To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, at twelve of the clock noon until six p.m. Regular business meeting will be held at seven p.m.

Article 1. To choose all necessary officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the income, estimated to be \$39,425.00, from:

- Article 3. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$88,000.00 for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$33,782 in State Aid. The Town will raise the balance. (Approximately 54,218).
- Article 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for the Capital Expenses of the Fire Department.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$29,000 for the purchase of a 1990 4 wheel drive truck with plow and dump body for the use of the Highway Department. Money to be raised by withdrawal of \$18,000 plus interest to date from the previously established Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase of highway equipment, and to authorize the sale or trade of the 1980 GMC Highway Truck, snowplow, approximate value \$2000.00. The Town to raise the balance (approximately \$7000) by taxes.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$50,000 for the construction of a Highway Maintenance Facility on Town Highway land along Rt 12A. Money to be raised as follows: \$10,000 from current years taxes, \$40,000 from a note for 5 years, annual payments of \$8000 plus interest.  
(2/3 vote required)
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000 for renovations to the Town Hall.
- Article 8. To see if the Town of Langdon will send the following message to our representatives and senators in Washington:  
As Citizens of New Hampshire assembled at our Town Meeting and concerned over the present and future well being of our town, state, nation, and world, we call upon our representatives in Washington to work vigorously for substantial reductions in military spending - spending for which tax-payers of our town paid approximately \$414,714 last year, and to redirect our federal tax dollars toward such purposes as education, environmental protection, deficit reduction, farming, housing, health care, and welfare of the elderly and children.

- Article 9. To see if the Town of Langdon will send a message to the Legislature and Governor calling for a comprehensive toxics law requiring coordinated programs of planning, research and development, education, enforcement, and economic incentives to achieve toxics reduction by substitution with safer substances. \*
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds for the perpetual care of the Cemetary Lots.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.
- Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
- Article 14. To allow accounts.

LIST OF APPROPRIATIONS -- TOWN MEETING 1989

Business meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. with the reading of the Town Warrant by Moderator, Donald Malcolm, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and Lord's Prayer. Action was then taken on various articles as follows:

Article 2. To see if the town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the income, estimated to be \$40,450, and defray Town charges estimated to be \$85,955. VOTE -- Yes

Article 3. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$80,000. for the maintenance of highways and bridges. The State of New Hampshire to furnish approximately \$32,000. in State Aid. The Town to raise the balance. (Approximately \$48,000). VOTE -- Yes

Article 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for the Capital Reserve Fund previously established for the purchase of highway equipment. VOTE -- Yes

Article 5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of 2,500. for the Capital Expenses of the Fire Department. VOTE -- Yes

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Capital Expenses of the Police Dept. VOTE -- Yes

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title 11 of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age, Survivors, Disability and Health Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 101 of the Revised Statutes Annotated amended by Chapter 302 and 322 of the Laws of 1955 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200., to defray the Town's estimated share of the cost thereof. VOTE -- Yes

- Article 8. To see if the town wishes to exclude from the Federal Social Security Act services in any class or classes of positions filled by popular election. VOTE -- Yes
- Article 9. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the Federal Social Security Act any class or classes of positions the compensation for which is on a fee basis. VOTE --Yes
- Article 10. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from The Federal Social Security Act services performed by election officials or election workers for a calendar year in which the remuneration paid for such service is less than \$100.00. VOTE -- Yes
- Article 11. If a plan for Social Security coverage is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Selectmen's secretary as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan. VOTE -- Yes
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000. for site improvements to Town highway land on Route 12A.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to accept Trust Funds for the perpetual care of Cemetary Lots. VOTE -- Yes
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a portion of Currier Road, also known as Durling Road, in the Town of Langdon, County of Sullivan and State of New Hampshire, to wit: commencing at the intersection of said Currier Road and Winch Hill Road and running thence northerly and westerly along the said Currier Road and terminating at the parking lot on the premises of Pierre D. Martinet, 1650 feet from the boundary between land of Herbert and Joan Stratemeyer and land of Pierre D. Martinet, which portion of the road to be discontinued lies upon land of Herbert

and Joan Stratemeyer and land of Peirre D. Stratemeyer, all pursuant to New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 231.8 \*

Amended to read "which portion of the road to be discontinued lies upon the land of Herbert and Joan Stratemeyer and land of Pierre D. Martinet."

Vote on amendment -- Yes

Vote on article as amended -- Yes

(33 yes 13 no)

- Article 15. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. VOTE -- Yes
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed. VOTE -- Yes
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. for renovations to the Town Hall. VOTE -- Yes
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000. to be used to fund the completed reevaluation of property in 1990. (This money is needed in addition to the \$19,040. we raised last year, due to the larger number of parcels of property due to continuing sub-divisions.) VOTE -- Yes
- Article 19. To see if the town will vote to amend the Building Code by addint to #1, letter E under the General Provisions the words "or alterations" so as to read:
- "A permit to be issued by the Road Agent for permanent or temporary access or alterations to and from Town roads or public right-of-ways will be required."
- VOTE -- Yes
- Article 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
1. Selectman, Bruce Cheeney sent his regrets for not being able to attend the meeting. He was called away on business.



2. Appreciation was expressed to the former Road Agent, Roger Lee Pelton, for making the transition to the newly appointed Road Agent, Doug Beach, a smooth one. Peltons have cooperated by allowing the Town to still use space at their location for various items.

3. The Selectmen in Acworth have asked that the people in Langdon please consider recycling. The trailer that is used for recycling is rented and recycling doesn't bring in any money but it does reduce the amount of tonnage that is burned, thereby saving money.

4. Bob Cunniff explained page 12 of the Town Report. This showed where unexpended taxes from the previous year are put back into the budget thus reducing the tax load in the current year.

5. It was announced that the current Police Chief will be resigning as of Dec. 31, 1989 and the selectmen are looking for a new candidate.

6. Pete Goodnough asked for an explanation of why the Town paid for expenses for the printing of Town Histories when the Bicentennial committee still has money. Fred Roentsch explained that this was an expense from the previous year. The bill wasn't paid until the Town was satisfied with the printing. Pete Goodnough also requested that a report of the bicentennial committee be included in next year's Town Report. He felt that even though this is a separate group they should still be accountable to the Town.

7. Ben Porter made a motion that the vote in previous years that disallowed the Selectmen from renting out Town equipment be rescinded. After considerable discussion, the motion was passed.

8. Wendell Holbrook brought up the matter of the Champlain Valley Pipeline which is passing through Langdon, according to information that has been received by the Selectmen. The following motion was made:

To see if the Town of Langdon will vote not to have the Champlain Valley Pipeline Co. go through the Town of Langdon until it's proven to be:

1. Economically essential for New Hampshire.
2. Totally safe, environmentally sound, and free of health hazards.
3. Routed along the least disruptive path possible.
4. Fairly and equitably agreed to by affected land owners.

9. Pete Toner made a motion that the Moderator appoint a committee to investigate the construction of a Town Garage. Motion Passed.

10. Concern was expressed that the Planning Board is working on a new Master Plan and since the selectmen appoint the various boards then in effect they are influencing the Master Plan. The Chairman of the Planning Board stated that the Planning Board works with all of the different boards and departments in Town. Other than the one Selectman who serves on the board, the Selectmen have no control over the Planning Board whatsoever.

11. Bob Cunniff relayed a message from the School Board Chairman that the School Board would like to know what direction the Town would like to take in regard to the overcrowding situation in the FMRHS School District. 24 in favor of a regional middle school and 21 in favor of additions to the existing schools. Jane Canning, Director of Special Ed. for the Fall Mt. District, spoke about what the State's role should be in paying for state mandated articles instead of forcing the Towns to.

12. Bob Davis reported that he and Dot Grout are on a committee to resolve traffic problems to and from the High School and invited input from any interested citizens.

13. Steven Holmes again referred to appointing people to boards instead of electing them. He felt that it is something we should think about in the future. He felt diversity is good and that a person should only be allowed to serve on a board for a certain length of time.

14. Community Club quilt winner was drawn - Wendell Holbrook

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN  
AND  
STATE FOREST RANGER

In 1989 we had one serious fire on Fall Mountain on April 28th. The fire was reported to be in Walpole and the suppression effort was carried out by people from Walpole. It appeared that this fire might have been started from a camp/cooking fire that was improperly extinguished. This one fire burnt about one acre and suppression costs to Langdon were \$504.90. The State of NH is responsible for one half of this amount.

On April 25th, we assisted Charlestown for a fire on the Meany Road. Eight personnel responded. This fire was started by a cooking fire.

On May 16, the State conducted training on locating a fire in the woods using a compass. These training sessions are very necessary should the time come when we have need to find a woods fire.

We also had what appeared to be intentional burning of a pile of tires. The State was notified and has warned the owner of future consequences.

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27b), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 and other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for paying all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989 including several large fires in Allenstown, Alton, Chesterfield, Concord areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.
