You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Exeter, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, by official ballot, and to take other action required to be inserted on said official ballot; the polls to open at eight o'clock in the forenoon and to close not earlier than eight o'clock in the evening, and thereafter to reconvene at the Exeter High School gymnasium on Monday, March 20, 1978, at seven o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of acting upon all other matters to come before the meeting.

Amend the Zoning Map of the Town of Exeter by deleting the portion of the Land Conservation District (LC) from the High St. Bridge including property known as 20 and 22 Franklin St., thence Northerly along the East side of Water St. to the Swasey Parkway as per proposed change shown on zoning map on display, and establishing in its stead a new district entitled, "Waterfront Commercial" (WC) and amend the zoning ordinance by adding to Article 4, Section 20, Schedule I, entitled "Zoning Schedule of Use Controls," a use for said new district reading as follows:

9. On Water St. side: 50 feet or five stories on river side.
 10. Any development on existing rear yard must be in conformity with the Master Plan.

and adding a new section to said ordinance, Article 6, Section 86, entitled, "Marinas, Docks and Piers," so that it reads as follows:

6.86 Marinas, Docks and Piers.

Marinas, boatyards, yacht clubs, docks, piers, wharves, floats, waterfront walkways and related development projects may be permitted by Special Exceptions which shall be granted only upon authorization by the Board of Adjustment upon compliance with the following requirements.

1. Marinas shall be designed so as to result in the least amount of alteration of water area.
2. Supporting marina facilities, such as outside winter storage yards, shall be located inland, not in the Waterfront Commercial District.
3. Pilings or cribbing are to be used to elevate marina structures rather than solid fill.
4. Pump-out facilities for boat sewage must be provided and connected to the municipal sewer, should any services be offered other than tie-ups.
5. Marinas, supporting facilities and structures shall be so designed and located to enhance and promote the Waterfront Master Plan.

and to establish a "Downtown Historic District," by adding to Article 6.72a new paragraph 6.72-1 to read:

6.72-1 Downtown Historic District

a. *Location.* The Downtown Historic District includes an area beginning at the center line of Water St. where it intersects with Main St., then runs easterly along the center line of Water St. and High St. to the intersection with Portsmouth Ave., and includes all portions of all properties with frontage on these portions of Water St. and High St. not already included in the so-called "Front St." historic district established on June 10, 1971, to a depth of 200 feet from the curb line or the rear property line, whichever comes first; and the district includes all land between Water St. and the banks of the Exeter and Squamscott Rivers, and the Exeter and Squamscott Rivers from a line connecting Jady Hill Ave. to a point on the Swasey Parkway 200 feet from its intersection with Water St., to a line 200 feet southeasterly of the High St.

bridge, including Kimball's Island; the district includes an area beginning at the intersection of Pleasant St. with High St. and running northerly along Pleasant St. and Chestnut St. to its intersection with Chestnut Hill Ave., then proceeding southwesterly along Chestnut Hill Ave. to its intersection with Water St., and including all properties with frontage on the above portions of Pleasant St. and Chestnut St. to a depth of 200 feet from the curb line or the rear property line, whichever comes first, and all property that fronts on Chestnut Hill Ave. between Chestnut St. and the easterly bank of the river to a depth of 50 feet and all properties lying between said portion of Pleasant and Chestnut Sts. and the Exeter/Squamscott Rivers. The District is intended to specifically *include* the properties from 1-35 High St., and 2-30 High St., and the properties fronting on Gilman Ln. within 200 feet of High St., the properties at No. 1 and Nos. 2-24 Franklin St., and the properties at 11-13 Chestnut St. The District is also described on an excerpt from the Exeter Tax Map entitled, "Downtown Historic District," dated Jan. 30, 1978.

- b. *Purpose.* The purpose of the Downtown Historic District is to retain the 19th century scale and atmosphere of Exeter's downtown, while permitting new construction of a size, scale and design that will be in harmony with the old.
- c. *Scale.* Story heights shall not be 10% over, or under, the average of the buildings within 100 feet on either side.
- d. *Exterior Materials.* Basic siding shall be brick, cut stone, or wooden shingle, shake or clapboard. Glazing, doors, and trim may be composed of any materials; walkways and paved yards shall be surfaced with brick or stone. An exception to the above may be made for the covering for a pedestrian walk on the waterfront side of the district.
- e. *Design.* When changes in exterior design are proposed overall design shall be in harmony with the design of neighboring properties.

1. *New Building and Structures.* Contemporary architectural treatment of new buildings is permitted, provided the result is a building which harmonizes with nearby properties of the same nature, i.e., commercial buildings should harmonize with the scale of adjacent commercial buildings, not that of important public buildings, like the Town Hall.

2. *Existing Buildings.* The exterior of existing buildings may be maintained as is. If they are remodeled it shall be to maintain or re-establish their basic appearance as of the time of construction, with the exception that larger plate glass windows may be installed in the facades at ground levels, and modern sash may be installed elsewhere in existing window openings.

3. *Marina Facilities.* Those marina facilities constructed on, or over, the water shall be of predominantly wooden construction; however, modern engineering methods and treated materials may be used.

f. *Demolition.* In order that a demolition be approved, it shall be demonstrated that:

1. The building or structure itself is of no architectural value to the district as a whole, or

2a. The building or structure itself is *structurally* unsound and the cost of renovation and repair exceeds the cost of a new structure which will meet these ordinances, of the same size and capacity on the same site, and

2b. Plans are approved, or approvable, for the proposed replacement.

g. *Signs.* No internally illuminated or plastic signs shall be permitted, except for signs required by public safety regulations.

h. *General.* The Historic District Commission shall be guided in making decisions on the appropriateness of any proposals by the above paragraphs; the Downtown Master Plan as prepared by Vision, Inc., 1974, and any subsequent modifications to the Downtown Master Plan as may be adopted by the Planning Board.

15. *Zoning Amendment #2*

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Exeter Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

Amend the Zoning Map of the Town of Exeter by rezoning a portion of Water St. in the C-1 and R-2 districts to a new district entitled "R-5 Elderly Multi Family" (as per proposed zoning map on display), and amend the zoning ordinance by adding to Article 6, Section 51, "Offstreet Parking Schedule," the following:

16. *Zoning Amendment #3*

To see if the Town will vote to reaffirm the vote of the Town at the Town Meeting which adopted a revision of the Exeter Zoning Map dated March, 1976, which revision was intended to define the boundaries between certain zoning districts to coincide with property lines and

other natural features and which revision in some instances changed the zoning districts of certain areas.

17. *Zoning Amendment #4*

To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town of Exeter Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by petition of J. Harold Carbonneau, as follows:

To see if the voters will establish a C-1 Commercial zone for the properties on the northerly side of Front St. to the rear property line, from the northwest corner of Lincoln and Front Sts., running westerly to the easterly side of the Boston & Maine Railroad right of way.

The Planning Board disapproves of this Article.

18. On petition of Vernon A. Schnare and 18 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "Shall we adopt the new provisions of RSA 72:43-b relative to expanded exemptions on real estate for the elderly, changing the basis of the exemption from the equalized assessed valuation to the actual assessed valuation?"

19. On petition of Vernon A. Schnare and 18 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "Shall we adopt the new provisions of RSA 72:43-c relative to expanded exemptions on real estate of the elderly, changing the eligibility requirement that a person may own no more than \$35,000 in assets in any kind to a requirement that a person may own no more than \$50,000 in assets of any kind?"

20. On petition of Laurence J. Gillis and 23 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system which exemption shall be in the amount of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00)."

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Million (\$3,000,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of constructing sewerage and sewage treatment facilities pursuant to the requirements contained in the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 United States Code, Chapter 26 -- entitled, "Water Pollution Control"), so as to qualify the Town

for federal funds. Of the total costs, the Town shall raise a sum not to exceed Six Hundred Thousand (\$600,000.00) Dollars by the issuance of serial bonds or notes and said sum to be paid by the State of New Hampshire with an additional Two Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$250,000.00) Dollars to be expended from town sewer reserve funds under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 33, as amended), and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other action as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interest of the Town of Exeter, N.H., and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as may become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants Section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 United States Code, Chapter 26) and pass any vote relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will authorize the construction of a public safety complex on property owned by the Town and being the premises formerly owned by William Marshall and the Court Street Market, situate at Bow and Court Sts., such complex to consist of a police and fire station, and for this purpose to appropriate the sum of One Million Fifty-Five Thousand (\$1,055,000.00) Dollars, of which the funds standing in the capital reserve fund set aside for the construction of a public safety complex in the sum of Three Hundred Sixteen Thousand (\$316,000.00) Dollars plus any accrued interest shall be expended, and the sum of Two Hundred Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$207,500.00) Dollars shall be authorized to be expended from the 1978 Federal Revenue Sharing Funds; and not more than Five Hundred Thirty-One Thousand Five Hundred (\$531,500.00) Dollars shall be raised by the issuance of serial notes or bonds of the Town under and in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act) of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, the discretion of fixing the date, maturity, interest, or discount rate, the

place of payment, the form and other details of said bonds or notes, to be delegated to the Selectmen.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to make application for and to receive and spend up to One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars of funds that may become available to the Town under "The Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of 1973" (CETA), as amended for the purpose of providing federally subsidized training and employment opportunities to benefit both residents of the community and the community-at-large.
24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all things necessary to obtain such funds as may be received under the Highway Safety Act, and in the event of receipt of funds, to authorize the expenditure thereof up to the sum of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars for the purposes received.
25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all things necessary to obtain such funds as may be received under the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency, and in the event of receipt of funds to authorize the expenditure thereof up to the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars for the purposes received.
26. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all things necessary to obtain such Federal funds as may be available through the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, and in the event of receipt of funds, to authorize the expenditure thereof up to the sum of Three Hundred Thousand (\$300,000.00) Dollars for the purposes received.
27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply, negotiate and do all things necessary to obtain such Federal or State funds or other assistance as may be available for the study of, design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system, and pass any vote relating thereto.
28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to spend a sum up to Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars anticipated to be received under the Federal Public Works Employment Act of 1976, Anti-recession Fiscal Assistance (ARFA) Funds to be used for the payment of snow removal expenses for the fiscal year 1978 and such other highway expenses, including repairs to highways, as may be consistent with the purposes and uses of ARFA funds.
29. On petition of Mary E. Rowe and 15 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to change the name of Cross Rd. to Inzenga Rd."
30. On petition of Donald P. Schultz and 39 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to petition the General Court urging it to pass legislation that would oppose the practice of Construction Work in Progress (CWIP), a device by Public Service Company of New Hampshire to pass on construction costs to the consumer in the form of higher electric rates before facilities are providing service."
31. On petition of Clifton Mix and 9 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to apply for, secure, and accept such state funds or federal funds as may be available from the State of New Hampshire Bureau of Outdoor Recreation or any other sources, and to spend therefrom up to the sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of acquiring land, easements, or water rights, in order to preserve open space and natural resources of the Town."
32. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Six Thousand (\$6,000.00) Dollars for participation in the Coastal Energy Impact Program providing the sum of Four Thousand Eight Hundred (\$4,800.00) Dollars of this amount shall be secured from the State of New Hampshire for this purpose and the sum of not more than One Thousand Two Hundred (\$1,200.00) Dollars be raised by taxes.
33. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate up to the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars for further detailing the recommenda-

tions contained in the Downtown Townscape plan of the Town with respect to that portion of the town running from Franklin St. to Swasey Parkway and bordering the Exeter and Squamscott Rivers, providing the sum of Twenty-One Thousand (\$21,000.00) Dollars of this amount shall be secured under the Federal Liveable Cities Program for this purpose, and the sum of Four Thousand (\$4,000.00) Dollars to be raised by taxes.

34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Seventy Thousand (\$70,000.00) Dollars for the repair of the town hall, providing the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand (\$35,000.00) Dollars of this amount shall be secured from the Federal Government through the National Park Service Historic Preservation Grant Aid Program for this purpose, and the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand (\$35,000.00) Dollars be raised by taxes.
35. On petition of Suzanne T. White and 10 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "Be it resolved that the Town of Exeter adopt the New Hampshire Municipal Association Guidelines for the administration of the Town of Exeter local welfare program."
36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with approval of the Selectmen, and pursuant to RSA 33:7 and 33:7-a to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of 1978 taxes, and in anticipation of any bond issue which may be voted by the Town, and to issue therefor notes of the Town payable within one (1) year after their date, and to pay or renew the same by issue of new notes payable within one (1) year after the date of the original obligation.
37. On petition of Elaine Thurston and 10 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to accept Stoneywater Rd. as a public street."
38. On petition of Frank J. Kozacka and 14 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to require that the selectmen, before disposing of real property the title to which has been acquired by tax collector's deed, first consult with the Conservation Commission, said Commission to recommend if the retention of such real property would be in the best interests of the Town as provided in RSA 80:42a, subject to final ratification of the next annual or special town meeting."
39. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new, fully equipped fire truck and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars to be paid into the same.
40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the payment of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars plus accrued interest, held in a capital reserve fund for the fire department and set aside in 1975 and 1976, into the capital reserve fund established this day for the purpose of purchasing a new, fully equipped fire truck.
41. To see if the Town will vote to fix the annual salary of the Town Treasurer at Three Thousand Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars, and to raise and appropriate an additional sum of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars above the sum budgeted therefor.
42. To see if the Town will vote to set the annual rate of compensation of the Town Clerk in lieu of statutory fees in the sum of Fourteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$14,500.00) Dollars, and to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand (\$12,000.00) Dollars for that purpose for the remainder of the ensuing year.
43. To see if the Town will vote to fix the annual salary of the Tax Collector at Eleven Thousand One Hundred (\$11,100.00) Dollars, and to raise and appropriate an additional sum of Six Hundred Seventy-Five (\$675.00) Dollars above the sum budgeted therefor.
44. On petition of Clifton Mix and 9 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Five Thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars for the use of the Conservation Commission to enable it to purchase land, easements, or water rights which it deems to be in the public interest, and in order to preserve open space and natural resources of the

Town, and to provide sites for open space and recreation."

45. On petition of Richard F. Niebling and 13 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Three Hundred Ninety (\$6,390.00) Dollars as dues for its membership in the South-eastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission."
46. On petition of John J. Adams and 10 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars for Seacoast Big Brothers/Big Sisters of New Hampshire."
47. On petition of H. Gray Funkhouser and 21 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-One and 70/100th (\$12,371.70) Dollars as a partial reimbursement to Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., for providing continued home health care services to residents of the Town."
48. On petition of Arthur Tufts and 19 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars for the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center, Inc."
49. On petition of Ethel Doe and 14 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Fifty-Six (\$3,556.00) Dollars to assist Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private, non-profit Social Service Agency. These funds are to be used for current operating expenses and to enable Rockingham Child and Family Services to continue providing individual and family counseling for residents of the Town of Exeter whether or not said residents are able to pay."
50. On petition of Nancy C. Merrill and 12 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars to be used for the support of the New Hampshire Seacoast Region Association."
51. On petition of Herman Gaulin and 9 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Eight and 80/100th (\$608.80) Dollars for the Child and Youth Project, which serves 164 children in Exeter."
52. On petition of Mary Brown and 11 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventeen Thousand Four Hundred (\$17,400.00) Dollars for the Town's participation in the expenses of the Exeter Area Youth Group Home."
53. On petition of David C. Hancock and 12 others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Seven Hundred (\$2,700.00) Dollars to defray a portion of the cost of service rendered to the citizens of Exeter by the Area Homemaker-Home Health Aide Service, Inc.
54. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars to relocate the bandstand on Front St. to an area closer to the entrance to the Town Hall by forty (40) feet.
55. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$13,500.00) Dollars to construct a bike path from the junction of Portsmouth Ave. and High St., running 1.4 miles along the north side of High St., to the Exeter Area Recreation Park.
56. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Two Hundred Thirty (\$11,230.00) Dollars for the purpose of mosquito control for the ensuing year.
57. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer to the Exeter Housing Authority the land situated on the Easterly side of Water St. and known as the "Gas Works" (the purchase of said premises by the

Town having been authorized by the 1977 Town Meeting and is now in the process of completion with funds provided and made available by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development) and to transfer such portion of additional adjoining land the Town may own which the Selectmen deem appropriate, for the purpose of securing development and construction thereon of housing for the elderly, and to authorize the Selectmen to arrange such terms for the transfer as are in the best interest of the Town, and to execute such instruments and deeds as may be necessary to carry out the purpose of this vote.

58. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of Kingston Rd., known as Rte. 111, which has been reclassified by the State of New Hampshire as a Class V highway as the result of the construction of a new section of Rte. 111 in the area of Great Hill, and authorize the selectmen to deed and convey right of way easements to abutters of said discontinued section which will permit and make available to the abutters access to the newly constructed section of Rte. 111, and to further authorize the Selectmen to delineate and define the easements.
59. On petition by J. Harold E. Carbonneau and 105 others, to see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Article: "To see if the Town will approve the use of the J. Harold E. Carbonneau resident property, located at 2 Lincoln St., to be used as a funeral home, a beauty shop, and seven apartments for the elderly and low-income persons, and furthermore, the Selectmen, all Boards and administrative agencies of the Town are hereby ordered by the Town to terminate all legal proceedings against said use, and to join, on behalf of J. Harold E. Carbonneau, in any and all legal proceedings.
60. To see if the Town will vote to receive, accept, and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Seven Thousand Five Hundred (\$207,500.00) Dollars out of the 1978 Revenue Sharing Trust Funds for the construction of the public safety complex.
61. To see if the Town will authorize the expenditure of the sum of Three Hundred Sixteen Thousand (\$316,000.00) Dollars, plus accrued interest, set aside in the Capital Reserve Fund for the construction of a public safety complex, and author-

ize the selectmen to use these funds for the construction of the public safety complex.

62. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell premises located on the West-erly side of the Newfields Rd. adjoining land now or formerly of Roger Sloan and being the premises formerly owned by Sylvia Todesco and acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed dated Aug. 14, 1969, said sale to be effected pursuant to New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 80, Section 42, I and II.
63. To see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the poor, for repairing and building bridges, for repairing and building sidewalks, for building drains and sewers, for oiling streets, for payment of the Town debts, for lighting streets, for defraying expenses of decorating the graves of soldiers, for preventing the spread of insect pests within the Town, for payment of firemen for the ensuing year, and for other charges arising within the Town.
64. To see if the Town will vote to recess the Town Meeting to reconvene at the call of the Selectmen for the purpose of taking whatever action is necessary or indicated by the Rockingham County Solid Waste Study to enable the Town to meet its solid waste disposal needs in conformity with existing laws and regulations.
65. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

For us all to see were Old Home Night, forced indoors at the Academy Cage for the first time; and the blizzards that caused over-spending of the snow-removal budget even before it was approved. The weather smiled on the dedication ceremonies for Highway's proud new Pickpocket Bridge, and on the long-awaited opening of the swimming pool. There were retirements, most notably that of our Police Chief. A new map of the town was published, and for one harried week traffic was re-routed across that map in an attempt at improvement. Our relationships with sister Exeters in England and in Canada were strengthened by the interchange of visits and gifts.

But along with all these obvious activities there was, beneath the surface, the surging power of committees — men and women giving hours of thought and work to chart out the best course for our town. Many people in many groups all coordinating their efforts — to achieve better sewage and water treatment; to eliminate mosquitoes; to effect master planning to ensure controlled growth; to provide suitable quarters for police and fire departments; to develop the downtown waterfront; to renovate and utilize the Town Hall; to afford facilities for elderly housing; to protect our green open spaces.

The list goes on, as will the results of their labor, and as do our thanks and gratitude to every person whose

dedication played a very special part in the achievement of this year past.

Town Manager

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Exeter:

The Town of Exeter ended the year with a \$132,000 surplus in spite of the high snow removal costs. Other than some unexpended revenue, balances exceeded anticipated amounts and the interest rates on tax anticipation notes was less than expected. It is recommended that so much as possible of this surplus be applied to 1978 expenditures.

Plans are being drawn for the aeration of the Sewage Lagoons in order to meet proper water quality standards. The actual construction could start in 1979.

Plans are also being drawn for reconstruction of Front St. from the railroad tracks to Little River and Portsmouth Ave. from High St. to the Stratham town line. Citizens should watch for public hearings to be announced, on both projects. One of the major problems in street reconstruction and paving projects is the refurbishing of the sewer, water and drain lines so that the street will not have to be dug up after the work is completed.

The Town Bounds were cut around the town under the Manpower

project. It is hoped this can be done more often to make it easier to locate the boundary markers.

Efforts are being made to get Federal funds to help preserve and restore the Town Hall which needs work quite badly, particularly the wiring, the columns and the cupola.

The taxpayers are facing a revaluation in 1978 and tax bills will be changed by this. The property tax is the major source of revenue for towns in New Hampshire. It is most important that valuations be kept up to date considering the substantial change in real estate values in the last few years.

I would like to extend my thanks to the Selectmen, Department Heads, Town Employees, Boards and Commissions, and Citizens of Exeter for the kindnesses extended to me during the year.

Report of Examination and Audit

The annual financial report of the Town of Exeter, New Hampshire, for the year ended December 31, 1977, is submitted herewith.

Accounting System and Reports

The Town's accounting records for general governmental operations are maintained on a modified accrual basis with revenues being recorded when received and expenditures being recorded when disbursed. Accounting records for the Town's utilities are maintained on a cash basis.

Budgetary control is maintained by recording the appropriations approved at Town Meeting in March and the encumbrances of this appropriation with selectmen warrants continued at the monthly selectmen's meeting. Selectmen warrants are examined to determine they do not exceed the appropriations. Appropriations may be reclassified within the General Fund by the selectmen.

General Governmental Functions

Exhibit A-1 is the comparative balance sheet as of December 31, 1977, 1976 and reflects the changes in accounts. Exhibit A-4, analysis of changes in fund balances, reflects the changes during the year. It discloses that the fund balance was increased by receipts in the amount of \$91,924.09. Exhibit A-3 discloses the reserve for encumbrances 1977 changed against surplus in the net amount of \$36,374.75.

From the surplus balance of \$131,891.15, \$75,000.00 is available to reduce the tax rate. The difference of \$56,891.15 represents unpaid bills and a contingency reserve.

General Fund Assets

The general assets of the Town are not inventoried and the auditors were unable to account for the control over these assets.

Auditor's Comments

Every effort should be made to inventory all the fixed assets owned by the Town. Records of the current year's additions are being submitted to the Town Manager. The accounts of the Enterprise Funds, Water and Sewer Department, are being maintained on a modified accrual basis, but reported on a cash basis. The Town should change this procedure to be completely on the accrual basis, reporting income when earned rather than merely received and disbursements when incurred rather than when disbursed.

It should be a firm policy to continually review the system of internal control over assets and funds, and to insure that all items have been accounted for. The auditors request the Town maintain all enterprise funds under complete accrual accounting for 1978. Two classifications of assets are not being reported: Fixed assets with no disclosed estimate of value; customer water and sewerage receivables, amounting to \$92,080.21 in 1977 and \$69,721.87 in 1976, less any reserve for uncollectible accounts.

Acknowledgments

I should like to express my appreciation to all members of the departments who assisted and contributed to the preparation of these statements. I should like to thank the Town Manager, Treasurer and Selectmen for their cooperation in assisting us to complete this year's audit.

Public Works

HIGHWAY

I respectfully submit the annual report for the Town of Exeter's Highway Department.

During the year 1977, there was a total of 22 storms with a total accumulation of approximately 77½ inches of snow and five freezing rain storms.

Summer maintenance consisted of spring clean up, coldpatching pot holes, manhole and catch basin repairs, sweeping of streets and sidewalks, and trimming and grooming of roadsides.

Bayberry Ln., Little Pine Ln., and Fuller Ln. were done under our Overlay Program. This year, instead of using a stone chip and seal, we used the funds for sand sealing on the badly deteriorated country roads in which we hope to finish this year. The sand sealing was done by Town forces. Through our Town Road Aid Program, the Town crews rebuilt a section of Oakland Rd.

Due to the rebuilding of the Garrison Ln. Bridge and the Pickpocket Bridge, we weren't able to do very many sidewalks.

Water and Sewer

I respectfully submit the annual report for the Town of Exeter's Water and Sewer Departments.

The year 1977 was a year of accomplishment for the departments.

Lary Ln. well was cleaned and the

pump and motor rebuilt, returning the water supply to its maximum capacity.

One of the High Service pumps at the Treatment Plant upon breakdown was redesigned and rebuilt to pump peak capacity consuming 17 percent less electrical power.

Potassium Permanganate was used for the first time this year in water treatment greatly reducing taste and odor problems associated with a surface water supply, while realizing an overall savings on other chemicals required for water treatment.

A central heating system was installed at the water treatment plant by plant personnel replacing a faulty space heater system.

Department personnel constructed 235 linear feet of 6-inch water main on Bayberry Ln. prior to road resurfacing, completing a loop water system with Rte. 88.

Department personnel also constructed 1,700 linear feet of 10-inch water main on Linden St., closing a loop system with Gary Ln., Court St. and Pine St.

Fire hydrants were repaired and replaced as necessary.

Purchase of a new sewer rodder was made and 40,000 linear feet of sewer was rodded as part of a sewer maintenance program. Catch basins were also cleaned as necessary.

This program was originally funded through a federal grant, but has since been picked up by the Town of Exeter. Sgt. Frank S. Caracciolo has been developing, coordinating and implementing this educational program aimed at enriching the study of Criminal Justice to high school students.

The goals of the program are to present to young people objective information concerning the criminal justice system, from which they can make valid decisions; to present alternatives and show young people the consequences of a criminal record; and to provide them an opportunity to interact with a police officer on a positive level. A total of approximately 400 students have been exposed to this program.

Visiting Nurse Association

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., is a Community Health Service providing health care to individuals and families in their place of residence or in ambulatory care settings for purposes of preventing disease and promoting, maintaining or restoring health or minimizing the effects of illness or disability.

The Association is a voluntary non-profit agency governed by a Board of Directors comprised of representatives from each of the towns it serves. It is often incorrectly thought to be a department of another health provider such as a hospital, but in fact is a separate and distinct organization.

Town appropriations make the services available to the town, they do not buy units of service for individuals.

The services provided by the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association are as follows:

Home Health Care. Home visits are made on referral from physicians, patients, families or other agencies. The nurse gives treatment, assists with rehabilitation, instructs designated persons in necessary care

between nursing visits, teaches good nutrition and understanding of specific diets, sickness and accident prevention. She provides health assessments, motivates patients and families to self care and independence and refers when appropriate to other agencies.

The Physical Therapist establishes and supervises a program to return the patient to maximum potential.

The Home Health Aide provides personal care to patients under the supervision of the registered nurse or physical therapist.

Maternal and Child Health Program. Home visits to new or expectant mothers are made to provide information and instruction in the care of themselves and their babies. The Child Health Conference is held twice a month providing the following services: Physicals by local pediatrician, immunizations, hearing and vision screening, lead and urine testing, PKU's, special counseling, family planning and referral when appropriate for infants and preschool children.

Adult Screening Program. Clinics held twice monthly for blood pressure and weight checks, diet and medication counseling and referrals.

Aftercare Program. Follow-up of mental health patients including those recently discharged from N.H. State Hospital. Coordination of care between patients, family, psychiatrist and community, administration of injectable meds and supervision of oral meds.

Communicable Disease Program. Home visits to patients with tuberculosis or patients who have had tuberculosis or who are contacts of patients with tuberculosis for testing and/or medication and general health supervision.

Discharge Planning. Service

provided by placing an agency nurse in a local hospital five mornings a week to assist in planning, coordinating and arranging for continuing care at home.

Eight thousand, one hundred and twenty-five units of service have been provided to the residents of the service area between Jan. 1, 1977, and Oct. 31, 1977.

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association is a Medicare and Medicaid certified agency.

Recreation and Parks

The year 1977 proved to be a very active year, both with our youth and adult activities, along with the senior citizens. Our swimming pool was open for a full twelve weeks, and was used by more than 13,000 students and adults from mid-June through Labor Day.

The tennis courts were used by many people during the spring, summer and fall including the National Junior Tennis program. Our minor league baseball program had a record number of teams, as we went from seven teams in 1976 to 11 teams in 1977. The softball league grew to 12 teams, and for the first time we had a summer competitive swim team for eight weeks. Other highlights of the year included the Jim Houston Hockey Tournament that was held in January, and the opening of our newest playground and park on Linden St. that we called Burt Park, as the land was donated for our use by the Burt family. We were able to start building a ball field and basketball court, install

playground equipment and flood part of the ballfield for skating. We had our regular yearly activities such as the summer eight-week playground program, learn-to-swim, trips, Halloween and holiday programs. We have many activities during the year, and many of these have volunteers who give hundreds of hours of their free time to help our youth and senior citizens enjoy their leisure hours. I would like to thank all who have made this department as active as it has been in the past few years. I have enjoyed my six years here in Exeter, and hope to have many more as this is my home, and my family and I are proud to be a part of such a fine community.

One of the things that we will be facing during the next 5 to 10 years is the growth that will demand more of our staff and facilities. We have made many improvements here at the Community Center to help meet this demand, and hope a few other items can be taken care of in 1978. We had storm windows installed at the center this year that should save the town money on heating oil.

We try to give you the best in leisure services through tight budgeting, some registration fees to help offset some of the expenses, and the best equipment that we can buy at competitive prices. You will find that most of our adult activities other than senior citizens are self-supporting. We are able to offer many activities through charging of fees. In looking back at the 1974 town report, we had at that time about \$24,000 in partially or fully self-supporting programs, where in 1978 we look for more than \$45,000 in revenues.

One of the fun outings of the year was the senior citizens trip to Edaville Railroad. This was one trip that I did take with the seniors last year, and one of the most enjoyable I

have ever been a part of. Some day maybe we will have our own bus, and make more of these outings available to our seniors on a monthly basis. This is one activity that many have enjoyed over the years. I would like to thank the senior citizens for their support in programs such as our toys for tots, as they have given many hours painting toys, repairing bikes, and making doll clothes to help our young people. Many times our seniors are told when they retire that they should just sit back and not get involved. Well, here at the Community Center we want them to be involved, as they have many good and interesting ideas. They come here to the center not to just play cards, but to enjoy the fellowship of others and take part in crafts and helping others.

Conservation Commission

In 1977 the Conservation Commission has been involved with its perennial projects, as well as new undertakings.

highway department. The Wilfred Moreau Nursery yielded 22 fine maples and red oaks for setting out in various regions of the town. Fall planting, however, was necessarily curtailed due to lack of personnel time for implementation of the program.

Two hundred more white spruce were set out in the lagoon area under the supervision of Mr. Robert Swasey.

Fifty black walnut and 17 hybrid chestnuts were planted in the nursery by Mr. Roger Sloan.

During the past summer three boys were made available through "Manpower" to do some weeding and cleaning, both in the nursery and Henderson-Swasey Park. It is sad to

relate that the days of the nursery seem to be numbered due to the likely pre-emption of the land for the future sewage disposal design.

As part of our education program two local teachers were sponsored at conservation seminars during the summer. In addition three Exeter students were sent to youth conservation camps. Both students and teachers gave enthusiastic reports of their experiences.

For their own self edification, Commission members attended the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Conservation Commission and the Society for the Preservation of New Hampshire Forests. Local meetings of the Sounding and Planning Boards found increasingly more Commission members in attendance. It is becoming increasingly more important for us to communicate and work with other local agencies for orderly development in Exeter.

Henderson-Swasey Park currently presents problems with supervision and maintenance. Development of the park must be done in a manner calculated to preserve much of its natural state, as well as to provide the public with another recreational area. New trails for hiking, jogging and skiing should be added toward that end. The commission is also attempting to make the environment suitable for a variety of wildlife. Mr. Clifton Mix has clear-cut three-fourths of an acre of Aspen Grove as a Grouse demonstration space. This has been suitably marked with an explanatory sign. Mr. Carl Anderson has done selective tree cutting in another region of the park which will encourage entry of deer to browse on secondary growth vegetation.

The assistance of Mr. Stanley Knowles, county forester, is being

sought to establish a plan for most efficient management of this important tract of land.

Perhaps our most significant accomplishment of the year was the implementation of a survey of Exeter's wetlands. The survey was limited to the poorly drained areas which make up some 7½ percent of Exeter's total land. The ecological importance of such wetlands is often not realized until their destruction. Mr. Glenn Coppelman, who conducted the survey, has identified, classified and objectively evaluated each of the 88 wetlands in Exeter. His report is being made available through the Southeastern Regional Planning office in Exeter. It is hoped that this information will aid in the formulation of an effective wetlands ordinance.

Our land acquisition program will receive a big boost when the Cove property transaction is completed. This prime wetland consisting of 100 acres is presently under the jurisdiction of the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. Transfer of the property will take place as soon as legal technicalities are resolved.

Any small conservational successes we may have had during the year are due to the efforts of many people. The Commission is appreciative of aid from all interested citizens in our mutual attempt to achieve a measure of harmony between man and his environment.

Planning Board

The Planning Board met 42 times during 1977. The Board's caseload consisted of 13 subdivision reviews, 13 non-residential site plan reviews and nine other matters such as perimeter surveys and boundary line changes. Forty-five residential house lots and two commercial-industrial parcels were approved; 81 additional house lots have been applied for and final approvals are pending.

As demonstrated throughout 1977, Exeter continues to experience the demands of increasing development with its concurrent costs. Growth has been occurring within the town at an average 3 percent annual rate. Growth studies undertaken during the year, as well as the experiences of surrounding towns, have taught us the consequences of unrestrained growth, including increased tax burdens and strain on essential services and natural resources. In order that Exeter avoid such a future, it is essential that growth occur in a responsible, planned manner. If Exeter is to continue to meet the many needs of its residents while retaining its unique character and sense of community, growth must be keyed to several factors, including the ability of the town to provide services, the suitability of the land for development and the resultant economic impact on the town. In enforcing a sound growth policy that reflects these concerns, we feel Exeter will remain a vital community for future generations.

An invaluable aid in the development of long-range planning policies has been the "Sounding Board," a group of some 50 citizens whose chairman is Daniel Jones. Formed a year ago, they have met on

a monthly basis to discuss various planning issues. Five subcommittees of the Board have met frequently for more intensive research.

The Open Space and Recreation subcommittee, chaired by Jack Heath, has been researching various techniques of open land preservation and resource protection. They have proposed valuable recommendations concerning open space acquisition and use.

The Soils and Wetlands subcommittee, chaired by Dan Jones, has studied the Exeter Soil Survey and the suitability of various soils for development. Several members completed a UNH soils course which aided in the group's drafting of the proposed wetlands ordinance for the town.

The Town Utilities subcommittee, chaired by Phyllis Hoddeson, has researched private waste systems as well as the capacity of the town sewage system; noting that sewer lines bring about development, their concern has been that utilities be extended in areas where development can be supported.

The Traffic subcommittee, chaired by Vern Sherman, has been considering long-range parking and transportation goals for the town and has conducted a survey of Exeter business and industry traffic patterns as well as cooperating with state studies.

The Economic Development subcommittee, chaired by Marthe Soden, has completed an extensive impact analysis of various types of residential development as well as of industry, and has surveyed Exeter's rental housing. Their concern has been that residential development, and in some cases, industry, does not pay for itself.

The Planning Board would like to express their sincere thanks to all

members of the Sounding Board who have voluntarily participated in the difficult task of planning for the rational use of our land and resources. Their ongoing involvement in the formulation of master plan policies assures a brighter future for Exeter, and is greatly appreciated. The coordination of master planning studies and Sounding Board activities has been the responsibility of Barbara Powers whose hard work and friendly manner has kept citizen interest and morale high.

The completion of the Soil Survey by the U.S. Soil Conservation Service is proving to be a valuable tool both in master planning as well as in every day responsibilities of the Planning Board. A "Wetlands Inventory," based upon the soils survey undertaken as a cooperative effort with the Conservation Commission, indicates priority protection areas.

The role of Southeastern N.H. Regional Planning Commission continues to be a vital one and their help is gratefully acknowledged.

1977 has seen several accomplishments towards improved planning policies. We have undergone a moratorium on the extension of town sewer and water services while master plan efforts are in progress. A new Downtown Commercial District is proposed as a Wetlands Ordinance. A group is currently studying potential growth control measures which we feel is a major step forward towards meeting the future intelligently.

Housing Authority

The year 1977 proved to be both busy and exciting for the Exeter Housing Authority. The Section 8 rental assistance program started to assist eligible applicants in January and continued at a rapid pace through the following months. In April, the Chairmanship of the Authority passed from Rene Valiquet to Charles Hayes and the Vice Chairmanship from Mary Shanahan to Flavia Page. The other members of the Authority wish to express their thanks to Mr. Valiquet and Mrs. Shanahan for their efforts on behalf of the Authority.

Spring showed rapid progress of the Section 8 program and the submission of an application to the Rockingham/Strafford Employment & Training Consortium for CETA Title VI Project Grant funds which was approved in June. Nancy Ray, Sandra Knowles and Linda Garrow joined the staff shortly thereafter. In early September, Ms. Ray left for another position and Roberta Butt began working with us.

September was a particularly hectic month for several reasons. Aside from the closing of the Authority's Fiscal Year, the Exeter and Newmarket Housing Authorities terminated the Administration and Management Agreement in effect between the two agencies since 1973. Each Authority will henceforth function independently with separate

administrative staffs. Ruth Joslin left Exeter to continue full-time at Newmarket after several years of service at both Authorities. The Exeter Commissioners extend to the Newmarket Housing Authority their best wishes in this endeavor.

September also saw Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) approval of the EHA's application for Conversion of the old Section 23 rental assistance program to the new Section 8 program as required by Congressional Mandate. Conversion began implementation in October and will continue into the spring. After conclusion of the Conversion procedures, all 145 subsidized units will be administered through the Section 8 program. The Commissioners extend their thanks to all landlords and tenants involved in Authority programs for their patience and cooperation during this past year.

Fall and early winter showed an increase in the Authority's efforts to explore funding possibilities for New Construction of Elderly Housing as well as other programs. Members and staff of the EHA met with Exeter Selectmen and Citizen Advisory Committee members concerning Land Acquisition and Planning for Elderly Housing funding through HUD Community Development Discretionary monies, and actual construction feasibilities at the "gas works" site between Water St. and Swasey Parkway. The Commissioners of the EHA see New Construction of Elderly Housing as one of our highest priorities and look forward to an exciting cooperative venture with Town Officials and residents toward this goal.

A special thanks is extended to the Director and staff of the Manchester Area Office of HUD for their many efforts on behalf of the

Exeter Housing Authority. The value of their expertise and assistance to our Authority is difficult to measure. Their commitment to providing service above and beyond the call of duty is greatly appreciated.

The purpose of the Exeter Housing Authority is to provide affordable, decent, safe and sanitary housing alternatives to the community. In line with this goal, we feel that 1977 has been an extremely progressive year for the Authority, and again thank all those officials, agencies and individuals who helped to make it so.

Historic District Commission

In 1977, the Exeter Historic District Commission received and approved two sign applications:

1. A change of location of sign on Wetherell-Lee House.

2. A change of lettering on sign on Mr. Gilmore's building.

In addition, the Commission approved applications for:

1. A delay in making additions to building of Mr. Russman at 14 Center St. until spring.

2. A change in the facade of the Exeter Co-operative Bank.

3. A fence on boundaries of Exeter Congregational Church Parsonage property.

4. Restoration of shutters at 76 Front St.

Although the Garrison House was not in the Historic District, members of the Commission expressed concern with the deterioration of the exterior of the building. Members of the Commission met with members of the Exeter Historical Society and then went jointly to the Board of Selectmen to see if HUD funds might be made available for part of the cost of painting and repair. It is now understood that this action resulted in approval of the program and the building will be painted in the spring.

In August, the Commission heard Town Manager Chick and Mr. Townsend explain that safety reasons were the basis of a decision to change the roof of the Town Office Building from slate to asphalt shingles.

In October, the Commission heard an informal presentation and discussion of plans for the Waterfront Commercial Area and a proposed Downtown Historic District. In December, the Commission voted to support the proposal for a Downtown Historic District and to publish notice of a Public Hearing to be held Monday, Jan. 16, 1978.

During the summer the Commission arranged for the design of five signs to mark the perimeters of the Exeter Historic District. Mrs. John MacDonald and Mr. Richard Bergeron arranged for the design of the signs and, with the assistance of Mr. Robert D. Strout and the Highway Department, the placement of the signs.

The Commission voted to subscribe to the publication "Landmark and Historic District

Commissions: National Trust for Historic Preservation."

The Commission also voted to purchase copies of the "Salem Handbook" for the use of members of the Commission.

Welfare

Like all communities, welfare in Exeter today includes many factors, such as: cash assistance, housing subsidies, medical aid, help in securing legal aid, and assistance in obtaining food stamps. Each welfare case is reviewed individually. Some cases are most deserving; others are questionable. No worthy applicant is ever denied welfare. In cases where the applicant is physically able, the work program — described in last year's report — is in effect. This program is successful, in that, it gives the taxpayer relief from the ever-increasing tax burden, and it gives the recipient a feeling of self-respect.

All information contained on the application form is strictly confidential. However, in completing an application form for welfare it is of utmost importance that the form contains accurate information. As soon as any changes occur in the recipient's status, they should be immediately reported in the Welfare Department. Such changes would include: change in family income; change in address; change in marital status; change in number of people living in the household. Failure to report these changes could lead to

paying back money the applicant is not entitled to receive, or having legal charges brought against the recipient who willfully misrepresents information.

Council on Aging

For the past four years, the Exeter Council on Aging has sought to furnish assistance to persons age

62 and over in Exeter. The subsidized taxi program now provides the seniors with up to 15,000 rides per year. We started this program with 12,000 per year, but due to the growing need for more rides, we increased that amount in 1976.

We also offer a blood pressure clinic once-a-month at St. Michael Church. The meals program, funded through the Somersworth Housing Authority, enables seniors to have hot, balanced meals several times a week. Approximately 113 meals are served here at the Community Center each week.

We had started a foot care program at the center once per month. This has been temporarily discontinued, but will resume when a new doctor is found. During the last nine months of 1977, we were engaged in updating our ID cards, using a photo on the new ones. The council will announce new 1978 activities as soon as details are finalized.

Meetings are held each month and are open to the public. The Exeter Council on Aging is a volunteer group of interested people with one goal: to help persons age 62 and over here in Exeter. We were all saddened by the death in 1977 of Edith Martlin, who was one of the original Council members and a dedicated worker. She will be greatly missed. The Council would like to extend thanks to St. Michael Church of Exeter, the town manager and board of selectmen and the news media for their help and cooperation in the year 1977.

Development Commission

To the Board of Selectmen and Citizens of the Town of Exeter:

In 1977, the Town approved a \$275,000.00 bond issue to construct the major road and sewer and water lines in the Industrial Park. The work

has been completed except for the hot top paving which will be put in in 1978.

Import Leather, Inc., of Londonderry will start construction of a 53,000 square feet warehouse in the spring. The firm, which imports leather and other material for the shoe industry, will employ about two dozen personnel. The building will be on a twelve-acre site. A Local Development Committee was formed since financing of the new building will be with the help of the Small Business Administration. The \$120,000.00 proceeds from the land will be paid \$60,000.00 by October 1 of 1978 and the balance over twenty years at 9½ percent interest. About \$50,000.00 of the \$60,000.00 will be used to install a water booster pump for fire protection in the Park.

The major goal for 1978 will be to land for development, not only for the tax base improvement but to get the income to pay the debts of the Park and reimburse the Town for as much of the Town's financial assistance as possible.

With the new building mentioned above, the Town will be receiving approximately \$70,000.00 a year in taxes from firms helped to locate in Exeter by the Exeter Development Commission.

All veterans must annually file for their exemption on the inventory. There seems to be a lot of confusion on this issue. Anyone having any questions concerning any exemption should call the Assessor's office. We have been told that there will be many changes on the Inventory this

year. Failure to file an inventory or to omit any items will result in a fine of not under \$10 or more than \$50.00. It is based on 1 percent of your assessment. Appeal rights are also lost. Since we are revaluing this year, this is an extremely important issue. We implore you to please be sure to get your inventory in on time, sign it in the proper place and make sure that all questions are answered.

Citizens Advisory Committee

The Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) is glad to submit the following report of its activities for 1977.

As described in last year's report, the town was awarded a \$246,000 grant from the Dept. of Housing and Community Development; this year, through the cooperation of town departments and committees of the CAC, implementation of this program is progressing for three projects:

a. Sewer and Storm Drain Separation — Sanborn/Myrtle Sts.

Engineering and design to accomplish this separation is now complete and town crews are expected to start construction this spring. The project will provide for additional capacity in the municipi-

pal sewer system and alleviate unhealthy conditions in this area.

b. Home Improvement Grants and Sidewalk Construction

Administered by a four-member "Grant Review Committee," \$41,000 has been contracted for to undertake necessary repairs and renovations to 26 Exeter low-to-moderate income households. Common repairs have included roofing, painting, plumbing and heating systems. Street and sidewalk repairs are scheduled for the South St. neighborhood this spring.

c. Land Acquisition and Site Preparation for Elderly Housing

The Housing Authority and Citizens Advisory Commission have long felt a need to provide housing for the elderly in a convenient location with proper amenities and service programs. This year, a subcommittee of the CAC has reviewed the feasibility of the town acquiring land on Water St. for such a purpose. A vote of the 1976 Town Meeting authorized the purchase of a site known as the 'Gas Works' owned by Northern Utilities and negotiations have proceeded so that we are hopeful transactions will take place this spring. This will enable the town to investigate sources of financial assistance and alternatives for eventual construction.

An application for 1978 funds will be developed in the near future. The CAC will hold public hearings in an effort to involve broad citizen participation in determining projects to be recommended to the selectmen for application. Input and suggestion from the public is always welcome by committee members and the Planning Department can provide information on the programs.

Of the total grant amount, \$49,500 has been spent to date. The

remaining funds will permit completion of the above projects without imposing any costs to Exeter taxpayers.

We look forward to working with the Housing Authority on the elderly housing project and appreciate their advice and cooperation.

We appreciate the efforts and support of our Town Manager and Planning Coordinator in filing the necessary applications and ongoing involvement by careful administration of these programs.

Mosquito Control Commission

The Exeter Mosquito Control Commission conducted its first full scale control program during the summer of 1977. The majority of the project centered on the treatment of stagnant water breeding areas with chemical sprays (of low toxicity to non-target organisms) known as larvicides. Although hundreds of sites were treated in this fashion, there were certain areas that demanded repeated attention throughout the summer. The worst of these prolific areas are listed below:

1. The Squamscott River saltmarsh is the single most important area of mosquito breeding in Exeter. Each flood tide initiates a new generation of salt marsh

mosquitoes, which are very aggressive manbiters. They will travel many miles, and therefore will affect the entire town. Using a combination of larviciding techniques, excellent control of breeding on the salt marsh was maintained.

2. The four sewage holding ponds are an important site of mosquito breeding because they are so rich in organic matter. These ponds were surveyed and maintained weekly until the end of the mosquito breeding season.

3. Storm drains are also an excellent source of mosquito proliferation, again due to high organic content. All storm drains were located, mapped and maintained during the season.

Although it was hoped that intensive larviciding would suffice, it was found that the rate of control was not completely adequate. The reasons for this were apparently the influx of mosquitoes from neighboring towns, and the preponderance of certain species which are inaccessible to larviciding techniques. Therefore the decision was made to purchase an adulticide spraying machine. The result of this supplemental technique was the achievement of a desirable level of control.

The program in 1978 will stress larval control and site reduction (breeding area elimination). Control of many fresh water areas will commence in early spring to deal with the spring hatch of last year's eggs. Larviciding will then be continued throughout the summer. However, adulticiding will take on a more important role in overall control efforts. Decisions to adulticide will be contingent on deficiencies in the larviciding approach from one week to the next. It is not viewed as a routine procedure at this time.

The Commission wishes to thank

everyone for their cooperation and understanding as we endeavor to control the mosquito problem.

The Old Home Night Committee is looking for new chairmen for this year. If you are interested, contact the Town Manager or Selectmen, as

arrangements must be made well in advance. We have worked on five old home nights, and will continue, but not as chairmen. We would like to extend our thanks to the Academy, the dining hall staff, townspeople, the Highway and Recreation Departments for their help with the 1977 Exeter Old Home Night.

Public Safety Complex and Building Committees

At the adjourned Town Meeting of June 6, 1977, the report and recommendations of the Public Safety Complex Committee were presented.

By vote the Town authorized the Selectmen to spend up to \$200,000 to purchase the land recommended by the Committee and to "secure design and build proposals for said complex which shall be presented for approval to the voters at the next town meeting in March, 1978."

The committee, with the help of members of both the Police and Fire Departments, prepared a careful list of space requirements with recommendations on how the spaces should be related to each other for efficient operation.

The Committee studied the further growth of the town to make sure the building would be adequate for the future. The Committee analyzed the current services provided by the

departments in the various areas of the Town.

The Committee studied various methods of construction and design and the relative costs of each. The Committee interviewed contractors and visited buildings recently constructed in other towns.

The Committee then recommended on December 8, 1977, that the Selectmen engage the architectural firm of Hughes and MacCarthy as designers and the Salter Corporation as construction managers.

The Selectmen accepted this report with its recommendations and appointed a new Building Committee.

This new committee, working again with members of the Fire and Police Departments, the architect, and the construction manager, prepared plans and sought prices.

However, at the time of this writing, final figures are not available, but it is the desire of the Building Committee that by the time of the Town Meeting the Committee will be able to make a final recommendation.

The plans as prepared have had the preliminary approval of the Selectmen, the Planning Board and the Building Inspector.
