THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rindge in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Rindge on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear and act upon the reports of the selectmen, overseer of the poor, town treasurer, town clerk, and reports of all agents, committees and officers heretofore chosen and act in any way relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to complete the Fitzwilliam road, so called, raise and appropriate, or set aside, the sum of \$4,250.00 for said purpose (the State to contribute \$12,750.00), or will accept State Aid for Class 5 roads known as "Town Road Aid" and raise and appropriate or set aside, for said purpose the sum of \$914.86 (the State to contribute \$3,659.51).

5. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the purchase of a tractor snow plow, or act in any way relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to defray the expense of diverting water from penetrating the foundations of the Ingalls Memorial Library, or act in any way relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110.00 to the Monadnock Region in Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

9. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see what method the Town will adopt to collect taxes.

11. To see if the Town will vote to plow out entrances, raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for same, or act in any way relating thereto.

12. To see what action the Town will take relative to Flood Control in the Upper Contoocook Valley.

13. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen full jurisdiction over the removal of snow or take any action relative thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to elect one or three road agents or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Highway Agent to give first service to the town roads, in the removal of snow and repairs, prior to any other occupation that he may have or take any action relative thereto. 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

During the past year, Ingalls Memorial Library has performed its function in the Town in the usual quietly-adequate way. Our Librarian takes a wholehearted interest in the important duties of her office. The children and young people, especially, find in her an interested friend, always ready to help with material for their school assignments.

Our fellow-townsman, Mr. Frederick L. Barrett, has found it necessary to retire from his duties as janitor of the Library. For forty-five years, ever since the establishment of Ingalls Library, Mr. Barrett has been an important part of it, going in and out in his quiet way, evidencing a personal pride in the efficient care of the building. The trustees take this occasion to express their deep appreciation of Mr. Barrett's interested and faithful service, over this long term of years. We know he will continue to have the interest of the library close to his heart. At the present time Mr. Everett Rice is serving the library as janitor.

In October we were reminded of Miss Ware's never-failing interest in Ingalls Library, when we were notified of her bequest of \$3,675. This generous gift has been added to other trust funds which have been bestowed upon our library during the past years.

The New Hampshire Library Association, at its annual meeting in 1937, voted to put into effect a plan of voluntary certification of libraries. Your trustees, at their meeting in September, voted to endorse certification for our library. Our present librarian was already duly certified. In the interests of upkeep of our building and equipment, a very much needed refinishing job has been done on the front door and adjoining woodwork, four chairs . have been re-caned, and some repair work done on the furnace. No work has as yet been done to prevent the seepage of water through the foundations, as no money for that purpose has been available. An article to raise and appropriate funds for that purpose appears in this year's town warrant; your library trustees earnestly hope that the Town will vote to make the requested sum available for this work which is so important for the preservation of our valuable building.

We wish to express thanks to the following friends who have made helpful and interesting contributions to the circulating department or the museum:—Mrs. Arthur Allen, Mrs. Richards, Mrs. Gertrude Hale, Mrs. Mabel Jones and Mr. A. Shurcliff, for books and magazines; Mrs. Harvey Hale for a steel engraving depicting the signing of the Declaration of Independence; Mr. Frank Wetherbee for a scarf which belonged to Dr. Isaiah Whitney, a physician who came to Rindge in 1790, and lived here until his death in 1839. Dr. Whitney was a great grandfather of Mrs. Frank Wetherbee.

"I would not choose to live in a town without a library," is a sentiment often expressed to your librarian, and yet there are many of our adult citizens who do not use our library freely; the summer people appreciate it and the boys and girls use it; are the adults overlooking a worth while opportunity?

Our circulation shows an increase over that of last year, and an interesting fact is that 60% of the adult reading is non-fiction. This may be due in part to the added stimulus given to the best reading, by our participation in a State reading contest, sponsored by the Congregational-Christian Church, which leads us wisely on to some of the choicest books of the season. I would invite new readers to join us in the coming year; there is no expense and no obligation, except to follow the guidance of our more experienced librarians and literary leaders. Also we are still able to borrow books from our State libraries at a very small cost, averaging 3 cents per book, which places at our disposal some of the more expensive up to date books which we could not afford to buy. For the first time a record of books borrowed from the State libraries has been kept.

The past year has been an active and progressive one with harmonious relations between the borrowing public and the library staff. Visitors to the museum have been frequent and they are always enthusiastic over the treasures exhibited there. On Old Home Sunday the attendance at the library numbered 27 and the yearly record of visits to the museum is 101. This does not include the repeated visits of the Town children.

After ten years of service in co-operation with our retiring janitor, Mr. Frederick L. Barrett, I wish to express my appreciation of his unfailing help and sympathetic interest in the welfare of the library as well as in my own personal problems as librarian.

The West Rindge Branch Library is passing through a transition period—the old order changeth for a new—and this condition is reflected in considerably less circulation than usual. This might well be expected to follow the series of losses which have overtaken the administrative forces of the library. When our patron and benefactor, Miss Mary Lee Ware passed away three years ago, we were deprived of the supreme motive force of the library and even though Miss Ware had planned to leave sufficient funds to carry on as previously, the executors were not able to pay the whole amount, so that the income available from her bequest is not sufficient to fulfill all her desires. However, her appointed trustee, Mrs. Amy P. Davol, gladly undertook the task of continuing the service as nearly as possible in accordance with Miss Ware's wishes and was in the midst of plans of readjustment to meet the condition of restricted funds, when she too was called away to another life.

I am very glad to report that Mrs. Florence Upjohn and Mrs. George Davol, whom we all know as summer residents of Rindge, are planning to assume the responsibility of carrying on the library interests of the West Rindge people and they hope that out of this seeming depression may arise a new service which will meet the needs and desires of all.

At the present time the library is open one hour twice a week Monday evening, from 6:30—7:30 and Thursday afternoon from 3.30—4.30. Having no new books, a supply is brought from the Center library at least once a week. We have to thank the Town for a supply of wood which will keep us warm this present winter

In closing may I pay a tribute of gratitude to our recent trustee, Mrs. Amy P. Davol, who so generously gave of her personal funds to keep the library active during the period of settling the Ware Estate and who, from her busy life, was giving a share of her time and thought to promote the welfare and interests of this community; and may I also express our deep sense of loss in the thought that her vivacious personality will no longer return to us in the coming summer seasons.

[•] I submit at this time my twenty-second annual report, the thirty-sixth in the series under union supervision.

The enrollment of the Rindge schools for the present year has been 82 as compared with 91 for the same period last year, and 98 for the entire school year 1938–1939.

During the past ten years the enrollment of the four schools has been as follows:

Two changes occurred in our teaching force for the present year.

Miss Helen Zolkos, a graduate of Keene, 1939, took charge of the West Rindge school to succeed Miss Hatch who was released to accept a position in Amherst, N. H.

In the Rindge Center primary school Miss Eleanor Aiken, a graduate of Framingham Teachers' College was chosen to succeed Miss Quintilio.

Mrs. Helen Towne has continued her efficient work as school nurse. During the spring term a successful dental clinic was held.

In addition to attending the State Teachers' Convention, held in Keene last October, the Rindge teachers attended the general meeting of the supervisory union held in Peterborough on the evening of October 24th. President Young of Keene Teachers' College addressed the group at this meeting.

During the school year 1938–39 an informal organization of the elementary school principals of Peterborough, Jaffrey, Rindge, Dublin and Hancock was formed. The first meeting was held in Dublin, and in January of this year a second meeting was held in East Jaffrey, when Miss Phila Griffin, Elementary School Agent of the State Board of Education carried on an interesting conference with these principals. Miss Youngquist represented Rindge at both meetings.

During the summer and early fall a fire escape was constructed at the Center school. This allows an exit at the rear of the building for the pupils of the upper grades.

The progress of all the schools has been particularly encouraging. The work in music directed by Mrs. Stebbins is an important factor in the education of the Rindge pupils.

I desire at this time to express my appreciation of the cordial support given me by the school board, teachers and pupils.
