As Chairman of the committee appointed by the Selectmen of Pembroke to observe the 200th anniversary of its charter, I wish to give notice that we have ambitious plans for a celebration covering the three days, August 21, 22 and 23. While the actual charter of Pembroke was granted by vote of the Provincial Assembly at Exeter, in November 1759, it is thought wise to have the town celebration in the summer at the time when Old Home Day is ordinarily observed.

The committee, originally appointed, has asked about fifty other people to join in the arrangements and it is hoped that as more people show interest the committee can be further enlarged.

Plans are underway which will make the event memorable for not only the members of the families which have been in Pembroke for a long time but also for the young people and for the newer residents. While we expect many people from outside of town, primarily this celebration is for Pembroke people and it is hoped that the various events will interest them.

I expect to attend the Town Meeting and will be prepared, at that time, to make a statement as to what events are planned. We have suggested to the Selectmen that the appropriation of \$1,000, made last year, be matched by another \$1,000 at the Town Meeting this year. It will be necessary, in order to have a good celebration, to raise at least \$2,000 by personal subscription from people who are interested. This should give us enough money to finance a good celebration.

It is hoped that the beneficial effects of a campaign to sell the "good old town" to its residents will make the occasion an inspiring one.

BI-CENTENNIAL NOTES

DID YOU KNOW THAT IN

- 1728 Suncook granted on May 6 by Massachusetts and on November 1, grantees finished laying out township.
- 1759 Pembroke incorporated.
- 1767 Town records of all roads in Town were burned in a fire at the home of the Town Clerk. At following Town meeting it was voted "that all roads in said parish shall stand as they were formerly laid out and improven."
- 1767 First sawmill on Buck Street laid out before this date. Foster's Mill on Soucook River built before 1765.
- 1774 Borough Road laid out to Chichester line.
- 1779 Voted \$1,000 to build stone abutments at Suncook River Bridge.
- 1798 Act passed making easterly and southerly banks of Suncook River the Pembroke boundary with Allenstown.
- 1804 Chester Turnpike Bridge built this year. Bombay Bridge so-called erected in 1823.
- 1812 Major Caleb Stark, son of Gen. John Stark, operated Pembroke Cotton Factory Co. He sold his interests in 1830.
- 1817 Glass Street laid out from Bridge to Main Street.
- 1823 Academy Road built.
- 1839 Chelmsford Glass Company began operation on Glass Street. This property purchased by Webster Mfg. Co. in 1865.
- 1854 At a special meeting voters turned down an article calling for the purchase of a fire engine.

- 1860 Pembroke Mill built after previous mill burned. Employs 175 females and 80 males and monthly payroll amounts to \$6,000. Webster Mill employs .350 females and 150 males. Monthly payroll is \$12,000. China Mill in Allenstown has 500 female and 300 male workers, with a monthly payroll of \$17,000.
- 1866 Gymnasium or Town Hall purchased for less than \$1,200.
- 1869 Established fire district in Suncook Village and voted \$750 to purchase hose and fixtures to connect with pipes laid in village.
- 1878 Two "Night Police" were appointed.
- 1879 Voted to purchase a steam fire pump and contract with Webster Mfg. Co. to operate it.
- 1883 Voted to purchase 15 street lamps and hire a suitable person to care for them.
- 1885 Selectmen authorized to employ suitable man to wind, regulate and keep in order the town clock.
- 1888 Voted \$1,000 to erect "Suitable monument for soldiers and sailors of late war," to be erected in lot in front of Town Hall.
- 1890 Population of Pembroke set at 3, 172.
- 1893 Electric current from Garvin's Fall Power Company to light stores was turned on .

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday the tenth day of March next, at seven o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after September 1, 1959, on all unpaid poll taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in this Town.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of cemetery lots indicated:

- (a) The Josiah R. Brown Fund of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Richardson-Brown lot in the Buck Street Cemetery.
- (b) The Gustav Ober Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Gustav Ober lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to create a Town Cemetery Fund, to be administered by the Trustees of Trust Funds, the income to be used for the care of Town Cemeteries; and to authorize the selectmen to pay over the proceeds of sales of cemetery lots in 1958, in the amount of \$1,300.00, as well as all proceeds of future sales of cemetery lots, to said Trustees of Trust Funds for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to acquire, by purchase or otherwise, (a) a strip of land sixteen (16) feet in width running between Central Street and Glass Street for an access street to the rear of the Main Street buildings, on the easterly side of said Main Street and (b) the lot of land occupied by the Old Suncook Valley Passenger Depot and the land adjacent thereto on the south for the purpose of constructing the Town shed thereon; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars for this purpose. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and the sum of Four Hundred (\$400.00) Dollars has been included in the Budget.)
- 10. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to change the name of the road commonly called the Sanatorium Road to Center Road.
- 11. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Perley Street at the comer of Chapelle Street near the residence of Roland Young, Jr., and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds therefor. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

- 12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred (\$700.00) Dollars for a Town sewer to be installed on Middle Street, this installation to take place during the year 1959. (This article is neither approved or disapproved by the Budget Committee, but is submitted without recommendation.)
- 13. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

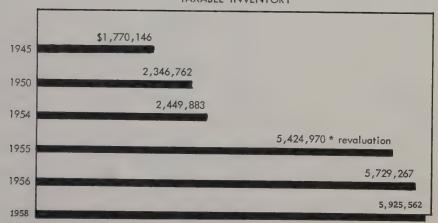

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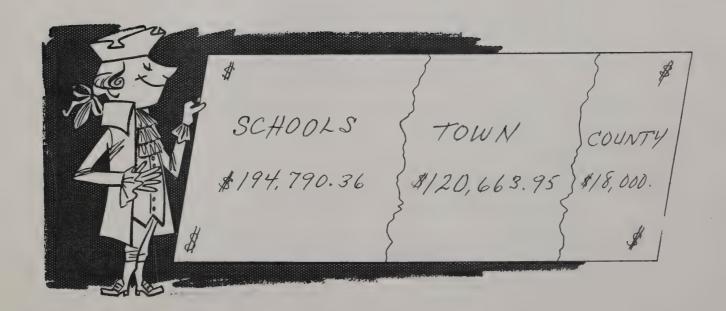

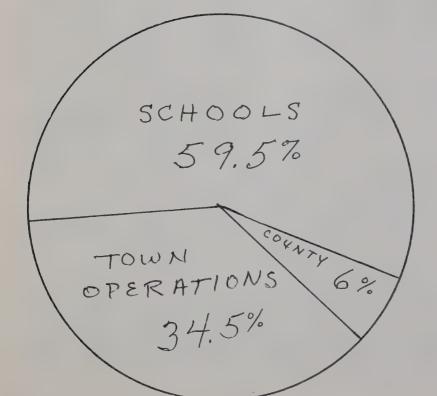

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

Nineteen fifty-eight was considered a good year by your fire department. That is, despite the fact that bell alarms increased by five over nineteen fifty-seven fire losses was kept at a minimum. This was due in small part to the immediate notification of the fire department by you, the citizens.

The year past saw your fire department keeping pace with the best department in the state. Thirteen home radios were purchased by the men to insure quicker response to alarms. Salvage covers were added to each truck as nineteen fifty-nine broke with a series of fires. These covers spread over furniture to stop water damage have saved five times the value in a month.

Early in May, the department embarked on an intensive drill program. The department met twice a week at a drill area donated by Mr. Nat Cling to devote time to fire fighting methods. In August, the department proudly showed its wares at a field day held on Glass street. It is hoped that this will become an annual affair.

Mutual aid coverage was extended northward with an agreement between Concord and Pembroke to exchange help should the need arise. This year, Pembroke was fortunate in not having to call on the services of the Tri-town mutual aid compact. We, on the other hand, responded to neighboring towns. Any one having seen the amount of equipment placed in operation at a fire by the compact can well feel comforted that this service is available to our town.

The department would like to call attention to one of its proudest possessions. The Pembroke Junior Fire Department since its organization some six years ago. This group of young men has not only served their town in the fire field, but have acted in the highest interest as citizens. We in the department are proud of the records made by these young men both in the department and in the field of business of the service of their country.

In any organization, there is always need for replacement. So it is with your department. At the present time, the ladder truck vintage nineteen thirty-five is in need of replacement. The ladders on this vehicle are the original ones purchased for the horse drawn ladder wagon used by our town at the turn of the century. In order to continue to give effective services to you, the townspeople, the department must soon embark on a program of ladder replacement on this piece of equipment.

Once more, it is with pleasure and pride that I thank the members of the department for their service and their support and you, the townspeople for your encouragement and help throughout nineteen fifty-eight.

YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning - brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two hundred dollars

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you – personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

- Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Save yourself much possible difficulty.

Use your town dump.

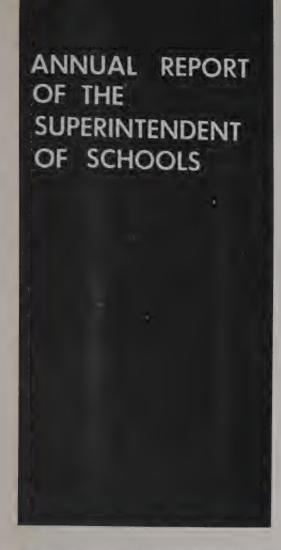

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1959

To the School Board of Pembroke:

In presenting my twelfth annual report of the Pembroke Elementary School may 1 thank you sincerely for a year of school growth in all of its phases and for your understanding and guidance in the needs and hopes of the community. It has been a pleasure to see the development of the school system in the town and with your continued efforts and vision the educational system of Pembroke cannot fail to make its influence felt all over the State.

With the opening of school in September 1958 another section of the plant was put into operation. This new addition is modern and houses five class-rooms and offices. It is in keeping with the style of the rest of the buildings and relieves the congestion so necessary at this time of increasing enrollments.

There are still a few spots in the overall picture that should be studied closely before any decision is made. This is in reference to the number of teachers and the number of children.

Both Grade 7 and Grade 8 will have better than 40 pupils each - Grade 7, 44 and Grade 8, 41. The question at this particular time is whether or not you will hire one or two new teachers. Then, too, there is the question of room space. Grades 7 and 8 are housed on top floor on the northwest side of the original building. The room on the north side is very small as is also the room just below it on the same side of the building. These questions must be solved before a final decision is made in the budget because it will involve a difference of \$3500.

Every year in studying the budget we find two items which make up nearly 80% of the total. These items are Teachers' Salaries and Tuition. At the present time there is nothing in sight to indicate any retrenchment along either front. As long as the number of children increases, just so long will these two items increase. If two teachers are added this year every grade in the school will have two teachers with a total of 16 regulars, a principal, and three part-time music instructors. According to the census taken in September, next year will bring 41 pupils in Grade 8; 44 pupils in Grade 7; 56 pupils in Grade 6; 54 in Grade 5; 60 in Grade 4; 60 in Grade 3; 68 in Grade 2; and 58 pupils in Grade 1.

The figure changes each year during the year since many children enroll after September while some leave. During the past few years more have been admitted after school began than have left. Up to January 15, 1959 this year, there have been an excess of 19 new pupils over those leaving the school. The enrollments may level off in the next few years, but this appears to be wishful thinking especially with the available land in Pembroke upon which to build houses.

If we consider the cost of tuition, we are again faced with increased enrollments and teachers' salaries. Most of our graduates from the elementary school attend Pembroke Academy while a few attend Concord. The law is very specific about students going to high school. If the town or district has a secondary school then children are required to attend until they are 16 years of age. The tuition bill this year 1958 – 59 will be very close to \$51,000 while the tuition bill for 1959 – 60 will be nearly \$59,000. This is an increase of approximately \$8,000.

There were nearly two and one-half million children born in the United States last year. Make no mistake about it, the schools are going to increase in enrollments each year. Some years the increase will be more and some years less. And Pembroke will get her share as long as there are schools. This business of school enrollments is the basic, if not the only reason, why school costs are rising. Do not blame your teachers, or construction, or

tuition, or books and supplies. Schools were established for children. If there were no children, we would need very few schools, teachers, or books and supplies.

Many changes will be made in the development of education in 1959-60 and the next five years following. With these changes Pembroke will have reached a point in its growth when there will be no turning back. I do not believe anyone wants to return to the "good old days." But I do believe that the pattern of our schools in the next few years has its beginning right here and now in the basic development of a cooperative school district. How fast and how far this phase of education will extend will largely depend upon the wise use of the facilities now being developed in the district and the area it will be required to serve.

I hope that the people of Pembroke will hold fast the best minds in the community who believe in education first as the bulwark of American Democracy and elect future boards and future officers of the town with care and caution in order to preserve and augment what the future is foretelling.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF PEMBROKE ACADEMY AND THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS:

I have been Headmaster of Pembroke Academy for a very short time, to date one half year. I wish to report our progress thus far.

I have found the students, teachers, townspeople and Superintendent a most cooperative group. The Trustees have been generous in their purchases of materials, equipment, and books this year; and most understanding of our problems. Material progress has been made towards the goal that has been established for Pembroke Acadmey. Much remains to be done, as I doubt if any school ever reaches the point where one can sit back and say 'we have arrived'.

We have established a guidance system whereby we have one teacher responsible for helping the students in each grade. The guidance teachers are assigned as follows: Freshmen, Mr. Paul Wilkinson; Sophomores, Mr. Redmond Carroll; Juniors, Mr. Henry Munroe; Seniors, Headmaster John Cotton.

Each student is being interviewed and assisted in fulfilling his plans for himself. He receives advice and counsel in choosing his courses for next year.

The Freshmen were given a guidance Battery of tests in early February. The results of these tests will be used by the guidance teachers in their work with the individuals.

As our guidance department increases in number and availability we will be able to drop a rigid form of curricula and adopt a system of majors and minors with a core of required subjects and electives whereby students and parents may choose courses best suited to the plans and abilities of the individual. This is being done in part now.

Reading is receiving special emphasis this year as we have instituted for the Freshmen and Sophomores a very special reading program covering a period of ten weeks. It is our hope that we can raise the reading ability of all students considerably and also teach the transfer of that improved reading ability into better study habits and thereby improved scholarship. The students are working diligently on the project for they can see their progress daily.

We have a music department where we offer vocal and instrumental music and music appreciation. We have a very small number enrolled this year as we were unable to schedule the students last Spring. This year we hope to arrange a schedule which will permit anyone wishing to study music to include it in his program.

Our program of studies for 1959-1960 meets the minimum standards of the State Department of Education and in some cases will exceed them. Our College Preparatory course students will be required to take 18 units, with 20 recommended, for graduation from the College Course. The University of New Hampshire will require two years of Mathematics and two years of a foreign language for entrance after 1960 and our College Preparatory course will take care of this requirement. Three years or more of a foreign language is strongly urged by Dr. James Conant, and also by the University. We offer three years of French.

Athletics plays an important part in the life of any school and ours is no exception. Our Soccer team won the State Championship this year under the coaching of Mr. Henry Munroe. Our Basketball team is among the first sixteen teams, at this writing, with Mr. Redmond Carroll as coach.

Every student has Physical Education twice a week, a fact of which we are very proud. In Physical Education students are taught the skills necessary for various games, how to keep physically fit and how to play together harmoniously.

We are grateful to Mr. Nat Cling who offered us the use of his field free of charge for our Soccer games and for practice sessions. We have a large area near the school which could be levelled, improved and made into an excellent athletic field. This is a project which could be started anytime now.

As we look to the future we would like to plan for better library facilities and a full time librarian. A good library can be the center of the educational process of the school. We are looking ahead to a full time guidance person. We are hoping for a department of Art where each student may have the opportunity of expressing his individuality in line form and color in painting, drawing, ceramics, etc.

Above all we are trying to keep good teachers on our staff; for a school is only as good as its teachers. Our teachers are enthusiastic and interested in their work. Four of them are taking extension courses this Winter and others are planning Summer extension work. All are planning their class work so that individual differences are cared for and offering each student an opportunity of working at his capacity.

We have added two more teachers to our staff thus making it possible to reduce the teaching load and give more individual attention in the classes.

Our enrollment has remained fairly steady this year. Our students are enrolled from the following towns:

Twenty-two have left and twelve have been added so that at present our enfollment is 239. It is our desire to so conduct our school that all the students from these towns will want to attend Pembroke Academy. It will mean that more class room space will be needed but we are anticipating that fact.

The trustees have improved our safety facilities by the addition of a rear exit door on the first floor and improved fire escape facilities. We can now clear the building in approximately one minute.

It has been a distinct pleasure to serve as Headmaster of Pembroke Academy.

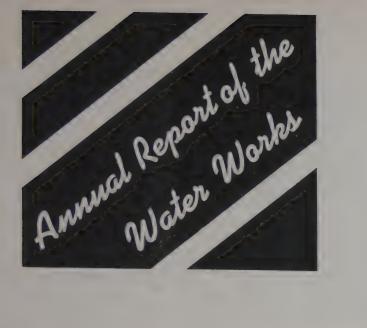

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

During the past year the water department deemed it necessary to trade it's old tractor and backhoe. This piece of equipment was well worn although it had paid itself many times over. The new tractor and backhoe was put out to bid and bought from the Milton Garage, the lowest bidder of four concerns giving prices. The new piece of equipment is much larger and was bought with a snow bucket enabling the water department to assist the town with the problem of snow removal. This is much help to the town as well as the water department, and a big saving has been realized.

A complete census of all homes and water takers was made by the department during the past year. The cost of this survey was \$300, but brought in nearly \$1,500.00 yearly revenue to the department. The superintendent will constantly make spot checks wherever needed and it is expected a census report will be taken every three years.

The water has been treated for the past year with a solution of soda ash as recommended by an engineer of the staff of the State Board of Health. This is being done to eliminate the acidity action of the water, thus preventing harm to piping, fixtures, etc.

A new 6" cast iron cement lined water main 543 feet in length was installed on Oak Street in Allenstown, replacing a 1 inch galvanized pipe installed many years ago and unable to furnish needed water due to several new homes having been built on this street. This new line extends southerly from Granite Street to Al's Avenue and at this point a hydrant was installed.

The department has realized a saving in their payroll and find this due mainly to the following reasons. First, the removal of all wooden mains from the system. Second, modern equipment has been added every year wherever the budget would allow. Third, the department employs but two regular men. Another is paid only part time and his wages are earned in tending to the soda ash maintenance and the pumping station and equipment.

Many other improvements have been made during the past year. New hydrants were installed on Rowe Avenue, and Academy Road. New services were made for new homes. Old services that needed replacing were taken care of.

The department meets monthly and would consider any suggestions for the betterment of this water system. Meetings are held during the second week of the month at the department's building on North Main Street.
