**TOWN OF TILTON WARRANT**  
**State of New Hampshire**  
**Polling Hours 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tilton Public Works Building on March 8, 1988 at 10:00 a.m. to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose the necessary Town officials as presented on the ballot prepared for same.
2. To see if the Town will vote on the adoption of the amendments to the existing Town Zoning Map and Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board and by special ballot prepared for same.
3. To see what action the Town will take on the following article:

“Shall we adopt adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? The optional exemption based on assessed value for qualified taxpayers shall be as follows:

for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years,	\$ 5,000;
for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years,	\$10,000;
for a person 80 years of age or older,	\$20,000.

To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or, if married a combined net income of less than \$12,000; and own net assets of not more than \$30,000 excluding the value of the person's residence.

If a majority of those voting on the question vote yes, the optional adjusted elderly exemptions shall apply within the town on the date set by the Selectmen; provided, however, that upon the adoption the increased exemptions shall take effect no later than April 1 next following the referendum.” (by petition)

And on the 12th day of March 1988 at 10:00 in the forenoon at the Winnisquam Regional High School to act on the following subjects:

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to expend the balance of the Federal Revenue Sharing funds for use as an offset against appropriations for the following purpose and in the amount indicated herewith:

Administration      \$3,997.65 plus accrued interest

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$21,000 for the purchase of an Administration computer system, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (2/3 ballot vote required)

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000 for the purchase of a Highway Department Compactor, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (2/3 ballot vote required)

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw \$30,690 plus accrued interest from the Equipment Capital Reserve fund toward the purchase of a Highway Department Compactor. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (2/3 ballot vote required)

8. To see if the Town will vote to enter into an agreement with New Hampshire Governor's Energy Office for the Street Light Replacement Demonstration Program; and raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to convert the existing inefficient street lights in the Town to the new high pressure sodium (or equivalent) lighting fixtures. Furthermore, said replacements to be contingent upon receipt of a grant from the Governor's Energy Office in the amount of \$12,067. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) (2/3 ballot vote required)

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Budget submitted by the Budget Committee, and pass any vote in relation hereto.

10. To see what action the Town will take on the following article:

“Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide the tax sales to private individuals for non-payment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.” (by petition)

11. To see if the voters of the Town of Tilton will instruct the Selectmen to permit the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council to continue its activities on the second floor of the Tilton Town Hall, as it has continuously for the past thirty-one (31) years, until said council has secured a more suitable location to which it may remove or until Town meeting 1989. (by petition)

12. To see what action the Town will take on the following article:

“Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:1-c which authorizes any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax?” (by petition)

13. To see if the Town will vote to have the Highway Department make provisions to have two special pick-ups a year for the purpose of a spring clean-up and a fall clean-up. (by petition)

14. To see if the Town will vote to reinstate the name Bamford Brook to that stream in Lochmere now referred to as Winding Hill Brook, in memory of the first settlers of the Town, through whose property the brook ran.

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Town Traffic Regulations ordinance changes:

15a. Insert new Section 6 of Chapter 200 Article III as follows:

It shall be unlawful to operate a vehicle in the following manner:

a. To cause a vehicle to make loud unreasonable noises by manipulation of the accelerator or transmission.

b. Exceed traction limits of the tires of a vehicle by accelerating or decelerating causing the tires to squeal so called “peeling or laying rubber.” It shall be an affirmative defense if the deceleration was to avoid an accident.

c. To accelerate a vehicle in such a way as to cause a vehicle to be operated on it’s rear wheel(s).

d. The penalty for a conviction of this Section will be as provided in Article VII Section I of this Chapter.



- 15b. Amend Section 9 of Chapter 200 Article III by inserting in place thereof:

Parking limitations on Main Street to Bridge Street (South Side of Main Street) and from Park Street to Mechanic Street (North Side of Main Street) exclusive of spaces in front of the Town Hall controlled by Section 13.

- a. Two hour parking: (1) both sides of Main Street.

- 15c. Insert new Section 16 of Chapter 200 Article III as follows:

a. The Board of Selectmen shall cause the Road Agent to erect appropriate signs restricting the parking of vehicles on the West side of the Town Hall in front of the Police Department to the use of Police vehicles only.

b. The penalty for violating this provision shall be as provided in Article IV, Sec. 1 a and c.

- 15d. Insert new Section 16 of Chapter 200 Article III as follows:

a. The Board of Selectmen at their discretion may cause the Road Agent to erect signs in the Town's Municipal Parking Lots reserving parking spaces, in numbers they deem appropriate, for the use of on-duty Town employees only.

b. The penalty for violation of this Section shall be the same as provided in Article IV Sec. 1, a and c.

16. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Town Health & Safety Regulations ordinance changes:

Article I: No structure shall be intentionally burned within the Town of Tilton without a permit signed by the Board of Selectmen. The Board shall promulgate administrative regulations for approval and notify appropriate agencies.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from State, Federal or another Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept donations, gifts or property that might become available prior to next Town Meeting.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey property acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed by public auction.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 21. To see what action the Town will take in regards to the reports of its officers and agents.
- 22. To choose any other officers and agents for the ensuing year.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen  
Town of Tilton  
Tilton, New Hampshire

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Tilton, as of and for the year ended December 31, 1987. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the Fiduciary Funds or the General Fixed Assets account group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. In addition, the Town has not provided for the contingent liability for accrued compensated absences and, therefore, the General Long-Term Debt account group does not include such liability or the related amount to be provided by the Town to cover such liability as required by generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except for the matters described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Tilton at December 31, 1987, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual account group financial statements and schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Tilton. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

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**REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN — 1987**

As the decade of the 80's winds down, the Town of Tilton finds itself at the junction of a critical fiscal crossroad.

In recent years Tilton has consistently been among the highest taxed local governments in the entire State. There are 235 cities and towns in our State, and during the 10 years previous to 1987, Tilton has ranked 210th of the 235 N.H. cities and towns in terms of taxes assessed.

There are several occurrences that have severely impacted unfavorably on Tilton's tax rate.

The revaluation of all properties in 1978 resulted in an additional tax burden to the residential taxpayer, as those owners of industrial and commercial parcels enjoyed the opportunity to significantly depreciate their assets, thus transferring additional tax burden to the residential sector.

Even more significant was a 1978 Court decision where a Master, assigned by the Court, found in favor of the plaintiff. This, along with all other exempt property in the Town, resulted in an unbelievable 18.7% of our total tax base being tax free.

There are other statistics and trend lines we think might be of interest to you. From the year 1978 to 1986, the net assessed valuation upon which the tax rate is based, rose from \$41,305,838 to \$47,562,000, and increase of 15.15%. During the same time period, net municipal appropriation rose from \$215,746 to \$313,972, an increase of \$98,226, or 45.5%. Tilton's share of the net school appropriation rose from \$995,409 to \$1,695,557, an increase of \$740,148, or 77.5%.

The 1988 recommended Town budget will increase the tax rate by \$3.83 and the recommended capital improvements of \$124,524, to be paid for in the next seven years, would add 50 cents to the tax rate for each of the next seven years, based on the 1987 net valuation of the Town.

The proposed 1988 School District operations budget would require an additional \$282,000 to be appropriated by Tilton which will impact unfavorably on our tax rate by approximately \$5.30. The proposed capital improvements by the School District for 1988 calls for the spending of \$6,800,000, to be borrowed at 8.5% and amortized over 20 years. This will increase our tax rate by an additional \$4.74 over the ensuing 20 years.

## REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

Crime in New Hampshire is on the increase and we cannot escape this. We are located between two cities and at the crossroads of Routes 1-93 and 3, which makes our Town and its citizens vulnerable.

We, I think, do a better job than other area Police agencies because we enjoy good public support, and we strive to maintain this. We do have limitations however, and it is necessary to ask for greater participation by the general public. The cities of Franklin and Laconia have established CRIME LINES, intended for the general public of area communities to anonymously call in their knowledge of criminal activity. We have solved a few cases this way and the name of the caller remains anonymous. We (the Police) are not allowed to know who provided us with the information; we simply build on provided information to make our case. Laconia has had considerable success with this program, as evidenced by the recent airplane crash hoax. This was solved by concerned citizens taking advantage of the Crime Line. I urge you to call the Crime Lines. The information you possess, coupled with what we know, may be all that is needed to make a case. You will be doing your part in improving our community and no one will be the wiser. Be proud you are a TILTON CITIZEN. Turn in a criminal. You could receive an anonymous cash reward. You may reach the CRIME LINE by calling 934-4092 or 524-1717. Please do it—we need your help.

Of the 4,882 calls for service, 1,672 Police reports were written. We prosecuted 351 cases in the Laconia District Court, which resulted in a total of \$28,780 in fines, 1,133 days in the House of Correction and 6,190 days of license revocations. There were only 3 cases found not-guilty, 5 cases placed on-file, 2 cases dismissed (witness failed to appear), and 2 cases dropped by Police for lack of evidence. Quite impressive in my opinion.

## HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT REPORT

What started out to be a winter with heavy snowfall seemed to end about February 1st. and, even though it turned out to be a relatively mild winter, salt consumption was high because of freezing rain.

Spring and summer work was constantly delayed because of weather, equipment breakdowns and problems related to rubbish.

Cross-walks were painted and accented with cross bars which proved to be helpful to pedestrians.

The monument fence posts were cast to duplicate the original posts. The Town now owns the pattern and core box making replacement posts much easier to obtain in the future. The Winter Street side was finally completed after many delays for various reasons.

Drainage work was done on Chestnut St., Hill Rd. and, working with the State, on Route 3, East Main St.

Paving was done on Dunlop Drive, Morrison Ave., Highland Ave. and Hill Road. The Dunlop Drive paving was part of the agreement with the developer and Hill Road was part of the sewer project.

The East Main St. sidewalk was done after an agreement with the Telephone Co. A surface coat is scheduled for 1988.

Problems with the stump dump are being addressed. The area was enlarged and the roadway moved away from the pistol range. Plans to improve the safety and appearance of the range area are in progress.

Regular maintenance was done on the Police Dept. cruisers and Highway Dept. equipment.

This is the first year Tilton has felt the impact of the revision. Since the residency requirement has been eliminated, the budget has had to be increased to service those who would have been previously ineligible.

**SELECTMEN'S REPORT CONTINUED FROM PAGE 28**

We take this opportunity to draw your attention to the proposed changes in the elderly exemption (included in the warrant by petition) and urge you to carefully read and understand it as it too could add to our almost unbearable tax burden.

Still another segment of Town Government that warrants discussion involves our sky rocketing welfare costs. 1985 amendments to the State welfare laws (Senate Bill 1) do not require recipients to establish residency in the Town in which they are seeking financial aid. Prior to the enactment of this bill, Tilton's annual welfare costs were in the vicinity of \$10,000 to \$20,000. We are currently (1988) spending welfare funds at the rate of \$100,000 per year (almost 7% of the total municipal budget).

The Planning Board has been diligent in carrying out their difficult task of controlling the growth of the Town while constantly keeping a talented eye on the economic impact of proposed development. Your Planning Board is recommending a major rezoning of the Town and we strongly urge that you support the rezoning proposal that will provide our Town a vital tool to control long term growth and development.

This message clearly points out to you that we are facing a potentially significant increase in our overall tax rate. The immediate and long-term plan of your Selectmen is multi-faceted. In generic terms, this plan can be stated accordingly:

1. Promote efforts to constrain the potential increase in our tax rate.
2. Vigorously support the Sewer Commission whose efforts have succeeded in bringing about an infusion of private dollars as the Commission prepares to embark on a multi-million dollar sewer installment plan. Sewer expansion must be considered the single most important effort used to entice industrial development which is vitally needed to enhance our tax base.
3. Monitor carefully the calendar of events in the State Legislature, to identify and pursue that legislation that might favorably or adversely affect our Town.
4. Continue to update the capabilities of our Administrative Department by providing the mechanical and human resources needed to meet the ever increasing requests for timely information and, at the same time, install fiscal controls consistent with sound accounting practices.
5. To thoroughly audit our entire tax file to identify and correct prior inconsistencies and/or errors of omission. This task rates high on our priority list as the tax file represents the entire revenue of the Town.
6. To make a concerted effort to improve enforcement of those ordinances under our jurisdiction.

## 1987 REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The purpose of the Conservation Commission is to insure protection and utilization of the community's natural resources and watershed resources. As such we collect information about these resources and provide input regarding the same to citizens, town and state agencies. In addition, by law we are required to review Dredge and Fill applications, and if necessary provide comments to the State Wetlands Board.

In 1987 the Commission reviewed and commented on an increased number of Dredge and Fill applications. In order to do this properly, the Commission conducted many on-site inspections and commented, either with a letter or in person, to the Wetlands Board on these inspections and applications.

When requested by citizens or businesses planning projects, the Commission reviewed and discussed the proposed site plans for the project, before a Dredge and Fill application was filed.

During 1987 Commission members attended workshops and meetings obtaining information on river protection, wetlands, and the New Hampshire Land Trust, which deals with the protection of New Hampshire land and land use planning.

This year the Commission composed a guide to help anyone owning, buying, or working on a piece of property in Tilton that has wetland, stream, and/or waterfront on it to know what zoning regulations are involved and what permits are/or may be required to work or build on this property.

The Commission is encouraged by the community's continued awareness of promoting quality land use practices and wetlands protection. Any information the Commission has regarding land use regulations, wetlands and other natural resources, is available to the townspeople.

The Commission members are available to assist anyone planning a project or having questions regarding natural resources, wetlands or State Dredge and Fill applications. Members can be contacted directly or at monthly Commission meetings.

**ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER  
REPORT FOR 1987**

In 1987 the number of animal complaints continued to increase 47% to a total of 177. 153 of the cases involved dogs, 15 dealt with cats and 9 calls for service involved other types of livestock or wild animals and possible neglect or abuse of animals. Twenty-two trips were made to the N.H. Humane Society to transport 21 stray or lost dogs and 1 cat. Four emergency trips were made to veterinarians for injured animals. Eighteen dogs and 2 cats were returned to their owners. A total of \$210.00 in fines (civil forfeitures) were paid by animal owners for a variety of reasons ranging from nuisance violations to unlicensed animals running at large. Tilton continues to have a major problem with dogs running at large without owner supervision thus increasing the number of complaints of vicious dog attacks and damage to other residents' personal property. This will continue to be a target area for the A.C.O. during 1988. A reminder to all dog owners to have their animals licensed for 1988. A license is not only a requirement but aids in returning your lost animal to you with minimal delay.

**HALL MEMORIAL LIBRARY**  
**Public Library of Tilton and Northfield**  
**1987 Report**

Hall Memorial Library celebrated 100 years of service this past year. Mary Hall Cummings gave \$10,000 for the building and Mrs. Charles E. Tilton gave the land. The beautiful brick, granite and sandstone building of Queen Anne architecture with stained glass windows was completed in 1885, but actually opened in 1887. It is named in honor of Dr. Adino Brackett Hall, a highly respected physician of the Northfield-Tilton area and Boston. He was a graduate of Dartmouth College Medical School and served valiantly as a volunteer surgeon during the Civil War. He was the first to reject the old medical practice of withholding cold water from typhoid sufferers, and one of the first to utilize ether as an anesthesia. The library was planned from the beginning to be a public library supported by the two Towns. For the first time in history, the library budget was cut by one Town last year. However, at a budget hearing in the Tilton Town Hall on October 21, several citizens spoke up for increased services and expanded library facilities to meet the Towns' growing population.

For the Old Home Day parade on June 27th, a float was devised with a giant (6 x 4 feet) book standing open showing the international library logos on the cover. Inner pages, thanks to Cindy Murphy's artistry, included pictures of Adino Brackett Hall and the library bearing his name. The Northfield Historical Society sponsored this project. Display of the book on the library lawn from October 21 on, helped call attention to the Annual Book Sale sponsored by the Friends of the Library.

Co-operative libraries and the community enjoyed hearing the famous author of children's books, Richard Peck, speak at the Tilton School during Library Week last April. The library continued to offer story hours and free film programs throughout the year. The summer reading program was "Bone Up on Books!" and the twenty or so eager readers who participated attended the final party on August 26, enjoying games, refreshments and sharing outstanding book reviews.

12. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) for the purpose of establishing a Truck Fund for the Winnisquam Fire Department. Such vote be binding on the participation by all other contributing towns.
13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The department consists of 21 active members, eight of whom are Emergency Medical Technicians qualified for defibrillator use (advanced life support). The defibrillator was purchased in 1987. It's cost was shared equally by Belmont, Tilton and Sanbornton and 1/4 of the funds were raised by members of W.F.D.

Training sessions and drills in cold water rescue, CPR, pump training & fire fighting were held throughout the year and Fire School attended by members.

WFD is near completion of new officer's rooms and meeting/training room. Most of the work was done by members over the past 3 years.

Because of concern over the risk of boating accidents or fires on Lake Winnisquam WFD voted to seek funding in the 1988 budget to place a rescue/fire boat in service as soon as possible.

The annual Carole Davis Memorial Christmas party was held for the children in the Winnisquam area.

The Winnisquam Fire Department would like to thank the community for it's continuing and ongoing support.

**YOUTH ASSISTANCE PROGRAM OF NORTHFIELD, SANBORNTON,

The Youth Assistance Program works with youths who have been referred by the police, schools and families with the intent of diverting these youths from the court system and from further serious trouble. The youths meet with a board of volunteers and contracts are developed for the youths to complete. One contract item is community service work. There are some activities that we cannot use since our youths are under 18 years of age and would not be covered by insurance. The following are some community service projects from this past year:

- shoveling snow - mowing lawns
- yard work
- repair and painting of a porch
- hospital volunteer work
- babysitting
- volunteer in a camp for asthmatic children
- maintenance in recreation center
- maintenance at the Youth Assistance Program
- trash clean-up
- volunteer in sports program
- brush cutting in cemeteries
- Tilton Welfare Dept. Toys for Christmas drive
- planning and writing skits for a puppet show for elementary children, subjects include shoplifting, drugs.

The Youth Assistance Program is also a prevention program. We accept self referrals, as well as referrals from family, friends, schools and police. A counseling process may be utilized including the whole family, educational programs, big brother/big sister type PEOPLE Program, parent support group, etc. Our goal is to provide healthy and productive alternatives for kids at risk.

## **CONCORD REGIONAL SOLID WASTE/RESOURCE RECOVERY COOPERATIVE 1987 REPORT**

The past year was a hectic and progressive one for the Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resource Recovery Cooperative (CRSW/RRC) as the project to construct a waste-to-energy incinerator to serve 27 communities in the Cooperative made significant progress.

Early in the year, the \$48-million financing package for the construction of the state-of-the-art facility was completed and secured after lengthy discussions and negotiations with bond counsels, financial advisors, industry officials, community leaders, legal counsel, state officials and others.

With the financing in hand, Wheelabrator Environmental Systems began construction of the incinerator facility in the 23.8 acre site in Penacook in August 1987. At the present time it is anticipated the facility will be operational by late summer of 1989.

The Cooperative also decided, after three years of operations, to hire a full-time project director to monitor the construction of the facility, to coordinate location and permitting of an ash disposal landfill, handle administrative responsibilities and accounting and to serve as a day-to-day contact for member communities, state and federal agencies and other interested parties. After a multi-state search for a project director, the Cooperative hired Ronald H. Ford of Concord, former Director of Public Works for the City of Concord.

At the present time the CRSW/RRC is joining with Wheelabrator Environmental Systems and the New Hampshire/Vermont Solid Waste District to contract the University of New Hampshire to conduct a scientific study of the affect of leacheate from landfills. The results of this study will help our Cooperative to better plan its ash disposal landfill for the protection of our residents in the generations to come.

While 1987 was a busy year for the Cooperative, 1988 promises to be even busier as the Cooperative prepares to continue its efforts to insure the facility is constructed in a timely manner and our member communities are prepared to begin delivering their solid waste to the facility for incineration.

Together, we have all come a long way in addressing a critical problem facing the State as a whole and our communities specifically. Continued cooperation and hard work by our member communities will enable us to bring this project to fruition and successful operation.
