HANCOCK 1980

1980 was a year of growth for Hancock, both for the town and for many of its individuals. The events remembered here are but a small cross-section of the life of our town.

Cold, clear days produced ice for some of the best skating in years on Norway Pond, with as many as 80 skaters counted on one January afternoon.

The Rev. Hollis Hastings was installed as the new minister of the Church in January, and he and his wife, Marjorie, were welcomed to their new home at the parsonage on School Street.

The library, a vital part of our town, continued to receive gifts of books and magazines. Figures compiled for the year revealed circulation increased from 14,788 in 1978 to 16,084 the next year. Sally Hamilton continued to arrange for a variety of art exhibits monthly throughout the year. And, a "Friends of the Library" group was formed in November.

Dorothy Schroeffer was named consultant in Title I (ESEA) with the N.H. State Dept. of Education. In her new position she helps school districts with programs for educationally disadvantaged children. Daughter Nancy toured Moscow in February, one part of her experience as an ICYE exchange student in Finland.

Sheilia Adams and Sarah Weston Hutchins agreed to head up a committee to compile a genealogy for the new Town History.

At age 97, Earl Otis, Hancock's oldest citizen, and Dorothy Robertson were married on Saturday, February 16.

The Depot Committee continued to sponsor fund raising events to bring them closer to their goal of restoring the old train depot. This year's project was the replacement of the old roof with cedar wood shingles. In July, a full house heard pianist Aleck Karis perform an all-Chopin benefit concert for the fund.

Two long-time Hancock residents celebrated birthdays — Bessie Hanson her 86th in February and T. Bertram Manning his 89th in May.

The Village Farm house, built sometime around the 1790s, was restored by Dick and Janet Quinn. The son of former owner Joe Quinn also reopened the cider mill and farm stand in the fall.

A sugar maple tree at Mathewson's Brooks' Side Farm was proclaimed the largest in the state and second largest in the nation by the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests. The giant tree, measured by Philip and Mark Mathewson for a contest sponsored by the Harris Center, is 18'6" in circumference, is 94' high and has a crown spread of 60'5".

Harold and Myrtle Colburn celebrated their 50th year of marriage at a surprise dinner party.

A fire house building committee was appointed and several special town meetings were held before voters approved nearly \$150,000 for a new fire station on the Bennington Road.

The 12th annual town litter clean-up, sponsored by the Conservation Commission, was held in early May. Little League coaches Almon Senechal and Christopher Joseph signed up players for another season of baseball that same afternoon.

In May, former Hancock resident Barry Cass was ordained into the ministry at the United Church in Penacook.

The Woman's Club held a fashion show to help fund their community needs projects.

Hancock Girl Scouts participated in a "discovery week-end" in Portsmouth, along with leaders Elaine Paquette and Helene Wardman.

A 36 piece group from the Pease Air Force Band played for the Memorial Day Parade.

Children at the Elementary School held an "Honor America Day" in late May at the suggestion of James Newcomb. The day was a culmination of activities done over several weeks to teach children about this nation. In December, sixth grader Rebecca Millman became editor of the school newspaper, *The Hancock Headliner*.

In June, a plexiglass bottom prototype boat built for the U.S. Navy was launched for a trial run on Norway Pond by designer John Roper and builders John Hitchcock and Robert Kierstead.

Young and old alike made contributions to the energy-saving cause. Randy St. John, a fifth grader, created an award winning collage for Public Service Company's energy-saving poster contest. Frank Bramley received a \$100 grant from the U.S. Dept. of Energy for his energy-saving thermostat which he designed for occasional-use buildings.

Self-taught Hancock woodmaker, David Huntington, earned a trip to California in July for a seminar with one of the world's greatest craftsmen, James Krenov.

Two brothers, Thomas and Herbert Bamford, purchased the former Milford Inn, now named the Beached Whale.

In July Kelly Brown achieved the highest proficiency level available in the U.S. Pony Club — an A level, representing the top 1% of the membership.

The completed Hancock Quilt, depicting local landmarks, was displayed on Old Home Day. The Historical Society put out a folder commemorating the quilt with a color photograph and a diagram identifying the pictorial squares, their contributors and a list of the quilters. "Miss Piggy" assisted the Woman's Club in copping the grand prize in the parade for their portrayal of women through the ages.

Local youths assisted Hancock Police in recovering American flags stolen from the Hancock Cash Market and the Common in September.

Over 50 residents met to discuss the Juggernaut reservoir supply situation at a public hearing in late September. Compliance with state and federal regulations for open water supplies requires constant monitoring, they were told. A committee to assist the water commissioners was appointed.

In September, Mary C. Peabody died at her Valley Farm home. Mrs. Peabody, who worked tirelessly for those principles in which she believed, will long be remembered for her efforts on behalf of school prayer in Hancock, her contributions to the revival of a fireworks display on July 4 and, most recently, the Farm Fair in July and the Harvest Festival in November.

Enrollment in the Cooperative Preschool for four and five year olds increased substantially. Joyce Stevens of Hancock was hired to assist teacher Gail Novotny. And in October, a nursery school for three and four year olds was opened by Pamela Dalhaus and Constance Butson.

The Church held a retreat in October at the Cathedral of the Pines. The theme — "Making Christian Ethical Decisions."

Many Hancock people are turning to home occupations for both income and satisfaction. Variances for nearly a dozen home occupations were granted by the Board of Adjustment.

In October, the Men's Club, organized in 1956, was dissolved because of lack of interest.

Sargent Camp began rebuilding a new lodge to replace the one which burned in December 1979.

A Halloween party, sponsored by the Youth Group, drew over 100 people.

Richard Amidon was elected Representative to the General Court in November. The Guild sponsored the traditional Election Day Fair.

The Fire Department used their annual lottery proceeds to purchase and convert a used ambulance into a rescue and equipment truck for the town.

A 30-year-old Hancock woman, Donna Coughlan, escaped by helicopter from the Las Vegas MGM Grand Hotel fire which claimed nearly 90 lives in November.

Christopher Barnes of Middle Road was approved as the new Director of the MacDowell Colony.

In December, 12-year-old Cheryl Cass successfully underwent surgery at Mary Hitchcock for a tumor on one of the vertebrae, discovered incidentally because of a cheerleading injury.

The town was honored to present "On That Night", a story by Elizabeth Yates, at the community Christmas Eve pageant. A second service at 10 p.m. introduced the recently organized group of hand bellringers, directed by George Dechert. The bells were given in memory of his late wife, Ruth.

The year ended, as it has begun, with a town party. Many townpeople this year will celebrate the new year's arrival at a party sponsored by the Fire Dept. in the new fire station.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Town of Hancock's growth rate slowed as construction everywhere was down. The interest rates being so high few people were building. This high rate affected the cost of the town borrowing. However, your Board of Selectmen, for the first time, invested in high interest short term notes, thus realizing about \$2,000 income to help the cost.

The highway department enjoyed their first full year in their new building. They have been making inside improvements and are able to do many of the repairs themselves saving many labor costs.

The Town water department has many problems in trying to implement the clean water act in Hancock. We have an extremely nice reservoir and we believe it can be used. We have a committee making a complete study of our system. Bud Adams has completed a ten year project of clearing the hardwoods which were dropping their leaves in the water.

The Town voted a fire study committee to develop plans, find location, and oversee construction of a new fire house. The committee worked very hard and came back to the Town with plans and, later, for approval, which they received overwhelmingly. Now the Town has a very fine facility set on a location at the approach to the landfill. This was purchased land from Elijah West to combine with land already owned by Hancock.

The tax burden gets more demanding on Hancock as the income, being affected by the State tax distribution, leaves Hancock with small increases. Construction is down, interest rates up and very little increase in state tax income makes a challenge to us all to keep the services and operation of town government at the high quality we are used to.

With the growth of the town there is more demand on all the committees and services required from departments. These require more and more time from the members of the many boards and committees. We extend special thanks to town officials, town employees, volunteers, appointees and all citizens taking an active interest in town affairs, for all their help to the selectmen.

SUMMARY OF MINUTES OF 1980 TOWN MEETING

Article 1: Harry Casler and Parker Starratt were elected as auditors for the ensuing year. Donald Lancey was elected as sexton for the ensuing year.

Article 2: The Town accepted the amended budget in the amount of \$293,570 for estimated expenses, and the necessary sums for County Tax, deduct the revenues and credits and raise the balance by taxation.

Article 3: Ballot Vote: Yes — 142; No — 78.

Article 4: The town accepted the sum of \$11,301.60 in Municipal Highway Subsidy funds for work on Longview Road.

Article 5: The town voted the withdrawal of \$5,661 from Revenue Sharing Funds for town office equipment, building repairs and an offset against the highway maintenance account.

Article 6: The town voted \$1,138.37 supplemented by \$7,589.16 from the State for Town Road Aid Program.

Article 7: The town voted \$3,500 for the purchase of a chipper for the Highway Dept.

Article 8: The town voted \$2,981 for the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Assoc.

Article 9: The town authorized the Moderator to appoint a 5-member building committee to evaluate alternative sites and structures for a new fire station and raised \$1,500 for committee expenses. The committee to report their findings at a reconvened Town Meeting.

Article 10: The town voted against joining the Southwestern N.H. Regional Planning Commission.

Article 11: The town voted \$1,000 for the Library Improvement Reserve Fund.

Article 12: The town voted \$520 for the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

Article 13: The town voted \$271 for the Monadnock Region Association.

Article 14: The town voted \$200 for the purchase of property for conservation by the Conservation Commission.

Article 15: The town voted to have a genealogy of Hancock families compiled and published as a companion volume to the **Second Hundred Years**.

Article 16: The town authorized the Selectmen to appoint a Genealogy Committee and to appropriate the proceeds of the sales of the new town history, the **Second Hundred Years**, **The Prelude** and the large maps for the use of the committee in preparing and publishing the genealogy.

Article 17: The town voted to discontinue the short road between Longview Road and Shady Lane.

Article 18: The town designated as a scenic road the part of King's Highway from the Old Dublin Road to the beginning of the hardtop at Hunt's Pond.

Article 19: The town designated as a scenic road the Old Dublin Road from Main Street to the Harrisville line.

Article 20: The town designated as a scenic road the Nelson Road from the Old Dublin Road to Route 137.

Article 21: The town voted to prohibit the storage of radioactive materials and dumping of radioactive waste from nuclear power facilities within the town lines of Hancock.

Article 22: The town failed to pass a request to prohibit the transportation of radioactive materials and radioactive waste from nuclear power facilities across Hancock town lines.

Article 23: The town authorized the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 24: The town voted to accept Cemetery trust funds of Paul and Marion Black, Joseph and Penny English and John S. duMont; Library gifts in memory of M. Louise Stearns and Dr. Richard Eustis.

Article 25: The town voted to accept the reports of the auditors and committees as printed in the Town Report.

Article 26: The town voted to accept the following resolutions: to Catherine Moore as a supervisor of the checklist for the past fifteen years; to Marian Harrington as School Board Representative for the past nine years; to Edward Wells as Library Trustee for the past several years.

It was asked if the lights on the outside of the Town Hall could be on once again during the evening hours.

The need for a light at the entrance to the fire station was questioned. It was noted this move has been voted down in the past.

The RECESSED TOWN MEETING: voted to authorize the Fire Station Building Committee to proceed with writing final specifications and obtaining firm price quotations for a fire station to be located west of Highway 137 on town-owned land and land currently owned by Elijah West. Also to develop total costs for the acquisition of the land from Elijah West and all other costs related to construction of the fire station at the said location and to report back to a meeting in August. Final approval and raising or borrowing of funds will be voted at that time.

SPECIAL TOWN MEETING: The town voted to authorize the Selectmen to acquire the Elijah J. West land and to contract for the erection of a new fire station. And, further, to authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sum not to exceed \$150,000 for the project. Ballot Vote: Yes — 94; No — 5.

TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next at 10 of the clock in the forenoon for ballot voting of Town Officers and all other matters requiring ballot vote; and, to meet at said Town Hall in said Hancock on Saturday, the 14th day of March next at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Change from the Residential District to the Rural and Agricultural District an area on Forest Road and Duncan Road between the public utility right of way and points 600 feet from the intersection of Forest and Duncan Roads.
4. To see if the Town is in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: Change from the Residential District to the Rural and Agricultural District an area on Antrim Road and Norway Hill Road extending northerly and easterly from the intersection of those roads.
5. To see if the Town is in favor of amending the Solar Energy Exemption, dated March 1976, to increase the exemption from 75% to 100%.
6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, the sum of ten thousand four hundred and twenty-four dollars (\$10,424) for repairs and improvements to Town Buildings, or take any other action relating thereto.
7. To see if the Town will accept and appropriate the sum of ten thousand and eighty-nine dollars and twenty-six cents (\$10,089.26) in increased Municipal Highway Subsidy Funds. This sum to be expended for reconstruction work on Middle Hancock Road, or take any other action relating thereto.
8. To see if the Town of Hancock, N.H. will raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand seven hundred forty-eight dollars and thirty-two cents (\$3,748.32) to support the services of the Monadnock Community Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. This local request for financial support is based on a \$2.74 per capita formula, or take any other action relating thereto.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) as the Town's share of reconstructing the driveway in front of the Town Hall, or take any other action relating thereto.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand one hundred twenty-six dollars and fifty-four cents (\$1,126.54) to be supplemented by seven thousand five hundred ten dollars and twenty-four cents (\$7,510.24) from the State for the Town Road Aid Program for this year, or take any other action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for the Library Improvement Reserve Fund. This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Library Trustees or to be added to by gifts of money, or take any other action relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town of Hancock will vote to join the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission as provided for in New Hampshire RSA 36:45, and appropriate the sum of nine hundred fifty-two dollars (\$952) as its membership assessment, or take any other action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred ninety-four dollars and fifty cents (\$594.50) to support the mental health program of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, or take any other action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for the purchase of property for conservation by the Conservation Commission. This sum to be allowed to accumulate from year to year or to be expended by the Commission, or take any other action relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) for the support of the Monadnock Region Association, or take any other action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to accept one rescue vehicle and other equipment from the Hancock Fire Department, or take any other action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a portion of the Old Nelson Road which separates lots no. 42 and 43 on Tax Map R-3 of the Hancock Property Tax Map, or take any other action relating thereto.

18. To see if the Town will vote to petition the Representatives and Senators who represent the Town in the General Court to support in the current session of the General Court, the concurrent resolution to amend the State Constitution to limit the annual increase in both taxes and spending by the State or any city, town, or other governmental unit of the State to five percent unless approved by a 2/3 vote of those present and voting of such taxing or spending authority, or take any other action relating thereto. (By petition)

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any other action relating thereto.

20. To see if the Town will accept gifts and legacies left in trust for the Town, or take any other action relating thereto.

21. To hear the reports of auditors and committees heretofore chosen or take any other action relating thereto.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of Arthur Tremblay, Tax Collector of the Town of Hancock, which was made by this Division under the provisions of R.S.A. 41:36. The examination covered the period from January 1, 1980 to March 1, 1980.

One of the enclosed audit reports must be given to the Town Clerk to be retained as part of the permanent Town records.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as were considered necessary in the circumstances.

GENERAL COMMENTS

During the course of our audit for the period from January 1, 1980 to March 1, 1980 we noted that not all procedures were complied with regarding the tax sales held in fiscal year 1979.

The Tax Collector did not notify the registry of deeds of the properties sold at tax sale and it is unknown if the registry was notified of payments before sale.

The Tax Collector's record of tax sale also did not agree with the list of properties for which he requested payment from the Town Treasurer.

In this report we have used as unredeemed taxes for levy of 1978 the list as submitted to the Town.

CONCLUSION

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that the auditor's summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

HANCOCK WATER DEPARTMENT

The engineering firm of DuBois and King, in their Juggernaut Pond Safe Yield report, indicated that the present reservoir would provide the water supply needs for the Town of Hancock for at least the next 20 years. However, the State Water Commission has directed that all public water systems provide full and complete treatment for surface supplies or replace it with a groundwater source.

In June Selectman John Roper and Water Commissioners Peter Moore and Wayne Fisher met with members of the State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission in Concord to show cause why the Hancock Water Works should not be directed to, either, provide full treatment for Juggernaut Pond, or to develop groundwater sources and abandon our surface supply. Based on this meeting, a compliance schedule was set up to:

- a.) explore groundwater by July 1, 1982.
- b.) design of pumping facilities with storage, if necessary, by October 1, 1984.
- c.) construction of these facilities, if necessary, by January 1, 1988.

In September the Water Commissioners held an open meeting in the Town Hall to discuss this and other matters and to get some input from the townspeople as to what they think would be the best course of action to upgrade our water system. The general consensus was that we have a good water source in Juggernaut and maybe we could improve our system, so it would meet state and federal safe drinking water standards, without constructing an expensive water treatment plant, for which there are no federal funds presently available. Out of this meeting, a five member committee was appointed to assist the Water Commissioners in a thorough study of the present function and quality of Hancocks water system and our necessity to comply with the many water quality laws and regulations set forth in the Safe Drinking Water Act of 1977.

Robert Strombeck continues to take care of the chlorinator station and is now required to monitor turbidity (water clarity) on a daily basis. He has been certified, along with Robert Fogg, as a treatment plant operator, under the grandfather clause.

Signs have been installed around the reservoir posting it as a "Public Water Supply."

The water level was down in September, due to the dry summer, but melting snow and spring rains should bring the level back to normal.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

We were fortunate that Fran Russ, with her wealth of library experience and intimate knowledge of the Hancock library, was available as a substitute throughout the summer. Laurie Hayes, who had previously spent many hours of voluntary service and was therefore familiar with library procedures, came after school hours and Saturday afternoons to work until she left for camp in June.

We are also grateful for the host of volunteers who took over for the summer the task of checking books in and out at the front desk, thus releasing the librarian on duty for other tasks. A sign-up sheet on the desk was soon filled and visitors to the library never knew which of many smiling faces would greet them as they entered. The volunteer system has proved so helpful that the trustees decided to continue it indefinitely.

It was a stroke of good fortune for all concerned that Icy Lent and Marge

Hastings became interested in the Hancock library and applied for the two vacancies. Two more capable and talented librarians would be hard to find. In July the trustees appointed Icy to the position of associate librarian and Marge to that of children's librarian. They started their regular duties in September and also traveled weekly to Keene for a ten week course in Library Techniques. Both are hard at work putting their newly acquired knowledge to good and helpful use.

Sally Hamilton continues to arrange for art exhibits to adorn the walls of our two front rooms. Visitors are attracted to the library by these exhibitions of largely Hancock and Monadnock Region talent. We thank Sally and the many gifted people who share their handiwork and hobbies with us both on the walls and in the display case.

Frances Russ has faithfully kept the Hancock library in the local news with her excellent bits of library happenings, new books, and other items of interest.

Special thanks also are due Larry Hayes and the entire Hayes family for always being ready to help when there's a need. Whether it's to carry a load of books, repair the record player or start a "Friends of the Library" organization we can depend on Larry to be willing and able.

We are grateful too for the many good friends who donate books and magazines for library use and for the annual Old Home Day Sale, as well as for the many people who came to carry out materials, set up tables, and become salesmen on Old Home Day. In 1980 our sale was especially blessed with Elsie Frank and Harriet Hampson in their accustomed places looking happy and well. Everyone is glad that Elsie and Harriet have recovered from their operations and are maintaining their interest in the library. At present Elsie is working every Saturday; Harriet is a frequent substitute, both are among the library volunteers and both are serving on the Book Selection Committee.

So many good friends have remembered the library during the past year with gifts of money and books that to give each of them individual credit in this brief report would fill an extra page or two. We truly appreciate each and every one. There are, however, a few that deserve special mention.

Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Seeman presented the library with a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica and all the year books through 1979, a valuable addition to our research area.

From Hope Pettegrew the library received a one year subscription to COBBLESTONE, a new history magazine for children. Hope is an editor of this publication as well as one of its founders.

Recent visitors to the library have been charmed with the beauty of the white Italian marble bust of a young girl reading a book which now graces the fireplace mantel. Our sincere thanks go to Lois Daloz who chose the library as an appropriate home for this treasured possession of her mother's.

It is a pleasure to report that as the Hancock Town Library faces a new year we have among our trustees, librarians, volunteers, and patrons kept our tried and true friends and added some delightful new ones.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The following information is provided to make Board procedures more understandable to the general public and particularly to those who may make appeals. By law, the responsibility for correct preparation of the application and presentation at the public hearing rests with the applicant.

The Board of Adjustment is one of four functions required in a system of zoning. The Planning Board has the primary responsibility for proposing the ordinance and any amendments. The Town Voters, at the annual Town Meeting, enact and amend the zoning ordinance. The Selectmen, through the Building Inspector, enforce the ordinance. The Board of Adjustment hears appeals and administers special provisions of the ordinance. Each of these components has its own functions and may not perform those of any other group. As an example, The Board of Adjustment may not do anything which would have the effect of changing or amending the ordinance.

Most of the work done by the Board of Adjustment consists of hearing two types of appeals. The first type is the Exception. When the ordinance specifically provides for Exceptions, the Board must decide if they apply in a particular situation and if so, assure that provisions made by the voters are applied. Only the voters can establish Exceptions and related conditions. As an example, the Town permits light industry in the rural and agricultural zone under special conditions.

The other type of appeal is a Variance which is a relaxation of the strict interpretation of the ordinance if certain conditions are present. These conditions are quite specific but do allow for Board judgement. In exercising this judgement, however, the Board must be particularly careful not to violate the spirit and intent of the ordinance.

State law determines the manner in which appeals are to be handled and also provides guidelines for all Board action. Townspeople wishing to make either type of appeal should become acquainted with these rules and with the ordinance before applying. Board members are always willing to discuss these matters prior to any formal application and to supply relevant information. Once formal application is made, however, the Board must balance the request of the applicant with the wishes of the voters as expressed by the zoning ordinance.
