STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PEMBROKE IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN THE TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday the eighth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after September 1, 1960, on all unpaid poll taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize, its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in this town.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:

- (a) The Lewis W. Cass Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Cass Lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
- (b) The Hazel Bennett Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Bennett Lot in the Buck Street Cemetery.
- (c) The Edith West Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Hyatt-West Lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept from the Pembroke Woman's Club Library Building Fund the sum of \$1,355.00 and from the special Building Fund, now held by the Library Trustees, the sum of \$1,309.22 and to authorize both of these funds to be paid into the Town Library Building Fund, to be held and expended in accordance with the terms of said Building Fund.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase for the Town, a dump truck, with a capacity of four to six yards and having not less than 205 horse-power, for a sum of money not to exceed Seven Thousand (\$7,000.00) Dollars; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars in 1960; and to authorize the Selectmen, to borrow on the credit of the Town, the balance of the cost of said vehicle, not to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, by the issue of serial notes, and to determine the time and place of payment and the rate of interest thereon and to provide for the sale thereof.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept and maintain the following equipment donated for the use of the Town:
 - (A) Donated by the Pembroke Fire Department:

Communication center, sound proofed, and provided with furniture, maps and radio equipment.

Five mobile radio trans-receivers, installed in fire trucks.

G. M. C. Carryall Truck.

Ford Tank truck, completely equipped.

Studebaker Tank truck, completely equippped.

Two sets of underwater rescue lungs.

Firemen's Room, completely furnished.

(B) Donated by the Pembroke Police Department:

Ford Police Cruiser, with two way radio, painted with identifying lettering and provided with emergency equipment.

11. To see if the Town will vote to pass the following Town Ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE PERTAINING TO SUBDIVISION OF LAND

- SCOPE. This ordinance shall apply to any sub-division of land in the Town of Pembroke in which a new street or streets or an extension of water or sewer lines is involved.
- 2. PLANS. The developer of any proposed sub-division of land, shall before any work is begun, submit to the Town five copies of the plans for the proposed sub-division. Distribution of plans shall be as follows:- (1) Planning Board, (2) Zoning Board, i.e. District Commissioners if the development is within the Pembroke Street Village District, (3) Water Department, (4) and (5) will be master copies signed by the Chairmen of the approving boards, one for the developer and one to be recorded in Merrimack County Registry of Deeds. If the area is outside the Pembroke Street Village District, four copies will be sufficient.



- 3. INFORMATION REQUIRED: Plans required under Section 2 shall contain the following information:
 - (A) Lots Location of all lots shall be shown, drawn to scale, and showing the dimensions on all sides.
 - (B) Streets Location of all streets shall be shown, drawn to scale, showing finished grade and percent of grade of the street.
 - (C) Drainage Location of all drainage facilities shall be shown, I.E., the location of all Catch Basins, sewer pipes and culverts with their dimensions and direction of flow.
 - (D) Any changes in natural drainage such as brooks, existing culverts or other natural drainage areas shall be shown, indicating the points where these changes occur and the nature of the change including the direction of flow and the area affected if the natural flow is diverted.
- 4. APPROVAL OF LOTS IN PRMBROKE STREET VILLAGE DISTRICT:
 Lots in this area must be approved by the Zoning Board, or the Board of Adjustment, as the case may be, as to size, shape and area prior to approval of road layout and sewer lines by the Planning Board.
- 5. LOT SIZE: In sub-divisions where septic tanks and sewage fields are to be used the minimum lot size shall be 100×200 feet.

6. APPROVAL OF STREETS AND SEWER LINES:

The location of streets, grades and drainage and the size of sewer lines to be installed shall be approved by the Planning Board, in conjunction with the Board of Selectmen, before any construction is begun.

7. CONSTRUCTION OF STREETS:

All streets shall be constructed and all sewer lines and drainage facilities installed by the developer, at his own cost, in accordance with the following specifications.

(A) Width of Streets: All streets shall have a minimum width of forty feet and shall be deeded to the Town as hereinafter provided.

- (B) Paving of Streets: All streets shall have a 12 inch depth of gravel 24 feet wide, with 3 foot paved gutters or steep grades. Three inches of Bituminous mix, 1.00 gal. per square yard, shall be placed on the gravel and sealed with asphalt, 0.25 gal. per square yard, application to be in accordance with New Hampshire Department of Public Works and Highways Town Road Aid specifications.
- (C) Drainage: Adequate drainage facilities approved by the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen shall be provided.
- (D) Grades: The maximum grades of a street shall not be greater than 8% where a street is dead end or only one street serves a sub-division. Maximum grades of streets may be 12% where access of less than 8% is available to the top of a 12% grade.

8. DEEDS:

When the road has been completed in accordance with this ordinance, except for graveling and bituminous mix, that is, when it is graded to subgrade and all drainage and sewer facilities are installed in accordance with the approved plan, the developer shall submit a Deed to the street, which shall be held in escrow by the Board of Selectmen. If the work is satisfactory to this point they shall accept the street conditionally, subject to the graveling and bituminous mix of the street as required by this ordinance, after installation of the water mains. The Board of Selectmen shall at this time notify the Water Commissioners of the conditional acceptance.

9. WATER:

Upon receipt of notice of conditional acceptance by the Selectmen, the Board of Water Commissioners shall make a contract with the developer authorizing the installation of water mains in accordance with the design made by the Water Department, and the Water Department's extension policy.

10. ACCEPTANCE OF STREETS:

When installation of water mains are completed, developer shall gravel, and bituminous mix road as provided herein and, after receiving approval of the Planning Board, the conditional acceptance shall be made permanent by the Board of Selectmen.

11. RECESSION:

All Town ordinances previously passed pertaining to new streets or sub-divisions of land are hereby rescinded to the extent that they are inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance.

12. TAKES EFFECT:

This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and continue in effect until amended or rescinded by voet of the Town.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred (\$300.00) Dollars, to be added to the sum of Seven Hundred (\$700.00) Dollars appropriated under Article 12 of the 1959 Town Warrant, making a total of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of installing a sewer on Middle Street, so called.
- 13. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.







FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

Following a course of continued progress in fire fighting work and its related fields, the department this year added another important emergency function to its repertory. Seven men from the Junior and Senior groups undertook a course specializing in underwater search.

The men successfully passed the exams at the end of the term and have since become an important addition to the many operations of the department. It is interesting to note that each man paid for the costs of taking the course and during the past summer, the Junior group paid for two complete underwater outfits. Drills were held during the year to keep up with latest methods and the drills are to be continued in order that the proficiency of the men in this department will be at top level.

Top priority this spring will be given to building a training center on town owned land at Memorial Field. Expected to be erected with funds to be provided entirely by the firefighters themselves, will be a four-story drill tower with all the necessary appurtenances for drilling purposes. Also included in the area plan will be gasoline and oil pits, a smoke house where various type masks can be tested and several types of suction outlets for pumper testing. Eventually, the center will contain all necessary facilities needed to train for all phases of firefighting work. Approval to build the area has been received from the Board of Selectmen and the fire department personnel desire at this time to thank the town officers for their help and consideration in this project.

Last fall, the department presented its second annual firefighting demonstration on Glass street in connection with "Fire Prevention Week." It is hoped to make this program more interesting from year to year and at the same time give the firemen an opportunity to show their skill following a period of rigid training. If the training center is somewhat completed this summer, the event will be held there in the fall.

Another step to better firefighting method will get underway shortly with the acquisition of new wearing apparel. A new type of aluminized clothing has been given exhausted tests and shows that 90 percent of the heat from fire is reflected thus enabling firemen to work at extremely close range. Four suits have been ordered and as experience is gained by the personnel, additional outfits will be ordered.

A welcome addition this year was the purchase of a 40-foot aluminum pole ladder. This replaces a wooden ladder with over 50 years of service. The replacement plan will be continued this year with the addition of another similar type ladder for work on high buildings of the community.

In closing may I extend an invitation to all of you to visit with us at fire headquarters and we will be proud to show you around. On behalf of the men, I express our sincere appreciation to our town officers and the people for their continued interest and support.

PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an aleri warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note.

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple –

- Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- 2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
- 3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- 4. Dcn't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles use your ash tray.
- Don't burn at home-Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

CRUISER PRESENTED

Through the fund raising efforts of the Police Department the Town now boasts a cruiser for the patrolling of local areas. Presentation of the vehicle to the town was made when Chief Leo Bouffard gave the keys to Ferdinand Bouchard, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen.

The cruiser is fully equipped with flashing lights, siren and large emblems on each door and on the rear trunk cover. A two-way radio has also been installed which keeps patrolman in constant touch with the manned communication center in the fire station. Various emergency equipment to aid motorist will also be kept in the cruiser.

In the past, officers on duty made use of their own personal cars to patrol the outlying districts and were paid a small amount to cover the cost of running their cars. The money used for this system will henceforth help to defray expenses of caring for the cruiser.

Chief Bouffard expressed his appreciation to the many business firms and individuals who contributed their time and money to help with the project. Among these were John Grappone and Asa Jacobs of Grappone Inc., Nat Cling of Cling Auto Parts, Lucien Lavigne of Carland Auto-Body, Concord Auto Top Co., John Yargean of Pembroke Sign Co., and Guilfred Boisvert.

Gentlemen:

Submitted, herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Pembroke which was made by this Division, acting under authority of Chapter 71, Section 27, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, which provides in part as follows:

"Audit on Motion of Commission. The (Tax) Commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such audit."

This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, and the period from January 1st to October 27th, 1959. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report. Also included is a Statistical Table presenting a Ten Year Statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector and Town Clerk.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets - December 31, 1957 - December 31, 1958: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1957 and December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$2,360.49 during 1958.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures – Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$1,696.90, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,565.39, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$131.51.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance, as of October 27, 1959, is shown in Exhibit J.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes:

Table I presents a ten year statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes. It will be noted that during the period from December 31, 1948 to December 31, 1958, the Net Debt of the Town increased from \$1,200.66 to \$14,715.68. This figure does not include Water Debt.

During the same period the assessed valuation of taxable property increased from \$2,035,806 to \$5,692,227, or 180%. The amount of the annual tax levy increased from \$82,653.72 to \$269,811.56, or 226%.

The local tax rate increased from \$4.06 to \$4.74 per hundred, compared to the average tax rate for the State which increased from \$4.06 to \$5.15 during this period.

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased from \$21,944.81 to \$22,076.32 during 1958, as shown herewith:

Accounting for Income Tax and Social Security Withholdings:

It was noted that in the matter of payroll procedure the Selectmen issued a voucher and order-check for the net amount of the payroll; i.e. total amount earned less income taxes and social security withheld. This is in accordance with the prescribed method. However, the gross amount rather than the net amount of the payroll was entered in the "Amount Paid" column.

It is recommended that the net amount of the payroll, which is the amount of the actual payment, be entered in the "Amount Paid" column. Then the gross amount, representing the total earnings, be carried out to the proper classification columns. Separate columns should also be maintained for "Income Taxes" and "Social Security" withheld.

When quarterly settlement checks are issued by the Town on account of these withholdings, the amount of such checks should be entered in the "Amount Paid" column and then carried out to the "Income Taxes" and "Social Security" withheld columns. The settlement check for the income taxes withheld will equal the quarterly total of taxes withheld. The settlement check on account of social security will exceed the quarterly total of social security withheld by the amount which the Town pays as its share.

If this procedure is followed, the total payments as indicated by the Selectmen's records should always be in agreement with the total payments as reflected in the Treasurer's Cash Book.

It is due to the manner in which payrolls were entered in the Selectmen's records that the expenditures during 1958, as shown in this report, differ from those which appear in the printed town report and the financial report which was filed with this office.

Town Clerk:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 260, Section 5, of the R.S.A., as amended by Chapter 13 of the Laws of 1957, no permit for the registration of a motor vehicle, should be issued without first requiring the applicant to show a tax collector's receipt for the payment of any poll and head taxes for which the applicant is liable for the preceding year.

The law provides for a fifty cent fee for every transfer of registration of a motor vehicle. In cases where the credit for a prior permit exceeds the charge for the issuance of a subsequent permit, the only charge would be the fifty cent transfer fee.

Conclusion:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1960

To the School Board of Pembroke:

It is again time to report on the educational development of the school system. In so doing, please bear in mind the need for close observance of further growth in enrollments, transportation, tuition and teachers' salaries.

It is imperitive to understand that budgets increase because more children are entering and continuing in school every year. There is very little doubt that the school will register very close to 500 students in 1960-61 if not more. In 1954-55, 354 children attended grades 1-8. This means that within six short years the school has increased 116 pupils. Suppose this happens in the next six years?

Let us discuss for a moment the implications of this increased enrollment.

Transportation. We are now transporting 287 children of which 17 are attending private schools. This means that we are transporting over 50% of our children. Since houses and homes will continue to be built on the open land of the town, it is readily seen that as the school grows, more transportation will be necessary and this problem must be solved each year.

Teachers' Salaries. We now have sixteen regular full time teachers — two teachers for each grade with grades seven and eight on a departmentalized basis. Each year the cost of teachers is increasing and especially when they leave our school to go to "greener pastures." If you will but look around you to the school districts with which we have to compete, you will note that the starting salary is very close to \$4000 with a more or less indifinite maximum. Salary schedules are being revised nearly every year because it is becoming increasingly hard to find teachers who are desirable and who will work for salaries less than \$4000. We have been fortunate in building a school system with many career and dedicated personnel. How long this will last will depend, in great part, on the salaries and the geographical location both of the school and the desire of the teacher. Add to this the increased costs of living and you will have a teacher problem nearly every year.

Tuition. Coupled with teachers' salaries, this total will be 65% of the entire budget. And it cannot be otherwise as long as the tuition charges at the secondary schools increase each year. We shall have about 150 students attending Pembroke Academy at \$395.00 a child next year; five or six attending Concord at \$415 per child; plus what handicapped and foster children have become our responsibility for about \$1800. It so happens also, that the law requires every boy and girl to attend a secondary school until 16 years of age if there is a high school in the district.

Is there any relief in sight? Is there a solution by which a reduction can be made in our increased budgets every year? What are the answers?

The time is not too far away when the district must find a solution to the housing problem together with the cost of tuition. In the districts of Allenstown, Hooksett, and Pembroke the cost of tuition for 1960–61 will be nearly \$150,000. This amount will be paid for about 380 students who will attend Manchester, Concord, and Pembroke Academy. In nearly every school to which these towns send students, the cost per pupil will be \$400 and over.

At the present time all these schools are looking ahead to future expansion because the present housing plants will be inadequate in less than five years.

As we study this problem, there are two possible solutions. One calls for the enlargement of the present buildings while the other involves the pooling of interests in consolidation. Of the two plans, the one covering consolidation would seem to be the most practical. This plan involves the building of a Junior High School at some central point that would house Grades 7-8-9 for

the three towns. According to the census reports we would have to build a plant to house nearly 500 youngsters with plans for expansion to between 800 and 1000 children. There is much to be said in defense of this plan, but in order to get all the facts, a study of the whole problem should be set in motion and brought to the attention of the voters of all three towns. And the sooner the better.

May I express my thanks to you in reporting for the thirteenth year the problems concerning the educational growth of the school. We have come a long way in solving some of the more pertinent ones. And with your continued help and advice the future is bright and hopeful.

To the Trustees of Pembroke Academy and the Superintendent of Schools:

There has been a large turnover in the teaching staff of Pembroke Academy this year. Assistant Headmaster Stanley Tufts who had been teaching here six years left to become Principal of Lancaster High School. Mrs. Alice Bean, who had been teaching here four years, left to become an elementary teacher. Two others left the teaching profession. Mrs. Elizabeth Stimpson went to Boston College as a fellowship student.

All of the replacements for these teachers are in their first year of teaching after graduating from college.

In order to have a more stable faculty it is desirable to reduce this turnover by continuing the teachers in their present positions. It is to be hoped that we can attract and hold good teachers.

Enrollment

The present enrollment of 287 is 40 more than that of last year. There are 99 Freshmen, 59 Sophomores, 71 Juniors and 58 Seniors. These students are enrolled from the following communities: Allenstown 50, Bow 2, Deerfield 2, Hooksett 52, Epsom 32, Concord 1, Manchester 2, and Pembroke 146.

Pembroke Academy is nearing its capacity. We expect to be able to take care of next year's estimated enrollment of 320 without any major building changes.

A canvas of the schools sending students to Pembroke Academy gives the following table to present enrollments:

Assuming, on past experience, that we will receive approximately 65% of these totals (we will receive a few from some schools and nearly all from some others) and that we will lose about 15% through drop out and transfer, we obtain this table of projected enrollments:

I believe that these figures are conservative and therefore show quite conclusively a need for more class rooms in the very near future.

This indicated increase in enrollment means more teachers, more rooms, more desks, lockers, books, supplies etc., all tending toward increased costs. Our tuition this year has been \$365 and will be \$395 for the year 1960–1961. This charge is below the state average. Tuitions do not provide for new construction costs however.

Much emphasis is placed on Science, Mathematics and Foreign Language today. It is interesting to note that 54% of all of our students are enrolled in Biology, Chemistry, General Science and Science Survey. Also, that 64% are enrolled in General Math, Algebra, Second year Algebra, Plane Geometry, and College Mathematics. In Foreign Language we have an enrollment of 29% in Latin I and II and French I and II. Students are being encouraged to take a three-year sequence in French as recommended by the Conant Report.

Athletics

The athletic program is caring for a large group of boys and girls. The Soccer Team coached by Mr. Henry Munroe and assisted by Mr. Francis Davis had a very successful season. They were the Central New Hampshire League Champions and runner-up for the State Championship. Again this year we wish to thank Mr. Nat Cling for the use of his field for the Soccer Team.

The Basketball team is presently among the leaders in Class M. Coach Redmond Carroll is having one of his best seasons.

The Baseball team under the coaching of Mr. Peter Kaligian won nine and lost three games. The team was the runner-up in the championship game with Penacook.

The athletic field near the school leaves much to be desired. It is not large enough for the soccer field, nor is it level, being much lower near the school. It is to be hoped that a suitable place could be provided in the near future.

The gymnasium is one of the finest in this area and provides quite adequately for our indoor activities.

Improvements

Four new basketball backboards and baskets have been added to the gym thus making it possible for the Physical Education classes and the Basketball teams to have better practicing facilities. These were added largely through the efforts of Mr. John Farnum who made and hung them.

An athletic drying room and storage room has been built in the left stage dressing room. A vanity and closet for Dramatics and a closet for music has been constructed in the right stage dressing room.

The stage scenery is in the process of being completely renovated with new and lighter frames with canvas coverings for ease in handling and storing. Mr. John Farnum is in charge of this project.

A very interesting project has been carried out by Miss Phyllis Lankalis and the girls in the Senior Home Economics Class. They have changed all the dark wood work in the Home Economics laboratory to a nice light ivory by scraping, sanding and painting. The walls have been done in a harmonizing pink. The room looks very cheery and is a credit to their vision and industriousness.

Guidance

Students elect their subjects each year with help from their guidance teacher and the approval of their parents. This plan has worked very well in practice and is to be continued this year. Early election af subjects enables the schedule to be set up for next year and teachers to be employed on the basis of the classes needed. Teachers assisting in guidance are: Mr. Redmond Carroll, Juniors and Seniors; Mr. Paul Wilkinson, Sophomores; Mr. George Kelly, Freshmen; Mr. Randolph Guyette, Freshmen.

Open House

Open House is being held after each marking period to enable the parents to confer with the teachers regarding the progress of their children. Many parents have visited and have become acquainted with our teachers to our mutual advantage.

Scholarship

Students are being prepared for college as well as for other fields of endeavor. In the college preparatory classes a standard is maintained such that a successful student in Pembroke Academy will be able to do successful work in college. Homogeneous ability grouping is used wherever possible. The quality of work done by a student in high school is a very good indicator of the type of work he might do in another school situation. It is the aim of the teaching staff to help students prepare for any work they may wish to undertake.

Pupils who come to Pembroke Academy without proper previous preparation (such as being unable to read properly or not having passed regularly the eighth grade) are sometimes admitted as Special Students. These students are marked Satisfactory (S) or Unsatisfactory (U) on their report cards and if graduated receive a Special Certificate. In this way an attempt is made to help all students get as much from high school as is possible. Special Students are not eligible to compete in interscholastic events.

Student Activities

This year, by lengthening the school day, one period per day has been devoted to student activities. During this period meetings are held by classes, clubs, or committees, and all musical activities are scheduled so that all may participate. Students not scheduled for some activity are studying under supervision of the teacher.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

During the past year, several new improvements have been made to the system, although very small amount of money is left for such. A following is a summary of projects accomplished during the past fiscal year.

On Reynolds Avenue, in Allenstown, a 2" cement lined main of four hundred forty-one (441) linear feet was installed. Six (6) house services were connected to this main which in turn could service another fifteen (15) such services in the future. Reynolds Avenue in the past had never had an installed water main.

On Union Street, in Pembroke, a renewal of main service pipe was made which services five (5) homes with water.

On Notre Dame Avenue, in Allenstown, a total of two hundred (200) linear feet of 6" cast iron cementlined water main was installed to furnish water to land lots owned by Victor R. Girard Co. Inc. This main line was installed under the main extension program of the water department in conjunction with agreement with Mr. Victor R. Girard.

On Bean Hill Road, a total of one hundred sixty-eight (168) linear feet of two (2") inch water main was installed, servicing two new homes recently built.

On Westerly side of Pembroke Street for Roycraft Co. Inc., the following was installed, at the expense of the building construction company mentioned. A total of eleven hundred twenty (1120) linear feet of 6" cast iron cement lined water main. Also thirteen hundred sixty (1360) linear feet of 2" cast iron cement lined main. In this installation a total of three (3) six-inch gate valves and four (4) two-inch gate valves were included. In this installation a connection was left for a future hydrant if needed.

It should be noted that at no time will the water department be responsible for water installations for home developments.

The members of the Planning Board wish to thank the Selectmen for the assistance you have given us during the numerous meetings we have held this year.

We have held conferences with the Selectmen relative to the layout and construction of your new building to house equipment of the Pembroke Highway Department. We have recommended to the Selectmen to accept one new road; another new road is now before the board waiting approval. We have held several meetings with a developer relative to a new development in Pembroke. It is hoped that these meetings will result in a better system of roads that will have less maintenance.
