical fire fighting methods can we hope to cope with the dangers of fire.

Continued progress was made in the Tri-Town Mutual Aid Compact, of which we are members. Drills were held with other departments in the compact participating, namely, Allenstown, Hooksett Village and South Hooksett Fire Departments. Improved methods of requesting aid from the compact, and responding to calls for assistance from member departments were set up. Fire inspection of major buildings in the various towns were also made by compact officials. Following the inspections, fire fighting plans for the buildings visited were discussed.

In closing, may I again express my gratitude to officers and members of the Fire Department for their interest in making the department a better one. To the townspeople, the sincere thanks of all the department personnel for their splendid support of our undertaking.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1958

To the School Board of Pembroke, N.H.:

May I present my eleventh annual report of Pembroke Elementary School and at the same time thank you for your help and advice in my attempt to make the school in Pembroke not only the most important part of the educational growth of the community, but also a place to which men and women of the highest sense of responsibility to the youth of the town will be attracted and who will make a worthwhile contribution to their basic needs and intellectual development.

Pembroke is one of the fastest growing towns in the state and in the next few years promises to set a higher rate of development than ever before. It is an indisputable fact to say that the planning and expansion of the town must run parallel with the enrollments of the school and the population growth. During this past year the most immediate need for school expansion has been realized in the addition which will be ready for the opening of the fall term. In the past ten years, we have passed from a small rural school where each room housed at least two grades with from four to seven teachers to a suburban educational system where there will be two teachers for every grade and two grades for every class within the next two years; or from an enrollment of 210 children to one of 420.

Beginning in 1960-61 every grade will enroll between 55 and 65 pupils. This will necessitate at least sixteen regular teachers plus what administrative, special, and supervisory teachers will be required to meet future rules and regulations of the State Educational System.

The day has past when the basic fundamentals are considered sufficient for children in a modern world; when public money was used for the favored few only to the education of all the children of all the people; when but certain subjects were offered and the child was fitted to the school to the education of the whole child where the school is more and more being geared to each and every child as an individual.

Society is demanding that the schools know more about their children; that these children be understood and their thinking be guided not only to those basic fundamentals of past generations, but also to the essential needs of the child who must live today and build an America whose educational systems have given us the men and women who built the first atomic bomb, who flew the first airplane, who launched the first atomic submarine, who led the world in thermoneuclear experiments, who developed mass production of automobiles, bathtubs, and telephones, and gave the world sulphadiazine, terramycin, and the Salk Vaccine.

These and many more great achievements and great men and women came from the classrooms and laboratories of these United States of America.

It is true that we in Pembroke have grown and prepared for future growth because the people have so fought and demanded such preparation. But the fight does not end here.

We must now place before these youngsters the chance to work in a library which is conducive to research and thought; vocational rooms with materials and equipment for the teaching of home-making and woodworking; the appreciation and absorption of some of the fine arts in music, art, and crafts; a realization of the need for a healthy and active body as well as a healthy and active mind; and a program set up and directed so as to guide, encourage, and train these boys and girls of ours for a most productive and gratifying life.

These are some of the goals involved in the training of the youth of today. There must never be a time in the growth of any child when he is not working and developing to his capacity whether it be mental, physical, spiritual, or social. Such training must have the guidance and understanding of master teachers and such help as can be derived from the necessary instructional

materials and equipment. This is the right of every child in a democracy. Therefore, as we approach the next plateau in our educational development in this community, let us weigh carefully those basic needs and essentials to our American way of life in the training of our children.

May I add my humble congratulations to the school board members and the men and women of the community who have worked so hard to bring to the town a school system second to none and who are still looking to the future for continued improvement and greater goals.

Pembroke Academy

To the Trustees of Pembroke Academy and the Superintendent of Schools:

Pembroke Academy opened in September with 243 students. From that time to January 24, or during the first half year, 13 boys and 3 girls have left and 5 boys and one girl entered, leaving an enrollment of 233. These students come from Allentown (46), Bow (2), Concord (2), Deerfield (2), Epsom (21), Manchester (1), and Pembroke (129). All towns are sending more students to us than last year, except Epsom. Attendance figures from the register show the following totals, and the comparison with last year's record:

Only 17 students have been neither absent nor tardy as compared to 52 at this time last year.

It was deemed expedient to change the school starting time from 8:40 to 8:00 o'clock. This has resulted in a very substantial increase in the incidence of tardiness. The outbreak of the "flu" and other illnesses has led to an increase in absenteeism.

We have four teachers who are new to our staff this year. Mrs. Alice Bean, who teaches Home Economics, returned after an absence of three years. Mrs. Hazel Hounsell, a graduate of U.N.H., teaches English. Mr. George Kelly, out of St. Anselm, teaches English, Latin and French. Mr. John McNamara, from U. of Illinois, teaches mathematics. Mr. Henry Munroe, from New England College, teaches social studies.

Mrs. Adine Chase and Mrs. Myra Munroe are cooking and serving hot lunches to about 130 students per day.

The Student Council, advised this year by Mr. Stanley Tufts, is very active in helping to plan a variety of activities to supplement the school's curriculum. The Athletic Association is doing a fine job of assisting in the operation of our interscholastic athletic program. We are providing this fine experience

for about sixty students. Many more are enjoying intra mural competition in such sports as table tennis, badminton, volley ball, and basketball.

Although the drop out rate has decreased since last year, several pupils who could profit by more school work have left school. Their parents are evidently not sufficiently interested in their welfare to see to it that these pupils take advantage of their opportunities.

We expect that some changes will have to be made in our program for next year in order for us to meet the new Minimum Standards of the State Department of Education. These changes will serve to make ours a better school, and one better able to meet the educational needs of the youth of our community.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

Mr. Martin G. Ferry retired as Superintendent of the Pembroke Water Works after completion of his three year contract which terminated January 15, 1957. Many thanks to Mr. Ferry for the many hours devoted to this water department. Mr. Ferry was replaced by Ernest L. Martel, who had at this time six years of experience with the water department. He was appointed by a unanimous vote of the Board of Water Commissioners.

The stand pipe on Brickett Hill Road was completely checked and painted inside as well as outside by the firm of Roy O. Leonard of Framingham, Massachusetts, for the contract price of \$3,500.00. It is estimated that this stand pipe will require painting every five years of service. The Leonard Firm was the one which painted the stand pipe for the first time when it was installed in the year 1949.

A total of 10,225 feet of 8" cast iron cement lined pipe was installed on Buck Street for a total cost of \$62,037.79. This installation was made by the R.H. White Company of Worcester, Massachusetts, the successful low bidder for this contract. Four firms submitted bids for this project. This installation included 7 new hydrants replacing the old type used on wooden main connections. At regular Town Meeting Day, March 12, 1957, a bond issue for the sum of \$70,000.00 was approved for this work. All services to consumers on this section of water main were renewed with copper tubing by the water department employees, as well as removal of the old hydrants. With the completion of this main line we find the water department clear of the old wooden main which serviced this community since 1914.

A total of 1050 feet of 2" cement lined pipe was installed starting at the residence of William Anderson to the Fleury residence on River Road in Allentown. This work was done by the department's men at a total cost of \$1,312.20. It has been found that cement lined pipe is superior to others for our use.

The building owned by the Water Department on North Main Street received a new roofing job. This was done by the State Roofing Company. The woodwork was painted and the windows were repaired and screened for protection. The grounds about the building were cleared for better appearance. The total sum of \$1,706.00 was spent on this building.

On the Academy Road a total of 1383 feet of 8" cast iron cement lined water main was installed to replace an old existing 2" main. This project was done by the Plourde Sand and Gravel Company with the aid of the water works employees on the installation of the pipe and fittings. The total cost of this work was \$8,068.11.

Many complaints have been received due to corrosion of water piping. These complaints were made due to the new well water. At the time the new system was installed the engineering firm of Metcalf & Eddy of Boston, Massachusetts had needed equipment installed at the pumping station for the insertion of soda ash into our water supply. With the aid of Mr. Richard Grossman, Senior Sanitary Engineer with the State Board of Health, numerous tests have been made over a period of months on our water. It has been found to have an acidity which needed correcting. After all tests were completed it was found that soda ash would be needed to remedy this acidity problem. We are now inserting the chemical and the yearly cost is figured to range about \$4,000.00. Mr. Grossman is still assisting our Superintendent with periodic tests which will continue for most of the year 1958. Many thanks to Mr. Grossman and the State Board of Health for their co-operation in this study. The services of Mr. Grossman and the State Board of Health were rendered to the water department at no cost is very much appreciated.



FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem - 97 percent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable - a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodland; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Careless and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires - all result in serious loss of property disruption of industry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort - The rules are simple.

1. Don't burn at home - use your town dump and avoid all fire problems .
2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fire places and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.
3. Be sure that all lighted material - cigars, cigarettes and matches - are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.
4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.
5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning re-

quirements.

6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER - the fire you prevent might be the one which could burn your property.
