

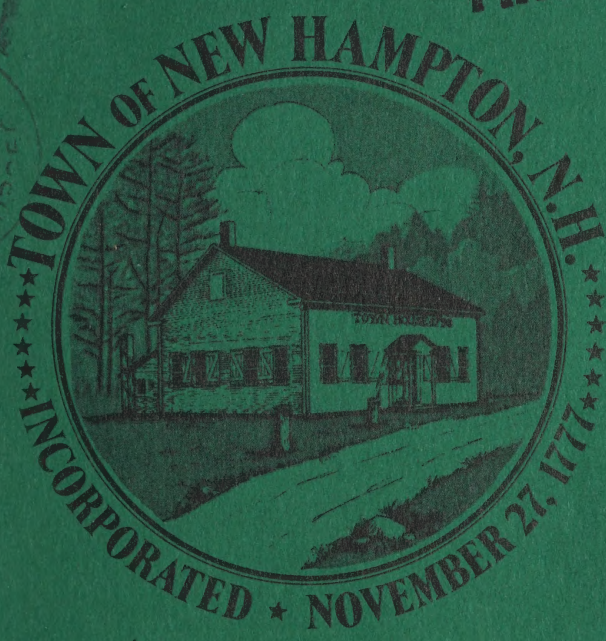

Record of Annual Town Meeting

New Hampton

March 9, 1982

Moderator Alden Hofling opened the meeting at 10 AM. To the inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton, New Hampshire in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in Town affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Hampton Town House on Tuesday, the ninth of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town officers and for questions required by law to be upon the ballot. Polls to close not later than 6:00 PM.

ARTICLE #1 was read by the moderator;

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-B and 43-C for expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, \$10,000 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of the value specified in RSA 72:43-cIII; provided that the exemptions shall be based upon the assessed value of the real estate? (By Petition)

Article #1 was accepted by a vote of 292 yes to 59 no.

There are 767 legal voters on the checklist 378 voted, approximately 49%. We are doing pretty good but I hope for a 75% vote in November.

Ballot clerks for this meeting were Patricia Torsey - Hope Clement - Ralph Ness - Katherine Seavey - Ralph Huckins - Barbara Chase - Herman Chase - Jeanette Hahn - Leon Torsey - Richard Hallberg - Marjory Hallberg - and Chester Butcher. Leon Torsey - Katherine Seavey - Ralph Huckins were the callers.

During the meeting a food sale was sponsored by the Women's Club, chaired by Mrs. Edith Youst. The food was donated by members and friends of the Women's Club. Barbara Shaw - Ann Chase - Annie Rice - Janice Seufert - Lillian McCrisis and Dorothy Noakes shared the responsibility of this very successful sale. The money raised is for the Girls State Fund

which the Women's Club sponsors. Barbara Piper was the recipient last summer. She will be speaking next Tuesday at the Women's Club Meeting.

March 13, 1982

Moderator Alden Hofling opened the recessed Town Meeting of the Town of New Hampton at 10 AM Saturday March 13, 1982 at the New Hampton Town Hall.

New Hampton Junior Troop #123 and Brownie Troop #79 then Trooped the Colors and led in the Salute to the Flag. Reverend Roger Cleveland gave the invocation. America was then sung in unison.

Those who performed this ceremony under the leadership of Joyce Marinace were Catie Stephenson - Sarah Maineri - Margaret Marinace - Sarah Rice - Beth Blake and Heather Anderson with Brownie Troop #79 represented by Allison Anderson.

Moderator read Article #2 of the Warrant;

Article #2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

William Clement made motion to raise \$88,725.00 2nd by Richard Hallberg.

Discussion: During discussion Bernard Smith wanted to amend article \$300. for 4 tables for use in Town Hall. 2nd by Chester Butcher. Willis Ober and Elaine Seaver reminded him that there was \$1000. for repairs etc. Mr. Smith withdrew motion.

Willis Ober wanted breakdown of legal expenses on page 47 of the Town report especially the Rivendell School. Chester Butcher explained the first year responsibility of the Town for Juveniles in group homes. Remarks by Joe Powers Sr. on covering of dump expense and Larry Blood on money in contingency fund were answered by William Clement.

Moderator reread article #2.

A unanimous aye vote was accepted. Article #2 was accepted.

Article #3 was read by moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$82,000. for the construction or purchase of a Town office building, including acquisition of land for the site, and to raise the sum by borrowing on the credit of the Town under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act as amended and - or bonding, and to take any other action relating thereto.

The article was amended by Mr. Clement to read;

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to contract for or purchase a Town office building, including acquisition of land for the site and to raise the sum not to exceed \$82,000.00 by borrowing on the credit of the Town under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, as amended and or bonding, and to appropriate \$16,400.00 for the principal and interest payment for one year, and to take any other action relating thereto.

2nd by Richard Hallberg.

After a long discussion the Moderator brought article to a vote by a paper ballot.

117 votes cast (75 yes) (42 no) necessary $\frac{2}{3}$ vote 78. Article #3 was defeated.

Article #4 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the rental of a building for Town office space provided that Article #3 is defeated.

Article was moved by William Clement and 2nd by Richard Hallberg.

Discussion: Bernard Smith amended article to read; "I move to appropriate the sum of \$16,500.00 be placed in Capital Reserve Fund for purchase and construction of a Town Office building. 2nd by Mr. Athanas.

Discussion; Moderator put amended article to vote and it was passed unanimously.

The Town Clerk was instructed to record vote as such.

Article #4 as amended was accepted.

Article #5 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund for a new fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

Article moved by William Clement, 2nd by Richard Hallbert.

Discussion; After discussion Moderator put article to vote. Unanimous aye vote.

Article #5 was accepted.

Article #6 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,398.00 for the purchase of a new Police cruiser, to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund, and authorize the Selectmen to

sell outright the present cruiser.

Article #6 was moved by Herman Chase, 2nd by William Clement.

Discussion; Chester Butcher presented 4 proposals. Buick front wheel drive Gas and Diesel, Ford LTD rear wheel drive gas, and Chevrolet Blazer 4 wheel drive diesel. After heated discussion article was reread by Moderator and put to vote.

Article #6 was accepted.

Article #7 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 for the purchase of a new mobile two way radio and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

William Clement moved article, and it was 2nd by Richard Hallberg. Chester Butcher made motion to put article on table. Moderator put it to a vote and article was tabled.

Article #8 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the maintenance and repair of Town Bridges and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

Article was moved by William Clement and 2nd by Herman Chase.

Discussion: The Ames Brook Bridge, on Oxbow Road, Fish Brook Bridge, and the bridge on Coolidge Woods Road were the ones under discussion.

Moderator reread article and put it to a vote.

Article #8 was accepted.

Article #9 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500.00 for the support of the Fire Department.

Moved by Richard Hallberg and 2nd by William Clement.

Discussion: Joe Powers Sr. said monies to be used to replace old equip-

ment plus small increase in equipment.

Moderator reread article and it was put to a vote.

Article #9 was accepted.

Article #10 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$43,205.00 for the support of the Police Department.

Moved by Herman Chase and 2nd by Richard Hallberg.

Discussion: Suggested that police spend more time on Town roads than on State Highways.

Article reread by Moderator and put to vote.

Article #10 was accepted.

Article #11 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80,000.00 for the support of the Highway Department, such sum is exclusive of an estimated \$19,122.81 from highway subsidies, \$7,551.86 from the Duncan Fund, \$9,006.48 TRA Funds and an unused amount of \$18,996.20 of State Funds, making the State amounts a total of \$54,677.35.

Article was moved by William Clement 2nd by Richard Hallberg.

Discussion: Moved to raise sum by \$10,000.00 voted on and accepted.

Article reread as amended by Moderator and put to vote.

Article #11 was accepted.

Article #12 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,174.76 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$7,831.72 for a total of \$9,006.48 in joint funds.

Moved by William Clement and 2nd by Richard Hallberg.

Discussion: Moderator reread article and put it to a vote.

Article #12 was accepted.

Article #13 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the care of cemeteries.

Moved by Richard Hallberg 2nd by Herman Chase.

Discussion; Article reread by Moderator and put to a vote.

Article #13 was accepted.

Article #14 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for Patriotic purposes.

Moved by William Clement, 2nd by Richard Hallberg.

Discussion; Article reread by Moderator and put to vote.

Article #14 was accepted.

Article #15 was read by the Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7609.00 for Regional Associations: NANA \$4000.00; Bristol Community Center \$920.00; Community Action Program \$1818.00; Lakes Region Planning Commission \$871.00.

Moved by Herman Chase, 2nd by William Clement.

Discussion; Article reread by Moderator and put to vote.

Article #15 was accepted.

Article #16 read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the Lakes Region General Hospital, The Franklin Regional Hospital, The Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, and the Sceva Spear Memorial Hospital (By Petition).

Moved by Charles Joyce, 2nd by Leon Torsey.

Discussion. Moderator reread Article and put it to a vote.

Article #16 was defeated.

Article #17 was read by the Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of the New Hampton Kindergarten (By request).

Moved by Hope Clement. 2nd by Mrs. Athanas.

Discussion. Article #17 reread by Moderator and put to vote.

Article #17 was accepted.

Article #18 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State Funds which may be made available during 1982. Further to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purposes designated with applicable Federal and State regulations.

Moved by William Clement, 2nd by Herman Chase.

Discussion. Article reread by Moderator and put to vote.

Article #18 was accepted.

Article #19 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Moved by William Clement, 2nd by Richard Hallberg.

Discussion. Moderator reread article and put it to a vote.

Article #19 was accepted.

Article #20 was read by the Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of Taxes.

Moved by Richard Hallberg, 2nd by William Clement.

Discussion. Moderator reread article and put it to a vote.

Article #20 was accepted.

Article #21 was read by Moderator;

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's deed as Justice may be.

Moved by Richard Hallberg, 2nd by William Clement.

Mr. Hallberg explained article; there was no discussion. Moderator reread article and put it to a vote.

Article #21 was accepted.

Article #22 was read by Moderator;

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

William Clement made motion to give a vote of thanks to Moderator Alden Hofling for his outstanding work as Moderator for the last three years. (applause)

Mr. Kenneth Torsey wants report on number of board feet sold by Mrs. Schlesinger of Conservation Committee in next Town Report. Mrs. Schlesinger said it would be.

Mr. Ober wanted to know why there was no article on Gypsy Moths in Warrant. Mr. Clement did not think about it and did not happen to hear of any other Town having anything of this nature in Warrant.

Mrs. Provencher wants Joyce Trust Fund report in Town Report next year. She made it as a motion and it was voted upon and accepted. She asked people to come to the School Meeting March 17th. One place they could save money is in Transportation.

Mrs. Schlesinger made motion to have Town, State and Federal polls to stay open till 7 PM and still open at 10 AM. 2nd by Larry Blood.

Discussion; After many pros and cons Katherine Seavey Deputy Town Clerk made statement that if a person really wanted to vote and would be out of Town on election day. What are absentee ballots for? Just make sure they are in the Town Clerk's office by 5 PM the day before election. (Applause) Moderator reread motion and put it to a vote.

Motion defeated.

Charlie Joyce wants to know why they can't dump from the top of the Dump instead of going down into that mess. A telephone pole or something could be put across for a stop. Made motion of it, 2nd by Willis Ober. In discussion Mr. Joyce and Selectmen would check it Sunday and see if it is possible to do it.

Motion accepted.

Mrs. Clement wants to show appreciation to Mrs. Schlesinger for her work in getting our telephones extended to other areas. (Applause of acceptance.)

Moderator reread motion to ask the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the 2 nations adopt a mutual freeze on the testing and production and development of nuclear weapons.

Moved by Ginga Moore, 2nd by Joe Miller.

Discussion. During discussion Donald Morrill gave a very good speech, then made motion to lay article on table; motion was 2nd and put to vote.

A standing vote was used. Those in favor of tabling motion 35; those not in favor of tabling motion 22. Motion defeated.

Mr. Governanti made motion to adjourn, 2nd by June Smith.

Adjourned at 2:50 PM.

New Hampton Special Town Meeting

July 22, 1982

Moderator T. Holmes Moore opened the meeting with Flag Salute. The Flag was presented by John Lovering and Jerymy McClay. Pam Anderson played the piano for singing "America" in Unison. Rev. Roger Cleveland gave the invocation.

The Moderator read the articles of the Warrant presented by the Selectmen Richard Hallberg, Herman Chase and William Clement.

Before any action was taken, the Moderator read a short paragraph written by the Chairman of the Gordon Nash Library to the Selectmen of the Town clarifying the wide belief that the Gordon Nash Library's will gave authority that the library provided rooms for Town Offices. There is no provisions in the will authorizing such procedure.

Willis Ober read for information only, an article by Col. Lewis at the dedication of the Library in the "New Hampton History 1895," pertaining to the building of the Safe in the Selectmen's Room.

Moderator reread article #1.

"To see if the Town will vote to raise \$90,000. for the planning, construction and furnishing of a Town Office Building, including acquisition of land for the site. Said sum to be raised under the provisions of the Municipal Finance act, as amended and/or Bonding and to take other action relating thereto.

Article was moved by Richard Hallberg and 2nd by William Clement. Moderator asked for discussion and introduced Chester Butcher this year's chairman of the New Hampton Office Building Committee. Mr. Butcher gave a resumé of the study committees from 1978 to 1982. Mr. Jaffa's report and the resumé on Bernard Smith chairman last year both proposals were rejected. He explained how new committee had meetings every Wednesday night meeting in the Selectmen's room studying all proposals. After many questions and answers by Kenneth Torsey, Joseph Powers, Hope Swain and many others, Richard Hallberg read and moved an amendment to Article #1.

"To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$90,000. for the planning, construction and furnishing of a Town Office Building including acquisition of land for the site, and also include the hiring of a registered architect to prepare plans and specifications and supervise the

construction and furnishing of said building, procure minimum of three bids from general contractors who will furnish performance and payment Bonds, as outlined by architect. Said sum to be raised by borrowing on the credit of the Town under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, as amended and/or Bonding and to take any other action relating thereto. In accordance with the recommendation of the Building Committee.

Motion was 2nd by William Clement.

Amendment was reread by Moderator and explained to clarify new part. Moderator asked for discussion.

Many questions and answers by Mr. Ebbels, Barbara Chase, Willis Ober, Mrs. Wendleboe, Ed Ballou, Mr. Willingham, Mrs. Stevens and John Bates. Joseph McDermott asked for explanation on Seavey site.

Arthur Seavey was willing to give the Town all the land it needed to build the Office Building and explained the advantages of it.

After further discussion the Moderator reread article and put it to a vote. Further discussions were brought up by Mrs. Moore, Ann Chase, Dan Sharpe, Mrs. Wendleboe, Edgar Ballou and Rabon Rose. All questions were answered by the three Selectmen and others.

Willis Ober made motion to amend article and to raise \$10,000. to hire an architect to prepare plans and present them within 2 months at a future meeting when the necessary funds will be raised to pay for the plan if accepted.

Dr. Miller asked him to change amendment to \$5,000. 2nd by Mrs. Ober. (Discussion)

The discussion was continuing so Hope Clement asked for a vote. Moderator reread article. Yes 48 No 53 article was defeated. The Moderator read motion to raise the \$5,000. by aye and nay vote. Vote was so equal that Moderator asked for a show of hands. Ayes 48 Nays 53 Article was defeated.

Article as amended was read by Moderator and voted upon. Ayes were silent. Nays unanimously. Article was defeated.

Original article of warrant was reread by Moderator and put to a ballot vote. Discussion.

Pauline Merrill asked that the article be amended to add in accordance

with the recommendations of the Building Committee. 2nd by Hope Swain.
Discussion.

Dr. Miller made remark that we needed professional help instead of amateurs. Arthur Seavey considered Dr. Miller's remarks out of order, that we have many professionals helping us.

Mr. Hofling asked us to reconsider motion action and reconsider article. This is undebateable if 5 consenting people agree. This will be voted upon by paper ballot.

Ballot Clerks were Patricia Torsey, Leon Torsey, Mrs. Hahn and Hope Clement. Officer Salmon was police guard. Moderator read ballots. Ayes 107, Nays 43. Motion was accepted.

Motion to raise \$5,000. as amended to hire an architect to make plans and have them ready within 2 months so we can have a meeting to vote on the article of Total building price.

Pauline Merrill wanted to know about the next meeting. Moderator told her the next meeting would be called at the call of the Moderator.

Article was voted upon and an affirmative vote was cast, so \$5,000. was accepted.

Article #1 was read and accepted.

Article #2 was read by Moderator on what to do about the Tree in the Common.

It was moved by Herman Chase and 2nd by William Clement. Herman Chase gave a discussion on the problem. 1st it was overgrown. 2nd the Flag was interfered with. 3rd tree can be trimmed for about \$200. 4th it can be replaced for between \$285. and \$1000. It was cheaper to be properly trimmed. Mr. Gulick moved that the tree be trimmed in the Common. The amendment was accepted.

The Moderator read articles as amended and put it to a vote. Article was accepted.

Bernard Smith made motion to adjourn meeting to the call of the Moderator at 11:15 PM. (Accepted)

New Hampton Special Town Meeting

September 30, 1982

New Hampton inhabitants held a Special Town Meeting at the Town House September 30, 1982 at 8:00 PM with Moderator T. Holmes Moore presiding. There were approximately 80 people present.

Rev. Rabon Rose gave a prayer for the opening and the Moderator gave a resum] of last meeting.

Article #1 as printed was read by the Moderator.

“To see if the Town will vote to raise \$90,000. for the planning, construction and furnishing of a Town Office Building including acquisition of land for the site. Said sum to be raised under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, as amended and/or bonding and to take other action relating thereto.

It was moved by William Clement and 2nd by Richard Hallberg.

Chester Butcher read an amendment.

“I move that this special Town Meeting of September 30, 1982 approve the preparation of construction documents for a Town Office Building on Town House site and instruct the Selectmen to provide site developing plans and Building construction plans of adequate detail to allow the next annual Town Meeting to appropriate necessary Funding. It shall be the responsibility of the Selectmen to schedule and notice 3 public meetings for voter information and participation.” 2nd by Bernard Smith.

Motion reread by Moderator and put to discussion. Chester Butcher explained how we came to vote this way and Bernard Smith gave a nostalgic resum] of the power of the Selectmen, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Police Department would be more efficiently used by their better communication in the Town Offices.

Mrs. McCrilis, Chester Butcher, Dr. Miller, Joseph McDermott, Mr. Marinace, Kenneth Torsey, Mrs. Wendleboe and June Smith discussed pros and cons of this problem.

Mr. Marinace showed his plans with comments.

After busy discussion Moderator reread amendment. Mr. Ober asked for a ballot vote which was granted by the Moderator. Ballot Clerks were Patricia Torsey, June Clement and Leon Torsey.

After ballots were cast the Moderator read total Ayes 59 Nays 43 the Amended article was accepted.

The Moderator read article #1 as amended. There was no discussion and a unanimous Aye vote was accepted.

The Moderator gave the dates of the next meetings November 3, 1982, December 8, 1982 and January 19, 1983.

Motion to adjourn was 2nd and moved at 9:38 PM.

Town Warrant

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton, New Hampshire in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Hampton Town House on Tuesday, the eighth of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town officers and for questions required by law to be on the ballots. Polls to close not later than 6:00 P.M.

1. Shall we rescind the provisions of RSA 72:43-b and 43-c for expanded exemptions on real estate which provide for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, \$10,000 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000 exemption, provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of the value specified in RSA 72:43-c III; provided that the exemptions shall be based upon the assessed value of the real estate?

The remainder of the Warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Saturday, March 12, 1983 at 10:00 A.M.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$140,000 for the construction of a Town office building with furnishings and to raise the sum by borrowing on the credit of the Town under the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, as amended, and-or bonding, and to take any other action relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the rental of a building for Town office space provided that Article 3 is defeated.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund for a new fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of highway equipment and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,200.00 for the purchase of a Highway Spreader and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$38,000.00 for the purchase of a backhoe and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow said sum on the credit of the Town. (By request)

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the improvement of Town bridges and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500.00 for the support of the Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purchase of Fire Department radios and to Authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$43,205.00 for the support of the Police Department.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110,800.00 for the support of the Highway Department. Such sum is exclusive of an estimated \$22,983.74 in highway subsidies, \$2981.94 Duncan Fund and \$8,963.07 TRA Funds. (\$34,928.75 State Funds)

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 for the recycling of sections of Town roads. Said improvements to be completed under the supervision of the Selectmen.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,169.10 for TRA, the State to contribute \$7,793.97 for a total of \$8,963.07 in joint funds.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the care of Cemeteries.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,485.10 for the support of Regional Associations. Community Action Program \$1,936.00; Bristol Community Center \$920.00; Lakes Region Planning \$958.00; NANA \$4,400.00; Inter-Lakes Day Care Center \$271.10.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the New Hampton Community Kindergarten.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 for Patriotic purposes.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, the Franklin Hospital, the Lakes Region Hospital and the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the purchase of a typewriter for the Planning Board and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a cooperative agreement with other area communities under the provisions of Chapter 53B to study the advisability of establishing a regional refuse disposal district and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$770.00 as the share of the cost of a feasibility study (total cost estimated to be \$12,000.00) of a refuse to energy facility to be located in Plymouth with the express intent of selling steam and-or electricity to Plymouth State College. The feasibility study to be initiated following approval at the March, 1983 Town Meeting, with a report to be completed with recommendations for further action to be presented to the participating towns at their 1984 or earlier Town Meeting.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of facilitating repairs to West Shore Road on the westerly side of Lake Winona in said Town on condition that the residents of said road shall match said appropriation with an equal amount. Said improvements to be made by private contractors under the Supervision of the Selectmen. (By Petition)

24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade off or sell any unusable tires, equipment or materials presently in storage at the Highway Buildings.

25. To see if the Town will vote in support of Federal action to control and reduce acid rain by the year 1990, and further to negotiate a treaty with Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. (By Petition)

26. Shall the citizens of New Hampton ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the United States Congress to:

Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with variation safeguards satisfactory to both countries. (By Petition)

27. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State Funds which may be made available during 1983. Further, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purposes designated with applicable Federal or State regulations.

28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

31. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

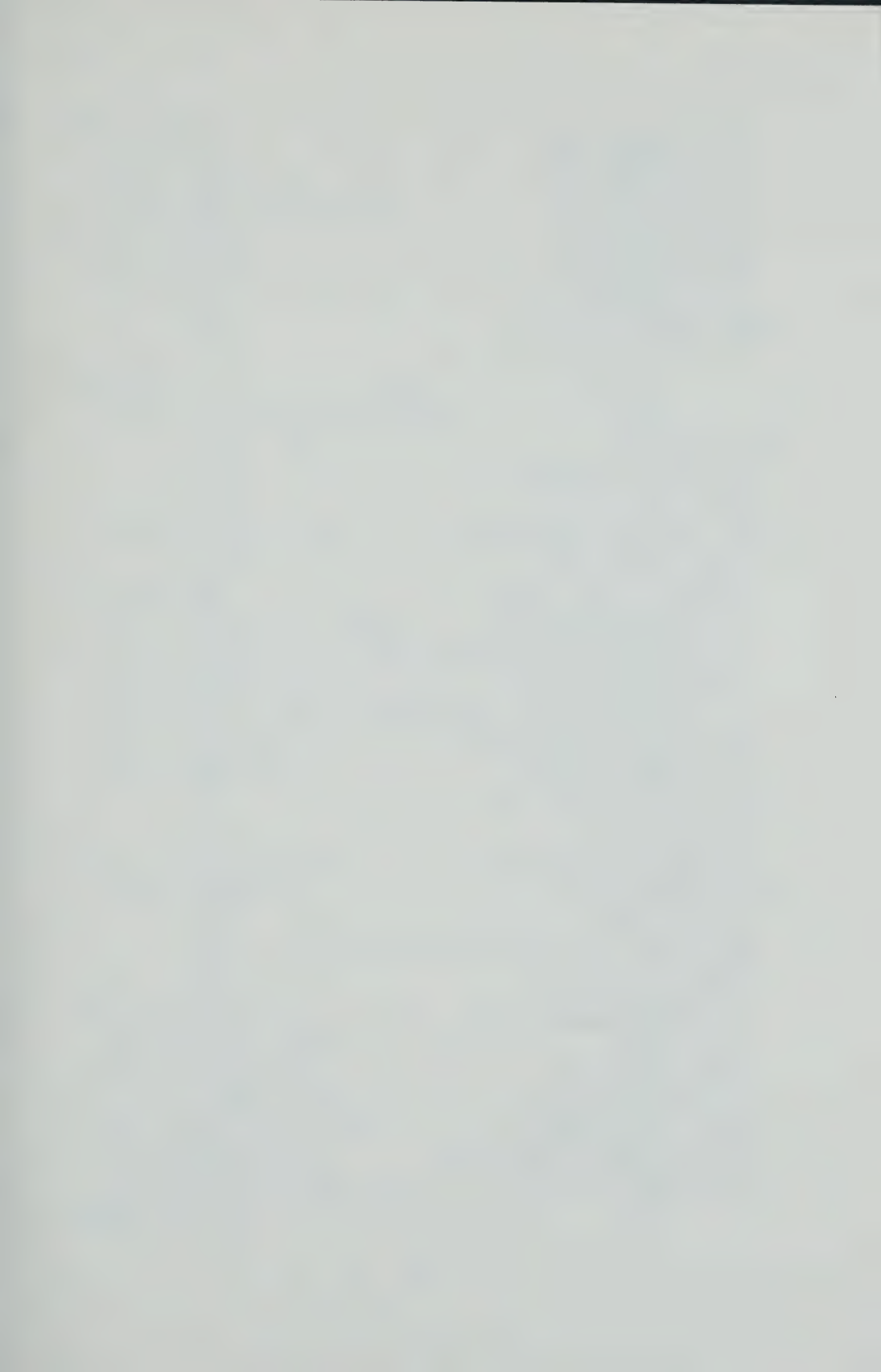

We take this opportunity to remind everyone that all fire or emergency calls should be placed through Laconia Fire Dispatch. Please dial 524-1545 for the most expedient handling of fire or emergency calls. Phone stickers may be obtained from the fire department.

We would like to caution users or potential users of unvented space heaters to adhere closely to the instructions that come with them. There is great danger of carbon monoxide in tightly closed structures.

We also remind everyone that flu-pipes and chimneys of air tight stoves generally need more than once a year cleaning.

The Fire Department Log reads: 9 chimney, 6 structure and 6 brush fires, 6 car accidents, 3 wires down and 1 rescue with 25 mutual aid calls. Of this number, 20 were at the scene and 5 cover trucks.

Report of Town Forest Fire Wardens and State Forest Ranger

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

The town provided funds to pay for equipment, supplies, and help to defray actual costs of training courses. Some of the costs are also shared by local industry and schools.

New Hampton Conservation Commission

Acid rain monitoring in town revealed first readings in 4 to 5 range...the new session of the Legislature gives rise to a new container bill which we support and follow with interest. Lil McCrelis concerned with former; Josette Hofling, the latter.

Cleanup of the logging operation is proceeding, albeit at a slow pace. The last logs removed from the area were scaled in Ashland by State Forester Bub Nelson and Swen Carlson, Forest Warden. We'd be lost without Bud.

We are proud of our second year's family firewood cut, which has distributed about 100 cords to townspeople. We have supplied a stockpile for the Selectmen to distribute at their discretion. The success of the fuel cut is due primarily to the time and efforts of Richard Gallagher who has received unanimous kudos from his fellow-commission members.

Richard was contracted recently by the commission to proceed with a commercial fuel wood cut as recommended by Soil Conservation Service and the State and County foresters. Extensive Timber Stand Improvement is necessary to promote and protect the Seaver portion of the Conservation Area for more intensive forest management/conservation use. We've a beautiful forest park in the making. It is estimated an annual family firewood cut and the TSI fuel wood cut can both proceed for a long time.

Russell Hamilton worked many hours through black flies and mosquitoes opening up the farmhouse site...woe to Sumac...anyone know a solution? The Fire Dept. rid us of the large pile of debris and brush. The shelters have been shingled; plans are proceeding for latrines at three sites: shelter area, beach and island. Bill Huckins' efforts.

The New Hampton School's Environmental Science teacher, Emily Lindeman, and her students toured the area and are interested in helping with beach and trail preparation in the spring. The maple swamp is a treasure we want all to enjoy.

Lester Youst, an original member of the Conservation Commission, will be honored in the spring when we plant a tree on Main Street in his memory.

As requested at last Town Meeting, \$7,100 was realized in the logging operation with Fred Avery; and we are beginning major work on the roadways to the shelters and beach area. To protect this investment, we will close the roads into the area in spring. The fuel wood (TSI) project we hope will be a continuing project, giving us annual operating moneys. Our major expense each year is our portion (about \$500) of the town's insurance bill, which covers the island, shore sites and beach area.

Lakes Region Planning Commission

New Hampton, N.H. - 1982

The Lakes Region Planning Commission has continued its service to member communities. As in the past, our primary objective has been to provide information, consultation and support to the local Planning Board in its planning efforts, as well as to the Board of Selectmen and other community officials.

Requests for funding continue to be based on a formula of the town's population and assessed valuation. Twenty-seven municipalities continue their membership with the Planning Commission because they believe that it provides a needed service that they cannot provide independently or that cannot be obtained elsewhere.

On behalf of member communities, the regional commission fosters the orderly development of the region through cooperative, coordinated and comprehensive action.

Local assistance during the past year has included typing and printing 100 copies of the town's Subdivision Regulations; provided information and advice concerning density standards that should be applied in a local lakefront conversion of cabins to condominiums; met with Planning Board to discuss impact from potential mobile home park development; assisted with recommendations concerning Twin Tamarack subdivision proposal and provided copies of Twin Tamarack conversion assessment report; met with mobile home park developer to review site plan and made recommendations for improvements of proposed plan, as well as advised the Planning Board on procedures regarding earth excavation within the town. Also, the Commission has made initial contact to consider placing the Old Town House and the Dana Meeting House on the National Register of Historic Places.
