

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING March 11, 1941

Two Hundredth and Tenth Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, A.D. 1941 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk (Charles Wentworth), one Selectman for a term of three years (Perley I. Fitts), a Town Treasurer (George D. Stevens), a Collector of Taxes (Arthur P. Stewart), two Auditors (Harry C. Woodworth, Leroy Higgins), four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years (Kenneth E. Barraclough, T. Burr Charles, Arthur W. Johnson, Loring V. Tirrell), one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of three years (Harold W. Loveren), and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years (Frederick W. Taylor).
- 3. To raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-three hundred and nine dollars (\$2,309) to obtain State Aid on the following:

State Aid on Durham Point Road. Voted.

- 4. To raise and appropriate funds for the repair and maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges. Voted \$7,000.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for current maintenance expenses, including County taxes as required. Voted \$9,568.15.

- 6. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$166.00). Voted.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for the purchase and repair of the brick school building at Durham Point to be used as a community center under such rules and regulations as may be made by the selectmen. Petitioned by O. V. Henderson and sixty other interested people. Voted.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) for the purpose of surfacing and tarring Woodman Avenue from the residence of Dr. George G. McGregor to the Woodman Cemetery. Petitioned by S. R. Shimer and forty-one other property owners or voters. Voted.
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to accept the 77-foot right of way from Madbury Road to Strafford Avenue Extension to be developed as follows:

One road, 12 feet wide to be surfaced and tarred, running beside the properties of Mr. Robinson and Mr. Partridge and another road to be built at some future date running from Madbury Road to Strafford Avenue Extension beside the properties of Mr. Hitchcock and Mr. Davis, and the space between to be developed as a parkway, towards the expense of which the following interested property owners promise to contribute one hundred dollars or the equivalent in materials or labor. Petitioned by Matilda R. Walsh, John S. Walsh, Annie E. Partridge, Allen B. Partridge, Earl P. Robinson, Sybil F. Robinson, Elsie C. Hitchcock, L. W. Hitchcock, Bethyl C. Hennessy, William G. Hennessy, Rachel A. Martin, and Carl L. Martin. Voted.

- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) for the purpose of surfacing and tarring the accepted part of the street now designated as Strafford Avenue Extension and the roadway connecting it with Madbury Road. Petitioned by John Walsh and eleven other property owners or voters of the Town. Voted.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for the Town Officers as required by law. Voted.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. Voted.
- 13. To see if the Town will allow a discount of one per cent for prompt payment of taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1941. Voted.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. Passed a motion that the Moderator appoint a committee to study the various improvements of the Town and make recommendations to the Budget Committee.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING March 10, 1942

Two Hundredth and Eleventh Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, A.D. 1942, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years, one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of three years, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.
- 3. To raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-three hundred and thirty-one dollars (\$2,331) to obtain State Aid on the following: a. So-called Lee Hook Road, b. Durham Point Road; (see budget).
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repair and maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges. (see budget).
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for current maintenance expenses, including County taxes as required by law. (see budget).

- 6. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Association, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$166.00). (see budget).
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) for the purpose of surfacing and tarring Edgewood Road. (see budget).
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow, if necessary, not in excess of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to provide emergency fire, police, and health protection due to the war emergency. (Requested by the budget committee).
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to study the problem of locating and purchasing a location for a new town dump and closing the present town dump; and raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for purchase of new site and closing of old site. (Requested by budget committee).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gates and bars that section of the Beech Hill Road so-called starting at the property line of Waldo Sanders and running to the Lee line; also that section of road connecting this road with a piece of road in the Town of Madbury already closed.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to continue the present planning committee, and authorize the Moderator to make such appointments as are necessary to fill vacancies; and to discontinue any other committee of this nature that has been previously appointed or elected. (Requested by the planning committee).
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for the Town Officers required by law.

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.
- 14. To see if the Town will allow a discount of one per cent for prompt payment of taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1942.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

If the above reports are accurate, it is evident that the incidence of contagious diseases in Durham was extremely low during the past year. To effectively control the communicable diseases, it is necessary that they be reported immediately to the Health Officer by the physician or a member of the family. Some of the more common reportable diseases include chickenpox, diphtheria, streptococcus (septic) sore throat, German measles, mumps, pneumonia (all forms), infantile paralysis, rabies, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, undulant fever and whooping cough.

Routine work during the year included inspections of restaurants and barber shops, sanitary analysis of the town water and milk supplies, and investigation of all nuisances called to the attention of the Health Officer.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY TOWN IMPROVEMENTS

February 23, 1942.

The committee appointed, according to motion passed at the 1941 town meeting, has made the following recommendations to the board of selectmen and the budget committee.

- (1) That Edgewood road be tarred this year.
- (2) That the Beech Hill road be closed, subject to gates and bars.

The committee felt that although this year was an inappropriate time to recommend extensive town improvements, a start should be made to collect data on projects which will be needed in the future. With that in mind studies were started on items as follows: Fire and sewer line extensions, town roads, sidewalks, and water supply.

Regarding fire line extensions the following data were collected: Approximate feet of pipe needed to protect property up to and including properties named, the assessed valuation covered by the extension, and the valuation per foot of new pipe.

Madbury road, 700 ft. (Bauer property) \$44,400, \$63.00 per ft.

Bagdad road, 1100 ft. (Mayo property), \$57,800, \$53.00 per ft.

*Jenkins court, Mathes terrace, Woodman road, 1600 ft. (Sopel property), \$165,100, 103.00 per ft.

Mill road, 2400 ft. (Wm. Daniels property), \$95,800, \$68.00 per ft.

Dover road, 1700 ft. (Hildreth property), (Charles Smart property), \$67,900, \$40.00 per ft.

*A line from the corner of Garrison avenue and Madbury road to and including Woodman road, would protect the same property and be approximately the same length. This study should be continued to determine the approximate cost per foot to lay the lines on the various streets.

This committee feels that a fact-finding body should continue to serve the town and that citizens should submit their ideas on town improvements to such a committee which should investigate the cost and feasibility of the various improvements and make recommendations to the Selectmen and Budget Committee. Such a committee should have a moderate budget to conduct its investigations.

HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

January 31, 1942.

To the Town of Durham:

"How can you operate both as a public and as a university library" is a question asked rather frequently. Certainly the major functions are different, and there always exists a tendency to stress the dominant function at the expense of the other. A tendency, we should add, that we constantly guard against. The question, however, is an important one and one which deserves as complete an answer as we can give. We admit the difficulty of reporting precisely the extent to which our library is a public library serving the townspeople of Durham. These facts, we believe, indicate that we are ever mindful of our responsibilities and privileges in our role of public library.

- 1. At the close of 1941, 155 juvenile borrowers were registered and were circulating books in their own name. (No registration record is kept of children whose parents take books out for them.)
- 2. At the close of 1941, 425 adults were registered. This number includes only those registrants who are not employed by the University and also are not members of a university employee's family.
- 3. During 1941, circulation to townspeople and juveniles accounted for approximately 30 per cent of the total book circulation.
- 4. The entire sum appropriated by the town is used to buy and repair books for the children's room. During 1941, 335 new volumes were added and 102 volumes rebound.

Circulation, both to adults and juveniles, showed an increase in 1941 over 1940. The steady increase in the amount of reading done by children is particularly significant during these times. Its importance was remarked last year and the increase noted this year shows that proper ac-

Particular note must be made of the splendid work of the Durham School in achieving this important educational objective. It is a real privilege to cooperate with Mr. Clark and his colleagues. The adult circulation, too, indicates that more reading is being done—a trend which we hope will grow continuously during our times of trial. Books offer a ready means of assisting us all during the present crisis—"how to" books help improve job skills; books on current affairs, politics and geography help us keep abreast of major movements during the war; and, of course, other kinds of books offer much needed spiritual refreshment and recreation. And books provide ammunition for that next important battle after guns cease firing—winning the peace.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

1940 - 1941

To the School Board and Citizens of Durham:

I have the honor to present my thirteenth annual report. Since the school year of all school districts in the State ends on June 30, the statistics and financial reports cover the period from July 1, 1940, to June 30, 1941. My remarks refer in part to this period with comments on the work being done this school year.

The teaching force remains unchanged and Mrs. Dorothy K. Pratt of Rochester is still our School Nurse. Your teachers have all maintained a good professional spirit and all have taken lecture courses, either at New Hampshire University or elsewhere. Miss Farley and Mrs. Maxam are just completing a course of 16 lectures given at Rochester High School by Dr. Donald Durrell of the Harvard-Boston University Extension. The course was on Remedial Reading. The Superintendent also took the course and we all found it very practical and helpful.

Durham is receiving a few tuition pupils from the surrounding towns. A total of 16 were enrolled last year. Of the eighty-four (84) pupils enrolled in High School last year (see Statistical Table) seven (7) attended Newmarket High School and seventy-seven (77) Dover High School. This school year six (6) are attending at Newmarket and eighty (80) at Dover. One pupil is enrolled in Robinson Female Seminary, with a major part of her tuition paid by Durham School District. The four (4) elementary pupils for whom tuition was paid were in attendance at Newmarket. This year three (3) are attending.

Next year, by vote of the School Board, the entering age of pupils to Grade One will necessitate the child being six years of age on or before January first, 1943. For four years we have experimented with the giving of tests to those under that age and we are all agreed that the giving of the test does not produce the desired result.

Our program of instruction remains the same. In Arithmetic and Language new texts have been introduced and are proving to be an improvement over the books replaced.

All first grade pupils were given the Detroit First Grade Intelligence test early in September and grades above the third were given the Metropolitan Achievement tests. The school rated very well. Grades five and eight were tested by the Otis Group Intelligence tests. The Standard Graduation tests for the eighth grade were replaced by the Stamford Achievement tests, which had just been revised. As I write these lines the pupils are this year taking similar achievement tests, a different form from that used last year.

The law requires that handicapped children who are not able to get to school shall be taught at home. Mrs. Judith Ham is tutoring three at the present time.

I am happy to write that our dream has finally come true. There has been installed a complete Program Clock. This was done with moneys from economies elsewhere and will not cause an overdraft on the budget.

The hot lunch project as carried on last year was successful. The same procedure is used this year. Two NYA girls from the Home Economics Department of the University come each day, prepare and serve the lunch. Surplus Products from the Surplus Products Distribution help keep the cost low and the project is self supporting. Miss Muriel Day and Miss Eleanor Marston serve about fifty lunches each day.

When the present building was put into use the furniture was largely that moved from the old building. When we can find a few dollars "not otherwise expended" we recommend that the worst of this be replaced. This year we have purchased two class room tables and a teacher's desk.

The P. T. A. under the leadership of fine officers has continued the practice started last year of having a Hallowe'en party for children and as this is being written tickets are being sold for a game night. The proceeds are to go into an emergency fund and if not spent for this purpose they will be used on the school grounds. The regular work of this Association continues with monthly programs of a very worthwhile nature.

The Lions Club continued the Dental Clinic and the importance of this cannot be stressed too much. This club and the Durham School District collaborated in continuing work on the playing field which with a little more work will be a very suitable field for the youth and adults of Durham.

The University of New Hampshire has deposited a Curriculum Library at the school. This is being used by teachers and pupils of the school. It will continue to enlarge and is used by the University each summer in connection with summer school. It is the property of the University of New Hampshire.

We again call attention to the great facilities of the Hamilton-Smith Library. The Children's Room is unique in a town the size of Durham.

The American Association of University Women continue to keep certain material of a museum nature at the school and it is available to each of us.

Your School Board and the Air Raid Wardens have given of their time freely in studying and making your school auditorium as safe as possible should there be air raids. No other school in my Union has made as great an effort. No letters concerning precautions have been sent to parents from this office but those sent from the school have all had the superintendent's approval.

All of your teachers have taken first aid courses and four of them hold certificates. Your principal is a First Aid Instructor. All have had some instruction in Air Raid precautions and I hope and believe that they can all be trusted "to keep their heads" should a crisis arise. The school is indebted to Mr. Edward Donovan for accepting the appointment of Air Raid Warden. Mr. Clark is also an Air Raid Warden.

Like all other executives with authority we have been extremely busy but believe that our schools have been kept up to standard.

In conclusion. The schools are feeling the stress and strain of the times. The National Education Association, Commission on the Defense of Democracy Through Education, and a like committee of the National Association of Manufacturers, in joint meeting on December 5, 1941 adopted unanimously the following resolution which I quote, hoping that it may help you to keep your schools properly financed:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the administration and conduct of public education is an essential public service, that its reasonable financial support constitutes a necessary claim upon our American society to which other public services of lesser value should be subordinated.
