Warrant for Annual Meeting

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as Lyndeborough road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$885.00, or will accept state aid for the construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$677.24.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of high-ways and bridges, in addition to that required by law.
- 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for cutting bushes beside the highways or act anything thereon.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to purchase any additional equipment for summer or winter use on town roads, raise and appropriate money for same or act anything thereon.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the care of cemeteries, or act anything thereon.

- 7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the J. A. Tarbell Library in addition to that required by law.
- 8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the control of white pine blister rust.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day, raise and appropriate money for the same, or act anything thereon.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for advertising the town through the Monadnock Region Association, or act anything thereon.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at time of taking inventory April first.
- 14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyndeboro: I respectfully submit my thirteenth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Supervision

While a considerable portion of a Superintendent's time is occupied with administrative duties. his chief function is in the field of supervising the work of teachers and pupils. Supervision is accomplished in a variety of ways. By observation of the activities carried on in the school room during visits one gets a very good general impression of the standards of instruction and of the attitudes of the pupils toward the learning situation. The rate of progress in each grade and subject is checked by comparison of periodical reports from the teachers with certain standards of progress. The proficiency of the pupils in the skills they are acquiring and in the specific knowledge they are gaining is gauged by a series of standardized tests such as was outlined in the annual report a year ago. Another helpful source of information is contact with parents: constructive criticism from this source is always welcome, and without it one is apt to lose much of the personal and human element that should always be a guiding factor in supervision.

Teachers and Salaries

For the past several years it has been common knowledge that many qualified teachers were unemployed. This is still true in the high school field, except in Commercial and Domestic Arts subjects, but the surplus of qualified teachers for the upper grades has very nearly disappeared, and there is at the present time an actual scarcity of primary grade teachers. At a recent conference of superintendents the President of one of the Normal Schools

made a strong plea for us to send to the Normal Schools a larger number of students to be trained for teaching.

During the depression salaries in general decreased and reached their lowest point a year ago. Partial restoration of the reductions has been made in a large number of towns and cities this year, so that the average salaries are somewhat higher and the trend is toward further increases. This trend will of course be greater as the surplus of teachers diminishes and disappears.

Cost of Text Books

The question is sometimes asked why the cost of text books runs so high each year. I have attempted an analysis of this cost. Each child requires from ten to fourteen different books in his progress through each grade, or a total of 92 for the eight grades. The cost of these is approximately \$66, or an average of \$8.25 per grade. These books wear out or become obsolete in from four to ten years. and the replacement cost on this basis is estimated at \$1.40 per pupil each year. Lyndeboro has approximately 70 pupils in grades one to eight, so that the text book replacement would amount to \$100 a year. The average actual expenditure per pupil last year in New Hampshire was \$1.19. In Lyndeboro the average actual expenditure for text books in the past four years has been \$1.26 per pupil. Each year a careful estimate is made of the needs for the coming year, based upon the probable number of pupils in each grade and the condition of the books on hand. This estimate appears in the budget.

Health Program

The medical inspection was made last September by Dr. Oscar Burns of Milford, who reports as follows:

Dr. Burns has since then voluntarily done some follow-up work, but I have no detailed account of it.

Repairs and Improvements

The improvement made at the Center School by whitening the ceiling and repainting the walls a light color has greatly improved the lighting at the pupils' desks. The pupils' desks at the South School were refinished. Besides the usual repairs and cleaning necessary next summer, allowance should be made for painting one of the school buildings. This is provided for in the budget.

Budget

The assessment called for to meet the proposed expenditures for next school year is \$6216.64, as compared with an appropriation of \$6198.60 for the current year. The balance on hand next June will probably be less than \$100. The State Aid allotment for next year is \$1071.86 compared with \$957.40 received this year. The following items in the budget need comment: A year ago the budget called for \$3300 for Teachers' Salaries; the teachers' contract however total \$3350. With a probability of one or more changes in the teaching staff next year, and with the prevailing trend toward higher salaries, we believe that \$3500 should be allowed for this item next year. Two items, Text

Books and Other Expenses of Instruction, call for an additional \$25 each to meet actual needs. Transportation was estimated at \$600 last year, but is costing \$722. We think \$800 a safer estimate for next year. We shall need some new equipment and have allowed \$25 to cover it These increases over last year's amounts are largely offset by the omission of two items in last year's budget, Extraordinary Repairs \$250, and Insurance \$62.50.
