

To the inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Barnstead Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the Eleventh (11th) day of March, next at 7:00 a.m. of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

To vote by official ballot on amendments to the Barnstead Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Barnstead Planning Board, as follows:

1. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #1, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To revise Article 2, Definitions. To change "Public Boundary Line" to "Reference Line".

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #2, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To add Article 2, Definitions. "Business- Activities of buying and selling; trade; commercial dealings, commercial enterprise industrial establishment".

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #3, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To add to Article 4-2: Other lot requirements of the Zoning Ordinance "Rear setback thirty (30) feet from the rear lot line."

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #4, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To make substantial revisions to Article 9 of the Zoning Ordinance which defines the functions of the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

5. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #5, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To revise Article 12-12 of the Zoning Ordinance to allow unused building permits to be put back into the annual allocation or surplus.

6. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #6, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To revise Article 14 of the Zoning Ordinance to add permitted and non-permitted uses in Suburban Districts to Table 1 permitted uses.

7. Are you in favor of the adoption of question # 7, amending the Barnstead Code of Building Regulations, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To change Section 2-2.05 of the Barnstead Code of Building Regulations to reduce the size of exempt structures from 250 square feet to 200 square feet as adopted by the International Building Code 2003.

The second session for the purpose of discussing and voting upon the remaining articles of the Town Warrant shall be held on Saturday, March 15th, 2008, at 9:00 a.m. at the Barnstead Elementary School.

- 3. To hear the Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Million Three Hundred Thirty Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy Two Dollars (\$3,330,972) gross budget, for the construction and original equipping of a Town Municipal Building, and to authorize the issuance of not more than Three Million Three Hundred Thirty Thousand Nine Hundred Seventy Two Dollars (\$3,330,972) of bonds or notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA 33) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest and other terms thereon. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7 III. (2/3 ballot vote required). This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to organize the Town of Barnstead Fire Department in accordance with RSA 154:1, I(b), which provides that the Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Fire Chief and further provides that firefighters shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, upon the recommendation of the Fire Chief. In accordance with RSA 154:1, IV, this change, if approved, shall not take effect until one year following approval of this Article. (Recommended by the Selectmen).
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) for the purpose of purchasing a modular/ trailer to provide housing for the full-time operations of the Barnstead Fire-Rescue. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by the Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$100,000 to furnish adequate temporary housing for the municipal employees of Barnstead Fire Rescue as required by the State Fire Marshall and the town's insurance company. This warrant article is submitted as a special warrant article pursuant to RSA 32:3 and RSA 32:10. (Submitted by Petition) (Not Recommended by Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Nine Thousand Two Hundred Seventy Nine Dollars (\$39,279.00) for the second year's payment of the lease for the 6 Wheel Highway Dump Trucks. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the purpose of repairing Welch Road Bridge and to authorize the withdrawal of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) from the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for the purpose of completing the pole barn at the Highway Department to house the Highway Vehicles and to authorize the withdrawal of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) from the Highway Garage Capital Reserve Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of Seventy Three Thousand Six Hundred Thirty Dollars (73,630.00) for the purpose of making necessary repairs to the Town Grader and to authorize the withdrawal of Seventy Three Thousand Six Hundred Thirty Dollars (\$73,630.00) from the Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (Recommended by the Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for milfoil treatment of Suncook River and for the divers in Barnstead waters. This will be a non-lapsing article and will not lapse until December 31, 2013. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000.00) for the purpose of replacing the existing computer server and workstations at the Police Department. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).

- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be placed in the Parks & Recreation Building Capital Reserve Fund previously established. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be placed in the Historical Society Building Capital Reserve Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be placed in the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) to be placed in the Highway Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be placed in the Library Computer Support Expendable Trust Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by the Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) to be placed in the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) to be placed in the Highway Garage Capital Reserve Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).

- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to be placed in the Town Hall Computer Expendable Trust Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) to be placed in the Emergency Management Expendable Trust Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,691.40 to repay the cost of legal fees incurred by Barnstead Fire Rescue, Inc. an expenditure made necessary to determine the validity of the contract between that entity and the Town. (Submitted by Petition) (Not Recommended by Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to add the Selectmen as agents to expend to the Milfoil Prevention Capital Reserve, a Non-Capital Reserve Fund established in 2006.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue Snackerty Road (so-called) leading from the property of Gordon Preston at Map 16 Lot 50, North Barnstead Road, to the property of Marion Henderson at Map 12 Lot 51, Holmes Road and the Strafford town line. The property along Snackerty Road is owned by three abutters, all of which have sent letters requesting the discontinuance and waiving damages as a result of this warrant article.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey the property at tax Map 040 Lot 281, Newport Drive, to Bronson F Cooke III and Deborah A. Peloquin-Cooke, to be merged with Bronson and Deborah Cooke's property at Map 040 Lot 282. Bronson and Deborah Cooke have paid all taxes, interest, costs and expenses owed to the Town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in August, 2001. (Recommended by Selectmen)
- 27 To see if the Town will vote to amend the Barnstead Water Rights & Local Self-Government Ordinance as follows (language in boldface added);

BARNSTEAD WATER RIGHTS & LOCAL SELF-GOVERNMENT ORDINANCE

Section 1. Name. The name of this Ordinance shall be the "Barnstead Water Rights and Local Self-Government Ordinance."

Section 2. Preamble and Purpose. We the People of the Town of Barnstead declare that water is essential for life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness – both for people and for the ecological systems, which give life to all species.

We the People of the Town of Barnstead declare that we have the duty to safeguard the water both on and beneath the Earth's surface, and in the process, safeguard the rights of people within the community of Barnstead, and the rights of the ecosystems of which Barnstead is a part.

We the people of Barnstead declare that all of our water is held in the public trust as a common resource to be used for the benefit of Barnstead residents and of the natural ecosystems of which they are a part. We believe that the corporatization of water supplies in this community – placing the control of water in the hands of a corporate few, rather than the community – would constitute tyranny and usurpation; and that we are therefore duty bound, under the New Hampshire Constitution, to oppose such tyranny and usurpation. That same duty requires us to recognize that two centuries' worth of governmental conferral of constitutional powers upon corporations has deprived people of the authority to govern their own communities, and requires us to take affirmative steps to remedy that usurpation of governing power.

Section 3. Authority. This Ordinance is adopted and enacted pursuant to the inherent, inalienable, and fundamental right of the citizens of the Town of Barnstead to self-government and under authority granted to the people of the Town by all relevant state and federal laws including, but not limited to the following:

Part First, Article 10 of the New Hampshire Constitution, which declares that government is instituted for the common benefit, protection and security of the whole community, and not for the private interest of any class of men;

Part First, Article 1 of the New Hampshire Constitution, which declares that government is founded upon the consent of the people and insti-

tuted for the common good;

The spirit of Part Second, Article 5 and Part Second, Article 83 of the New Hampshire Constitution, which subordinate corporations to the body politic;

NH RSA 31:39 I (a), (l) and III which, under powers and duties of Towns, permits bylaws for the care, protection, preservation of the commons; the ordering of their prudential affairs; and the enforcement of such bylaws by suitable penalties.

The Declaration of Independence, which declares that governments are instituted to secure people's rights, and that government derives its just powers from the consent of the governed;

The General Comment of the United Nations Covenant on Economic, Social, and Cultural Rights, which declares that "the human right to drinking water is fundamental to life and health. Sufficient and safe drinking water is a precondition to the realization of human rights."

Section 4. Statement of Law. No corporation or syndicate shall engage in water withdrawals in the Town of Barnstead. The term "corporation" means any corporation organized under the laws of any state of the United States or any country. The term "syndicate" includes any limited partnership, limited liability partnership, business trust, or Limited Liability Company organized under the laws of any state of the United States or any country. The term "engage" shall include, but not be limited to, the physical extraction of water, and the buying and/or selling of water extracted within the Town of Barnstead.

Section 5. Statement of Law. No corporation doing business within the Town of Barnstead shall be recognized as a "person" under the United States or New Hampshire Constitutions, or laws of the United States or New Hampshire, nor shall the corporation be afforded the protections of the Contracts Clause or Commerce Clause of the United States Constitution, or similar provisions found within the New Hampshire Constitution, within the Town of Barnstead.

Section 5.1. Rights. All residents of the Town of Barnstead possess a fundamental and inalienable right to access, use, consume, and preserve water drawn from the sustainable natural water cycles that provide water necessary to sustain life within the Town. Natural communities and ecosystems possess inalienable and fundamental rights to exist and flourish within the Town of Barnstead. Ecosys-

tems shall include, but not be limited to, wetlands, streams, rivers, aquifers, and other water systems.

Section 6. Exceptions. The people of the Town of Barnstead hereby allow the following exceptions to the Statement of Law contained within §4 of this Ordinance:

- (1) Municipal authorities established under the laws of the State of New Hampshire engaged in water withdrawals providing water only to residential and commercial users within the Town of Barnstead;
- (2) Nonprofit educational and charitable corporations organized under state non-profit corporation law, and qualifying under §501(c)(3) of the federal Tax Code, which do not sell water withdrawn within the Town of Barnstead outside of the Town of Barnstead:
- (3) Utility corporations operating under valid and express contractual provisions in agreements entered into between the Town of Barnstead and those utility corporations, for the provision of service within the Town of Barnstead;
- (4) Corporations operating under valid and express contractual provisions in agreements entered into between residents of the Town of Barnstead and those corporations, when the withdrawn water is used solely for on-site residential, household, agricultural, or commercial facilities within the Town of Barnstead, as long as such commercial facilities do not withdraw water for sale outside of the Town of Barnstead for sale outside of the Town.

Section 7. Enforcement. Any corporation planning to engage in water withdrawals within the Town of Barnstead must notify the Town of such activity at least sixty (60) days prior to engaging in water withdrawals. Such notification shall contain a claim to one of the exemptions listed in Section 6 of this Ordinance. Any violation of this Ordinance shall be considered a criminal summary offense, and will subject the Directors of the noncompliant corporation to joint and several liability with the corporation itself.

The Board of Selectmen of the Town of Barnstead authorizes a fine of up to \$1,000.00 per violation. Each act of water withdrawal [and each day that water is withdrawn] shall be considered a separate violation of

this Ordinance. The Board of Selectmen of the Town of Barnstead may also file an action in equity in the Belknap County Superior Court or any other Court of competent jurisdiction to abate any violation defined in Section 4 of this Ordinance. If the Selectmen of the Town of Barnstead fail to bring an action to enforce this Ordinance, any resident of the Town has standing in front of the Court for enforcement.

Section 7.1. Civil Rights: Any person acting under the authority of a permit issued by the Department of Environmental Services, any corporation operating under a State charter or certificate of authority to do business, or any director, officer, owner, or manager of a corporation operating under a State charter or certificate of authority to do business, who deprives any Town resident, natural community, or ecosystem of any rights, privileges, or immunities secured by this Warrant Article, the New Hampshire Constitution, the United States Constitution, or other laws, shall be liable to the party injured and shall be responsible for payment of compensatory and punitive damages and all costs of litigation to satisfy that liability, including, without limitation, expert and attorney's fees. Compensatory and punitive damages paid to remedy the violation of the rights of natural communities and ecosystems shall be paid to the Town of Barnstead for restoration of those natural communities and ecosystems.

Section 7.2. Environmental Protection: It shall be unlawful for any corporation or its directors, officers, owners, or managers to interfere with the rights of natural communities and ecosystems to exist and flourish, or to cause damage to those natural communities and ecosystems. The Town of Barnstead, along with any resident of the Town, shall have standing to seek declaratory, injunctive, compensatory, and punitive relief for damages caused to natural communities and ecosystems within the Town, regardless of the relation of those natural communities and ecosystems to Town residents or the Town itself. Town residents, natural communities, and ecosystems shall be considered to be "persons" for purposes of the enforcement of the civil rights of those residents, natural communities, and ecosystems.

Section 7.3. Civil Rights Enforcement: Any Town resident shall have standing and authority to bring an action under this Warrant Article's civil rights provisions, or under state and federal civil rights laws, for violations of the rights of natural communities, ecosystems, and Town residents, as recognized by this Warrant Article.

Section 7.4. Town Action Against Preemption. The foundation for

the making and adoption of this law is the people's fundamental and inalienable right to govern themselves, and thereby secure rights to life, liberty, property, and pursuit of happiness. Any attempts to use county, state, or federal levels of government – judicial, legislative, or executive - to preempt, amend, alter, or overturn this Warrant Article or parts of this Warrant Article, or to intimidate the people of the Town of Barnstead or their elected officials, may require the Board of Selectmen to hold public meetings that explore the adoption of other measures that expand local control and the ability of residents to protect their fundamental and inalienable right to self-government. Such consideration may include actions to separate the municipality from the other levels of government used to preempt, amend, alter, or overturn the provisions of this Warrant Article or other levels of government used to intimidate the people of Barnstead or their elected officials.

Section 7.5. Strict Liability. Persons using corporations to engage in water withdrawal in a neighboring municipality shall be strictly liable for all harms caused to the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of Barnstead from those activities, and for all harms caused to ecosystems and natural communities within Barnstead.

Section 7.6. Liability. No permit, license, privilege or charter issued by any State or federal Regulatory Agency, Commission or Board to any person or any corporation operating under a State charter, or any director, officer, owner, or manager of a corporation operating under a State charter, which would violate the provisions of this Warrant Article or deprive any Barnstead resident, natural community, or ecosystem of any rights, privileges, or immunities secured by this Warrant Article, the New Hampshire Constitution, the United States Constitution, or other laws, shall be deemed valid within the Town of Barnstead. Additionally, any employee, agent or representative of any State or federal Regulatory Agency, Commission or Board who issues a permit, license, privilege or charter to any person or any corporation operating under a State charter, or any director, officer, owner, or manager of a corporation operating under a State charter, which would violate the provisions of this Warrant Article or deprive any resident, natural community, or ecosystem of any rights, privileges, or immunities secured by this Warrant Article, the New Hampshire Constitution, the United States Constitution, or other laws, shall be liable to the party injured and shall be responsible for payment of compensatory and punitive damages and all costs of litigation, includ-

ing, without limitation, expert and attorney's fees. Compensatory and punitive damages paid to remedy the violation of the rights of natural communities and ecosystems shall be paid to the Town of Barnstead for restoration of those natural communities and ecosystems.

Section 7.7. Future Lost Profits. Within the Town of Barnstead, corporate claims to "future lost profits" shall not be considered property interests under the law, and thus, shall not be recoverable by corporations seeking those damages.

Section 8. Severability. The provisions of this Ordinance are severable, and if any section, clause, sentence, part, or provision thereof shall be held illegal, invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision of the court shall not affect, impair, or invalidate any of the remaining sections, clauses, sentences, parts or provisions of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared to be the intent of the people of Barnstead that this Ordinance would have been adopted if such illegal, invalid, or unconstitutional section, clause, sentence, part, or provision had not been included herein.

Section 9. Effect. This Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon its enactment. (Submitted by Petition).

 To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our State Representatives, our State Senator and our Governor;

Resolved: We the citizens of Barnstead, New Hampshire believe in a New Hampshire that is just and fair. The property tax has become unjust and unfair. State leaders who take a pledge for no new kinds of taxes perpetuate higher and higher property taxes. We call on our State Representatives, our State Senator and our Governor to reject the "Pledge", have an open discussion covering all options and adopt a revenue system that is fair and just, and lowers property taxes without increasing the overall tax burden.

29. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Town of Barnstead Fire Department Study Committee as established by the 2006 Town Meeting and authorize the appointment of members to said committee pursuant to the method set forth at the 2006 Town Meeting. (Submitted by Petition)

- 30. To see if the Town will vote in favor of authorizing the Selectmen to appoint a committee to research the potential for creation of a Town owned Development Company, the purpose of which is to support, nurture and assist existing and new businesses to develop their businesses in Barnstead an stay in Barnstead, with the assistance from new and existing Town resources, with the Town and its tax base reaping the benefits from a tax positive environment.
- 31. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the Budget Committee's recommended sum of \$3,138,596.00 for general municipal operations. The Selectmen recommend \$3,338,298.00. This article does not include appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately.
- 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.





TAX RATE COMPARISON FIVE YEARS 2003-2007



Selectmen's Report

Shortly after the 2007 Annual Meeting, Barnstead experienced the worst flooding in town since the hurricane floods of the 1930's. Twenty-four hours of heavy rains coupled with the run off from melting snow pack caused the rivers and streams to overflow their banks resulting in extensive damage to town roads. The Welch Road Bridge was destroyed, The Hannah Nutter Bridge was damaged, and sections of Gray Road, Garland Road, North Barnstead Road, and Holmes Road were severely damaged. A state of emergency was declared by the Board of Selectmen with all town departments and the school responded to aid and assist.

The subsequent road repairs were largely paid for by FEMA (75%), but we did have to use funds budgeted for non-emergency management areas to pay for the additional gravel, paving and culverts. The Board is requesting that an increased amount be placed in the Emergency Management Expendable Trust Fund for future contingencies.

An unfortunate situation stemmed from the 2006 request by the Board of Selectmen (BOS) for the documentation of fire department payments and purchases made by Barnstead Fire Rescue Incorporated (BFRI). opinion obtained by the BOS raised an issue of the legality of the contract between the Town and BFRI. The BOS chose to withhold further payments to the Corporation until the status of the contract could be resolved. BFRI brought suit against the BOS and the BOS reacted with a defense. Legal negotiations persisted through the early half of 2007 and BOS was directed by the Court to resume payments to BFRI. An offer of outside mediation was presented to BFRI in June, but this was rejected by BFRI and the suit went to trial. The final results were that the contract with BFRI was legal, and that it could be re-negotiated. It was established that BFRI was not a private fire fighting organization and that the Town was responsible for all operational aspects of the fire department. The Town was found not to have engaged in any illegal activity in its actions with BFRI and neither party was entitled to recover litigation expenses from the other.

The BOS is committed to the establishment and maintenance of a municipal fire department. To those ends, both a full-time fire chief and new living quarters for the full-time staff are proposed for consideration at the 2008 Annual Meeting.

The BOS is enthusiastic over the proposal before the 2008 Annual Meeting for a new municipal/police building. The 1847 town hall has served us well, but really does not permit us to provide the level of services needed and desired by our community. Likewise, the police building was adequate for

a growing police force, but cannot meet the demands of current and future staff levels.

Also, this year the BOS has ordered a complete independent audit of all town departments. The intent of this audit is to insure that we have all the proper financial safeguards in place, and that our departments are operating as efficiently as possible. The final report should be complete by late spring of 2008.

The BOS has sincerely tried to assure that all necessary town services have been and will be provided within the limits of the budget. Your comments and opinions on our activities are appreciated and all are welcome to attend our weekly Tuesday night meetings.

The current town tax rate is \$18.40 per thousand, with the Town portion being \$3.81 which supports the town hall, police, fire, ambulance, highway, welfare, parks and recreation, building inspector, conservation, health officer, library, boards and committees.

Assessor's Report

After completing a sales ratio study the Town decided it was NOT necessary to update all property values for the 2007 tax year. The 2007 assessments are the same as 2006 unless a property had improvements or an error was corrected. The Town will continue to analyze assessment to sale prices annually. The assessments will be adjusted accordingly, even if the analysis shows that the values have decreased.

In keeping with the State's requirements that towns review their property record data once every five years, the Town has contracted the firm of Brett S. Purvis & Associates to perform a review of 20% of the Town on an annual basis. In 2007 town tax maps 23 thru 35 were reviewed for accuracy. All property owners should check their property record cards annually for data accuracy.

Any taxpayer that feels their property's equalized assessment does not reflect the market value of the property may file an abatement by March 1, 2008. Applications are available in the Selectmen's office or online at www. nh.gov/btla.

The deadline for filing all exemptions and tax credit applications is April 15 for the tax year applied. These include elderly and blind exemptions as well as veteran's tax credits. If you feel you qualify for any of these as of April 1, 2008, stop by the Selectmen's office to fill out an application.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S COMMUNICATION OF CONTROL DEFICIENCIES AND OTHER MATTERS

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Barnstead, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of Town of Barnstead as of and for the year ended December 31, 2007, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Town's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Town of Barnstead's internal control.

A control deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect misstatements on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses.

In connection with our consideration of Town of Barnstead's internal control as described above, we are pleased by the Town's commitment to improving operations. While still in the process of developing office and accounting procedures, we generally noted improvement in the quality of records. For the coming year, we encourage the development and use of a formal operating plan to focus the attention of staff, management and the govern-

ing board on priorities as well as long-range goals and objectives. We further encourage the continued use of contract accounting personnel to assist with the development of procedures and with the training of staff. These accounting functions are critical to maintaining the accuracy of Town records and should continue until such time that town personnel can routinely balance accounts on their own and management is comfortable over-seeing these functions. In light of evolving accounting standards and widening sophistication of informational needs, we also encourage the community to participate in educational programs provided by the State and other organizations whenever they are made available. Areas of opportunity for further consideration include:

- Review of public welfare functions to minimize discrimination risk, to
 expand alternate service opportunities, to assure compliance with state
 regulations, to maintain confidentiality, to assure proper documentation of approved transactions and to provide control that liens are
 recorded in a timely manner when applicable.
- Efficiency of treasury information available with on-line banking

INTRODUCTION:

The Barnstead Fire Study Committee (Committee) was first established at the 2006 Barnstead Town Meeting, and charged with studying the current system used to provide fire and rescue services to the Town of Barnstead. An impending lawsuit between the Board of Selectmen (BOS) and Barnstead Fire Rescue, Inc. (BFR, Inc) impeded the Committee from fulfilling its obligations. While the Committee was able to provide cursory recommendations it was obvious that the complexity of the situation would require additional time to present long-term solutions. Voters at the 2007 Town Meeting reauthorized the Committee to continue its assessment, and provide recommendations to improve emergency services.

Although conditions changed during the year, the Committee essentially continued to operate under our original mission statement as follows:

To obtain available information necessary to assess current organizations that provide administrative and management of fire protection services to the Town of Barnstead with emphasis on evaluating the effectiveness of the organizational structure, its relationship with the BOS, and identifying contractual and fiduciary conflicts between the Town and service providers; submit a report at Town Meeting providing recommendations by the Committee to mitigate obstacles affecting near-term stability of fire protection services while providing options for future consolidation and management of fire protection.

COMMITTEE ACTIONS:

As the Committee entered the second year of study, members continued to meet monthly, but we soon became aware that progress was unlikely until the validity of the contract was determined. Since the trial would not be heard in Superior Court until late spring the Committee forged ahead. Their activities could be characterized as those actions taken prior to the trial and actions taken after the decision was handed down by the court. The decision will be addressed later in the report.

Our activities prior to the decision were one of contingency. The Committee facilitated discussions between the BOS and BFR, Inc in an attempt to reach an agreement and avert costly legal fees by the parties and ultimately borne

by the taxpayers. When the desired goal was not achieved, the Committee initiated discussions with the BOS to define their responsibility to provide continued service if the contract was found to be invalid. Finally, the Committee explored alternative short-term options available to the Town if the contract was invalid.

In June 2007 the Superior Court handed down a verdict that ruled the contract between the Town and BFR, Inc was valid. Once the ruling was issued, the Committee turned its attention to a process that would merge the parties into a full time town fire department. In 1995 the BOS, serving at that time, contracted with Municipal Resources, Inc. to analyze the existing fire structure and provide a plan to consolidate resources to a single agency. Members of the Committee presented several recommendations last year that were consistent with the plan. Further implementation of the plan was dependent on all parties committing to the merger. At this time, we have a general consensus but no formal agreement from BOS and BFR, Inc to move forward with the merger and take the next step implementing other recommendations contained in the plan.

Members of the Committee are frustrated with the inability to resolve this issue. Some months ago the Committee requested the BOS submit a plan with a defined schedule to complete the steps necessary to complete the transition. To date, the Committee has yet to receive any semblance of a plan from BOS; which further emphasizes their inability to manage fire services. Some members also expressed concern that BFR, Inc has hedged on disposition of property and equipment.

In the end members of the Committee are committed to the merger recommended last year. We have expressed doubts that meaningful progress can be made under the current atmosphere of animosity and distrust fomented by the BOS. Members have discussed the viability of the Committee, and its ability to complete the charges established at Town Meeting. A majority of the members believe the Committee should be reauthorized for another year to complete the efforts started in 2006 even if it requires the Committee to develop an independent merger plan that would be presented at Town Meeting for voters' consideration.

LEGAL REVIEW:

The 1996 Barnstead Board of Selectmen entered into a contractual agree-

ment with BFR, Inc. Each side was represented by attorneys who agreed that the contract met the applicable legal requirements.

The contract provides for annual negotiating between the Board of Selectmen and BFR, Inc. and would remain in effect as long as the funding was approved by each annual Town Meeting for the contract.

During the early part of 2006 the Selectmen took the position the contract was not valid and refused to pay BFR, Inc.'s quarterly invoices as set forth in the contract until a change in the billing and reporting by BFR, Inc. was implemented to the Selectmen's satisfaction. In June 2006, BFR, Inc. filed a lawsuit requesting (1) an order requiring the Selectmen to make quarterly payments until the court ruled whether the contract was valid and (2) a decision that the contract was valid.

In June 2006, the court ordered the Selectmen to continue to pay the quarterly invoices until the contract validity could be decided.

In June 2007, after a trial, the court ruled that the BFR, Inc. contract was valid. The court found that BFR, Inc was not a private fire company as claimed by the Selectmen, but was a management company that leases property and equipment to the town and manages the finances for maintenance and operation of the fire and rescue service. This does not include any pay for fire/rescue service personnel, all of whom are town employees paid directly by the town. The court also disagreed with the Selectmen's position that the contract and BFR Inc.'s operation prevented the Selectmen from exercising the financial oversight required by law.

BFR, Inc. has reported that its legal fees were over \$48,000. The Selectmen have declined repeated requests to disclose the town's legal fees for this matter.

One issue that the Committee feels is still not clearly understood is the financial operation of BFR, Inc. The Selectmen have repeatedly stated that they feel they should have more review and approval authority over BFR, Inc.'s "spending of Town money". However, The Town contracts annually with BFR, Inc. to provide management services at a fee approved at town meeting. This is similar to contracting annually with First Student to provide school bus services. Once the funds are paid to BFR, Inc. for the services, it is no longer "Town money".

COMPOSITE OF OPINIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Committee as a whole supports the addressing of the housing issue of full time staff as the top priority. The Committee further recommends a warrant article with an adequate appropriation for purchasing or constructing acceptable temporary housing which meets standard building codes and life safety codes be inserted in this years warrant and supported by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

Although the Committee supports the hiring of a full time Fire Chief to replace the current method of a part time chief, the committee was divided on when this position should be filled. Some felt it should done immediately and the individual charged with developing and executing the plan to transition from a member-operated fire company to a full municipal department, while others felt the current issues should be resolved and a long range plan should be developed and implemented prior to advertising and filling the full-time Chief's position. Despite the differing opinions on the timing for hiring the full-time Chief, the Committee believed the expansion of the position to full time was justified due to the amount of record keeping, the number of incidents, the complexity of events that happen, and the lack of manpower during the daytime hours.

In the opinion of the Committee the development of a long-range plan for the Town fire service has been the most difficult matter. The Committee further believes that getting Town officials to agree to develop a plan is a very important matter and is a vital part of any transition. We believe prior to any change in the current status of the fire service a formal well thought out long range plan which includes addressing building and housing issues, equipment purchase and replacement, staffing, and management must be developed and implemented.

The current contract between the Town of Barnstead and Barnstead Fire - Rescue Inc. which the Belknap Superior Court ruled a legal document should be reviewed, re-negotiated, and amended as necessary on an annual basis as provided for in the terms of the contract. The amending of this document can be the basis to begin transfer of ownership of property between the Town and BFRI or replacement of such property. It also can serve to update the document to meet the challenges of today. This document has not been

revisited or modified since its inception.

The Committee felt very frustrated during this year on several fronts. Due to the court case animosity ran high which created a difficult format within which not much got accomplished. On both sides of the issue distrust and stubbornness or shall we say an unwillingness to modify ones position in favor of considering other options was evident.

Only late in the committee's work did we begin to see a willingness to compromise from the BOS, the representatives of BFRI, or the FIRE DEPT. It was the goal and desire when we the committee asked to be reappointed at the 2007 Town Meeting that we would be able to get the parties to move forward and a constructive plan be developed that would begin to heal hard feelings and move the fire service into a municipal fire dept. in an orderly and constructive manner. We were not able to accomplish that goal much to our dismay. We still believe all parties must work together in constructive dialog and planning to make a smooth transition to a different form of fire service management with all parties willing to support the plan.

Annual Report of the Fire Chief

Barnstead Fire-Rescue had another very busy year responding to fires, medical emergencies, motor vehicle accidents and calls for service to the residents and citizens of the Town of Barnstead. As I write this report, members are working hard to finish the installation of equipment on the new 2007 HME Heavy Rescue Truck that the Town purchased. This new rescue will provide better storage of the rescue tools and hazmat equipment and will allow breathing apparatus to be filled more efficiently and safer. The department appreciated the support of the Town residents and taxpayers in making the purchase of this truck possible.

The Department continues to investigate opportunities to find alternate funding to lessen the dependence on property tax revenue for equipment purchasing. In 2007, Barnstead Fire-Rescue was awarded a "Fire Act Grant" from the Department of Homeland Security for the purchase of new Personal Protective Clothing for every member. This grant was for \$104,332.00 with a Town match share of \$5216.00. The Department has just received notification that we have been awarded a 2007 Volunteer Fire Assistance Fund grant for the purchase of a Class "A" Foam proportioner for the Tank Truck. This will allow more efficient extinguishment of both forest fires and building fires whenever the Tanker is used. This increases our foam capability to all our engines and tank truck. This grant is a 50/50 grant in the amount of \$4000.00 with the Town's share being \$2000.00.

The Department has been providing full-time Fire/EMS since 1997 when we made the change from contract ambulance. When this operation was proposed it was not known if it would prove to be the right solution. We have just completed our 10th year of operation and I believe we have proven the benefit that the Town receives by having Full-Time Fire/EMS is cost effective.

The members of the Department have for several years worked with the Boards of Sclectmen and Town committee's to study the building needs of the Town of Barnstead. In 1998, the Town had a risk audit conducted by Compensation Funds of New Hampshire, the Town's Workers Comp Insurance provider who found Life Safety violations in the Fire Station in Center Barnstead. In 2005, the Town had a risk audit conducted by the NH Local Government Center, the Town's Workers Comp Insurance provider who found Life Safety violations in the Center Fire Station. Recently, I requested the assistance of the New Hampshire Fire Marshall's Office who conducted an inspection of both Fire Stations. The Inspector reviewed the buildings for

both Fire and Life Safety Code and found that the station in the Center had several issues that need correction immediately. We have discussed making modifications to existing buildings but this is not a cost effective solution. I believe the best solution is a Public Safety Complex (Police, Fire, and EMS) to provide a centralized facility that can better serve the Town.

The Town of Barnstead's first organized fire department was established in 1909 and next year we will be celebrating our 100th anniversary. We hope to celebrate this milestone and are just beginning to make plans. If anyone has any pictures, badges, movies, or other fire department memorabilia that you would be willing to share, please contact me so that we can capture as much of the history of our Town's fire service.

The Fire-Rescue is always looking for new members and invites those interested in joining to stop at the station or call to discuss joining this dedicated group. It's a lot of work but the rewards of knowing you made a difference are what make the job all worth while.

In closing, I would like to express for the members of Barnstead Fire-Rescue our sincere appreciation for the continued support of the citizens of Barnstead. I personally want to extend my sincere appreciation to each member and their families for the dedication and commitment to our organization and Town of Barnstead.

Report of Barnstead Road Agent

In 2007 the Highway Department had its most challenging year in recent memory. January was warm and muddy, in fact we had three mud seasons this year. Then the worst flood by far of the three recent floods hit us in April. We morphed from a maintenance crew into a construction crew, and fixed a lot of drainage in town. December hit us with the most snow in recorded history. At the same time, we had not yet received the two new trucks. The aged trucks broke down and the crew was left to plow six routes with three trucks. The new trucks have arrived; we purchased a used one ton to replace the pickup which was deemed not worth maintaining. In short, we are now in pretty good shape.

I would like to thank all the contractors, not by name, as I would not want to forget any of them. With their help we were able to go from 39 roads closed on Monday to all but 3 passable on Friday.

Annual Report of the Chief of Police Kenneth A. Borgia

The Barnstead Police Department has completed yet another year of providing 24 hours a day 7 days a week law enforcement services despite having had as many as two positions remain vacant throughout the 2007 fiscal/calendar year. Unfortunately, the amount of work to be done and the number of calls to answer do not subside when manpower is below minimum requirement.

From the statistics reported, one can readily see that there are noticeable reductions in several crime categories listed as a direct result of the services provided by this agency. From these statistics, one can also see that in 2007 there was a higher solvability of higher level criminal activity. Unfortunately, when criminal activity is effectively addressed and reduced with limited manpower, traffic enforcement efforts are adversely affected.

During 2007 the Barnstead Police Department regrettably experienced the re-retirement of Administrative Assistant Richard W. Bray Sr., Administrative Clerk Leamon H. Hirtle and the transfer of Sergeant David L. Estes. The Town of Barnstead and its Police Department are fortunate to have Joseph G. McDowell Jr. who was promoted to Sergeant during 2007 and Administrative Assistant Merideth L. Hirtle who have picked up the extra workload as left by the two clerical vacancies and one supervisor vacancy.

As dedicated public servants to the residents of and visitors to the Town of Barnstead the sworn and civilian employees of the Barnstead Police Department we will continue to provide the professional law enforcement services which the Town has come to know and expect. As always, anyone can feel free to visit the Barnstead Police Department where their questions, comments, and concerns are appreciated.

Municipal Building Committee

The previous work of the Space Needs Committee determined the need to pursue a building program for a municipal building to house the Town Offices and Police Department. Although the 2007 Town Meeting did not appropriate funds for a building program, it did appropriate funds to produce a design and construction plans for a proposed combined Town Hall and Police Station. The Committee has been meeting on a weekly basis since then.

Our first task was to clear the area of the growth at the building site. Next, a Geothechnical Engineer was hired to conduct a soils investigation to accurately determine the characteristics of the building site. The site, with a high water table, steep slopes and limited space, presented some challenges to our conceptual design. This information was essential to the proper design of the building.

The Committee explored different methods to accomplish the task given to us by the 2007 Town Meeting. We ultimately decided on a construction manager—architectural design team approach. The building program would be done in two phases. Phase one, the design phase, funded by the 2007 Town Meeting and phase two, the construction phase.

A request for proposals was prepared and sent to six invited construction managers (CM). The Committee and Board of Selectmen interviewed four of the CMs and ultimately North Branch Construction from Henniker, NH, teamed with Udelsman Associates, from Hollis, NH, was hired to produce our construction drawings.

The construction drawings have been completed to a point where accurate pricing has been compiled to arrive at an accurate construction cost. Upon funding of the project, the construction phase of the project can begin.

Briefly, the proposal provides for a building just under 13,000 square feet. It houses the Selectmen, Town Clerk-Tax Collector, Building Inspector, Planning Board, Welfare offices and Police Department. It also provides for a 1,600 sf. meeting room with a capacity of approximately 130 persons. The proposal also provides for suitable holding and interrogation facilities within the Police Department. Radiant floor heat, air conditioning, ventilation and stand-by power are part of the design.

The Committee firmly believes, and reaffirms the Space Needs Committee recommendation, that the Town Offices and Police Station should be provided new facilities. The Charrette done by Plan NH has provided a realistic

glimpse into the future for the development of our Town. This project is the cornerstone of that plan for the development and sorely needed improvements to the Town's infrastructure.

The Committee also believes that providing proper facilities for our Town employee's to work, promotes morale and encourages our employees to continue to give their best. This building project and our energetic employees will tell prospective businesses that, as a Town, we welcome them. New business suitable for our Town is essential to easing our tax burden. The Town must be willing to invest in itself to attract commerce.

The Municipal Building Committee has worked diligently to be able to bring this proposal to the 2008 Town Meeting. The Committee believes that we have adequately addressed the concerns of the 2007 Town Meeting and also the needs of the Police Department and Town Offices for the foreseeable future.

The current members of the Municipal Building Committee are Doug Darrell, Tom Whittenburg, Karen Schacht, Frank Sullivan (B.O.S. rep), Co-Chair Bill Haynes and Co-Chair Mark Fraser. I would like to personally thank my fellow committee members for their dedication and effort put into this project.

Let's end the year with a few statistics. The library collection consists of 15,805 items. Item circulation for 2007 was 21,934. Patrons downloaded 487 books from the New Hampshire Downloadable Audio Books program. Patrons also logged 1,630 hours on the three public computers (nearly double the use from 2006). The meeting room was used a total of 228 times.

The ever popular Story Hour continued on Wednesday mornings during the school year. Dawn McCartney has remained as Chairperson and we are very grateful for her dedication. She has a great crew of volunteers who help provide a fun filled hour each week. There were a variety of programs for the children, the favorites being the Halloween Parade and the Christmas Party with a visit from Santa Claus!

Marie Stackhouse joined the staff in May, and will serve primarily as the Children's Librarian. She offered a wonderful summer reading program in which 94 participated. A total of 989 books were recorded. The theme was "Reading Road Trip U.S.A.", sponsored by CHILIS (Children's Librarians of New Hampshire) and NHLA (New Hampshire Library Association). Special events included Family Bingo night at the library, and weekly challenges for those who wanted to go the extra reading mile to win prizes from our prize box. The culmination of the reading program, courtesy of a grant from Kids, Books, and Art, was a magical performance by Alex O'Brien Feldman. The Town Hall was filled to capacity to see "Alexander the King of Jesters".

Pam Welch and Trina Blackwood are the remaining staff members. 2007 marked my 23rd year as Library Director. Ron Fitzpatrick and Roberta Gould welcomed Bruce Marriott to the Board of Trustees.

We were very happy to host two art exhibits, one of watercolors and the other photography. There are a number of talented artists in our community, and the library would be honored to host an exhibit of your work. It always brightens the day to walk in and be greeted by an artist's work. Any artist interested in exhibiting his/her pieces can contact the library.

The Book Discussion group continues to meet on the first Wednesday of the month. This is a very active group that offers lively discussion on a wide selection of books. If you are interested in joining, please contact the library for more information.

It proved to be a popular program and enrollment was filled within a week. The library looks forward to providing more adult programs in 2008.

Barnstead Planning Board Annual Report

Planning Boards in the State of New Hampshire have the responsibility to guide the growth and development of the community. The duties of Planning Boards to accomplish that responsibility include preparing and periodically amending a Master Plan, updating a Capital Improvement Plan to project costs for infrastructure improvement projects, reviewing applications for subdivisions/lot line adjustments/site plan reviews, and establishing any other requirements deemed necessary or helpful to support the development of the town.

The purpose of a Master Plan is to take input from the community at large and to document the direction the people who live in the community want to see the town headed. Once the desired long-term development of the community is envisioned, infrastructure improvements to support that development can be identified. The Capital Improvements Plan uses the information from the Master Plan to project spending over a 5-year period so that the Selectmen, the Budget Committee and the Town Meeting can budget appropriately and accomplish specific goals while controlling spending. The Planning Board will be working on revising the Capital Improvement Plan during the year 2008. Phil Grillo has volunteered to spearhead this task. Anyone who would like to assist should call Phil directly at 269-2740, or call the Planning Board at 269-4071, ext. 4.

During 2007 the Planning Board has approved 1 major subdivision, 1 minor subdivision, 3 lot line adjustments, and 5 site plan reviews for new businesses in town. This created 7 new building lots. The Board still has a major subdivision application before it, which will create 11 new building lots.

In June of 2002, the Planning Board enacted interim measures to control the growth of the Town of Barnstead. In 2001, the number of building permits for new homes jumped from a ten-year average of 9 per year to a total of 137 in one year. Alarmed by this increase, and with the number of building permits for new homes at 87 by the beginning of June 2002, the Board posted a notice to adopt a temporary growth limitation ordinance. This stopped the issuance of building permits until a special election could be held. The voters overwhelmingly supported the limited growth ordinance at the special election in June 2002. With the adoption of the Interim Growth Ordinance, the Planning Board was addressing the issues of overcrowding in the elementary school, high school enrollment, and the strain on municipal services in town created by the unprecedented growth. To continue these growth control measures the Board placed a permanent Growth Control Ordinance on the ballot for the 2003 Town Meeting. This ordinance passed by an overwhelming margin, and has withstood a test in Superior Court. This

ordinance allowed the town to limit the number of building permits issued for new homes each year during the period 2003 – 2009. In 2007 34 new home permits were issued. This provided a chance to get the infrastructure updated to support the increasing population of the town. So far we have built a new high school, but still need a new Town Hall and Public Safety Complex as well as extensive road improvements to serve the inevitable growth that will come in ensuing years.

In 2003 the voters authorized the Planning Board to collect impact fees. These are fees levied against new home construction to defray the costs already assumed by the present homeowners. In 2007 the Planning Board adopted a fee schedule based on the cost of the new high school. This schedule calls for every new single family home to pay \$1,492.00, every new manufactured home to pay \$1,247.00, and every new duplex to pay \$985.00 per unit into a fund that can only be used to pay off the bond on the new high school. If any other capital projects are approved at this year's Town or School Meetings then the proportional cost of those projects will be incorporated into the impact fee schedule.

Report of the Conservation Commission

The Barnstead Conservation Commission would once again like to take this opportunity to inform the Barnstead community of the various projects and ongoing activities that were undertaken in 2007 on Conservation lands throughout the town. The topics include a wide range of issues such as repairing damage related to the spring floods as well as active management of the existing properties under our care and continuing our efforts on additional land protection projects.

The damage associated with spring floods occurred at the Parade Road boat ramp, which was washed away and required a complete rebuilding. With the help of local contractors including RAT Enterprises and C.L. Lank Concrete, we were able to install a concrete ramp structure that should serve the community for many years. We expect to complete the landscaping of the site in the coming year and perhaps add other features to improve the site.

The White Oaks Road Beach property also received extensive damage during the spring floods with many downed trees or broken branches. These unscheduled maintenance activities were part of the overall effort at this property including trimming brush along the causeway to the beach and other trails. Over the course of the last three years, the Conservation Commission has been working with the Recreation Committee to provide improvements to this property and the beach area in particular. It seems to be paying off with improved access, equipment and public utilization.

Other work projects conducted at our existing properties included a walk over of the Grau property off Holmes Road attempting to mark boundaries and monitoring public use. In the coming year, we are expecting to work with the neighbors in that area to provide better access for the public and possibly providing more active management in the region. Our latest land protection effort also occurs in the vicinity of the Grau property, off Clapp Road. This proposed Conservation Easement adds a large parcel of land in one of our primary focus regions for land protection.

The Harrison property on Gilmanton Road also continues to be a focus for hands-on activities from brush-cutting to maintaining the mile long path to the Upper Suncook Lake. The large field in front of the cabin was mowed last fall to maintain the field habitat re-established 3-4 years ago. Other projects planned for this site in the near term include additional hiking trails and a better parking arrangement at the Gilmanton Road entrance.

The Commission co-sponsored a snowshoe hike on the Harrison property with the Friends of the Suncook River in February 2007. We hope to do the same thing in 2008 with possibly some new trails to follow. Whether you

snowshoe or hike, please take the time to visit the Harrison property. It's a great site that most people in town never see or take the time to enjoy. Closer to town, the loop trail at the back of the Stevens property located behind the Police Station was trimmed last summer for easier access with further improvements planned for the upcoming year. This short trail follows both the Big River and the Suncook River and has great potential for public use especially in connection with the adjacent boat launch, recreation area and library. Look for new signs to be installed at the trail entrance near the edge of the woods.

Land Protection

Land protection projects were given a boost last year when the Commission took title to a fifty-acre parcel of land on Gilmanton Road not far from the Harrison land. We will be finishing marking the boundaries this year and developing plans to utilize this piece of land to connect to other protected properties in the immediate area. Other areas we are focusing our land protection efforts on include the Cilley Meadows region, around the Harrison property, as well as the previously described Clapp Road region which includes the North Barnstead Road and Pitman Road areas. All these locations have limited development and include other easements or town-owned parcels nearby providing a solid opportunity to maintain the rural character of the region.

Hopefully, anyone who has an interest in protecting their land would contact the Commission to discuss the available options. If you are curious about the advantages of protecting your land please contact the Commission Chair, Jim Fougere at your convenience to discuss it.

Also, as we mention every year; any members of the community who are interested in learning more about the Commission's work, including its projects and activities, are encouraged to come to a meeting on the first Wednesday of the month at 7:30 at the Town Hall. Please feel free to contact Jim Fougere, Chairman with any questions.

Report of Town Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

Fire activity was very busy during the spring of the 2007, particularly late April into early May. As the forests and fields greened up in later May the fire danger decreased. However, a very dry late summer created very high fire danger again from August into September, with fire danger reaching very high on Labor Day weekend. Even with the dry conditions, the acreage burned was less than half that of 2006. The largest forest fire during the 2007 season burned approximately 26 acres on the side of Wantastiquet Mountain in Chesterfield during the month of May. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2007 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Additional information and homeowner recommendations are available at www.firewise.org. Please help Smokey Bear, your local fire department and the state's Forest Rangers by being fire wise and fire safe!



A Message from the District Committee

The Committee has avoided increasing taxes for the 9th consecutive year, 2008. While each town's share has changed slightly do to population changes, the total taxes collected by the District haven't increased since 1999. Prices for recyclables stayed strong during 2007, resulting in a cash surplus of \$59,024.97.

In late August, 2007 the District received a visit from the Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Weights & Measures, in response to a citizen complaint. The citizen apparently felt he had been over charged \$1.60, as the scale weight was 20lbs above what he believed was accurate. During the visit, Weights & Measures compliance personnel found several practices at the District were in violation of their administrative rules. The District has changed its operations to comply with their rules, to the best of our knowledge. However, one of the rules prevents the District from using its scales to weigh loads under 200 lbs, even though the scales are certified accurate in 20 lb increments by Weights & Measures. The result of compliance with this rule is a potential loss of revenue to the District of, worst case, \$100,000.00 per year. While we held the 2008 budget flat, the impact is no facility improvements, no further landfill closure activity, deferred maintenance and reduced raises for the staff. 2008 will be the last year of no tax increases unless the District can get the rule modified.

To that end, the District Administrator has met with the previous and new Commissioner's of Agriculture, as well as the Director and other personnel from Weights & Measures. They all appear unreceptive to providing any relief to the District. The District Committee has engaged legal counsel as well as a legislative advocate and, while continuing to work with the Department of Agriculture, will also review and pursue all legal and legislative remedies available. As stated before, if the District is unable to get some relief from the rule, the 2009 District Budget will reflect a hefty increase in taxes.

Comments from the public are always welcome. The District Committee meets the last Thursday of each month (except Nov. & Dec.) at the District facility at 7:00 PM. The Public is invited.

Barnstead Historical Society

The Historical Society meets in April, June, August and October each year. The theme of the Barnstead Historical Society's April meeting was The Adventures of a Bush Pilot. Mr. Richard LaPorte, a bush pilot and guide in Alaska and northern Canada, told stories of flying sportsmen to remote locations for salmon fishing, moose or caribou hunting and rescuing lost hunters and occupants of downed aircraft.

In June, a potluck dinner was followed by the evening program about the Concord Coach. The speaker was Charles Bourbean, past president of the Concord Coach Society. His stories, photographs, miniature coaches and books about the Concord Coaches were of great interest.

Planning for our booth at Old Home Day was done in August. Photographs, display boards, artifacts and maps about stage stops and routes through Barnstead were assembled.

Our October meeting featured presentations about some of our historic churches. Twink Merrill started the discussion with the possible location of the first meetinghouse near the Big River by the New Road. There is a stone marker at this site. Twink thinks a more plausible site is further to the north where he has found a stone wall that would be the right size to surround a meeting house. Forest Young discussed recent history of the Center Barnstead Christian Church and told about some of the missionary work that they are supporting. Jean Terry told interesting historic stories of the Parade Congregational Church and some members of that church that were important in the early history of Barnstead. This would include Enos George who was a minister in the Parade for many years in the early 1800's. Edie Brown told about the South Barnstead Church. She related how in the early 1900's Lewis Hanson and Everett Clark worked to promote and finance the construction of the steeple and the purchase of the clock, prominent features of the building.

Special note should be made of Fred Noyes's work in getting a state roadside memorial marker honoring Jonathan Chesley, a Revolutionary hero and prominent resident of Barnstead. This marker was placed on Tim's Hill on Route 126 near Chesley's gravesite last Spring.

Bill Walker continues to complete his Barnstead genealogical work that will be available to the public on computers at the Oscar Foss Library.

The Historical Society still seeks a permanent location that could be used to store and display Barnstead artifacts, photographs and stories. Ideas or as-

sistance from anyone would be greatly appreciated.

The Society has an ongoing oral history project. This year, seven of Barnstead's long time residents were interviewed, video recorded and taped. Stories of the Suncook Valley Railroad, Seward's Mill, the Morocco Shop, McAllister's Store, the early fire department, old Route 126, the town grader and early town police are found throughout these tapes.

Everyone is welcome to come to our programs and join the Barnstead Historical Society.

Barnstead Milfoil Control Committee

The activities conducted by the Barnstead Milfoil Control Committee (BMCC) in 2007 ranged from treatment of the Suncook River, assisting the Locke Lake Colony through inspection of their treatment areas as well as a review of all other ponds within the town boundary to determine the need for future management efforts outside the River corridor.

The Suncook River treatment was the major focus of our effort in 2007. Milfoil was determined in 2006 to be primarily located within that portion of the river from Crooked Run to the Parade Dam. The treatment program included a well-coordinated effort by the DES Dam Bureau, and the BMCC to drop the water levels in the river in increments down to minus five feet to force any current back into the channel. The treatment program occurred at specific elevations including minus 1.5 feet, minus 3 feet, and minus five feet.

The first treatment occurred on May 2nd, and the treatment effort was completed on June 5th. Two early summer storms and a high water table prevented the water level from reaching the target elevation of minus five feet and appeared to have influenced the effectiveness of the treatment effort. The total acreage of the treatment was nearly 100 acres with good control on approximately 60 acres. The surviving plants amounted to about 40 acres and grew in patches in the Broads and in several other specific sections of the river such as the old railroad trestle area. Scuba divers determined early on, that re-growth in these specific areas was too dense to be controlled by pulling. A follow-up treatment was planned specifically for these areas but the Department of Agriculture did not allow re-treatment..

The result of the treatment and follow-up work is a complete map of silted and heavily silted areas of the Suncook River based on the location where milfoil re-growth was observed. From past efforts of the BMCC and others, it has been determined that plants in these silted areas have higher survival rates and require follow-up efforts. The 2008 BMCC program will focus on these specific locations with a research project already proposed to control and study the re-growth locations in cooperation with UNH and DES.

The review of other ponds in town resulted in a determination that the milfoil infestation is generally confined to the Half Moon Lake-Suncook Lakes and Suncook River corridor. As part of their continuing effort, Locke Lake paid for the treatment of the lake during the summer of 2007 with BMCC providing follow up dive support and expertise to help ensure that no milfoil exists that can potentially re-infest the watershed. An effort as attempted to

pull plants but additional work is proposed in 2008.

The BMCC wants to thank all who assisted with the draw down and permitted access to the river during this past year. Your support greatly assisted our efforts. The BMCC would also like to acknowledge the ongoing efforts of the Suncook Lakes Association, which continues to spend numerous manhours on their lakes to control milfoil on the lakes. That effort can only help the entire town.

State Representative Report

As I enter into the last year of my third term (year number 6) I often stop to wonder where the time has gone. It seems like only yesterday that I was running for office for the first time. I have enjoyed being the voice of the citizens of Barnstead in Concord.

As many of you know, the milfoil committee has continued its hard work in cleaning up our lakes and rivers here in Barnstead. During the past year there have been some great successes and some disappointments. The important focus is that with each success, we all move forward toward milfoil free lakes and rivers. It is no accident that Ed Neister, chairman of the milfoil committee, became the Citizen of the Year in Barnstead. It is a well deserved honor and I would like to extend my congratulations to Ed and to all who work so diligently to eradicate milfoil.

Another issue that our town is involved in this year is the issue of the vehicle scales at the BCEP. Below is an excerpt of a letter that I wrote to Commissioner Merrill of the NH Dept. of Agriculture.

It has been brought to my attention that the Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Weights and Measures has informed the BCEP that they have been using the vehicle scales improperly and in violation of administrative rule Agr. 1404.05(o) It is my understanding that my constituents cannot be charged for any net weights under 50 scale increments (other that scrap recycling) and yet, the vehicle scales are calibrated in 20 lb. increments. This rule effectively prohibits using the vehicle scales for net weights under 1,000 pounds for demolition and mixed kitchen waste. It appears to me that the rule and the vehicle scale calibration are in direct conflict with each other. If the vehicle scale has an accuracy range certified by the Bureau of Weights & Measures, then why would be there be a rule that would forbid the usage of the scale within the certified range? It doesn't make any sense to me and I must speak on behalf of all of my constituents who will have to pay a far higher disposal price due to this conflict.

There are many more issues that will be addressed over this new year that will have a direct and/or indirect impact on Barnstead. It is my hope, as always, that you will all keep an eye on what is done at the State House and make your wishes known regarding bills that are of interest to you. I fear that there will be some large tax increases headed our way. Although I cannot guarantee the outcome, I can promise to vote against raising taxes and vote for less spending.

Listed below are some to our services performed on behalf of the Town of Barnstead and the region in the past fiscal year:

- Completed and distributed the 2007 Development Activity in the Lakes Region report on the Lakes Region residential and commercial development trends. Prepared a new survey for 2007-2008.
- Developed an update of the top regional transportation priorities.
- Convened several meetings for Transportation Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) to enhance local involvement in transportation planning and project development.
- Hosted and organized three public Municipal Law Lectures, provided a legal perspective on local planning, zoning and other municipal issues.
- Secured funding from the NH Homeland Security and Emergency Management to assist local communities with the preparation of all hazard management plans.

Barnstead Officers have been handling an increasing number of lengthy criminal investigations forcing the department into a reactionary mode which in turn reduces the amount of time officers are able to spend performing patrol and traffic enforcement duties in a proactive fashion. In 2007 the officers of the Barnstead Police Department will be carrying four (4) months worth of combined/accrued vacation time to be covered at overtime rates by other officers at a mean cost of \$17,000. The straight rate of pay to cover vacation time would be approximately \$9,700. That is a \$7,300 cost savings in utilizing a straight rate of pay as compared to paying at an overtime rate. (This does not include training time and sick time overtime coverage). The remainder is a net cost of \$17,700 in order to implement the seventh (7th) Full-Time Position. The benefits of this position may not be recognized for several months due to hiring and training constraints, however, to wait until the 2008 Town Meeting for consideration would result in the benefits of the added position not being recognized until late 2008. S. EDWARD NEISTER



Overwhelming nominations came in and the 2007 Citizen of the Year award was presented to S. Edward Neister for the tireless efforts that he has bestowed on the Town of Barnstead.

Born in Roanoke, Virginia, Ed moved to Barnstead in 1970 and immediately became a member of the Planning Board, chairing the committee for three of the five years that he served. An avid scuba diver, Ed ran into an 8 foot plant in ten feet of water of the Suncook River

and after research, realized that the invasive plant would quickly overrun the natural waterways.

With foresight, Ed and his committee of dedicated volunteers contracted with the State of New Hampshire to begin the work of eradicating the Milfoil Plant that until recently had begun to clog the local lakes and streams. Beginning in 2003 Ed worked with the Town and finished the first project in 2007 which consisted mainly of the Suncook Watershed.

With 1000 hours of clean up work logged, the Suncook Lake System is now virtually free of the Milfoil weed. Ed maintains that because of the Milfoil Plant's aggressive nature, continuous work must be done to keep the persistent weed out of the waterways and his efforts to eradicate the plant continue to this day.

Ed attributes his success to great local and Town support and a wonderful group of people who helped him every step of the way. Because of his efforts, the Town of Barnstead can continue to enjoy its beautiful lakes.
