## Warrant for Annual Meeting

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of chapter 235 of the public laws of 1933, raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2500.00) for same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue serial notes in payment of permanent improvement of a certain road as set forth in chapter 235 of the public laws of 1933.
- 5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges in addition to that required by law.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) for the care of cemeteries.
- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the J. A. Tarbell library in addition to that required by law.

- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 9. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the control of white pine blister rust.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, raise and appropriate money for the same, or act anything thereon.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to buy new chairs for Citizen's hall, or act anything thereon.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to buy a new fire truck, or act anything thereon.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to repair or replace ceiling of dining room of town hall.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to buy a snow plow for the tractor or additional snow equipment, raise and appropriate money for the same, or act anything thereon.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to accept a certain piece of land for a highway extending from Erwin E. Cummings' residence to Hadley road, so-called, or act anything thereon. (By request.)
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be presented to the Wilton Fire Department to be used in their firemen's relief fund. (By request.)
- 17. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

- 18. To see if he town will vote to allow the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at time of taking inventory April first.
- 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or sell any property which may be acquired by tax title. (By request of State Tax Commission.)
- 20. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under laws of New Hampshire 1933, chapter 99. (By request of Secretary of State.)
- 21. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyndeboro:

I respectfully submit herewith my eleventh annual report.

# **School Organization**

The same teachers as last year have been retained at the South School and Perham Corner, Miss Gretchen Smith, after four years of very satisfactory service at the North School, accepted another position for this year. In her place we secured Miss Elma Holt, who was graduated from the Plymouth Normal School two-year elementary course last June with an excellent record. On account of a large increase in the number of children at Lyndeboro Centre, it was decided late in August to reopen the Centre School. Miss Marion Brown, a graduate of the three-year elementary course at Keene Normal School last June, was engaged and taught the school until the last of January when she was released and Mrs. Dorothy Davis of Wilton is substituting at the present time. Mrs. Davis is a graduate of the Gorham Normal School in Maine in the Class of 1932. In accordance with the wishes of the District, for the sake of economy, there has been no music supervisor either last year or this year. We hope the District will see fit to provide for this service next year.

The statistical tables at the end of this report are for the complete school year 1932-1933 and for the Fall Term of 1933. As compared with previous years the enrollment shows a slight decrease. The attendance was somewhat below the state average last year but is normal so far this year. The record of tardiness was high at Perham Corner last year and is high so far this year at the South and Centre

Schools. There appears to be no reason for this except carelessness. We ask the co-operation of the parents in our efforts to reduce tardiness.

## Supervision

In several of my earlier reports I have given in some detail statements of certain phases of my supervisory activities and I have spoken particularly of the use of standardized tests to measure the progress of the children in various subjects. The reading tests described in last year's report have been continued and the children have shown even better results than were reported at that time.

The Sanford Achievement Tests have been used for a period of five years, every child in grades three to eight taking this battery of tests at least once a year, generally in October, and those children who do not appear to have made satisfactory progress in the Spring have been examined a second time.

The scores of these tests are stated in terms of letters A, B, C, D, and E and we expect in the long run to find approximately 7% of the children getting A; 24% B; 38% C; 24% D; and 7% E. Last October the scores for the forty-six children taking the tests in Lyndeboro showed 2% getting A; 18% B; 41% C; 26% D and 13% E. This indicates that the advancement of the Lyndeboro children so far as it is measured by these tests was a little below the average. This was not true, however, at the South School.

# Medical Inspection

The medical inspection last Fall was conducted by Dr. Rice of Wilton with the assistance of the nurse, Mrs. Gilbert. The nurse has completed the examination by weighing and measuring and testing the eyesight of each child. Her illness at the present time makes it impossible to give a more detailed report of the examination and her follow-up plans.

# **High School Tuition**

Perhaps a statement regarding the legal provisions for high school tuition will be of interest. The state law, as amended from time to time by the legislature up to and including the session of 1933, provides that a school district having no high school of its own shall pay the tuition of any child who resides in the district with parents or guardian (or has resided in the district without parent or guardian and attended the district schools for two years or more) at any New Hampshire approved High School or Academy. The District is not liable, however, except under contract, for a rate of tuition higher than the average cost of high school instruction in the state the preceding year. A school district may authorize its School Board, with the approval of the State Board of Education, to make a contract for a higher rate of tuition with any high school or academy in New Hampshire.

In accordance with the vote of the District two years ago a contract has been made with the Wilton High School at the tuition rate of \$80. The state average cost last year was \$78.26. No contract is necessary with Milford High School because the tuition rate is below the average cost.

# Budget For 1934-1935

The budget as presented, is based upon the expectation that the Centre School will continue to be maintained. We have not provided for any change in teachers' salaries, except that we have included a sufficient amount to provide a music teacher next year if the voters so desire. The other items in the budget have been changed very slightly from last

year's figures except that more money will be required for high school tuition.

It is costing approximately \$850 to \$900 to maintain the Centre School this year, partially offset by a reduction of approximately \$250 in the cost of transportation. Judging by the amount of state aid promised for next year we shall eventually receive nearly \$400 from the state to help defray the cost of the Centre School but at present it comes out of our cash balance from last year.

## Trends In Education

The effect of the depression upon the schools has been less severe in New England than in any other part of the country. The primary reason for this is doubtless the fact that the depression itself has been less severe here. However, it may be that New England people are more determined to provide adequate education whatever the cost may be, within reason.

General education of all the people is intimately related to their individual success and happiness and to the prosperity and security of the country. We can accumulate wealth and pass it on from one generation to the next, and to some extent this is true of physical health and mental ability, but we can not bequeath an education to our children. The most we can do is to provide them with the means for an education. Of necessity some economies must be made, but the schools ought to be the last to feel the real pinch of economy and the first to benefit by a returning wave of prosperity.

There is a deeper significance in the present situation than the mere reduction of costs, essential as that may seem to us now. Society is undergoing some fundamental changes and these must be reflected in education if the coming generations are

to receive the proper training for future social conditions. The happiness and prosperity of our successors in their time will depend upon their education and training, not only for their personal living and occupational pursuits, but in their choice of leadership and their co-operation with others in sustaining intelligent and beneficent government.

Amongst all the facts and knowledge that we must pass on to our successors none is more important than the fact of change. In the field of human affairs, as distinguished from fixed physical facts, nothing is changeless and the speed with which changes take place is ever increasing. Only a few generations back our forefathers could pass on to their successors great bodies of knowledge with the assurance that most of it would remain as solid fact. but today we are confronted with the certainty that much of what we teach our children will be changed when they have grown to maturity. Our successors must not only know this fact, but they need to be so trained in habits of thought as to be able to adapt themselves to change and to do their part in cooperation with others in the control of the effects of change.

Necessarily this argument applies more to the field of what we call secondary education than it does to elementary education, for it is at the high school age that youth becomes susceptible to training in methods of though and study, and it is at this time rather than later in life that habits of reasoning can best be developed in place of prejudice. From this point of view many are now saying that our high school programs of study are ill adapted to the needs of our young people. Much study is being given to this by leading educators and laymen, and it appears that we shall shortly be making changes in the direction of substitution of more material in

the social science fields for some of the subjects now given greater emphasis.

In closing, I am again happy to express appreciation for the support and interest in all of my endeavors to be of service in my capacity as Superintendent of Schools.
