We also want to express our condolences to any of the families who have lost loved ones this year whether they are new to the community or have lived here all their lives.

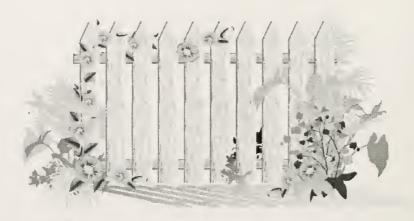

To the inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Barnstead Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the Tenth (10th) day of March, next at 7:00 a.m. of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

- To vote by official ballot on amendments to the Barnstead Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Barnstead Planning Board, as follows:
 - 1. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #1, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To revise Article 7 of the Zoning Ordinance - Shoreland Protection Ordinance - to delete the Article as written and replace it with references to RSA 483-B:1-20, Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act and Administrative Rules Env-Wq 1401-1414 as amended.

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #2, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To add to Article 2 - Definitions. "Shoreline lot: is any lot adjacent to any public waters as defined by the Barnstead Zoning Ordinance and subject to RSA: 483B The Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act".

3. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #3, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To amend to Article 4, section 4-2.07 of the Zoning Ordinance "to allow as a matter of right an open deck up to 8 feet wide for all shoreline lots".

4. Are you in favor of the adoption of question #4, amending the Zoning Ordinance, Town of Barnstead, NH, as proposed by the Planning Board, as follows:

To revise Article 12, section 12-16 of the Zoning Ordinance – Growth Management Regulation, to change the Sunset date from April 1, 2009 to April 1, 2014.

The second session for the purpose of discussing and voting upon the remaining articles of the Town Warrant shall be held on Saturday, March 14th, 2009, at 9:00 a.m. at the Barnstead Elementary School.

- 3. To hear the Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to organize the Town of Barnstead Fire Department in accordance with RSA 154:1, I(b), which provides that the Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Fire Chief and further provides that firefighters shall be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, upon the recommendation of the Fire Chief. In accordance with RSA 154:1, IV, this change, if approved, shall not take effect until one year following approval of this Article.
- 5. To see if the Town will increase the allocated number of Full-Time Police Officer Positions from the six (6) full-time officers required to

minimally operate a 24/7 agency to seven (7) full-time officers. The cost of the additional position including outfitting, training, and the Town Employee Benefit Package could be up to \$67,980 and is not reflected in the current proposed budget figures. (Not Recommended by Selectmen).

- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of One 6. Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000) to be placed in the Emergency Management Expendable Trust Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of Ten 7. Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to be placed in the Bridge Construction Capital Reserve Fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- To see if the Town will vote to establish an Emergency Fuel and Heat-8. ing Oil Expendable Trust Fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a for the purpose of meeting the cost of unanticipated gasoline, diesel and heating oil expenses; and to raise and appropriate Thirty Nine Thousand Dollars (\$39,000) to be placed in this fund; and furthermore to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend this fund. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of Six 9. Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) for an energy upgrade in the Town Buildings as proposed by Atlantic Energy through Public Service of New Hampshire for lighting and fixtures. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:3. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) for Milfoil treatment of Suncook River and for the divers in Barnstead waters. This will be a non-lapsing article and will not lapse until December 31, 2013. This is a special warrant per RSA 32:3. (Submitted by Petition) (Recommended by Selectmen) (Recommended by Budget Committee).

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Professional Planner Expendable Trust Fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19 a for the purpose of being able to retain a professional planner when expertise is required by the Planning Board to investigate technical and complex planning issues and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be placed in this fund; and furthermore to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend. This is a special warrant article per RSA 32:2. (Recommended by Selectmen) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee).
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey the property at tax Map 046 Lot 028, to Melanie Horohov, to be merged with Melanie Horohov's property at Map 046 Lot 027. Melanie Horohov has paid all taxes, interest, costs and expenses owed to the Town in maintaining the property. This property was acquired by tax deed in November, 2003. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 13. To see if the Town of Barnstead will vote to accept Beaver Ridge Road to Beaver Pond Road to Hazel Clark Road in Barnstead, NH as a Class 5 Roadway. (Submitted by Petition).
- 14. We, the undersigned registered voters of Barnstead, hereby request that the Town of Barnstead oversee the care of Forest Road in regards to plowing, sanding and maintenance. (Submitted by Petition).
- 15 To see if the Town will vote to change the Road Agent's position from an elected position to an appointed position. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 16 To see if the Town will vote to change the Welfare Officer's position from an elected position to an appointed position. (Recommended by Selectmen).
- 17 To see if the Town will vote to change the Treasurer's position from an elected position to an appointed position. (Recommended by the Selectmen).
- 18 To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the Budget Committee's recommended sum of \$3,123,471 for general municipal operations. The Selectmen recommend \$3,213,444. This article does not include appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately.

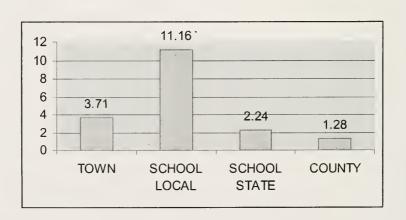

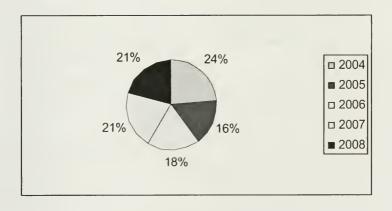

Selectmen's Report

Dear Residents of Barnstead.

As we know 2008 has been a hard year for our community. After the flooding in both 2006 and 2007, we had almost record snow falls combined with very high diesel and heating oil prices. The combination put our regular budget under pressure from its inception. Despite this, virtually all the flood damage and the program for enlarging and replacing culverts was completed.

The year was dominated again by weather related disasters when in the late morning of Thursday, July 24, a class EF2 tornado struck our town. The tornado entered on our boundary with Pittsfield and exited on the Alton boundary. The rotational wind was up to 135 mph with a ground speed of between 50 to 60 mph, yet miraculously we had no serious injuries or fatalities; mainly due to luck and the hour the tornado struck. Over 120 houses were damaged and several were subsequently judged to be irreparable. The largest amount of damage to personal property occurred in the areas of Locke Lake which were in the direct path of the tornado.

Despite the severity and scale of the destruction, by Sunday, July 27 all our roads were opened to be at least passable enabling utility, telephone and emergency services to get through. Fortunately, our highway department had recently joined the Municipal Highway Department Mutual Aid System and the Governor, having declared a state of emergency, sent State highway crews and equipment to assist our own department. We also received very welcome help from many volunteers, both from our own citizens, UNH Forestry and the Southern Baptist Emergency Organization that came all the way from Tennessee and Virginia.

Unfortunately, although FEMA reimbursed the Town for 75% of the cost of tornado related damage, non municipal entities and private property damage was not granted any funding. In light of this the Selectmen asked for and received tremendous help from many of our skilled citizens and their machinery to help with the cleaning up. We also received a great deal of help from the community volunteer program at Strafford County Jail.

During the clean up work we also managed to cut and split significant amounts of cord wood which went to the welfare department for the fuel assistance program. We would like to thank both the residents and the Welfare Department for their assistance in providing our volunteers with sustenance during the very hard days of July and August. We hope to continue and possibly extend the program during the summer as there is an enormous amount of work still to be done.

Due to the frequency and severity of natural disasters hitting the Town, the

Selectmen requested Mr. John Blair to accept the position of Emergency Management Director and Mr. Steve Byers as his deputy. They are both eminently qualified for these positions and were almost immediately tested by the major ice storm which struck in December leaving many homes without power for several days with temperature dipping well below freezing. Again, unfortunately this placed an additional burden on our highway department to clear the roads to enable power company crews to begin work. During this widespread outage, together with Alton, we utilized the Prospect Mountain High School as an emergency shelter. The cooperation of the school authorities bodes well if we have future emergencies. The high school can provide heat, food, shelter, and other amenities for large numbers of people.

In addition to the above events and directly related to the national economic woes, we had an unprecedented number of bank repossessions of property and tax liens placed on property within the Town. We also saw the revenue coming to the Town from such things as vehicle registrations, etc. fall for the first time in many years. The reduction in income had the effect of putting further strain on the financial well being of the Town.

On a more optimistic note, the thrift shop, opened by our welfare officer and staffed by volunteers is thriving and helping the whole community in these increasingly hard times. We would urge everyone to support this endeavor.

The Selectmen also began with five of our neighbors to form the Suncook Valley Regional Association. The purpose is to study where financial savings can be made for the tax payers by looking at how we can regionalize many of the services which each town needs to provide. The first benefit was in forming a health group which provides exactly the same benefits to our employees as they already receive and in the case of Barnstead reduced our costs by 13.5%. We feel that future endeavors in the direction of regional cooperation combined with the encouragement of tax positive business and enterprise will be essential towards achieving a stable and affordable tax rate.

Assessor's Report

After completing a sales ratio study the Town decided it was NOT necessary to update all property values for the 2008 tax year. Although the market has gone through a lot of changes over the past year, Barnstead's assessments remain equitable among the different property types. Therefore, the 2008 assessments remain the same as 2007, unless a property had improvements or an error was corrected. The Town will continue to analyze assessment to sale prices annually to determine the need for a valuation update.

In keeping with the State's requirements that towns review their property record data once every five years the Town has contracted the firm of Brett S. Purvis & Associates to perform a review of 20% of the Town on an annual basis. In 2008 town tax maps 36 thru 50 were reviewed for accuracy. All property owners should check their property record cards annually for data accuracy.

Any taxpayer that feels their property's equalized assessment does not reflect the market value of the property may file an abatement by March 1, 2009. When filling your abatement application only valid arms length transactions may be used as comparables. Foreclosures, bank sales and family sales are not considered valid sales. The abatement applications are available in the Selectmen's office or online at www.nh.gov/btla.

The deadline for filing all exemptions and tax credit applications is April 15 for the tax year applied for. These include elderly and blind exemptions as well as veteran's tax credits. If you feel you qualify for any of these as of April 1, 2009 stop by the Selectmen's office to fill out an application.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of Town of Barnstead as of and for the year ended December 31, 2008, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Town's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Town of Barnstead's internal control.

A significant deficiency is a control deficiency, or combination of control deficiencies, that adversely affects the entity's ability to initiate, authorize, record, process, or report financial data reliably in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles such that there is more than a remote likelihood that a misstatement of the entity's financial statements that is more than inconsequential will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. A material weakness is a significant deficiency, or combination of significant deficiencies, that results in more than a remote likelihood that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected by the entity's internal control. Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses.

Barnstead Emergency Management Report

Residents of Barnstead,

This year, our Selectmen formally organized our town's response to major emergencies under the Incident Command System. This is Barnstead's participation within the National Incident Management System. The Incident Command System is the customary way that all towns and state government bodies manage their response to natural disasters such as floods, tornadoes, or storms and man-made disasters that include hazardous spills, criminal or terrorist attacks and many, many other events. The National Incident Management System requires all levels of government to adopt the Incident Command System as a condition of receiving federal re-imbursement of disaster expenses.

To help the Selectmen fulfill this requirement, they appointed me, a retired military officer, as the Emergency Management Director and Mr. Steve Byers, past chief of police, as the Deputy Emergency Management Director. Together, we will work to bring the local, regional, state and federal resources to bear upon all town disasters. In order to meet the needs of any incident, we will meld all support personnel and agencies into a common management structure, provide support to operational crews and prevent duplication so that we are most cost effective.

Our short term objectives are to prepare for the next disaster by taking required Federal Emergency Management Agency courses, attending state Emergency Management Agency conferences and courses, and keeping our town plans current. Next, we will exercise our plan to validate that it contains the right information and revise it where necessary.

To help us prepare to aid those who are most vulnerable in Barnstead, we will compile a list of people in town who, if for any reason, may require assistance or checking during a disaster or emergency. In the back of the town report is a Request For Assistance form. Should you choose to participate or if you know of someone who might need help, please complete the lines that apply and return it to the town hall. This information will be kept confidential and will only be used by town personnel for emergency purposes.

Barnstead Fire Department Study Committee

The Committee began meeting in May 2008 after being reappointed at the 2008 Town Meeting. It was immediately clear that the current Board of Selectmen and Barnstead Fire Rescue Inc. had an agenda to resolve this matter in a manner that was cooperative and in everyone's best interest. The Committee prepared to take on the role as the sounding and review group and to support both side's work toward what hopefully was an amicable solution to the issues before us.

Because of the election of Jim Barnard and Phil Grillo (former members of the committee) to the Board of Selectmen, two positions were left vacant on the committee. Assistant Moderator Chris Hipkiss was responsible to fill vacancies on the committee, based on the criteria for appointment. Chris advertised for two members as large and appointed former Selectmen Ed Tasker and Frank Sullivan to fill the positions.

The issue of insurance coverage was premier to the Board of Selectmen as that had been a critical issue for BFRI regarding buildings, equipment and deductibles. The Board and BFRI had worked collectively with the Local Government Center and the insurance carrier for the Town to resolve the issue of eligibility of BFRI to be covered under the Town policy as a government entity. In a letter dated June 6, 2008, LGC denied coverage based on their determination that BFRI did not qualify as a government entity. The Board of Selectmen looked at alternatives to find insurance coverage that would provide comparable coverage while saving the Town substantial dollars.

The issue of housing of Town Fire/Rescue personnel began to be pursued by the Board of Selectmen and the Fire Chief in June. The issue of putting municipal funds into a private building seemed to be a stumbling block for the Board, based on the recommendation by the NH Department of Revenue Administration representative. As a result, this issue was not resolved during the year.

By October BFRI and the Selectmen were actively meeting to resolve insurance issues and discuss other issues, including a review of the contracts between BFRI and the Town. Contract revisions on the original document began. In November, BFRI reported to the committee they are actively meeting with the members and working with Study Committee Chairman Paul Vince to draft contract language and time frames for the transfer of authority and financial responsibility to the municipality.

Our December meeting was short on attendance but those members present were presented a letter by Nick Rott, President of BFRI, addressed to the Selectmen offering a timetable and terms by which BFRI and its members would allow the use of their equipment and facilities until such time as the Town had replaced the equipment or determined it to surplus. BFRI would change its name and charter to reflect a different type of non-profit organization. This would place the full responsibility for all aspects of management of the Fire Department with the Chief and Selectmen.

The Committee submits the following recommendations:

- We encourage the Town to support a warrant article establishing the position of Full Time Fire Chief.
- Support any proposal brought forth to amend or replace the existing management contract with BFRI if both sides are in agreement to the final terms.

Our work has been long and at times tedious over the last three years, but rewarding. Although we cannot take credit for actually bringing the parties to the table to resolve the issues among them we feel the existence of this committee and the feedback we provided helped bring forth change. The credit for resolving the issues goes to the professionalism and dedication of the Board of Selectmen and the officers and members of BFRI. We recognize change is difficult and not without sacrifice but the actions taken by both sides will in the long run improve what is already an outstanding service to the residents and guests to our town.

It is the Committee's position we have completed our work and should dissolve as of the 2009 Town Meeting. Our thanks to the members of BFRI and the current Board of Selectmen for the foresight and vision to work with this committee to develop a resolution to a problem which has caused much anguish and expense to many over the last years.

In less than two hours we had over 150 fire and ems personnel providing search and rescue to the complete effected area making sure that all homes were checked and those needing assistance were taken care of. We have read about this type of effort during Katrina but now we have benefited from all the Emergency Preparedness Training that has been held since the events of 911 and the World Trade Center. The Board of Selectmen appointed John Blair the Emergency Management Director for the Town and this now completes the critical management for future natural disasters and other emergencies.

The present economic situation causes concerns for everyone. This is a time when everyone looks to find alternatives to help during these tight times, but please do not put you or your family in danger.

- 1. Make sure all heating devices are inspected
- 2. Install smoke detectors, AC powered with battery back-up
- 3. Install carbon monoxide detectors
- 4. Only use NH licensed installers for all heating devices
- 5. Have your wood burning chimney cleaned regularly
- 6. Call to have a safety inspection of your home
- 7. Whenever you have an emergency call 9-1-1

The Fire-Rescue is always looking for new members and invites those interested in joining to stop at the station or call to discuss joining this dedicated group. It's a lot of work but the rewards of knowing you made a difference are what make the job all worth while.

Annual Report of the Chief of Police Kenneth A. Borgia

The Barnstead Police Department has completed yet another year of providing 24 hours a day. 7 days a week law enforcement services despite officer recruitment and retention issues that most law enforcement agencies have experienced nationwide. Unfortunately, the amount of work to be done and the number of calls to be answered do not subside when manpower is below minimum requirements. We can look back at 2008 and reflect on having survived a wide array of natural disasters.

From the statistics reported, one can easily see that there are noticeable reductions in several crime categories listed as a direct result of the services provided by this agency. The most marked reductions are in the areas of suspicious activity reports, juvenile matters and animal complaints. During 2008 the Town of Barnstead and its Police Department acquired an Animal Control Officer position. The position has been filled by Stacey Mulcahy who is on call for the Town as needed and can be contacted through the Barnstead Police Department.

The Barnstead Police Department has noted a steady increase in neighbor disputes over the past few years resulting in criminal investigations. Many of the issues being reported can oftentimes be resolved by courteous requests between neighbors themselves rather than resorting directly to law enforcement involvement. One of the best forms of reduction in criminal activity is neighbors helping neighbors.

Some of our anticipated goals in 2009 include an increase in awareness programs and seminars by working with the school and the community to provide a safer environment and the initiation of the Barnstead Police Department K-9 program which will aid the Town in lifesaving efforts.

As dedicated public servants to the residents of and visitors to the Town of Barnstead the sworn and civilian employees of the Barnstead Police Department will continue to provide the professional law enforcement services which the Town has come to know and expect. As always, anyone can feel free to visit the Barnstead Police Department where their questions, comments, and concerns are appreciated.

Municipal Building Committee

The MBC has been continuing its work by looking into what the building needs are of other Town departments, specifically the Fire and Highway Departments. We asked each department to come up with a physical plan and possible locations for new buildings and/or renovations. There are many factors involved with this planning process.

The MBC feels that input from the departments is critical for the building program and planning process to be able to meet the departments' expectations and needs. The goal of the MBC is to accurately budget for future buildings and to produce durable, energy efficient, economical and green (environmentally friendly) buildings. These projects are still a work in process.

The MBC was asked to look into renovating the existing Town Hall to see what could be done to temporarily add more usable space and increase the comfort level for our employees and visitors. While there are some things that can be done, i.e. using the stage area as office space, the cost vs. benefit needs to be considered as well as preserving any historical features.

The 2008 Town Meeting voted not to pursue a building program for the Town Offices and Police Department at this time. The Town has expended approximately \$90,000 for those plans; the balance of the appropriation has lapsed. The building plans, 70-80% complete, are still workable today with a minor code and compliance review.

The MBC did vote to recommend to the Board of Selectmen to not pursue any building programs this year because of the current economic conditions that all of us are feeling. When the economy returns to a more robust condition, the Town will need to make a serious effort to review and address a Town Building program. Until then, the committee will continue to work on putting together the program. The committee welcomes all input and ideas.

As the Town grows, the Towns' infrastructure will also need to be updated. This includes buildings that house the services the Town provides. If the Town wants to attract new business to help stabilize our tax burden, we must be prepared to invest in our service infrastructure. By implementing these plans, we are telling prospective business that we are investing in ourselves to provide a better environment for them to come to Barnstead to conduct their business; a place that people will want to come to, a destination community.

Barnstead Planning Board Annual Report

Planning Boards in the State of New Hampshire have the responsibility to guide the growth and development of the community. The duties of Planning Boards to accomplish that responsibility include preparing and periodically amending a Master Plan, updating a Capital Improvement Plan to project costs for infrastructure improvement projects, reviewing applications for subdivisions/lot line adjustments/site plan reviews, and establishing any other requirements deemed necessary or helpful to support the development of the town.

The purpose of a Master Plan is to take input from the community at large and to document the direction the people who live in the community want to see the town headed. Once the desired long-term development of the community is envisioned, infrastructure improvements to support that development can be identified. The Capital Improvements Plan uses the information from the Master Plan to project spending over a 5-year period so that the Selectmen, the Budget Committee and the Town Meeting can budget appropriately and accomplish specific goals while controlling spending. The Planning Board has revised the Capital Improvement Plan during the year 2008, with a committee headed by Phil Grillo.

During 2008 the Planning Board has approved 3 major subdivisions, 0 minor subdivision, 4 lot line adjustments, and 7 site plan reviews for new businesses in town. This created 16 new building lots. The Board still has a major subdivision application before it, which will create 11 new building lots.

In June of 2002, the Planning Board enacted interim measures to control the growth of the Town of Barnstead. In 2001, the number of building permits for new homes jumped from a ten-year average of 9 per year to a total of 137 in one year. Alarmed by this increase, and with the number of building permits for new homes at 87 by the beginning of June 2002, the Board posted a notice to adopt a temporary growth limitation ordinance. This stopped the issuance of building permits until a special election could be held. The voters overwhelmingly supported the limited growth ordinance at the special election in June 2002. With the adoption of the Interim Growth Ordinance, the Planning Board was addressing the issues of overcrowding in the elementary school, high school enrollment, and the strain on municipal services in town created by the unprecedented growth. To continue these growth control measures the Board placed a permanent Growth Control Ordinance on the ballot for the 2003 Town Meeting. This ordinance passed by an overwhelming margin, and has withstood a test in Superior Court. This ordinance allowed the town to limit the number of building permits issued

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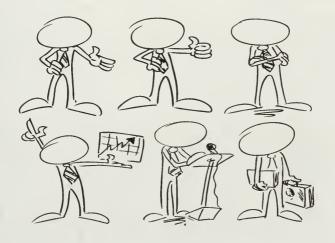

for new homes each year during the period 2003 – 2009. In 2007, 34 new home permits were issued. This provided a chance to get the infrastructure updated to support the increasing population of the town. So far we have built a new high school, but still need a new Town Hall and Public Safety Complex as well as extensive road improvements to serve the inevitable growth that will come in ensuing years. This ordinance is scheduled to expire on April 1, 2009. There is a question on the ballot to extend the ordinance for 5 years.

During 2008 the Planning Board granted permission to Sanco Energy, LLC to restart the 5 MW generator and add ancillary businesses upon their purchase of the Timco property. During this hard economic time - this business will give great promise to the economic growth of the Town of Barnstead.

Report of the Conservation Commission

The Barnstead Conservation Commission would once again like to take this opportunity to inform the Barnstead community of the various projects and ongoing activities that were undertaken in 2008 on behalf of the Town. As has been typical lately, the year's activities seem to be overshadowed by extraordinary natural events. This year of course it was the tornado. Even today a quick tour around the impacted areas reveals a staggering amount of damage. Unfortunately, we have to report that lands under the control of the Conservation Commission were directly in the path of the tornado, meaning numerous downed and damaged trees like many other spots in town. The damage was in the Cilley Meadows area and primarily on several lots off Province Road. With assistance of David Ladd, a logger who assisted other landowners in town, the damage has been cleaned up and we look forward to the long term recovery of the site.

Other issues addressed this past year included active management of the existing properties under our care and a continuation of our efforts to provide additional land protection projects. As reported last year, we were attempting to identify boundaries and develop management plans for the Grau property off Holmes Road. Progress was made in both fronts and after meeting with a group of neighbors and abutters to the Grau property, it was determined to focus our efforts on active land management which would compliment the wishes of Mrs. Grau, who had donated the land to the Town. We appreciate the thoughtful input of the neighbors and will continue on this front in the future. To that end, anyone wishing to access the property is requested to go in near the Grau property sign on Clapp Road and avoid crossing abutters land.

If it hasn't happened already, we are expecting to finalize a Conservation Easement project off Clapp Road which will add to the land protection efforts adjacent to the Grau property. The long process of appraisals, surveys and negotiating with the land owner have been ongoing for several years and we look forward to completing this process.

As is the case during most years, the Harrison property on Gilmanton Road continues to be a focus for hands-on activities from brush-cutting to maintenance on the cabin. The planned expansion of the trail network was postponed until 2009. We will be looking for volunteers to help out, as described below.

Other Land Protection Projects

Developing land protection projects also continues to be a priority. Happily, we are in preliminary discussions on a parcel adjacent to the Harrison prop-

erty, a high priority region for land protection. In addition, we are looking for potential protection projects in the vicinity of the Cilley Meadows region and in the North Barnstead Road and Holmes Road areas. We would be pleased to followup with any inquiries from landowners to discuss the available options for land protection without any commitment on their part. If you are curious about the advantages of protecting your land please contact the Commission Chair. Jim Fougere at your convenience.

Membership/Volunteer Help

As always we are looking for one or two members to join the Commission, however this year we are hoping to start a list of names and email addresses of folks in town who would be willing to work on specific projects for a day or so but don't want to commit to regular meetings, etc. For instance, if trail work or a beach cleanup was planned, an email message would be sent out to the group about a week ahead of schedule to establish volunteers, plan for equipment needs and set a firm schedule. This works in other towns and currently we don't have the time or personnel on the Commission to accomplish all we would like to. A sign up sheet will be circulated at the Town Meeting. Come join us and help out if you can.

Also, anyone interested is welcome at our regular meetings on the first Wednesday of the month at 7:30 at the Town Hall. Please feel free to contact Jim Fougere with any questions or concerns.

Report of Town Forest Fire Warden and State Forest Ranger

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

Spring fire season lasted unusually long this past year, with very high fire danger stretching into the first week of June. Once again, the rains started to fall during the summer and the fire activity was fairly light for the remainder of the year. The acreage burned was less than that of 2007. The largest forest fire during the 2008 season burned approximately 54 acres on Rattlesnake Mountain in Rumney on White Mountain National Forest property. Another 39 acre fire occurred on Mount Major in Alton during the month of April. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2008 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. 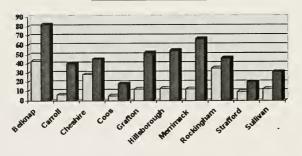

The Committee has avoided increasing taxes for the 10th consecutive year, 2009. While each town's share has changed slightly do to population changes, the total taxes collected by the District haven't increased since 1999. Prices for recyclables stayed strong through most of 2008, resulting in an end of year cash surplus of \$118,596.88. The market for recyclables, however, evaporated in late 2008, likely due to the general downturn in the economy. The Committee expects the market to come back slowly during 2009; however the District will see a much reduced revenue stream from the sale of recyclables during 2009.

You may recall that the District was required to change the way it uses its vehicle scales during most of 2008. The change addressed a violation of NH Weights & Measures rules, but also created an economic hardship on both the District and the residents who were using the scales. At the end of June, 2008, Governor Lynch signed into law, legislation which changed the Weights & Measures requirements and allowed the District to revert to its original practices.

Comments from the public are always welcome. The District Committee meets the last Thursday of each month (except Nov. & Dec.) at the District facility at 7:00 PM. The Public is invited.

In keeping with the philosophy of offering programs for all, your current committee was thrilled with the large turnout of kids playing soccer in the fall of 2008. Over 150 kids from kindergarten through the sixth grade participated. Practice fields, including the Parade grounds, were filled daily. Games were hosted by New Durham Parks and Recreation.

Basketball season draws a different challenge for our community. With over 170 kids participating, lack of gym space presents difficulty in offering practice time to the 12 teams. Barnstead Historical Society

At the first meeting of the year on April 24, the Barnstead Historical Society discussed ongoing projects. Then, as a presentation, members related stories of childhood memories, particularly of Barnstead but, also, other regions as well. We wonder how many in town can remember the old town plow or grader chugging through the snow, making its loud sputtering noise and, on occasion, actually working like it should.

On June 26, a slide presentation was featured about the history of the Congregational Church of North Barnstead. Ethel McConaghy, daughter of Rev. William McConaghy, a long time summer pastor of the church, made the presentation. Additionally, there was a slide presentation about the Snackity Meeting House by Martha Kennedy. Martha discussed the removal of the building, board by board, from the Barnstead/ Strafford area on Barn Door Gap Road and it reconstruction at its present site at Concord Academy in Concord, Mass.

For Old Home Day, women's clothing of the 1880's was displayed as well as dance cards from many dances held at the Town Hall during that era. Pictures of some of the early bands were shown as well as some of their musical instruments. Some vintage automobiles and other artifacts were also on display.

In September some of the members went to Concord, Mass. to tour the Snackity Meeting house. Although the building has been renovated, expanded and updated, the original parts of the old building remain intact. A very old, worn, painted sign labeled: "NO. STRAFFORD and BARNSTEAD BAPTIST CHURCH" was conspicuously displayed in the entryway and many of the original pews were still being used. Later we toured the Louisa May Alcott house and saw where she wrote many books, to include *Little Women*.

On October 9, Twink Merrill led us on a tour of the old cemetery in the Parade. Twink told of the sad and harrowing plights of Civil War veterans that are buried there. We viewed the gravesites of Dr. Jeremiah Jewett who wrote *The History of Barnstead*, and of many early settlers who were initially buried near the Parade Church and were reinterred at the current site. Twink showed the large obelisk that is the gravesite of Rev.Enos George who was one of the most noteworthy citizens of Barnstead in the mid 1800's. Later, a pot luck dinner was held at Roger and Bea Nelson's vintage home in North Barnstead.

Bill Walker continues to enhance and improve his computer based genealogical records of Barnstead. Betsy Webber and Susan Fraser have volunteered to assist Bill in making instructions on how to utilize his records of the families of the town when the program becomes available for use in the town library.

A question was presented to the group on what is the oldest standing house in Barnstead. If anyone has any ideas of what that building might be, please contact a member of the society.

Barnstead Milfoil Control Committee

The Suncook River treatment was the major focus of our effort in 2008. The 2007 treatment appeared to be initially very successful, but a large amount of re-growth occurred. The result of the '07 treatment and follow-up work produced a complete map of silted and heavily silted areas of the Suncook River based on the location where milfoil re-growth was observed. From past efforts of the BMCC and the Suncook Lake, it has been determined that plants in these silted areas have higher survival rates and require follow-up efforts. The 2008 BMCC program focused on these specific locations with a research project to control and study the re-growth locations in cooperation with UNH and DES.

The 08 program compared two different treatment concentrations in the different silted areas to the effectiveness of the herbicide to kill the plants. Both treatments were followed after 8 weeks with a follow up treatment. The results were better than expected. The higher dose in heavy silted areas was much more effective than the standard dose. Very few plants survived and those that did were experienced significant damage. The follow up treatment turned out to be very important. It appears to be the best method to produce the most effective removal of the variable milfoil plants. The second dose killed all surviving plants by what we observed by mid-October. Hopefully this method will prevent re-growth in heavy silted areas that is occurring in the Suncook Lakes.

During the summer of 09, a section that was missed needs to be treated. The BMCC has the funds to do this treatment but is asking Barnstead for \$5000 to ensure divers are available to support the treatment, monitor its progress and completely check the river for any re-growth or missed plants and remove them by hand. From the exciting results of last year, we hope that there will be little re-growth but really won't know until divers go below the surface to check.

We have been fortunate to have started the milfoil eradication program in 2005. Since then, the State of NH has invested \$95,000 assisting Barnstead with a serious infestation. The State has no funds available this year for most milfoil treatments, so it speaks well that Barnstead is ahead of the other towns on this issue.

The BMCC wants to thank all who support this effort to remove this milfoil plant from the Suncook River. Your support greatly assisted our efforts. The words we keep hearing is that the fishing is really coming back in the river and many different species are being caught. The river is now easy to kayak and canoe and a place where the water way can be truly enjoyed once again.

Barnstead-In-Bloom is a volunteer group that was founded in the spring of 2003. We have now been through five full growing seasons and we hope that all of the residents of Barnstead are pleased with the results of our efforts.

The 126/28 triangle is coming along better with each passing year. We have seen the profusion of pansies that continue to bloom without being replanted and we are very pleased to have them do so well in that spot. We have met our goal of planting some Black Eyed Susan's along the sides of the lilies which are in the middle. The yellows look so bright and sunny in the summer. This year we planted the ends with some red petunias but were not quite as happy with those as we thought we'd be. We are hoping to maybe plant dark purple ones this year. We again planted the yellow marigolds along the sides and they do seem to thrive down there. We do have the occasional problem of cars driving over the triangle but they haven't done too much damage yet.

It seems that each year the soil tells us what it likes the best and what grows the best there. Since we were able to afford the mulch this year, the plants held the water much better and the maintenance was a little less demanding.

We skipped the mums this year as we felt that there were still plenty of lilies and marigolds to supply color. This enabled us to save a little on our budget. Speaking of budgets, we fully understand that the town is in need of making the budget stretch as far as possible (we are taxpayers, too). These are not easy times for anyone and we know that what we do is more of a luxury than a necessity. We do not know what the future of our gardening efforts will be but we do know that town hall and the triangles at the Parade & 126 have looked a little better, given our town a brighter face to outsiders and supplied us all with some pride. We have decided that we will not solicit donations because that is not something that we have the time or interest in. If there is some money to plant, then we will try to continue to volunteer our time to do that. If there is not any money, then we totally understand that there are other more important things to be done. I guess we don't yet know what the next year will bring but we certainly have enjoyed our time with Barnstead-In-Bloom and thank you all for the support and encouragement you have shown to us.

Lakes Region Planning Commission



The Lakes Region continues to grow and evolve. Homes and businesses have expanded along major roadways, and many of our communities have experienced dramatic changes. The Lakes Region Planning Commission (LRPC) is an organization established to provide area communities and region with the eapability to respond to and shape the pressures of change in a purposeful way. With a service area covering over 1,200 square miles in Belknap, Carroll, Grafton and Merrimack Counties, the LRPC provides a wide range of planning services to member municipalities. The Commission offers direct and support services including technical assistance, geographic information systems, transportation planning, land use, environmental planning, hazard planning and economic development. Local, state, and federal resources primarily fund the LRPC. We also maintain a regular dialogue with state agencies as a resource for the entire Lakes Region. Our overall goal is to provide support, knowledge, and leadership to the governments, businesses, and citizens of the Lakes Region. Below are some of the focus areas and services provided on behalf of the town of Barnstead and the region in the past fiscal year.

- ❖ Conducted a Smart Growth Assessment for the town, in cooperation with the planning board.
- ❖ Distributed many copies of the NH Planning and Land Use Regulation books to member planning boards at considerable savings.
- Organized and hosted three public Municipal Law Lectures, in cooperation with the NH Local Government Center, where practicing attorneys provide a legal perspective on local planning, zoning, and other municipal issues.
- *Developed a website of electronic documents to facilitate the outreach/education component of the Innovative Land Use Guide project, completed by the nine regional planning commissions and the NH Department of Environmental Services.
- ❖ Developed an update of the top regional transportation priorities, in cooperation with area communities, and submitted them to the NHDOT for review and consideration.
- ❖Convened several meetings of the LRPC Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) to enhance local involvement in transportation planning and project development.

- *Presented testimony to the Governor's Advisory Commission on Intermodal Transportation to retain all Lakes Region projects in the state's Ten Year Plan.
- *Completed and distributed the 2008 Development Activity in the Lakes Region report on Lakes Region residential and commercial development trends. Prepared and distributed a new development survey for 2008-2009.
- Staff became qualified by the NH Housing Finance Authority to help communities implement the new Workforce Housing Law
- *Awarded \$50,000 from the U.S. Economic Development Administration to prepare a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for the Lakes Region. approved CEDS will provide communities with access to EDA funding for infrastructure and economic development projects.
- ❖Planned and coordinated the 22nd annual household hazardous waste collection in the Lakes Region with 1,500 households from 23 communities participating at 8 collection sites. An estimated 19,000 total gallons of waste were collected, containerized, and transported to EPA approved end-of-life locations.
- *Received funding assistance from the NH Department of Environmental Services to conduct the first phase of the Lakes Winnipesaukee Watershed Management Plan. Project partners include Lake Winnipesaukee Watershed Association, the University of New Hampshire, Plymouth State University, and the North Country Resource Conservation and Development Area Council.
- Secured funding from the NH Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM) to prepare all hazard management plans for Lakes Region communities.
- *Completed an overhaul of the LRPC website, www.lakesrpc.org, added many new features to facilitate access to access to on-line images for each municipality, recent publications, latest news, etc.
- *Convened six Commission meetings that featured a diverse range of topics: NH Rail Transit Authority, the Downeaster, NH Rail Service, and Next Steps; Viewshed Management and Steep Slope Protection in the Lakes Region; Incentives for Housing, Smart Growth, and Conservation; Transportation Plans/Projects; Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act: Its Future and Current Status.

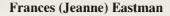
