Article 3. It was moved that the Town vote the present building housing fire equipment across from Tin Shop Pond to become permanently a fire station. Passed.

Article 4. An amended motion was passed to authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the following specific purposes:

Article 5. A motion was made that the Town vote to withdraw the necessary funds from the "Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund" to cover the cost of:

Total cost of above equipment \$1,570.20. Passed.

Article 6. It was moved that the Town vote to withdraw \$4,000.00 from the "Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund" for the purchase of a dump truck with sander and plow equipment. Total price \$6,000, balance to be taken from Summer & Winter Maintenance Budget. Passed.

Article 7. It was moved that the Town sell to the Marlow Historical Society for the sum of \$1.00, the old Town Hearse, the Hearse House, and the land which it occupies. The purpose being to ensure its care and preservation. If at any time the Historical Society should cease to exist, said property would revert back to the Town. Passed.

Article 8. It was moved that the Town vote to give the Selectmen the authority to issue tax bills rounded to the nearest dollar. Passed.

Article 9. A motion was made that the Town vote on the following article: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person of 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for a least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married a combined income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence." Passed. (The Selectmen later found that improper procedure was used to pass this article. A Public Hearing on the article was required and it should have been listed on the Town Ballot. It has therefore been voided.)

Article 10. It was moved that the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with solar energy heating or cooling system which exemption shall be in the amount of 100% of the cost of said solar system. Passed.

Article 11. It was moved that the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 72:66 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a wind powered energy system which exemption shall be in the amount of 100% of the cost of said wind energy system. Passed.

Article 12. It was moved that the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 72:70 for a property tax exemption on real property equipped with a wood heating energy system which exemption shall be in the amount of 100% of the cost of said wood heating energy system. Passed.

Article 13. A motion was made that the Town vote on the following article: "To see if the Town will vote to legalize casino gambling within the Town limits and authorize the Board of Selectmen in consultation with Town Counsel to set such regulations as may be necessary to control such activity. 50% of all net proceeds of this activity are to be turned over to the Town and used as revenue to defray Town and school expenses." A move was made to amend the article to direct the Selectmen to appoint a committee of five to do a feasibility study of legalizing casino gambling, and to investigate all other possible revenue generating measures. The committee to report back to the Town on September 18, 1982, 10 A.M. in Jones Hall. Passed.

Article 14. The Town moved to authorize and direct the Selectmen to grant a cable television franchise to the Town in accordance with and as allowed by New Hampshire RSA 53-C (Supp. 1977). It was moved to amend the article by adding: "Whenever feasible all wiring necessary should be installed underground". Passed.

ABSTRACT RECESSED TOWN MEETING
Saturday, September 18th, 1982, 10:00 A.M.

Amended Article 13. The Town moved to direct the Selectmen to appoint a committee of five to do a feasibility study on legalized gambling and investigate all other revenue generating measures. The study committee reported and did not recommend gambling within the Town limits. A vote of thanks went to the committee for a very indepth report. Senators Blaisdell and Wiggins attended.

To the inhabitants if the Town of Marlow in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Jones Hall in said Marlow on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next, at one of the clock (1:00) in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.

Article 1A. "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000, or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence."

After the votes are counted, the meeting will recess until Saturday, the 12th day of March, at 10:00 a.m. in the forenoon, at Jones Hall to act upon the following subjects:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing, and make appropriations of the same, as set forth in the following budget:

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to dissolve the Capital Reserve Fund marked "Fire Station Lot" in the 1982 Trust Fund Report which was established April 10, 1970. As of December 31, 1982, there was a balance of \$977.43. This is in accordance with State law since Capital Reserve Funds cannot be established for land acquisition.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to allocate the amount of \$977.43 from the above article to the Fire Department to be used for a flush toilet and holding tank.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to form a committee to look into repairs needed on the body of the 1965 International Fire Truck. The committee to report back to the March 1984 Town Meeting. Committee to consist of the Fire Chief, one fireman elected by the Fire Department members and three people from the Town. Members from the Town to be elected at this Town Meeting.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following as a permanent Animal Control Ordinance for the Town:

Animals defined: Animals shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, sheep, goats, cattle, horses and swine.

Whosoever, being the owner or custodian of such animal, shall allow such animal to be at large or unlawfully upon the property of another shall be liable for all costs incurred in abating the nuisance created by such animal. Costs incurred in abating the nuisance created by such animal shall be directly payable to the Town of Marlow.

Whosoever, being the owner or custodian of a dog, shall allow such dog to be in violation of the 1979 adopted By-Law entitled "Dog Ordinance", shall be liable for all costs incurred in abating said violation. Costs incurred in abating the violation shall be directly payable to the Town of Marlow.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress to:

Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries. (By Petition)

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Marlow and to the health and welfare of the people of Marlow. (BY Petition)

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to approve the following ordinance:

At any town, primary, general, national or other election, and during the hours that polling stations are open, the following will not be allowed to be physically located less than 300 feet in any direction from the exterior of the structure designated as the polling place:

- a) candidates, their workers or representatives
- b) supporters for any amendment, resolution or warrant article appearing on the ballot

Further, no literature, brochures, signs, etc. relating to either a candidate, amendment, resolution or warrant article shall be distributed or made available to voters in any manner within such 300 feet, nor shall such be affixed to any part of the structure designated as the place of polling.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to have all property in the Town reappraised in 1985. The Selectmen to be authorized to investigate the best possible financial arrangements. The results of their action to be presented to the Town at the 1984 Town Meeting.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to elect our Road Agent instead of having the Selectmen appoint one. The Road Agent to be elected from the floor this year. (By Petition)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to do away with the semi-annual tax billing and return to the annual tax billing. (By Petition)

Article 14. To act upon any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

- c) Owned by a resident 65 years of age or over jointly or in common with a person not his spouse; or
- d) Owned by a resident whose spouse is 65 years of age or over, and who has been married to, and living with, his spouse for a least five years.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Dear Fellow Citizens:

Like every previous year in Marlow's history, some changes have occurred; though in many cases not readily obvious. Perhaps this might be a good opportunity to draw attention to a few.

To begin with, we are all a year older. To the young, this fact may have little significance; others are grateful for each additional year. To some this past year may have been a milestone in their lives. Perhaps they entered into or graduated from school. Or they married and began their own homes. Or they embarked on a new job. During the year a few new people moved in among us. We bid them welcome. A few saw fit to move on. We wish them good fortune in their new locations. A few were born, a few retired, and a few died.

The Town also experienced changes, though, as Selectmen, we may prefer to call them improvements or accomplishments. Most are described in the reports of the various departments. Here we will simply mention a few of the major ones.

Through the tireless efforts of Chief Dave Davis, the members of the Fire Department, and other interested citizens, plus professional contracted labor, the old Fire House has been raised, repaired, and remodeled. A special word of thanks is due the Ladies Auxiliary of the Fire Department for its substantial financial assistance in this long overdue project.

Our Highway Department now boasts a permanent chimney enabling it to be heated with wood far more economically than previously.

Our Police Department gained the addition of an exclusive Animal Control Officer for the express purpose of dealing with our four footed residents.

Our Planning Board finally completed work on the Comprehensive Master Plan for Marlow's future growth and development.

On the social side of the picture, Hazel White and the 4-H Club presented an excellent demonstration of horsemanship at their newly constructed horse rink.

Gerry Plotts and a group of talented residents treated us to "a night at the theater" in our own Town Hall.

Another Old Home Day parade and activities were accomplished through the enthusiasm and hard work of a great many people.

Events and activities such as these help bind a community together and are to be encouraged. For in this way we become more than just a group of families that happen to live in the same geographical location.

And all of our departments continued to provide the best possible services of which they are capable whenever the need arose. This is the highest accomplishment of all for a town. Truly we may look back with pride on 1982.

1983 will not be a year without difficulties, both on an individual and a community basis. The recession and high unemployment are still with us. Projected cuts in revenue and assistance from the State increase the burden of the local community and, ultimately, the individual taxpayer.

With the able assistance of our Advisory Budget Committee, we have developed a proposed working budget for the Town for 1983. In all instances we have not only attempted to keep to the levels of the previous year, but have even reduced some items. We have weighed the requirements for adequate services and improvements against what we can actually afford. Our proposals await your judgment at Town Meeting.

In our constant desire to control costs we are looking to a professional study of all Town buildings for the purpose of eventual consolidation of uses. In this manner heating and maintenance on some buildings could be substantially decreased while affording us maximum use of others. Hopefully, this effort will have positive results.

As most of you must be aware of by now, Frank Hardy recently resigned his positions as our Police Chief and our Civil Defense Director. This seems to be an excellent opportunity for the Selectmen to publically thank Frank for the sincere effort and time he devoted to these positions. Frank will continue to be involved in our Police Department on a limited basis. And, of course, we hope he will continue to drive our school bus and maintain our cemeteries for a good many years.

Small town government and services are things which we provide ourselves for ourselves. Quality is entirely dependent on our own abilities and dedication. We encourage every one of you to get involved in helping to make Marlow an even nicer place in which to live.

Unfortunately a few individuals have only a limited concept of the seriousness and complexity of town government. These same few find humor in writing in impossible possibilities on their ballots. Or they see fit to initiate unnecessary or frivolous legislation, without sufficient prior consideration regarding its merits or benefit to the Town as a whole. Or they simply "bad-mouth".

We, who assumed the responsibility for managing the Town's affairs, find ourselves bearing an ever increasing burden of duties due to State requirements and regulations. All we ask of you, our Townpeople, is a little understanding and a lot of patience. We are the first to admit that we are not infallible. However, should you feel dissatisfied with, or not understand, an action taken by the Board, or any of its members, please don't complain to your neighbors. Such action only serves to create ill will and distrust among us, and the less of that we have to contend with the better. By all means bring it to our attention. Let us reason it out together. Much can be resolved simply through talk.

Remember that we took an oath when we assumed our office; and for the good of the majority, (and despite a few) we are attempting to fulfill that oath. Some times it is not easy. We always need your help and cooperation. The last thing we need is distrust. The work load is heavy enough. Let us pull together, not apart.

Finally we wish to thank all those who are already involved in Town affairs for their time, their efforts, and especially their interest and desire to make town government work. And, we wish to thank everyone who took time to acquaint us with problems and shortcomings in services. Without your input we would have no way to gauge our effectiveness.

We wish you all a good, productive year. Thank you.

TOWN AUDITORS REPORT

I would like to apologize to the Town for not getting more of the audit done before the deadline of submitting this report.

The Selectmen's Payments consumed so many hours that I did not have time to get very far on the rest of the audit. I did find some improvements in the Selectmen's records as far as missing original invoices, a clear cut off at the end of the year, handling of investments with the Treasurer, timely payments to the Trustees of the Trust Funds, and consolidation of Yield Tax Bond accounts into one account.

An overall decline in the Selectmen's bookkeeping system was found. With some of the same problems, only worse, as last year. I found their expenditure process to have little guidelines. For example, they did not properly account for the disbursements of the Revenue Sharing Fund and the Capital Reserve Fund in their records. A check written in July to H.K. Webster Company for \$440.40 and expensed to the General Highway Department Expenses turned out to be a payment of a bill belonging to the Town of Marlborough. The Town of Marlow will be getting a check issued back to the Treasurer.

The Town Clerk's records were found to be time consuming as there were errors in calculation of the dog licenses, errors in the disposition of the dog licenses fees to the State, and an overcharge of Motor Vehicle Permit issued fee.

The Treasurer's records have been audited as far as balancing to the Selectmen's Payments. The rest of the Treasurer's records look to be in order, not having the time to give a complete audit.

The Tax Collector and Trustees of the Trust Funds have not been given a complete audit at the time of this report.

The audit should be complete by Town Meeting, enabling me to give an oral report if needed.

This helped to raise extra funds for the Library and also to give people the chance to socialize. We held our 2nd Coffee Shop May 15, but as the weather was so beautiful and because of conflicting schedules, the attendance was disappointing. However we hope to continue with the Coffee Shop in the future with the help of all the good cooks in Marlow. We thank all those who donated doughnuts, coffeecakes, muffins, etc.

With National Library Week in April we held several programs at the Library. April 21st Andy Davis of Acworth entertained the children with storytelling and music. Students from Perkins School and pre-school children attended. Also for Library Week, Gerry Plotts presented a slide show on the Holy Land April 23rd.

During the summer months a Craft Class was held for the children every Wednesday morning from 10:00 A.M. to Noon. Christine Bryce led the group making many creative projects with them. The last day was a fun day where everyone made their own sundaes.

For the Old Home Days Parade we entered a float based on the Peanuts cartoon "A Beanbag Summer", inviting residents to check out a book from the Marlow Library for their beanbag summer. Jeremiah Pratt and Jacqueline Bryce were Charlie Brown and Sally, while Eddy Christopher was Snoopy. And we were off to beanbag camp!

With Fall arriving and a long Marlow winter to look forward to the Cabin Fever Club was formed. Instrumental in organizing the group was Alice Scharf. Held every other Wednesday from 10:30 A.M. until Noon, this is a chance for Mothers and Fathers, toddlers and infants, to meet and become acquainted. A playpen is available for the babies and the toddlers each bring with them a toy to share. Everyone is welcome to attend. One benefit of the Cabin Fever Club is to acquaint the young child with the Library so he will perceive the Library as a pleasant place to visit.

Wednesday morning is certainly a busy time at the Library as the students from Perkins School visit every other week. Gerry Plotts helps when the students check out their books.

Irene Streeter of Surry is still helping us at the Library as an RSVP Volunteer. She also volunteers at the Gilsum Library and recently started working at the Keene Library. Irene has certainly been a big help to us.

Eileen Gendron began a class in the different needlecrafts this Fall. She will be at the Library from 1 to 4 P.M. every Monday working with all ages. If you would like to learn to knit, crochet, macrame or tat, please join us. Stay as long as you have time for, or all afternoon.

The Library Trustees are at this time considering other classes and programs to offer to the Marlow people. There are many possibilities with your participation.

We decided to sponsor another Halloween program such as the one that was so popular several years ago. October 27th, Randy Plotts read scary Halloween stories. His lighting effects and sinister voice and costume made this a very successful event.

Thanks to Sharon Wentworth we now have a rug in the children's section. Fred and Carol Hamman gave us a magazine rack. We purchased a paperback book rack as the start of our separate Teen section. We hope to set up one corner as the Teen section. Many thanks to those who donated books this year.

Since the bookmobile has been discontinued we must travel to Concord to choose our selection of State Library books. There are more books to choose from but this is an all day event. We are a member of the Nubunusit Library Cooperative which meets monthly and allows us a 37% discount on book orders because we are buying cooperatively.

Probably the most exciting news for the Marlow Library was in October when we were notified that we were remembered in the last will and testament of Russell Perkins of Hartford, Vermont. Our very generous bequest reads as follows; "I hereby give and bequeth the sum of twenty thousand (\$20,000) Dollars to the Marlow Library of Marlow, New Hampshire as a Memorial to myself and my wife, Irene Perkins, and my mother and father, Waldo and Marion Perkins. This bequest is to go towards the building of a new Library in Marlow, New Hampshire and may be added to any other sums that will be raised for that purpose. I request that this money be invested in certificates of deposit or government bonds until such time as enough money is accumulated in the fund to build a reasonable Library for the Town of Marlow, New Hampshire".

It will be some time before we see our new Library, I'm sure, as we will need more money added to the fund, thorough planning and land for the building. As yet we have not received the bequested money. However this is something to look forward to and think about for all of us!

We accepted with regret the resignation of Sharon Davis as a Library Trustee. She has served since 1975 on the Board. We wish to thank her for the time she has given to the Marlow Library and its programs.

Thanks to all who have supported the Marlow Library over the years. For those who have no interest remember there are many possibilities with the support of the Townspeople. This will be something to keep in mind over the next few years.

Randy Preis is still with us, and Rob Chambers has taken over as Animal Control Officer as of the end of last year. We are only a four man Call Department, and one of us is almost always available to answer your needs. We all carry pagers and are reached by calling Mutual Aid in Keene at 352-1100.

This past year has seen a slight increase in thefts and burglaries reported to us. An ounce of prevention on your part would be to tell any member of the Police Department is you will be away for any length of time so that we can arrange to check your property. You would be surprised at the few properties I have checked at the request of the owner, because of the owner failing to tell me he would be gone.

An Article dealing with Animal Control will put more burden on animal owners and custodians, saving the townspeople money they are now expending.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

This past year was an active one for your Civil Defense. Marlow CD is now without a director, but has one working assistant. The director's job is not that difficult, probably requiring about a week of work out of the year if nothing happens, and we have been fortunate in that regard. My work with the Police Department, Fire Department and Ambulance prohibit me from taking this position. It would be an ideal job for a housewife who would like to contribute just a little time on behalf of her neighbors.

Marlow Civil Defense acquired new Radiation Detection Equipment this past year, and it has been put to use in training about 70 Firefighters and Rescue Personnel in Marlow and in surrounding towns. Prior to this, I was able to arrange through Civil Defense in Concord the swap of defective and inaccurate equipment, for Marlow and some surrounding towns, for more modern equipment. In the event of a disaster, you can be confident that we have people well trained to serve you.

If anyone feels that they can take a little time to fill the Director's position, I would be happy to talk to them and assist them to their full potential. The job is a most important one when things really go wrong.

MARLOW VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

In 1982 the Fire Department answered 20 alarms. These calls included 2 buildings, 2 dump fires, 3 chimney fires, 1 brush fire, 2 automobiles, 1 rescue, 1 cover, 6 mutual aid responses and 1 misc. Of the 6 mutual aid calls, 1 was to E. Alstead, 2 were to Gilsum and 3 were to Stoddard.

We had four mutual aid calls to town. Gilsum came four times, E. Alstead three, Keene twice and Stoddard and Acworth each covered once.

Last summer I received a call from Phil Tierell, Fire Chief in Lempster, asking if we could meet and maybe work out a mutual aid agreement between our towns. I invited Chief Tierell and members of their department down to one of our meetings. Last Fall Lempster was accepted into South West Fire Mutual Aid. By being accepted into SWFMA we can now work with them the same as the rest of our neighboring towns. They have a very good and active department.

As you can see in the last year the fire trucks were fairly quiet. I hope you do not take this to mean that the Fire Department did not have enough to do. Between meetings with Ladies Auxiliary, fire schools in Manchester, Claremont and Meadowood, two scheduled meetings a month, and any other time I could beg, borrow or steal help, we were at the Fire Station almost every day or night right into November. In fact we were painting the doors on December 23rd.

If you have been by our Fire Station since last May you had to notice some major changes in the building. Some of you may not know how that came about.

In October of 1981 I received a letter from the Marlow Fire Department Ladies Auxiliary stating that they had approximately \$8,000 and would like to know if there was anything they could do to help the Department. I contacted Mabel Champney, President of the group, and met with the group in February with proposals of what we would like to do at the Station. The Ladies had two conditions which had to be met. One, the building had to be voted by the Town as a Fire station and the State Fire Marshall's office had to approve the building as a fire station. Both of these conditions were met.

At this time it was decided that if major renovations were to be made to the Station, now was the time to raise the building, keeping in mind the future needs of our equipment.

The Town voted \$1500 last year at Town Meeting for this aspect of the project.

After almost giving up the project altogether we decided to aim for Memorial Day weekend to raise the Station. A number of volunteers showed up, many not firemen, and by 11:00 P.M. on the 31st of May, our building was 30½" in the air.

The building did not go up without its problems. We had trouble unhooking the tower and almost tipped it over, we also dropped the left front corner of the building when we were changing the jacks. Needless to say at 11:30 P.M. the last night, when a tired crew of townspeople, firemen and boy scouts went home, some of us did not sleep too well. We hoped there wouldn't be any unexpected high winds.

A week later the masonry work was done, the building was set down on its new foundation 28" higher than when we started.

We would like to thank Henry Pletzner for engineering the method in which the building was raised and for sticking with us long enough to set up and get us started.

The building on a firm foundation, we started the work made possible by the Ladies Auxiliary donation.

The outside of the building was completely stripped. Some studding was replaced, some moved and more added. The whole outside was sheathed and braced with half inch plywood. Originally we had planned to have vinyl siding on both ends and part of the back side of the building. After we installed it on the back and ends we decided we liked it well enough to put it on the front and also do the tower. Instead of covering 970 sq. ft. as planned, we covered 1,790 sq. ft. We hope you will agree it makes a better looking and easier to maintain building.

We put six inches of insulation in the side walls with a vapor barrier and all new half inch sheetrock. The entire building has been rewired. Three ceiling fans were put in to blow the heat at ceiling level down. This makes the building easier to heat and makes the temperature more even from the floor to the ceiling. We also have a closed in furnace room and office with storage space over both.

We bought one new 11' x 16' insulated overhead door and one new 12' x 12" panel for the old wood overhead door. Under the eaves was closed up and vents installed.

We still have some finishing work to be done and with a little luck the Station will be finished and ready for an open house by Fire Prevention Week in the Fall.

Your Marlow Ambulance Squad has completed another successful year of service. We have been able to provide you with twenty-four hour a day emergency medical care and most important, emergency transportation to the hospital when necessary. This is available to you at no cost in terms of tax dollars.

The continued success of this unique service is dependent on two factors: time and money. You have always generously supported us through your donations and we are slowly accruing funds to purchase an updated emergency vehicle when the need arises. The best and most expensive equipment in the world however will not help you or your family when you are ill or injured if there are no trained personnel to man it.

As a result of an appeal made at last year's Town Meeting, we gained two new members who subsequently attended classes and are currently serving as certified Emergency Medical Technicians. Unfortunately, during the year two of our experienced crew members found it necessary to withdraw. Consequently we face a new year still understaffed and desperately in need of your help. We currently have just seven active members. We should have twice this amount to insure prompt response when you need us. At the present time, guaranteed response is possible only because of back-up assistance from affiliate towns. This is far from an ideal situation and certainly will delay prompt arrival on the scene in some instances particularly during the daytime since the majority of our present group are employed outside of the Marlow area during these hours.

This is a direct appeal for your skills. Your monetary support has always been strong. Please support this invaluable service with your time. This extensive document, utilizing text and diagrams, traces Marlow's historical background and development, both socially and economically, to the present. Then, drawing on recent trends, it attempts to forecast future growth. Finally it presents what we feel are sound recommendations for managing and controlling this anticipated future growth to the best advantage of the Town.

This document has been accepted by the Planning Board as a guide in judging the merits of future growth. In subsequent warrants, articles will be introduced for Town Meeting approval that will attempt to implement various recommendations of this Comprehensive Plan.

Aside from working on the Comprehensive Plan, the Planning Board also dealt with several subdivision proposals for Marlow, which were concluded to the satisfaction of all concerned.

At this time the Planning Board finds itself short one member, and invites interested residents to apply to the Selectmen for this position. We feel that serving on this Board can be an interesting, rewarding experience; one that does not make great demands on the members' time or private lives, while still affording an opportunity to exercise some positive influence on Marlow's future.

BUILDING INSPECTOR'S REPORT

This is the first time I have felt the need to submit a report from this department.

I was appointed to the post of Building Inspector during the summer of 1978. Some months later, in March of 1979, I became a member of the Board of Selectmen. At this point the other Board members indicated that they wished me to continue as Building Inspector in addition to my other duties. I saw no problem in this arrangement and continued acting in that capacity. Since then I have tried to better define the duties and responsibilities of this office in relationship to the people it serves.

Though I know of no conflict of office under existing N.H. statute, it has been brought to my attention that it might be considered "awkward" by some for a Selectman to serve as Building Inspector. To date I am aware of no problems that this dual role has caused. Therefore, I am perfectly willing to go on doing the job for as long as I am needed.

However, I would never-the-less welcome a responsible replacement, possessing some knowledge and interest in this field, willing to assume the post in my stead. Interested candidates should apply in writing to the Board of Selectmen.

Due in part to the general economy, building activity in Marlow has been rather limited during 1982. For the most part building permits were issued for additions to existing domiciles rather than for new residences. Permits were also issued for several non-residential structures. A total of 16 permits were issued by me in 1982. There was also a certain amount of small construction activity which did not require the issuance of a permit.

I wish to thank everyone for the interest and cooperation afforded me over the years.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

The past year has been a year of changes. At the urging of our Selectmen, all Cemetery Funds were put into certificates of higher yield on June 30, 1982. This explains the semi-annual breakdown of cemetery funds. The Trustees would like to point out that while this act has increased the Income Account significantly, these monies can only be spent on the designated lots except for a very few specified funds which stipulate that any residue may be used elsewhere in the cemetery.

These Principal amounts were invested in three separate certificates:

Common Trust I --- \$16,117.71

Common Trust II -- 750.00

One individual fund which does not require the usual annual maintenance.

As of March 1, 1982, accounts under \$100.00 ceased to draw interest. The Library and School Funds were combined into one certificate and the Library Fund is now drawing interest again.

Because of the nature of Capital Reserve Funds, and the laws governing their availability, these funds cannot be invested in high yield, long term certificates and must be available to the Town's vote.

In July, we received a letter from the Department of Revenue Administration pointing out that the "Capital Reserve Fund - Fire Station Lot" was not permissible under N.H. law. Upon consultation with the Selectmen, it was agreed that this matter should be put to a vote of the Town.

This year's project for available cemetery residue funds was used to lime the Town's cemeteries.

Home Health Care and Community Services

In an effort to maintain home health services for local residents, several years ago the six communities, including Marlow, represented by the North Cheshire County Home Health Agency made the decision to become a part of Cheshire Health and Social Services. Today, as a result of the establishment of a new organization, Home Health Care & Community Services, these same services are being provided to the citizens of Marlow. This larger organization, in the interest of providing more cost efficient and higher quality services, now serves 34 southern New Hampshire communities.

The services currently available in North Cheshire County include the following:

1. Visiting Nurse Services - Nurses provide direct nursing care for the ill in their homes, as well as preventive health services such as care of the newborn and education for diabetic patients, in collaboration the patient's physician.
2. Occupational, Physical and Speech Therapy - Physical therapy includes active and passive exercises, muscle re-education, whirlpool treatments, as well as instruction for the patient and the patient's family. Speech therapy tests for speech, voice or language disorders and develops and implements a plan to help people regain their natural means of communication or to use compensatory methods. Occupational therapy uses selected activities to improve or restore functions which have been impaired by illness or injury.
3. Personal Care - Home Health Aides assist with providing care of the sick at home including activities such as bathing, meal preparation and personal hygiene, under the direction of the Visiting Nurse.
4. Homemaking - Homemakers perform selected housekeeping functions, such as shopping, laundry and light cleaning that are essential to the patient's and the patient's family's well-being.

5. Outreach - The Outreach Program is designed to help identify isolated, handicapped, frail and elderly individuals who need assistance to participate in services such as congregate meals, transportation and other health and social services offered throughout the community.
6. Community Health Education and Services - HHCCS staff sponsor and conduct health promotion activities such as blood pressure clinics and nutrition, dental and health services for children.
7. Special activities which include occasional trips and participation in the congregate meals program in Keene.

A sliding fee scale, based on a confidential assessment of the client's ability to pay, insures that services are available to anyone in Marlow who needs them. Many services offered are covered by insurance, Medicare, Medicaid, federal or town funds.

In some instances clients are able to pay for the services offered by HHCCS. Full fee for services is as follows:

Monadnock Family & Mental Health Services

Annual Report

Monadnock Family & Mental Health Services is a non-profit agency which provides a range of mental health services to citizens of all ages who reside in the Monadnock Region. These services include individual, couple, family and group counseling, support groups for adolescents, adults and older people, 24 hour emergency services, inpatient psychiatric services, a partial hospitalization program and consultation and training to other service providers. Fees are set on a sliding scale and no one is refused service because of an inability to pay.

In 1982, the Keene office provided services to 1871 people. Twenty-eight Marlow residents used our services including 5 people under 18; 22 between the ages of 18-64, and one person over 64 years of age. The type of problems they sought help for included:

Adjustment problem	52%
Behavior Disorder of Childhood or adolescence	5%
Alcoholism	3%
Anxiety or Depression	9%
Long Term Personality Problems	9%
Psychosis	11%
Other	11%

In 1982, many new programs were started. Amongst these were a group for sexually abused teenage girls, an educational program about aging for older people and their families, a three evening workshop for single parents and participation in drug and alcohol programs in several area high schools. We continued our work with many community organizations including the Juvenile Conference Committee, the Child Abuse Task Force and area Nursing Homes. Our ongoing groups for teenage parents, handicapped adults, Vietnam veterans and parents of young children have continued to be well utilized. In 1983, we expect to be able to continue providing our full range of services and to develop new programs which can better serve the mental health needs of local residents.
