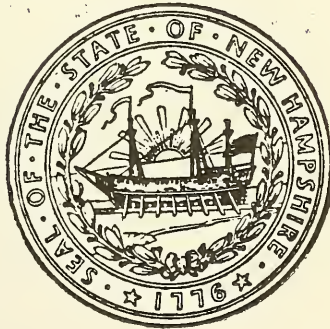

## SELECTMEN'S LETTER

This year, with 15% inflation, has been our hardest year since we have been in office to hold our budget within the limits appropriated. We want to thank all Town Officers for helping us in holding the budget down.

When gasoline prices have soared to \$1.50 per gallon it reflects higher costs on everything we buy. This year you will notice increases in the budget that we feel will be adequate but not overly spending.

We have had a meeting with the State Pollution Board in Concord concerning our open dump burning. They did not wish to give us a permit, but we stated for economic reasons beyond our control, due to this 15% inflation, we could not ask the people of Groton to increase their tax rate at this time to find an alternative, such as incinerator, as ways of disposing of their garbage. As for the future we are still burning as in the past until we are required to do otherwise.

We believe this year is a crucial year for everyone to attend the upcoming School Meeting due to a large increase in our share of payments, also new teacher contracts, and as usual new buildings that we feel they do not need.

The board of Selectmen is going to have a change this year due to Samuel Abbott not seeking re-election. As much know, except for new residents within the last four years that this present Board of Selectmen was all elected as freshmen Selectmen due to one not seeking re-election and two resignations. This does not happen very often in any town. Being three freshmen Selectmen all at one time gave us a lot of challenges we could not have met if everyone had not done his share. For this reason we sincerely regret that Sam is not seeking re-election. We wish him the very best of luck in his retirement.

We know the incoming Selectman will be most welcome and we will be looking forward to working with him or her.

**STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE  
WARRANT FOR 1981 ANNUAL MEETING OF THE  
TOWN OF GROTON**

---

To the inhabitants of the Town of Groton in the County of Grafton in said State,  
Qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at North Groton Town House in said Groton on  
Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, polls to be open at two o'clock in the af-  
ternoon until eight o'clock in the afternoon for voting on Article 1, and meeting for  
action on the remaining articles in the warrant at six o'clock in the afternoon.

**Article 1:** To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

**Article 2:** To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to  
defray Town charges for the year ensuing.

**Article 3:** To see if the Town will vote to give a two percent discount on taxes paid  
within fifteen days of the Tax Collector's mailing date.

**Article 4:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$314.53 in  
order to secure from the State the \$2,096.89 for class IV and V highways.

**Article 5:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, and authorize the  
Selectmen to place in Capital Reserve Funds as a consolidated account the  
following: a. \$2,500 for a new truck; b. \$1,000 for a new sander.

**Article 6:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$703.58  
for the support of the Pemi Baker Home Health Agency.

**Article 7:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110.00  
for the support of the Baker River Audio Visual Center, established by Federal Grant  
in 1974.

**Article 8:** To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer,  
lease, rent, sell, and convey or otherwise dispose of any real estate acquired by the  
Town by any Tax Collector's deed.

**Article 9:** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money  
in anticipation of taxes, and pay obligations of the Town.

**Article 10:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$9,500 for the  
repair and sealing of roads.

**Article 11:** To see if the Town will vote to allow the Tax Collector to accept  
prepayment of taxes.

**Article 12:** To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$14,019.12 for the  
summer and winter maintenance of highways, and to authorize the withdrawal from  
the revenue sharing fund the sum of \$3,019.12 to offset the sum, with the remaining  
\$11,000 to be raised by taxes.

**Article 13:** By Petition to see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in both taxes and spending by the State or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the state to five percent unless approved by a 2/3 vote of those present and voting of such taxing or spending authority.

**Article 14:** By Petition to see if the Town will vote the following ordinance: The Town of Groton ordains that no hazardous wastes, chemical or nuclear, shall be stored within town limits, and no hazardous waste dumps, chemical or nuclear, shall be established within town limits, without specific approval of the voters of the Town of Groton. Violation of this ordinance shall result in a fine of \$5,000.00 for each day of violation, payable to the general fund of the Town of Groton, and in addition, violators shall be physically and financially liable for cleanup of said waste. This ordinance upon passage, shall be recorded at the Grafton County Court House at Woodsville by the Selectmen.

**Article 15:** To see if the Town will vote to accept \$212.07 from the State Duncan Fund for maintenance of Class V highways.

**Article 16:** To transact any other business that may legally come before the Town.

## REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest Fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

## GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS REPORT

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To the Citizens of Grafton County:

In an effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we, the Grafton County Commissioners, are writing to you through your individual town or municipal reports.

Due to inflated Nursing Home expenses with somewhat reduced revenues and rapidly increasing costs of welfare reimbursements to the State, our budget year ended very close to the line, with a \$3,620 surplus. Because of the Delegation's decision to use a two-year surplus in one budget year to allow citizens a reduced county tax in FY 1980, the 1981 fiscal year budget resulted in a heavier tax factor making up that decrease as well as offsetting reduced revenues and allowing for standard budget increases.

As with towns the county welfare assistance programs are increasing and becoming more involved, especially with the current energy crunch and rapidly inflating economy. We also foresee a possible decrease in Federal and State contributions to social service programs which could have considerable impact on local budgets.

The sewage disposal system has progressed slightly, with planning completed and ready to go out for bid. If all goes well, we may be able to submit a final report next year.

The Commissioners worked closely with the Nursing Home Employee Council to set up a wage/benefit package more compatible to the State program for Glencliff employees. The Commissioners hope to work out a job description/wage scale plan for courthouse employees in the near future.

Grafton County is gradually converting from a bookkeeping machine system to a computerized system for all county accounts. Payroll was converted effective January 1, 1980, and vendor payment and receipt programs were recently added. Patient accounts and purchase order programs will be added later. The system is too new for comprehensive comments, but we anticipate constructive changes in the overall accounting and reporting system.

The Commissioners hold their regular meeting every Monday (except holidays) at 9:30 a.m. in the Commissioners' Office of the Grafton County Courthouse, followed by a second meeting at the Grafton County Nursing Home Complex at 1:00 p.m., which regularly includes visits to farm and jail facilities. Public and press are welcome, and, in fact, are encouraged to attend the meetings.
