CENTRE HARBOR TOWN MEETING
March 14, 1989

The moderator swore in the ballot clerks, Priscilla Manville and Priscilla Sorlien. He also posted the time for opening absentee ballots at eleven o'clock A.M.

The March fourteenth, nineteen hundred eighty nine Town Meeting was called to order at ten o'clock in the morning by the Moderator, William L. Taylor, who announced that the polls were open to act upon Articles 1-A through 1-G. At 11:00 A.M. the absentee ballots were accepted from the town clerk, opened by the moderator and deposited in the ballot box. At 1:00 P.M. the assistant moderator, Kenneth Sorlien was sworn in to cover for William L. Taylor, Moderator.

Article 1-A. All town officers and school board members for the ensuing year were voted on with the following results:

Article 1-D Are you in favor of adopting the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, which will add to Section X:B:3 (Wetlands), the following sentence: "Costs involved in the forgoing shall be borne by the appellant"?

Article 1-E Are you in favor of adopting the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, which will add to Section X:B:3 (Wetlands), the words "claimed to be" before "incorrectly delineated", which is intended to clarify the wording of this Section?

Article 1-F Are you in favor of adopting the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, which will delete from Section X:F (Special Requirements), the word "pathway" and add the word "walkway"?

Article 1-G Are you in favor of adopting the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, which will add to Section X:F (Special Requirements), the following sentence: "Any such work must have a New Hampshire Wetlands Board Permit and a Town Construction Permit as required in Section IV:1"?

The polls closed at 6:00 P.M. and the ballots were tallied. At 7:30 P.M. the Town Meeting reconvened in the Fire Station to act on Articles 2 through 29. The meeting started with a salute to the flag.

Article 2 On a motion by Lewis Hanson and seconded by Aaron Smith it was voted to raise and appropriate \$391,360 to defray town charges.

Article 3 On a motion by Aaron Smith and seconded by John Schoenbaur it was voted to raise and appropriate \$150,000 for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges, including Sidewalks, dead tree Removal, and Docks and Fountain: \$18,684 to be paid from State Highway Block Aid the balance of \$134,116 to be raised by taxes.

Article 4 On motion by Lewis Hanson and seconded by Bernard Horne it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 for the maintenance of the Centre Harbor Fire Department, and to authorize the Centre Harbor Volunteer Firemen's Association to expend said sum for the operation and maintenance of the Centre Harbor Fire Department.

Article 5 On motion of Aaron Smith and seconded by Chris Williams it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$54,000 to purchase a new equipped dump truck, and to authorize the selectmen to borrow this sum in the name of the town.

Article 6 On motion of Aaron Smith and seconded by Franklin Fancher it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,200 for the operation of the Police Department.

- Article 7 On motion of Bess Hanson and seconded by Joan Taylor it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,415 for Parks and Recreation, to include Band Concerts, Holiday Celebrations and Life Guards.
- Article 8 On motion of Lewis Hanson and seconded by Kenneth Sorlien it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26,952 for the purpose of providing ambulance service to the town.
- Article 9 On motion of Priscilla Sorlien and seconded by Douglas Anderson it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000 for the operation of the Nichols Memorial Library.
- Article 10 On motion of Priscilla Sorlien and seconded by Douglas Anderson it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,800 for repair of roof and chimneys of the Nichols Memorial Library.
- Article 11 On motion of Aaron Smith and seconded by Robert Heath it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,500 to pave the Winnepesaukee Beach loop, walk and Lake Street.
- Article 12 On motion of Lewis Hanson and seconded by Kenneth Sorlien it was voted to raise and appropriate \$4,000 for Direct Welfare.
- Article 13 Kenneth Sorlien moved the town vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 to save the Kona Fountain from vehicle damage or destruction, to move said fountain to the Dr. Leonard B. Morrill Memorial Park where it would be reset to include a re-circulating water system and for landscaping. After a lengthy discussion which included comments from Kenneth Sorlien, Harold Bernt, Edward Libby, Gregory Garrick, Edwin Kline, Don Leavitt, Franklin Fancher, Douglas Anderson, Eugene Manville, Helen Poff, Bart Coudert, Thomas Crane, Lewis Hanson, Robert Heath, Carl Marshall, Chris Williams, and Thomas Price. Chris Williams made an amendment to the motion: to leave said fountain in the present location where it would be raised and reset to include a recirculation water system, for landscaping and illuminated. This was seconded by Mark Kozak and voted in the affirmative. The motion as amended was then voted in the affirmative. The motion now reads: The town raise and appropriate \$5,000 to save Kona Fountain from vehicle damage or destruction, to leave said fountain in present location where it would be raised and reset to include a re-circulating water system for landscaping and illumination
- Article 14 A motion was made by Kenneth Sorlien and seconded by Christopher Williams that the town vote to instruct the town's representatives to the General Court to respond to our solid waste crisis by taking all necessary measures to insure that New Hampshire adopt legislation that will permit consumers to return for refund of deposit within New Hampshire all soda, beer, wine coolers and liquor containers and that all unclaimed deposit monies shall be collected by the state and no less than 80% shall be returned annually to local municipalities for the sole purpose of implementing, expanding and reimbursing community recycling projects. It was voted in the affirmative by a count of hands. 42 yes 28 no
- Article 15 Aaron Smith moved the town vote to deposit into the Conservation Commission Fund 25% of all the funds collected from the land use change tax, pursuant to RSA 79-A. This was seconded by Edwin Kline. After some discussion, Robert Beem made an amendment to the motion, to add - expenditure of such funds would require town meeting approval. This was seconded by Barbara Benoit and voted in the affirmative. The motion as amended: The town voted to deposit into the Conservation Commission fund 25% of all funds collected from the land use change tax, pursuant to RSA 79-A, expenditure of such funds would require town meeting approval. This was voted in the affirmative.
- Article 16 On motion of Kenneth Sorlien and seconded by Ronald Ulm it was voted that the town establish a Historic District Commission pursuant to RSA 673:1, and to direct the selectmen to appoint five to seven persons to serve on said commission in order to formulate a Historic District Zoning Ordinance and Regulations to protect and preserve the Centre Harbor Village as listed on the National Register of Historic Places, a function of the United States Department of the Interior.

- Article 17 On motion of Gladys Bickford and seconded by Deborah Ulm it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,750 for a new picket fence around three sides of Lakeview Cemetery.
- Article 18 On motion of Bess Hanson and seconded by Christopher Williams it was voted to raise and appropriate \$2,500 for the support of the Lakes Region Family Service.
- Article 19 On motion of Eloise Coudert and seconded by Bernard Horne it was voted to raise and appropriate \$2,995 for the support of the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center.
- Article 20 On motion of Maurice Hildebrand and seconded by Franklin Fancher it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,158 for the support Community Action Program.
- Article 21 On motion of Bess Hanson and seconded by Marv Fancher it was voted to raise and appropriate sum of \$11,521 for the support of the Meredith Public Health Nursing Association.
- Article 22 On motion of Kenneth Sorlien and seconded by Virginia Walker it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600 for the support of the Lakes Region General Hospital.
- Article 23 On motion of David Schimke and seconded by Minnie Nichols it was voted not to raise the sum of \$186.72 for the Lakes Region Association.
- Article 24 On motion of Aaron Smith and seconded by Minnie Nichols it was voted to compensate the Tax Collector based on a straight salary with all fees being returned to the Town General Fund.
- Article 25 On motion of David Schimke and seconded by Edward Libby it was voted to allow a discount of two percent on taxes paid in full within fifteen (15) days of issue of the tax bills by the Tax Collector.
- Article 26 On motion of Robert Heath, seconded by Gregory Garrick, it was voted to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 27 On motion of Aaron Smith and seconded by Kenneth Sorlien it was voted to authorize the selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:05-b.
- Article 28 On motion of Lewis Hanson and seconded by Orion Bickford it was voted to authorize the selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.
- Article 29 Kirk Meloney reported on the status of the Centre Harbor Master Plan. It has not yet been completed by the Lakes Region Planning Commission.

The moderator would not entertain a motion from Christopher Williams in regard to forming a committee to review alternate traffic routes for commercial trucks on Route 25B. Chris Williams then made a motion to overrule the moderator and was seconded by Edward Libby and voted in the affirmative. Chris then moved that the selectman appoint a committee to review alternate routes for commercial trucks on Route 25b through Centre Harbor and that the committee make recommendations to the legislature. The motion was seconded and then voted in the affirmative.

On motion of David Schimke and seconded by Kenneth Sorlien it was voted to adjourn the meeting at 10:07 P.M.

The moderator administered the oath of office to all elected officials.

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Centre Harbor in the County of Belknap in Said State, Qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Cary H. Mead Meeting Room in said Centre Harbor on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the morning to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1-A. To choose all necessary Town and School Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 1-B. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Historic District Ordinance to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, as Section XII. The Historic District is to be established to preserve the ambiance and character of downtown Centre Harbor. Exterior changes on existing buildings and all new construction on properties within the District would be regulated by the Centre Harbor Historic District Commission.

Article 1-C. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board to add to Section IV:9, (Conversion of Existing Structures), the wording to define Accessory Apartments in owner-occupied single-family structures in the residential zoning district.

Article 1-D. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board to add to Section II, (Definitions), the definition of Accessory Apartments.

Article 1-E. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board to add to Appendix A, (Special Exceptions), Residential, the wording "#14 Accessory Apartments (See IV:9B)".

Article 1-F. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board to delete from Appendix A, (Special Exceptions), Agricultural and Rural, the wording "#8 Marinas".

Copies of the complete text of the ordinances are available in the Centre Harbor Town Office during regular business hours.

Article 1-G. To see if the Town will adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional veterans' exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for veterans seeking the exemption. The optional veterans' exemption is \$100, rather than \$50.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. The sum being \$303,565.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$169,350 for the maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges, including sidewalks, dead tree removal, and Docks and Fountain: \$15,000 to be paid from State Highway Block Aid, the balance of \$154,350 to be raised by taxes.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$171,847 for the disposition of Solid Waste.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35,800 for the maintenance of the Centre Harbor Fire Department, and to authorize the Centre Harbor Volunteer Firemen's Association to expend said sum for the operation and maintenance of the Centre Harbor Fire Department.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$48,975 for the operation of the Police Department.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,700 for the purchase of a new police cruiser.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,515 for Parks and Recreation, to include Band Concerts, Holiday Celebrations and Lifeguards.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$27,065 for the purpose of providing ambulance service to the Town.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the operation of the Nichols Memorial Library.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3600 for interior painting and repair of windows of the Nichols Memorial Library.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000 for Direct Welfare.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to choose one preferred spelling of the Town's name:

- 1) to accept the modern American spelling (Center Harbor)
- 2) to return to the original spelling (Centre Harbour)
- 3) to re-affirm the spelling voted in 1980 (Centre Harbor)

And further, to give specific direction regarding: which spelling should be used at which levels of government; what actions the selectmen are to take regarding the chosen spelling; what efforts (if any) are to be made by whom to attempt to get organizations and associations and other levels of government (if necessary) to conform to the chosen spelling; what sum of money, if any, is to be raised and appropriated for such actions.

(The purpose and intent of this article is to clarify or correct the vote taken at Town Meeting on March 11, 1980.) (By petition)

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000 for the Town of Centre Harbor Kona Fountain Fund to be used for the completion of the restoration of the Kona Fountain. In the event the Kona Fountain Committee is able to raise said amount through private endeavors, said amount will be returned to the Town. (By request)

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the support of the Lakes Region Family Service. (\$2500 requested in 1990. \$2500 appropriated in 1989.)

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the support of the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center. (\$3106 requested for 1990. \$2995 appropriated in 1989.)

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the support of the Meredith Community Action Program. (\$5416 requested in 1990. \$5158 appropriated in 1989.)

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds for the support of the Meredith Public Health Nursing Association. (\$12,806 requested in 1990. \$11,521 appropriated in 1989.)

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$600 for the support of Lakes Region General Hospital. (\$600 appropriated in 1989.)

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for capital expansion/improvements and equipment maintenance for the Greater White Mountain Chapter of the American Red Cross. (By request)

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of two percent on taxes paid in full within fifteen (15) days of issue of the tax bills by the Tax Collector.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money, provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other Town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of Town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:05-b.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed, by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.

Article 25. To choose agents or committees in relation to any article of the Warrant and hear reports of any heretofore chosen.

ANNUAL REPORT 1989

This past year was quiet for the Planning Board, reflecting the general slowdown in real estate activity in the Lakes Region. The respite meant that Board members were often able to get home before 11:00 PM and that only a few special meetings were necessary.

A few of the major projects approved by the Board in 1989 include the "On Hawkins Pond Subdivision" in West Centre Harbor, a three lot subdivision of Dane Family Trust land along Lake Winnepesaukee, and a new entryway to the Senter's Market complex. The Board also adopted a new construction permit form and passed an ordinance governing the number of pieces of heavy equipment that can be stored on a property. With the help of the Lakes Region Planning Commission, the Board adopted new chapters on Housing, Land Use, Transportation, and Goals and Objectives for the Centre Harbor Town Plan.

Something new that the Board is working on is voluntary impact fees where developers help pay for town improvements needed as a result of their project. Soon the town will need to adopt a formal Capital Improvements Program to permit the Board to continue collecting these sums. This policy will help save the taxpayers tens of thousands of dollars in coming years.

JAMES E. NICHOLS MEMORIAL LIBRARY
ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES
1989

The Trustees have met regularly each month on the third Wednesday, at the library. Regretfully the year began with the resignation of Trustee Robert Furey. The Board welcomed new Trustee Bess Hanson in February to fill the vacancy.

Each year the library hosts a program featuring the I.F.Y.E. student who has returned from living abroad for six months with a native family. This took place on February 16th and was well attended and enjoyed by all.

Librarian Gertrude Martin expressed her intention to purchase 25 new chairs to replace the old folding wooden chairs which are deemed unsafe by the Trustees. The chairs are now in the library and a welcome addition.

Work on the library roof was completed in July. The two chimneys have been re-pointed, as a temporary repair. However, expert advice informs the Trustees that they will have to be completely rebuilt in the near future.

Town Historian Gladys Bickford was nominated by the Trustees to receive the Joseph W. Vaughn award for "Leadership and Meritorious Achievement" in our town, and the Trustees and Mrs. Bickford were notified of this honor being bestowed, by the state, in May.

The Historic District Plaque was placed on the southeast corner of the building facing Plymouth Street. The library is the first building in Centre Harbor to be so honored, and a dedication ceremony was held on June 25, 1989 commemorating the passage of 79 years since the original dedication of the building. State Representative Steve Maviglio and Town Selectman Lew Hanson attended the ceremony on the front lawn, as well as our Town Historian, the Trustees, the Librarian and many interested citizens.

The Board of Trustees extended their written appreciation to the Centre Harbor Woman's Club for the decorating of the mantels throughout the year. Each month features a new display. In September Trustee Dorothy Simonds' letter of resignation was accepted with regret.

Trustee Barbara Benoit became Chairman of the Board in November, replacing Chip Sorlien. In December new Trustee E. Marshall Sargent was welcomed to the Board. Citizen volunteers stepped forward to start again the children's story hour on Wednesday afternoons.

And so, another very active and successful year closes. Several very worthwhile projects were accomplished. In summation, it is believed by the Chairman that the Board of Trustees and the Librarian have managed the affairs and care of the library and its contents in a fine and caring manner.

On a positive note, much was accomplished in 1989. The major roof repairs were successfully completed, along with other necessary maintenance. The building now displays a plaque designating the library as being listed on the National Register of Historic Buildings.

However, some serious negative issues were addressed at the meeting. Concern was expressed over the decrease in patronage and circulation of books at the library. The children's reading program, despite having adequate adult participation, experienced a hiatus during the year. The program has been reinstated but attendance is sparse.

It was also noted that there has been a decline in membership of the Library Association. Those present at the meeting unanimously agreed that there exists an immediate need to increase the library's visibility. Methods suggested to resolve this situation include telephone canvassing and/or written survey cards directed to the residents of Centre Harbor soliciting membership and responses of how the Nichols Memorial Library can better serve the community. Also, contact will be made with a representative of the State Library Board for the purpose of enlisting their expertise on ways to improve the library's services. Most importantly, we need your support.

CENTRE HARBOR VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

1989

The responses of the Fire Department in 1989 numbered just under 200. By far, the greatest number of calls was for medical emergencies. Actual structure fires were very few, and chimney fires totaled out at only eleven. Vehicle accidents accounted for 27 calls. The department responded 12 times out of town on Mutual Aid alarms, and as luck would have it, we had no need to call for Mutual Aid help in 1989.

Back in 1986, President Reagan mandated that every community in the country should draw up an Emergency Management Plan. A committee of citizens working with the Fire and Police Departments produced a plan for the Town. This plan is to be reviewed and updated on a yearly basis from now on. A copy is available at the Town Clerk's Office.

During 1989, a new attack pumper was built and delivered to the Town by Middlesex Fire Equipment Company of Montpelier, Vermont. The engine is powered by a diesel automatic with a 1250 GPM waterous pump, a 1000 gallon fiberglass tank, a six passenger cab, and five two-inch pre-connected attack lines. The arrival of this new engine allowed Engine 3 to be housed permanently at the new station (attached to the Town garage) near the intersection of Routes 3 and 25B.

Another very important thing happened to the Fire Department in 1989. Six men took and passed the state course called Firefighter I. Many hours of training and study went into this course and those who received Firefighter I certification are to be congratulated. Plans are in the works for another course to begin in January of 1990. Hopefully, in the not-too-distant future every fire-fighter will become certified through these state sponsored programs.

Finally, and with much regret, it is also time to announce the changing of command in the Fire Department. After nearly 30 years in the fire service, and ten of those as Chief, the time has come to pass the responsibility on to much younger shoulders. It is no secret that firefighting is a challenge for the young and the brave. There is great risk here! Every time the alarm is sounded, no one really knows what the final outcome will be. With proper training and competent leadership, we can be sure that the Fire Department will always be ready to roll for the protection of life and property in the Town of Centre Harbor.

My personal gratitude goes out to all my officers and men for their undying loyalty and friendship through all the years. We didn't always see eye to eye on every issue but we got the job done, and that is the most significant thing. To the Town Selectmen, the Town Clerk, and the office staff, the job couldn't have been done without your continual support. Please believe me, the pleasure of the experience has been all mine, and I will be forever grateful for having been given the opportunity of serving the citizens of the greatest little town on God's green earth.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
and
STATE FIRE WARDEN

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27b), No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or caused to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.

Violations of RSA 224:27 and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable of fines up to \$1,000, and or a year in jail and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression cost.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands, assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989 including several large fires in Allenstown, Alton, Chesterfield and Concord areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.

PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT

The Easter party started the 1989 activities for Parks and Recreation. We had a stuffed animal contest, games, prizes, and Easter Egg hunts. About 25 children attended.

For Memorial Day we had a parade with participation by the Inter-Lakes Jr.-Sr. High School Marching Band. Reverend Joe Parkman spoke at the Nichols Memorial Library and the Centre Harbor Town Docks, also Lakeview Cemetery.

The Fourth of July was a very busy day, beginning with the annual foot race. There was a five-mile, two-mile, and children's races which drew a record 330 participants. Entrants were given complimentary T-shirts by Ronald Ulm and the Centre Harbor Sports Shop.

The annual Fourth of July parade was held in the afternoon with more than 20 families and groups participating. The fire trucks from Centre Harbor and surrounding towns were especially appealing to the young spectators. The activities for the day concluded with a beautiful display of fireworks over the bay. Due to some changes in the laws regarding setting off fireworks, some of the firemen had to take a course to satisfy legal requirements, costing them extra time and money. Again our thanks.

All went very well at the town beach this year with over 60 children signing up for Red Cross swimming lessons which were given by the lifeguards. The lifeguards also gave instructions in arts and crafts twice a week, with 25 to 30 youngsters attending each session.

Thanks go to Nancy Read who volunteered her time and organized a low impact Aerobics group three mornings a week. Other volunteers were Bart and Eloise Coudert who ran the Friday night volley ball.

Tennis lessons for beginners and intermediates were offered twice a week. The response was so good that another instructor was added and a class for adults instituted. The tennis courts were in heavy use all summer, with the lessons being only a small part.

The softball field had a lot of use with both the boys' and girls' Youth League games, and men's and women's softball. There were also a number of pick-up games by families.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

1989

Two very fine Inter-Lakes High School students were the recipients of Centre Harbor Conservation Commission's scholarship to the New Hampshire Youth Conservation Camp. Karyn Welsh and Keri Dole spent the week of June 18th at Interlocken Camp in Windsor, N.H. where professional staff from the Society For the Protection of New Hampshire Forests guided learning about forestry, water, wildlife and soil as well as providing electives such as canoeing, swimming, art, music and sports. Keri and Karyn sent the Commission a delightful letter of "Thanks", and the Camp Director sent the Commission a letter of "Thanks" for our sending Karyn and Keri to camp! We're all winners! The 1990 camp will be June 17-22. Students of ages 13 - 18 who have completed grades 8 - 12 are eligible and should contact Mrs. Thomas Power at 253-9504 for further information.

Testing of the quality of the water in Centre Harbor Bay of Lake Winnepesaukee was again in 1989 performed by Commissioners Duke Kline and Ingrid Smith. As in the past, the cost of analysis by the University of New Hampshire's Fresh Water Biology Group is being shared by Centre Harbor and Moultonborough. This project is crucial due to the amount of power boating in the bay where our valuable much used swimming area is located. It would be appreciated if other folks would contact Duke Kline at 253-7633 and monitor more locations.

A new project for the Commission was mandated by Article 15 of the 1989 Town Meeting in regard to preparing for the conservation of open space in Centre Harbor by accumulating a portion of the funds paid to the Town when property is taken out of Current Use for development. Commissioner Harold Bernt has agreed to spearhead this very important project. Some money was turned over to the Trustees of Trust Funds in 1989 for this separate account, but there is a question regarding the full amount due which must be resolved with the Selectmen.

The third Household Hazardous Waste Cleanup was held Saturday, June 10, 1989. As with the first two events, Meredith's Public Works yard was the primary site for Centre Harbor participants, and once again 2000 gallons of hazardous substances were brought from households. This means that in three years over 6000 gallons of hazardous materials have been kept out of our groundwater. Did you and your friends participate? These items should not go into the ground, nor into sewers, nor into septic systems, nor into the transfer station burnables. Just as we want you to put old household batteries into the buckets at the Town Hall or at Heath's Hardware Store, so do we want you to save your unused oven cleaner, old oil paints, old medicines, used motor oil, etc., for disposal at our next Household Hazardous Waste Cleanup. The Lakes Region Planning Commission will again serve as coordinator, and Barbara Hunter of the Belknap County Extension Service of UNH will again provide educational guidance. Because state funding is being reduced due to their budget constraints, it is now being proposed to have this cleanup in the state's next fiscal year, possibly August.

Ongoing work for the Conservation Commission is serving as local inspector for the New Hampshire Wetlands Board. All applications for dredging and filling must originate at the Town Clerk's office, and this includes applying for new boat docks, or for making any changes in dock configuration, or for any work on or in the State's Great Ponds, which are bodies of water of 10 acres or more. New in 1989 is a requirement that dock permits must be recorded with the Registry of Deeds in order to be valid.

The Conservation Commission is pleased to have had Bob Keren of West Centre Harbor join the team.

HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

ANNUAL REPORT - 1989

At the Town Meeting of March, 1989, town residents voted to create an Historic District Commission for Centre Harbor. The Selectmen appointed members and by the end of the summer the Commission started work. Throughout the fall and winter the Commission developed an ordinance and proposed boundaries for the Centre Harbor Historic District.

Thousands of large and small communities across the United States have voted in historic districts in order to help preserve the character and ambiance of their towns. Locally, historic districts exist in Gilford, Wolfeboro and Sandwich. By controlling certain aspects of the exterior appearance of buildings, historic districts help prevent developers from disfiguring towns through inappropriate changes. Examples of the negative aspects of development can be seen throughout the exploding southern tier of New Hampshire and right down the road in Laconia. An Historic District allows for change that fits into the character of the community. Historic Districts also raise property values.

The Centre Harbor Historic District Commission is comprised of seven voting members including a Selectman, and five alternates. Meetings are held the third Wednesday of the month in the Cary Mead Room and as needed. Everyone is welcome to attend.

REPORT OF THE KONA FOUNTAIN COMMITTEE

1989

The 1989 Town Meeting voted "to raise and appropriate \$5000 to save the Kona Fountain from vehicle damage or destruction, to leave said fountain in its present location where it would be raised and reset to include a recirculating water system for landscaping and illumination." Given that responsibility, the Kona Fountain Committee has met ten times since July 31 and has researched and planned the simplest, most cost-effective way to preserve the fountain. The Committee has received the enthusiastic support and advice of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, the State Historic Preservation Agencies of N.H., Vermont and Massachusetts, fountain experts in Rhode Island and Georgia, professional historians and sculptors.

The Kona Fountain Committee recommends, and has begun taking action, on the following steps:

- a. Clean the bronze statue and restore its finish.
- b. Install a new circulating water system.
- c. Raise the fountain 18 inches.
- d. Surround the fountain with granite curbing, with protective blocks of granite at the corners.
- e. Install granite steps and a brick path to the fountain, and plant flowers in the small garden enclosed by the curbing.

The Committee plans to complete this work by 4 July, 1990, at a total cost of \$32,650.00. A dinner at Red Hill Inn on 2 December kicked off the campaign to raise funds privately. Mr. James Ritchie, grandson of the sculptor, and Mrs. Ritchie and Mrs. Helen Poff and Mrs. Dorothy Morse, who attended the 1907 fountain dedication ceremony as children, and the sculpture itself, were guests of honor. The dinner sold out. The Committee has solicited and received many generous contributions and is continuing its fundraising campaign. As of 31 December 1989, \$6,691.58 has been donated. In addition, the Centre Harbor Woman's Club has pledged \$3000.00 and the Town appropriated \$5000.00, making a total of \$14,691.58.

The Committee's records have been audited by the Town Auditors.

The bronze sculpture of Kona was delivered to a Sculpture Conservation Studio in Rhode Island in January. Their work, done to the highest professional standards, will be documented by a full written report to the Town.

While the Kona Fountain is often referred to as "the most beautiful public sculpture in New Hampshire," little was known of the artist, Russell Gerry Crook. Research has revealed his association with the most famous American sculptors of the day. The Kona Fountain is generally regarded as Crook's greatest work. Mr. Ritchie, of Lincoln, Mass. (grandson) has also contributed to the restoration effort and loaned another of his grandfather's works, an important arts and crafts period vase, which is displayed in the Town Hall with a sign asking for donations.

REPORT OF STATE REPRESENTATIVE STEVEN MAVIGLIO

Belknap County District One

Legislative Report

Taxes, environmental issues, and funding for education are among the key issues that the New Hampshire legislature is tackling during the 1990 session.

More than 600 bills will be considered by lawmakers during the 1990 session, which will adjourn in late April. The most controversial proposals involve taxes. At least four proposals for broad-based taxes, including one that calls for a two percent general sales tax with funds dedicated to education and another proposing a limited income tax, will be considered. So will legislation to increase from four percent to 10 percent the county share of the state's Real Estate Transfer Tax. Many of these bills are designed to relieve increasingly-burdensome property taxes and to bolster state aid to towns and school districts.

With the state facing a potential budget shortfall of \$70 million, the Gregg Administration is proposing another sharp hike in fees for a variety of state services. Of note to Centre Harbor residents is the Governor's "dock tax" proposal, that would require every dock, float, and raft to be registered with the state at an annual fee of \$25 (passage is pending). The Governor also is proposing to end all of the state's foundation aid funding to school districts, leaving only lottery money and limited building aid as the state's contribution to fund our schools. These proposals are being hotly debated, as they will likely increase property taxes substantially.

On the environmental front, the New Hampshire Shorelands Committee, on which I serve, sponsored a bill that would call for greater septic and building setbacks along the state's rivers and lakes. Because of its controversial nature, the legislature voted to study the proposal further and report back in 1991. Looser restrictions on jet skis, impact fees for developers, limits on construction near lake and riverfront properties, and a tax on disposable diapers also are on the agenda.

Social concerns also face the legislature. Drug dealers would be levied additional penalties if they are caught peddling within 1,000 feet of schools under one bill, and penalties for DWI also would increase under another. The most attention on social issues has been given to the Governor's requests to slash state aid to social service agencies and programs, including the mentally ill at the Laconia State School.

County spending proposals also are on the rise, with the Commissioners proposing a 19 percent increase in spending. The bulk of the increase is in health insurance costs for county employees, which are expected to soar by 36 percent. The county delegation, on which Centre Harbor's two state representatives serve, currently is working to minimize the increase.

Centre Harbor residents are urged to contact me (RFD 1, Box 189B, Laconia 03246, 286-3449) to share their views on any issue before the legislature or to remedy any problems with state agencies. I appreciate the opportunity to represent our town in Concord, and welcome your involvement in the legislative process.

LAKES REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

Summary of Local Assistance 1988-1989

Over the past fiscal year, the Lakes Region Planning Commission provided support and assistance to the Town of Centre Harbor at both the regional and local levels. Below is a sample of some of the services provided as a benefit to the community.

- * Answered questions regarding the hearing procedures for zoning amendments.
- * Provided information on waivers for off-site sewer and water systems.
- * Edited the zoning ordinance and provided a copy of the edited document.
- * Provided information on the enforcement of minimum lot sizes.
- * Discussed methods of road improvements and fair share assessments to developers.
- * Organized a successful Household Hazardous Waste collection in June of 1989 which was well attended by town residents.
- * Entered into an Agreement to update a portion of the Town Master Plan.
- * Co-hosted the annual Municipal Law Lecture Series, where practicing attorneys provide a legal perspective on local planning, zoning, and procedural issues.
- * Presented three public workshops for local land use boards on environmental constraints in zoning, growth management strategies, and planning board procedures.
- * Produced the Development Review Procedures Manual: A Guide for Local Planning Boards.
- * Developed a regional future land use plan to help coordinate local planning efforts. The plan was produced in conjunction with the LRPC's Regional Land Use Plan Update.
- * In response to RSA 36:47, produced a Regional Housing Needs Study which addresses the Region's need for affordable housing for low to moderate income families.
- * Began preparations for the 1990 Census, including participation in the Local Review Program.
- * Published A Guide to National Register Historic Districts in the Lakes Region.
- * Produced four quarterly newsletters focusing on planning topics and issues relevant to the Lakes Region.
- * Maintained a regional transportation planning program designed to assist members with local and regional road and traffic problem solving.
- * Represented the Region on key legislative issues such as impact fees, shore-land development and transportation.

LAKES REGION FAMILY SERVICE ASSOCIATION, INC.

1. AGENCY PROGRAMS AND SERVICES:

Lakes Region Family Service Association, Inc. is a social service agency, offering a counseling and a domestic violence program to residents of the Lakes Region. In 1988, the agency began to sponsor and oversee the area's Information and Referral Program. In September, 1989, we began to provide emergency and support services to victims of sexual assault.

A. COUNSELING PROGRAM:

The agency's counseling program includes individual adult, couples, child/adolescent/family counseling services. We also provide psychiatric consultation and evaluation through our consultant, Marcosa Santiago, M.D. Our agency provides counseling services to Centre Harbor residents in our office at the Belknap Mill in downtown Laconia, and in our one day per week satellite office in Meredith. Outpatient counseling services are provided according to a sliding fee scale, and we do not have a waiting list. No one is denied services due to inability to pay.

The Counseling Program offers a variety of groups and workshops to residents in our area. These currently include the following:

Parenting Workshop: Extensive Parenting Programs are planned in 1989-90, building on and expanding the child development class we have presented for three (3) years, free of charge.

Adult Children of Alcoholics Program: The program includes educational workshops and therapy groups for adults who are experiencing problems as a result of growing up with an alcoholic parent(s).

Children of Divorce: Six week therapeutic groups for children whose parents are divorced. On-going.

B. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PROGRAM AND SHELTER:

The agency sponsors a comprehensive program of services to violent families. This includes a 24 hour crisis line, court and social service advocacy, support groups, family counseling, and shelter for battered women and their children. The shelter program is serving dramatically increased numbers, with forty-two (42) women and thirty (30) children utilizing the facility in 1988.

Our staff recruits a thirty (30) member volunteer task force to assist us in serving battered women. Volunteers undergo a thirty (30) hour training session and ongoing supervision.

The agency relies heavily on support from area towns to fund the domestic violence shelter. The Town of Centre Harbor is not billed when Centre Harbor residents stay at the shelter.

In September, 1989, our domestic violence program expanded to include services to sexual assault victims in emergencies and in follow-up services. Our agency has become the only local response of its kind to both domestic violence and sexual assault cases. We have already been receiving nine (9) sexual assault calls per month, including adult and minor victims of assault.

The new sexual assault services are in place and available to the Centre Harbor Police Department, 24 hours a day, by calling 524-5835.

C. INFORMATION AND REFERRAL

In May of 1988, Lakes Region Family Service began to use and sponsor the area's Information and Referral Program. The incorporation of the Information and Referral Program does not increase our request from your Town. You may be interested to know that Information and Referral staff handle over two hundred (200) calls and walk-in inquiries per month concerning social services in our region.

INTER-LAKES DAY CARE CENTER AND NURSERY SCHOOL

During 1989 our After-School Program expanded to include use of the Lang Street School multi-purpose room for our school age children, thus allowing more space in the Bixby House for preschool and kindergarten age children in need of child care when parents are working.

In 1989 the Center, with its various programs for children ages two years six months to twelve years, served 141 children from 111 families. The Inter-Lakes Day Care Center, Inc., is a private, non-profit, fully licensed, tax-exempt child care program incorporated in October 1971, and governed by a volunteer Board of Directors comprised of community citizens and parents. Our school is open on a year-round basis from 6:30 am to 5:30 pm, making it possible for parents to maintain employment. As a participant in the New Hampshire Child Care Food Program sponsored by USDA hot breakfasts, lunches, and snacks are served daily.

Our goals and primary responsibilities to working families are to provide a stimulating atmosphere with a program of social, emotional, physical, and cognitive development for all ages. The children receive creative and educational experiences, field trips, weekly movies, and many other enrichment activities. In addition we provide a full range of services of health care, nutrition, dental care and screening, vision and hearing screening, child behavior and development with parenting education and resource availability for the entire family.

Programs offered include full and part-time child care, a Nursery School Program open to children of non-working parents, a Seven-Upper Program for school children before and after school and during vacation, individualized special needs for handicapped children or those in protection from abuse and neglect. For the sixth year we are sponsoring a network of licensed Family Day Care Homes receiving federal reimbursement from USDA by serving nutritious meals and snacks while providing care for children of working parents in their homes. Currently we have 30 homes under this program.

The Day Care Center Board and Staff are appreciative of the support and donations received from the community. Area residents are cordially welcome to visit the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center and Nursery School at 11 Lang Street in Meredith.
