

INAUGURAL ADDRESS

BY MAYOR OSWALD S. MAYNARD

Nashua, N. H., January 1, 1946.

Reverend Father, Members of the City Government, Ladies and Gentlemen:

It is not my intention to impress you with flights of oratorical fancy. I have neither the ability to do so nor the desire to repeat to you today, the history of the hardships we have endured during the war. Others have told you and told you well about the heroic actions of our sons and daughters over the far-flung battlefronts of the world, and the privations of those who remained behind to work for and sustain their fighting brothers and sisters.

I have been elected to the highest office of this City with a handsome majority and in being so honored I have construed the vote of the citizens of Nashua not only a vote of confidence but one of approval of my past actions and one of gratitude for the good I have been able to do for Nashua and its citizens. The honor does not only reflect upon me but it reflects also on many of you here who have co-operated with me in the past and who in the past have helped me to bring about the results so pleasing to the citizens of our City that they have given us a new mandate for further office in their service.

Therefore, I shall not keep you long from your hearths and your loved ones on this day when families love to gather to thank God for the favors of the closing year and to implore his graces for the months to come.

I have collected a few thoughts and ideas since November the sixth last, some of them have been given me by citizens of our fair City, others have come from the heads and members of our City Boards and Commissions, and still others from our predecessors in office. These thoughts, these ideas, make up the subjects which I wish to discuss before you here today.

You may catch in my words a glimpse of my aims, my plans, and my ambitions for the City which has made me its Mayor and if you do, I beg you not to consider them orders, nor even directives but rather to look upon them as a beacon which will illuminate your path and mine on the road to a good, economical and fruitful administration for our Municipality.

There is no set rule of conduct by which we can anticipate in every detail what the needs of a city will be in a coming year. There is no way of determining exactly to the penny or even to the dollar what that city's income will be for that same future period. Therefore, when planning our future course we must endeavor to allow for emergencies not anticipated and we must find some way to compensate for disappointments in expected revenue when they occur.

With these thoughts in mind, I wish to pass briefly over certain expectations in our City Departments for the coming fiscal year as they have been expressed to me by those who will be in charge during that period.

Customarily, when a tenant moves into an apartment vacated by another, he finds that a lot of housecleaning is needed before that apartment becomes clean and inhabitable again. But I do not find that is so in our case here today. It is with great pride and pleasure that I tell you now that I find this City in a very healthy condition as I begin my administration. It is sound financially; all departments have been administered and managed with ability and discretion; and the City's equipment and properties have been well chosen, are of good quality, superbly cared for, in good condition, and well-housed. In only one quarter have I found something wanting and I refer now to the morale of a certain number of the City's employees.

Due to certain conditions, most of them beyond our control, such as the high cost of living, reconversion, post-war scarcities and uncertainties, there exists a feeling of dissatisfaction and insecurity amongst the City's workers. There is amongst them a lack of loyalty and respect for their superiors which I find is probably due to the fact that they are not quite sure to whom they owe loyalty and respect. As an answer to this and as a probable cure for it, I have the following to offer:

First, the extra weekly moneys allowed them over and above their wages and until now called "bonus money" we intend to make and call hereafter a regular and permanent raise in salary and wages.

Second, we are urging and recommending that the heads of all Commissions and Departments confer with the employees in their respective departments, or their union representatives about wages, conditions of employment, and obtain contracts from them satisfactory to and binding upon both the City and said employees and servants.

Third, I intend to restore to each Department and Commission and to the heads thereof complete independence of action as far as that is consistent with our City Charter so that they, the heads of Departments and Commissions, may perform freely and according to their respective abilities the duties of office to which they have been elected or named or appointed without interference from outside powers assuming rights they do not possess under our democratic way of life. By doing so I intend to remove, for the employees of the City of Nashua, the dilemma of serving two masters and trying to please them both. They will know who their masters are, they will know who has authority, and knowing this, they will be loyal to those superiors and they will respect that authority.

The citizens of Nashua, as taxpayers, upon whom heavy levies have been and will be imposed to defray the cost of administering this City and maintaining its properties, will demand in return to be given services adequate to protect them and sufficient to allow them all and equally happiness and freedom in their everyday actions as must be expected in our American way of life. To give these services adequately, some of our Departments will need new equipment, and still other Departments will require additional manpower. For instance, the Board of Public Works will need more men especially if certain projects to be hereinafter mentioned become realities.

The Fire Department will need a few extra men if the recent conflagration on High Street is any indicative. Our School Department, of which we are justly proud, has already begun readjustments in its personnel due to the return of several members of its staffs from their World War II experiences. The Park and Recreation Commission will have to expand its activities if it is to meet the just requests of our returning veterans for more facilities in the matter of sports and clean recreation.

Demands will be made on other Departments, new demands under new conditions, all the way down the line. We, all of us who have been entrusted with the management of the City's affairs, will have to meet those demands. It will take teamwork and with your co-operation we will have teamwork. I promise you that each and every one of you will have my blessing and my help as long as you will show me that you are working with and doing your best in that team. If we do this, ladies and gentlemen, we will get one hundred pennies' worth for each and every dollar of municipal moneys we shall spend. The City's expenses for the coming year will be higher but the City's income from all indications will remain the same. Therefore, we, the City Fathers, will have to work all the harder to keep the tax rate down and the efficiency of our administration up.

We have another duty to perform; we must redeem all the promises which have been made to our returning veterans both by ourselves and our predecessors. We must give them their just share and their just place, not only in industrial, manufacturing and mercantile fields, but also in the management of their City, County and State Affairs. To this end we will do everything in our power. We invite the veterans to visit with us, expose their problems and ambitions to us, that they may help us to help them not only to resume their rightful place amongst us, but also assume their just share of responsibilities in the management of our affairs. As a first step in this direction, it is my intention to appoint two air-pilot veterans to the Airport Commission in addition to the three members of that Commission as it is now constituted.

The last matter I wish to mention before closing is that of unfinished business. I refer now to the widening of that section of Main Street near the bridge; to the realignment of certain thoroughfares west of Main Street and north of Factory Street; to the erection of an incinerator. These are serious problems and they will require time and serious study if they are to be completed efficiently. I cannot promise you when or how these projects will be completed. I can promise you that they will receive our constant and total attention until they are so completed.

Such are our problems for the coming year. And such as they are, with the aid and assistance of God and the co-operation of all the citizens, we shall tackle them with honesty and determination and solve them to the best of our abilities. And now as I close, to you present and to the citizens of our City, may I say Peace on Earth to all Men of Good Will and a very happy and prosperous New Year to all.

GENTLEMEN:

In accordance with authority granted by you, I have audited the books and accounts of the City of Nashua for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1945. I submit my report thereof with appropriate comment, exhibits and schedules.

Comparative Balance Sheets show the financial condition on December 31, 1945 compared with December 31, 1944. Items shown therein were verified and found as stated. Special attention was given to Uncollected Taxes and to Trust Funds. As in the audit of 1944, it was not found advisable to verify the amount of unpaid property taxes directly with the taxpayers of record, so for 1945 it was agreed to omit direct verification, but notices were mailed out to all property taxpayers whose accounts showed unpaid balances on April 8, 1946. These were prepared by the Tax Collector's clerical staff, but checked with the records by me and mailed under my supervision. Eight notices were returned by the Post Office Department as not deliverable, but no other errors were found.

The assets of the various Trust Funds were verified in detail. Changes in Investments during the year were carefully checked and no unauthorized expenditures were found.

I examined the Surety Bonds of the Tax Collector, City Treasurer, City Clerk, Cashiers and Clerks and found them in order,

- (1) It is hereby affirmed that employees of the City of Nashua, New Hampshire are authorized and empowered to fully and freely associate themselves in organizations of their own choosing for their mutual benefit and advancement.
- (2) All Department Administrative heads of the City of Nashua, New Hampshire shall formulate and establish in their respective Departments or agencies effective machinery whereby grievance, complaints, problems, or suggestions may be presented by said organization and their duly authorized representatives.
- (3) Such organization, whenever formed, shall prohibit any employee from participating in a stoppage of work or in a strike against the City of Nashua, New Hampshire.
- (4) No employee shall be punished, disciplined or discriminated against, nor shall his status, position, salary, advancement, or any other rights be affected in any way by reason of his membership in any such organization, or the lawful activities therein.

(5) The Mayor shall have the right to intervene in any dispute between any such organization and Department of the City, if he deems it desirable or necessary in the interest of the City.

GOVERNING THE GRANTING AND PAYMENT OF MUNICIPAL PENSIONS

BE IT ORDAINED, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of Nashua:

SECTION 1. On or before December 31, 1945 all teachers of the City of Nashua who are eligible and are desirous of securing a pension upon retirement, shall make application, pay the required contributions, and retain membership in the State of New Hampshire Teachers' Retirement Association of which he or she is now qualified to become a member.

SECTION 2. Any teacher of the City of Nashua who retains membership in the State of New Hampshire Teachers' Retirement Association at the time of his or her retirement and whose annual benefits as received therefrom at retirement do not amount to a sum equal to one-half of the basic annual salary for the municipal fiscal year next preceding retirement, shall when annually recommended and approved in accordance with the provisions of present existing pension laws by the respective Boards now having jurisdiction in such matters, receive annually thereafter and if necessary from the City of Nashua a supplemental pension in an amount which when added to the annual benefits as received by him or her from said Retirement System will equal but not exceed one-half of the basic annual salary which he or she received for the municipal fiscal year next preceding retirement, but in no case to exceed a total pension of \$1,000 provided, however, that the provisions of this section shall not apply to teachers whose retirement becomes effective after December 31, 1955.

SECTION 3. All municipal pensions for teachers granted and approved prior to December 31, 1945 and in full force and effect as of that date, shall be continued when approved annually in accordance with the provisions of the present laws governing the granting and payment of the same.

SECTION 4. No application for a pension made in accordance with the provisions of existing local pension acts will be considered or approved if submitted by a teacher of the City of Nashua who is eligible to membership in the State of New Hampshire Teacher's Retirement Association and who neglects to attain membership in said system on or before December 31, 1945.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance shall take effect on its passage and all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent therewith are hereby repealed.

ANNUAL REPORT OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN:

The Board of Fire Commissioners herewith submit its report for the year of 1945.

The Board met on January 1, 1945 and organized by electing S. St. Laurent, Chairman; V. Cote, Purchasing Agent; E. A. Whitney, Clerk.

FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU

Fire Prevention Week was observed by the Department from October 8th through the 14th.

Inspections by the different members of the Department were carried on throughout the year. Also many special inspections were made due to a series of complaints coming to the attention of the Department by citizens who came upon them. The majority of the Merchants and Property Owners were very good in regards to cooperating with the Inspectors and helped to carry out the recommendations left with them. A very small minority was always being complained of for not carrying out the Inspector's recommendations. These were the same ones who at all times over the period of years we have had to cardend with to carry out their end in reducing fire hazards. As a whole the Citizens of Nashua have been very good in helping to eliminate any fire hazard that may occur surrounding them and it is hoped that they will continue along these lines so as to mak the City a better and safer place to live in.

FIRE APPARATUS

During the year a new Aerial Ladder was purchased but as yet it has not been delivered as delivery was expected early in 1946. Continuance of the idea to purchase new apparatus every year should go on so that the oldest apparatus could be gradually eliminated and replaced with modern equipment.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM

The Fire Alarm System is in good working condition and being kept that way at all times. During the year a new piece of cable was laid in conduit from Park Street to the top of Library Hill to replace cable that had become deteriorated. Five new boxes were purchased to replace some of the old boxes which have been in service since the system was first installed. This replacement must continue yearly until all the old boxes have been replaced. Now that the War has ended it will be possible to get more of these boxes than during the years of War.

AUXILIARY FIRE DEPARTMENT

The activities of the Auxiliary Fire Department slackened to a standstill due to V-G and V-J Days which came during the year and the dangers of attack from the enemy became null. We wish to take this time to thank all the Members of this Department who helped to carry on during the years of danger and also protect the City from the ravages of fire when the Regular Department had a large fire to contend with.

DEPARTMENT CHANGES

Inauguration of the Two Platoon System on March 1, 1945 and progressive steps were taken to perfect it. Modern and progressive action continues in the Department.

A Drill-Master was appointed and charged under the Commissioners and the Chief with the instructing, schooling and drilling all department members in modern methods of fire fighting.

Again at this time we wish to extend to the Mayor, the Board of Aldermen, the Board of Public Works, the Board of Police Commissioners and the Members of the Police Department, the many workers of the Red Cross, the employees of the Telephone, Public Service and Gas Companies, the Captains of the Salvation Army and their band of loyal workers, the members of the C. I. O. First Aid Unit and to any and all of the Citizens of Nashaa who have taken an interest and cooperated with our Department to help carry out its duties.

We also wish to commend the officers and member of the Fire Department for the manner in which they have performed their duties and carried on their work during the year.

STREET CLEANING

Our street cleaning program was carried out with hand cleaners and our 1930 Elgin Power Sweeper. We ordered a new power sweeper and it was delivered on December 31st. With two power sweepers we should be able to render better service during 1946.

The snow removal costs increased over 300% over 1944. We have had many severe storms during the year and our facilities for the removal of snow were severely taxed. New plowing units are needed as well as additional trucks for snow removal. Since the start of the war these units have not been available.

STREET MAINTENANCE

We have used about 80,000 gallons of tar during the year. With our asphalt plant closed we have had to rely on cold patch for filling holes. This method is not very satisfactory and we hope to have our plant in operation next year.

Taft Street was graded and tarred after completion of sewer project. Almont, Linwood Streets and the Harris Road were also improved during the year. Due to shortage of workers we contracted with the Highway Department of the State, to tar our Class V Roads.

We purchased an International tractor and mower to be used in cutting brush along the highways. This unit will also be used in plowing snow.

SEWER MAINTENANCE

Ten manholes were built into the sewerage system. Two catch basins were built and surface drains extending across the full width of street were built on Eaton Street under railroad overpass, on Lock Street at corner of Lucier Street and also on Chandler Street near corner of Canal Street.

Thirty-one new house sewer connections were built during the year to service new homes or replace obsolete drainage facilities.

SIGNS

Under the NYA before the war, a federal sponsored program made and installed wooden "Street name" signs all over the City. These signs now need replacing or repainting. We have spent a considerable sum of money doing this and will continue the program next year.

Traffic signs of all sort have also been repaired and repainted, and new ones installed to comply with newly passed ordinances of the Board of Aldermen.

TRAFFIC

At the request of the Traffic Committee of the Board of Aldermen, Concord and Lowell Streets were widened near junction of Main, Amherst, Concord and Lowell Streets. Corners were rounded at "Monument" and traffic lines painted to better control traffic at this point.

HONOR ROLL

An "Honor Roll" was erected on Deschenes Oval at Railroad Square. This comprised a granite monument weighing about fifty tons. This department built the base to hold this granite monument. The base built of cement concrete is forty-three feet long, ten feet wide and six feet deep. The weight would amount to about three hundred tons. Sidewalks leading to monument were built as well as a cross walk on the Oval.

FIRE

During the fire at O'Donnell Block at corner of High and School Streets, the wall on the High Street side fell into the street. This debris had to be cleaned up in order to permit passage of traffic. Work cleaning up was started during Christmas week and will be completed during the first week of the new year.

MAIN STREET WIDENING

Main Street opposite the Montcalm and Woolworth blocks was widened and rebuilt. New sidewalks were built in front of these two new buildings and leading to the old walk in the narrow section of street. New drains were constructed in the widened section and traffic light poles moved. This completes the widening undertaken last year.

We worked on the South End Trunk Line sewer from the first of the year until September and were able to complete the tunnel section of said sewer. This tunnel section which is five hundred and thirty-six feet long was built because the sewer is very deep and in solid ledge. There now remains about five hundred feet of open trench sewer work to complete the trunk line.

SNOW DUMP

We purchased land off Temple Street and adjoining the Nashua River for a snow dump during the winter season. This is an ideal location as it is near the center of the City and beyond the Jackson Mill power station. A temporary ramp has been built to facilitate the dumping of snow.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINATION OF PLUMBERS

To His Honor the Mayor, and Board of Aldermen, City of Nashua, New Hampshire:

GENTLEMEN:

The Board for the Examination of Plumbers respectfully submits its annual report for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1945.

The membership of the Board consisted of Master Plumber, John P. Nash; Journeyman Plumber, Eugene L. Carrier, both of whom have had many years of practical experience and are engaged in the business of plumbing, and Fred L. Clark, City Engineer, who has served on the Board since the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 153 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire in 1928.

The Board was organized as follows:—Eugene L. Carrier as Chairman and Fred L. Clark as Secretary and Plumbing Inspector.

Regular meetings and special sessions, to conduct the required plumbing examinations and pass upon the fitness of applicants for plumbing licenses, were held as frequently as was required.

During the year 1945 there were thirty (30) Master or Employing Plumbers, and forty-nine (49) Journeymen Plumbers licensed by the City through this Board.

The total number of (157) plumbing inspections were made during the year, which shows an increase of about 25% over the previous year.

Owing to the acute shortage in plumbing supplies the rigid enforcement of the regulations became quite a problem, and many installations were made which ordinarily would not be permitted; however it is expected that conditions will gradually improve and it is hoped that the plumbers will continue to cooperate fully so that the health hazards, due to improper fixtures and installations will be avoided.

REPORT OF PARK-RECREATION COMMISSION

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Park-Recreation Commission:

GENTLEMEN:

I submit the following report of our activities in 1945 for your approval.

Although the war ended, we were still handicapped by the

scarcity of equipment and labor.

With assistance from the Board of Public Works, we operated our four skating rinks at Atherton Avenue, Holman Stadium, Marshall Street, and Sandy Pond during January and February, completing a very satisfactory season.

During July and August our five playgrounds and the swimming pool were conducted under the supervision of Director Robert Dion. A young lady attendant was in charge of each playground while the swimming pool was staffed by Supervisor William Sweeney, three life guards and a matron. A Red Cross instructor was also provided through the courtesy of the Kiwanis Club.

All of these centers were well attended, although there was a noticeable absence of older boys and girls due to the fact that so

many were employed.

The septic tank installed when the bathhouse was built in 1924 proved to be inadequate and so poorly located that the water of the pool was contaminated by it. This necessitated the construction of a new tank, much larger and with an adequate disposal field located at a much greater distance from the water. This new tank is of such capacity and so located that in the event of a new and larger bathhouse being erected at some future time, it can still be utilized. Alterations were also made in the bathhouse so that the toilets could be entered without passing through the shower rooms, a change strongly recommended by representatives of the National Recreation Association. The cost of these improvements was \$2,458.00.

The Press box at the Holman Stadium was moved to a more satisfactory location in the rear of the Knights of Columbus bleach-

ers near the 50 yard line.

An attractive electrically operated score board was installed at the north end of the field by the Coca-Cola Company at no cost to this department. This proved a source of great satisfaction to our patrons.

A granite memorial bearing the names of all who were in any branch of the service during World War II was placed on Deschenes Oval by the Honor Roll Committee. This necessitated considerable

changing of grades and reseeding. Two badly decayed trees were also removed and replaced with younger trees from our nursery. Other trees on the oval were trimmed and fertilized.

In spite of the scarcity of new equipment we were able to purchase a three-unit Worthington gang mower which was used to keep play fields at Atherton Avenue, Marshall Street and north of Holman Stadium neatly mowed and available at all times.

A lawn mower grinder, ordered nearly two years previously, but held up by quotas, etc., was delivered shortly after the cessation of hostilities

Recreational Director Dion made a survey of the present and future recreational needs of the City, and submitted a very complete report on the same. Copies were sent to the Mayor, Board of Aldermen, and Planning Board for consideration in connection with a Post-War Development program.

Maintenance of our various properties was carried on as usual.

REPORT OF THE AIRPORT COMMISSION

Nashua, N. H., January 18, 1946.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and Board of Aldermen, City of Nashua, New Hampshire:

GENTLEMEN:

rollowing is the annual report of the Municipal Airport Commission for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1945.

During the past year nearly normal activities were carried on at the airport under the supervision of Acting Manager, Albert E. Hirsch.

The H. & H. Airways, also under his management, conducted ground and flight training courses; also an airplane charter service and licensed repair shop were conducted.

I.t. Claude E. Nichols, Commanding Officer, Nashua Squadron of Civil Air Patrol conducted commercial flight training courses for the benefit of Nashua and Milford students and also C. A. P. students of Ralph French of Tufts College

As has been the constant policy of this commission, the past year saw the adoption of further safety rules and regulations, and these with properly maintained flying equipment account for the absence of any serious accidents at the field; much redit is due the instructors and mechanics for the important job of supervision, which was handled in a most satisfactory manner.

The usual repairs and maintenance to the hangar, the water and heating systems, and the electric wiring at the former Transient Camp were made and the property in general is in good condition. The hangar was repainted and the airmarkings, which were removed during the emergency, were re-painted. The field was completely moved making the entire area safe and usable.

On July 27th, by unanimous vote of the Commission it was voted that the airport be officially designated as "Boire Field" in memory of Ensign Paul A. Boire, United States Navy Flier, who was killed in line of duty at sea, and that fitting and appropriate dedication exercises be conducted at the field to commemorate his sacrifice for his Country.

Ensign Boire was a graduate of Nashua High School in the class of 1939; was attending St. Anselm's College at the time of his enlistment into the service, and received his primary flight training at the Municipal Airport. He was the first Nashua flyer to make the supreme sacrifice for his Country during World War II.

September 9th, the Commission, assisted by the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Red Cross sponsored and conducted fitting and impressive dedication exercises at the field. Members of his immediate family, high ranking Army and Navy Flight Officers, the Clergy, Senator Tobey, Congressman Adams, The Mayor and members of the City Government, members of the State Aeronautic Commission, and his many friends honored the occasion by their presence. To forever perpetuate his memory, a memorial tablet was attached to the northeast corner of the main hangar.

To further increase aviation activities and provide more usable space, the former N. Y. A. garage building was remodeled into a hangar-workshop and a modern heating system was installed in same.

Never was the shortage of hangar space more acute than during the past year with the main hangar so overcrowded that planes had to be tied down outside on the field. It is hoped that this condition can be corrected by the erection of additional hangar facilities, and that ways and means be provided whereby the necessary funds will become available.
