**RECORD OF TOWN MEETING
March 8, 1994**

The Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, was called to order at 1:00 p.m. by Moderator Donald W. Melvin. The polls were declared open and the following Ballot Clerks were sworn in by the Moderator.

Moderator Melvin called the evening session of the Meeting to order at 7:30 p.m. The assembled citizens (seventy or so) stood for a moment of silence for those Madbury residents who died during 1993. They included:

Everyone joined in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

ARTICLE 1. The following Town Officers were elected by ballot:
Moderator for the ensuing two years . . . Donald W. Melvin
Selectman for the ensuing three years . . . Joseph B. Moriarty
Treasurer for the ensuing year John W. Printy
Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing
three years Georgia G. Drew
Supervisor of the Checklist for the
ensuing six years Lynda J. Gilbert
Auditors for the ensuing year Betsy J. Booth
and Barbara G. Houston
(Sample ballot on file)

ARTICLE 2. By paper ballot the Town adopted provisions of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from the assessed value of residential real estate for property tax purposes. This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year, for property tax purposes, from the assessed value on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00.
Yes - 126 / No - 58 PASSED

ARTICLE 3. Woodie Fraser moved and Robert Houston, Jr. seconded a motion to authorize the Selectmen to choose all other Town Officers. There was no discussion of the Article. The Moderator called for a vote. PASSED

ARTICLE 4. Selectman Richard Houghton moved and Richard Schreiber seconded a motion to raise and appropriate One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for the purchase of 49.18 acres of land adjacent to Madbury Memorial Park and the Civic District and further to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and notes in the amount of Sixty-five Thousand Dollars (\$65,000.00) over the next two years. The balance of Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) is included in the posted budget. Selectman Houghton gave a history of the Town's interest in this property and early negotiations with the former owner, Kenneth Tibbets, who passed away on September 30, 1992. He noted that the Town's Master Plan recommends that the Civic District be expanded in a westerly direction. The property is in Current Use and only paid \$314.00 in 1993 property taxes. It probably could never be developed commercially. After only a very few questions and comments from those present, Moderator Melvin called for a hand vote.

Yes - 83 / No - 2

PASSED

ARTICLE 5. Lorraine Morong moved and Robert Wilson seconded a motion to discontinue the Cemetery Capital Reserve Fund established in 1988. This fund was created for the purchase of land which has occurred. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town's general fund. Selectman Houghton explained that this was a companion article to number six. There were no comments or questions. A vote was taken.

PASSED

ARTICLE 6. David Penniman moved and Woody Fraser seconded a motion to create an expendable general fund Trust Fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a to be known as the Madbury Memorial Park Fund, for the purpose of maintenance and operation of Madbury Memorial Park and to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000.00) toward this purpose and further to authorize the selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend from this Trust Fund. This appropriation is recommended by the Selectmen. \$6,000.00 is included in the posted budget and \$6,000.00 plus accumulated interest is from the discontinued Cemetery Capital Reserve Fund. Selectman Houghton explained that this article establishes working funds for the Cemetery Committee and that this should be the last time the Town is asked for funds for the cemetery. Soon lots will be sold and the operation will

become self-supporting. Again there were no comments or questions from the floor so a vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 7. Selectman Bruce Hodsdon moved and Barbara Houston seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) for the existing Capital Reserve Fund created in Article 6 at the 1991 Town Meeting for the purpose of the revaluation of Properties in the Town of Madbury and further to authorize the selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. This appropriation is recommended by the Selectmen and is included in the posted budget. Selectman Hodsdon explained that these should be the last dollars asked to fund the Revaluation project. New assessments will be effective April 1, 1994 and reflected in the final (December) tax bill for 1994. With no questions or comments a vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 8. Tom Chase moved and Robert Hodgson seconded a motion to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of a Fire Truck and to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be placed in this fund, and further to authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to withdraw and expend from this Capital Reserve Fund. This appropriation is recommended by the Board of Selectmen and is included in the posted budget. Selectman Jay Moriarty told the citizens how the Board of Selectmen had wanted to include this article two or three years ago but high legal fees and Madbury's payment for the cleanup of the Tolend Landfill had precluded such a move on the Board's part. Fire Chief Ken Wolcott urged the passage of the article. A vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 9. Bruce Hodsdon made and Robert Wilson seconded a motion to adopt the proposed budget of \$670,873.00 as printed. In response to a question by Gray Cornwell about where road improvement moneys would be spent, the Selectmen listed Cherry Lane, Evans Road, Huckins Road and a section of Moharimet Drive as priorities. Another citizen asked about costs associated with current and former bond issues. The Hicks Hill bond has approximately \$15,000 to be paid, that for Tolend Landfill cleanup will run about \$65,000 per year through 1997, and the bond just passed for the Tibbetts land will cost approximately \$35,000 per year in 1995 and 1996. Asked about the future of

the Lamprey Regional Waste Cooperative, Selectman Moriarty commented that it is at best dim, despite high hopes and hard work. The University has set a firm date of November 1995 for ceasing its relationship with the co-op, and Moriarty sees little chance that satisfactory arrangements for another method of waste disposal will be settled by that date. The cooperative agreement among its member towns does not expire until June of 1996. A vote was taken on the proposed 1994 budget of \$670,873.00. PASSED

ARTICLE 10. Selectman Moriarty made and Barbara Houston seconded a motion to accept the provisions of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to issue Tax Anticipation Notes. The effect of passage of this article will be to allow the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes without an annual warrant article having to be passed. A vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 11. Craig Seaver made and Harry Loughlin seconded a motion that the Town vote the retention of the unexpended portion of the 1994 Conservation Commission appropriation, said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund. Seaver explained the reason for this annual article. A vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 12. Margaret Wolcott moved and Woodie Fraser seconded that the Town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at any annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the Town Meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or any other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year. Again, this article will stay in effect without having to appear each year. A vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 13. Robert Wilson moved and David Penniman seconded, that the Town authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the Town for any public purpose, pursuant to RSA 31:95-e The Selectman must hold a public hearing before accepting such gift, and the acceptance shall not bind the Town to raise, appropriate, or expend any

public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair, or replacement of any such personal property. Mr. Moriarty dubbed this the "wishful thinking article." A vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 14. Lorraine Morong made and Woodie Fraser seconded a motion to authorize indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:80 and RSA 80:42. A vote was taken. PASSED

ARTICLE 15. No committees reported.

Selectman Houghton thanked all the volunteers who contribute to Madbury's community functions; specifically, he mentioned those folks who saved the town \$700 by delivering Town Reports, serve as Volunteer Firemen, maintain various small parks throughout town, and serve on various Town Boards. He then invited everyone present to join each other in a social time complete with coffee, punch, and homemade goodies.

With no other business to be brought up at this time, the Moderator adjourned the Meeting at 8:20 p.m. with the polls remaining open until 9:00. The 210 cast ballots were counted and the meeting was officially adjourned at 9:50 p.m.

A Cemetery Trustee for the ensuing three years.

A Cemetery Trustee for the ensuing two years.

A Cemetery Trustee for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2: To vote on the Amendment No. 1 to the Zoning Ordinances regarding the COMMERCIAL & LIGHT INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT, as proposed by the Madbury Planning Board. (Majority vote required)

MADBURY VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT

The Fire Department answered 111 calls this year, 66 fire and 45 FAST. We did not have any serious fires this year. Several accidents and brush fires kept us busy.

We have also found time to add a room on the back of our station. This room will be used for a much needed office and communication room. The members have spent several weekends at the station and should be proud of what they have accomplished. We plan to have an Open House and Dedication in the spring.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were No Permit, Children and Rekindles of fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 11, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

The Committee will start work on the Memorial Park area in the near future. We are looking for input from the citizens of Madbury on this part of the project.



MADBURY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1994

The Commission's most satisfying accomplishment was the completion of the forest management project at the Pudding Hill property. The harvest enhanced habitat and recreational uses, and will allow better growth of species with commercial value. Proceeds from the cut covered all expenses, with a surplus of over \$800 going to the Town.

The second gratifying piece of commission work involved trails on Town property and Kingman Farm lands. The steepest part of the trail coming down off the northwest end of Hicks Hill was rerouted for mountain bike use. The new trail link also keeps riders farther from the Madbury Woods house lots. In addition, a loop was added to the end of a trail which has been interrupted by development. Work remains to be done in obliterating trail links that don't go anywhere now. The commission hopes to publish a new map of the trail system with various segments marked for different uses, and we welcome the input of folks who use the trails. UNH has been cooperative in the trail work arena.

Work proceeds on the revision of 1985's *Inventory of Properties Owned by the Town of Madbury*. It is worth noting here that in visiting town-owned parcels commissioners end up thrashing along boundaries where neighbors might be unaccustomed to seeing people. Citizens whose land abuts town property should expect to see commission boundary parties from time to time. Usually, too, those parties can use some help in locating markers on the property line, so feel free to come out and tell us what you know.

Other commission work involved attendance at some Planning Board meetings, and various workshops, consideration of two dredge and fill permit applications, and the completion of the fourth annual monitoring of the Fernald Easement.

The commission is fortunate to have gained John Nachilly as its newest member. John is an avid outdoorsman with expertise in computers and mapping.

Townpeople may feel free to bring their concerns and comments to the commission, either by letter or by attending the meetings on the fourth Monday at 7:30.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MADBURY WATER DISTRICT

The Water District oversaw the sampling and testing of ground water, from private wells in town, for radon. From the 49 sampled wells, the median radon concentration was 2,400 PiC/L, with low and high values of 120 PiC/L and 10,000 PiC/L respectively. There is currently no regulatory limit for radon concentrations. In general, when radon concentrations exceed 10,000 - 20,000 PiC/L it becomes a concern, since the radon is easily released into the air. In Madbury, overburden (dug) wells had lower radon concentrations than drilled (bedrock) wells. Even in the bedrock wells, radon seemed to decrease with depth. Although the spatial variability was high, in general, radon concentrations were higher in western Madbury and decreased moving eastward. The final report for the study is available at the Town Hall.

The Water District has also been involved with the continuing investigation and remediation of ground water contamination at Madbury Metals. New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services (NH DES) has hosted several meetings for all of the involved parties. A treatment system has been designed and should be operating by Spring 1995. The system is to treat for trichloroethane. Although some elevated levels of arsenic have been found in some of the monitoring wells, no treatment for arsenic has been proposed. It should be noted that wells of Madbury residents do not appear to be affected by contamination at Madbury Metals; it is the Dover well field that is primarily at risk.

Lastly, the Water District supervised sampling of monitoring wells at the transfer station. Of two wells, only one had water. The water analysis did not indicate any severe contamination; however, more regular monitoring is warranted.

LAMPREY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE

The Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative, in 1994, operated within budget and had a productive year. The Board of Directors voted a closing date of November 30, 1995 of our present incinerator on the campus of UNH.

The Lamprey Board of Directors are presently pursuing a New Restatement of the Cooperative Agreement which outlines goals for the future such as a Recycling Facility with Transfer capabilities. At the 1995 Town Meetings, the respective Cooperative Communities will be voting on this expanded agreement for the future of the Cooperative.

In 1995, the Cooperative hopes to have a new facility constructed so that on November 30, 1995, all municipal waste will go to the new facility without any interim period of interruption.

DURHAM AMBULANCE CORPS

Town Report 1994

The Durham Ambulance Corps is a private, non-profit, volunteer Corporation. Since its incorporation in 1968, the Corps has provided continuous 24-hour emergency ambulance service to Durham, Lee, Madbury and the University of New Hampshire. Staffed with volunteers, and one full-time Manager, the Corps has greatly improved its level of patient care from the minimal services of Advanced First Aid in 1968, to the various levels of Advanced Life Support currently provided to its service area. The Durham Ambulance Corps takes pride over a quarter century tradition of providing some of the most sophisticated and progressive emergency care in the area.

In 1994, the DAC responded to 767 calls, a slight increase over our 1993 call volume of 755. There were 285 calls in Durham (not including UNH), 270 calls on the UNH campus, 129 calls in Lee, 46 calls in Madbury and the Corps responded mutual aid to other communities 37 times.

ACHIEVEMENTS IN 1994

We established a program for training members in Infection Control and Hazardous Materials as required by OSHA. Each member receives annual refresher training.

Our public education program was expanded by the addition of an annual "Safety Fair" which provides safety information to the general public. In addition, the Corps continues to offer CPR and First Aid training, station tours, daycare visits, etc.

The Corps continues to improve the availability of Advanced Life Support care. The DAC sponsored an EMT-Intermediate Course, and a Manual Defibrillation Course in 1994.

In an effort to shift the cost of ambulance service away from the taxpayer and to the user, at the request of the communities we serve, the Corps began billing all patients who are transported.

GOALS FOR 1995

Fund drive: The Corps will hold a fund drive in early-mid 1995 to raise money for an anticipated move to a "new" station within the next 5 years. If a move is not necessary, money raised will be used for major renovations/additions to our current facility to better meet our needs.

OSHA Compliance: Continue annual training and policy review/revision in compliance with OSHA guidelines for Tuberculosis, Bloodborne Pathogens, and Hazardous Materials. Investigate OSHA requirements for hazardous material preexposure and postexposure health surveillance and associated costs.

Training: Develop an ongoing training program to maintain the high level of patient care provided to the Corps' service area.

Station Planning: Corps membership has doubled since moving to our current quarters in 1985. Begin preliminary work on future housing for the Corps.

Accreditation: Continue preliminary work on national accreditation through the newly formed Commission on Accreditation of Ambulance Services.

We owe a great deal of thanks to the communities and citizens of Durham, Lee, Madbury and UNH for their continued support. We would also like to thank the Durham, Lee and Madbury Fire Departments, the Durham-UNH Communications Center and the Durham, UNH, Lee and Madbury Police Departments for their support. Most of all, we would like to thank all the DAC volunteers for their many hours of dedicated service.

MY FRIEND'S PLACE

DESCRIPTION

My Friend's Place is Strafford County's only homeless shelter. It was organized to provide temporary housing and support for individuals and families in need of assistance due to an emergency or adverse situation. More than 1200 individuals and families have been assisted since opening in January 1989. During the same period, My Friend's Place was forced to turn away five times as many individuals - compelling evidence of the severity of homelessness.

OBJECTIVES

To provide emergency shelter, food and clothing to meet immediate needs. To give support and guidance. Reestablish confidence and self-esteem.

The comprehensive program will provide the following:

1. 24 Hours a day staffing by Professionals.
2. A caring environment of warmth and security.
3. Assist each resident to develop goals and objectives to secure employment and housing.
4. Network with existing agencies to obtain services such as: medical, educational, financial, vocational and counseling.
5. Weekly evaluations and updates.
6. Follow up and assistance after exit as needed.

BUDGET

My Friend's Place utilizes town funds along with grants and private donations to staff, feed and operate the shelter. 1995 request - \$500.00
