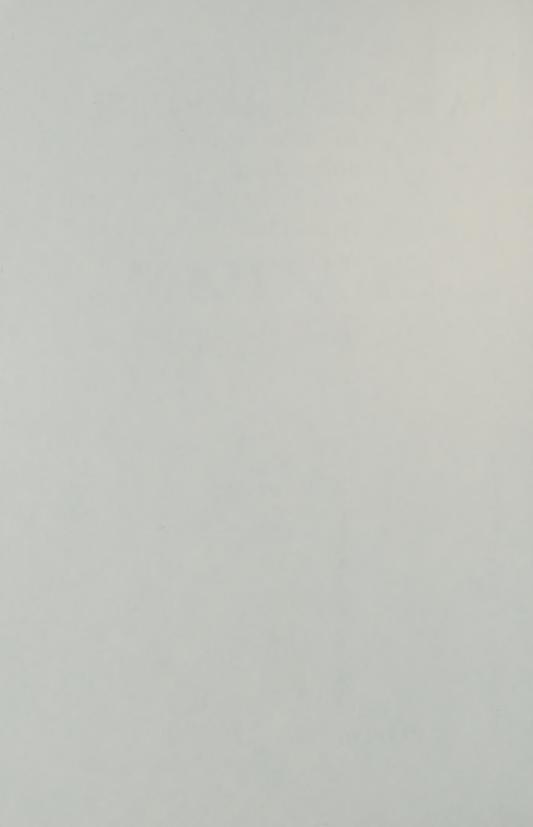

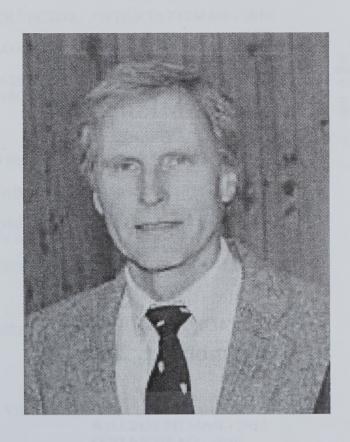

Important Warrant Article Information

American Red Cross- Article 3: This agency responds in times of emergency and supports families as they seek to restore peacefulness to their lives in cases of fire, flood, and winter storm. The Red Cross also trains area residents in CPR and First Aid. (decrease of \$146.00)

Children Unlimited, Inc.- Article 4: This agency provides services for developmental evaluations, speech/language therapy, physical therapy, family support, and counseling. (increase of \$100.00)

White Mountain Community Health Center- Article 5: This agency provides medical care for the underinsured and uninsured Chatham residents. This year they provided services for 24 Chatham residents. (decrease of \$16.00)

Northern Human Services- Article 6: This agency provides mental health coverage for Carroll County residents. The funds they receive from us help them cover the costs incurred by residents that can not afford to pay for services themselves. They provided services for 4 Chatham residents.

Saco Valley Fire Associations-Article 7A & 7B: This agency provides fire protection services for the Town of Chatham. (increase of \$1,550- see letter sent by John Plowden for more information)

Fryeburg Rescue- Article 8A & 8 B: This agency provides emergency coverage for the Town of Chatham. Their request is based on the amount of runs made to Chatham. (decrease of \$427.20)

Lovell Recreation Department-Article 9: This program provides children living in Chatham with the opportunity to participate in sport activities. The department offers 32 programs and Chatham children participated in various programs 70 times. (increase of \$100)

Tri-County Community Action-Article 10: This agency provides fuel and electrical assistance to low-income, elderly and or disabled people. This year they provided assistance to 12 households for fuel assistance (\$14,775), 7 households for electric assistance (\$3,171), and 1 household for weatherization(\$2,672).

Eastern Slope Airport Authority- Article 10: The airport is located in Fryeburg Maine. The funds are used for operation and maintenance costs. It costs approximately \$100,000 per year to operate the airport. 15% of the cost is covered by town contributions.

CASA- Article 11: Court Appointed Special Advocates for children would like our support. They provide services for abused and neglected children in our area. 31 cases were open in Family Court, involving 53 abused and neglected children in Carroll County.

Charlotte Hobbs Memorial Library of Lovell- Article 13: In 2008, 36 Chatham residents held library cards. Chatham patrons checked out \$2,944 items. These services were provided free of charged. (There was no information provided for the year 2009)

Brownfield Food Pantry-Article 14: The food pantry has helped provide food for several families from Chatham. (increase of \$100)

Starting Point- Article 15: Starting Point provided 5 Chatham residents with 21 services including crisis intervention, in-person support, court advocacy, police advocacy, support group, Child Advocacy center assistance and numerous referrals to a variety of social service providers. (This organization has never requested funds from Chatham before.)

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF CHATHAM:

Winter hit hard in December, 2008, with lots of rain, freezing rain, ice and snow. The rest of the winter eased somewhat from the year before, but we still had lots of snow. Spring brought two weeks of dry weather followed by a spring, summer and fall of abnormal amounts of rain.

In spite of that rain, the town roads fared well without any ponding of water or washouts. Crushed stone and gravel were spread on Butter Hill Road to prevent mud forming from the bridge to the hill, an area that historically had deep mud. Stone and gravel were also spread on Province Brook Road. All and all our roads held up well.

ITEM OF NOTE: Two of the current selectmen feel that the roads in town should be graded by an outside contractor for approximately \$5,000.

I do not recommend this. For five years I have been working on a plan which I believe will prevent future costly washouts. An underlying base of $1\frac{1}{2}$ " crushed stone is the first layer with extra drainage on the hills. On top of this underlay, $1\frac{1}{2}$ " of crushed gravel has been spread for a total depth of 3". An additional 3" of this type of gravel needs to be spread giving us a total base of 6". On top of this, 3/4" gravel will be spread. This road survace was recommended by the FEMA Agency representative.

If the roads a graded at this time, most of the gravel and underlay will be disturbed thereby wasting taxpayer money that has already been spent. Last year, with heavy amounts of rain falling, we did not experience any significant washing on the hills or roads confirming my conviction that we are moving in the right direction.

Consequently, spending \$5,000 to hire a grader for the 6.75 miles of town roads, is a terrible waste of town resources and will eliminate the progress already made. Additionally, such grading will last only until the next heavy rain.

At this time, I want to thank all the people who unselfishly donated their time and equipment to help throughout the year.

Town of Chatham 2009 Solid Waste and Recycling Committee Report

The Town of Chatham is finishing the third year of a 5 year contract with the Town of Lovell for our solid waste and recycling. The relationship is working well. We have experienced very few issues. The general feeling is that this is a good situation for both towns. The Solid Waste and Recycling Committee met twice in 2009. The committee continues to work towards a design and a plan to have in place if or when we need to go on our own for solid waste and recycling. Hopefully that will never happen. The more we recycle the more we save in many ways. We also will start the process of negations to extend our relationship with the Town of Lovell. We did enter into an agreement with Lovell increasing our annual budget by \$2500.00. This will eliminate all fees that have been charged at the transfer station. This is \$8.34 per person on a 300 person population. It is a good deal. We continue to gather real time data of waste hauled across the scales of the Mid-Maine Waste Action Corporation, a waste to energy facility in Auburn, Maine. From April of 2007 through end of December 2009 a total of 1003 Days we put 293.68 tons of trash across the scales. This is a projection of 106.87 tons per year. With these figures we are projecting 110 to 115 tons per year average of solid waste. Nice job by all but we could recycle more for the benefit of all. This information, as it continues to compile, will give us exact amounts of waste to help determine any future designs. I see us meeting at least two times in 2010. The dates will be posted in the future, all meetings will be at the town office in North Chatham prior to the scheduled selectmen's meetings. I want to thank all the members of this committee, Bill Briggs, Ron Briggs, Susan Crowley, Scott Leach, Wayne McAllister, and Trish Pitman. 2009 was indeed the year of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA)/Stimulus Funds in New Hampshire!

As of November 4, 2009, \$579,305,870.00 had been allocated in New Hampshire in nine areas: business/community; education; employment; energy; health; housing; safety; technology and transportation. Of that \$181,463,876.00 went to Council District One towns and cities and the counties of Belknap, Carroll, Coos, Grafton and Sullivan.

The ARRA money has enabled local, state and county government to work on projects that have been in process and planning for years. For a complete listing of these projects go to: www.ed.state.nh.us/education/recovery/index.htm or write to my office.

Governor Lynch has now submitted the New Hampshire Transportation Plan to the New Hampshire House and Senate. Highways/bridges, rail, aviation and public projects are among the proposed recommendations. Contact your local State Senator and Legislator for details about what projects you believe to be key ones for your region.

As Councilor, I do not see new revenues being raised in New Hampshire State Government. With the decline in existing revenues leading to cut backs in services, only time will determine what the law making branch has in mind for new dollars. Keep in close touch with your local State Senator and Legislator to make sure costs are NOT passed on to county and local government.

The Governor and Council are required by law to fill dozens of boards and commissions with volunteers. Report of Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. 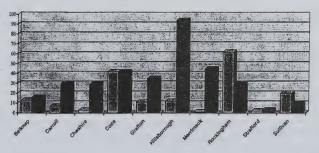
Spring fire season was unusually short this past year, with wet weather beginning the third week in April and lasting virtually all summer long. Consequently both the number of fires and the number of acres burned were below the last five year average. Due to state budget constraints, the staffing of our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers was limited to class III or higher fire danger days. Despite the reduction in the number of days staffed, our fire lookout towers are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented this year by contracted aircraft and the Civil Air Patrol when fire danger was especially high. Surprisingly the largest single fire this year occurred in late November during an unusual dry spell, in the northern Coos County town of Clarksville. This fire burned 17.1 acres and is presumed to have been caused by a careless hunter. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2009 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!
