

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING SOUTH HAMPTON, NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday the 14th of March at one o'clock in the afternoon to act on Article 1.

You are also hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Wednesday, the 15th of March at 7:30 in the evening to act on Article 2 and all subsequent articles.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$194,386 for the general town operations. (Majority vote required)

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town nay legally appropriate money.

- To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to dispose of surplus Town property.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to furnish and equip the new library.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for Town Hall improvements.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the restoration of historic documents; the original Town Clerk Record Book dated 1742-1838 and Town Charter.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand one hundred dollars (\$6,100) to finalize the contracted work on the Master Plan revision, funding from the current general fund balance.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the purpose of renting or leasing a site for recycling.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand three hundred dollars (\$7,300) for payment of the Town's share of the budget of the Southeast Regional Refuse Disposal District and dues to the Southeast Regional Solid Waste District.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for land acquisition established for that purpose at Town Meeting 1988.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a lease-purchase agreement for the purpose of purchasing a 1989 Class "A" Tanker/Pumper for the Fire Department, and to raise and appropriate the sum of eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000) for that purpose. (Majority vote required)
- To see if the Town will authorize the withdrawal of six thousand four hundred dollars (\$6,400) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for the purpose of a new Fire Truck to be used as a down payment on a Class "A" Tanker/Pumper.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to have a complete revaluation by a private appraisal firm (Avitar) that has been approved by the Dept. of Revenue Administration. Revaluation to be completed for the tax year 1989 or thereafter. (Majority vote required)
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) to fund revaluation and to authorize the withdrawal of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant franchises for the installation and operation of a cable television system within the Town. Said authorization to encompass the setting of such conditions as the Board deems necessary and appropriate. Said conditions shall not be inconsistent with NH RSA 53-C.
- 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to establish a Trust Fund for the pupose of Town approved activities associated with the celebration of the Towns 250th anniversary in 1992 with such funds as may be realized from the Cable franchise.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to establish the Land Acquisition Capital Reserve Fund as authorized in RSA 34:1,III-a, for the purpose of acquiring conservation land or interests in land for permanent conservation use. And to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money to be deposited into the fund for the purposes contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the N.H. Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-a, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the state matching funds under the LCIP for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and state matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the conservation commmission.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) for the purchase of a computer system, hardware and software, and to establish computerized systems for tax billing, appriasal files, inventory, accounting, voter registration files and other uses.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) for the repair of "Stockmans Bridge", so called.
- 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING SOUTH HAMPTON, N.H. March 8th & 9th, 1988

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of the Town of South Hampton. in the County of Rockingham, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs. held on March 8th, 1988 at the South Hampton Town Hall, the following business was transacted:

The Town Warrant was read by Moderator Horace Cressy. Ernest Bonah moved that the polls be opened, seconded by Audrey Brunet and so voted. Ballot Clerks for the election day were Ernest Bonah and Audrey Miller. A total of 111 votes were cast out of 593 registered voters. Polls opened at 1:05 p.m. and closed at 8:02 p.m.

Currier, 94 votes, elected Auditor, 1 yr., Robert Fraser, 7 write-in votes Auditor, 1 yr., Ernest Bonah, 6 write-in votes Auditor, 1 yr., Lutz Wallem, 6 write-in votes Highway Agent, 1 yr., John Santosuosso, 94 votes, elected Trustee of Trust Fund, Walter Hill, 12 write-in votes Trustee of Trust Fund, Albert Gray, 8 write-in votes Trustee of Trust Fund, Ernest Bonah, 6 write-in votes Trustee of Cemeteries, Vincent Early, 8 write-in votes Trustee of Cemeteries, Albert Gray, 8 write-in votes Trustee of Cemeteries, Fred Kozacka, 5 write-in votes Trustee of Cemeteries, Richard Harlow, 4 write-in votes Trustee of Library, 3 yrs., Linda G. Blair, 98 votes, elected Constable. 1 yr., John Santosuosso, 88 votes, elected Budget Committee: Ernest Bonah, 21 votes (write-in)

Brunet, 105 votes, elected School Board Member, 3 yrs., Judy Shivik, 25 write-in votes, elected School Board Member, 3 yrs., John Gamble, 18 write-in votes, School Treasurer, 1 yr., Nancy F. Dixon, 103 votes, elected

Sworn in at open meeting by the Moderator were: Vincent Early, for Selectman; Pamela Noon, for Supervisor of the Checklist; Dawn Currier for Treasurer; John Santosuosso for Highway Agent and Constable; Walter Shivik for Budget Committee. Horace Cressy, Moderator, and Judith Shivik, School Board Member were sworn in by the Town Clerk,

The following evening on March 9th, Moderator Horace Cressy called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. The remaining articles were voted on as follows:

ARTICLE II - To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$173,052 for general town operations. Walter Shivik, Selectman, moved that the article be adoped as read, seconded by Norman Marble. Walter explained the increases in most of the line items.

Wayne Theriault, Police Chief, explained that the increase in the Police Department budget was due to adding more patrol time and included a raise of \$1/hr. for officers. John Gamble, Acting Chief of the Fire Department briefly itemized the Fire Department expenses, noting an increase due to upgrading radio equipment and training of firefighters. Highway Agent, John Santosuosso, spoke on the Summer/Winter Maintenance and Highway Block Grant.

Martha Anderson, Library Trustee, stated that the increase in the budget was in the operating expense - salaries and books. Lutz Wallem commented the entryway to the new Library was poorly designed for snow and felt architect should be accountable.

Town insurance was discussed. Walter mentioned the deductible was increased by \$1,000 and the new Library was added. Several townspeople felt \$200,000 was not adequate coverage for the town buildings. It was suggested better rates could be found by shopping around. The article was voted and passed.

ARTICLE III - To see if the town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year. In accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money. JoAnn Hill, Selectman, moved the article be accepted as written, seconded by John Santosuosso, and it was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IV - To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes. The motion was made by Walter Shivik, seconded by Walter Hill and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V - To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to dispose of surplus town property. JoAnn Hill moved that the article be accepted as read, seconded by Walter Goldthwaite. Peter Oldak asked if information was made public and was told that anything of value would be put up for bids. The article was voted and passed.

ARTICLE VI - To see if the town will vote to maintain the road known as Bugsmouth Hill Rd. which runs from Chase Rd. along the properties owned by James Cassidy, Madeline Burrill, Michael Payne and John Packard, up to the bridge. (By petition) JoAnn Burrill stated the road is classified as a Class VI road and is used by the public for access to the woods and fishing. John Santosuosso claimed the road has never been accepted as a town road. JoAnn stated the road is not listed on their deeds at the Registry of

Deeds. Audrey Miller questioned whether this would open up any backland? John Gamble moved the article be accepted for the sake of public safety, seconded by Walter Hill. John Santosuosso asked how we could maintain it without money in the budget? Pat Hesselbach questioned whether this would set a precedent for the Peak Road? Ilsa Briggs stated it must be accepted as a town road before the town can maintain it. Fred Anderson amended the motion to accept and maintain the road known as Bugsmouth Hill Road, seconded by Audrey Brunet. Peter Oldak felt Fred should withdraw the amendment and moved that acceptance of the road be referred to the Planning Board, seconded by Ilsa Briggs. Fred said he would withdraw the motion if a special town meeting would be called after the Planning Board reviews it. The Moderator said it would not be necessary to have a special meeting. John Santosuosso said that he would plow it. Lutz Wallem asked if he could accept the responsibility of plowing it. The Moderator asked for a vote in favor of the amendment. The amendment carried. The motion as amended was voted and passed.

ARTICLE VII - To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$4,000 for Town Hall improvements and authorize the withdrawal of the principal plus interest in the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund with the balance to be raised by taxation. Walter Shivik moved that the article be adopted as read, seconded by John Santosuosso. Walter explained this would be used for painting the Town Hall. Lutz Wallem asked if they had received any estimates. Walter responded that it has not been advertised yet. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VIII - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,500 to prepare a revised Master Plan/Capital Improvements Plan as required by RSA 674:1-8. Dennis Blair moved that the article be accepted, seconded by Margaret Miller. Florence Goldthwaite asked why the Budget Committee did not recommend \$6,750? Vincent Early spoke for the Committee stating they felt half could be appropriated this year and half next year. Ilsa Briggs spoke for the Planning Board, stating that it may not be completed this year, but not having the money available would delay it. Most of the cost \$9,500) is for the Master Plan and she felt it important to be able to move forward with this as it is required by State RSA's. She added there is no way the Planning Board can do this without professional/technical assistance and we need this to support our zoning. Lee Goodnough, Representative of Rockingham Planning Commission stated that \$6,750 would not cover the cost of the Master Plan. The article was then voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IX - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,500 to purchase a new police cruiser. Wayne Theriault moved that the article be accepted, seconded by Scott Dixon. Peter Bryant questioned why the Budget Committee did not recommend spreading this amount over two years. What would the increase be? Walter Shivik estimated \$2. Ilsa Briggs asked how our tax rate compares with area towns. Walter responded that last year we ranked 211 out of 234 towns in N.H. The article was voted and passed.

ARTICLE X - Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 53-B:l to 11 inclusive providing for the establishment of a regional refuse disposal district, together with the Towns of Brentwood, Danville,

East Kingston, Exeter, Fremont, Hampton, Hampton Falls, Kensington, New Castle, Newton, North Hampton, Rye, Sandown, and the City of Portsmouth, and the construction, maintenance, and operation of a regional refuse disposal facility by said district in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen? (Ballot vote) Walter Shivik moved that the article be adopted as read, seconded by Walter Hill. Donald Hellen expressed concern that he heard there are possible sites in town. Tim Hoyt, Representative of S.R.R.D.P.B. responded. There are eleven possible sites, two are in South Hampton. The 18 Town Representatives will vote on the sites. Fred Anderson asked if there would be hazardous material dumped at the sites? Is there an alternative? He does not feel we should join until we know where the sites will be. Walter Shivik commented that if we vote against joining, we will not be able to join at a later If we don't join, we have to satisfy the State that we have developed a plan for rubbish and septic. Cate's may work out for 4-5 years. but what about after that? Peter Bryant asked if there is a way to delay voting on this article - "we don't have enough information to vote it." Fred Anderson made a motion to indefinitely postpone voting on this article, seconded by Peter Bryant. It was voted to postpone by hand vote - 27 for and 18 against.

ARTICLE XI - To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five-Thousand One-Hundred Twenty-Nine Dollars (\$5,129) for the payment of the Town's share of the budget of the Southeast Regional Refuse Disposal District for the fiscal year of said district ending March 31, 1989; to authorize the Treasurer to pay the appropriated amount to said district in four (4) quarterly installments commencing on April 1 and continuing on or before the first day of each successive calendar quarter; and to take action relative thereto. Walter Shivik made a motion to postpone voting on this article in view of the postponement of voting on Article X, seconded by Pam Noon and so voted.

ARTICLE XII - Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for nonpayment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against the land and buildings for unpaid taxes. Walter Shivik moved that the article be adopted as read. seconded by Walter Hill. Carol Baker, Tax Collector, explained the difference in the Tax Sale currently in effect and the Tax Lien Procedure. The article was voted by ballot - 41 in favor, 0 against.

ARTICLE XIII - To see if the town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of land acquisition and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to be placed in this fund and to designate the Selectmen as agents to expend. JoAnn Hill made a motion to accept the article as read, seconded by John Santosuosso, and voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIV - To see if the town will authorize the establishment of a capital reserve fund (pursuant to RSA Chapter 35) for the future revaluation of the town and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 towards this purpose, and appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer the fund. JoAnn Hill moved that the article be accepted

as read, seconded by Ilsa Briggs. JoAnn explained the need for reassessing the town - there are some inequities and she feels Selectmen do not have the expertise in this area. She also estimated the cost to be \$40-\$50 per parcel. Peter Bryant agreed that a professional evaluation should be done - but notthis year due to the increase already. JoAnn added that the tax maps have to be updated in anticipation of a reassessment. The article was then voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XV - To see if the town will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under the provisions of RSA35:1 for the purpose of a new fire truck and to raise and appropriate \$6,400 to be placed in this fund. John Gamble moved that the article be accepted as read, seconded by Fred Kozacka. Vincent Early explained that the Budget Committee only recommended \$5,000 because of the need to cut the budget. The article was voted and passed.

ARTICLE XVI - To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for legal expenses with regard to the adequacy of off-site emergency planning. Walter Shivik made a motion that the article be adopted as read, seconded by George Briggs. Walter commented that the Town of Rye took Public Service to court, claiming the sirens were installed illegally. Without approval of the town. They are waiting for a decision from the Superior Court; if favorable, we would like to address the problem for our town. The article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XVIII- To see if the town will vote to establishethe Land Acquisition Capital Reserve Fund as authorized in RSA 35:1,III-a, for the purpose of acquiring conservation land or interests in land for permanent conservation use. And to see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money to be deposited into the fund for the purposes contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under the N.H. Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) RSA 221-a, and authorize the Selectmen! to apply for and accept the State Matching Funds under the LCIP for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and State Matching Funds may be expended by majority vote of the Conservation Commission. Walter Shivik moved that the article be adopted as read, seconded by Peter Bryant. After a brief explanation, the article was voted in the affirmative.

KVIII - Transaction of Other Business

Donald Noon made a motion that property evaluations be listed in the Town Report, seconded by Audrey Brunet. After a brief discussion of the time and expense involved, the motion was voted and lost.

JoAnn Hill thanked Walter Shivik for his years of service to the town as Selectman. Walter then commented on the time involved and wished the new board luck.

Fred Anderson expressed concern that the Town had not taken action to make the Vozzella property safe. He also urged the Town to establish rights concerning the sirens. Judy Shivik expressed thanks to the Budget Committee for the time and work they put in, keeping the other Boards on their toes!

John Gamble moved that the Selectmen and Fire Chief send a registered letter to the Vozzella's stating they must have the well covered and the house boarded up by a specified date, seconded by Fred Kozacka and voted in the affirmative.

Lutz Wallem made a motion to recess the meeting to May 31st, seconded by Peter Bryant and so voted.

RECONVENED TOWN MEETING

SOUTH HAMPTON, N.H. MAY 31, 1988

Moderator, Horace Cressy called the May 31, 1988 meeting (reconvened from March 9, 1988) to order at 7:37 p.m. and the following two articles were voted on:

ARTICLE X - Shall the Town accept the provisions of RSA 53-B:1 to 11 inclusive providing for the establishment of a regional refuse disposal district, together with the Towns of Brentwood, Danville, East Kingston, Exeter, Fremont, Hampton, Hampton Falls, Kensington, New Castle, Newton, North Hampton, Rye, Sandown, and the City of Portsmouth, and the construction, maintenance, and operation of a regional refuse disposal facility by said district in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen? (Ballot Vote)

At this time, the minutes of the March 9, 1988 meeting were passed to members of the audience. Walter Hill made a motion that non-resident advisors be allowed to speak in explanation of the article seconded by Tim Hoyt and so voted.

Ilsa Briggs asked the Solid Waste Planning Commission reps. how many towns listed above had actually agreed to join the district. Tim Hoyt, representative of SRRDPB stated that Brentwood, Hampton, Hampton Falls, Newcastle, North Hampton, Rye, and Sandown have said yes. The remaining towns have, so far, voted no or are still considering. James Miller asked why this meeting was necessary and E. Joann Hill stated that, at this time, we can only put certain items out for trash collection and we are restricted to what we can dump. We only have a short time left to be able to dump at the Kingston site we are now using. Lee Knapp asked hou many tons per day would be dumped if one of the sites were in So. Hampton. Tim Hoyt stated that it would be about 400 tons per day, not all necessarily at the same site.

Mr. Kelly Planning Commission Rep. stated that any site choice would not be made until the regional district is formed, meaning not all the towns have approved the plan. After the district is formed, extensive site investigation is made to determine where the dump will be situated. Every town involved has one vote to determing the sites. It was explained that land has to be purchased for a site and annual dues for each town would be on a per ton basis so smaller towns with less trash would not be paying for the larger towns.

K. Imbrescia, K. Oakes, T. Hellen, J. Miller all spoke against passing the article due to lack of information on where the sites would be located, toxicity from the sites, and lack of choice as to where a site would be located in So. Hampton.

Douglas Hadley asked how much trucking would increase on Town roads and was told it would depend on what kind of waste would be brought to So. Hampton if a site was chosen here. Probably 10 to 20 two way trips per day.

(Article X Cont.)

Rich Russman was introduced by Fred Anderson. He is an attorney from Kingston who suggested that we might use an alternative plan instead of having a disposal site in Town. His town votedno for joining the district due to toxicity.

E. Cressy asked who would own the site once it was chosen, and was told that the district would own it with one vote from each Town involved.

Walter Shivik made a motion that the Article should be moved and voted on. Seconded by Edward Condon and so voted.

The Article was voted on by ballot. Results: Yes-23, No-14. The Article (X) was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XI: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand one hundred twenty-nine dollars (\$5,129) for the payment of the Town's share of the budget of the Southeast Regional Refuse Disposal District for the fiscal year of said district ending March 31, 1989: to authorize the Treasurer to pay the appropriated amount to said district in four (4) quarterly installments commencing on April 1 and continuing on or before the first day of each successive calendar quarter; and to take action relative thereto.

Walter Shivik made a motion to accept Article Xl as read as we have already voted in the affirmative for Article X. Walter Hill seconded the motion.

Fred Anderson questioned the figure and Walter Hill explained that projected figures for site studies and other activities through 1989 were \$623,000. Our share came to \$5129 or about \$20 per family.

Article XI was voted in the affirmative by a show of hands.

Walter Shivik made a motion to close the reconvened meeting, seconded by Edward Condon and so voted. Horace Cressy closed the meeting at 10 p.m.

Last year, this office indicated its commitment to the enforcement of Zoning. Several cases have and continue to be actively pursued on a variety of levels. A number of letters were sent out informing owners of business' of the processes available to them. Several individuals took the appropriate steps with the Zoning Board of Adjustment. More needs to be done following this avenue of enforcement. Legal proceedings were necessary in some cases to accomplish compliance. This office believes that litigation will be necessary in a number of remaining violations. This is a costly and time consuming method but thus far effective. Your responses to the Master Plan survey indicated that zoning violations were a priority concern.

An agenda has helped to organize the activities of this office. Reguests for meeting with the Board should be addressed to the Chair. Complaints, however valid, do need to be in writing and signed.

Again this year we feel obligated to request volunteers to fill a variety of appointed positions. A list will be available at Town Meeting indicating the various positions of volunteer participation.

The Selectmen encourage your support of a professional revaluation which we hope will be accomplished in October of 1989 with your approval. Two objectives will be achieved in the process; professional appraisals and enhanced documentation of the property in South Hampton. These two features will be very valuable to future efforts.

The members of the Board thank the residents of South Hampton for their support and cooperation.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State Government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1,000.00 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1,000.00 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire los record.

OFFICE OF THE PLANNING BOARD

In 1988 the Planning Board's most important effort was directed toward the revision of the Master Plan. Augmented by several volunteers to form the Master Plan Committee, and guided by the Rockingham Planning Commission, many many hours have been spent this past year in getting this complete review of the Town's Master Plan under way.

The response to the Citizen Survey was enormous. Of the 272 surveys distributed, over 54% were completed and returned in time to be tallied. Analysis of the responses is ongoing but a number of points are very clear. There is considerable unanimity in the perception of South Hampton's most important need as being more protected open space and preservation of our wetlands, backed up by the opinion that the most important capital expenditure is the acquiring of more conservation land, and that the most serious present local problem is loss of woods and open space. In addition, over 60% of those responding think water supply or potential contamination if a very serious or serious present problem.

We were surprised at the number of respondents who feel that enforcement of zoning ordinances is a serious or very serious problem. We wish we knew more about the specifics of this concern and will welcome letters or notes on this subject. We would like to assess whether enforcement is seen as a problem due to lack of clarity in the ordinance, whether it is the result of a lack of consistency in interpretation, whether it is the result of our onging difficulty in funding enforcement procedures, or whether it is some other factor not listed here.

Very few responsents expressed any wish for additional town services, and it is clear that most people would prefer to see the town remain predominantly single-family homes. The questions involving maps were apparently broadly misunderstood, and we apologize for not presenting them more clearly. We are, however, still trying to interpret the responses we got. We know however from the final question that 57% of those responding don't want South Hampton to grow at all in the next ten years and another 34% would like to hold the growth in that time to 300 people. The message over all appears to be that we should try not to change the rural character of the town.

One of the most vital sections of the Master Plan work has yet to formally begin. That is the construction of a Groundwater Resources Management section. But our education in this area has come a long way and we can begin to see some of the problems the town will face both in the development of the plan ind in the ensuing effort to zone for the plan's implementation. The town will need to have a lot of research done to learn about the flow of its groundwater. We don't yet know the extent or the cost of these hydrogeological studies. We have the offer of one town organization to contribute to the funding of it and we are grateful for that. This work is an absolute top priority if the town wishes to assure the availability of potable water to its present and future residents.

Once it is determined what has to be protected and how best to do so, the town will have to make some choices.

For example, we may have to rethink our attitudes toward cluster zoning which, according to the Citizen Survey, very few residents would support at this time. A well drawn cluster zoning provision would permit the Planning Board to protect the sections of big tracts of land that are relevant to our ground water resources without the town having to buy the land, while at the same time preserving a great deal of open space and yet permitting the owner to realize a fair economic benefit from his property. Properly done, everyone will benefit. Another advantage to a cluster provision would be to facilitate the preservation of the rural character of the town as well as woods and open space. Curb cuts every 200 feet or so along our existing roads don't contribute anything positive to those considerations. It certainly is something we will ask you to think about.

A great deal of work has been done on the Master Plan and an equal amount remains to be done. Long-range planning is an awesome task in this technological age.

SOUTHEAST REGIONAL REFUSE DISPOSAL DISTRICT

Following Town Meetings in 1988 the Southeast Regional Refuse Disposal District was formed with representation from the towns who voted to remain within the district. The eleven towns are: Brentwood, Canville, Fremont, Hampton, Hampton Falls, Kensington, New Castle, North Hampton, Rye, Sandown, and South Hampton.

While the District will develop eventual systems for the management of all refuse, the focus has been placed on recycling as a first step. The 3year goal is to have 80% participation of households in the district with material such as newsprint, cardboard, aluminum cans, plastic containers, glass and stumps. Each member community is being asked to establish its' own committee to consider feasibility, method, education, process and so forth. Those interested should make themselves known to the Selectmen.

New Hampshire has a number of successful Recycling operations in the state. Experience and educational materials are there to help us become equally successful. South Hampton once made a strong effort to recycle. We are confident that the energy can be rekindled.

The District recognizes that recycling is a first step to reducing the bulk of the waste stream but that much work needs to be done to implement effective management of septage and landfill needs. South Hampton needs another volunteer to serve as an alternate participating in the various committee work that is ongoing in the District.

Continued volunteer and financial support are key to the full implementation of this enormous task. As your representative to the District I am available and happy to answer any questions you might have.

SOUTH HAMPTON SCHOOL BOARD Annual Report, 1988-1989

You could say that the 1988-1989 school year started off with a bang. Literally!

Barnard School and the portable classroom received a total of four lightening strikes over the summer months, causing repeated damage to the fire alarm system. Repairs were made, and with input from Fire Chief John Gamble, improvements were made to the alarm system. Gravel walkways now connect the portable classrooms to the Barnard School. The need for proper ventilation of the portable classroom was emphasized, and this problem will be remedied in time for the warm spring weather.

Last year, the District voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to engage architects, engineers, surveyors, soils consultants, and other professionals, and to pay related costs such as legal and appraisal costs required to plan a new school for South Hampton. The events leading up to the passing of this Warrant Article began with the School Needs Report of November, 1986 which resulted in the School Board's resolution to form a Building Committee. This committee was then broken down into three subcommittees dealing with the site selection, educational programs, and building space needs. With the work of the educational committee completed, emphasis was turned toward the space and site committees.

This year has been one of many accomplishments and much preparation. Through the efforts of the site committee, the Pow Wow River State Forest lands have been leased to the town, at no cost, for the purpose of building a new school. Meanwhile, the space committee, using the findings of the educational committee program study as a reference guide, along with contributions from townspeople, Barnard School staff, SAU 21, and adhering to the minimum state standards for New Hampshire public elementary schools, planned space requirements for a new school. With this done, and with a school site available, the School Board could now hire the services of an architect. JSA, Inc. of Portsmouth, N.H. was chosen, with Briggs Engineering providing site development services.

Over the past several months, JSA and Briggs have been working with the Building Committee, the Barnard School staff, the School Board, and SAU 21 in order to plan a new facility that meets the educational needs of the children and the financial needs of the town. The School Board supports the resulting proposal for a new elementary school for South Hampton, and extends many thanks to all those who have contributed their time and effort toward this goal.

rou, the voter, ultimately have control of your town's educational future. A 'yes' vote on Warrant Article 1, at the South Hampton School District meeting, on March 7, 1989 will allow South Hampton to continue to offer the instructional programs presently available, enable all the State Standards to be realized; and provide a place for community activities for the benefit of all.

The School Board appreciates all the support we have received this year, and we look forward to a successful School District meeting on March 7th.

March 1, 1988 South Hampton, N.H.

The Annual South Hampton, N.H. School District Meeting was called to order at 8:09 p.m. by Moderator Horace Cressy with 50 voters and 4 non-voters in attendance. The Warrant now attached to page 262 was read. Audrey Miller made the motion to "open the meeting", Kim Furnald seconded. The Moderator stressed that people address the chair before speaking.

Budget Committeeman Vincent Early made the motion "to open the meeting with Warrant Article III and adopt the Budget Committee figures", seconded by Ernest Bonah.

Margaret Miller asked to make a motion "for the superintendent, of schools, his staff and the principal of the South Hampton School to speak or answer questions when requested", seconded by Judith Shivik. All in favor.

Vincent Early and Lutz Wallem then spoke on Mr. Early's motion. Mrs. Shivik stated that it was not wise to vote on the article out of sequence because it would be voting on their figures. It was stated by Mr. Wallem that if the figures were to change it would have to be amended. Walter Shivik, Selectman read the recommended procedure to cover warrant articles from the Department of Revenue and Administration Booklet. After an hour discussion of parlimentary prodedure, John Gamble then made the motion "to hold a secret ballot on whether to go with Article III first." Pam Noon seconded 12 in favor of the motion, 39 against. Motion defeated. Vote was then taken on whether to take Article III first - 22 in favor 27 against, motion defeated.

ARTICLE I

Margaret Miller made the motion to accept the article as written Carol Baker seconded. Mrs. Shivik explained the work the School Board and all the committees had done. Reports had been distributed to residents as well as holding an informational meeting a week before the District Meeting. Supt. Dr. Norman Katner spoke regarding the states position on building new schools. He stated, the state cannot force a town to build a new school, but could force a town to look for other sources where to educate; the State Fire Marshall has the authority to close a school, but the decision to build or not to build is up to the body of voters. The school board had detailed steps they have taken to bring them to this point. After an hour discussion with many townspeople speaking, Vincent Early made a motion "to raise \$10,000 for the school board to start the process for the planning of a new school". seconded by Fred Kokacka, Jr. Vote 22 for and 27 against. Motion failed. Walter Shivik made the motion "for Article I to be amended to \$25,000 to engage engineers, surveyors etc. to pay related costs such as legal fees for the planning of a new school". Sheila Mahoney seconded

ARTICLE II

Patricia Hesselbach moved that this article be accepted as read. seconded by Mike Santosuosso. After the board explained where the land was and its history, the motion carried in the affirmative.

Motion voted in the affirmative.

South Hampton School District Meeting Minutes - Page 2 March 1, 1988

ARTICLE III

Judith Shivik moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$543,550 for the support of the school and for the salaries of School Officials and Agents and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the School District. seconded by Margaret Miller. This sum includes \$25,000 of the \$40,000 not approved. After discussion of certain line items, this article was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IV Margaret Miller moved that this article be accepted as read, seconded by Carol Baker. Motion carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V

Patricial Hesselbach moved that this article be accepted as read. Margaret Miller seconded. Lutz Wallem spoke on the budget committee cuts. After statements were made, the motion carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VI

Margaret Miller spoke and thanked Mrs. Shivik for her years on the board and presented her with a plaque of appreciation.

Michael Santosuosso made the motion to adjourn the meeting at 10:45 p.m., second by Margaret Miller.

AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the School Board South Hampton School District South Hampton, New Hampshire

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the South Hampton School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1988, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the financial activities of the Student Activities Fund, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts and the Student Activities Fund results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraphs, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the South Hampton School District at June 30, 1988, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the South Hampton School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.
