

Laurence F. Whittemore, citizen of Pembroke, stroller in the halls of the mighty, wanderer through the by ways of the country, holder of trusted prominence, confidant of presidents, advisor and financial fiduciary, befriended by the great, friend of all who knew him.

I first met him on a back road driving an old model A Ford. I had been hunting and he stopped to check my luck. The land, so well kept in its natural state, I found belonged to him. We talked and he invited me home to see his books and Indian pictures. It wasn't until I had left that I found out that my loquacious interrogater was the head of a great Railroad. This was typical of Whit. He met you on your own ground, talked your language and lived his life on a simple scale. He seldom mentioned his own rise, but spoke of his neighbors in admiration. To him the past was the prologue to the future bright with promise, perhaps this was his success formula. He took what was offered and improved on it, be it a financial problem, diplomatic mission or advising a young neighbor.

This man was equally at home spinning a yarn in the local lodge room, or making his respects to her most Brittanic majesty. His was a power and glory too often neglected in the composition of those who achieve fame. He was himself wherever his station found him. He was plain folks from Pembroke and it didn't take him long to let you know this. He held his life in this town to have been of the utmost importance, and his words are still remembered "This town has prospered because of the spirit of its people. It will continue for that spirit is reborn and renewed in the heart of each child that calls Pembroke home".

This was the tenner of Lincoln's life and the theme he was searching for when he said,"I like to see a man proud of the place he lives in. I like to see a man live so that his place will be proud of him". He found life, took it and held it with his feet planted firmly in Pembroke. He loved his town and respected it. The same was returned. He lived his life wherever the moment found him, always the same, namely, as Whit.

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in the Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after September 1, 1961, on all unpaid poll taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.
- To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in this Town.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:

- (a) The Charles H. Nixon Fund of two hundred (\$200.00) dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Nixon lot in the Buck Street Cemetery.
- 8. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a hydrant in the Sherwood Meadows development, at a location to be determined by the Board of Water Commissioners; and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds therefor. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and funds therefor are included in the Budget).
- 9. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a fire hydrant at the corner of High and Lindy Streets; and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds therefor. (This article is approved by the Budget Committee and funds therefor are included in the Budget).
- 10. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hundred (\$1,200.00) dollars to install a sewer line on Lindy Street, from the end of the existing sewer on that street to the end of the street, a distance of approximately two hundred twenty-five (225') feet. (This article is submitted by the Budget Committee without recommendation).
- 11. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Center Road at or near the entrance to the Doe and Andrews residences to replace one which was removed by the New Hampshire Congregational Christian Conference at the time of its acquisition of the Pembroke Sanatorium, and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds therefor. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee).
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand (\$6,000.00) dollars to rebuild Bricket Hill Road at the junction of that road and Pembroke Street, in accordance with a plan submitted by E. N. Roberts, C. E. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee).

- 13. To see if the Town will vote to widen, straighten and resurface Borough Road and Clough Mill Road. (This article is disapproved by the Budget Committee).
- 14. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or of officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

# Budget Committee Report

In the present period of rising costs, it becomes essential that the Town receive the maximum benefits from its tax dollar, in order to provide necessary services for its citizens and still maintain a stable tax rate. The Budget Committee, as a result of its studies over the past few years believes that an important factor in achieving this result is fiscal planning over a longer period than has been the custom in the past, particularly long range planning with a view to future requirements of the Town. To do this will require additional work on the part of the Budget Committee and will also require a source of greater information from the various departments, better control of the expenditure of funds, and closer cooperation with the Planning Board. To implement this type of fiscal planning the Committee makes the following recommendations.

- All employees of the Town, except those of the Fire Department shall be paid directly by the Town Treasurer by means of regular Town checks initiated by the Board of Selectmen.
- 2. No employee, or official of the Town, either elected or appointed, shall buy, rent for use by the Town, sell or rent to others, any equipment or material without first having obtained written authorization from the Board of Selectmen.

- 3. All gasoline used in Town owned or operated vehicles, or equipment, shall be purchased from local retailers under Contracts negotiated by the Board of Selectmen, on the basis of competitive bidding.
- 4. Every Department head shall keep a current Inventory of all material and equipment owned by the Town, and used by his Department, and file a copy of said Inventory semi-annually-with the Board of Selectmen.
- 5. Every Department head shall file with the Board of Selectmen, a detailed monthly statement of income and expenses of his Department. This statement should show a separate break-down of the cost of operation of each piece of Town owned equipment used by his Department, together with the number of hours each piece of equipment is operated.
- 6. All requests to the Budget Committee for funds for new construction, major repairs or reconstruction of roads, side walks, sewers or buildings, shall be accompanied by the recommendation of the Planning Board.
- 7. Every Department head shall submit to the Budget Committee, in writing, a detailed statement of his Department's fiscal requirements for the ensuing year, including equipment and new construction, on or before December 1st of each year.



#### FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

Once again the Pembroke Fire Department has led the way not only in the valley but in the State. It is with just pride that we announce that this department has established the first permanent fire school in the state.

Starting early last spring the men embarked on a three fold training program. First they had to construct a drill field. Some three acres of land was leveled near the junction of the Suncook and Merrimack rivers for this area. A 60 foot drill tower, oil fire pits and dry hydrant were installed. Twice a week members of the fire department held practice sessions on these training aids. In October after a final working examination the men sponsored their annual demonstration. Winter found them working hard on the books and classroom theory. In January the final exam was administered and five men were promoted to Senior Fire Fighter. With the passing of the snow the men will once more be hard at work on the field and training.

The department's board of engineers has ruled the increase of high value districts within our town. It is our understanding that in the coming months several large housing developments will be started. The citizens must bear in mind that increases of this nature strain the resources of the fire department as well as the water, highway and other town departments.

In the not too distant future the department is going to have to replace its ladder truck of vintage 1934. This vehicle is in need of major repairs. It's condition is such that the repairs will be of but short duration. #### CRUISER REPORT

Last year, through its fund raising campaign, the Police Department acquired a police cruiser. The car is equipped with flashing lights, siren, and bears the Police Department emblem. The cruiser has proved invaluable during the past year in:

- Patrolling the outlying district of the town, thus keeping all businesses and country roads under surveillance.
- Helping the patrolman on duty to quickly answer emergency calls and complaints.
- Keeping in contact with the fire station with its two-way radio and accompanying the fire trucks on fire calls.
- 4. Transferring prisoners to the County Farm.
- 5. Helping motorists with the emergency equipment it carries.

The cruiser has accumulated a mileage of 8088 miles during 1960. At an expense of \$546, this represents a cost of .07¢ per mile to operate. For this low cost, better service and protection are given to all the residents of Pembroke.


First - by setting a good example YOURSELF - being sensible and complying with the necessary laws and regulations governing the use of fire in and near woodlands.

To the School Board of Pembroke:

In submitting my 14th report as Superintendent of Schools in Pembroke, may I express my thanks and appreciation for the kindnesses received from board and staff members and citizens with whom I have been associated since the fall of 1947.

Since that time the school population has increased many times requiring the expansion of the school plant twice in order to meet the surging enrollments.

Again we come to the point where we must expand for the third time or build a new school.

Up to January 1, 1961, 501 children had been enrolled in the school, with not more than 34 and not less than 24 in each of the rooms. The smallest class in the school is the seventh grade with 48 pupils, while the largest is fourth with 69 pupils. On the basis of past experience, the estimates show that nearly 75 pupils will be enrolled in Grade 1 for next year, with a grand total of between 25 and 35. This means that some provision must be made for housing the increase.

We now have 16 full time teachers with a supervising principal, and, as this report is written, we shall probably need at least three replacements and one additional teacher.

Every year we have come to expect an increase in the budget, although more in some years than in others, and even though we do not like it, we have come to learn that it must be faced. In the 1961-62 budget the situation is the same. There is only one underlying answer--children. This has been true over a great many years. It is inevitable, it is progress. Many parents now living in Pembroke or who have nigrated from other towns and cities remember when there were eight grades in one room, then two grades, and even one grade. In fact, in our school today we need two rooms for one grade. They can remember, also, when the transportation to and from school was made on foot, regardless of distance. In those days there were no required courses or required certificates for teachers and this was true all over New England.

Times have changed, living has changed, conditions have changed. It follows, then, that schools have changed to meet these living conditions. Then, too, we have more children being educated.

So as this increase in school population develops we find that nearly 80% of all the taxes raised in the town goes for the operation of the schools. And the two items which absorb the lion's share are teachers' salaries and tuition. If you would check the budget for 1961–62 you will find that these items form 72% of the entire amount. Add to this amount retirement – \$6400; debt and interest – \$21,000; fuel and related costs – \$8800; books and supplies – \$5000; and other administrative and miscellaneous items. It is not too difficult to understand the enormous costs for education.

About a year ago the district meeting instructed the School Board to make a study of the building needs of the school, including the possibility of a Co-operative School District formed by Allenstown, Hooksett, and Pembroke on the seven through twelve-grade level. Later in the year a committee consisting of board members and laymen of the three towns was appointed and met to discuss and formulate plans for a new Junior High School which would serve the districts involved. Considerable time and energy has been exerted to bring a report to each of the District Meetings in March 1961. In making this study architects and members of the State Department of Education have contributed to the work.

There is very little doubt as to the need of some plan involving the construction of a building to house the growth of the schools in the area. A cooperative plan would release grades 7 - 8 - 9 from their present buildings in the three districts and give to these children a more complete and comprehensive education. According to Dr. James B. Conant, President Emeritus of Harvard, the Junior High School has a very definite place in American Education today, if we are to meet the problems of the century. It would seem then, that with the rapid growth of our understanding of the universe, the need for music, art, and the crafts, and the nature and preparation of the children of Junior High School age, we owe to the children of these communities a better and more complete education at this age level.

However, there is a possibility that a majority of the citizens do not desire to be associated with such a plan. This is their right in a democracy. Nevertheless, every voter is urged to weigh the merits of the cooperative plan carefully and intelligently before making a final decision.

Whether or not you decide to build the Junior High School does not alter the fact that as the town expands so do the number of residents and the size of the families. It will follow, also, that people will be attracted to the area in greater numbers when and if the schools offer the kind of education which meets their needs.

In the year of my association with the members of the various school boards, I consider it my good fortune to be able to say that with few exceptions, all have been interested in the education of the children of the town. Not only has it been a privilege to serve you and your children for the past 14 years, but a great pleasure.

Dear Mr. Cofran:

I am pleased to report that we have a very fine staff of teachers in Pembroke Academy and a group that works well together for the interests of each student. Our new teachers have excellent backgrounds in their fields of teaching.

Some of our teachers attended summer schools and took extension courses.

I was especially pleased to have Mrs. Elizabeth Stimpson return to us after a year and a summer at Boston College studying mathematics.

I hope we can keep our well equipped teachers with us for many years.

#### Enrollment

Our enrollment increased this year from 287 to 327. The schools from which our students come now have enrollments as follows:

From these figures I would guess that while we may enroll 370 we will level off at about 346 or about 40 more pupils than we have this year. Nevertheless we need desk space, rooms, teachers, books and supplies for the 370. Plans for their accommodation should be made now.

Our plans may change: so much depends on what the towns of Allenstown, Hooksett and Pembroke do about a Junior High School. If they build, our freshmen class would practically disappear and our enrollment would be about 125 less. (Epsom may continue to send 9th grades to Pembroke). However it seems that if they build, we would still have this next year to provide for before their building would be ready.

In caring for our increase this year we provided a new home room and lockers to accommodate 30 students. Something along this line will have to be done for next year.

#### Improvements

Through the National Education Defense Act we were able to purchase much equipment and books for Science, mathematics, and Foreign Language. We are now using our language records in the teaching of French. We will continue to teach 3 years of French and two years of Latin.

Mr. John Farnum completed the changing of all cafeteria tables so that now we have all tables with new tops, edges and aluminum legs.

Each summer the gymnasium floor is completely redone so that we continue to have a beautiful surface.

Many rooms and corridors were repainted this last summer so that the building was in good condition for Fall.

It has been hard to heat the north rooms during this extremely cold January. Storm windows would help greatly in heating and in conserving oil.

Three teachers desks and chairs have been obtained from New Hampshire Distributing Agency and are being refinished in our shops.

#### Scholarship

It is our purpose to help each child attain the maximum education of which he is capable. We have divided our classes so that we have homogeneous groups whenever possible. We teach superior pupils through extra courses and assignments and individually where we can.

We test the whole school with the High School Essentials Content Battery each year so as te have an objective measure of the growth of each child in English, Social Studies, Mathematics and Science. This is the second year we have used the battery.

We also test all Freshmen for interests, clerical and manual dexterity, and intelligence.

The Sophomores take the State test given in all schools in the state. All scores are discussed by the guidance teachers with the students. All test scores may be discussed with parents if they should care to visit school.

After the first quarter marks an Open House was held at which time parents were invited to visit with our teachers and discuss the progress being made by their children. A large number visited that evening.

#### Athletics

Athletics are an important part in the life of every secondary school. We maintain varsity teams and schedules in Soccer, Basketball and Baseball. In all three sports we have maintained good representatives of Pembroke Academy in sportsmanship and ability.

Our baseball teams should have a level field on which to play. Our soccer team has an excellent field which we use through the generosity of Mr. Nate Kling.

Our athletic program is entirely financed through student dues, gate receipts, dances, candy sales and other money raising activities.

Mr. Peter Kaligian took over the basketball coaching from Mr. Redmond Carroll who carried them successfully for many years. Mr. Kaligian has maintained a large squad and besides a good varsity team this year has a strong potential in the junior varsity and reserves.

We were pleased to have a local group form a booster's club for athletics and give a banquet to the athletes in recognition of their activities.

#### Student Activities

Student participation in school affairs is conducted through the Student Council. Each home room has a representative and the Council meets every week if business warrants it. The Student Council also conducts the Carnival Week. Mr. Frank Hounsell is the advisor.

The Future Teachers of America is composed of students desiring to learn more about becoming a teacher and is advised by Mr. Francis Davis.

The National Honor Society is an elective organization composed of students who can pass the hurdles of good scholarship, character and leadership. Mrs. Elizabeth Stimpson is the advisor. They recently visited Brandeis College. One of the objectives is to help members decide on what college to attend.

The Dramatics Club is our largest group and is composed of student enjoying play productions. They put on a 3 act play in the Fall and Spring and a one act play at Christmas. They have plans to enter the One Act Play Contest. Mrs. Elizabeth Morrill is the advisor.

The Senior Year Book, the Academian, is produced by an Editorial Board of seniors and is under the guidance of Mrs. Hazel Hounsell, Last Years' Academian won a second place in National Competition in our class school.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WATER COMMISSIONERS

During the past year the following main extensions were installed:

A four inch Cast Iron Cement lined water main was installed on Whitten Street in Allenstown. The amount of eight hundred ten linear feet (810') was used on this project.

On Notre Dame Avenue thirty six linear feet (36') of 6" Cast Iron Cement lined main was installed.

A total of three hundred twenty six linear feet (326') of 6" Cast Iron Cement lined main was put into service at the John Dycus project in Allenstown. Part payment of this installation is being made by the developer, Mr. Dycus. Pembroke Boats Co., Inc., required an eight inch (8") Cast Iron main due to the new factory being built. This plant is being erected in Allenstown on route #28. The main line was needed mainly for fire protection, and the owners of the new factory had to pay the cost of this main line. The water department's cost consisted of the labor and materials needed for the tapping of the main line on River Road.

Several other short main extensions were made on various streets for new services.

Two new hydrants were installed to replace unserviceable ones located at corners of Glass and Turnpike Streets. Also at corners of Turnpike and Millard Streets. The new hydrants are of modern streamer type.

During the past year the painting of hydrants was started and is expected to be completed during the summer months.
