

# REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING FEBRUARY 15, 1896.

The school board of Sullivan present to its citizens a report of the condition of the schools the past year. There have been twenty-one weeks in each of the five divisions, excepting No. 1, which had twenty-three to make up a deficiency in 1894, by reason of the illness of the teacher at that time, amounting to 107 weeks. There have been two terms in each of the several divisions. We think our schools the past year will compare favorably with former years; there have been no failures to report; while some of the schools have been more successful than others, we believe all of our teachers have endeavored to do their duty faithfully. We do not, and must not, expect perfection in teachers; some are better adapted for teaching than others. Teachers need encouragement from parents, and all that take an interest in education, and we are pleased to see an increased interest in the welfare of our schools. We noticed the kindest and best feelings between teacher and scholars in all of the schools, which is one of the means for a successful school. We would not sacrifice good discipline to make friends with all, but rather that love and friendship should aid in governing a school. In some of the schools we noticed a lack of order, and in some instances too much readi-

ness on the part of the teacher to assist the scholars in their recitations, which we hope and trust will be done away with. Let the scholar be taught to rely upon himself or herself in reciting, and they will be very much more likely to remember the lesson. We speak of this not in a spirit of criticism, but as worthy of thought. There has been a greater expenditure for books and supplies than some years, by reason of changing of the reading book; the readers having been in the schools the past five years, your committee thought it advisable to have a change. In the expenditure for books and supplies we have endeavored to economize as much as was for the interest of the schools; and we believe that the teachers have been careful and judicious in the use of supplies furnished them. When we consider that it cost us less than ninety cents per scholar for a year, it seems that it might not impoverish us to a very great extent. If we send our children to school, it naturally follows that they must have books and other supplies, if we expect them to make the greatest improvement. We find by the registers, the number of visits of parents and others to be 403, exclusive of the school board.

In conclusion, we would thank all who have assisted in the school work the past year, trusting that the people of Sullivan will continue to take a lively interest in the education of the young, and by a united effort advance the standard of our common schools.

# THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the town of Sullivan, in the county of Cheshire, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Sullivan, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1.—To choose all necessary town officers

for the year ensuing.

ART. 2.—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year.

ART. 3.—To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of schools.

ART. 4.—To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highway and bridges.

ART. 5.—To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support

of the public library.

ART. 6.—To see if the town will vote to discount a certain per cent. on all taxes paid on or before June 15, 1896; if so, how much.

ART. 7.—To see if the town will vote to purchase a new road machine and raise money for the same or

take any action relating thereto.

ART. 8.—To see if the town will vote to pay for digging the graves, going with the hearse, and a certain sum of money for coffins for deceased persons of the town.

ART. 9.—To here the report of agents, auditors or committee heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

ART. 10.—To transact all other business that may

come legally before said meeting.
