To vote by official ballot on amendments to the Barnstead Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Barnstead Planning Board, as follows:

1. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #1, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To change Section 2-1 Definitions: To delete the definitions of undevelopable and developable land.

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #2, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To change Section 2-1 Definitions: To change the definition of wetlands from Wetlands, as defined by the New Hampshire Wetlands Board to: As defined by the Department of Environmental Services.

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #3, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To amend Article 4-2.03 of the Zoning Ordinance to require contiguous frontage.

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #4, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To revise Article 7-7.01 of the Zoning Ordinance which now reads: reflect the recommendations of the publication "Storm Water Management and Erosion and Sediment Control Handbook for Urban and Developing Areas in New Hampshire" prepared by the Rockingham County Conservation District, prepared for the Department of Environmental Services in cooperation with the USDA Soil Conservation Services, August, 1992. To read: All construction and/or development activities shall incorporate design standards for erosion and sedimentation control which at a minimum reflect the requirements set forth in the Town of Barnstead Subdivision Regulations and Site Plan Review Regulation.

5. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #5, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, submitted by petition, as follows:

To amend Article 14-3 of the Zoning Ordinance to change

the Aquifer Recharge District to Aquifer Recharge and Wellhead Protection District and to make extensive changes to the requirements. (Not recommended by the Planning Board).

The second session for the purpose of discussing and voting upon the remaining articles of the Town Warrant shall be held on Saturday, March 17th, 2007, at 9:00 a.m. at the Barnstead Elementary School.

- 3. To hear the Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Million Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,200,000) gross budget, for the construction and original equipping of a Town Municipal Building, and to authorize the issuance of not more than Two Million Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,200,000) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest and other terms thereon. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7 III. (2/3 ballot vote required). (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$260,000.00) to hire the architectural firm of CMK for the purpose of designing and providing construction plans and specifications for approximately eight thousand (8000) square foot municipal building/police department. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 6. To see if the Town will increase the allocated number of Full-Time Police Officer Positions from the six (6) full-time officers required to minimally operate a 24/7 agency to seven (7) full-time officers. The current national standard is 2.5 officers per 1,000 population as cited by the Federal Bureau of Justice Statistics which would equate to twelve (12) full time officers given the current year-round population in Barnstead cited as 4,800. This

does not include the seasonal influx which increases as much as three times that of the year-round population. The cost of the additional position including outfitting, training, and the Town Employee Benefit Package would typically be \$50,000, HOW-EVER, the bottom line of the 2007 Town Budget would not be impacted by more than \$25,000. The transfer of the cost of a current part-time police officer position at \$25,000 per year would make up the difference. Barnstead Officers have been handling an increasing number of lengthy criminal investigations forcing the department into a reactionary mode which in turn reduces the amount of time officers are able to spend performing patrol and traffic enforcement duties in a proactive fashion. In 2007 the officers of the Barnstead Police Department will be carrying four (4) months worth of combined/accrued vacation time to be covered at overtime rates by other officers at a mean cost of \$17,000. The straight rate of pay to cover vacation time would be approximately \$9,700. That is a \$7,300 cost savings in utilizing a straight rate of pay as compared to paying at an overtime rate. (This does not include training time and sick time overtime coverage). The remainder is a net cost of \$17,700 in order to implement the seventh (7th) Full-Time Position. The benefits of this position may not be recognized for several months due to hiring and training constraints, however, to wait until the 2008 Town Meeting for consideration would result in the benefits of the added position not being recognized until late 2008. (Submitted by Petition).

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a lease agreement for the purpose of leasing to own two fully equipped 6 wheel dump trucks for the Highway Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) for the first year's payments for that purpose. This lease agreement contains an escape clause. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Three Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty Eight Dollars (\$23,828.00) for the fourth year's payment of the lease for the Road Rescue Ambulance for the Town. (Recommended by the

Selectmen and Budget Committee).

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) gross budget, to purchase and outfit a 2007 Crown Victoria Police Package marked vehicle including video and audio for the Police Department, to replace the 2001 Chevy Tahoe. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) to repair Hannah Nutter Bridge and to authorize the withdrawal of Fifty Five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) from the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. This will be a non-lapsing warrant article and will not lapse until the project is completed. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) for the purpose of installing a fire cistern at Map 1 Lot 20, 245 Province Road and to authorize the withdrawal of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) from the Cistern Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of Eighteen Thousand Dollars (\$18,000.00) for an extensive milfoil treatment of Suncook River during the summer of 2007 and to authorize the withdrawal of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) from the Milfoil Prevention Non-Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. The balance of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) is to come from general taxation. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000) for the purpose of purchasing a modular/trailer to provide housing for the full-time operations of the Barnstead Fire-Rescue. (Recommended by the Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$317,000.00 (gross budget) to purchase for Barnstead Fire-Rescue, a 2007 Rescue Truck with a six man custom cab and a stainless steel non-walk-in rescue body and to authorize the withdrawal of \$235,125.00 from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve, with the balance of \$81,875.00 to be raised by taxation. (Submitted by Petition). (Not Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Three Hundred Thirty Five Dollars (\$5,335.00) for the purpose of purchasing one fully rugged pc tablet for the ambulance. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$6,720.00) for the purpose of purchasing a recording device for the telephone/ radio system at the police station. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$5,850.00) for the purpose of purchasing 8 bullet proof vests. The vests are purchased through the Bulletproof Vest Grant program and 50% of the cost (\$2,925.00) is to come from a Federal Grant. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be placed in the Parks & Recreation Building Capital Reserve previously established. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be placed in the Historical Society Building Capital Reserve. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of

Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be placed in the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be placed in the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be placed in the Library Computer Support Expendable Trust Fund. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) to be placed in the Highway Garage Capital Reserve. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Town Hall Computer Expendable Trust Fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19a for the purpose of maintaining the computer replacement schedule to include workstations, monitors, printers, screens and computer towers at the Town Hall; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) to be placed in this fund; and furthermore to appoint the selectmen as agents to expend this fund. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to establish an Emergency Management Expendable Trust Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1-c for the purpose of emergency preparedness and to raise and appropriate Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) to be placed in this fund; and furthermore to appoint the selectmen as agents to expend this fund. (Recommended by Selectmen). (Not Recom-

- mended by Budget Committee).
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Fire & Rescue Equipment Capital Reserve fund created in 1995, said funds having been exhausted per warrant article #8 of the 2000 Town Meeting to complete the assembly of the fire truck that was purchased in 1999. The balance is zero (\$0.00) but per the Department of Revenue the fund must be voted on to be discontinued. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) from Arthur Pitman, for the Pitman Cemetery with the interest to be used for the perpetual care of lots in the Pitman Cemetery located on Holmes Road in Center Barnstead, NH. The acceptance of said sum shall not impose any liability upon the Town beyond the amount of the gift and the income thereof. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey the property at Tax Map 045, Lot 46.6, Dalton Drive to Robert and Renee Leonard, to be merged with Leonard's existing property at Map 045 Lot 47.6. Robert and Renee Leonard have paid all taxes, interest, costs and expenses owed to the Town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in September 2001. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey the property at Tax Map 042 Lot 022, Monroe Drive, to Rex and Donna Hansen, to be merged with Rex & Donna Hansen's property at Map 042 Lot 021. Rex and Donna Hansen have paid all taxes, interest, costs and expenses owed to the Town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in October 1998. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey the property at Tax Map 004 Lot 037-1, 223 Bow Lake Road, to Patricia Johnson on payment of all taxes, interest, costs and expenses owed to the Town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in November 2002 and Patricia Johnson was the prior owner. (Recommended by the Select-

men).

- 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey the property at Tax Map 010 Lot 048-1, 113 Pineo Road, to Tom Corliss on payment of all taxes, interest, costs and expenses owed to the Town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in April 2004 and Tom Corliss was the prior owner. (Recommended by the Selectmen).
- 33. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Town of Barnstead Fire Department Study Committee as established by the 2006 Town Meeting and authorize the appointment of members to said committee pursuant to the method set forth at the 2006 Town Meeting. (Submitted by Petition).
- 34. Barnstead Residents Only: Please vote for a tax cap for the Town of Barnstead. This means that they cannot raise taxes anymore that the cost of living is per year, set by the Federal Government. Laconia and Franklin has it and it works. (Submitted by Petition).
- 35. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the adoption of the following Sight Distance Regulation: It shall be unlawful to erect, construct or maintain any structure, landscaping, facility or other object that will reduce the all season safe sight distance to less than 200 feet in both directions along a public right-of-way. "All season safe sight distance" is defined as a line which encounters no visual obstruction between two points, each at a height of three feet nine inches above the pavement, and so located as to represent the critical line of sight between the operator of a vehicle entering the public right-of-way and the operator of a vehicle approaching from either direction. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 36. To see if the Town will go on record in support of effective actions by the President and the Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future well being of the people of Barnstead. These actions include:

- 1. Establishment of a national program requiring reductions of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U.S. economy.
- 2. Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investment.

In addition, the Town of Barnstead encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities, and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States and to declared candidates for those offices. (Submitted by Petition).

- 37. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the Budget Committee's recommended sum of \$3,017,488.00 for general municipal operations. The Selectmen recommend \$3,009.474.00. This article does not include special or individual warrant articles.
- 38. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.





Town Clerk's Report January 1, 2006 - December 31, 2006

As you are all well aware, 2006 was a very chaotic year in my office. We've been through many changes this year. The beginning of the year brought about numerous challenges both personal and professional. There was several software changes brought about by the State of New Hampshire Department of Safety- Motor Vehicle division with the new MAAP system. Our software company was unprepared, in our opinion, for this change and we were forced to go on-line with inadequate support and software. This brought about long lines in my office and frustration for Heidi and me as well as the citizens of Barnstead. I am glad to report that since going directly to the state server all frustration and lines have been alleviated.

At the beginning of 2006 with the changing systems it was virtually impossible to process the Boat Registrations. I am hopeful that this will be an easier process in 2007. The deciding factor will be the legislation that is in the House and the decision on distribution of town fees.

Vital Statistics has also changed, in the format in which the form that all the birth certificates, marriage certificates and death certificates are printed on. There is no longer a three (3) day waiting period for marriages. You now can apply for your marriage license, get married and receive a copy of your marriage certificate all within a 45 minute window. In the coming year of 2007 you will hear of more changes in this area for example, divorce decrees will be able to be purchased at the Town Clerk's office six (6) months after final dissolution.

Dog License's were slightly down this year by about 100. Last year more than 900 dogs were licensed in Barnstead this year we did just over 800. The dog licensing procedure is mandated under RSA 436:100 - 106 which states dogs need to be registered; just a reminder that dog licenses expire April 30 of each year and need to be renewed.

The following services are available through our office: wetland applications, swearing in of new committee members and appointed employees of the Town, Notary and Justice of the Peace services, voter registration and absentee ballots, as well genealogy information.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

For the second time in less than a year, Barnstead was ravaged by heavy rains, and subsequent flooding of the Suncook River and many other small tributaries throughout town. As a result, a state of emergency was declared by the Selectmen. Consequently an unusual burden was placed on all municipal departments, which resulted in a massive over expenditure of the Emergency Management line of the budget, which in turn forced the Selectmen dangerously close to over expending the entire budget for the year 2006.

Thankfully, there were no human casualties, and the Town was able to recoup 75% of all expenses relating to the event, from FEMA. Currently, we are still waiting for the legislature to authorize the Governor to release additional funds to cover 12.5% of remaining costs. All funds returned to the Town are deposited in the general fund, and are used to offset taxes.

Another issue which the Board of Selectmen is grappling with is the arrangement between the Town and Barnstead Fire and Rescue, Inc. The Selectmen also feel that the agreement with BFR, Inc. has ceased to be a useful tool in administering funds, and therefore seek to bring all spending under the scrutiny of the Board. It is a safe statement to say that both parties wish for a speedy resolution to this issue.

On a final note, the Selectmen have done their best to live within the limits of the budget, and still deliver all necessary, and some unanticipated municipal services.

At the present time the Town's tax rate is \$16.23 per thousand, the Town's portion comprises \$2.44 of that amount.

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

After completing a sales ratio study the Town decided it was NOT necessary to update all property values for the 2006 tax year. The 2006 assessments are the same as 2005 unless a property had improvements or an error was corrected. The Town will continue to analyze assessment to sale prices annually. The assessments will be adjusted accordingly, even if the analysis shows that the values have decreased.

In keeping with the State's requirements that towns review their property record data once every five years, the Town has contracted the firm of Brett S. Purvis & Associates to perform a review of 20% of the Town on an annual basis. In 2005 town tax maps 8 thru 22 were reviewed for accuracy. All property owners should check their property record cards annually for data accuracy.

Any taxpayer that feels his/her property's equalized assessment does not reflect the market value of the property may file an abatement by March 1, 2007. Applications are available in the Selectmen's office.

The deadline for filing all exemptions and tax credit applications is April 15 for the tax year applied. These include elderly and blind exemptions as well as veteran's tax credits. If you feel you qualify for any of these as of April 1, 2007, stop by the Selectmen's office to fill out an application. 

BARNSTEAD FIRE DEPARTMENT STUDY COMMITTEE

This committee was established by a vote of Town Meeting last year to study the current management arrangement of the Fire Department through Barnstead Fire Rescue Inc. and to report back to the 2007 Town Meeting with our findings and recommendations.

The committee met multiple times during the year and reviewed many documents, received input from The Board of Selectmen, the Barnstead Fire Chief, Officers of Barnstead Fire Rescue Inc., and other public officials past and present, as well as citizens of the Town.

With this data and input the committee carefully reviewed the current management arrangement and the relationship with the Board of Selectmen. We further discussed what would be in the best interest of the citizens of our Town.

The committee developed a report which is too lengthy to be placed in the Town report but is available through the Town's website (www.barnstead. org) for reading and downloading. The report is 23 pages long which would be very costly to reproduce for everyone to have a copy. The Selectmen were approached about printing copies to be distributed but did not have money appropriated in the budget to fund the printing. As a result of the generosity of the committee members and other members of the community 500 copies were printed at no expense to the Town. These limited copies will be available Election Day and at Town Meeting. We encourage you to download and print your own copy and share it with a neighbor.

Briefly, our committee found no fault with the decision made 10 years ago by the 1995 and 1996 Boards of Selectmen, and Barnstead Fire and Rescue, Inc, both represented by attorneys, to contract with Barnstead Fire Rescue Inc. to manage the Town Fire Department. The committee opinion is this has been a good financial arrangement for the taxpayers of the Town with very little increase to the tax base. In fact BFR, Inc. has provided funding for equipment worth approximately \$200,000 at no cost to the taxpayers over the last 10 years.

Early this year, however, the current Board of Selectmen took the position, based on the advice of Attorney Mark Broth of the Devine, Millamet & Branch, that the BFR, Inc. contract was illegal and they declined to pay

BFR, Inc.'s quarterly invoice. As a result, BFR, Inc. brought a lawsuit for (1) a temporary injunction to preserve the status quo and (2) to determine whether the contract was legal. The Court granted the injunction and required the Board to pay BFR, Inc.'s invoices and the decision on the contract is expected to be resolved at a trial later this year.

The committee believes that based on the injunction, the Town should again approve BFR, Inc.'s proposed budget and continue the contract that has been in effect for the past 10 years. We do all agree that when the goals recommended by this committee and listed below have been met it will be prudent to end the relationship with BFR, Inc. and bring management of the Town Fire Rescue services under the Board of Selectmen and Town Fire Chief, but that should be done on a reasonable timetable with a detailed plan for transition that should be agreed between the Board of Selectmen, the Town Fire Department, and BFR, Inc. No such plan has currently been agreed upon.

The goals included in our report recommendations include the following:

- Review the housing requirements for fire equipment and full time staff.
- Fund the Capital reserve funds at a value which keeps pace with equipment costs.
- Complete the equipment purchases set forth in the Capital Improvement Plan.
- Change the Fire Chief position to a full time Town employee position.

Our complete report goes into greater detail regarding time tables and actions by the Town Meeting and the Board of Selectmen pertaining to the above listed recommendations. So please take the time to read it and get the complete picture.

Every committee member has a copy of the final report and would be happy to share it with you. So if you recognize a name feel free to contact them for a copy.

This committee would like to recognize and applaud the effort, energy, and dedication of our public servants especially those who risk their lives to serve us. Without these people our town would not be the great community it is today.

The members and officers of the Fire-Rescue had a very busy year and completed many projects to better serve the Town of Barnstead. Training, maintenance, fire preven-

tion, and emergencies continue to require dedication from both the member and their families. We wish to express our sincere appreciation for the support of all the other departments and employee's working in our Town.

The projects that have been completed include:

- 6 Tower 1 was placed in service with 19 members certified Driver/Operators Aerials and Driver/Operator All Emergency Vehicles
- Air Fill System including High Pressure Compressor, two bottle fill station, high pressure booster pump and four bottle cascade system purchased under Fire Act Grant from FEMA
- New Self-contained Breathing Apparatus including personal masks for each member, purchased under Fire Act Grant from FEMA

The Town continues to see growth, which has required Fire-Rescue to provide new services and continue with the responsibilities we have historically done. We have seen an increase in Life Safety inspections and new home purchasers are requesting fire safety inspections for wood stoves, chimneys, and smoke detector installations. To accomplish this our Fire Prevention Deputy is attending training seminars to become better prepared to provide the highest level service. The Kid's Safety House continues to be a valuable tool to send the safety messages to our children. Barnstead Fire-Rescue was recognized for its' commitment to children by being awarded our 19th Gold Circle Partnership Achievement Award with the Barnstead Elementary School.

Your Fire-Rescue offers a few suggestions:

- 1. Make sure you have your house number clearly visible from the street.
- 2. Make sure you have working smoke detectors (Battery back-up and AC) and change your battery twice a year.
- 3. Make sure to have any new heating system (replacements include) inspected as required by NH RSA.

If you have any questions or want to discuss a home safety issue, contact the Fire Station or the Building Inspector.

REPORT OF BARNSTEAD ROAD AGENT

The Highway Department had some challenges this year that we do not see every year and thank goodness for that. The Mothers' Day flood damaged our infrastructure to the point that at the worst of it about forty roads were temporarily closed. We recovered quickly and most roads were open and passable within a week. Province, Bartlett, and Beauty Hill West Roads required more time to repair. We have been working to get the roads all over Town shaped up, using finish gravel to top them off.

I worked with F.E.M.A. representatives to get the paperwork completed for the highway portion of the claim, allowing us to recoup some of our losses. We received a check for about 75% of the monies spent. The State may cover 12.5% more.

The second section of Varney Road was prepared and paved. Some sections of last years' paving on that road were removed and repaved, and a small portion of Peacham Road was shimmed at no cost to the Town. John Tasker Road from Route 126 just passed Bow Lake Road was reclaimed, fine graded and paved.

The bridge on Pineo Road over Webster Stream was replaced this year by Clinton Lank, with the highway crew supporting him. Daniel Lank and Michael Huggins also did a fine job on the excavating and guard rail work.

We made many improvements to drainage, in flood damaged areas and routine maintenance and repairs around Town. The crew worked on plumbing the water truck, making it a useful tool for clearing culverts of sediments.

Crack Sealing was applied to Parade Hill Road, Hartshorn Road, Parade side of Province Road and Beauty Hill East Road.

Mowing was sporadic this year, as we had equipment failures. We replaced the spindle which has been the Achilles heel of that machine, and had excellent service thereafter.

I would like to thank the crew for the long hours and dedication to safety.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE KENNETH A. BORGIA

The Barnstead Police Department has completed yet another year of providing 24 hours a day 7 days a week law enforcement services despite having had as many as two positions remain vacant throughout the 2006 fiscal/calendar year. Unfortunately, the amount of work to be done and the number of calls to answer do not subside when manpower is below minimum requirements. In fact, calls for service have increased in 2006 as cited in this report. That having been stated, the Barnstead Police Department welcomes the addition of recently hired Full Time Patrol Officer Dan York and Part Time Patrol Officer Charlie O'Connor. Please make an effort to meet and welcome them to our community.

From the statistics reported, one can readily see that there are noticeable reductions in several crime categories listed as a direct result of the services provided by this agency. Regrettably, when criminal activity is effectively addressed and reduced with limited manpower, traffic enforcement efforts are adversely affected. Currently, the national standard for law enforcement staffing is 2.5 officers per 1000 population. This leaves the community shy of the mark with only 6 full time officers serving an increasing population of roughly 4,800 which doubles/triples during peak seasons.

The personnel of the Barnstead Police Department account for almost 200 years of law enforcement training, knowledge and experience. As dedicated public servants to the residents of and visitors to the Town of Barnstead we will continue to provide the professional law enforcement services which the Town has come to know and expect. As always, anyone can feel free to visit the Barnstead Police Department where their questions, comments, and concerns are appreciated.

OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT

The Oscar Foss Memorial Library in Center Barnstead continues to grow year after year. A few statistics for 2006: circulation was 23,693 (up 3,662 from last year), the program room was used a total of 281 times, the computer hours logged were 1,007, and the Inter-Library system loaned 620 items for our patrons, which adds to the circulation. The Library collection consists of 15,383 items which includes 1,192 new acquisitions.

The Book Discussion group continues to meet the first Wednesday of every month at 7 p.m. and welcomes your attendance. Each member of the group makes a suggested choice of reading for the year and there is a great mixture of fiction and non-fiction.

Story Hour continues under the expert guidance of Dawn McCartney. Each Wednesday morning at 10:00 (while school is in session) lots of little ones come to the library to hear a story or two, do a craft and have a snack. Dawn also organized a Halloween Parade, Christmas party and a Child Safety program. There are many active participants at the Story Hour and we welcome all preschoolers and their caregivers.

An Art Show was held at the library in the fall and we were pleased to have the beautiful photography of Lew Joslyn on display. We hope that other local artists will contact the library and set up an exhibit.

We still have passes to the Christa McAuliffe Planetarium and the Shaker Village. These are FREE passes that any Barnstead Library patron may use.

The Summer Reading Program almost doubled again this year with 90 children participating and 900 books recorded. The theme this year was "Treasure Reading", sponsored by CHILIS (Children's Librarians of NH) and NHLA (New Hampshire Library Association). Special events included a Scavenger Hunt at The Woods at Beauty Hill, and weekly library "challenges" for those who wanted to go the extra mile. We also had a raffle for adults who wanted to participate, which was such a success we plan to include adults again this coming year. The ending program featured a pirate-themed magic show by award-winning magicians Angelique & Markus Steelgrave. We filled the Town Hall to capacity!

OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT

For National Children's Book Week in November, a group of our young readers voted for their favorite nominee in the State Library's "Ladybug Award." The winning book was "I Ain't Gonna Paint No More" by Karen Beaumont.

This fall we added another service for our patrons. We now offer downloadable audiobooks. We received a Gates Grant which allowed us to purchase the appropriate software to run the program and now with a yearly fee, we are able to offer our patrons a program where they can download audiobooks from their home. All you need is a password and code and then you can, listen to the audiobooks on your computer or download them to CD or MP3 player. Once again, this is a FREE service to our library patrons. We started NH Downloadable Audiobooks in late October and already have 28 users who have listened to over 50 books. With a beginning collection of over 1,200 books available (which will grow every year), we anticipate this to be a great service for the patron who loves audiobooks.

BARNSTEAD PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT

In the 2003 Town Meeting, the voters responded to a request from the Planning Board and enacted a temporary growth control ordinance that was designed to maintain the growth rate in the population of the town at a level that town and school services could support by limiting the number of building permits issued each year for new residences. This growth control ordinance was needed because, during calendar years 2001 and 2002, the town's population had begun to grow at a rate that greatly exceeded the town's ability to provide town services. This growth ordinance has succeeded in controlling the rate of growth during calendar years 2003, 2004, 2005, & 2006 to a level that the town and schools can support in the near-term.

The growth control, however, is not permanent. State Statute intended the growth control ordinance to be a temporary measure to give the town time to expand its' infrastructure to support population increases without overwhelming Town's resources when the growth ordinance expires. Although the number of building permits for new residences is currently controlled, new building lots continue to be created. The number of subdivisions, both Major and Minor, has continued to grow significantly.

During calendar year 2006, the Planning Board approved the following:

- 5 Major Subdivisions
- 3 Minor Subdivisions
- 2 Lot Line Adjustments
- 4 Site Plan Reviews for new businesses

During calendar year 2005, the Planning Board approved the following:

- 9 Major Subdivisions
- 6 Minor Subdivisions
- 4 Lot Line Adjustments
- 3 Site Plan Reviews for new businesses

Once the temporary growth ordinance expires, these lots will be available for construction of new residences, immediately.

Therefore, the town needs to plan now for expanding its infrastructure to continue to keep pace with the expected future growth of the town's population. The goal set in Barnstead's growth ordinance was to have infrastructure improvements in place before April 1, 2009. To that end, a Space Needs

Committee met weekly from 2004 until the 2006 Town Meeting,

This year a new Municipal Building Committee has been meeting weekly to implement the findings of the Space Needs Committee and their recommendations for municipal buildings are part of a long-term plan, which the Planning Board recommends that the voters approve.

One of the major subdivisions this year was an Open Space Preservation Development (OSPD). Back in 1992 the Planning Board proposed a section of the Zoning Ordinance to allow this kind of imaginative land use, commonly referred to as 'cluster housing', to encourage developers of large tracts of land to leave permanent open space. The OSPD proposal this year was the first we have seen and it has caused us to review our regulations. There will be a proposal to change the regulations on the ballot in 2008.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Barnstead Conservation Commission would like to take this opportunity to inform the Barnstead community of the various projects and ongoing activities that have been undertaken in 2006 on Conservation lands and throughout the town.

A highlight for the Commission was the dedication of a memorial bench for Ernie Locke Jr. From the memorial fund established in 2005 in Ernie's name, we purchased an engraved granite bench that was placed on an overlook at the Harrison property located off Gilmanton Road. This was a favorite hunting area of Ernie's and it seemed an appropriate way to honor his memory. On a sultry July afternoon friends and family gathered to dedicate the bench and share memories of Ernie. It was a special time for all that attended. We suggest you make the short hike to Ernie's bench near the Harrison Cabin to enjoy the overlook and consider continuing along the mile-long woods road to the shore of Upper Suncook Lake.

This occasion was also a nice opportunity to highlight the Harrison property to some town's people who may not have an occasion to visit the property. This land is always a major focus of our hands-on activities including clearing brush, managing brush piles, and maintaining the house, field and road to the lake to name a few items. Watch for future activities at the site including winter hikes with the friends of the Suncook River and more summertime events.

New land protection projects and on-going management activities on townowned properties are in the process for 2007. The White Oaks Road Beach property continues to take the time and elbow grease of the Commission as well as the Recreation Committee. Additional stone-dust and gravel was placed on the causeway, vegetation trimmed around the beach, and a new gate was installed at the entrance to the beach area to eliminate vehicles driving across the causeway. The Recreation Committee is purchasing additional items such as picnic tables to enhance the beach area. In the near term, we hope to provide other improvements to enhance the recreational opportunities at the White Oak Road property.

The protection of a network of open space lands through easements and other measures continues to be a top priority of the Commission. To that end, the Conservation Commission continues to work with the landowner to put together a 96-acre conservation easement parcel on Clapp Road. This par-

cel ties in nicely with land the town already owns and other easements plus protected land to provide a valuable wildlife corridor in an area of town with minimal development, high habitat value and great potential for additional protection. We look forward to finalizing this project and working with other landowners who might be interested in preserving the open space and high value natural resources in this area and other regions of Barnstead.

The Commission welcomed a new member in December, when Suzanne Picone was elected as a full member. We expect she will be a great help in the future and we look forward to working with her. All members of the community who are interested in joining the Commission, learning more about the Commission's work, including its projects and activities, are encouraged to come to a meeting on the first Wednesday of the month at 7:30 at the Town Hall. Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. 
Fire activity was very high during the first several weeks of the 2006 fire season, with red-flag conditions issued by the National Weather Service and extreme fire danger in many sections of the state. The largest forest fire during this period occurred in late April and burned 98 acres. The extremely dry conditions in spring resulted in over twice the amount of acreage burned than in all of 2005. Our statewide system of fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Fires in the wildland urban interface damaged 6 structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!

The Committee has avoided increasing taxes for the 8th consecutive year, 2007. While each town's share has changed slightly do to population changes, the total taxes collected by the District haven't increased since 1999. 2006 saw an increase in recycling revenue. It was fairly dramatic and reflects an increase in scrap metal and fibers over amounts received during 2005.

During 2006 the District authorized the purchase of a new John Deere 444J loader. This piece of equipment will be purchased in January of 2007 from cash surpluses generated in 2006 without the requirement for debt or lease payments. A section of new guard rail was installed at the scales in an effort to avoid the public from scraping concrete blocks that were there.

For 2007, the District will continue the process of closing the old 'landfill'. You will note that no funds are budgeted in 2007 for the project. Over the last several years, the District Committee has funded a reserve account for the purpose of accomplishing the closure. Funds will come from this reserve account and there will be no impact on taxes, at least for 2007. A series of groundwater tests were completed in 2006 and continue to show little to no impact on ground water quality due to the old landfill.

The District Committee would like to take this opportunity to give a special thanks to the Victory Workers 4-H club. Since the facility was built (1998), the club has planted and maintained the flowers and shrubs at the front of the office area.

Comments from the public are always welcome. The District Committee meets the last Thursday of each month (except Nov. & Dec.) at the District facility at 7:00 PM. The Public is invited.



BARNSTEAD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Barnstead Historical Society meetings started this year in April with Bonnie Dutton, president of the Milton Historical Society who spoke on the historical collection that was found unexpectedly in the old Milton schoolhouse during reconstruction. She also discussed methods to clean and preserve historical documents. At a later meeting, Walter Sanborn spoke on changes in Chichester, especially the changes in roads and traffic along Route 28 and 4 and the Chichester "cutoff". The society participated in Old Home Day with exhibits of old recreational activities that included fishing for horned pout with long bamboo poles and catching suckers with spears. Displays of early motorcycles and video of races were available throughout the day. In the fall, there was a round table discussion of disasters that have befallen Barnstead. Those disasters that were discussed included: floods (both recent and old), fires (including that of the Artistic Web factory), hurricanes (including pictures of the remains of the Archie Carr barn) and an actual train wreck in town. We wish to thank Rusty Krause and family for providing a power point presentation and thanks go to all who had given pictures that were used in this discussion.

Other activities in which the members participated include: a visit to the Wright Museum in Wolfeboro, involvement in the Charrette Business Plan and hiking along the Suncook Valley Railroad track. Bill Walker is continuing his development of a genealogical computer program for Barnstead. We are grateful for the work that Fred Noyes has accomplished in getting a historic marker placed on Route 126 in memory of Jonathon Chesley. We also purchased a camcorder so that we can more easily interview longtime residents about the history of Barnstead. Those interested in this history are always welcome to our meetings and activities. Artifacts of Barnstead are gratefully received.

BARNSTFAD MUNICIPAL BUILDING COMMITTEE

The Barnstead Municipal Building Committee was formed on 4 October 2006 by request of the Board of Selectmen. The committee was formed utilizing volunteers solicited by various BOS members. The BOS appointed the committee chairman. The makeup of the board was developed in such a manner as to take a cross-section of our community and take advantage of the talent available locally. The committee's first meeting was held on 18 October 2006. The meeting was utilized to familiarize the new committee members with the previous Space Needs Committee findings. In addition, the results of the Plan New Hampshire study were reviewed.

On 25 October the 2nd committee meeting was held and the committee spent the next two months visiting various police departments and town offices throughout the local area. The committee immediately realized that the Town of Barnstead was in need of a number of facility upgrades and replacement. The committee agreed that the two areas that needed the town's immediate attention were the town hall and police station. It was agreed that three options should be developed and presented to the townspeople at the March 2007 town meeting.

The subsequent meetings through 11 January were informal work sessions where the committee members visited various facilities. The committee met again formally on the 17th of January 2007. The culmination of these meetings confirmed the need to replace both the police station and town hall in the first phase of the project. The second phase would address the fire rescue requirements and possibly the highway garage. The committee also established a goal to keep the cost of the first phase at 2 million dollars. The committee recommended a 15 or 25 year bond to fund the project. The buildings in the first phase would be built in such a manner as to facilitate future expansion needs. It was agreed that the physical location of the buildings would be on the town owned land formally known as the Rogers property.

We hope through all of the efforts of the committee, town officials, and fellow town residents we are able to move forward in the development of the needed municipal buildings. This would provide safe and adequate facilities for all of our town employees and also provide the types of services and facilities all Barnstead residents can be proud of.

BARNSTEAD MILFOIL CONTROL COMMITTEE

Summer 2006:

The field survey of Suncook River was completed on April 28. The survey included the area from Barnstead Parade Dam to the navigable limit of the Suncook River and Big River near Center Barnstead. Four maps were created that provided bathymetry maps of 1 and 2 foot contours with color gradient. The locations of variable water milfoil were noted when found at each survey collection point. The total area of the river is 116 acres with the deepest section reaching 20 feet.

The river drop in September was very successful. The purpose was to understand the exact locations of the milfoil, changes in the river bottom after the survey due to the early summer flood and to record with pictures the water location at each level. This helped to better define treatment areas for each depth for the herbicide application that was submitted to DOA in February. The planned level drop of the river began on September 19. It reached -25 inches at 3 pm on 9/20, -4 feet on 9/23 at 1 pm, -5.9 feet on 9/27 at 3 pm and refilling began on 9/28. Ken LeGrow helped greatly by taking committee members on a river tour at each level. Bob Ramalho also helped by taking pictures at opportune times that recorded how bad the milfoil had gotten in views from his dock.

2007 Spring Treatment:

During the treatment while the river is at the minus 5 foot level, volunteers will be called upon to help remove the dead trees and debris from the river. This must be done before any divers can enter the water with safety to inspect for treatment effectiveness beginning about 3-4 weeks after treatment. Follow up work will require divers to locate and remove any surviving plants.

Locke Lake is paying for their treatment during this summer. BMCC will provide follow up dive support to Locke Lake to help ensure that no milfoil exists that can potentially re-infest the water shed.

The program will focus on inspecting other water bodies and the Suncook River below the Parade Dam to determine the extent of treatment that may be necessary for 2008 in order to complete the clean up of the Suncook River watershed one year earlier that originally planned. A more detailed report will be presented at the Town meeting.

The BMCC wants to thank all who assisted with the draw down and per-

mitted access to the river this past year. Your support greatly assisted our efforts.

It has been most disappointing that the NH Fish and Game department is trying to stop the cleanup of milfoil in Barnstead and other lakes in NH. They were almost successful in stopping the fall test draw down that finally did get approval only due to the extra effort by DES and BMCC personnel. Presently the exact date of the treatment is still to be determined. NHFGD has stopped reviewing all treatment permits due to differences with DES. NH DOA wants EPA authorization that the treatment program meets all label and application guidelines. DOA has just released the application to the other four departments for the 90 day review process after pleading from BMCC and sending a written appeal to the top heads of EPA at Boston Region I and at the Federal level. It is our hope to complete the 3 week treatment of Suncook River before Memorial Day but we will not know if the permit is approved until the first week in May.

I usually like to use this space to share some of the upcoming issues that I feel might be of interest to the citizens of Barnstead. Whether it is legislation that will aid in our fight against milfoil or legislation that will aid our disabled hunters, it is interesting that the pending legislation has originated here in our own hometown. I hope that many of you will follow any and all pending legislation that is of interest to you.

Each year I receive a small booklet and this year's booklet is entitled, 50 State Comparisons 2006 Edition. This booklet is published by The Taxpayers Network located in Green Bay, WI. [www.taxpayersnetwork.org] I thought that you might be interested in some of the rankings so I picked out a few that caught my eye.

*Public School Expenditure per Pupil, 2004-05. New Hampshire spent \$9,642 per pupil and ranked thirteenth (13) of the 50 states, only 12 states spent more per pupil than New Hampshire did.

*Ranking of Relative Health in States, 2005. New Hampshire ranked number three (3), with only two states ranking healthier than NH.

*Percent of Eligible Voters Casing Votes in 2004 Presidential Election. New Hampshire ranked number four (4) with 68.2 of eligible voter voting; only three states had a higher turnout.

The above samples of rankings are part of what contribute to our quality of life here in New Hampshire. It is part of what makes us want to raise our children here, work here, start business here and live here. We must not lose the "New Hampshire Advantage" which is what keeps this state one of the most livable and envied states in America.

I know that I have said this before, but now is the time to remain vigilant in our efforts to keep our taxes reasonable without sacrificing services. It will be important for us all to decide exactly what our priorities are before committing to any new spending.

Here are some statistics that may be of interest: The Town of Barnstead received \$3,958.745.17 in state funding in 2006. Education grants made up \$3,347,512 of this total.

The balance of state aid consists of the following: \$161,631.17 from the Rooms and Meals Tax, as well as \$257,000 in Building Aid, \$150,083 for Highway Block Grants, and \$42,519 for Revenue Sharing.

I am serving as a member of the Senate Finance Committee, the Joint Fiscal Committee of the House and Senate, Energy, the Committee on Environment and Economic Development, the Public and Municipal Affairs Committee and I serve as vice chair of the Health and Human Services Committee. My appointment to the board of directors for the Healthy Kids Corporation and on the state's Winnipesaukee Watershed Advisory Committee represent two of the nine statutory committees I serve on as well. Your input on these or any state issues would be of great value to me in representing this district.

There are two overarching issues that will dominate this session: addressing the state Supreme Court's challenge to define an adequate education and crafting a budget for the coming biennium. I also will be concentrating on several key issues important to the citizens of New Hampshire, including finding ways to make health insurance more affordable to small businesses, making government more efficient by eliminating outdated regulations, reaching out to families with children who qualify for the state children's health insurance program and protecting the state's natural resources, including it's beautiful lakes and waterways.

The Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) is the area organization established to address the effects of growth at both the local and regional level. With a service area covering over 1,200 square miles in Belknap, Carroll, Grafton and Merrimack Counties, the LRPC provides a wide range of planning services to member municipalities. The Commission offers direct and support services ranging from technical assistance, geographic information systems, and transportation planning, to land use and environmental planning, and economic development. Local, state and federal resources primarily fund the LRPC. We are contacted several times daily for answers to local and statewide issues. We also maintain a regular dialogue with state agencies as a resource for the entire Lakes Region. Our goal remains to provide support and leadership to the governments, businesses, and citizens of the Lakes Region.

Listed below are some to our services performed on behalf of Barnstead and the region in the past Fiscal year:

- Conducted traffic counts at ten locations in Barnstead in 2006.
- ❖ Agreed to provide circuit rider planning assistance to the town.
- Submitted a letter to the NH DOT regarding road work on Rte 28.
- Secured funding from the NH Emergency Management Bureau to assist local communities with the preparation of all hazard management plans.
- Co-hosted and organized three public Municipal Law Lectures where practicing attorneys provided legal perspective on local planning, zoning and other municipal issues.
- Prepared a preliminary report on Housing and School Enrollments in the Lakes Region, funded by grants obtained by LRPC.

To vote by official ballot on amendments to the Barnstead Zoning Ordi-nance, as proposed by the Barnstead Planning Board, as follows:

1. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #1, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To add Section 14-2.03 Prohibited Uses. The commercial burning or incineration of any construction and demolition material or debris (C&D) is expressly prohibited in all zoning districts in the Town of Barnstead.

PASSED

Definition: "Construction and demolition debris" means non-putrescible waste building materials and rubble which is solid waste resulting from the construction, remodeling, repair or demolition of structures or roads. The term includes but is not limited to, bricks, concrete and other masonry materials, wood, wall coverings, plaster, dry wall, plumb-

ing, fixtures, non-asbestos insulation or roofing shingles, asphaltic pavement, glass, plastics that are not sealed in a manner that conceals other wastes and electrical wiring and components, incidental to any of the above and containing no hazardous liquid or metals. The term does not include asbestos waste, garbage, corrugated container board, electrical fixtures containing hazardous liquids such as fluorescent light ballasts or transformers, furniture, appliances, tires, drums and containers and fuel tanks.

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #2, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To add Section 14-2.04 Prohibited Uses. The commercial withdrawal of ground water, other than for the domestic and agricultural use of residents of the Town of Barnstead is expressly prohibited in all zoning districts in the Town of Barnstead.

PASSED

3. Are you in favor of reducing the Board of Selectmen to 3 members? (Submitted by Petition)

FAILED

- 4. To hear the Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to organize the Town of Barnstead Fire Department in accordance with RSA 154:1, I(b), which provides that the Board of Selectmen will appoint a Fire Chief and further provides that firefighters shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, upon the recommendation of the Fire Chief. In accordance with RSA 154:1, IV, this change, if approved, shall not take effect until one year following approval of the Article. (Recommended by Selectmen).

FAILED

6. To see if the Town will vote, in accordance with RSA 154:5, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Fire Chief for an

indefinite period of time, with the appointed Fire Chief subject to suspension without pay or dismissal only for cause. (Recommended by Selectmen).

FAILED

7. To see if the Town will vote, in accordance with RSA 154:5, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Fire Chief for a definite period of time, to be determined at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen, with the appointed Fire Chief subject to suspension without pay or dismissal only for cause. (Recommended by Selectmen).

FAILED

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225,000 to hire the architectural firm of CMK for the purpose of designing and providing construction plans and specifications for a fifteen thousand (15,000) square foot municipal building to house the police department and town administrative offices. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).

FAILED

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$93,000 to hire the architectural firm of CMK for the purpose of designing and providing construction plans and specifications for a municipal building to house the fire and rescue department. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).

FAILED

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a six year lease agreement for the purpose of leasing to own a fully equipped 10 wheel dump truck for the Highway Department and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,623 for the first year's payment for that purpose. This lease agreement contains an escape clause. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).

FAILED

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,828 for the third years payment of the lease for the Road Rescue

Ambulance for the Town. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).

This is contingent upon receiving a grant in the amount of \$50,337 and the Town's match would be \$18,000. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a ten year lease purchase agreement for the purpose of leasing to own a 2006 heavy rescue vehicle for the Barnstead Fire Rescue at a cost of \$325,000, and to authorize the withdrawal of \$120,000 from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund to reduce the lease purchase amount to \$205,000. This lease agreement contains an escape clause. Submitted by Petition. (Not Recommended by Selectmen or Budget Committee).

FAILED

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed \$6,000 to prepare Suncook River for an extensive mil-

foil treatment during the summer of 2007. Preparation will include contour mapping of the river with GPS, identifying plant density patterns and water current locations for different water levels. (Recommended by the Selectmen and Budget Committee).

PASSED

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of funding the Plan NH group, and to construct a granite "welcome" landmark and to attract, develop and shape existing and new positive tax base businesses in Barnstead. (Recommended by Selectmen and Budget Committee).


CITIZEN OF THE YEAR 2006
