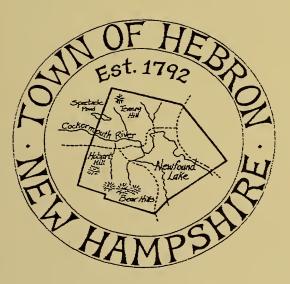

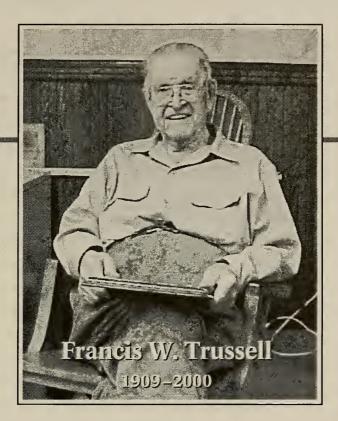

2002 TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hebron, in Grafton County, in the State of New Hampshire, you who are qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Hall in Hebron on Tuesday the 12th day of March, 2002 next, at 11 A.M. to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose all Town Officers for the ensuing year by official ballot. The polls will open at 11 A.M. and close at 9:00 P.M., and the business meeting will commence at 7:00 P.M.
- ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to approve, by ballot of "yes" or "no," the following amendments to the town-zoning ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board:

Note: This is a non-discussion item, to be voted by ballot at the polls.

1. Page ZN 15 Article VI: GENERAL PROVISIONS Add Section U.

No commercial vehicles may be parked overnight on Town of Hebron property.

Commercial vehicles may park overnight providing they are actively working on site.

2. Page ZN 3 Articles II: DEFINITIONS

Add #23

"Commercial vehicle" means any vehicle having a commercial license plate or used commercially. Private passenger autos and farms tractors and related farm equipment shall be exempted from this definition.

- ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will authorize a two percent discount on property taxes if paid within thirty days of the date of the tax bill.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$4,100) to provide programming in the Gazebo on the Hebron Common for fiscal year 2002. Said funds to be administered by the coordinators. *This is a Special Warrant Article. (Recommended by the Selectmen)*
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-one thousand dollars (\$31,000) for paving projects to include George Road, the area around new culvert on the east end and the west end by the Poulos property tax map 8.016.003, and to pave approaches for the following dirt roads Pike Hill Road, Crescent Lane both ends, Stone Gate Road and Lake Shore Drive.

This is a Special Warrant Article. (Recommended by the Selectmen)

- ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five hundred dollars (\$6,500) to replace the drainage system at Crescent and Loon Island Lane. This is a Special Non-Lapsing Warrant Article for a period of four years. (Recommended by the Selectmen)
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-eight Thousand dollars (\$28,000) to grind, gravel and repave Cooper Road from North Shore Road to Ramsay's driveway. This is a Special Warrant Article. (*Recommended by the Selectmen*)
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty-two Thousand dollars (\$122,000) for the following Capital Reserve Funds:

- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Forty-three thousand dollars (\$243,000) for a new fire truck and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow Forty-nine thousand dollars (\$49,000) for a 1 year note and to withdraw One Hundred Ninety-four thousand dollars from Capital Reserve fund entitled Fire (purpose of fund) for Capital Expenditures *This is a Special Warrant Article. (Recommended by the Selectmen)*
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the upgrade and purchase of computer software. This is a Special Warrant Article. (Recommended by the Selectmen)

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-six thousand Dollars (\$26,000) for miscellaneous renovations at the "Old Schoolhouse," these renovations to consist of painting, paving and landscaping, and to authorize the Selectmen to transfer Twenty-six thousand dollars (\$26,000) from the Fund Balance.

This is a Special Warrant Article. (Recommended by the Selectmen)

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Sixty-five Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-one dollars (\$465,421) to defray charges for the ensuing year. This article EXCLUDES all previous warrant articles.

HEBRON ANNUAL TOWN MEETING March 13, 2001

The Annual Meeting of the voters of Hebron was called to order by Moderator, Everett N. Begor, Jr., at 11:00 A.M.

ARTICLE 1. The polls were declared open for voting for Town Officers, for Officers of the Newfound Area School District, for Warrant Articles for the Newfound Area School District. All the results are recorded on a separate sheet. The results of the School votes were sent to the Newfound Area School Clerk on March 15, 2001. There are 421 registered voters in Hebron and 175 votes were cast. The following votes were turned in for Town Offices. Many of the offices also had several single write-in votes which are unrecorded in this report.

The business portion of the meeting was called to order at 7:00 PM. After the Salute to the Flag, and the introduction of the people at the head table, the Moderator read the rules of the meeting and announced upcoming Town events.

Bruce Barnard moved and John Matthews seconded a motion to place Articles 7 and 8 first on the meeting agenda because Bond issues must be dealt with first at the business portion of Town Meetings. A voice vote in the affirmative.

John Matthews, Chairman of the Capital Improvement Program Committee (CIP) reported on the work done by the CIP Committee which consisted of Alan Barnard, Phil Twombly, Lee Alexander, Alice Kirby, Richard Carrara, Henry Lynch, Ron Johns, and Bruce Barnard. The Committee looked into the future needs of the Town and decided there is a need for a Highway Building/Salt Shed now, followed in 2002 by a Public Safety Building to house the Fire, Police and Emergency/Rescue Departments which would be located on the Rogers property, and a Town Meeting Hall, which may include Town Offices, to be located on the Berry site (between the Hebron store and the present fire station) in 2004 or 2005.

ARTICLE 7. John Matthews moved and Bill Gabler seconded a motion to see if the Town would vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thirty-five Thousand dollars (\$235,000) for a Highway Maintenance Building, and to authorize the issuance of not more than \$220,000 of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of \$15,000 from the Town-Shed Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. (Borrowing \$220,000 @ 4.75% for 3 years) John Matthews presented plans drawn up by Trapper Brown, Inc. for the proposed Town Highway Maintenance Building and Sand/Salt Shed which will be located off Cooper Road. The Maintenance Building will be an insulated steel building with a half pitched roof that will have 3 bays with concrete floors and overhead doors, an office and a bathroom, and a connecting $30' \times 50'$ open shed with dirt floor. A well and some site work is included in the price of \$188,400 quoted by Trapper Brown, Inc. The Sand/ Salt Shed will be a three sided lean-to type building built with concrete blocks and telephone pole timbers on the sides and a metal roof. The cost of the Sand/Salt Shed is \$32,000. A septic system and improvements to the access road make up the remaining money requested. By borrowing \$220,000 over a three year period, the impact on taxes is about \$0.65 per thousand. The pitch of the Maintenance Building roof was questioned, and John Matthews said that will be brought up with the contractor. A ballot vote was taken, with the polls declared open for one hour by the Moderator.

Eighty-two (82) people voted. A $\frac{2}{3}$ vote was required which equaled 55 votes. The vote was 59 yes, 23 no. The article passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8. Bruce MacDougall moved and Lee Alexander seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand dollars (\$30,000) for future design work for Town Buildings. John Matthews made an amendment, seconded by Bruce Barnard to change the amount of \$30,000 to \$35,000. Thirty-five thousand dollars was the original

amount asked for, but there was an error when the amount was written in the warrant. The amendment passed with a voice vote. John Matthews explained the design work would be architectural plans for the new Safety Building which would be presented for voter approval at 2002 Town Meeting. If the plans as presented were approved then, the design portion of the cost of the new building would be deducted from the final appropriation. There would also be a conceptual design of the proposed Town Meeting Hall presented. It was asked if the buildings would be fire rated and the answer was yes. The consultant, Joe Nichols, who oversaw the work done on the Bridgewater-Hebron School, will also be reviewing the plans before they will be submitted to the Town. It was asked if a design-build method of construction would be cheaper for the Town and John Matthews said the CIP Committee has looked into several different plans and felt an architect designed project with a consultant working for the Town would save the most money. It was asked what would be done with the old building in Town if offices were put in the Town Meeting Hall, and John Matthews said at present nothing had been decided.

The article, as amended, passed with a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 2. Bruce MacDougall moved and Mary Campbell seconded the motion to see if the Town will authorize a two percent discount on property taxes if paid within thirty days of the date of the tax bill.

The article passed unanimously by voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3. Ed Gempka moved and Bill Gabler seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$2,150) to provide programming in the Gazebo on the Hebron Common for fiscal year 2001. Said funds to be administered by the coordinators. Speaking for the Coordinators, Everett Begor and Jane Ramsay, Jane gave a rundown on the programs proposed for the upcoming summer and thanked people for their support of last year's series.

The article passed unanimously by voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4. Bruce Barnard moved and Jay Matthews seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand dollars (\$10,000) to upgrade a portion of the Braley Road. Bruce Barnard said the area to be upgraded was easterly from the bridge up toward the Esty house. The road has been undermined by flooding over the years and some large rocks need to be removed. The work will be minimal because between three and five years from now the bridge is to be replaced. It was asked why this road was being worked on while George Road, which had suffered severe damage from a flood, several years ago, still was not repaired and Bruce Barnard explained that FEMA is waiting for a civil engineer to get a wetlands permit before the work can be completed.

The article passed with a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5. Bruce Barnard moved and Curtis Mooney seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand dollars (\$10,000) to upgrade a portion of Beachwood Road and its drainage system. Bruce Barnard said the area to be worked on was at the end of the

road toward the lake and there was a problem keeping the existing culverts open in the winter. The Town would put in a catch basin near Oak Lane and the broken surface of the road above Birch Lane would be replaced. *The article passed with a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.*

ARTICLE 6. Bill Gabler moved and Heath Lynch seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty-five Thousand dollars (\$85,000) for a town-wide revaluation of properties. Bill Gabler explained that the Town had been taken to Court over an assessment of property last year and the Court ordered a revaluation of the whole Town. The Selectmen checked into several companies and felt the amount in the article would be adequate for the job. The properties will be listed on tax cards (now each property is in a folder) and all the work will be fully computerized. It was asked if the Gallaway decision (regarding the School Funding Tax) would change the Court's decision on Hebron's revaluation and if the State might pay for it and the answer to each was no. By law, the Towns have to revaluate property every five years. The last times Hebron did entire revaluations were in 1969 and 1988. The Selectmen have done assessing by measuring the outside of each house and reviewing the property. The company hired to do the revaluation will do an outside and inside inspection of each property. It was asked if the money raised last year for this purpose (\$10,000) was included in the fee of the company to be hired and the Selectmen said they wanted to hold that money in case of any appeals or unforeseen needs. The time frame for the work to be done is that the assessors will start around the first of June and the groundwork will take about twelve months. They will do the computer work and the project should be completed by October 2002. It was asked if there needed to be further updating each year and it was said that would need to be done. It could be done by the Town or by professionals. Who will do it has not been determined yet. It was asked what would happen if the article was voted down and Bill Gabler said the State would come in and do it and take the money from the Town to pay for it.

The article passed with a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 9. Bruce Barnard moved and Alan Barnard seconded the motion to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell to Wicosuta Real Estate Co., L.L.C., an abutter, for One Thousand dollars (\$1,000) each, two (2) certain landlocked lots or parcels of land, containing approximately $\frac{1}{16}$ of an acre, located within Camp Wicosuta, on the westerly side of West Shore Road in the Town of Hebron, more particularly described in Book 834, Page 8 and Book 902, Page 328 of the Grafton County Registry of Deeds and also known as lots LVP 56 and LVP 127 (Section B) on the Town of Hebron tax maps. Alan Barnard explained that Lake View Park consisted of many $40^{\prime} \times 90^{\prime}$ lots, which were given away or sold in the early 1900s and are assessed at \$1,000 each. The two parcels are owned by the Town. Many of the other Lake View Park lots have been purchased by Camp Wicosuta, and the two lots in question are situated in the middle of the present camp, and have been used by the Camp for many years. The Camp approached the Selectmen and asked to purchase the lots.

The article passed with a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 10. Bruce Barnard moved and John Dunklee seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to Camp Wicosuta (No.2) Inc., an abutter, for One Thousand dollars (\$1,000) each, four (4) certain lots or parcels of land, containing approximately ¹/₁₆ of an acre, located within Camp Wicosuta, on the easterly side of West Shore Road in the Town of Hebron, more particularly described in Book 2114, Page 889; Book 2114, Page 890; Book 2114, Page 887, and Book 2114, Page 888 of the Grafton County Registry of Deeds and also known as lots LVP 106, LVP 130, LVP 199. and LVP 231 (Section A) on the Town of Hebron tax maps. Bruce Barnard explained this article was similar to Article #9 in that the landlocked parcels were owned by the Town and surrounded by Camp Wicosuta. He said Camp Wicosuta had approached the Town to purchase the parcels. Ron Ward, representing Camp Berea, an abutter to the Camp Wicosuta (No. 2) land, offered an amendment to: Sell the parcels to Camp Berea for Two Thousand (\$2.000) each. It was seconded by Alan Matthews. There were questions as to whether the land, if sold to Camp Berea, would be tax exempt (ves) and whether the motive for Camp Berea purchasing the property was to create problems for any future development of the Camp Wicosuta (No.2) property. After discussion, the amendment was defeated with a voice vote.

The article as stated in the warrant was passed with a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 11. Bruce MacDougall moved and Frank Handibode seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Six Hundred dollars (\$4,600) to hire a professional auditing firm to audit the financial records of the Town of Hebron. The Selectmen said they had spoken to Plodzik and Sanderson and felt they would do a good, professional job.

The article passed with a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 12. Bill Gabler moved and Curtis Mooney seconded the motion to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to discontinue the portions of the Class VI road as Bryar Road that has been relocated to access Hobart Country Estates. Alan Barnard explained that the new development had rebuilt sections of the Class VI road along the Bryar Road and eliminated some steep sections of the original road. There would be no need for the Town to continue to hold on to the unimproved sections since there is a rebuilt road which is up to Town specifications in place.

The article passed with a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

- ARTICLE 13. Bill Gabler moved and Barbara Brooks seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred dollars (\$2,500) for the upgrade and purchase of computer software. Some of the money would be used to upgrade the Tax software, purchase software for compiling voter checklists, and the upgrade of the BMSI software. Training for the new programs would be included. *The article passed with a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative*.
- ARTICLE 14. Bill Gabler moved and John Matthews seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand dollars (\$8,000) for the purchase of office equipment. A new printer for tax bills, desk for the Tax Collector, a copy machine/fax machine for the Plan-

ning Board, and new fireproof files are included in the article. The article passed with a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 15. Bruce MacDougall moved and Alan Barnard seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty-seven Thousand dollars (\$127,000) for the following Capital Reserve Funds:

Bruce Barnard made an amendment, seconded by Hugh Sycamore to reduce the amount by \$10,000 making the total One Hundred Seventeen Thousand dollars (\$117,000). The amount taken out is for the Highway Shed because the total amount needed was raised in Article 7. It was asked if the money should be kept in to help purchase needed tools and equipment, but Bruce Barnard said there was money built into the amount being raised in Article 7 which should cover tools and equipment. The amendment passed with a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

The article, as amended, passed with a unanimous voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 16. Bruce MacDougall moved and Nadine Hession seconded the motion to see if the Town of Hebron will be a provider of ambulance service to the Town of Bridgewater commencing January 1, 2002 and to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate a contract therefore. Hebron EMT Chief Linda Fischer spoke to the article. She said the Town had been asked by Bridgewater to help them get their own Rescue Squad going by supplying ambulance service to the West side of Town from Whittemore Point, Hemlock Brook Road, and Dick Brown Road up Route 3A to the Hebron Town line. Bridgewater would pay Hebron a yearly fee, Bridgewater EMT's would serve Hebron and Groton as well as Bridgewater, and Hebron would collect the insurance fees. Questions were asked about Hebron's ability to cover three towns (Hebron, Groton, and Bridgewater) with just one ambulance and whether Hebron's coverage would suffer if the department was responsible for so much area. The Board of Selectmen said they had asked for a vote of the Department to see if the volunteers wanted to add Bridgewater, and an actual vote was not taken because the squad was called out on the night it was to be done. The EMT's in attendance who spoke were not in favor of the addition of Bridgewater, although they said they would be willing to act as backups as they do with the Mutual Aid system that is now in effect. The article was defeated with a negative voice vote.

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ARTICLE 17. Bruce Barnard moved and Ron Collins seconded the motion to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to discontinue the northern 750+/- feet of Tenney Lane. Bruce Barnard spoke to the article. He said Green Acre Woodlands is working with the New Hampshire Department of Transportation to make a parking lot for the designated Mt. Crosby walking trail that starts at the end of Tenney Lane at what is called "New Barn Field." The 750+/- feet of trail will be closed to vehicles but will remain open for foot traffic. The parking lot is entirely on Green Acre Woodlands property, the snowmobile and cross-country skiing access will still be protected, no property owner's land (other than Green Acre Woodlands) will be impacted and access for fire protection will be assured. There would also be no expense to the Town.

The article passed in the affirmative with a voice vote.

ARTICLE 18. Bruce MacDougall moved and Alan Barnard seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withhold the Statewide Property Tax payment to the State of New Hampshire and to place the same in escrow until the final disposition of the so-called Portsmouth Court Case challenging said tax. Hebron's \$440,880, along with money from other so-called donor towns, will be put in escrow at the Rockingham Superior Court.

The article passed in the affirmative with a voice vote.

ARTICLE 19. Bill Gabler moved and Bruce Barnard seconded the motion to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Thirty Thousand Thirty-two dollars (\$330,032) to defray charges for the ensuing year. This article will exclude all previous warrant articles. Bill Gabler went over the budget.

The article passed in the affirmative with a unanimous voice vote.

The business portion of the meeting ended at 10:35 P.M. The polls were kept open for anyone who had not had a chance to vote. The meeting adjourned at 11:00 P.M.

HEBRON POLICE DEPARTMENT Annual Report

2001 proved to be a very busy year for the officers of the Hebron Police Department. We received over 795 calls through the Grafton County Sheriff's dispatching services. This was a 100% increase over last year's calls along with the calls to individual officers' homes. 911 calls were down about 20%, but still resulted in over 30 emergency responses.

Accidents kept us busy, along with domestic incidents, traffic and radar patrols, missing persons, house checks, marathons, fairs and private gatherings held throughout the year.

If you are contemplating installing a burglar and/or a fire alarm system in your house, please contact the department so we can review procedures for our response to the alarm. This is important for your safety as well as the safety of our officers. Also, if your home is going to be vacant for a period of time, please contact the department so we can initiate a house check.

The new cruiser has proven to be of great value many times this past year at several accidents along Route 3A and other locations where the four-wheel drive had to be used due to the remoteness of the area or weather conditions. It is well equipped, thanks to the efforts of Officer William Gabler, who supervised the stocking of the vehicle with the necessary daily operational equipment and emergency response gear.

The department has received many favorable compliments on its appearance, not only from town residents, but also from neighboring communities and departments.

Because of the September 11 attack on our country, I am asking everyone, if you see anything out of the ordinary or something that looks suspicious, please call us and let the police investigate it. HEBRON FIRE DEPARTMENT

In 2001 the Hebron Fire Department responded to 146 calls. This compares with 113 calls in 2000, 135 calls in 1999, and 122 calls in 1998. The type of incidents breaks down as follows:

- 86 medical emergencies including motor vehicle accidents.
- 21 requests for mutual aid.
- 10 wires down.
- 10 alarm activations.
- 5 smoke investigations.
- 4 chimney fires.
- 3 assist police.
- 3 furnace/boiler problems.
- 2 outside fires.
- 2 service calls.

As is apparent, medical emergencies are the bulk (60%) of the department's activity. This is typical of fire departments that run an ambulance service. It is also interesting to note that medical emergencies have steadily increased since 1996, the first full year of providing patient transport. Population increases coupled with the fact that we are all getting older probably accounts for the increase.

The number of members in the department has remained stable at 24, with only a small amount of turnover. Most of the members are cross-trained as both firefighters and emergency medical personnel. This gives the department the depth it needs to respond to various kinds of emergencies in a timely manner. At present there are a total of 8 EMT Basics and 5 EMT Intermediates in the department. With two members currently enrolled in an EMT course, the total number of EMT's will be 15 by the fall of this year. There is not another town around that can claim as many trained persons.

On the fire side, most of the members have some level of firefighter certification. However, since certification as a firefighter does not require periodic renewal as do the medical certifications, it is easy to become "rusty." To counter this, the department is establishing a refresher training program to sharpen skills and increase readiness. Hebron has gone many years without a major fire, but the reality is that one could occur at any time. We must always be prepared.

The fire service is a little like the old stools used for milking cows. They require three legs to stand. The three legs of the fire service are personnel, training, and equipment. We have made significant strides with the first two, and now it is again time to consider the third—equipment, namely, replacement apparatus. At present the department runs three engines and a tanker. The three engines were manufactured in 1959, 1978, and 1987 respectively. The tanker is a homemade unit put together some years ago by a department in Connecticut on a used 1969 chassis. As is obvious, our ten-year apparatus replacement plan has morphed into a 15-year plan. Therefore, the time has come to step up and buy a new engine.

Finally, I want to thank the community for the support it has given the department. Our success reflects your concern for the safety and well-being of our town and its people.

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PEMI-BAKER HOME HEALTH AGENCY REPORT

Serving the community since 1967, Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency serves ten member towns as set forth in the Constitution and Bylaws of the corporation. Many services are partially paid for by a variety of funding sources, but the agency must ask its member towns for an appropriation to help defray the costs of services to Hebron residents. In addition to fund-raising efforts by the agency, a sliding fee scale is offered for those patients who cannot afford to pay or who can only afford to pay a minimal amount. For these purposes, the agency uses donations from generous community members. In 2001, the agency provided 116 visits to patients in Hebron.

Pemi-Baker Home Health skilled nursing program provides ten specialties including adult psychiatric nursing, geriatric nursing and newborn visits. Rehabilitation services include Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Speech Therapy and Respiratory Therapy (by arrangement). Social workers, home health aides and homemakers provide other specialty services to patients. The agency's Community Outreach provides education and support services to Hebron including Alzheimer's Respite, Long-term Care and seven other community programs.

Home health offers comprehensive home health care services. Home health is provided to all ages.

Home health care treats the patient with respect and consideration. Home health promotes patient independence.

Pemi-Baker Home Health is a nonprofit New Hampshire licensed Medicare Homecare and Hospice certified agency.

They are truly for those who need home care, and we, as member towns, will continue to support and commend their efforts to serve our residents. We are indeed fortunate to have this agency and its services available to all of us.

The Staff of the TTCC wishes everyone a Happy & Healthy New Year. 2001 was a very productive year at the TTCC. We completed a number of exciting projects. The main entrance porch of the Center was rebuilt and the other porch was enclosed to add much needed storage space. With 55 teams involved in our sports programs, it is always difficult to find space for equipment and supplies.

We were fortunate to receive a grant from NH Rural Development to build additional office space and a computer room for the children. With this money we were also able to purchase new computers, a printer and a scanner. We will also be adding a homework area with this money.

Many new programs were added during the year. The Center revamped our Basketball program this year. We split the third and sixth grade leagues to all boys and all girls teams. This was done to give the girls a better opportunity to learn the games and encourage more girls to participate.

The Center joined the Cal Ripken/Babe Ruth program this year allowing our 26 teams a better opportunity to play in tournaments and with other towns.

We want to thank the Newfound Area School District for their continued support of the Tapply-Thompson Community Center and its programs. We hold many of our programs and practices at the local schools to accommodate our growing numbers. During basketball season you will find our program in the Bristol Elementary School, Newfound Memorial Middle School and at the Bridgewater-Hebron Village School. We are grateful for their appreciation of the importance of Recreation in the Newfound Area.

In closing, the Tapply-Thompson Community Center wishes to thank the many Hebron volunteers that have donated their time and energies by working in our sports leagues, helping with our Haunted House, Santa's Village (we had 1,067 visitors this year) and our numerous other fund-raising and youth activities.

GRAFTON COUNTY SENIOR CITIZENS COUNCIL, INC. 2001 Annual Report

Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. is a private nonprofit organization that provides programs and services to support the health and well-being of our older citizens. The Council's programs enable elderly individuals to remain independent in their own homes and communities for as long as possible.

The Council operates eight senior centers in Plymouth, Littleton, Canaan, Lebanon, Bristol, Orford, Haverhill and Lincoln and also sponsors the Retired Senior Volunteer Program for the Upper Valley and White Mountains (RSVP). Through the centers and RSVP, older adults and their families take part in a range of community-based, long-term services including home delivered meals, congregate dining programs, transportation, adult day care, chore/home repair services, recreational and educational programs, and volunteer opportunities.

During 2001, 48 older residents of Hebron were served by one or more of the Council's programs offered through the Plymouth Regional Senior Center.

- Older adults from Hebron enjoyed 655 balanced meals in the company of friends in the Plymouth Center's dining room.
- They received 772 hot, nourishing meals delivered to their homes by caring volunteers.
- Hebron residents were transported to health care providers or other community resources on 17 occasions.
- They received assistance with problems, crises or issues of long-term care through 57 visits by a trained social worker.
- Hebron's citizens also volunteered to put their talents and skills to work for a better community through 227 hours of volunteer service.

The cost to provide Council services for Hebron residents in 2001 was \$9,291.02. (The Town of Hebron contributed \$350.00 towards these expenses.)

Such services can be critical to elderly individuals who want to remain in their own homes and out of institutional care in spite of chronic health problems and increasing physical frailty. They also contribute to a higher quality of life for our older friends and neighbors. In addition, community-based services offered by the Council save tax dollars over nursing home care or other longterm care options. As our population grows older, supportive services such as those offered by the Council become even more critical.

Grafton County Senior Citizens Council very much appreciates Hebron's support for our programs that enhance the independence and dignity of older citizens and enable them to meet the challenges of aging in the security and comfort of their own communities and homes.

Popcorn and popcorn making supplies were donated, different organizations helped with the Family Fun Day, Camp Berea and the Bridgewater-Hebron School served as the backup locations when it rained, and several volunteers helped the Coordinators.

The Coordinators of the Gazebo programs look forward to bringing another year of fun and entertainment to the Hebron Common in 2002.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION REPORT

With a service area covering over 1,200 square miles in Belknap, Carroll, Grafton and Merrimack Counties, the Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) provides a wide range of planning services to its members. Our work program is as comprehensive as it is full, with activities ranging from technical assistance, geographic information systems, transportation, and use and environmental planning, to economic development. We are funded from multiple sources including local and state government, as well as special studies. LRPC is contacted many times each week for answers to local issues. We also continue to maintain a regular dialogue with state agencies that depend on us as a resource for the entire Lakes Region. Our goal remains to provide support and leadership to the region, its governments, businesses, and citizens.

Here are a few of our accomplishments over the past year:

- Provided town officials with historic and future population statistics.
- Provided the Hebron Planning Board with information regarding changes in their zoning ordinance.
- Furnished the town with twelve copies of Hebron's Regulations and Ordinances.
- Ordered and delivered to the Hebron Planning Board three copies of the 2000–2001 NH Edition Planning and Land Use Regulation books at considerable savings.
- Completed the Lakes Region Transportation Improvement Program and forwarded a prioritized list of projects to the NH DOT as part of the biennial update of the NH State Transportation Improvement Program.
- Coordinated the 16th annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection, with nearly 2,400 households from 27 communities participating. Over 16,000 gallons of toxic household products were removed.
- Completed the Region's first digital land use map, which is available to local and regional organizations.
- Updated the Development Trends in the Lakes Region Annual Report using survey data.
- Co-hosted and organized three public Municipal Law Lectures where practicing attorneys provided a legal perspective on "The How, Who, What, Where, and Why Plans"; "Towers, Traditions, and Topless Dancers"; and "Innovative Land Use Regulations".
- Entered into an Agreement with the NH Office of Emergency Management to prepare two pilot all hazard mitigation plans. These plans are used to facilitate mitigation funds from the federal government.
- Prepared and hosted citizen education workshops on How to Prepare a Master Plan, and Planning Processes and Procedures.
