TOWN MEETING MARCH 7, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 1:30 P.M. by Moderator Ralph B. Bemis. The Ballots were counted and found correct. The Warrants were read and polls opened under Art. 1, to choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing by Australian Ballot also voting in the Presidential Primary.

Ballot Clerks: Jennie Main, Rita Rathburn, Arthur Wikman and Katherine Upton.

The School Meeting was called to order at 6:00 P.M.

The Town Meeting was called to order at 7:00 P.M. Prayer by Rev. Mary B. Upton.

Continuing under Art. 1 Clarence H. Peterson was elected Trustee of Trust Funds for 3 years. Eleanor Smith was elected Trustee of Trust Funds for 1 year.

Fire Wards: Roland Knight, Gordon Getty, Sr., David Schmitt, Justin Chamberlain, William Bemis and Alton Chamberlain.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber: William P. House and J. Edward Mattila.

Fence Viewers: Ralph B. Bemis and John N. Clark.

Harrisville Beach Committee: Mary Gilman, Jacqueline Getty, Warren Thayer, Lawrence W. Rathburn, and Sandra Coburn.

Chesham Beach Committee: Robert Lake, Alton Chamberlain, and Roy Williams.

Library Trustee for 3 years: Jane Dunn.

Art. 2. A motion to take up Art. 2 after Art. 19 Passed.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$335.00 in support of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year 1972.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$386.00 for the Monadnock Region Association to continue its efforts in areas of solid waste disposal, planning, ambulance service, legislation, state parks, youth work and by other means call attention to the protection of the natural resources of the Town, plus its other advantages, along with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand five hundred Dollars (\$6500.00) for a complete revaluation of all the taxable property in the Township of Harrisville, N.H., this revaluation to be carried out by the State Tax Commission of New Hampshire.

By a standing vote the Article was lost 34 for and 44 against.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept a lease from the State of New Hampshire Water Resources Board and pay the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) per year on a tract of land containing approximately 30 acres situated on the south side of Seaver Pond in Harrisville, formerly owned by the Public Service Company of New Hampshire, said land to be under the supervision of the Harrisville Conservation Commission for recreational purposes.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to support the continuing service of the Harrisville Conservation Commission.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to request the State of New Hampshire Water Resources Board to lease at the rate of One Dollar (1.00) per year land which the State owns on the northeast corner of Childs Bog including land now used for a boat landing for purposes similar to that of the Seaver Pond land and under the supervision of the Harrisville Conservation Commission.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art 10. To see if the Town will vote to pass an article to have a permanent restraining order on all dogs in the Town of Harrisville. (By request)

After much debate the article was lost by a standing vote 26 for and 42 against.

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$377.40 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal Funds available for planning purposes.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$334.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. This local request for financial support is based on a 60 cent per capita formula.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred and Seventy-five Dollars (\$175.00) in support of the operating expenses of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00) to improve and hard surface that portion of the Eastside Road at Silver Lake starting at the State Road and ending at the Tennis Court.

A motion to lay this article on the table passed.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$673.61 if the State will contribute \$4490.71 of T.R.A. funds.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the funds necessary to purchase a new truck for the highway department. To further authorize the Selectmen to withdraw funds from the Capital Reserve Fund and to borrow the balance by the issuance of a series of notes and to determine the date and place of payment and the rate of interest thereon. A motion was made to accept as printed.

An amendment was offered as follows: To take \$2000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund, raise \$2000.00 by taxation in 1972 and issue a series of notes of \$2500.00 each the first to come due in 1973.

The amendment was accepted and the original motion as amended also passed.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 to serve as matching funds received from the Ford Foundation and U.S. Soil Conservation Service, funds to be used for a soil survey as recommended by the Town Conservation Commission.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 towards the support of the services of the Monad-nock Humane Society.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) to be placed in a Sinking Fund for the replacement of fire trucks under the provisions of the Capital Reserve Act of 1943 Chapter 160 as amended.

A motion to accept as printed passed.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

A motion to accept a Town Budget of \$37,542.93 passed.

Art. 20. To take the sense of the qualified votes whether the amendments of the Constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.

Taken care of by the ballots cast on the Constitutional Amendment.

Art. 21. To hear the reports of agents, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

The moderator called attention to the various reports of Agents, Committees or Officers chosen as printed in the Town Report.

A motion to accept them as printed passed.

Art. 22. Edwin Heald called attention to the Town Reports and explained why they were not printed before.

The following was presented by Thomas P. Putnam.

The Lake Association of Chesham voted at its Annual Meeting last July to empower its Board of Directors to purchase a skimobile for the purpose of improving the winter fire and police protection at Silver Lake.

The skimobile has been purchased, and is now located at Silver Lake.

The Lake Association would like to make a gift of this skimobile to the Town of Harrisville for use by the Harrisville Police Department in patrolling the Silver Lake area during the winter months.

We request this special article be read at Town Meeting and that Harrisville will accept the gift of the skimobile.

A motion to accept this gift passed.

Lawrance W. Rathbun spoke about the necessity of land maps by 1980.

A motion to see if the Town will vote to continue for one year the present agreement with the Town of Nelson for the use of the Harrisville Town Dump at a monthly rental of \$75.00, said year to begin at the termination of the present agreement was lost.

A motion to ask the Water Pollution Commission to change the classification of the Harrisville water areas from Class C & D to Class B passed.

A motion to close the Polls came at 9:23 P.M. passed.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Wells Memorial School in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the Sixth day of March, next at seven of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects.

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Art. 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$342.00 in support of the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital for the year of 1973.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the Monadnock Region Association to continue its efforts in the various services and programs, plus its other advantages, along with the other thirty seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 as the Town's share for the studies and operation of the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. These funds will be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal Funds available for planning purposes.

Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$234.00 in support of operating expenses of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$590.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association Inc. This local request for support is based on a \$1.00 per capita formula.

Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to support the services of the Monadnock Region Humane Society.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to support an Old Home Day and authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of 5 to carry out same. (By request)

Art. 11. To see if the Town will vote to designate certain roads as scenic roads in accordance with R.S.A. 455 amended R.S.A. 253.

1. Seaver Road from Silver Lake to the junction with Brown Road.

2. MacVeagh Road from Brown Road to the Town Line.

3. Brown Road from the center of Chesham to the Chesham Harrisville Road.

4. Tolman Pond Road from the end of the tar to the Town Line.

Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$2,129.57 from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for payment on a new Highway truck. This article entered at the request of State Tax Commission to verify verbal vote taken at March 1972 Town Meeting.

Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the operating expenses of the Conservation Commission.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to give Lawrence W. Rathburn other land owners along the former railroad right of way: the right to pass and repass over that section of the former railroad right of way owned by the Town, from the Eastview Road to the abutment at the edge of Goose Brook so called with privilege of using said abutment to support one end of a bridge.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to serve as matching funds from the New Hampshire Bureau of Outdoor Recreation to build a tennis court in Harrisville. (By Request)

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to repair the Town owned bridge near the Post Office, and to accept any other funds towards same if any are available.

Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate as a special appropriation for the Fire Department.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to replace eleven (11) of the older street lights with new high powered ones as will be selected by the Selectmen.

Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$1,500.00 of the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to make a study of and planning for the future solid waste disposal problem of the Town and such remainder of said funds to be used to reduce the Tax Rate.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

At the end of 1972, statistics show little change in the pace in the library. The Adult circulation at 2,646 was slightly higher than in 1971 but the Children's circulation at 2,090 was lower. The magazine circulation was a high 516. Even though there seems to be less participation in the children's group, we do not have the readers in that category that we had some years past.

To help keep our patrons satisfied, our outside sources of help consist of the Bookmobile which provided 740 books, State Library in Concord sent 47, our Peterborough Center 14. The mystery readers would indeed be lost without the usual pickups from time to time at the Keene Library. These pickups are taken care of by the Librarian periodically. Approximately 150 were loaned to us last year. During the year 81 Adult and 78 Children's books were purchased. The Adult group included a varied selection - best sellers in fiction, biography, travel, many different cookbooks and craftsbooks. We had 32 Adult and 23 Children's books donated. Many of these were new books patrons wanted to read and then turn over to the library. To add to the statistics, the Librarian attended a ten week course in Reference work which is very helpful. Already, we are adding Reference Books needed in our work. She also attended four District Advisory Council meetings and five book meetings to keep up with the State's qualifications in books.

The extra activities were successful in all ways. Special exhibits in old crafts and new handwork were well accepted. Hand painting exhibits and crayon murals were most attractive. Each month showed a different exhibit.

The Annual Tea was a huge success. 29 ladies became "Friends of the Library" and showed special interest in helping out with exhibits or in any way they can. The special exhibit of handwork by Mrs. Rita Patnode made the day. Our only regret, as usual, was the absence of more familiar faces. Let's do something about it this coming year.

As you can judge, there are things going on at the library. New faces appear — some stay and others are here for a short time — and we are always pleased to have you with us. There are still many who have been around town for a long time who could join the group.

My sincere thanks to all and everyone who has helped in any way to keep us perking. May I offer special thanks to Jon Richardson for all the time he gave to keep us neat and clipped outside.

I believe contractors shouldn't be allowed to have a key to open the dump at their convenience when the dump is closed. The taxpayers money has to be spent burning and clearning this mess.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative Statetown program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression.

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit, free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes. Permits are obtainable from your Warden or from Deputy Warden John St. Peter.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

MARL-HARRIS FIRST AID AND EMERGENCY SQUAD INC. AMBULANCE SERVICE REPORT

Your ambulance responded to fifty-two calls during the period of Jan. 1, 1972 to Dec. 31, 1972. These included, thirty-five trips to or from the Elliot Community Hospital, one trip to Mary Hitchcock in Hanover, four trips to or from the Peterborough Hospital, two trips to the Keene Manor, one to the Keene Clinic, one to a funeral home, three back up trips for the Foley Ambulance Service, stood by at one fire, four other stand bys, for a plane crash, Memorial Day Parades and a car accident and a D.O.A. We also furnished the ambulance and equipment for the E.M.T.A. Drill. A total of fortyseven people were transported to or from hospitals to their homes.

The money this year came from the following sources: the annual appeal letter, memorial gifts, in lieu of flowers, donations from the people that used the ambulance, gifts from organizations, a food sale, a raffle, and again a sizeable sum from the people of Harrisville, in response to a community effort. At the writing of this report, Playwrights Theatre Co. of Marlborough has informed us that they will present the New England Premiere of "Grass Harp", for the benefit of the ambulance fund. We sincerely appreciate the efforts of this organization on our behalf.

The ambulance, its equipment, and the personnel that operate it, have more than met all the requirements of the State and Federal government. Twelve members of the squad have taken and passed the seventy-two hour E.M.T.A. course, which exceeds the requirements of the State Health Dept.

We have not used or asked for tax money from the Towns we serve, and as long as your contributions cover our expenses, we will remain in service.

Due to the age of our present ambulance, and the difficulty in getting parts for it, we are considering the purchase of a new ambulance, and as information and price is made available to us we will make plans to raise the money.

The ambulance is in service from 6:00 P.M. to 6:00 A.M. on week days, and twenty-four hour service on week ends and holidays. We still need qualified personnel to join the squad, especially during the day Monday through Friday. This would enable us to be in service at all times. Won't you help us?

The number to call for the ambulance is 352-1100 and specify Marl-Harris.

We wish to take this space to thank everyone that has contributed in any way to help us keep the ambulance service in operation.

MONADNOCK FAMILY & MENTAL HEALTH SERVICE

During the 12 month period Dec. 1, 1971 through Nov. 30, 1972, Monadnock Family & Mental Health Service was actively working with 10 families from the Harrisville area, involving 30 individuals. Services included individual and group therapy, psychological and psychiatric evaluation, marital and budget counselling.

This year (7/1/72-6/30/73) the Agency has an operating budget of \$212,000. Increased state aid this year has carried with it increased responsibilities for extension of services to new programs and client groups. A special After-Care Program was initiated in September, 1972, which serves patients discharged from the New Hampshire Hospital residing in this service area. A special youth services program was initiated in December 1, 1972, which involves a professionally trained worker acting as liaison between Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service and the existing groups that provide services for people experiencing problems with drugs.

This area has a high priority developing capability for comprehensive mental health services for this region. Under present federal guidelines, 90% of the cost of new services can be secured through federal grants. We, however, also need increased local revenue to meet the many complex requirements of such fundings. City and town governmental aid, along with voluntary contributions, State aid, and fees based on ability to pay, provide the budgetary support required for existing and new services.

TOWN REPORT FOR HARRISVILLE TOWN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

What town is fortunate enough to have within its boundaries a minimum of ten lakes, all of which give pleasure to the eye and provide opportunity for pleasure and recreation to innumerable persons? None other than 'Harrisville, N.H. In addition, smaller unnamed bodies of water and many streams also contribute to this happy state of affairs. The Commission is compiling as complete an encyclopedia as possible of the natural advantages which it is the good fortune of Harrisville to call its own. This is called a Resource Inventory. The process of digging out all such information is slow, and the Commission solicits all help which each and every citizen is able to provide. The Commission asks every individual to look about his/her immediate environment and relay such detailed information to any or all Commission member, and to do so as immediately as possible.

The Conservation Commission has been the grateful recipient of a Ford Foundation Grant of \$1,500 to supplement the \$1,000 voted by last year's Town Meeting for Completion of a Soil Survey. The field work by the Soil Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture has been completed and when the paper work is finished we plan to hold a public meeting so that you can see the results.

The Commission was authorized by the Selectmen on October 12, 1972 to collect data and start work on a Tax Map for the Town. All that we were able to do will save the taxpayers on the cost of a commercially done map. State law requires all Towns to have a tax map by 1980. The Sub-Committee working on this is chaired by Roger Packard. If one of his men ask you for a copy of your deed, please give him your cooperation.

The Seaver Pond site which was allocated for responsibility by the Selectmen to the Commission should be ready for recreational use in the spring 1973. The land has been initially cleared. Picnic tables have been built by Mr. Alton Chamberlain. Under the supervision of Principal Kenneth R. Swift of Wells Memorial School, pupils in the School have constructed several duck boxes of material supplied by Mr. Lawrance Rathbun, Commission member. Picnicking parties may bring their own charcoal grills for cooking, but due to fire hazard, no fires are to be built here. The site is an uncommonly beautiful one. The first clearing project was handled by Mr. and Mrs. Alton Chamberlain and their two children, Mrs. James Meath and Mrs. Edward R. Collier. A Spring clean-up party will be needed for which the Commission asks aid from residents. It has been a busy year. Thank you all for your support and help. We would like to involve more people next year.

REPORT FROM HISTORIC HARRISVILLE, INC.

A year ago, Historic Harrisville, Inc. reported to the town on the Foundation's plans for preservation and reuse of several buildings, in particular the historic Harris structures.

In the twelve months since, four such buildings owned by Historic Harrisville, Inc. have been extensively renovated. Three of these — the Harris Storehouse, Harris Sorting House, and Harris Boiler House — are being used by new businesses. The fourth structure, the Harris Boarding House, will soon be completed as three apartments.

This work has been financed by generous grants and gifts. Five non-profit foundations and thirty-five individuals have given \$130,000. Each of these donors believes in the historic and living quality of the town and hopes to help preserve it.

Other important work in town, ranging from renovation of houses to conversion of the main industrial facility owned by Filtrine Manufacturing Company, confirms that preservation of the town has deep support and that the history of Harrisville provides a base for its future.

Historic Harrisville, Inc. expects to do more. The Trustees are planning the financing and renovation of the Foundation's remaining buildings and hope to assist in other projects that relate to Harrisville's unique buildings and environment.

REPORT OF THE HARRISVILLE PLANNING BOARD — 1972

This year we have considered and approved 13 applications for subdivision approvals conforming to the Town's subdivision regulations adopted the previous year. In one third of these we suggested changes from the original plans which effected improvements and were agreed to by the owner.

During the summer we cosponsored with the Dublin Planning Board and other agencies, two informational hearings at which the proposed relocation of Route 101 were presented by the State Dept. of Public Works and Highways. We also held one on our own. As a result of these and other pressures, the Department is in the process of re-examining their proposals. At this date no time has been set for the first of the two official public hearings which are to be held.

The greater part of our time this year has been taken up with reviewing and updating the Town's Zoning Ordinances — aiming chiefly at increasing minimum acreages and frontages in the Lakeside, Residential and Village Zones. These and other changes proposed are included in various articles to be considered in this year's Town Warrant.

In the coming year we expect to continue to screen and process subdivision applications and will be responsive to any suggestions for improvement which may come to us.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Wells Memorial School in said District on the 6th day of March, 1973, at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon to bring in your votes for the election of school district officers. The polls will be open not later than 1:30 p.m., nor close earlier than the time of closing the polls for the election of town officials.

Article 1. To choose all necessary school district officers in said district:

A moderator for the ensuing year.

A clerk for the ensuing year.

A member of the school board for the ensuing three years. A treasurer from July 1, 1973, for the ensuing year.

An auditor for the ensuing year.

You are hereby further notified to meet at the Wells Memorial School in said District on March 6, 1973, at 6:00 p.m. to act upon the following subjects:

Article 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency.

Article 6. To see if the District will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 35 of the Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire for the purpose of construction, alteration reconstruction, equipping, or acquisition of land and/or buildings for school purposes, said fund to be held in custody by the Trustees of Trust Funds of the Town of Harrisville.

Article 7. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund established "for the purpose of construction, alteration reconstruction, equipping, or acquisition of land and/or buildings for school purposes."

HARRISVILLE SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

The Harrisville School District meeting opened March 7, 1972. Mr. William House, moderator read the warrant and declared the polls to be opened for voting.

Art. 1. Voting for School District Officers by Australian ballot.

Art. 2. Motion was made and seconded to accept the reports of agents, auditors, and officers as printed in the Annual Report.

Art. 3. To authorize the School Board to enter into contracts for the school year 1972-73 with the Union School District of Keene at a rate not to exceed Nine Hundred Seventy-Six Dollars (\$976.00) per pupil for junior high instruction, or with other approved junior high schools was voted on and accepted.

Art. 4. It was voted that the District will accept the provisions of Title 1, Public Law 89-10 (Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965) and to appropriate such funds as may be made available to the District under said Federal Act and any amendments thereto for such particular projects as may be determined by the school board with the further power and authority vested with said school board to cooperate with other school districts and/or supervisory unions. Further that the District will authorize the school board to make applications for such funds and to expand the same for such projects as it may designate. This (89-10, Title 1) provides money for educationally deprived children with total grants based on a formula involving the amount of federal dollars available and the number of pupils appropriately identified. Approximately \$1,000.00 is available to the school district.

Art. 5. Motion was made and accepted that the District will appropriate the sum of \$1,722.00 to install a fire alarm system to have State Underwriters approval and the connection of all warning devices to Southwestern New Hampshire Fire Mutual Aid. Also will appropriate the sum of \$444.00 for the first annual operating cost of the system.

Art. 6. It was voted that the District will authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as many now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency.

Art. 7. It was voted that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$128,410.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of

school district officers and agents, and for the payment of Statutory obligations of the District.

Art. 8. Motion was made and seconded to choose Agents, Auditors and committees be passed over.

Art. 9. Mr. Day, Superintendent of Schools, gave us some very interesting information on the courses offered at the High School. Meeting was recessed at 7:15 until closing of polls.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL January 1973

The Wells Memorial School opened in September of 1972 with an enrollment of 51 students and the same staff as the previous school year, including Mrs. Pauline Goodnow as a Title I resouce/remedial teacher.

The program of study for Wells Memorial School has been updated completely and is now offering the same materials and instruction as the other elementary schools in Supervisory Union 29.

The instrumental music lessons conducted by Mr. Perry and the physical education program offered by Mr. Gerald Sylvestro have contributed a great deal toward the development of our children. The services of Mrs. Douglas Morse and Mrs. Alton Chamberlain in the library are greatly appreciated.

The school has worked closely with the Y.M.C.A. facilities of Cheshire County and they have offered several trips and other educational experiences to the children of Harrisville.

I feel that the school year of 1972-73 has had a good beginning and the entire staff is looking forward to a successful year. We are here to serve the children of Harrisville and welcome visits to the school from parents at any time.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT January 1973

FINANCE

It is with a great deal of pleasure to report that due to increased anticipated monies from sweepstakes, federal dollars, business profits tax, and a large projected balance, that the amount of revenue to be raised by taxes to support the education of the Harrisville students, is reduced by \$6,795.00, or 6%.

The total budget account is up slightly but represents the smallest increase in the last five year period. Modest salary increases for the professional staff and others, along with slight increases in the instructional accounts, transportation, and support for the Supervisory Union operation accounts for a budget increase of \$3,132.

MAINTENANCE

The Wells Memorial School continues to be maintained at a high level of efficiency, cleanliness, and appearance. The citizens of Harrisville should indeed be pleased with the concerns shared by the School Board and administration in providing adequate maintenance upkeep and support for its fine school facility.

EDUCATION

The dedicated staff at Wells Memorial is continually strengthening its professional competencies, participating in various workshops, in-service training programs, and course work.

The new Title I resource teacher is providing valuable tutorial assistance to youngsters at Wells Memorial that need that little extra help to overcome learning problems.

A new science program established at the school this past year should be producing exciting results as the students assume a more active role in the learning process.

LOOKING AHEAD

Within the near future, serious consideration must be given to the implementation of new services and programs at the Wells Memorial School, particularly in the areas of music, art, library and guidance services.

A cooperative effort in combination with other smaller districts in the Union appears to be in order.

Every effort will be made by your School Board and school administration to insure that the pupils of Harrisville receive the highest quality of education possible within the financial limits of the District.

A.R.E.A.

A new A.R.E.A. (Authorized Regional Enrollment Area) Plan will be presented to the voters of five school districts, (Keene, Harrisville, Nelson, Marlow and Stoddard), at their Annual District Meetings.

Basically, the plan guarantees that the District of Keene provide educational facilities for grades 7 and 8, (Harrisville, Nelson, Marlow, and Stoddard). All the districts involved will benefit by such an agreement. The towns no longer will have to be concerned about the possibility of space limitations for their seventh and eight graders. Keene, on the other hand, will be permitted to apply for 55% State Building Aid instead of 30% on any proposed capital improvements.

The Harrisville voters are strongly urged to support the A.R.E.A. Article in the Warrant.

RECOGNITION

Mrs. Jessie Bosworth, School Lunch Director, will be retiring this year after eighteen years of faithful service to the School District of Harrisville. It is a well-known fact that meals provided for the students at Wells. Memorial have been the envy of all in the Supervisory Union.

The administration has enjoyed, with the students at Wells Memorial, the annual Thanksgiving and Christmas Day dinners.

It is with deep regret that Mrs. Bosworth is leaving. We wish her every success in her retirement.
