THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rindge in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Rindge on Tuesday, the 9th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear and act upon the reports of the selectmen, overseer of the poor, town treasurer, town clerk, and reports of all agents, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and act in any way relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will accept State Aid on Class 5 roads known as "Town Road Aid" raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$811.87, the State to contribute \$3,247.47.
5. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
6. To see what method the town will adopt to collect taxes.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$104.00 to the Monadnock Region in Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.
8. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

Mrs. Henry M. Hale, Library Trustee 1939-1943

It is with a deep sense of loss that we record the passing of this highly esteemed co-worker. Mrs. Hale has served the Town as library trustee for four years, having been most conscientious and attentive to the library welfare. Her goal has always been to maintain the best service possible with a maximum of efficiency. In grateful appreciation for her loyal services and for the privilege of having been associated with her in this work, we have caused this memoriam to be spread on the records of our library.

INGALLS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

The trustees are glad to report another successful year of library service, with no interruptions to the even tenure with which the literary and educational work moves along, as well as the routine duties of caring for the library properties and equipment. There have been no major repairs or changes in administration.

Friends have again remembered our institution during the year with gifts. Mrs. Brummer has presented us with a large antique hat basket for the museum; Mrs. Nellie Holman has given an oil painting of Monadnock; and Mrs. Gertrude Sawtelle copies of two newspapers printed in Rindge, one the "St. Nicholas" dated Dec. 10, 1875 and the other Dec. 25, 1876. Mrs. Arthur Allen, Mrs. Everard Upjohn, Mr. Shurcliff, Miss Susan Doran have sent books both new and used, and one friend has given two magazine subscriptions. For all of these remembrances we are grateful.

The final payment of the legacy to the Rindge libraries from the estate of Mary L. Ware has been received and we again voice our gratitude for her financial help, the benefits of which will be enjoyed for many years to come.

The local report room which was established in the basement during 1941, is still equipped and used for all air raid alarm activities but due to fuel and electricity conservation, the daily "check ups" are received in the homes and the "Center" is not manned. The local rationing board seem to find the report room an excellent location in which to convene. The exigencies of the defense program have recently brought to the trustees a request for permission to use one of the reading rooms as headquarters for the First Aid unit in Rindge. This having been granted with certain restrictions, the necessary equipment has been moved in, which includes medical supplies and two beds. This is strictly for emergency work in connection with war relief activities.

We have at the present time a fine group of young readers in our schools, who are making good use of the library, as evidenced by the proportionately large circulation of juvenile books. It is a pleasure to work with the boys and girls with their fresh enthusiasm and a gratification that we have such a good supply of juvenile books to place at their disposal. Our own collection is supplemented three or four times a year by an installment of books, loaned by the Public Library Commission at Concord, which helps considerably in view of our small allotment of funds for new books. As to adult readers, we had a larger number from our summer visitors this past season, which made up for the smaller circulation among our town adults who are so busy with extra duties imposed by war conditions.

I would like to call attention to the variety of literature available at the library, covering many phases of war activities, defense procedure, also Federal reports on all sorts of home activities from preparing nutritional meals to the making of air-raid shelters.

A second Victory Campaign for books for the service men is under way and all contributions for our share in this project will be gladly received at the library and sent to the proper distributing points.

It is also my desire to express in this report, my deep appreciation for the whole-hearted support in all that concerned the library, of our trustee who has so recently passed from among us. Her alertness to the values and possibilities of library service was a continued source of encouragement; her time and counsel in solving library problems were ever freely given. For such service as hers we are truly grateful.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I submit my twenty-fifth annual report, it being the thirty-ninth in the series under union supervision.

The enrollment of the Rindge Schools for the first term of the present school year was 70 with an average membership of 66.84. For the school year 1941-42, the enrollment was 77, with an average membership of 66.61.

All four of the teachers for 1941-42 declined their elections for the present school year in order to accept positions elsewhere. It was then decided that with a small enrollment in the East Rindge School, and a scarcity of teachers, that it would be economy to temporarily close the East Rindge School and transport the first six grades to Rindge Center, thus eliminating one teacher.

For the Rindge Grammar School, Miss Esther Perry, a graduate of Keene Teachers' College with experience of one year in Milan and one in the Antrim Junior High School was chosen. In view of the larger enrollment in the Primary school, the sixth grade was added to the Grammar School for this year.

For the position in the Center Primary, a candidate from Fitchburg Teachers' College was elected and for West Rindge, one from Keene Teachers' College. The new teacher at the Center was unable to continue her work after the first week and Mrs. Louise Belletete of East Jaffrey, a graduate of the Keene Teachers' College with several years of experience in the lower and intermediate grades was called in as a substitute and her job made permanent.

The situation in West Rindge being quite unsatisfactory, the teacher in that school was released at the end of the eighth week and Mrs. Mary Fitzgerald of Peterborough was elected for the rest of the school year. Mrs. Fitzgerald is also a graduate of the Keene Teachers' College and served her first two years in East Rindge, later in the primary school at East Jaffrey and for several years was principal of the Central School in Peterborough. Her experience and ability have done much to improve the situation which existed when she took the school in West Rindge. Mrs. Stebbins has continued her work as Supervisor of Music and Mrs. Helen Towne, her work as School Nurse.

The Teachers' Association, which was scheduled for Manchester in October postponed their meeting, but a Regional Association Meeting was held in Keene on Friday, November 20th which was attended by all teachers in this section.

As was the case during the last year, the schools were again called on to take charge of the rationing program for fuel oil in October, and for canned goods in February.

We are again facing a teacher shortage throughout the country, and in order to secure added results, school officials should act early and offer salaries that will attract teachers of ability and experience.

I wish to express my appreciation of the support given during the past year by the School Board, teachers, pupils and parents.
