

SELECTMEN'S REPORT - 1997

There is a diversity of backgrounds on the present Board of Selectmen, and this diversity serves the town and the taxpayers well. Each and every decision this Board of Selectmen has made has been determined solely by "What is best for the taxpayers." This Board of Selectmen knows how to say *no* when in its collective judgment such action would be prudent for our citizens and taxpayers. Likewise, this Board is not daunted to say *yes* to needed measures and programs such as Town Hall maintenance, recreation, and road building programs. Because of the uniqueness of present-day government, your Selectmen have to play "catch-up" since other priorities took place in previous years.

This report will outline many of the accomplishments during the previous year and also point out some of the areas where your Selectmen believe continued

emphasis is needed.

TOWN HALL: Although there was extra work done on the Town Hall in 1995 in connection with the centennial observance, the work was largely cosmetic. Your Town Hall is in need of some serious rehabilitation inside the building. The present heating system is excellent, but floors need repair, plaster is dropping from the walls in the auditorium, and there is a need for rehabilitation of the stairways and hallways. Outside repair needs are limited to improving the basement access with some outside lighting added.

Also in connection with your Town Hall, the Selectmen are pledged to make all floors ADA accessible. We are in substantial compliance now. With the improvements already made, our most cost effective solution is a Limited Use - Limited Access (LULA) lift inside the building which would access all floors. The present temporary ramp in front of the building would be removed and sold, with the proceeds being returned to the taxpayers. The original exterior appearance of

the Town Hall would be recovered.

ROADS AND BRIDGES: We have two "red-lined" bridges in town. One, the Copp's River Bridge on the Canal Road, is scheduled for replacement in early 1998. The monies have been raised, appropriated, and encumbered for this project. The second bridge is the Maple Street Bridge in Union. Your Selectmen are in favor of replacing this bridge, utilizing the State Bridge Aid Program—whereby the State pays 80% and the Town pays 20% of the associated costs. We hope to

initiate this project in 1998.

The highway program is yet another area where the Selectmen believe an aggressive and accelerated program is needed. 1997 saw renewed road construction and remediation, with approximately 226,200 square feet of paved road being constructed. Also approximately 107,000 square feet of gravel road was improved with additional gravel, culverts, and ditching. Of course the long range plan for future years is to pave most of the major gravel roads. It is a known fact that maintenance costs on a paved road are less than for a gravel road. In 1998 major work is scheduled for Whippoorwill Road, Acton Ridge Road, Garney Road, Hilltop Drive, Canal Road, and Old Stage Road.

Your Selectmen see distinct advantages to working on a road from one end to the other. Examples of this are the Willey Road from Old Stage Road to the Milton town line, Stoneham Road from Route 16 to the Brookfield town line, Canal Road from Route 153 to the Maine state line, and the Acton Ridge Road from Route 153 to the Main state line. As long as the town has the responsibility for the road, that

responsibility must be carried out.

RECREATION: Your Selectmen are pledged to continue to provide recreational facilities for all age groups. The Wakefield Town Beach continues to be well used. With the construction of two recreational fields at the Paul School,

the Selectmen are examining future town projects.

The demands of present day government have the Board of Selectmen looking at many ways to create a user friendly administrative system for out citizens. These areas include putting historical records onto microfiche and computerizing tax maps—with the idea that one day public documents can be easily accessed by home computer. Your Selectmen have taken advantage of an AARP program and have brought one Wakefield retired citizen to work on special projects at the Town Hall with no cost to the taxpayer. Your Selectmen average ten to fifteen hours each week on town business. Many daytime meetings and workshops plus many evening sessions—not only Selectmen's meetings, but all the other Boards and Commissions. It takes plenty of time to serve properly as a Selectmen, and your Selectmen have given that time and effort.

It was predicted by the State that all public assistance budgets, state-wide, would increase by 20% in 1997; yet, in fact, the Wakefield public assistance allocation stayed well within the \$12,000 budgeted—plus receiving \$3,000 back from beneficiaries in the form of payment. Our Overseer of the Poor, Selectman Kenney, is to be commended for his efforts.

In keeping with Wakefield's traditional values and in keeping with out historic preservation, your Selectmen took a hard stance on junkyard compliance. Everyone was required to comply, and it will be a matter of continuing priority for the

Selectmen to strictly enforce all applicable statutes town-wide.

As of January 1, 1998, there is a new way to tax gravel. Your Selectmen have overseen a project whereby over fifty gravel pits have been identified. Some are active and some are not. Wakefield has anticipated this taxation change and is well

prepared to implement any changes.

Your Selectmen have put in place a road opening permit requirement, which also applies to sidewalks, to better protect our roads against damages. Consideration is being given to establishing weight restrictions on our roads and to seek the posting of a bond from those operators who must use the roads to harvest timber, sand, or gravel.

A citizens' representative committee, along with representative town employees, was established to examine the salary/benefit disparity of Wakefield employees and elected officials. The committee report showed great inequities

compared with other towns in the county and state.

In 1998 your Selectmen expect to close the present fuel depot near the Wakefield Central Fire Station. This site poses a potential for an environmental hazard with its proximity to the adjacent river. Fuel operations will be consolidated next to the Highway Department facility on Wakefield Road at NH DOT Patrol Division 312. Usage control will be improved through individual vehicle accountability.

Your Selectmen continue to support the Summer Youth Program now completing its third year of existence. Many projects town-wide are evident as a result of this project—all at no cost to the taxpayer. A special thanks must be given here to Lou C. Sisson, Chairman of WERC, for directing the Youth Program and for her extraordinary talent and effort in rescuing the sidewalk project. This project has been put out to bid and will be completed in 1998.

Since we are in the computer generation, so must the town stay with this

technology. The town's computer capability has grown. Outdated equipment has been replaced. Addition equipment will be added. The town has purchase the State of New Hampshire Assessing Software Program, which will be implemented in connection with G.I.S. technology. Information will be computerized and stored at the Town Hall with retrieval being rather simple. The Town Police Department will be connected via fiberoptic cable to the town's data base. Yes, we will be ready for cyberspace. The town's internet identification is:

Your Board of Selectman has spearheaded efforts to return tax-acquired property to the tax rolls. Sixty-five properties were sold at public auction in August 1997. As a result of these efforts, nearly one and one-half million dollars of assessed valuation was returned to the tax rolls. Some of these properties had been owned by the town for over twenty years. Presently the town owns over fifty properties as a result of nonpayment of taxes. Your Selectmen are unanimous in their resolve to sell the tax-acquired property in a timely manner—thereby reducing the tax burden for all taxpayers.

Also, your Board of Selectmen has been working on an "owner unknown" project. There are ten (10) "owner unknown" properties in town with an assessed valuation of \$100,000. No taxes are being paid since there are no known owners. Some of the properties have been in this status since 1974. After much tedious and long research time, this Board has identified the owners and will be recommending to the assessors that the property be added to the tax rolls. This, too, reduces the

burden for all taxpayers.

One frustration the Board has is that the Board presently cannot bring its budget directly to the people—to vote up or down. Such procedures make long-range planning difficult at best, and they make capital improvement plans nearly as difficult. The goal of both Long-Range Planning and for Capital Improvement Plans is to anticipate future needs and to gradually provide for these needs so that our property tax rate can remain stable.

In conclusion, no Selectmen's Report would be complete without an expression of thanks to the many dedicated full-time and part-time employees and our elected officials. These are the folks who keep the town running. Also appreciation and expressions of thanks must go to the many volunteers who staff the various boards, commissions, and ad hoc committees. Recently we had a perfect indication of the community coming together during the severe January ice storms. Our police, fire, and rescue service, along with the highway department, were busy 'round the clock. Dedication and volunteerism at its finest. We cannot mention everyone who helped out, but particular thanks go to Gordon R. Hollis and Patricia D. Brackett for their service at our emergency shelter. The Selectmen and the townspeople appreciate the dedication and volunteerism.

Our strength as a town comes from the participation of all. We will endeavor to continue improving communication and the dissemination of information to our citizens during the coming year, while steadfastly planning for the future of our

town.

The funds of Wakefield are held through the NH Public Deposit Investment

Pool and the Charter Trust Investment Company.

Due to the adoption of new regulations regarding municipal voting and elections in Wakefield, this report had to be submitted prior to the availability of 1997 year end investment reports. The totals indicated below are current as of the end of the third quarter of 1997.

All additional contributions as voted in at the 1997 Town Meeting have been deposited into the appropriate funds as of May 1997 and the balances indicated

below include these contributions.

Third quarter totals in the 1997 Annual Report cannot be directly compared

to previous Annual Reports which contain fourth quarter totals.

The Trustees are responsible for the safe investment of the Trust Funds of the Town of Wakefield. There is a large fund comprised of many individual funds for the care of individual cemetery plots. The Cemetery Trustees are responsible for the actual care and maintenance of these plots using the interest earned on the Trust Funds.

As of September 30, 1997 there was a balance of \$181,449.34 in this fund.

In May 1997 the Trustees opened a new fund titled the Carl Siemon Scholarship Fund. Due to the generosity of Wakefield resident Carl Siemon, the high school seniors of Wakefield will have the opportunity to receive money for scholarships to further their education.

As of September 30, 1997 there was a balance of \$ 154, 101.74 in this fund. The Trustees are responsible for the safe investment of the Capital Reserve Funds

that the voters of Wakefield establish at each Town Meeting.

The following Capital Reserve Funds are currently in place, and their balances as of September 30, 1997 are indicated below.

WAKEFIELD ECONOMIC RESOURCE COMMITTEE

The Wakefield Economic Resource Committee is charged with the task of improving and expanding Wakefield's economy while at the same time maintaining our unique rural, small town character. Since our appointment by the Selectmen in 1991, WERC has supported local businesses and expedited changes which will become the foundation for our town's economic future.

This year through the extensive use of volunteers, careful deliberate planning and successfully attracting outside resources, WERC has been able to improve the business environment, and encourage more spending in the community by

seasonal visitors.

Much of the committee's work this year has centered on the Town's largest village and the center of business activity. Infrastructure and institutional improvements in Sanbornville have already begun to transform this village into a prosperous, attractive village, capable of drawing seasonal as well as local dollars to businesses. The Summer Youth Program, sponsored by WERC, NH Job Training Council, and the Wakefield Lion's Club which employed 10 of our community youth has provided Turntable Park with a stage which can be used by the Arts Council and other organizations to promote community programs. The completion of the Heritage Center of the Branch River Valley located in the Garvin Building will become a focal point to tell visitors our story and guide tourists into our community. The Scenic By-Way will connect our community to others and encourage travelers to stop here. In the spring of 1998, when our vision of having sidewalks in the village of Sanbornville to encourage residents and visitors to walk down our main street and to the beach becomes a reality, our vision of enhancement will be well on its way.

We will continue to work toward the development and enhancement of other villages in our community along with the development of our recreational resources that will enhance economic opportunities. In addition, we will continue to monitor programs which we have established that are directed to support business. These include the "Wakefield Marketplace", promotional brochures and events such as the "Wakefield Fall Festival" to increase awareness of our area, NHWORKS program at Gafney Library, the complete restoration of the Garvin

Building and the Route 16 Corridor Study.

As a result of the adoption by this town of SB 2, I have been asked to prepare this report with the final quarter of 1997 still ahead of us. It feels a bit odd, but I guess you'll have to wait until the 1998 report to find out what happened in October, November, and December of 1997.

Fortunately for this department, the crew members have remained the same, and for that I am grateful. Each with his own area of expertise, the following

members of this department comprise an exemplary team:

In addition to regular maintenance and road repair; snow, ice, and sleet control; and the winter care of the town's two schoolyards, the following roads in the various villages of Wakefield were tended to:

1. Old Settler's Lane, Union - Rebuilt and paved - 850'

2. Pigeon Hill Rd., Union - Rebuilt and paved -1,950'

- 3. Bonneyman Rd., E. Wakefield Rebuilt and paved 3,000'
- 4. White Birch Rd., Wakefield Rebuilt and paved 1,525'
- 5. Canal Rd., Sanbornville Rebuilt and paved 2,700'
- 6. Walsh Rd., Sanbornville Rebuilt and paved 3,400'

I would like to thank the people of the Town of Wakefield for their patience while their roads were under construction. To those of you who are still waiting (patiently, I hope), I would like to explain that road management and maintenance planning is a "due process." It is cyclical in that each road in the Town of Wakefield is evaluated by condition, traffic volume, and population. It is then placed on a prioritized schedule dictated by time and money.

There is an old saying, "I do not believe you can do today's job with yesterday's methods and be in business tomorrow." This department believes in continuing education. We are involved in a program sponsored by the University of New Hampshire Technology Transfer Center, simply pronounced "T-2" or "T-squared." Subjects include road design and construction, road maintenance and repair, and supervision and safety. Topic requirements ensure that training covers a range of subjects essential to local road management.

I appreciate the support and guidance offered by our Selectmen with a special

thanks to Linda, Cassandra, and Toni for all they do for this department.

It is with a great sense of pride and accomplishment that I conclude this report. A special "thank you" to each member of the Highway Department for their continuing support. It is because of them and their hard work that the condition of the roads in Wakefield continue to improve.

WAKEFIELD CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Wakefield Conservation Commission was established in March 1988 by Town vote (RSA-36A), consisting of five members appointed by the Selectmen.

Meetings are held the second Monday of each month at 10:00 AM at Town

Hall, and the public is welcome to attend.

The purpose of the Commission is to research the use of local land and water areas and establish an index of open space and wetland areas as part of public information. We also review the requests that are sent to the State Bureau for filling, dredging, and dock construction. We do not have decision-making powers, but make recommendations to state and local agencies.

This year we have reviewed 54 applications and made several onsite inspections. These inspections are in line with the policy of the Department of Environmental Services, Wetlands Division. We are also available to assist the Paul

School in any projects that involve conservation.

Any gifts of money may be put into the separate Conservation account and allowed to accumulate from year to year for the purchase of land and development rights or any project to do with conserving land. We are helping to protect the lakes, rivers, and wetlands and would welcome anyone who might be interested in joining us in this community project.

We are sorry to lose Willis McCoy and Eileen Blomquist as active members of this commission. Welcome to Al Keller and Nancy Spencer-Smith, the new

members.

WAKEFIELD HERITAGE COMMISSION

1997 has been an exciting year and a busy one for the Wakefield Heritage Commission. The continued renovation and restoration of the J. W. Garvin building has taken a considerable amount of time, but the end results are beginning to show, which is indeed exciting.

Bid packages for the Interpretive Center went out in March. W. David Stephen was the low bidder, with a bid of \$46,962, and was awarded the contract.

As a part of the Wakefield Fall Festival on September 20, we were able to have a 'walk through' so that people could begin to get an idea of how special the Interpretive Center is going to be. Comments were all pleasant from those taking advantage of the opportunity to view the progress, and a goodly number of people did 'walk through' that day. Many were surprised at the complete transformation, especially considering what we started with. Now we are all working toward and looking forward to November 22, when we will have many of the displays and exhibits in place and ready for viewing by all. Wakefield and the area will really have a very special place on the Scenic Byway when the Interpretive Center is open.

In addition to the interior being completely done over, the outside of the Center has had considerable attention as well. The sills have been repaired or replaced as needed under the Interpretive Center by Ron Crawford & Sons, and the ADA walkway is in place. This has been highly approved of with many positive comments. Because of the lack of ADA compliance of the buildings in Town, we no longer meet in the Wakefield Public Library, but have moved about. First to the Museum of Childhood, which does comply with ADA regulations, and now in the Town Hall. Soon we'll hope to meet in the Interpretive Center. We continue to

meet regularly, of course, the first and third Mondays at 5 p.m.

Our responsibility of caring for the Wakefield Corner Historic District and our historic sites has continued this year. We have had one public hearing and acted upon changes proposed for that one building in the District. We have also held consultation talks with other property owners about considered changes. We believe that these preliminary discussions of changes prior to hearings are very worthwhile for the property owner as well as for the Commission.

Once again the Summer Youth Program group cleaned up the Town Pound

for us, and we're grateful.

Our fund raising efforts have continued to go on throughout 1997. We applied to the Deane and Chesley Paul Fund for Innovative Programs of the First Congregational Church of Wakefield and were awarded \$2,500 for the audio system in the Interpretive Center. This will help greatly in making the displays and exhibits become more meaningful to the visitors. As the third plaque in our Wakefield series we chose "Sarah's Spa." The entire series has gone very well, and now we will offer number four in 1998.

1997 LANDFILL DEPARTMENT REPORT

As taxpayers of the Town of Wakefield, you are aware that the existing landfill (or the "dump" as it is affectionately referred to) will run out of space in 1998. The transfer station will be constructed and operating in 1998.

The preliminary design by King Engineering of Wakefield has been accepted by the Solid Waste Advisory Committee, and the necessary permits are being

processed.

The western slope of the landfill has been shaped to pre-closure grade in

compliance with long-range planning.

The Town of Wakefield has joined the Northeast Recycling Recovery Association, a company designed to maximize recycling revenues. Each household in the community can help this effort by separating and sorting at home. When you arrive at the landfill, your "trash" should be deposited according to the following categories: Aluminum, glass (brown, green, clear), paper, cardboard, and household garbage. Those of you who can are encouraged to start a compost pile at your home.

Please understand that a transfer station will be more expensive to operate than a landfill. Every item that you deposit has to be transferred or carried away. The more you bring in, the more it costs. The more you recycle, the lower the cost

of the transfer station, which directly affects your taxes.

Recycling costs and income in 1997:

ITEMS MARKETED: Aluminum cans, Batteries, Scrap metal, Glass, Newspapers.

DISPOSAL COSTS*: Freon removal, Tire disposal, Container rentals,

Transportation, Tipping fees.

* Does not include labor and equipment costs or revenue payments.

DUMP FEES CHARGED: Tires, White metal, Demo material, Bulky items, Shingles.

I know that I share the sentiment of the townspeople when I extend a sincere thank you to the landfill crew. It is a well known fact that "cold feet" can cause a "hot head." The existing "veteran" crew remains courteous and helpful at all times regardless of the weather.

WAKEFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT 1997

The Police Department continues to look for opportunities for pro-active interaction with out citizens. We have chartered Police Explorer Post #290, in conjunction with the Daniel Webster Council, Boy Scouts of America. Participation in the Explorer's Post allows our young citizens an opportunity to participate in police functions, training, and activities, while allowing department personnel to develop a better understanding of the problems and concerns of our youth. We have presented Drug Awareness and Stranger Danger programs at the Paul School. Officers have been rewarding children for wearing their helmets while riding bicycles, by presenting them with tickets for free ice cream donated by Rockin' Ryan's Ice Cream. Citizens are taking advantage of our Good Morning call-in program for shut-ins and those living alone. We are participating in Crimeline and are receiving numerous calls with information or comment. We have been able to use some of that information to clear cases and make arrests. For the first time, a Wakefield Police Officer will present the DARE program at the Paul School this year.

I am pleased to announce that Officer Randy Power has been selected as the 1997 Officer of the Year. Officer Power has been instrumental in developing our Good Morning program and has spearheaded our new Police Explorers Post. He is our DARE officer. Officer Power has been a member of the department for about two years. He is retired from the United States Air Force where he attained the rank of Captain. Office Power and his wife are local residents with children in the Paul School. He is a community spirited citizen deeply concerned with the welfare

of our youth and elderly.

The department is still losing officers to other departments. Unless and until we can offer truly competitive compensation packages, we will continue to lose officers as fast as we can train them.

The crime analysis below differs from prior years because it includes only the first nine months of the year. This change is made to comply with deadlines for submission of data due to timeframes relating to Senate Bill 2. I have added a line for comparative purposes showing approximate numbers for the first nine months of 1996.

WAKEFIELD FIRE & AMBULANCE Report for 1997

During the fall of 1997, by agreement between the Wakefield Area Ambulance Corps, the Wakefield Fire Department, and the Wakefield Board of Selectmen, the Wakefield ambulance joined the Wakefield Fire Department to form a single agency now known as the Wakefield Fire/Ambulance Department.

This joining of forces and efforts provides a closer working relationship between the two public safety agencies and makes it easier to coordinate purchasing, training, and administrative functions, which in some cases can help save money.

Our thanks and appreciation to former Ambulance Director Malcolm Kurth and DeputY Director Richard Guilmette for their work with the Ambulance Corps. Without their efforts, the Town of Wakefield would be missing some of the efficiency and effectiveness of our current emergency medical service.

The Fire/Ambulance Department membership consists of the following EMS Personnel: (16 volunteers)

10 licensed Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT).

One of whom is EMT-I and a second attending the EMT-I course.

4 First Responders (Firefighters with emergency medical training).

2 Associate member EMT-Is. Fire Personnel: (29 volunteers)

12 Certified Career Level firefighters.

9 Certified Level 1 firefighters.

8 Uncertified firefighters.

Through November of 1997, the ambulance logged 9,450.4 miles, responding to the following medical aid calls:

Motor vehicle accidents: 51

Illness and personal accidents: 220 Calls responded with Fire Dept.: 37

The busiest periods for EMS were during the months of March (with 40 emergency calls), followed by January and July (with 35 calls each). The least busy month was October, for EMS, with 19 calls.

For 1997, fire calls totaled 883 man-hours, with 117 emergency calls responded to:

The busiest periods for fire emergency calls were during the year's heating season. With the use of furnaces and wood stoves comes the higher incidence of chimney fires, carbon monoxide alarms, and heater problems. September was the busiest month for 1997 with 16 emergency calls, with January (14 calls) and October (13 calls) following closely. The least occurrence of emergency calls was during the month of August, with 7 calls.

The Wakefield Fire/Ambulance Department would like to remind Wakefield's residents that smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors DO SAVE LIVES. The early warning provided by these detectors can alert occupants to a dangerous situation in time for them to escape safely. Make sure that your detectors are installed properly and in good working order BEFORE the need for them arises.

A blood pressure clinic is provided by the Wakefield Fire/Ambulance Department on the first Wednesday of each month at the Branch River Commons in Sanbornville between the hours of 10:00 am and 12:00 noon. Monitor your blood pressure regularly by attending this FREE clinic.
