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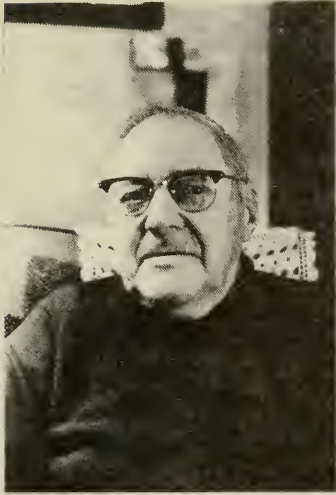

Campton is proud to dedicate its 1973 Report to a faithful and efficient public servant, Max G. Haley, who is retiring as a member of the Campton Board of Selectmen after concluding nine years in this office. He has unselfishly given many hours of his time in serving his community; as a Town Father, and a member of the Campton Planning Board. Fellow-townsmen, while expressing appreciation for his efficient service in their behalf, now wish him many years of continued good health to enjoy leisure hours pursuing his favorite sport, fishing, and hobby, painting.

A painting by Max of Senator Lester Mitchell's homestead was presented the Senator at his recent Appreciation Dinner. Another painting of the Campton Town House was presented Town Clerk Sterle Cheney and wife on their Golden Anniversary.

Max was born in Laconia in 1894, and moved to Plymouth in 1898 where he attended schools. He married Leona Robie of Plymouth in 1923. The couple was honored on their Golden Wedding Anniversary in 1973 at the Campton Townhouse, where over 200 friends and relatives gathered to extend best wishes to this outstanding couple.

He served his country during World War I, and is a charter member of Durand-Haley Post #66, American Legion of Plymouth, co-named for his younger brother, Richard Haley who was killed in action during the early days of World War II.

Max worked as a clothing cutter for the former Draper & Maynard Sporting Goods Co. in Plymouth. He organized the White Mountain Mfg. Co. in Plymouth, then the Sportswear Department for William Knowlton & Sons in West Upton, Mass. He later moved to Lebanon to the Carter & Churchill factory where he lived for several years.

Max and Leona have a son, A. James Haley, who is outstanding in research work in Bethesda, Md., and a daughter, Mrs. Virginia Cantlin of Lebanon, who is employed in the office of the Dean of Dartmouth College in Hanover.

Max and Leona moved to West Campton in 1955 where they reside in their lovely country home, Puckerbrush Farm overlooking the White Mountains, and always look forward to visits from their family and many friends.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the fifth day of March next, at two of the clock in the afternoon to act on the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Art. 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of its highways and bridges.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Memorial Day.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the White Mountain Region Association.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the maintenance of Blair and other cemeteries in Town.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,640.00 to reimburse the Campton Village Precinct for hydrant rental.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,171.00 for the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency, Inc.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 to purchase a fire truck as recommended by the Fire Wards.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw Revenue Sharing Funds to apply toward the purchase of said fire truck and to borrow through notes or bonds, the balance to be repaid within three years.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to apply 1973-74 Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be used for the Fire Department purposes.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500.00 for the support and maintenance of its Fire Department.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an ambulance service agreement with the Town of Plymouth for the ensuing year, not to exceed \$3,000.00.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell tax acquired property.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road from Route 49 to its end near the Draughty Barn, so-called.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$2,500.00 to set aside for equipment for future use of the Town.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, accept and expend on behalf of the Town such financial aid as the Town may now be entitled to receive or hereafter become entitled to receive from the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration.

Art. 19. To bring in your ballots for delegates to the State Constitutional Convention.

Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to join the North Country Council.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 for the North Country Council.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents and officers heretofore chosen.

Art. 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT — 1973

We wish to extend our thanks and appreciation to our retiring member, Max Haley, for twelve years of faithful service and sincere interest in the welfare of our Town. He has always been able and willing to do his share of work for the good of the Board. We will miss him, but wish him well in his retirement and hope the fishing will be good.

As everyone knows, we were hit with the disastrous flood of July, which caused an estimated damage to our roads of \$36,053 as approved by the State and hopefully by the Federal Government. As you will note in the report we have received only \$13,427 in Disaster Funds. We are told the balance will be paid on completion of all repairs, and after Federal Audit.

In the ice storm and flood of December 1973, we had damages of several thousand dollars, some of which may be reimburseable from Disaster Funds.

In accordance with the vote of the Town at the March 1973 Town Meeting, your Selectmen and Fire Wards met with the Selectmen and Fire Wards of Thornton and have approved the following five year contract to furnish fire protection to Thornton:

“It is agreed that Campton furnish fire protection to the Town of Thornton, for a period of five years from January 1974 to January 1979 subject to renegotiation by the Selectmen of the two towns at that time.

Campton agrees to pay 65% and Thornton agrees to pay 35% of capital and operational costs. This percentage is subject to review each two years in January by the Selectmen of the two towns. An accurate record of capital costs shall be kept by the Fire Wards of the two towns.

In case of withdrawal by the Town of Thornton, capital costs shall be returned to said Town on the basis of the fair market value of such capital equipment and at the same percentage that exists at the time of the dissolution.

One year's notice shall be given by either Town in case of Dissolution.”

You will note we have an article, recommended by the Fire Wards of the two towns, to see if the Town will vote to buy a \$40,000 fire truck. The costs to be apportioned as the above contract. The Fire Wards feel it will take about two years to acquire such a truck and that we should start this year. As voted last year we have the Revenue Sharing funds earmarked for this purpose and as of December 31, 1973 had about \$23,000 but have received notice from Washington that we can expect only about \$4,000 for 1974.

The Planning Board and its Zoning Committee, after the required public meeting on the proposed Zoning Ordinance, felt it would be better to call a special Town Meeting to act on the Zoning question. The meeting was called for February 5, 1974 and while we had a disappointingly small vote it was passed 94 to 42. We hope that with the help of dedicated and interested citizens we can make Zoning a good thing for the future of Campton.

We did not include an article on the new Homestead law, because of its newness and the fact that the present law already gives exemptions to those over 65. The end result of more property exemptions is to increase the tax rate for the rest, so that in the long run taxes will be more for those who the law is supposed to help.

This year, for the first time, we converted our tax records to computer printout, which also produced the printed individual tax bills. We feel that with the increase in the number of individual tax accounts this was the best method of handling them. Like all changes we had some problems but feel that over the years it should be of great benefit to the Town. Our thanks to I. P. C. and Mr. John Emerson for their time and efforts.

PEMI-BAKER HOME HEALTH AGENCY

The Agency this year is asking for the sum of \$1,171.00 as Campton's share of the cost of supporting the Agency in its work. The amount is based on a per capita amount of \$1.00 using the 1972 State Census figure of town population. This is an increase of .15c per person over last year, and reflects the rising costs to the Agency of doing business.

As in the past, this Home Health Care is a necessary part of many Campton residents' health and well-being. During 1973 the nurses made 214 visits to this community. Whenever possible, patients are expected to pay the costs of the visit and care. Those unable to pay benefit from the sum voted by the Town. All visits are made only under doctors' orders.

The Board has continued its policy of meeting regularly on the second Tuesday of each month, the number of applicants for subdivision having shown no substantial increase over the past year. If, at some future time, a pronounced increase occurs, the Board will undoubtedly give serious consideration to meeting more frequently. At the present time no zoning has been adopted by the Town. The Zoning Ordinance Commission has completed a set of ordinances which the Planning Board finds itself in agreement with. A number of years have passed since the concept of zoning was first brought before the Town. Unfortunately, as of this writing, no such ordinances have been adopted by the Town. If the Town is to grow in an orderly and proper manner, in a manner which will be to the benefit of all and not just a few, the implementation of zoning ordinances should not be postponed any longer. The Board sincerely hopes that the citizens of Campton will take an increased interest in zoning and adopt a series of ordinances early in 1974.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

School nursing exhibits constant changing priorities in the general health and health education of each student.

Pre-school registration is held in May with parents and youngsters. The medical history is reviewed at this time and each parent receives the necessary health information for school entrance in September .

Grades 1-8 have routine vision and audiological tests with medical follow-up appointments when necessary. Heights and weights, an important part of growth and development is done annually for each student.

TB testing on all school personnel including cooks, custodians and bus drivers is done each year through the efforts of N. H. Dept. of Public Health and the school nurse.

Health community resources, specialized clinics, our local hospital and physicians are strong supporting factors in assisting with my work.

Student health conferences, consistent health teaching, home visits and assisting parents are a major role in school nursing.

I wish to thank all of the school staff, parents and students for their continued support to me.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1973-1974

On September 5, 1973, the school opened its doors to one hundred sixty-four students. There has been a shift of population during the past six months which has given us an increase of eight new students and a loss of seventeen. The net loss is nine with a current total of one hundred fifty-five.

During a one year leave of absence granted to Mrs. Mary Wanzelak, we have been privileged to have the very able services of Mrs. Ellen Cook teaching the students of Grade 3.

Our music program is an enriching experience for the majority of our students, both vocal and instrumental.

An active sports program of flag football, basketball and baseball continues under the direction of Mr. Weston Noyes for the boys, and volleyball and softball for the girls with Mrs. Sandra Carter coaching.

Mrs. Carolyn Kent continues to work one day a week at the Village School with some of our students with special needs. She now has an assistant, Mr. Wayne Robtoy of Plymouth College, who comes to the Village School twice a week to aid her in the program.

A word of appreciation is extended to the Campton/Thornton Volunteer Fire Department for the use of their facilities for these programs.

Mrs. Rita Lougee assists two days a week in the fourth grade. She also assisted us in arranging a swim program for this year with the Waterville Estates who opened their pool for all our children who desired to swim.

The ski program continues each Tuesday afternoon plus the added activity of skating at Waterville Valley from January through March.

Our children's dietary needs are well met from the kitchen of Mrs. Sarah Strong, with assistant Mrs. Daisy Mardin.

Our building is kept in good order by our janitor Mr. Henry Noyes with his helpful wife.

Our nurse, Mrs. Blanche MacDonald, takes care of our medical needs, working one and one-half days at the combined schools.

Academically our students are showing good progress with the new Social Studies series of textbooks, the new Language Arts series, the ESS Science program, and the explorations in the area of Reading. There is an attempt now to improve the area of Mathematics. With an additional teacher added to the staff and the new facility to give adequate space to work and library accommodations, we shall be able to better meet the educational needs of your children.

Thank you for giving such loyal support to your faculty in attempting to fulfill the objectives of our school system.

EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S AND ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY FOR 1972-1973

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the Superintendent of Schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each superintendent of a supervisory union shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district, and their share of same. Said report shall be filed with the school board of each school district involved and shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrators, if any is in service in the union."

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuations. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$16,500 which was received by the Superintendent of Schools of Supervisory Union #48 during 1972-1973 was made up as follows: \$2,500 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$14,000 was prorated among the school districts comprising the Supervisory Union. Allowance for \$400 travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.

The salary of the Assistant Superintendent during 1972-1973 was made up as follows: \$2,190 paid by the State of New Hampshire and \$12,510 was prorated as stated above. Allowance for \$1,500 travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.
