To the inhabitants to the Town of Tuftonboro in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Town House in said Tuftonboro on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March next, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1 will be voted on by Ballot March 12th.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Central School in said Tuftonboro on Wednesday, the Thirteenth day of March next, at 7:30 p.m. in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) to be used to complete the reconstruction of Whitten Road. The 1989 Town Meeting approved the petition to rebuild Whitten Road. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for improvements on Northline Road, including: moving the road away from the former Dow House (now Sharples) and straightening the curve, and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a property exchange with the Sharples and to execute all documents necessary to give effect to the relocation of the roadway. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) for the Special for Tar Account. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for improvements to Melvin Wharf Road. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum to Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be added to the Police Cruiser Capitai Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the Piper House Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to be placed in the existing Capital Reserve Fund for the Revaluation of the Town of Tuftonboro. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) to be added to the Dump Closure Capital Reserve

Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for the proposed addition to the Tuftonboro Library (said sum to be held in the Library Capital Reserve Fund until needed), and to authorize the withdrawal of Forty-four Thousand Two Hundred and Sixty Dollars (\$44,260.00) raised in previous years, plus any accrued interest, from the Library Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose, for a total withdrawal in 1991 of Seventy-Four Thousand Two Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$74,260.00) (plus accrued interest). This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$145,000.00) to purchase a new Fire Truck and authorize the withdrawal of Seventy-nine Thousand Dollars (\$79,000.00) plus the accrued interest from the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Fire Chief to dispose of the 1952 two and one-half (2 1/2) ton Army surplus vehicle and take any moneys received and establish a fund for the restoration and preservation of the 1938 Ford Maxim fire engine. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Nine Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$16,950.00) for a computer system for the use of the Tax Collector and Town Office Accounts. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

14. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors, Disability and Health Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated amended by Chapter 301 and 332 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Four Hundred Nine Dollars (\$7,409.00) to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof. The effective date to be the beginning of the calendar year, January 1, 1991. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

15. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Selectmen's Secretary as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Task Force to be made up of volunteers to study and report back to them on the feasibility and possible implementation of a recycling program in anticipation of eventual State-mandated closing of the Town's landfill. No expenditure will be required for the study.

17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a Use Agreement with the Mirror Lake Community Church, also known as Second Christian Church of Tuftonboro, for the use of Lot A, the Ernest B. Piper Lot, for parking; any improvements and alterations to be approved by the Board of Selectmen and insurance in amounts and on terms acceptable to the Board of Selectmen to be provided by the Church.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey Lot 62 Hidden Valley, Tax Map #69-2-62, acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed in 1985. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80. The Selectmen shall have the power to establish a minimum amount for which the property is to be sold and the terms and conditions of the sale.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1991 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36A-5.

20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town gifts, legacies, donations and devises made to the Town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for interest charges, as approved by the Budget Committee, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, for the current year and issue notes therefor, said notes to be repaid from taxes.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same, the sum of Five Hundred Eighty-eight Thousand Three Hundred Twelve Dollars (\$588,312.00) as recommended by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the costs of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

The Moderator read the results of the voting which had taken place on Tuesday. He announced the winners of all positions for town office and declared the passage of articles two and three. Vittum; Selectmen 2 years William Rollins; Town Clerk 3 years Mary B. Craigue; Tax Collector 3 years Jacquelyn H. Rollins; Treasurer 3 years Sharon Berry; Road Agent 3 years Reg Colby; Budget Comm. 3 years Ken Craigue, Sue Weeks; Budget Comm. 2 years Edward Hebden; Library Trustee Christie Sarles; Trustee of Trust Funds Robert Ramsbotham. The Town Clerk swore in the Moderator.

4. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional veteran's exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for veterans seeking the exemption? The optional veteran's exemption is \$100, rather than \$50.

Motion was made by Earl Hobart and seconded by Barbara Hull to move the question.

Vote by paper ballot Total Votes Cast 110 Yes 101 No 9 Article declared passed by the Moderator. **5**. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:35, IV for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a service-connected total disability? The optional disability exemption is \$14,000., rather than \$700.

Vote by paper ballot Total Votes Cast 111 Yes 106 No 5 Article declared passed by the Moderator.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000,000.00) to be used to further rebuild Whitten Road. 1989 Town Meeting approved the petition to rebuild Whitten Road. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Ken Craigue and seconded by Thad Coleman to adopt article 6 as read. The vote by show of hands was unanimous in favor and article declared passed by the Moderator.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) to be added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Barbara Hull and seconded by Ken Craigue to adopt article 7 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Three Hundred Sixteen Dollars (\$14,316.00 to purchase a new Police Cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of Fourteen Thousand Three Hundred Sixteen Dollars (\$14,316.00) from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose, and to designate the Selectmen as agents to expend.

Motion was made by Wm. Whall and seconded by Dick Newcomb to adopt article 8 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Gordon Hunt and seconded by Norman Vittum to adopt article 9 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative. Article declared passed by the Moderator.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be added to the Piper House Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Ken Craigue and seconded by Albert Southard to adopt article 10 as read. The question was raised as to what this money was planned to be used for. Selectman Vittum explained it would be used to expand present Town Office, probably for a meeting room also. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative. Article declared passed by the Moderator. **11** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for the Library Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Fred Bauer and seconded by John Williams to adopt article 11 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be placed in the existing Capital Reserve Fund for the Revaluation of the Town of Tuftonboro. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Dick Newcomb and seconded by Helen Whall to adopt article twelve as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for the Dump Closure Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Ken Craigue and seconded by Earl Hobart to adopt article thirteen as read. Landfill problem was discussed by Selectmen Vittum. Town at present does not know status of life of landfill. Tests will be done shortly and the Hydrogeological Study will proceed. Until this study is done and plan accepted by the State will the Town know the future of the landfill, except that it will be very costly to close. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) for Special for Tar. This article has the approval of the budget Committee.

Motion was made by Darwin Moulton and seconded by Dick Newcomb to adopt article fourteen as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Nine Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$20,960.00) to be added to the Special for Tar Account and to authorize the use/transfer of the December 31, 1989 account balance for this purpose. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Darwin Moulton and seconded by Barbara Hull to adopt article fifteen as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Dollars (\$600.00) to assist the Family Health Centre. This article is on the Warrant by Petition. This article was not submitted in time for approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Barbara Hull and seconded by Ivan Phelps to adopt article sixteen as read. Meeting moved to let the Director of Carroll County Mental Health to speak on the article. Explained it is a program of Pre-Natal Care for the Poverty Level. Town has received some benefits. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator. **17.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1990 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36A-5.

Motion was made by Nat Crane and seconded by Earl Hobart to adopt article seventeen as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

18. To see if the Town will vote to designate and proclaim April 22, 1990, as Earth Day, 1990 and to set aside that day for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching the "Decade of the Environment." This article on the Warrant by Petition.

Motion was made by Dan Harrington and seconded by Barbara Hull to adopt article as read. Meeting questioned what was involved. Petition was brought in by parents of science class at Central School. Maureen Borowski explained that this would be a school function; merely asking for Town approval. Vote by show of hands was in the affirmative but not unanimous. Article declared passed by the Moderator.

19. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen to accept in the name of the Town gifts and donations which may inure to the Town during the year; said sums to be placed in Special Accounts to defray normal Town Expenses as may be outlined by the donor and acceptable to the Board of Selectmen. In the event of an unspecified gift, monies will be applied to Highway Maintenance and Reconstruction.

Motion made by Sue Weeks and seconded by Helen Whall to adopt article nineteen as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to pay for the preparation of establishing the boundary lines on Eastwood Road for the Town's R-O-W to Lake Winnipesaukee. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Ken Craigue and seconded by Barbara Hull to adopt article twenty as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) for the Twenty Mile Bay Land Purchase. Any sums not used will be placed in a Tuftonboro land Acquisition Account established by donations in 1989. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion made by Potter Campbell and seconded by Vanessa Vittum to adopt this article as read. Selectmen Vittum explained the purchase of the land at Twenty Mile Bay through the Land Conservation Investment Program; with a Conservation Easement from Cecile Crowe Bently, this sum represents the Town's expense in acquiring this property. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One thousand Dóllars (\$1,000.00) for interest charges, as approved by the Budget Committee, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of

taxes, for the current year and issue notes therefor, said notes to be repaid from taxes.

Motion made by Charles Allard and seconded by Robert Ramsbotham to adopt article twenty-two as read. Selectmen Vittum explained that Town has not needed to borrow the last two years because of the semi-annual collection of taxes; but, article needs to be included in the warrant in case there is a need. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the sum of Five Hundred Seventy-two Thousand Four Hundred Twenty-one Dollars (\$572,421.00) as recommended by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the costs of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8.

Motion made by Ken Craigue and seconded by Potter Campbell to adopt article twenty-three as read. No discussion. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative. Total Budget figure which includes articles six, seven, eight, nine, ten, eleven, twelve, thirteen, fourteen, sixteen, twenty, twenty-one, twenty-two and twenty-three brings total Budget figure to Seven Hundred Eighty-six Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-seven Dollars (\$786,337.00). Article twentythree declared passed by the Moderator.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Motion was made by Carolyn Wood and seconded by Bill Whall to adopt article twenty-four as read. Vote in the affirmative to close the meeting. Meeting closed at 9 P.M. with approximately 120 residents in attendance. Norman Vittum, Selectmen, requested to speak briefly about the school situation. Looking for a vote of confidence to keep elementary students in Town; if necessary the Town giving the school district additional land for expansion.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE TRUST FUNDS

The Trustees of Trust Funds for the Town of Tuftonboro financial report is included in the annual Report of the Town.

Funds currently managed by the Trustees include: Cemetery Care Funds, the Shepard Scholarship Fund, Tomb Library Fund and the C.W. Davis Fund. These Funds are invested in CDs and the interest is expended yearly, being dispersed in a manner to maintain sufficient estimated amounts for the following and current year's expenses.

The capital Funds here are invested in line with expected expenditures to be voted by the people of Tuftonboro. (Piper House Capital Fund, Dump Closure Fund, Fire Truck Fund, Library Capital Fund, and Town Reappraisal Fund.)

The voters approved the purchase of a new Police Cruiser in 1990. The Fund was paid to the selectmen for the Cruiser. The balance of the Cruiser Fund is invested in a CD.

Reports of both capital and trusted other funds are reported to the Town and the State of NH Charitable Trust Agency after audit approval.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

January 9, 1991

During 1990 the Conservation Commission processed thirty (30) new fill and dredge applications.

The State of N.H. Wetlands Board denied nine (9) permit applications and denied one (1) denial appeal.

The Conservation Commission investigated four (4) non-permitted activities and forward that information to the N.H. Wetlands Board.

The Conservation Commission assisted seven (7) permitees with applications and assisted others in obtaining additional information for the N.H. Wetlands Board.

There were administrative fines issued in five (5) cases.

The above statistics suggest that although the applications for permits were down from 1989, the State of N.H. Wetlands Board has been actively seeking monetary compensations for unauthorized fill and dredge activities in order to curtail that activity.

The Conservation Commission wishes to acknowledge and commend Mrs. Beatrice Johnson for the Conservation Easement that she presented to the Selectmen last summer for property on the Nineteen Mile Brook Estuary. We would also like to acknowledge the acquisition by the LCIP of lands donated by Mrs. C.C. Bentley and purchased from Wayne Parkhurst on the Twenty Mile Brook Estuary.

The Conservation Commission also continues to underwrite the purchase of "Ranger Rick" magazine for use at the Tuftonboro Central School with hopes that the students will acquire good conservation practices for the future.

REPORT OF THE TUFTONBORO HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Winter plowing and sanding were done as usual. The beginning of the year was especially snowy and icy with a severe contrast as 1990 came to an end. Dirt roads were graded, raked, and crushed gravel was added to these areas.

The working relationship between the beavers and the highway department began in earnest in April and continues today.

The bridge on Sodom Road was widened and guard rails were put up. A certain amount of tree trimming was done on many roads which substantially increased visibility and safety in those areas where it was needed. The Old Town Road was widened, culverts were replaced and/or relocated on Harvest Lane, Eastwood Road and Burleigh Road. Also the entrance to the Burleigh Road was widened and shoulder work was done on Brown Road. Whitten Road was ditched and guard rails put up. Stone walls were relocated, road widened and then Tuftonboro Neck Road was paved. A hailstorm in May and severe weather in July caused significant damage to trees and a great deal of debris on the roads. In November approximately 2,000 yards of sand were stockpiled for winter use.

Thank you, everyone, for your cooperation. It is greatly appreciated.

PARK & RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Tuftonboro's recreation facilities once again reached new high levels of use by the public and enjoyed substantial support by contributors providing needed services and assistance in achieving the success of the programs.

Mary Ann Murray's 1990 swim classes continued their growth with 87 children and two adults signed up for lessons, a 20% increase over 1989 registrations. The swimming classes progressed well in spite of somewhat chilly weather during the first two weeks. Only one day's sessions had to be cancelled due to heavy rain.

Two part-time assistants, Kerrianne Cunniff and Nathan Dickey, helped manage the coverage of special swim activities. Their work included coaching the swimmers from Tuftonboro who swam with the Wolfeboro team; teaching the pre-beginners and helping with the shallow water beginners. The swim teams' overall increased participation this year included an informal inter-camp meet at Camp Belknap. The latest Red Cross program, Emergency Water Safety, was added to each of the five progressive swimming classes' programs. Two adults also participated and completed the appropriate level of instruction.

The cost recovery program continued and a modest fee increase to \$10 per child or \$15 per family was instituted. Fees, other than those turned back to the town, were used to purchase two hard cervical collars and a V-8 strap for use with the backboard. Some additional funds, together with contributions of lumber and foam, were used to build a portable swim platform which was constructed by Fred Williams assisted by some of the swimmers. Fred Williams also should be thanked for making some much needed repairs and improvements at the Town Dock. He replaced a board, covered a dangerous area and created a suitable diving platform for the advanced beginners group.

Recommendations for 1991 include addition of a lifeguarding course which could prove to be of considerable value to the community over a period of time. A paddle board, a diving brick and some additional part time instruction assistance would be required both to handle this new class and the expected continued growth in swim class enrollments.

Bruce Johnson directed and several members of the community helped with the completion of the basketball court and baseball backstop at Davis Field. Use of the area by the general public continued to grow as the facilities were improved. The shed from the skating area was relocated to the Field with the help of Dave Cash, Blair Rudolph, Scott MacDonald, Craig Johnson, Rob Newhall and Caleb Rudolph. The Tuftonboro Nursery School has assumed responsibility for the shed and the power bill for the yard light and, in turn, will use it for fund raising during the Little League and Soccer seasons.

Regular programs at Davis Field included Little League baseball, the Wolfeboro/Tuftonboro soccer teams and a local womens' softball league. Various large groups also used the field for softball and the Tuftonboro School used the facilities on a daily basis during the school year. Due to continued very

wet conditions during Spring and Fall, caused by water running onto the field, the perimeter requires shoring up and clearance of blocked stream beds.

The 19 Mile Bay area also experienced growth in the use of its facilities. Due to the anticipated relocation of Route 109 past the area and projected swimming area improvements, no major changes were undertaken this year. The Francis Laase family handled the purchasing and installation of a new rope and floats to mark off the safety area for boats. They also oversaw the use of the picnic area.

The town has been most fortunate in terms of the number of interested citizens who have donated time, effort and materials toward developing and managing the programs sponsored by the Department. Their efforts are truly appreciated and they help to continue our reputation as a truly caring community.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1990, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, permit fires that escaped control and rekindled fires. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable or all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1990, including a 262 acre fire in Moultonboro and several fires in Hooksett.

In 1990, the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands trained 844 local Wardens and Deputy Wardens in the Incident Command System (ICS), an incident management system for all types of emergencies. In 1991, Wardens will be trained in the use of Class A foam in wildfire suppression.
