The Community Church of New Boston

REV. HENRY JAMESON, JR., *Minister*

The hardy pioneers who settled New Boston in the early 18th century had an awareness of the need for preaching and other services offered by a church. The subsequent history of the Church follows that of the Town very closely. The Town was incorporated in 1763. In 1766 Town Meeting was first held in the new "Meeting House" near the cemetery; this was also the Presbyterian Meeting House. The First Presbyterian Church may have been organized on September 6, 1768, the date of the installation of Rev. Solomon Moor as the first Minister.

A native of Ireland, Mr. Moor served a fruitful ministry here for thirty-six years. His successor, Rev. Ephraim Putnam Bradford, served for forty years and dedicated a beautiful new meeting house on the hill in 1823. In recent memory Rev. Louis W. Swanson was Minister for thirty-five years. The present minister became twentieth Minister of this Church at his installation in 1955.

A memorial chapel was built near the river in 1875 but was destroyed in the disastrous fire of 1887. The present edifice, "a house so constructed as to embrace a church and vestry," was dedicated in 1888. The addition of a parlor and kitchen with generous financial help from the Mizpah Circle dates from 1897. The parsonage was built in 1892 and has been modernized in recent years.

In 1839 the Town refused to assess and collect taxes to pay the minister; and so the First Presbyterian Society was born. Over the years the Church has received numerous Memorial Gifts, now aggregating over \$31,000. An endowment in memory of Rev. Ephraim Putnam Bradford provides a sizable annual income. The remaining support comes from the generous giving of members and townspeople. The Society has no indebtedness.

For some years there has been only one church in New Boston. The membership, now numbering 144, is open to all believers. The Church endeavors to serve all in the community. It issues the Community Bulletin to everyone; it has an active Sunday School for all the children in town; the building is used for weddings, funerals, talks, meetings, and other occasions of town interest. The ministers have always tried to serve all the people in town and be active in town affairs. To reflect its broad purpose, the official name was changed in 1949 to "The Community Church of New Boston."

The Community Church has the loyalty of many dedicated lay-people. The business affairs are capably governed by the Society with three Assessors. The spiritual problems are the special charge of the Session, consisting of six Elders. The Mizpah Circle has been carrying on its faithful work for many years. A newly formed Women's Guild is taking a responsible place in the Church life. There is an active Westminster Fellowship and a fine Junior Choir. Thus the Community Church of New Boston strives to offer a varied program intended to meet the spiritual needs of all in New Boston.

Forest Fire Report

BE A GOOD CITIZEN — COOPERATE

Smoking and debris burning caused more than 50 percent of the forest fires occurring in the state of New Hampshire in 1955 — 235 fires out of a total of 463 originated from these two sources. Lighted smoking material and matches thrown from moving vehicles along the highway or dropped by fishermen, hunters, hikers, berry and flower pickers accounted for 26 percent; debris burning in the wrong place or at the wrong time by those who failed to heed all pleas for safety or refused to recognize the logical sensible rules and regulations set up under legislative authority governing the use of fire in or near woodlands accounted for more than 24 percent. This is inexcusable.

Everything possible is being done officially to remedy the situation. Since 1909 there has been a statute on our law books which requires everyone to secure written permission from the local forest fire warden before starting a fire in or near woodlands or where fire can be communicated to woodlands, unless the ground is covered with snow. A never ending program of educational work is being carried on by your local warden and state officials to inform the general public both of the value and necessity of securing the required permit for such burning. Much progress has been made, but there are still many who fail or refuse to cooperate. The value of our permit system was definitely proven in this district during the 1955 calendar year. Local wardens issued 1621 permits for debris burning fires. That's a lot of

permits. The records show only 8 permit fires got out of control. This proves several things — while wardens were liberal in the issuance of fire permits, accommodating every applicant so far as possible, they were cautious, following closely directives outlining overall policy governing the issuance of burning permits and thoroughly instructing permit users. The latter, too, fully appreciating their responsibility in using their permits, governed themselves accordingly. Result? Much burning done legally and safe.

But what of the smokers? Despite all the efforts of those officially charged with the responsibility of preventing fires, too many were careless or thoughtless in disposing of smoking material and matches. Why? It is difficult to say. Autos are now equipped with ash trays. Why not use them. The crushing out of a cigar, cigarette and the complete extinguishment of matches before being discarded is an easy chore.

If the costly habits of the careless and indifferent smoker and debris burner could be overcome, more than half of our annual forest fires would be eliminated. Will YOU do YOUR share to bring this about?

REMEMBER

1. Get a written permit from your local warden before starting your debris burning or camp fire. The law requires it.
2. Make certain they are dead out before leaving them.
3. Become a safe smoker by extinguishing smoking material and matches before discarding them.

Finance Committee Report

This Committee has considered each item in the Town and School Budgets and each Article in the Warrants, and has consulted with the departments concerned in order to arrive at the best recommendations possible.

We wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation which we received.

Town Budget — Recommend all items as printed.

TOWN WARRANT ARTICLES

4. Recommend — This appropriation is necessary in order that our town receive monies under the Town Road Aid Act.

5. Recommend — Approved.

6. Recommend — Although the Fire Department has \$2,431.20 in a trust fund, this Committee feels that this fund should not be used at this time, but retained in trust in case some of the present equipment becomes unusable either by accident or otherwise.

We also recommend that the Fire Department consider the purchase of a four-wheel drive Army Surplus truck for the replacement of Fire Truck No. 2.

7. Recommend — If we are to keep our graceful elms on the Town Common in a safe and healthy condition, spraying and pruning are necessary at once.

8. Recommend — Approved.

9. This Committee had very little information regarding this Article; therefore, we do not feel justified in either recommending or not recommending the appropriation.

10. (a) Do Not Recommend — We do not recommend the building of a new road from the Depot to the foot of High Street.

(b) Recommend — We approve the appropriation of \$1,000.00 to repair Depot Bridge. We were assured that with this amount, impregnated lumber can be used throughout and a black-top coating applied to the surface of the bridge. This should last fifteen years with very little maintenance.

We also recommend that Depot Street be made a one-way street (down), that a "No Trucks Allowed" sign be erected where Depot Street and Route 77 join. Heavy trucking at excessive speed has been a big factor in causing the necessity of constant repairs to this bridge.

School Meeting March 19, 1955

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of New Boston, qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District, on the 19th day of March, 1955, at 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Motion by William J. Burger, seconded by Marjorie Bose: I move that "Demeter's Manual of Parliamentary Law & Procedure" be adapted as the rules of procedure of this meeting. — Voted to accept.

Motion by Leon Daniels, seconded by Marjorie Bose: I make a motion to pass over Article No. 7 temporarily. — Motion prevailed.

8. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payments of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriations of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State foundation and fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Motion by William J. Burger, seconded by Donald Byam: Moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$66,384.24 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town and that the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer be set the same as in the current year's budget. — Motion prevailed.

9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of operating a typing course in the High School, or act in relation thereto.

Motion by Marion French, seconded by Ella Daniels: Moved to temporarily lay Article No. 9 on the table. — Motion prevailed.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for classroom furniture purchased during the current school year, such appropriation to provide additional funds for the school year 1954-55.

Motion by William J. Burger, seconded by Logan Dickie: Move to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Class Room furniture purchased during the current school year, such appropriation to provide additional funds for the school year 1954-55. — Motion prevailed.

11. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to meet the expenses of the Building Committees authorized by the district meetings of March 14 and October 16, 1954, such appropriation to provide additional funds for the school year 1954-55.

Motion by F. L. Moss: Moved that the sum of \$397.70 be raised and appropriated to meet the expenses of the Building Committees. — Motion carried that the sum of \$397.70 be raised and appropriated to meet the expenses of the Building.

12. To see if the district will vote to construct and equip an addition to the present elementary school units in such a manner as to provide for not less than two nor more than four additional classrooms, together with other necessary service areas.

Motion by Rheba Locke, seconded by Marjorie A. Bose: I move that the district construct and equip three additional Classrooms with necessary service areas, to the present elementary school units. — Motion did not prevail, voted by ballot.

Total ballots cast 207; Yes 97, No 110.

13. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction of and equipment for new classroom facilities, for architectural and engineering services, and other expenses incident to the project, and in order to furnish such funds, to authorize the issue of the sale of bonds or notes of the School District, therefore under and pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act of 1953 and any other authority thereto enabling.

Moved to pass Article 13 temporarily.

14. To see if the District will vote to acquire the Whipple Dairy Building and land, and convert and equip any part of the same for school purposes, or act in relation thereto.

Motion by F. L. Moss, seconded by Charles French: Moved that the District purchase the Whipple Dairy Property and convert and equip three school classrooms. — Motion prevailed and voted by ballot.

Total ballots cast 208; Yes 121, No 87.

15. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the acquisition, conversion, equipping and furnishing of the Whipple Dairy property for school purposes, and in order to

furnish such funds to authorize the School Board to issue serial bonds or notes in the name of and on the credit of the district for this amount, and to authorize the School Board to determine the details and conditions upon which the bonds or notes shall be issued, including the sale, time, and place of payment, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act of 1953 and any other authority thereto enabling.

Motion by Charles E. French, seconded by F. L. Moss: Moved that the School District raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding \$50,000.00 for the acquisition, conversion, equipping and furnishing of the Whipple Dairy Property for school purposes as voted under Article 14, and in order to furnish such funds, to authorize the School Board to issue serial bonds, or notes in the name of and on the credit of the District for this amount, and to authorize the School Board to determine the details and conditions upon which the bonds and/or notes shall be issued, including the sale, time and place of payment, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act of 1953 and any other authority thereto enabling. — Motion did not prevail, voted by ballot.

Total votes cast 208; Yes 133, No 175 — necessary 139.

Motion by F. L. Moss, seconded by W. J. Burger: Moved that the polls be closed and that we adjourn this meeting until 8:00 P.M. April 2, 1955, in this hall. — Motion prevailed.

Special Meeting of the New Boston School District June 25, 1955

To the Inhabitants of New Boston School District in New Boston, New Hampshire, qualified to vote in District affairs:

Pursuant to a degree of the Superior Court in and for the County of Hillsborough and State of New Hampshire, dated June 7th, 1955, authorizing New Boston School District to hold a special District Meeting. Yo are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said New Boston on the 25th day of June 1955, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, to act upon the Articles set forth in this Warrant:

Art. 1. To authorize the construction and equipment of a new elementary school building.

Summary of Findings and Recommendations

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the New Boston School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1954 and June 30, 1955, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$3,982.33 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriation and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net revenue surplus of \$364.99, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$117.34, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$482.33.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures:

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1955, is included in Exhibit E-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the long term indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1955, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

GENERAL COMMENTS**Current Deficit:**

It is noted that there was a current deficit (excess of current liabilities over total assets) in each of the years 1954 and 1955, as shown by the following statement:

A deficiency appropriation of \$1,397.70 was included in the 1955-1956 budget to partially cover the current deficit.

Report of the Building Committee

At the School District Meeting on June 25, 1955 this committee was elected to work and advise the School Board in the planning and construction of the new elementary school building. The School Board was authorized to borrow, by the issue of serial notes or bonds, the sum of seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000.00) for the construction and equipment of the new building.

The School Board negotiated a bond issue for \$68,800.00 rather than \$70,000.00, because of pending State Legislation, which could effect the borrowing limit of the Town. This Legislation was later enacted and proved that New Boston's borrowing limit is over \$70,000.00.

CONSTRUCTION COSTS AS OF JANUARY 10, 1956

Grading and Drainage

This phase was handled by day labor and included:

- a. Cutting and removing trees and brush from the new site.
- b. Stripping loam from the new site.
- c. Reclaiming old 24" tile pipe from swamp area. This pipe was later used for a new drain line on the Playground.
- d. Constructed two new catch basins and a 24" drain line, approximately 200' long, and a 42" main drain line, approximately 150' long.

Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of New Boston:

I hereby submit my annual report as the Superintendent of Schools in New Boston.

Teaching Staff

We experienced several changes in our teaching staff during the vacation period. Mr. Neal Andrew, who had served so effectively as teacher and principal during the past five years, asked to be released from his contract in order to accept the position as State Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture. Mrs. Elizabeth Straw, teacher of the sixth grade, indicated that she did not desire to return for the current school year.

In filling the above vacancies the School Board elected Mr. John McNamara of Twin Mountain as principal, and Mr. William Powers of Tilton as instructor of Vocational Agriculture, and redistributed the teacher assignments in grades six through twelve.

Enrollments

There was but little change in the total number of pupils in our schools, but the larger groups moving into our Junior and Senior High Schools do present a few problems in class and room assignments. With the completion of the new school, and the transfer of elementary pupils to new quarters, the housing of all grades and classes will be quite adequate, — in fact, it will give us the best facilities that we have ever enjoyed.

The District Warrant

The warrant for the March 1956 meeting, in addition to the customary articles regarding officers and budget, also contains several so-called "special articles." The warrant calls for the appropriation of funds to meet a current deficiency arising from expenses incurred in financing the new school. The actual expense of the entire project, including all grading and drainages, now stands at \$70,255.82. At the postponed meeting in June 1955 the School Board was authorized to issue bonds or notes to the amount of \$70,000. However, rather than experience any difficulty in determining the bond limit of the district, it was decided to issue new notes to the amount of \$68,800. From the above figures it is apparent that the amount of the loan was \$1,455.82 less than the anticipated cost of the building.

Further expenses arose from the refinancing of our existing and new notes, which action necessitated an increased payment for interest, and also for insurance coverage of the new building. It is estimated that a deficiency appropriation of \$2,800 will take care of all of the above items.

The budget contains an additional item under teachers' salaries to provide the services of a "Helping Teacher." With the increasing growth in certain areas, the superintendent is no longer able to devote sufficient time to supervision. The 1953 Session of the General Court authorized the services of "helping teachers" in such Supervisory Unions as warranted the added personnel. The law provides that, with the approval of the State Board of Education, and the adoption of the provision by the several school districts within a Supervisory Union, the State of New Hampshire will contribute \$2,500 toward the salary, the balance to be shared by the districts of the Union.

Supervisory Union No. 19 (composed of Goffstown, Bow, Dunbarton, New Boston and Weare) has approximately doubled in size during the past ten years; the number of teachers increasing from 42 in 1944 to 70 in 1956, and the number of pupils from 985 to some 1700. It is obvious that this increase in numbers of teachers and pupils, together with the added buildings and financial problems, leaves little time for the superintendent to carry on classroom supervision. In considering the problem at the Supervisory Union Meeting in December, it was practically a unanimous feeling that a "helping teacher" could perform the important function of working with our teachers of the elementary level in developing a more effective teaching and educational program. With the State assuming more than 50% of the cost of such a person, the financial demand on any one School District is relatively small in terms of the potential results of the program. For that reason, the item was included in the budget of the Supervisory Union for the coming school year.

1956-57 Budget

The budget for 1956-57 as prepared by the School Board calls for an increase of \$10,000 over the budget approved in March 1955. The principal increases are in Teachers' Salaries, Operation of the New School, Transportation and Bond Service. (Although the new budget provides for salary increments, the main difference is in the amounts actually paid over the budget item for the current year.) The operational costs of our schools has been increased by some \$1,500 to provide necessary heat, light, and janitor service in the new building. Our current transportation costs are \$1,000 in excess of the budget, and the increase also reflects in the new budget. Bond service has increased to the amount of \$3,200 due to the financing of the new building and the refinancing of our previously existing debt.

The School Board, with the cooperation of the Souhegan National Bank of Milford, negotiated a loan of \$83,800, payable \$5,000 on August 15, 1956 and annually until August 15, 1972, at which time the remainder of \$3,800 would become due. The old notes totalling \$15,000 were cancelled, and this amount plus the new loan of \$68,000 were combined in the new notes for \$83,800.

Conclusion

I am certain that the citizens of New Boston, are experiencing a sense of pride in the new building now under construction. As mentioned earlier in this report, the pupils of New Boston will soon have the benefit of excellent school facilities, and it will not longer be necessary to hold classes in the Community House and Town Hall, neither of which is suitable for school housing. We are, however, **grateful to the Playground Association** and the Board of Selectmen for allowing the schools the use of its facilities.

36 Children received chest X-rays. In May, 33 children received their first inoculation of Polio vaccine at the clinic held in Goffstown. Three well child conferences were held during the year. 10 children received their booster shots, 2 children were vaccinated, and one child received three inoculations of triple toxoid. At the present time we have two children under care at the Orthopedic Clinic. One child was seen at the Mental Hygiene Clinic, one at the Speech Clinic, and one at Dr. Kerr's Clinic.

Registration Day was held in May with 15 incoming first graders present.

48 home visits were made during the year and 41 First Aids given.
