GEORGE DOUGLAS STEVENS

Let us pause this day to pay honor and respect to George Douglas Stevens, who was one of our oldest citizens and who had served his town well and faithfully until his death August 22, 1942.

Born in Durham November 16, 1860, the son of David and Hannah (Lee) Stevens, he had lived here all of his life, except for a few years spent in Portsmouth, while being employed at the Portsmouth Navy Yard.

He was educated in the public schools and Franklin Academy, Dover, N. H. For several years he was employed as a bookkeeper by DeMeritt & Burnham of Durham.

He was elected Town Clerk in March, 1888, and held this office until 1904, and was a Justice of Peace for the same period of time. He was Postmaster from 1897-1916 and Assistant Postmaster 1916-1919. In March, 1925, he was elected Town and School Treasurers, offices he held until his death.

Through all the years he had not neglected his civic obligations and took considerable pride in his fraternal affiliations. He had been a member of Scammell Grange since 1890, and was a charter member of Sullivan Lodge, Knights of Pythias, which was formed in 1897. He was a member of the George Frost Temperance Association and had served continuously as its treasurer since 1888.

He is survived by his widow, Gertrude I. Stevens, and two daughters, Marjorie S. Crossman of Claremont and Louise S. Maxam of Rochester, N. H.

As the old citizens of Durham pass to the Great Beyond, may we all be thankful of the privilege of being allowed to pay reverence to those worthy souls, who by their way of life, have contributed toward making our lives brighter.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

MARCH 10, 1942

Two Hundredth and Eleventh Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, A. D. 1942, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk (Charles Wentworth), one Selectman for a term of three years (Albert D. Littlehale), a Town Treasurer (George D. Stevens), a Collector of Taxes (Arthur P. Stewart), two Auditors (Harry C. Woodworth, Leroy Higgins), four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years (L. J. Batchelder, J. Guy Smart, George S. Ham, R. R. Starke), one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of three years (Harold W. Loveren), and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years (Mark Willey).

3. To raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-three hundred and thirty-one dollars (\$2,331) to obtain State Aid on the following: a. So-called Lee Hook Road, b. Durham Point Road. Voted.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repair and maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges. \$5,000.00.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for current maintenance expenses, including County taxes as required by law. \$8,249.23.

6. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Association, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$166.00). Voted.

7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) for the purpose of surfacing and tarring Edgewood Road. Voted.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow, if necessary, not in excess of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to provide emergency fire, police, and health protection due to the war emergency. Voted.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to study the problem of locating and purchasing a location for a new town dump and closing the present town dump; and raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for purchase of new site and closing of old site. Voted.

10. To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gate and bars that section of the Beech Hill Road so-called starting at the property line of Waldo Sanders and running to the Lee line; also that section of road

connecting this road with a piece of road in the Town of Madbury already closed. Voted.

11. To see if the Town will vote to continue the present planning committee, and authorize the Moderator to make such appointments as are necessary to fill vacancies; and to discontinue any other committee of this nature that has been previously appointed or elected. Voted.

12. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for the Town Officers required by law. Voted.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. Authorized.

14. To see if the Town will allow a discount of one per cent for prompt payment of taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1942. Voted.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

MARCH 9, 1943

Two Hundredth and Twelfth Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, A. D. 1943, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years, one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of three years and one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of one year, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repair and maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.)

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for current maintenance expenses, including County taxes as required by law. (See budget.)

5. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Association, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$166.00). (See budget.)

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to complete payment for the new dump site and close the old one and start the new one. (See budget.)

7. To see if the Town will vote to create a Board of Fire Commissioners consisting of three members, one to be appointed by the Selectmen, one by the University of New Hampshire, and one by the aforesaid appointees. The member appointed by the Selectmen shall serve for three years; the member appointed by the University shall serve for two years; the member appointed by the two aforesaid appointees shall serve for one year; and thereafter each member shall be appointed for three years. Each member shall hold office until his successor is appointed. Any vacancy shall be filled by the agency which appointed the retiring member. All members of the Board shall be appointed within thirty calendar days from the date of the adoption of this article.

No member of the board shall receive compensation for his services but may be reimbursed for reasonable expense incurred in the performance of his official duties.

The Board shall establish such rules and regulations and elect such officers as they deem proper and necessary for the conduct of their business.

The duties and responsibilities of the Board shall in general consist of: 1. Making recommendations to the Town and University officials for: (a) the employment of adequate and qualified officers and personnel for the Fire Department who shall, in turn, be responsible to the Board, (b) the purchase of new equipment and the maintenance of existing equipment; 2. Making and enforcing such rules and regulations relative to the operation of the Fire Department as they may deem necessary and proper.

Upon passage of this article, all regulations relative to the establishment and operation of the Fire Department now appearing on the Town records and which are in conflict with this article shall be repealed.

REPORT OF THE CEMETERY COMMITTEE

The Durham Cemetery is now in a fairly prosperous condition and is no longer the "grave" problem of a few years ago. The extremely dry weather of 1941 killed out some of the grass on a few lots but with the application of manure, fertilizer and grass seed most of these places have been resoded. Considerable difficulty has been experienced in getting young shade trees to grow. Last season ten elms were planted to replace some Norway Maples, but most of them died. The hay this year, which was mostly weeds, was not worth cutting, and it was necessary to hire the cleaning up done.

Since there is an occasional demand for a single grave space, the Committee set aside Lot No. 72, Sec. D to be sold in 12 single grave allotments. Two lots and one single grave space were sold during the year.

Three interments were made: i.e. Infant son of S. D. Edmond, April 10, 1942; Mrs. Ellen Bennett, June 16, 1942, and George D. Stevens, August 24, 1942.

HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

TO THE TOWNSPEOPLE OF DURHAM :

New impressions are sometimes worth recording because familiarity and unthinking acceptance normally go hand in hand. As a librarian generally acquainted throughout the state and looking at the Hamilton Smith Library from the point of view of a newcomer to the community, I feel that Durham folk are to be congratulated on their library facilities. Through cooperation with the University they have at slight cost service that few cities can afford.

The Hamilton Smith Library is open for most of the year seven days a week. There are books for all ages and all tastes. Magazines available represent an annual expenditure of hundreds of dollars. Reference questions are welcome and efficiently answered. The children's room is adequate and well stocked. There are constantly changing exhibits. There is ready cooperation between the Library and the school and between the Library and any groups who desire such service.

There is nothing new in these opportunities open to Durham residents. But today, as never before, there is cause for gratitude whenever and wherever books are adequately supplied for public use. That they can be so supplied is one of the blessings of America.

Comment should be made on certain changes in the Library. Most important is that since July of 1942 the bookstacks have been open to the public. Although

many borrowers still prefer to choose their books from the generous cross section assembled in the browsing room, many others appreciate being able to make their selections from the shelves rather than from the card catalog.

Since Durham has been included in the dimout area it was necessary to close at sundown the stacks, the children's room and the newspaper room. Understanding the motive behind this change, the public has been entirely cooperative.

Acting jointly, the Durham selectmen, members of the Durham Library Association, and the Librarian have set aside the old agreement that the Library be kept open every Wednesday and Saturday evenings, and have decided that for the duration it be closed on Saturdays at 5:30. A combination of circumstances all directly traceable to the war forced this move. The Librarian and the selectmen hope that the public will accept this change also in good part, understanding that as a war measure it was unavoidable.

Most communities the size of Durham lean heavily upon the resources of the State Library in Concord. The University Library is such that supplementary collections need seldom be called upon for the general reader. Music lovers, however, are beginning to avail themselves of the privilege of borrowing State Library phonograph records through the Hamilton Smith Library. A list of records available for borrowing is kept at the circulation desk. The borrower pays carrying charges both ways.

SEACOAST REGION OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Seacoast Region of New Hampshire consists of the towns bordering on the seacoast and tidewaters of the State.

These communities have common interests in economic betterment, in regional problems, and in necessary adjustments to changing conditions brought about by war emergencies.

The New Hampshire Seacoast Regional Development Association is the accredited organization through which this and the other regional communities are brought together in combined efforts to attain their related objectives of development and improvements.

It serves the individual interests of the community to the extent of its facilities in accordance with expressed desires of the community.

There are five Regional Associations in New Hampshire.

The Seacoast Association organized in 1934 and incorporated in 1936 is the official State Co-ordinating Agency for the Seacoast Region. The Executive Secretary is the only paid official and his salary is provided for by State appropriation administered by the State Planning and Development Commission under certain rules of procedure.

Consistent with state statute, city and town appropriations, requested on an approximate basis of one one hundredth of one per cent of net assessed valuation or less than 10 cents for a thousand dollars, are used

for publicizing the resources of your community. Each community has representation on the Board of Directors and its representative citizens serve as members on committees.

The association works in co-operation with regional city and town, state and federal departments and officials, the State University Extension Service, the New England Council, chambers of commerce, farm, industrial and other accredited organizations and has established contacts, brought about conferences and surveys and gathered information necessary to determining the needs of the region. This work has contributed to developments and considerations which could be realized only through co-operative effort.

Promotional publicity, not only through publications but through personal contacts, conferences, information service and otherwise has brought year-round business, as well as seasonal business; the professional and other services, and farm and factory as well as the retail business and resort business are all recipients of added income resulting from this work. Of added importance is the maintenance of tax producing property and individual benefits of employment.

In view of the necessary planning for the post war period this promotional work assumes more importance than ever.

Evidences of the work of Association officials and the various committees are most apparent but difficult to publicize. Bridges have been built, new highways constructed, others improved, funds are available for coastal protection and bridge construction when priorities permit. Industrial plants have received war contracts. Some of the needs of this vital defense area have been recognized by the Federal Government; some added transportation facilities have been pro-

vided; information on the population increase has been presented for purposes of securing adequate rationing quotas; surveys pointing to inland water area development are in progress, development of fishery resources are in prospect and consideration is being directed to forestry and farm conservation needs.

The recently released report "A Plan for the Development of the Seacoast Region" prepared by the State Planning and Development Commission represents much time and work of the officers and committees, together with that of the State Commission.

The factual findings of this report have proven to be of particular value for Federal and local use in the present emergency and with continued studies will be of the utmost importance for guiding future planning.

Copies of the report have been sent to boards of selectmen, city officials and individuals who are contributing to the overhead expense of the Association.

The Association stands on its record of accomplishment with equal consideration for the interests of all regional communities and it is obvious in view of increasing demands for service that the value of regional co-operation is important to everyone.

This critical region is constantly confronted with new situations and problems created by necessities of war. Energetic work through Association channels has served to alleviate some of the unnecessary burdens imposed upon the communities. In so doing every co-operation has been given to the war effort as the first important consideration. This work must be continued vigorously with proper backing to the end that the security of the region shall be maintained during the war period and be best prepared to face the post war problems.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE
SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS
1941-1942**

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF DURHAM :

I am permitted to make by fourteenth annual report. Statistics cover the 1941-1942 year ending June 30. Comments, however, include the school year now in progress.

Our first change in teachers was made when Miss Collins resigned to take a fine position in one of the best school systems in the East. Mrs. Delta Ham took her place in Grade Two. Late in the summer Principal Guy Clark asked to be released to take up the work of Superintendent of Schools, in the Pittsfield Union. Principal Arthur W. Gray of Rye was selected from several candidates to succeed Mr. Clark. Mr. Gray's school at Rye was similar to the Durham Junior High School and his valuable experience there has made his choice for Durham a very happy one. Mrs. Ruth T. Hopkins became our nurse, and we feel that having a local nurse, within easy call will be an improvement.

Your teachers have withstood the lure of high wages in defense industries, and the glamour of uniforms, to continue to give us good work in the "second line of defense," our public schools.

In numbers, the war has not very much affected our schools, although we have the largest first grade now that we have ever had, thirty-two pupils.

There are fourteen tuition pupils enrolled in the

elementary schools. These come from Lee, Madbury, and Newington. There are three pupils attending the elementary school in Newmarket.

Pupils in secondary schools are as follows:

Newmarket High School, 13

5 in Grade 12

1 in Grade 11

2 in Grade 10

5 in Grade 9

Dover High School, 60

23 in Grade 12

12 in Grade 11

13 in Grade 10

12 in Grade 9

The rate of tuition charged us this year, is the State Average of last year. (\$89.79)

Your School Board has given the matter of transportation careful attention and has complied fully with the rulings of the Office of Defense Transportation, which does not allow any transportation route which does not start at least two miles from the school, and pupils living on side roads are expected to walk to the main lines, unless they live more than one and one-half miles from the established bus line. All unnecessary stops are to be eliminated.

Careful study has been made regarding care of the children should air raids occur, and fire drills are held.

A hot lunch is being provided those pupils who remain for the noon recess. Two young ladies from the University are provided through the NYA funds and some products furnished by the Agricultural Marketing Administration, help to keep the price very low.

An attempt was made to introduce the Penny Milk Program, whereby the Agricultural Marketing Administration would pay the vendor the cost of production and the one cent per half pint to be charged pupils would pay for the processing and distribution. Owing to the scarcity of milk no dealer could furnish it.

The three handicapped children reported last year are still instructed at home by Mrs. Judith Ham.

The Curriculum Library of the University is still housed at the Durham School and its use has been extended to all schools in this vicinity. It is in direct charge of Principal Gray.

The Lions Club still helps with the Dental Clinic.

More work is needed on the playing field but it has not been found possible to secure the necessary help.

We miss the cooperation of a Parent-Teachers' Association this year.

The work of your superintendent has been magnified by the defense courses operating in this Union. At Durham there are four such courses now in operation, three in Somersworth and a fourth expected to open soon. If the school supervision seems in your eyes to be slighted, he has that as an alibi. We are all trying to help win the war as quickly as possible.

Your school is taking part wholeheartedly in buying War Bonds and Stamps and did a very fine job in collecting scrap.

Your teachers have given freely of their time to the rationing programs and are ready to do more. It is significant that we have lost no "school time" in this effort.

During the summer months some interior redecorations were made and more will soon follow. The

building has now been in use seven years and shows that it was well built.

Your School Board meets regularly on the first Tuesday of each month. We are conducting Public Schools and constructive criticisms are welcome.
