# 2008 TOWN WARRANT State of New Hampshire Town of New Ipswich

To the inhabitants of the Town of New Ipswich in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Mascenic Regional High School in New Ipswich on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of February, 2008 at 7:30 o'clock in the evening for the first session (Deliberative Session) of the Annual Town Meeting and you are further notified to meet at the Mascenic Regional High School on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of March, 2008 between 7 o'clock in the forenoon and 7 o'clock in the evening for the second session of the Meeting (polls will be open for voting at the second session) to vote upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose the following necessary town officials for the year ensuing:

Auditor	1 year term
Board of Assessors	3 year term
Cemetery Trustee	3 year term
Fire Chief	. 1 year term
Moderator	2 year term
Selectman (1)	3 year term
Supervisor of the Checklist	6 year term
Tax Collector	3 year term
Town Clerk	3 year term
Trustee of the Trust Funds (1)	3 year term
Planning Board (2)	3 year term
Planning Board (2)	1 year term

ARTICLE 2. Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amount set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session for the purposes set forth therein totaling \$2,319,189. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$2,305,778 which is the same as last year with certain adjustments required by previous action of the town or by law, or, the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Advisory Committee.

ARTICLE 3. Shall the Town vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:38-b, Exemption for Deaf or Severely Hearing Impaired Persons, and to set the exemption from the property tax assessment each year for qualifying persons at \$50,000. To qualify, a person must meet the hearing loss requirements of RSA 72:38-b, II, and must have a net income from all sources, if single not greater than \$22,500, or if married a combined net income not greater than \$30,000, and must not have net assets greater than \$50,000. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Advisory Committee.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty-Eight Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$158,500) to be added to the capital reserve and expendable trust funds created previously as directed below:

Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Advisory Committee.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate One Hundred Eighty-five Thousand Dollars (\$185,000) for the purpose of building a salt shed including site improvement costs, on the land adjacent to the Transfer Station. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Advisory Committee.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Six Thousand Dollars (\$46,000) for the purpose of purchasing a diesel truck with a plow for the Highway Department, using the State of New Hampshire bid program, and to authorize the withdrawal of Forty-Six Thousand dollars (\$46,000) from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established for this purpose. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Advisory Committee. (see amendment made at Deliberative session)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-Nine Thousand Dollars (\$79,000) for the purpose of purchasing an excavator with rubber tires for use by the Highway Department and to fund \$50,000 from the Highway Department Capital Reserve, the balance to be funded through taxation. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen. Recommended by the Finance Advisory Committee.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty-Three Thousand Four Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$123,490) for the purpose of town road maintenance. 

Your trustees have adopted an investment policy. The first objective is safety of principal with the second objective being liquidity of the funds meaning that money should be available as needed by the town. The third objective is income growth. To this end, we have consolidated our investments in Citizens Bank, which offers a special program for community trust funds. This program provides collateralization for the town's funds to provide safety; the funds are readily available and offer a better interest rate than the previous investments.

#### BOARD OF SELECTMEN

2007 once again presented many challenges and opportunities for the Board of Selectmen.

After having been elected by the voters, we welcomed Selectman Richard 'Dutch' Stauffeneker back as selectman after having served the previous vacant position. Your votes have allowed for the board to continue in stride pursuing the goals and objectives that had been developed.

Prior to highlighting the 2007 year, I would like to take the opportunity to recognize Lucy Lemons, our Town Clerk and Municipal Agent, who has decided to retire. For 30 years Lucy has fulfilled the duties of not only the Town Clerk, but also had simultaneously served as the Tax Collector. Lucy began working for the town at the former New Ipswich Electric Light Company and has continued working for the town in her many roles. We wish to thank Lucy for her dedication and service to the town and wish her a well-deserved retirement.

Selectmen worked diligently this year in focusing on improving our town roads, as these are by far the largest issue that we hear about from our residents. The board has developed a 20 year plan that will allow the reconstruction of our currently paved roads. As the first step to achieving this goal, we have put forth a warrant article this year for you the voters to approve, for the reconstruction of approximately two miles of road. This year the highway crew did a tremendous job of rebuilding approximately two miles of the gravel portions of Timbertop and Hubbard Pond Roads, including ditching and installation of culverts for better control of storm water. Gravel materials from the town transfer station property was crushed and processed by an outside vendor, which will provide enough material to rebuild approximately five miles of gravel roads. Our goal is to continue forth on this path.

Several of our town roads were damaged during the April flooding this year. The board worked to retain an engineering firm to design the necessary repairs and a contractor to make the necessary repairs, which have been completed. Seventy-Five percent of these costs will be reimbursed by FEMA, 12.5% by the State and the town is required to cover the balance of the unexpected cost.

Improvements at Memorial Field continued this year with the generous help of volunteers, local businesses and prudent fiscal management of the funds approved by voters last year. The pool house received a new concrete floor slab that was desperately needed for safety and sanitary reasons and we will be having the exterior doors replaced in the spring. The long awaited skateboard park was constructed with volunteer labor and a generous donor provided the skate park equipment. The baseball fields and basketball court have had new chain link fencing installed and the perimeter of the park is in the process of having granite post and wood rail fencing installed.

This year Jonathan Sawyer was hired on a part-time basis to oversee the maintenance of all town owned buildings and to develop a facility maintenance plan so that our buildings and mechanical systems are serviced on a regular basis so as to maximize their efficiency and lifespan.

The former SAU tenant area of building two at the town complex was tested and detected to have mold, which will need to be addressed. Currently the space is vacant. With the installation of the new roof, approved by the voters last year, this has alleviated the source of the problem that allowed the mold growth to generate. Through a generous donation offer from Gemini Electrical, a generator and electrical service upgrade has been installed at building two, which will allow the police department and the town office complex phone system to stay operational during any power outage. Administrator Knowlton coordinated through the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Department for inmate labor to paint the interior of the town office building and the removal of the carpeting. The new carpeting has recently been installed and the town office renovation has been completed.

In June, the town employees voted to disband the collective bargaining unit that had previously been organized in 2004. This was a positive step for both the employees and the town. Our employees should be applauded for their dedication to the town and to their work.

You, the voters, approved the proposed 2007 budget and we ask for your continued trust and support for the proposed 2008 budget that department heads, Finance Advisory Committee, Town Administrator and Selectmen have worked on for several months to minimize the impact, and still provide the services required of our growing community.

In closing, we would like to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to all department heads, town employees, volunteers, board and committee members for their dedication and support to our town.

#### TOWN ADMINISTRATOR

The Town of New Ipswich had another busy year. The voters approved the requested budget of \$2,239,557. With this encouragement the Board of Selectmen moved forward with improvements in much needed areas.

A brochure was developed and mailed to taxpayers early in the year encouraging voters to attend the deliberative session. The flyer explained the facts behind the budget and gave voters the opportunity to read the warrant articles prior to voting day. Selectman Lage enhanced voter information at the deliberative session through a power point presentation.

Clean up day was a huge success. The volunteers who helped pick up litter along the roadside were awarded a grant of 800 daffodils. Mary Fortier strategically placed these bulbs around town; watch for them this spring.

In April the town was hit with a surprise flood causing much damage to the roads. The basement of the town hall flooded creating a challenge for emergency services. Volunteers spent hours vacuuming and cleaning while emergency personnel strategically planned the hours and days ahead. An enormous thank you is due to the Firefighters, Emergency Management Team, Police Department and especially the Highway Department who worked for weeks after the storm repairing the washed out roads.

This year the town is moving toward compliance with GASB 34. This is an accounting standard which the town should have adopted in 2003. GASB 34 requires all government entities to do a full accounting of all capital assets including infrastructure; this will provide an overall financial picture of the entity rather than a year-by-year review. A new three year auditing contract was signed this year with the audit firm of Plodzik & Sanderson.

The Energy Committee was formed this year at the direction of the voters. The committee meets regularly and is working toward their charge of finding ways to save energy throughout the town.

I have a personal thank you to the volunteer firefighters who allowed me to join with them on a live-burn training session in November. They geared me up in those heavy clothes, put me into the site of a  $2^{nd}$  floor fire and gave me a glimpse of the tremendous work they all do to protect the town. Thank you all for the time and talent you offer this town as volunteers.

In early December the Town was awarded a \$100,800 grant to install a sidewalk from Central School to Boynton School on the south side of Route 124. The work should begin in 2008. The grant is designed to find ways to encourage children to walk and ride their bikes to school.

If you the voters continue to support the town, the town can continue to do great things. Thank you for the opportunity to be your Town Administrator

#### BOARD OF ASSESSORS

During 2007 we completed the data collection necessary for a revaluation. We are presently scheduled to complete the revaluation and assign new property values with an effective date of April 1, 2009. This revaluation was originally scheduled to be completed in 2008, but we have found that moving the effective date to 2009, we will save costs associated with certification by the Department of Revenue Administration.

In the 2008 warrant, we have asked for approval of a property tax exemption for low income persons who are deaf. This exemption is equal to the elderly exemption and is terminated when the person becomes eligible for the elderly exemption. In order to qualify, the applicant must provide documentation according to state statute. This will be of minimal cost to the Town, and we ask for your support.

#### EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

The past year was another busy one for the town's Emergency Management Department.

- In March of 2007 approval of the Hazardous Mitigation Plan by FEMA. The board of selectman voted to adopt the plan on March 20, 2007. This document along with our Emergency Operation Plan is required to receive disaster relief and federal grants.
- Work on the All Medical Hazard Emergency Response Plan continues with surrounding communities, the Department of Health and Human Services and the Monadnock Community Hospital. This plan will be completed in 2008.
- In April New Hampshire experienced the third 100-year flood in 18 months. New
  Ipswich was impacted with flooded homes and damage to many roads. Members of the
  New Ipswich CERT responded and assisted Emergency Management by filling sand bags
  and doing traffic control. They also wet vacuumed one of the emergency management
  offices that was flooded. They helped in many ways. Thank You.
- The flood caused damage to our roads with a price tag in excess of \$80,000. As of this report we have received FEMA reimbursement of over \$28,000 with more monies expected. FEMA reimburses 75% of the cost and the State of New Hampshire splits the remaining 25%.
- The New Ipswich Citizen Emergency Response Team has participated in other community events. They have become a valued part of the office of Emergency Management. The state Citizen Corps office has given a trailer to CERT for use to support their mission.

I would like to thank Deputy Director Richard Lehtonen, Communications Officers George Standley and Wil Birch, Animals in Disaster Coordinator Lora dePlante, and Volunteer and Certified Coordinator Patricia Lage, for their hours of dedication and help.

The Emergency Management Office has preparedness information for our citizens available at our office. We drill most Tuesday evenings at 7:30 and invite anyone to stop in. We are in need of volunteers to assist in our mission of being prepared to help our citizens in time of need. Our email address is EmergencyMgmt@TownOfNewlpswich.net

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

2007 has again proved to be an excellent year for the fire department and we have many things to be proud of. Our new tanker arrived at the beginning of summer. With the addition of this truck our department is very well equipped and barring any unusual growth spurts we should not have to purchase any large pieces of equipment for several years.

We continued to grow as three of our Explorers graduated to the regular department Congratulations Mike Wamsley, Tony Reeves and Andrew Cain. We also welcomed Brian Murphy, Tony Annese and Jurg Zwahlen to the department.

Our Explorer program is continuing to grow, as we were able to replace the three that graduated and also added 4 new members bringing our total to ten. This is a tremendous program open to all boys and girls that have finished the eighth grade and are 14 years of age. This summer three members spent a week at the N.H. Fire Academy. This is a 3-year program and when finished members become state certified firefighters.

The members of the department built another addition to the station as the new tanker would not fit. Trucks are built a lot bigger than they were 35 years ago when the building was first constructed.

A major step was taken this year with the creation of the position of Administrative Assistant. Mary Fish, who also happens to be our Inspector, has done an excellent job in this position. This should postpone the hiring of a fulltime chief for several years unless we have unexpected growth.

Members Pete Bergeron and Pete Gedenberg were both promoted to Lieutenant.

For the first time in many years the department was given two buildings to train with and then burn down. This is a tremendous training tool as nothing works like the real thing.

The members of the department continue to train regularly so we can bring you the residents the best possible service when you are in need.

Just as a reminder when in need of a burning permit you can get them from the highway garage Monday-Friday 7:00 am - 3:30 pm and at the fire station on Saturdays mornings from 8:00 am - 10:00 pm. There is no one available on Sundays or holidays so please plan accordingly.

#### FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or <a href="www.des.state.nh.us">www.des.state.nh.us</a> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at <a href="www.nhdfl.org">www.nhdfl.org</a>.

Fire activity was very busy during the spring of the 2007, particularly late April into early May. As the forests and fields greened up in later May the fire danger decreased. However, a very dry late summer created very high fire danger again from August into September, with fire danger reaching very high on Labor Day weekend. Even with the dry conditions, the acreage burned was less than half that of 2006. The largest forest fire during the 2007 season burned approximately 26 acres on the side of Wantastiquet Mountain in Chesterfield during the month of May. Our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wild land fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2007 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. 

#### CEMETERY TRUSTEES

The Cemetery Committee again thanks the townspeople for passing the cemetery budget for 2007. The works done on cemetery maintenance and projects have resulted in numerous comments of appreciation from towns people and visitors to our cemeteries. Without the Town's support for our budget, we would not be able to do the improvements that have been done but there is more work to be done.

In 2007, we had 9 internments, including two WWII veterans and sadly one infant. Burial lot sales totaled ten, primarily in the South Cemetery. Beginning this year, included in the cost of lots, the Sexton will install granite stone corner markers. The Internment and Burial Lot fee schedule remains the same for the new year.

The biggest project this year was the dredging of the Center Cemetery pond, which had been slowly disappearing with the amount of silt that had been accumulating over hundreds of years. The whole pond was dredged and regarded. Banks were shaped and the gate control was replaced. The pond now looks like a pond and should be a better source for water for fire protection and a better environment for the fishing derby.

Again, this year we continued the work to re-level memorial stones in our cemeteries, especially the older memorials that have little or no foundations. This year the focus was in the Center Cemetery west of the pond up to the stonewall before the Balch Memorial Section. A significant amount of work was done in straightening up these memorial stones. All the severe "leaners" were corrected.

For 2007, our cemetery maintenance care budget remained the same as in 2006, and because we varied the mowing schedules for each of the cemeteries, based on the type of grass and soil of each of the cemeteries, we were able to get additional mowing for Center Cemetery including the Balch Memorial Section without an increase in cost. This again resulted in cemeteries having the appearance of a "fresher mowed look" throughout the year.

In reviewing work and projects for 2008, the Cemetery Trustees have acquired contractor bids this fall for several projects. The primary projects planned are for providing fencing along the south and westerly sides of the South Cemetery Section D, tree removal in all cemeteries and brush clearing the section west of the flagpoles in the Center Cemetery.

#### BUILDING INSPECTOR

The year 2007 was not much different than 2006 with the number of building permits issued. There were a total of 101 permits with 36 new homes, 12 condominium units and one 12-unit multi family building. We are in a generally slow period at the end of this year and I think the winter will be very slow due to energy costs and the slowing home sales.

I would like to thank everyone for their cooperation and patience with my department as it continues to evolve and become more efficient. I have added this year the need for additional permits for electric, plumbing, mechanical systems and gas piping. The need to know who is doing this work is a great safety concern and can only be controlled by the permit process.

There is a new code cycle this year and I will be enforcing the NEC 2008 as of July 1<sup>st</sup>. There are also new state laws covering gas piping that will be enforced as of January 2008.

#### PLANNING BOARD

The Planning Board had another busy year beginning with the passage of four land use articles that have helped to clarify our ordinances. A total of 9 subdivision applications, 3 lot line adjustment applications and 2 site plan review applications were processed, and 38 new lots were approved. The Board also bid farewell to Jonathan Sawyer, who completed his term, and we welcomed Bentti Hoiska as a new member. We thank Jonathan for his faithful participation and thoughtful help with resolving many items of concern. During the year we also appointed Jay Lewis to replace Jacqui Rager who was unable to continue.

The town's Master Plan had a new chapter on open space added and the subdivision regulations had the specifications for new streets revised. A special thank you to Jay Lewis who collected much of the necessary design data and assembled it for the Board. The Board also updated the Capital Improvements Program (CIP) completed by the CIP Committee. We thank the entire committee for their work

A final item that we reviewed was the Souhegan River Watershed Plan, which was completed under the guidance of the Nashua Area Regional Planning Commission with the participation of citizens from all the affected towns. We thank New Ipswich resident Kleta Dudley for her efforts on behalf of completing the plan and presenting it to us.

A special thanks goes to our secretary, Joanne Meshna, who does her best to keep us moving forward and focused, and to you the public, for your support of our 2007 land use articles.

The members of the Planning Board often hold divergent views on many issues, but all possess a desire to make New Ipswich, a great place to live, an even better one. Although what may appear as competing views by members of a seven-person board to be a problem, it most often results in a positive outcome with greater acceptance.

We look forward to serving the town in 2008 and welcome new and returning members. We meet on the first and third Wednesday of each month along with some other dates. All our meetings are noticed and we welcome public attendance and comment.

#### ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The New Ipswich Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) works with home and business owners, builders, and land developers to help them achieve their goals while meeting the requirements of the zoning ordinance. The ordinance serves the town's desire to both facilitate and regulate growth, without compromising New Ipswich's rural character, scenic beauty, and fragile historical and environmental resources. This is not always an easy process, although 2007 was a relatively peaceful year in zoning terms. The ZBA approved three special exceptions, one equitable waiver of dimensional requirement, one appeal of an administrative decision, and two variances—both related to wetlands; one variance application is still pending. The revisions to the steep slopes and wetland ordinances, approved by the 2006 Town Meeting, clarified the approval process. After meeting with both the Conservation Commission and the Planning Board to discuss ways to improve communication between the three land use boards, we decided to try to conduct combined site visits for all applications. The ZBA now makes routine site visits before any hearing (unless the issue does not merit one); frequently members of other boards attend these site visits, giving us their valuable insights.

David Cotzin, Wendy Freeman, Greg Hanselman, and Toni Lovell continued as permanent members of the ZBA this year, supplemented by alternate member Suzan Schafer Meiszner. We are operating, however, with a slim margin of alternate members. As members serve out their three-year terms, we need a larger pool of alternates who are essentially members-in-training. Alternates attend meetings regularly, learn the ins and outs of the Zoning Ordinance as well as the procedures of the Board, and become able to step in when a regular member cannot be present. If you are interested in becoming involved as an alternate, please contact any member of the ZBA for more information. This is your chance to find out what is happening in your town and to have an impact on its future at a crucial time in the history of New Ipswich.

Joanne Meshna's excellent service as Secretary to the Board cannot be overestimated. Throughout 2007, she ensured that the workings of the ZBA proceeded smoothly. We are grateful for her expertise in land use matters and for her ability to serve both the Board and the public efficiently and professionally. Small towns with all-volunteer boards are highly dependent on the knowledge and good will of their town employees—we are indeed fortunate to have Joanne in New Ipswich.

The ZBA meets at 7:30 pm on the first Thursday of every month at the Town Office. When necessary and appropriate, the Board schedules additional meetings to meet the needs of applicants. Since additional meetings are unbudgeted, the applicant covers their cost. To make appointments with the ZBA and to get any additional information about New Ipswich's zoning regulations and procedures, please contact Joanne Meshna during regular working hours.

#### RECREATION DEPARTMENT

Bob McArthur resigned as Recreation Director at the end of the year and was replaced by Kathy Perra. Bob, for your service to the town, we thank you.

Mike Conlin finished out the year with an increase in sign ups for the basketball program.

#### POOL.

Also, a permanent pipe was installed to supply water to the pool house. Previously a garden house was delivering the water supply to the pool house. New lifeguard chairs and additional guest chairs have been purchased for use next year at the pool.

#### OLD TOWN HALL COMMITTEE

The Selectmen created the Old Town Hall Committee in 2000. Their task was to determine the potential uses for the building and to explore potential refurbishing options and costs.

Fresh members were appointed this year following the resignation of many of the original committee members. The current members began an aggressive bi-monthly meeting schedule to refocus the committee on its original mission.

The committee held an open house, or to more accurately put it, an open "Town Hall" during the annual Fishing Derby weekend. The committee had learned that many of the people of New Ipswich had never seen the inside of the Old Town Hall. The goal was twofold. First was to hear the thoughts, ideas and concerns of residents before any course of action would be taken. Our second goal was to give residents an opportunity to see the building in its current state.

The building has been at the same location since 1817 and is the only structure in New Ipswich on the National Register of Historical Places. Over time, the building has served as a school, a meetinghouse and even a gym. Although it had gone through some structural changes early in its life, the form that we see today has remained unchanged since pre-Civil War years. The vast majority of feedback from residents suggested that an effort be made to restore the building to its original form as much as possible rather than simply repair it.

The committee received a small grant from the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance this summer to do a historical assessment of the building. The Alliance commissioned architect Daniel V. Scully of Keene who completed his evaluation in September. The report identified many of the historical aspects of the building and contained both short and long term recommendations. Aside from recommendations for dealing with an aging foundation and limited septic/water; the report points towards respecting the integrity of the building in future work. "Death by a Thousand Cuts", the incremental loss of detail and elements, which would result in the loss of the original composition of the building should be avoided.

A warrant article has been put forth asking for the creation of a Heritage Commission in accordance with RSA 673:1 II. This commission would be instrumental in obtaining grants to be used in the restoration of the hall. The next step in the building's future is dependent upon the approval or disapproval of this warrant article. If the warrant article passes, grant funding will become more accessible, allowing restoration efforts to continue. And, should the warrant article fail, the committee's mission will become one of maintaining rather than restoring.

#### POLICE DEPARTMENT

The year 2007 was very productive for the Police Department. Although we have been unable to successfully recruit a sixth officer, adjustments in scheduling and five officers for a full year made the police coverage much better than in previous years. We continue to compete with all other agencies in the State for qualified candidates for open police officer positions. The hiring process is very in depth and the number of potential candidates who make it through the entire process is 1% nationwide.

In 2007, the Police Department added a CAD system. This is a computer aided dispatch program that allows officers to send and receive messages from the police department and to be dispatched to calls via the computer network and not over radio frequencies. Officers are now able to confirm vehicle registrations and check driver licenses from their on board computer terminals.



In 2007 the Police Department responded to 3,286 calls for service and completed 477 Incident Reports. The department made 190 arrests and made 1975 motor vehicle stops and person stops resulting in 1454 written warnings and 591 citations. The Police Department also handled 60 motor vehicle accidents. The department averages 9.00 calls for service per day. The statistics for the department are available on our website, www.nipd.net.

#### CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The purpose of the Conservation Commission is to insure the "proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources of the said city or town" (RSA 36-A). Commission activities are directly related to this purpose. Activities for 2007 are outlined below:

- The Commission collaborated with the Northeast Wilderness Trust and the Town of Rindge in a successful campaign to permanently protect over 1,400 acres of the Hampshire Country School Property.
- The town's Tree Warden (Betsy Thoms) continued being active in planting trees on town property and working with schools to educate the young on the importance of trees.
- During the year Commission members maintained hiking trails located on town conservation land. The hiking trails, provided for the use and enjoyment of the public, require ongoing maintenance such as brush cutting, bridge repair and other trail grooming activities.
- The Conservation Commission continued the publication of a series of documents to inform the citizens of New Ipswich about the value of the town's natural resources and the importance of protecting those resources. Each document, known as the "Green Sheet", covers such topics as timber harvesting, stream buffers and wetlands.
- The Commission spent a great deal of time reviewing Wetland Permits and monitoring development activities adjacent to the wetlands. The Commission is very concerned about the impact increased development will have on the town's wetlands. The wetlands are important for wildlife habitat, water storage and flood control. Wetlands are one of the town's most valuable natural resources, and your Commission spends a great deal of time protecting them.
- Members of the Conservation Commission's Easement Monitoring Teams monitored the various conservation lands managed by the Conservation Commission. The purpose of the monitoring is to insure that the conservation values of the lands are not negatively impacted.
- The Conservation Commission sent letters to town boards, offering comments and suggestions on the impact of development on the town's natural resources.
- The Commission is looking for full or part-time members who have an interest in protecting the town's natural resources and are able to give time to various Commission projects. If you are interested, contact the Town Office.
- The State of New Hampshire approved the Commission's application to officially designate Tophet Swamp as a Prime Wetland. Prime Wetland designation provides additional protection for wetlands which the Town of New Ipswich and the State of New Hampshire consider to be of extraordinary value.

- The Commission continued its annual tradition of donating an environmental/conservation book to the New Ipswich Library. This year's book was titled "Deforesting the Earth" by Michael Williams.
- The Conservation Commission continued to work with local Boy Scout Troops on conservation and environmental Eagle Scout projects.
- The Communications Committee redesigned and updated the Commission's web site (http://www.NewlpswichCC.org).
- The Commission erected a plaque at the Geoffer's Trail trailhead to the late Geoff Rhoads who, together with his wife Dixie, generously donated a conservation easement to the Town of New Ipswich.

#### LIBRARY

2007 was a successful year at the New Ipswich Library. We continue to serve patrons from New Ipswich in numerous capacities with an on-going focus on children's titles and popular fiction.

As a result of a long-range planning committee conducted in 2006, a local contractor installed structural cable supports to prevent potential damage from heavy snowfall. The supports are aesthetically pleasing and the library building is structurally safe in the event of heavy snowfall.

Our children's programs continue to flourish. The Summer Reading Program is well attended with over 67 children reading numerous books throughout the summer months. Many children earned prizes for reading the required number of books.

As part of the Summer Reading Program, we hold special programs. For example, we had over 100 adults and children attend a reptile program in the warm days of summer. The library was full of excitement and energy while children and adults interacted with a wide variety of reptiles.

During the school year, the elementary schools in New Ipswich routinely use the library as classes walk from Central School to check out books. During their visits, the children also participate in story hour led by our librarian, Anne Soini.

Every Monday night at 7:00 PM, we hold a bedtime story hour for young children.

At 9:00 AM on Tuesday mornings, we have a mother's group for mothers and their pre-school aged children. Activities include singing, a story, and a craft activity. On special occasions, parents hold parties to celebrate holidays such as Valentine's Day or Easter.

We open up local and state resources for home school children, with a focus on using the NH State Inter-Library Loan program.

To support the needs of our adult patronage, we have an open book club that meets on Wednesday nights at 7:00 PM. The broad selection of books is selected carefully to challenge readers and offer a breadth of ideas for lively discussion.

We also continue as a member of the Hillstown Co-op that lets us participate in regular meetings and an audio/visual exchange. This co-operative agreement supplements our NH State Inter-Library Loan resources.

While our wireless Internet access has not been extensively used, children and adults regularly access the Internet from our public access computer. We are prepared to expand computer access as the needs of our patronage grow.

With the help of a Bill Gates' sponsored grant, we raised money to pay for an upgrade to our computer systems. With the remainder of the grant money, we hope to improve our library automation system, also.

We sincerely thank our library patrons for using the library and we also thank many charitable individuals and organizations such as the Steams Burton Lecture Fund, the Children's Fair, and numerous Friends of the Library for their on-going support.

#### FINANCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Finance Advisory Committee was established in 1995 by a warrant article vote. The purpose is to review and assist in the preparation of the Town Budget. The committee presents its recommendations to the Board of Selectmen. However, the recommendations are not binding. The Committee consists of five members, two appointed by the Moderator, two appointed by the Planning Board, and one appointed by the Board of Selectmen. In 2007 the members were as follows: Jeanne Cunningham, Bentti Hoiska, Mark Hopkins, David Lage and Malcolm "Kim" Rode.

The Committee started meeting in September each Monday until the budget recommendation was complete and presented to the Selectmen on December 18, 2007. As part of its deliberations the Committee had all department heads present their budget requests and answer questions. The Committee reviewed each request line by line including information regarding the 2007 budget, actual expenditures to date, and assumptions for 2008.

After all presentations were made and all requested information was received the committee reviewed each department's budget and arrived at a unanimous recommendation. The original 2008 budget request was \$2,450,048 or 9.4% over the 2007 appropriation. The committee's recommended budget for 2008 is \$2,339,254 or 4.5% over 2007. Through its deliberations the Committee was able to reduce the request almost \$100,000 and still allow the Town to maintain its essential functions.
