Mr. Johnson explained difference in work between City and County Solicitors. Mr. Bruno thinks the salary asked for is reasonable. Mr. Matthews in favor of bill if job warrants a raise but thinks the present Solicitor should appear in person before the Delegation. Mr. Shannon in favor, as nearly all other Counties are raising salaries.

Mr. Tilton moved that the bill be laid on the table until further information can be obtained and to hold a continued hearing when the Solicitor can attend. Seconded by Mr. Shattuck. Voice vote in the affirmative. Motion to adjourn by Mr. Cotton at 11:45.

Belknap County Home — Monday, March 17, 1947

The Belknap County Delegation met at the Home at noon and were served a wonderful dinner by Supt. and Mrs. Flanders. Present with the Delegation were the County Commissioners Colby, Sanborn and Smith, also Senator Stafford, Supt. John Proctor of the Belknap Recreation Area, Rev. Fitzpatric and Miss Jansen of the Citizen.

The first order of business taken up by the Chairman was a rising vote of thanks to Supt. and Mrs. Flanders and the staff. Roll Call of the Delegation found Dearborn of Belmont, Neal of Meredith and Ewing of Laconia absent.

Chairman Bucklin called on Chairman of the Area Committee, Matthews, for a report on the Area but as the committee was unable at the time to make a complete report, it was postponed to an adjourned meeting.

Chairman Hopkins of the Budget Committee asked that his report be heard at a later date after the Area Committee has turned in their report to the Budget Committee.

Mr. Tilton moved that a copy of the Budget be mailed to all members of the Delegation before the adjour-

ned meeting, that all members can see what they are voting on. Motion seconded by Mr. Bruno.

Mr. Hopkins asked Chairman of County Commissioners to give an outline of the future Home as contemplated by them.

Mr. Colby, speaking for the Commissioners, warned Delegation that new building project couldn't be postponed indefinitely and that for several years the board has advocated a fireproof brick building.

Mr. Tilton moved, seconded by Mr. Hopkins, that the Commissioners contact an architect to make plans and report to the Delegation. Mr. Normandin suggested we should have committee from the Delegation to engage architect. Mr. Cotton objected to building at this time on account of the high taxes all over the County and in his town of Barnstead. He thought there should be a County Hospital rather than the County Farm type we have today. Mr. Matthews emphasized the fact that the present Home is a fire hazard, and we shouldn't delay any longer in making plans for a new Home. Commissioner Sanborn remarked that we have a very bad risk for County. Mr. Shattuck was of the opinion that we should go along with the Commissioners. Mr. Johnson thinks building costs at the present time are prohibitive for a new building. Mr. Gerry thinks we should start doing something at once.

Hand vote on Mr. Tilton's motion was called and found 9 for and 5 against engaging architect.

Mr. Johnson moved that any architect Commissioners should engage would do so without obligating the County for fees. Motion seconded by Mr. Normandin.

Voice vote carried.

Mr. Normandin moved to adjourn at 1:45 p. m.

Court House — Laconia, N. H. — April 28, 1947
Meeting of the budget committee called to order
by Chairman Hopkins to revise and review budget as
proposed by Commissioners. Members present were
Chairman Hopkins, Ransom, Tilton, Cotton and Bucklin and Tarlson ex-officio. Absent Normandin. After
discussion, meeting adjourned until 2:00 p. m.

Meeting of the Belknap County Delegation with the County Commissioners at 2:00 p. m., was called

to order by Chairman Bucklin.

Roll call found Normandin, Guay and Johnson absent. Chairman Bucklin called on Mr. Matthews, Chairman of the Area Committee, for his report, which was postponed from the last meeting at the County Home. Mr. Matthews stated that the Area is now on a self supporting basis with a balance of \$13,000 for improvements at the Area and that the Commissioners had agreed to employ an accountant to set up books for the Area. His committee was satisfied with the appropriation proposed by the Commissioners.

Mr. Hopkins, Chairman of the budget committee, gave his report which was also postponed from last meeting at County Home. He explained that the \$5000 extra on board and care of children was due to high cost of living and that it is hard for Commissioners to find

desirable boarding places for children. Mr. Hopkins called attention to the fact that no provision had been made in the Commissioners' budget for a fund to build in the future at the home and the committee were proposing a Capital Reserve Fund of \$3,500. Also explained that the \$1,400 for retirement was due to more employees. The committee recommended a budget of \$137,586.65 for the year 1947 to be raised by taxation. Mr. Hopkins read the budget item by item.

The matter of a new home was discussed at this time. Mr. Shattuck thought we should make some repairs on County Home now, such as new rugs and curtains, paint walls to give present occupants a more home like atmosphere. Mr. Varney asked if it wasn't possible to start building on a new wing at the present Comissioner Smith was of the opinion County could sell shore property and unused farm land to raise funds toward new building. Mr. Shattuck is of the opinion we should have plans drawn up by an architect so that building could be put up for bids. On questions by Mr. Matthews as to what the Commissioners would suggest as to buildings, they suggested three or four fireproof dormitories. Motion made by Mr. Hopkins that Commissioners be authorized by Delegation to sell land that they see fit, both farm and shore line. Seconded by Mr. Tilton. The vote was unanimous in favor. Commissioner Colby asked if Delegation cared to give permission to use up to \$1,000 for surveying land and have plans drawn for build On motion of Mr. Hopkins, seconded by Mr. Tilton, it was voted to allow same and that this amount be added to the present budget. Mr. Shattuck moved we rescind vote taken on Mr. Johnson's motion at last meeting at County Home relative to engaging archi-This motion was seconded by Mr. Bruno and the vote was unanimous in favor.

Mr. Tilton remarked on the \$1,700 additional for the Farm Bureau; \$500 of this amount for County Forester in conjunction with Strafford County. Motion by Mr. Gerry and seconded by Mr. Varney that budget as presented by the budget committee with additional

\$1,000 asked for by the Commissioners be accepted. A hand vote taken showed Delegation was unanimous in support of the committee report of \$138,586.65 for the year 1947

Moved by Mr. Matthews and seconded by Mr. Bruno that budget for 1947 be the tentative budget for 1948.

Vote in the affirmative.

Motion to adjourn by Mr. Hopkins and seconded by

Mr. Cotton at 2:50 p.m.

building have been drawn and we hope it may soon materialize.

We are making every effort to do as good a job as is humanly possible with what we have to do with, we welcome the advice and criticism of those who pay the bills.

REPORT OF THE COUNTY SOLICITOR

To the Honorable County Commissioners:

During 1947 eleven men and three women were prosecuted for felonies. Two of the cases attracted considerable public attention, and are therefore ment-

ioned in particular.

Barbara and William Roberts, sister and brother, were indicted at the October Term for murder in the second degree, for killing their father, Sylvester Roberts, at Gilmanton Iron Works on December 22, 1946. A jury was drawn for their trial, after which both defendants changed their pleas of "not guilty" to "guilty of first degree manslaughter." Barbara Roberts, a twenty-year-old girl, was sentenced for three to five years in the State Prison, and William Roberts, a sixteen-year-old boy, was ordered into the custody of the New Hampshire Probation Department until he should become twenty-one.

Your County Solicitor, the sheriff's department and the State Police spent considerable time in the investi-

gation and preparation of these cases.

Evelyn Cote was indicted at the October Term for manslaughter for the slaying of her three yaer old son, William F. Burns, at Meredith on September 24, 1947, by putting a tablespoonful of pepper in the child's mouth as a punishment, which caused death by asphyxiation when the child inhaled the pepper into his air passages. Mrs. Cote was tried, found guilty, and sentenced to the State Prison for two to three years.

The other felonies included three cases of breaking, entering and larceny, two cases of obtaining money by false pretenses, one case of stealing an automobile, one case of attempted rape, one case of statutory rape, one case of reckless driving resulting in death, one case of adultery, and one case of committing an unnatural act. In all of these cases, with the exception of one where the defendant was already in State's Prison, the defendants pleaded guilty, and five were sent

to State's Prison, one was sent to the Belknap County Farm, two were fined, and two were given suspended sentences upon payment of costs. Restitution was ef-

fected in all larcency cases.

In five of the above felony cases—the defendants waived indictments by the Grand Jury, and were immediately taken before the Court and sentenced. This procedure was provided for by the N. H. Laws of 1945, and allows a defendant who wants to plead guilty, to be sentenced at once, without waiting for indictment by the Grand Jury. This procedure results in a speedy disposition of cases. and is frequently more economical for the County.

Numerous misdemeanors were prosecuted in the various Municipal Courts throughout the County; cases of driving under the influence of liquor and drunkenness predominated. A number of Juvenile cases were also prosecuted in the various Municipal

Courts.

The County Solicitor has received excellent co-operation from the Sheriff's Departmen, and the State Police, in the investigation and prosecution of all crimes.

Report of Belknap County Cooperative Extension Service

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

Each year the County Budget includes an appropriation to the Farm Bureau. These funds are used to assist in maintaining a system of educational Extension Work in Agriculture and Home Economics, including 4-H work with boys and girls. The County Farm Bureau and the University of New Hampshire are jointly responsible for the administration of these county funds and of State and Federal funds which

also go to support Extension work.

The Belknap County Extension Staff includes a County Agricultural Agent, a 4-H Club Agent, a Home Demonstration Agent, a clerical assistant, and a part-time Forester. The work of the Agents is planned and supervised by the University of New Hampshire and the Farm Bureau Executive Board. It is not possible to give a detailed report of the work done in 1947 here, but a cordial invitation is hereby extended to you to visit the County Exetnsion Office and study the Agent's reports at your leisure.

A resume of the work of the Extension Staff follows:

County Agent Work—Robert S. Smith, County Agricultural Agent

During 1947 the County Agent made 456 farm and home visits, participated in 85 educational meetings with rural groups, handled 483 office calls and received 722 phone calls. He wrote 65 news stories, distributed over 500 bulletins, and delivered 18 radio talks.

As dairying is the major farm enterprise of Belknap County, the dairy program was an important part of the Agent's work. The organization of an artificial breeding circuit which is raising the production level of county herds, the enlargement of the dairy production records program, and the development of a sound grassland farming program are a few of the im-

portant recent advances made in dairy farming for which the Extension Sevice is in part responsible. Dairymen's meetings of an educational nature were

held on several occasions during the year.

An educational program for fruit growers was planned and carried out with the assistance of the larger fruit producers. Pest control is the foremost ochard problem and meetings were held in Februay and June to assist growers in formulating a pest control program. Information on when and what to spray was offered growers in spray service letters issued during the gowing season. County growers met in November to inspect storage facilities and discuss marketing problems at a large fruit farm. New equipment demonstrations and a State-wide tour were also participated in by the Agent.

The Agent assisted poultrymen by arranging series of meetings in March and in November. Circular letters were dispatched regularly and many poultrymen were visited personally by the Agent for the purpose

of discussing individual poblems.

Gardening problems were discussed with both farm people and townsfolk. City gardeners are urged to take advantage of the up-to-date information on gardening which the Extension Service has to offer.

The younger farm people of the county have learned early to look to the Extension Service for information and advice. The County Agent acts as chairman of a committee to guide the Veterans on-Farm Training Program, and also meets regularly with a County Young Farmers Club.

Rural housing is a current problem, and County Extension Staff members have been given special training to enable them to give advice on housing. Surveys have been made to determine local problems, and meetings and tours have been arranged.

An anti-Rat campaign held in the fall was participated in by over 100 farm families. Rat control is an im-

portant step in food and feed conservation.

The County Agricultural Agent cooperates closely with Federal and State Farm Agencies and organizations, and often acts as a consultant and advisor to such groups. In addition he is responsible for the office management and administration of the Extension program and staff.

County 4-H Work—Mrs. Ruth C. Weston, County 4-H Club Agent

During the past year Belknap County 4-H members have — (a) raised 6.16 acres of garden products and worked 2152 hours in the family garden, (b) started 2061 chicks and cared for 557 laying hens, (c) raised 7 hogs, 19 beef animals and 94 dairy animals, (d) prepared and served 3159 meals, 6728 dishes and packed 1523 lunch boxes. (e) canned 2093 quarts and frozen 224 pounds of food to assist with the family food supply.

The members improved 1036 health and safety practices, gave 23 demonstrations and set up 24 health and safety exhibits. 54 had health examinations by a doctor or nurse as a result of the extension program.

Members spent 902 hours cutting fuel wood for home use and planted 3000 spruce and pine trees for future use. They tapped 1304 trees and assisted with making 537 gallons of maple syrup.

Thirty pieces of electrical equipment and 36 articles from wood were constructed by the boys. 1226 hours were spent on 144 repair jobs in the homes and on the

farms and 77 electrical jobs were completed.

The girls made-over 36 garments, made 176 garments and 317 other articles of clothing. They did 292 darns and repaired 634 garments. They spent 6427 hours on home front jobs and 3896 hours caring for children.

The above results were accomplished by 186 boys and 177 girls. There were 226 boys and 231 girls enrolled, which is an increase of 107 over the 1946 enrollment. Membership completions were 80.5 per cent and project completions 77.8 per cent.

The balance of enrollment was 50.5 per cent girls and 49.5 per cent boys. The per cent of boys enrolled increased this year.

191 were first year members and 266 were re-enrolled.

76 per cent of the 1946 membership re-enrolled.

425 of the membership were in school and 32 were out of school. 330 members came from 207 farm homes and 127 were from 83 non-farm homes.

An increase of 20 local volunteer leaders brought that figure to 50 for this year, assisting 26 clubs and 7 project groups. Their leaders were trained at 18 meetings with an aggregate attendance of 163. They held 109 meetings, not atended by the Agent, with a total atendance of 1313. 12 clubs rated achievement or better.

The Club Agent spent 2681/2 days in the office and

117 in the field, making 376 visits to 146 homes.

The Agent received 124 office calls, made 397 telephone calls, wrote 93 news articles and gave 21 radio talks. She attended 84 demonstration meetings with an attendance of 1730, 11 achievement meetings attended by 427 and 14 other extension meetings with 419 present. Mileage traveled in accomplising this was 6469 miles.

1356 projects were started and 77.8 percent of these reported, the same percentage as in the previous year. Of these, 378 were Home Economics projects, 495 agricultural and 483 health, safety. leadership, etc. The number of agricultural projects remained about the same, Home Economics decreased and health increased over the 1946 level.

43 members attended county camp with Merrimack County for one or more weeks. 117 members exhibited at one or more fairs with 65 per cent of these receiving Grade A awards.

19 clubs took part in the Easter lily sale for the benefit of New Hampshire Crippled Children and collected a total of \$198.76.

50 members gave demonstrations and 126 did judging.

David Weeks of Gilford, was one of two boys selected to represent the state at National 4-H Camp in

Washington, D. C. This selection was based on project work, leadership, all-round development and per-

sonality.

Richard Shaw, Belmont, was state winner in the tractor maintenance contest and Phyllis Joslyn, Sanbornton, placed first in the state in the food preparation contest. Both received free trips to National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Lucille Patterson and Richard Currier, Sanbornton, and Richard Shaw, Belmont, were free trip winners to

the Eastern States Exposition in Springfield.

Three members won forestry medals for woodlot improvement work, 12 members won 350 free chicks, 29 girls won 60½ yards of free cloth, 17 outfits were modeled in the county dress revue. 13 received L. H. Bailey medals in the garden contest and 28 received county medals in the National 4-H contests. 37 members attained championship grade of membership.

The Trailblazer Club of Belmont, had the best health records and received a certificate as county award.

Roberta Goodell, Sanbornton, received the county award of a Foley food mill for outstanding work in food preparation. She was the outstanding girl in the county with top honors in five projects.

Elois Taylor, Laconia and Eleanor Royea, West Center Harbor, were recipients of \$2.50 each in the Hazel-

Atlas canning contest.

County Forestry Work—Robert F. Bradley, County Forester

Fifty per cent of the County Forester's time is spent in Belknap County. Interest in forestry has continued to increase to the point where the Forester is confronted each month with 12 to 15 urgent requests in this county, plus many more of less urgent nature.

Sixty-three different woodland owners, involving nearly 4000 acres have been given marketing and forest management advice and about 450 MBF of timber and 50 cords of wood on many of these holdings have been marked to demonstrate selection cuttings, improvement cuttings, and thinnings. About 600 MBF of timber

and wood (converted from cords to board feet) valued at \$9,000 have been harvested under improved cutting practices on fifteen different holdings, involving 160 acres of woodland. In addition about 5,575 gallons of maple syrup, valued at \$30,663. were produced in this county.

Four 4-H forestry meetings, two local and two county, were held and one labor saving show was participated in by the Forester. One maple meeting was held, and a study to determine the cost of maple syrup production was conducted, involving eleven producers.

Home Demonstration Work—Mrs. Harriet L. Clark. Home Demonstration Agent

Home Demonstration work in Belknap County was carried on in sixteen communities during the year 1946-47 with 921 women being reached through meetings on subjects of Nutrition, Clothing, Home Management and Home Furnishings. Projects carried on as regular subjects for meetings were Refinishing of Furniture, Room Arrangement, Christmas Greens, Tailoring, Dress Finishes, Bread Round-Up, Satisfying Suppers, Snappy Meals and Organization.

Fifteen Home Demonstration Clubs were formed in the county with club organization and business procedure carried on according to Parliamentary Law. The Presidents received training and help in this busi-

ness procedure.

Refinishing Furniture was a project to help the women utilize and make more attractive the things they had in their homes with the minimum cash outlay at this time. Many very attractive pieces were done at the meetings and the work is still going on with leaders trained in the clubs helping the club members.

Room Arrangement was carried on by trained leaders to help our county women arrange attractive living rooms as to color, texture of materials used and balance in arrangement of furniture and accessories.

Since holiday seasons as Christmas is a time when people decorate their homes, leaders were trained in

making Christmas Greens. Many attractive methods of decorating and use of native greens were developed

from these meetings.

In Clothing tailoring was offered to our women through trained leaders with the result that our women could make attractive, professional looking coats and suits for themselves and their children and apply the dress finishes lessons to make the smart looking clothes they desired.

In Nutrition we gave the help in making breads of all sorts to help in the conservation program utilizing flours other than wheat. To help the folk have better balanced meals we hal a project on Snappy Meals bringing into mind the health aspect of our work in

better nutrition for our Belknap County folk.

Through the Organization work, we have developed leadership in our women — leadership qualities of which the women were not aware they possessed.
