RECORD OF ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

Bow, NH March 13-14, 1984

Moderator Phil Ryan opened the March 13, 1984 Town Meeting for the Legal Voters of Bow at 10:00 AM announcing that Article 2 Amendment 13 would need a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote in order to pass.

A motion to recess the March 13th meeting to March 14th at 7:00 PM at the Bow Memorial School to take up the rest of the warrant articles was made by Moderator Phil Ryan and seconded by Sara Swenson.

The meeting reconvened at 7:00 PM with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Scoutmaster Roland Robinson and Scouts Mark Dartnell, Eagle Scout; Chris Kraybill, Life Scout; Kenney Gagne, Second Class; and Bill Colantuoni, Tenderfoot of Troop 75. The Rev. James Smith, of the Bow Community Baptist Church, then led us in prayer.

Moderator Phil Ryan explained that the Roberts Rules of Parliamentary procedure would be followed for this meeting. The meeting then proceeded with the results of the Town Ballot Election results as follows:

ARTICLE #3: It was voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) for the replacement of one highway department dump truck; said appropriation to be funded in the following manner: to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of Twenty-five Thousand (\$25,000.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund for the replacement of highway equipment, to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, and to raise the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for this purpose by taxation.

ARTICLE #4: It was voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for the purpose of rebuilding one of the Bow Fire Department trucks.

ARTICLE #5: Was moved by Al Ward, and seconded by Delia Bechtel. It was voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$10,500.00) to purchase a new police cruiser and in order to fund such appropriation, to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw such sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE #6: Was moved by Al Ward, and seconded by Bill Roberts. It

was voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) for the purpose of purchasing a four-channel telephone/radio recording system, and in order to fund such appropriation, to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw such sum from the Capital Reserve Fund for Police Department equipment.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE #7: Was moved by Al Ward, and seconded by Tom Goley. It was voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the purpose of preparing and plotting an area for expanding the Evans Cemetery, and in order to fund such appropriation, to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw such sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE #8: It was voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-one Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$31,950.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the replacement of highway equipment.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE #9: It was voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) to improve the public highway known as the Dunbarton Center Road, the State to furnish the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00).

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE #10: It was voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Eight Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$5,850.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for Tax Maps.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE #11: It was voted, by voice vote, to purchase a tract of landlocked land containing fifty-four (54) acres more or less, situated off the south side of Robinson Road, and identified as Block 2, Lot 119 on the Bow Tax map for a price not to exceed Fifty-four Hundred Dollars (\$5,400.00) and to establish such tract, upon acquisition, as a Town Forest pursuant to RSA 31:110; and in order to finance such purchase, to authorize the use and expenditure of Fifty-four Hundred Dollars (\$5,400.00) from the Land Acquisition Fund in payment of the purchase price; and to authorize the Town Conservation Commission to manage such tract as a Town Forest and to develop and carry out a forest maintenance program for the same; and other multiple use programs consistent therewith.

ARTICLE #12: Was moved by Al Ward, and seconded by Dom D'Ambruoso. It was voted, by voice vote, to authorize and direct the Selectmen to review the considerations which may be involved in participating with the City of Concord solid waste resource recovery project, to enter into discussion and negotiations regarding the project, and to report back to the Town with their findings and recommendations.

ARTICLE #13: Was moved by Al Ward, and seconded by Dom D'Ambruoso. It was voted, by voice vote, to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Forest Management Fund the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be used for the purpose of reducing taxes.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE #14: Was moved by Al Ward and seconded by Dom D'Ambruoso. It was voted, by voice vote, to raise and appropriate Four Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$4,760.00), said sum representing the second of twenty payments to the City of Concord as our apportioned amount of the capital and operating costs of the Wastewater Treatment Facility.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE #15: Was moved by Al Ward, and seconded by Dom D'Ambruoso. It was voted, by Standing vote, to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars, (\$25,000.00) for the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund for financing a reappraisal of the real estate of the Town for tax purposes.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE #16: Was moved by Al Ward, and seconded by Dom D'Ambruoso. It was voted, by voice vote, to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for future sewerage construction and/or hook-up costs to the sewerage system for the Community Building, and to direct that any funds which are reimbursed to the Town by the Federal Government and/or the State of New Hampshire for sewerage facilities constructed in 1978-79 be deposited into said fund.

ARTICLE #17: Was moved by Al Ward, and seconded by John Swenson. An amendment that: The Town of Bow not be enjoined to subsidize any costs until notified what our monies spent for, was defeated.

It was voted, by a standing vote of: 38 - No, 59 - Yes, to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Bow, New Hampshire, and to the health and welfare of the people of Bow, New Hampshire.

These actions shall include:

1) Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.

2) Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this Article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States.

ARTICLE #18: It was voted to remove \$4,900.00 from the Conservation Budget and the budget was then accepted as \$1,772,950.00.

ARTICLE #19: Was moved by Al Ward, and seconded by Dom D'Ambruoso. It was voted, by voice vote, to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE #20: Ted Bardwell, Chairman of the Water Commission asked that the Water Commissioner's Report be added to the Town Report for next year as the report was not ready in time to be printed in this year's Town Report. He gave that report to the Town Clerk.

TOWN OF BOW
SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

November 13, 1984

Moderator Phil Ryan opened the November 13, 1984, Special Town Meeting, at 7:00 P.M. in Bow Memorial School's cafeteria. The Rev. James Smith, of the Bow Community Baptist Church, then led us in prayer. Mr. Ryan explained that the majority would control the vote for this meeting.

The meeting adjourned to the gymnasium at 7:23 P.M. and reconvened at 7:40 P.M. with general discussion by several townspeople.

ARTICLE I: To see if the Town will vote to spend the \$7000.00 contingency money already approved for the 1984-85 budget for the purpose of hiring an additional employee for the Town, whose specific hours would be 8 to 5 weekdays, and whose qualifications would include EMT, requires that $\frac{1}{2}$ (1236) of the legal voters be present in order to pass. As 1236 voters were not present, only approximately 400, Selectman Sara Swenson said the Selectmen will pursue other avenues of day time coverage, without a vote, as 1236 voters are not present. This passed.

ARTICLE II: It was voted to authorize the Selectmen to release the new employee and town employee James Scovil from their regular paid duties so they can take the Bow Rescue Squad Ambulance to any emergency calls in the Town during the hours of 8 to 5 weekdays.

A committee consisting of Lee Kimball, Jim Kibby, Bob Lougee, Bill Hall and Horace Bailey, was formed to study possibilities for day time coverage for the Town.

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bow, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Bow Community Building in said Bow on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, 1985, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot, and the polls shall open for balloting at ten o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before seven o'clock in the evening.

You are hereby notified, in accordance with the provisions of R.S.A. 39:2-a, adopted at the 1980 annual meeting of the Town of Bow, to meet at the Bow Memorial School in said Bow on Wednesday, the 13th day of March, 1985, at seven o'clock in the evening to consider the remaining Articles of the Warrant.

1. To choose by non-partisan ballot the following Town Officers:
One Selectmen for three years.
A Town Treasurer for one year.
A Town Clerk/Tax Collector for one year.
Two members of the Budget Committee for three years.
One Library Trustee for five years.
One Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.
One Sewer Commissioner for one year.
One Sewer Commissioner for three years.
One Water Commissioner for three years.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to complete improvements to the public highway known as the Dunbarton Center Road, said project already in progress, with the State furnishing matching funds.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$11,600.00) to purchase a new police cruiser and, in order to fund such appropriation, to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw such sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of

Twenty-Six Thousand Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$26,250.00) for the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund for financing one-half of the Town's Share (10%) of replacing the "Dry Bridge", so-called, on River Road (subject to a contribution by the Boston & Maine Corporation toward the Town's share of a like amount of \$26,250, and subject further to the receipt by the Town of 80% Federal funding and 10% State funding of such project); and in order to fund such appropriation, to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw such sum from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Two Thousand Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$22,750.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for the Replacement of Highway Equipment.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for Tax Maps.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to be added to the Capital Reserve Fund for a re-appraisal of the real estate of the Town for tax purposes.
8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw from the Forest Management Fund all monies in such Fund at the time of withdrawal in excess of \$100,000.00, to be used for the purpose of reducing taxes.
9. To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift of the building known as the Bow Bog Meeting House and the contents thereof and the land on which it is situated, as offered by the members of the Bow Bog Meeting House Society; and to accept a gift of funds from the said Bow Bog Meeting House Society in the amount of approximately \$4,000.00 to be held in trust for the maintenance and care of said historical building and site, in accordance with RSA 31:19, such trust fund to be separately invested and to be used, income and principal, for such upkeep purposes as the Selectmen may from time to time determine.
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town to enter into a cooperative agreement, pursuant to RSA Chapter 53-A, for the purpose of joining together towns and

cities in a joint and cooperative effort for the disposal of solid waste in a manner which will meet federal and state regulations and for the economical and efficient recovery of energy from said solid waste disposal. The Cooperative to be formed under the cooperative agreement will be designated the "Concord Regional Solid Waste/Resource Recovery Cooperative". A copy of the current draft of the proposed cooperative agreement is posted with the warrant and is available at the Town offices during normal business hours. The adoption of this article shall be deemed to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town specifically (a) to execute and deliver the cooperative agreement (with such changes therein from the posted agreement as the Board of Selectmen shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the Board of Selectmen's execution thereof) and such other instruments, documents, and agreements as the Board of Selectmen may deem necessary or desirable in furtherance of the purposes of the cooperative agreement; (b) to cause to be performed all obligations which may from time to time be required pursuant to the terms of the cooperative agreement; and (c) to take action relative thereto. (Note: Cooperative Agreement will bind the Town for 20 years. Tipping fee range proposed to be \$12.00 to \$21.00 per ton.)

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee and to determine the amount to be raised and appropriated for Town expenses, and to pass any vote in relation thereto.
12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
13. To hear the reports of standing Committees and take any action relating thereto.
14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S MESSAGE

The Town is experiencing an upward trend in building once again with 59 new single family building permits issued in 1984 as compared to 35 issued in 1983. We have experienced little growth in the commercial and industrial area of which there is a need to generate more tax base, thus eliminating some of our dependency on Public Service.

This past year the State started construction on Dunbarton Center Road to improve road conditions using matching funds approved by the Town over the past few years. Other projects started this year were the first phase of our Sewer Project and the first phase of expansion at the Evans Cemetery is almost completed.

We have new 1985 dump stickers available in the Town Clerk's office. Anyone using the transfer station should have the sticker displayed on the passenger side of the vehicle by the end of March. As a reminder to anyone calling the Town Clerk's office, she has her own telephone number which is printed on the back side of the Town Report.

If all the Warrant Articles are passed by the Townspeople as recommended by the Budget Committee, the amount to be raised by taxes this year for the Town's portion will be down over \$100,000 from the amount raised in 1984.

This year we will not be sending out property inventories. Anyone who is a new resident in Town and eligible for a veteran's exemption should pick up a form at the Selectmen's Office and file it before April 15th.

Anyone who has anything to offer and is interested in serving on any of our boards or commissions should let the Selectmen know prior to March Town Meeting as we start making our appointments after Town Meeting.

Copies of the Town History "100 Acres More or Less" are still available at \$20.00 each at the Selectmen's Office.

The Selectmen wish to express their thanks to all the Boards, Commissions, Volunteers and Town Employees for their support this past year.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of
the Board of Selectmen

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements of the Town of Bow, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1984, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Bow, New Hampshire at December 31, 1984, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining, individual fund and account group financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Bow, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined, combining, individual fund and account group financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

In 1984 I performed a research program within my department in order to ascertain how much time was being spent in our five categories of work. I was pleased with the results and thought it might be of interest to you, to know, that your Police Department spent 59% of it's time on patrol, 22% doing paperwork, 10% on investigations, 7% on special details and 2% in court.

Reviewing the statistics for 1984 you can see the total burglaries increased by one over 1983 (17 to 18). Broken down it shows Industrial burglaries totaled 11 while Residentials totaled 7, almost a complete reversal over 1983, when Industrial burglaries totaled 4 and Residentials were 13. In addition, Larceny (thefts) totaled 27 in 1984 as compared to 63 in 1983, a decrease of 57%. Criminal Mischief reports totaled 61 in 1984 and 91 during 1983 a 33% reduction. Criminal Trespass declined 60%, showing a total of 7 in 1984 and 18 in 1983.

Personally, these reductions in part tell me that our CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAM (NNW) - NATIONAL NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH-is working, due to our NNW street signs, NNW residential door stickers and YOU-the Residents-for being AWARE that BOW is NOT IMMUNE from CRIME and taking the TIME to CALL US (228-0511) to REPORT SUSPICIOUS VEHICLES AND PERSON(S). In order to maintain low levels of crime in Bow and to get the most out of our Crime Prevention Program (NNW), you the residents of Bow have got to work together as a team, preferably as a family with your Police Department. We can't be everywhere at once, but you the residents are located all over Bow. You the people are our additional eyes! I know that if every resident of Bow got together and tallied every suspicious vehicle and person they observed in a years time, that the figure would be much greater than what your Police Department statistics show. Remember, if you SEE IT, HEAR IT then REPORT IT, so that we can protect and serve you to the fullest extent. The one thing we dislike receiving is a call stating, "My house has been burglarized".

Motor vehicle accidents in 1984 totaled 77. Twenty-nine of them occurred on Route 3-A with one of them being a double fatal in May, which took the

lives of 2 of our Bow youths. Speed is the biggest cause of accidents in Bow. Our radar arrests for speed increased by 60% in 1984 for a total of 189 compared to 119 in 1983.

If you are thinking of getting an Alarm System and have questions or would like a Residential/Industrial Security Survey Check then do not hesitate to call us.

I want to thank the Bow Rotary Club and J.C. Pitman Co. (PITCO) for their assistance in sponsoring the Jr. Police Officers Program (a safety orientated program) at the Bow Elementary School. In addition, I would like to thank Grappone Transportation Center for supplying the 1985 Bow Police Department Calendar entitled McGruff "Take a bite out of Crime".

At this time, I thank all the members of the Bow Highway Department, Fire Department and the Bow Rescue Squad for their assistance at accident scenes and emergencies.

To each citizen of Bow I extend my warmest thanks to you for continued support, interest, cooperation and assistance that you have given my department during the past year. Please stop by our offices located in the Municipal Building on Grandview Rd. or contact us at 228-0511 if you have any questions or need NNW materials, telephone stickers or need assistance.

The Bow Dispatch Center is located at the Bow Community Building on Knox Rd. As in the past the Dispatch Center operates on a 24 hour day, 7 days per week schedule. We are here to serve you in many different aspects, such as; receiving incoming calls for Police, Highway, Rescue and implementing necessary action, answering telephone calls pertaining to community activities, dump hours, road and weather conditions, cancellations etc.

Radio transmissions have continued to increase to a total of 39,536 for 1984 versus 39,229 in 1983 and 38,846 in 1982.

The Operation Call-In Program remains in effect and is working very well. This services the elderly, those living alone, invalids or any other person who wishes to be on this program. Information pertaining to this program may be obtained at the Dispatch Center by simply placing a telephone call.

The third and final phase of the Dispatch Center has been completed with the purchase of a new recording system, which enables all incoming telephone calls and all radio transmissions from the cruiser to be recorded on tape. This system allows the dispatcher to play back a call to obtain pertinent information in an emergency situation, such as Police and Rescue calls. All of the tapes are monitored by Chief Cheney, if no serious incidents have occurred they are erased and re-used at a future date. If a serious incident has occurred the tape is then secured for a reasonable length of time as to protect the Town.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind you that when you are reporting an EMERGENCY situation, the dispatcher needs to know the following:

1. WHO (who is calling)
2. WHERE (where is the location)
3. WHAT (what is the problem)

Please keep this number 228-0511 by your phone and DO NOT hesitate to use it. Stickers for your phone are available at the Police Station, Dispatch Center, Town Clerk's Office and are also a part of the Neighborhood Crime Watch Program packet.

The Dispatch Center has available for your use an Electric Engraver, used to engrave any and all of your personal property with an identification number of your choice, such as your drivers license number, then if a burglary should occur and your property is stolen, it could be easily identified by you. You need only to come to the Dispatch Center and sign for it, no fees are involved.

Again, thank you for the courtesy and support you have extended us in 1984 and may we all work together to make 1985 a better and safer year for all.

This type of experience is invaluable to the firefighters. The Department is currently involved in a first responder medical course that will better prepare them to aid the citizens in the event of an emergency. This course will complete the rescue portion of firefighter training. The department is now trained in many rescue techniques including search for lost persons, rescue from landslides and cave-ins, electrical emergencies, height rescue, building collapse, and rescue from below grade structures.

As in past years, we conducted the National Fire Protection Association "Learn Not to Burn" presentation for the children in the Bow Schools.

The 1961 F.W.D. pumper sent out last year to be rebuilt, has been completed. We would like to invite everyone to stop in and look at the fine job that has been done. We expect to get many more years of service from this truck.

1985 marks the 40th Anniversary of the Bow Fire Department. The Fire Department and the Ladies Auxillary are planning a dinner-dance to celebrate the occasion on March 23rd. Tickets will be on sale soon. Come celebrate with us.

We wish to thank the Ladies Auxillary for the equipment and many other things they have done for the Department in 1984.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

REPORT OF BUILDING INSPECTOR

To the Citizens of Bow: I hereby respectfully submit my 1984 report.

Once again the previous year has shown that the Town of Bow has had another busy year in development. Single family residences have once again led the way, with commercial construction, renovations and additions much in line with the previous year.

The two shopping center projects are at a standstill at this time, but with the coming of the new sewer project on Rt. 3-A, hopefully things will culminate.

The Evans Cemetery expansion area has been seeded and hopefully will be ready for use in mid or late summer of this year.

New subdivisions are on the increase, creating many more buildable lots, which tends to show a very active forecast for 1985.

The new sewer project which has involved Hall Street and the north end of Rt. 3-A has gone very smoothly. Come spring, work will resume on completion of road adjustments and the connection of all new services. The re-design of the new pumping station will be located on the south side of Hall Street versus the prior location on the north side of Hall Street, which would have created a traffic hazard for tractor-trailer trucks heading north on Rt. 3-A. Hopefully this will eliminate all the problems with tractor-trailer trucks coming from or leaving Universal Packaging and Blue Seal Feeds. We acknowledge all the problems and inconveniences the sewer project has created for residents of Hall Street and Rt. 3-A. We appreciate their patience and tolerance needed to complete this project. With the completion of sewer services in this area, all commercial properties will be that much more acceptable and attractive to new businesses.

I would once again extend my gratitude and appreciation to the Selectmen, Highway Department, Fire Department, Conservation Department, Police Department, Planning and Zoning Boards for their help and cooperation when needed.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the residents of the Town of Bow for their patience and understanding during all "work in progress".

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The members of the Bow Zoning Board of Adjustment held one special meeting and twelve monthly meetings during 1984 with seven public hearings for Variances, ten public hearings for Special Exceptions and four public hearings for Administrative Decisions. It has been our policy to make on site inspections of all properties involved so that further insight can be made prior to any decisions, and we shall continue this policy in the future.

Some of the Board's challenges included dealing with day care facilities and "panhandle lots" as outlined in the amendment that was passed at 1983 town meeting directly addressing large lots with limited frontage.

The Board appreciated the support of the Board of Selectmen and all other Boards and Commissions together with town personnel with which it worked during 1984. We look forward to their assistance and counsel in the new year.

BOW CONSERVATION COMMISSION

At the March 2, 1976 town meeting townspeople voted to purchase thirteen parcels of land comprising approximately 1,000 acres. Nine of these parcels were placed under jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission for forest management, one parcel went for school use and three parcels were placed under control of the selectmen for use by other town departments. The Bow Conservation Commission would like you to know how your forest lands are working for you.

The Commission has completed survey of all parcels under its jurisdiction and assisted the selectmen in surveying two of the town maintained parcels. Boundary lines are periodically blazed and painted to maintain accuracy.

Management plans with timber cruises have been completed on three of the larger lots and plans are underway the complete forest inventories on the remaining lots in 1985. Timber is marked for selective cutting based on a sustained yield cycle.

Lot 106, Block 3 (18.5 acres) is familiar to most of you as it is the location of our elementary school. Timber was removed from the construction area prior to excavation which provided income of \$1,000.

Lot 77, Block 4 (150 acres) is on Albin Rd. This lot has provided the town with space for three ballfields as well as access to Turee Pond.

Lots 65 and 68, Block 4 (52 acres) are adjacent to Evans Cemetery and have supplied much needed room for cemetery expansion. These lots contain a superior stand of large white pine and provide access to Turee Pond for recreational use. Some timber removed from these lots for cemetery expansion has been used for building improvements at the Town Highway Garage. Other has been sold and income of \$1,270.25 received.

Lot 102, Block 2 (42 acres) is located off Route 3A and is providing a source of gravel to the town for road construction. Pine harvested in clearing the area for gravel use has brought \$3,776.35 income to the town and boulders sold for crushing \$9,634.50.

Lot 116, Block 4 (80 acres) is located on the Branch Londonderry Turnpike West and abuts 110 acres of land previously owned by the town. A timber harvest of 398,962 bd. ft. was conducted on this lot in 1978 with a net income of \$30,878.44.

Lot 56, Block 4 (53 acres) is located off Page Rd. 187,395 bd. ft. of timber

was harvested in 1979 with an income of \$11,964.62.

Lot 122, Block 2 (22 acres) is located on Robinson Rd. It was also harvested in 1979 with a harvest of 150,660 bd. ft. netting \$10,937.56.

Lot 64, Block 5 is a 35 acre parcel located in the Knox Rd.-Dow Rd.-I-93 area. The commission plans a cordwood cut on this lot to improve the timber stand but a right of way, either temporary or permanent, must be obtained prior to the cut.

Lot 138, Block 3 (318 acres) has access on both Knox and Robinson Rds. This lot abounds with wildlife and timber harvests are carefully planned so as not to interfere with natural animal habitat. A timber harvest is underway on a small portion of this lot with an anticipated income of \$46,000. Upon completion of timber harvest log yards and skid roads will be seeded with a conservation mix to prevent soil erosion and provide wildlife vegetation.

Lot 63, Block 3 (62 acres) is a landlocked parcel off Branch Londonderry Turnpike East. It is hoped that a right of way can be secured in the near future and a timber harvest conducted.

Lot 83, Block 2 (10.7 acres) located on the discontinued Johnson Rd. was harvested in 1982 with a harvest of 100,200 bd.ft. netting \$6,022.03.

Lot 97, Block 2 (254 acres) is located on Robinson Rd. A timber harvest was held on this lot in 1980 and 1981. The Commission worked with the Fish and Game Department to preserve and improve the natural habitat of the area wildlife. At the time of the timber harvest an interior road system was developed for fire protection and future timber harvests and is now being used for winter recreation by snowmobilers and cross country skiers. By using a consulting forester on timber harvests, the Commission has consistently obtained the highest bids available. On this lot John Morse, the consulting forester, obtained the highest price ever received for white pine in this state. Timber harvest on this lot provided income of \$129,519.50 for the 1,030,065 bd.ft. harvested. The management of this timber harvest was of such a superior quality it received a write-up in the Fall 1982 issue of *N.H. Natural Resources*. In 1981 a deposit of superior road construction gravel was discovered on this lot and has been used in the construction of Allen Rd.

Lots 26 and 27, Block 4 (76 acres) A timber harvest was completed on these lots this year with 413,895 bd.ft. bringing an income of \$45,201.16.

In 1979 the town purchased 153 acres of land near I-93 for \$10,000. A timber harvest of 197,670 bd. ft. was conducted in 1983-84 returning

\$11,011.12 for the 197,670 bd. ft. harvested.

All monies received from timber harvests are invested by the town treasurer at the highest available rate of interest, which has resulted in income to the town of more than \$45,000.00

With these lands the town has a renewable resource. To date approximately 2,500,000 bd. ft. of timber have been harvested at an income of more than \$290,000.00. The Bow Conservation Commission has returned \$80,000 to the town to offset taxes and is pleased this year to return more than \$100,000.

Sound forest management on a sustained yield basis can provide a continued source of income to the town as well as providing areas for wildlife and recreation for this and future generations.

DOG ORDINANCE

TOWN OF BOW

The Town of Bow hereby ordains as follows:

Any dog found running at large outside the limits of its' owner's property and not under the owner's control or supervision within the Town of Bow will be impounded.

The word "owner" as used in this ordinance shall mean a person who owns or keeps a dog.

The owner of any impounded dog, when known, may retrieve said dog upon payment to the Town of Bow a fee of \$5.00 for the impounding and an additional charge of \$5.00 per day that said dog is confined by the Bow Police Department.

In the event that the owner of any impounded dog is unknown, the description of said dog will be advertised. If the owner is found, the same fees and charges must be paid as well as any additional cost caused by the advertising before said dog is released to the owner. If the owner cannot be determined after ten days confinement, the dog will be humanely disposed of by the Bow Police Department.

This ordinance shall take effect May 1, 1976.

BOW ATHLETIC CLUB

The Bow Athletic Club was founded in 1974 "To promote and organize sports and recreational activities for residents in the Town of Bow, New Hampshire". Since that time the club has grown in the basic direction of providing athletic programs to the children of Bow. The club also sponsors a road race, participates in the spring carnival, sponsors the sports sale and in conjunction with the Bow Rotary Club, delivers these reports.

It is always a pleasure to report on the progress the club is making and our plans for the coming year.

The Robert D. Wheeler Memorial Building was essentially completed by volunteers in the fall of 1984. With some finishing touches in the spring, we should be ready for a gala dedication ceremony with a Saturday round robin of baseball and softball games. The funds for the building were donated in memory of Bob by his friends and family.

Basketball is well underway again and while you are reading this report all eight teams and two cheerleading squads will be actively participating in year end tournaments. The club is sponsoring their own tournament this year. We hope this is successful and will become an annual event.

We expect that our tour baseball program will follow the same format as usual and that our numbers will stay at about 275-300 children involved with either baseball or softball. Programs offered are:

Baseball - Clinic (8 or 2nd grade), Juniors (9 & 10), Independent (11 & 12), Babe Ruth (13), and Babe Ruth (14 & 15).

Girls' Softball - Clinic (grades 2 & 3), Regular League (grades 4-7) and Junior Miss (ages 13 - 18).

Fall sports include football, cheering and soccer. Unfortunately in 1984 the football league in which we played dissolved just prior to the season leaving us with very few options. Fortunately many of our boys who wanted to play football were able to play in the Hooksett Pop Warner Program. This year we will have a mixed program under Hooksett's Pop Warner Charter. The 11-12-13 and 10-11-12 year old participants will register and play on the Hooksett teams. There will be two teams in the 9-10-11 year old group, one from Hooksett and one from Bow.

The Soccer program remained about the same size last year; 110 boys and girls participating in the Merrimack Valley Soccer League, grades 3-6. 6

teams. We expect this level to stay about the same in 1985. We are also planning on adding an instructional "after school" league for boys and girls, grades 1 & 2.

It is impossible to thank everyone who makes our programs run. The Sponsors, Recreation Department, School Staff and Town Volunteers are all important to our program success. This year several people stepped down from the Board of Directors who have contributed greatly to the success of the Club. Lee Kimball who will remain as Commissioner of our football program, Ray Johnson a coach of all sports and Director of the Club for many years and Pete Colby, a past Vice President and Coach. We thank them all for their years of dedication.

There is one person I would be remiss to not mention, even though he is not leaving the Board. Bill O'Donnell, our Treasurer for five years, stepped down. Besides Treasurer, he has coached baseball, softball, junior miss softball, and soccer. I would like to say a special thanks to Bill for his dedication to the Club.

We hope you and your children will take advantage of our programs and look forward to a successful year.

We provide wreaths for the Bow Municipal Buildings during the Christmas season.

Our organization initiated the plans for landscaping the town office building on Grandview Road. The plans are in the process of being carried out and hopefully our efforts will come to fruition in the near future.

Leadership has been provided for the formation of a Junior Garden Club which should reach its culmination in 1985.

The Bow Garden Club had the honor of designing and providing the table decorations and favors for a luncheon of the 1984 Fall Board Meeting of National Council of State Garden Clubs which was held at the Sheraton Wayfarer in Bedford, N.H. Several club members also assisted with the registration of delegates attending the meetings and associated activities.

REPORT OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE BOW SCHOOL DISTRICT

Tuesday, March 20, 1984

A duly called meeting of the legal voters of the Bow School District was held at the Bow Memorial School on Tuesday, March 20, 1984, at 7:00 P.M. The meeting was called to order by Dom S. D'Ambruoso, Moderator. He announced the results of the School District elections noting that all offices are for three year terms.

The Moderator then proceeded with the reading of the School Warrant upon which the following action was taken:

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was

VOTED: to accept the salaries of the School Board and the compensation of any other officer or agent of the District as they are printed in the Town Report. (Article 1)

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was

VOTED: to accept the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen as they are printed in the Town Report. (Article 2)

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was

VOTED: that the District authorize the School Board to make applications for and to expend, on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from any source including the State of New Hampshire and/or United States Government and to appropriate any funds anticipated from such sources including the State of New Hampshire and/or from the United States Government to the payment of obligations of the District for which said funds constitute full reimbursement, provided such grants and/or funds do not jeopardize the local control of our school system, in accordance with RSA 198:20B. (Article 3)

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was

VOTED: that the District establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year and to raise

and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for this purpose. (Article 4)

Upon motion duly made and seconded, it was

VOTED: that the District raise and appropriate Three Million Six Hundred Eighty-four Thousand, Thirty-seven Dollars (\$3,684,637) for the support of the schools, for the salaries of the School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid Fund together with other income: the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town. (Article 5)

Article 6

Robert Lynn reported that five years ago a study committee found that the Bow School District was indeed receiving adequate services within the Supervisory Union #19. At that time part of the report recommended a five year review. The Bow School Board has evaluated its representation in Union #19 and does not see any need for further study at this time.

The Moderator declared the meeting adjourned at 7:21 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Bow qualified to vote in District affairs:

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE BOW MEMORIAL SCHOOL IN SAID DISTRICT ON THE TWENTIETH DAY OF MARCH, 1985, AT SEVEN O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING TO ACT UPON THE FOLLOWING SUBJECTS:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other Officer or Agent of the District.
2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
3. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for, and to expend on behalf of the District, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from any source including the State of New Hampshire and/or United States Government and to appropriate any funds anticipated from such sources including the State of New Hampshire and/or from the United States Government to the payment of obligations of the District for which said funds constitute full reimbursement provided such grants and/or funds do not jeopardize the local control of our school system, in accordance with RSA 198:20-B.
4. To see if the District will vote to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year and to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for this purpose.
(Recommended by the Budget Committee).
5. To see if the School District will vote to discontinue the Capital Reserve Fund originally established for school bus replacement and transfer any funds to the Bow School District General Fund in accordance with State of New Hampshire RSA 35:3 or take any other action in relation thereto.
6. To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate for the fiscal year 1985-86 the sum of One Hundred and Forty Five

Thousand, Three Hundred and Sixty Nine Dollars (\$145,369) to fund the cost items related to an increase in teachers' salaries and benefits attributable to the latest Collective Bargaining Agreement which, if funded, will be entered into by and between the School Board and the Bow Education Association, such sum of money representing the additional cost attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those obligations payable under the prior Collective Bargaining Agreement. 7. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid Fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.
8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The teachers and employees are covered under the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. The District's contribution for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the entire State Plan. Since the actuarial valuation is performed on the entire State plan the amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets for the Bow School District is not available. The District does not have an accrued liability for past service costs.

The retirement cost for 1983-84 was \$11,921.

ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements of the Bow School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1984, as listed in the accompanying table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset group of accounts results in an incomplete presentation as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund and account group financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Bow School District at June 30, 1984 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole. The combining fund and account group financial statements and supplemental schedules listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Bow School District. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined financial statements and, in our opinion is stated fairly in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Bow:

I herewith submit my 1985 Report concerning the public schools of Bow.

The 1984-85 school year is significant because pupils entering school this year will complete their college educations in the 21st century. When the technological advancements which have taken place in the last 20 years are examined, it is easy for us to be awed by the responsibility of preparing youth to live in a century that will make educational demands we can only incompletely imagine. It therefore seems appropriate to report to the citizens of Bow on the efforts being made to develop curricula that will prepare our children for life in a high tech society.

It is reasonable to speculate that there will be virtually no occupational endeavor in which individuals will not in some way need to interact with computers. We have taken a careful approach to computer education so that sound educational decisions can be made that will not be influenced by fads that come and go. We believe that it would be irresponsible to leap into huge expenditures for computers before establishing an approach that is flexible enough to accommodate the rapid technological change that is certain to take place. At the same time it is equally irresponsible to be immobilized by caution and thus fail to meet our commitment to the pupils who will be graduating in the near future and who need to be prepared for a world in which computers are playing an important role.

It is with the above mentioned considerations that all 5 districts in S.A.U. #19 are working on a computer plan that will fulfill our responsibilities to both pupils and taxpayers. The plan encompasses 5 basic steps:

1. **Identify the computer applications that will be necessary and relevant for successful entry into a high tech society.** To this end, we believe that computers will continue to be used to manage data, to perform calculations and to make the editing process in writing more efficient. All of our pupils should be given skills in at least these areas. Many other areas are being considered. Some of these include the computer as an instructor, a communications network and a simulator.
2. Once applications have been identified, **specific skills that we wish our pupils to attain will be identified.** Attached to these skills will be the grade level of instruction and the degree of mastery expected.

3. Once applications and skill expectations have been identified, **specific categories of software will be identified as those most effective in achieving stated learning objectives.**
4. Based on identified software, **hardware will be selected that can run the identified software.** Hardware that is selected may vary depending upon the software application.
5. Because implementation will be costly, the district will **establish an implementation schedule** which allows for the distribution of costs over several years while guaranteeing that priority areas for staff training and pupil instruction are implemented first.

In the process of implementation it is certain that new applications will be discussed. Each of these can be routed through the above 5 step process so that computer education in Bow will remain up to date. We believe that the above approach is a sensible one that will long serve the Bow School District. This year's budget as well as future budgets will include allocations for computer education. We look forward to your support in preparing our children for the future.

I wish to express my appreciation for the assistance and cooperation provided me by the administrators, teachers, School Board, and citizens of Bow. Without this assistance and cooperation, many of the things accomplished would have been left undone, and I look forward to another prosperous year -- a year of continued cooperation.

BOW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL/BOW MEMORIAL SCHOOL

Many exciting and challenging opportunities have taken place for our students and faculty during the past year.

Technology, in the form of computer assisted learning has been incorporated in our program of study. Presently, students in grades 2-8 are involved in a computer classroom management program in math which allows the teacher to have far better record keeping of student progress.

As students try to keep up with the advantage of computer technology, your faculty and administration have been active in learning and planning for more complete integration of computer applications within our school program. We envision this area to be an area of constant change and refinement as the technology of education changes.

During the 1983-1984 school year and for part of the summer a Language Arts Curriculum Committee comprised of faculty and administration of both schools was involved in the review and revision of a new Language Arts Curriculum for grades K-9. The new curriculum places emphasis on the master of basic skills in the areas of spelling, vocabulary, language structure, mechanics and usage, grammar, reading and literature skills, writing skills, study skills along with listening and speaking skills.

Curriculum work planned for the 1984-1985 school year will be done in Physical Education, Music and Art.

The Bow Schools have again received approval as *100% comprehensive* from the New Hampshire State Department of Education. This approval means that our schools meet all the minimum standards recommended by the state.

Our schools are fortunate in having the support and cooperation of many community groups and organizations. The Bow PTO has helped enhance our program with equipment and supply purchased, coordinating parent and citizen volunteers, sponsoring parent educational programs and helping to keep the line of communication open between the school and the community. A career awareness project was made available by the Bow Rotary Club and greatly enhanced the career education program at the middle school. Fire prevention and fire safety were taught with the cooperation of the Bow Fire Department. The Bow Police Department instructed the children in the elementary school in many areas of public and personal safety.

The Bow Schools are a very exciting place to learn for our students and a rewarding place to teach for the staff. Thank you, the citizens, for providing this fine environment.
