### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

While many thought that 2002 would be a year of economic turn around in the United States, the year ended with higher unemployment rates, lower stock market prices, and lower short term interest rates on bank CD's and treasury bills. At the state level, the real estate boom has brought higher home prices and rents that are reflected in a housing shortage and rising property tax bills.

The summer and fall drought has been followed by the deep snow of January in 2003. The record cold weather and deep snow of January 2003 has increased skepticism in the Highway Department about the "global warming" theory, as employees battle to open the streets and respond to citizen complaints about unplowed sidewalks on streets leading to the grade school.

The current down turns in the national economy, the stock market slide, terrorism threats, war in the Middle East, abnormal weather patterns and the State school funding crisis are major factors contributing to the risk and uncertainty facing Rollinsford's government during the coming year.

The proposed 2003 Municipal Budget is basically another hold the line effort. As part of continued efforts from recent years, the budget calls for \$2000 salary increases for police officers. A somewhat larger salary increase for the Road Agent reflects additional maintenance responsibilities given to this position. Half-time employees are scheduled to receive a \$1,000 salary increase and part-time employees will receive a 4 percent salary increase. The budget calls for \$18,000 to fund the first year of a three-year project to reevaluate real estate property in town as mandated by the state. The proposed revaluation project involves measuring and listing 1/2 of properties in 2003 and the other half in 2004. Then, the actual setting of new property values and hearings with property owners will occur in 2005. The overall estimated \$78,000 cost of the revaluation will average \$26,000 each year. Current revaluation expenditures in 2003 and 2004 will be \$18,000 with another \$8,000 placed in a revaluation reserve fund both years for use in the third year.

One-time capital expenditures proposed in the 2003 budget include:

- 1. Purchase of a new one ton 4-wheel drive truck equipped with a snowplow and sander for use on downtown streets and on steep hills around town. The requested amount of \$55,000 would be financed by a withdrawal from the Equipment Reserve Fund. This purchase will have no additional impact on the 2003 tax rate.
- 2. Build a two bay addition to the fire station and replace the 30-year old roof on the existing station and cover existing wood trim with white vinyl. The \$70,000 cost of this project would be financed by a withdrawal from the Fire Station Building Fund. Again, this project will not increase the 2003 tax rate.

Other major on going capital appropriations call for \$50,000 for road projects, \$30,000 for the capital equipment reserves, and \$20,000 added to the Land Reserve Fund.

The Selectmen are pleased to report that the contract work on the Town Hall renovation project has now been completed. The handicapped access entrance that was constructed adjacent to the new municipal parking lot was constructed at a total cost of \$41,707.19. (Foundation and site work by Mick Construction \$14,400; handicapped lift \$14,517; construction and electricity \$12,927.) The Selectmen also settled through mediation our claims against the contractor and architects for the elevator problem, which reduced their charges about \$24,000.

Mick Construction completed the fill and surfacing of the new municipal lot just before the election last November. The town appreciates the overtime that owner Sam Mick spent to get this lot completed before the election. Cost of filling the lot, building a drainage catch basin, installing retaining walls, surfacing, etc. was \$33,645.00.

In January 2003, Howard Hammond began final construction of the unfinished addition to the police station. The contract cost to finish the addition was \$21,927. The work will be completed before the 2003 March town meeting. Currently, approximately \$24,000 will remain in the renovation fund after all current contracts are completed. The Selectmen are considering the addition of 3 doors on the new entrance to better control rain and snow blowing on the entrance steps and elevator area. We are also looking into a leak problem in the Town Hall tower that was not included in the scope of work for the renovation project. After these two add ons are paid for, any remaining funds in the renovation fund will be available for electrical or heating work on the upper level which was not included in the contract for the basement and the first floor.

Elise Brelis is rapidly gaining experience as Rollinsford's new Tax Collector and Deputy Town Clerk. Former Tax Collector Kate Nesman is now working full time for the City of Portsmouth.

The Highway Department has been functioning under the full time direction of Alton Johnson since last August. Al retired from Moore Business after directing maintenance at the Dover plant for many years. Al, a town resident with a strong work ethic, can fix just about anything given a little time. He has already left his imprint at the transfer station. John Hinds, another resident, joined us as the part-time assistant road agent last fall. Both Al and John are rapidly gaining experience as snow movers this winter.

Holly Trice and Jeffrey Eaton can be seen at the transfer station each Saturday working as transfer station attendants. Holly lives in Rollinsford and Jeff comes from South Berwick. Holly and Jeff believe in recycling and encourage all citizens to comply with the transfer station regulations and help keep Rollinsford green by recycling and saving tax payer's greenbacks.

Jonathan Uraskevich joined the police force after previous employment as a certified officer in Milton, NH. Officer Michael Beauchamp also joined the police department as a part-time officer in 2002.

Once again the Selectmen extend their appreciation to all town officials, employees and volunteers who helped make Rollinsford a unique and great community.

# WARRANT FOR ROLLINSFORD TOWN MEETING STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE STRAFFORD, SS MARCH 11, 2003

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ROLLINSFORD COUNTY OF STRAFFORD, STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified that the polls will be open from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Rollinsford Town Hall, on Tuesday, March 11, 2003 to bring in your ballot for the Town Officers to be elected in Article I, and to meet at the Rollinsford Grade School at 9 a.m. on Saturday, March 15, 2003 to act on the budget and other Articles in the Warrant.

#### ARTICLE I

To bring in your ballots for:

One (1) Selectman and Overseer for the Poor for three (3) years.

Town Clerk for one (1) year.

Town Treasurer for one (1) year.

Chief of the Fire Department for one (1) year.

Three (3) members of the Budget Committee for three (3) years.

One (1) member of the Budget Committee for two (2) years.

One (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for three (3) years.

One (1) Trustee of the Library Trust for three (3) years.

One (1) Trustee of the Library Trust for two (2) years.

One (1) Trustee of the Cemetery Trust for three (3) years.

One (1) Supervisor of the Checklist for one (1) year.

#### ARTICLE II

To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

#### **ARTICLE III**

Are you in favor of adopting Town Ordinance 2003-01 to regulate adult entertainment in Rollinsford.

This ordinance will regulate operating hours of adult entertainment, establish an annual license and fee for adult entertainment establishments in Rollinsford, establish attire and behavior standards for performers and employees in adult entertainment establishments, and prescribe unlawful behavior of non-performing persons in adult entertainment establishments. Adult entertainment establishments include: clubs where dancing and adult entertaining occur; mini motion picture displays; massage parlors; and adult book stores. Definitions of prohibited dress and sexual behavior are defined. Penalties for violation and enforcement provisions are included. (Majority vote required)

#### **ARTICLE IV**

To see if the Town will: 1) discontinue the right of way between Beccaris Drive and Stockdale Circle located adjacent to Tax Map lots, 9-13-8, 9-13-9, 9-10-17, and 9-10-15. 2) Authorize the Selectmen to sell the former right of way land to abutting property owners to be joined to existing lots. (Majority vote required).

#### ARTICLE V

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum equal to all revenues in excess of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) that may be received from the Hydro Electric Plant to be placed in the Town's Hydro Electric Fund. (The first \$50,000 or any lesser amount that may be received will be used as offset against Town Budget expenditures). (Majority vote required).

#### ARTICLE VI

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) and withdraw the same from the Land Trust Fund to finance land survey and related expenses that may be incurred in assisting private land owners who donate Conservation Easements and/or participate in the Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) (Majority vote required).

#### **ARTICLE VII**

To see of the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to be added to the Town Equipment Reserve Fund previously established. (Majority vote required).

#### **ARTICLE VIII**

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Fire Station Building Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

#### ARTICLE IX

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for road reconstruction and drainage upgrades. (Majority vote required)

#### ARTICLE X

To see if the Town will appropriate twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the purchase of a new police cruiser that will be delivered in the Spring of 2004. (Majority vote required)

#### ARTICLE XI

To see if the Town will appropriate sixty-five hundred dollars (\$6,500) for recycling equipment at the transfer station (metal roll off containers) (Majority vote required).

#### ARTICLE XII

To see if the Town will appropriate ten thousand four hundred and one dollars (\$10,401) for cemetery capital improvements. (Majority vote required).

#### **ARTICLE XIII**

To see if the Town will appropriate fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000) for a four wheel drive truck with snowplow and sander. (To be financed with money transferred from the equipment fund). (Majority vote required).

#### ARTICLE XIV

To see if the Town will appropriate seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000) to construct a two bay addition to the fire station and to replace the roofing on the existing building and to cover building trim on the fire station with vinyl trim. (This project would be financed with \$70,000 withdrawn from the fire station building fund) (Majority vote required)

#### ARTICLE XV

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Revaluation Trust Fund to be used for partial funding of

revaluation expenses in 2005 and to appropriate eight thousand (\$8,000) for placement in this fund in 2003. (Majority vote required).

#### ARTICLE XVI

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to be added to the Land Trust Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

#### ROLLINSFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT

The construction at the police department continues. Howard Hammond is currently finishing the interior of the addition that was put on the building during the renovation project. We anticipate the completion of all work to the police department sometime this year.

Officer Jonathan Uraskevich joined the department on July 7, 2002, and filled the remaining full time officer's position. Officer Uraskevich had two years experience with the Milton Police Department before coming to Rollinsford. Officer Michael Beauchamp joined the department on July 7, 2002, and filled one of the open part time officer's positions. Officer Beauchamp works with the NH Air National Guard as a security specialist. We currently have two vacant part time positions and anticipate filling them sometime this spring.

With the generosity of the citizens authorization for the substantial pay increase for the patrolman's positions last year, which makes their salaries competitive with other agencies, I believe we have begun the process of ending the revolving door policy of training new officers just to see them move on to other departments.

Our activity seems to increase every year. Calls for police service increased as did all aspects of our activity with one exception; arrests are down from the prior year.

Because more time is spent on responding to and investigating criminal matters, less time is available for routine patrol, traffic enforcement and deterrence, thus resulting in an increase in complaints concerning speeding and reckless driving. We are making every attempt to address these motor vehicle complaints.

I wish to thank the citizens of Rollinsford for your continued support of the department. I would also like to thank the town officials, elected and appointed, members of the Highway and Fire Departments, town committees, and members of the Rollinsford Grade School community for their past and continued support of the Rollinsford Police Department.

On behalf of all the members of the Rollinsford Police Department, I report we are committed to providing the best service possible to the Citizens of Rollinsford.

In the year 2002, the Town took delivery of the new Smeal fire engine replacing the 1970 American LaFrance fire engine. The engine arrived in April and was placed in service in June, after two months of training by the members of the department. The truck carries 1,500 gallons of water and has a pumping capacity of 1,250 gallons of water a minute and carries 5 firefighters.

The staffing continues to be a full strength with all firefighters certified through the State of New Hampshire. Fifteen of the fire fighters are also National Register Emergency Medical Technicians.

In November the department was awarded a \$2,000.00 grant by the state attorney generals office for the purchase of hazardous material decontamination equipment. This equipment consists of a decon portable shower, portable pools and decon suits, gloves and foot protection.

I would like to thank the men and women of the fire department for their long hours and dedication to the Town of Rollinsford. I would also like to thank the residents that have continued to give their support to the fire department in our efforts of raising funds to purchase emergency equipment not obtainable through the budget.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ROLLINSFORD PLANNING BOARD

In calendar year 2002 the Planning Board considered one request to voluntarily merge two parcels, conducted preliminary consults and hearings on two applications for site plan review, Application of Wentworth Greenhouse (Somersworth Road) and Application of Church of Christ (Portland Avenue) and

processed two applications for home businesses (Application of Sandra McCleary and Application of Chris Kraft).

In March 2002 the Planning Board submitted nine proposed amendments to the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance to the town's voters. These amendments were approved and affected the ordinance's definitions of single and multi-dwellings, elderly housing definitions, modified the table of uses pertaining to residential uses, updated the impact fee ordinance, and clarified the town's right previously reserved right to deny applications that constitute "scattered and premature development".

The Board also received grants and budget funding to allow it to update the Town's Capital Improvements Plan. It worked with the Board of Selectmen, various agencies and departments of town government and the Strafford Regional Planning Commission to update the Capital Improvements Plan in order to facilitate the better administration of the town's impact fee ordinance.

The Town received a grant from the Coastal Program to conduct a resource inventory to support the master planning and ordinance development process.

The current members of the Rollinsford Planning Board include Nancy Carmer (Secretary, term expires 2005), Ben Thayer (term expires 2005), Fred Barry (term expires 2003), John Wastrom (term expires 2003), Charles Putnam (Chairman, term expires 2004), Richard Wasson (Vice Chairman, term expires 2004) and Edmund Jansen (ex officio). Michelle Small serves as an alternate member of the Board.

The Rollinsford Planning Board has begun the process for adopting procedural rules to better order its procedures and conflict of interest rules as well as to better define the relationship between board members and the board's business. In addition, the Board is undertaking a review of the Rollinsford Master Plan. The Board welcomes the participation and involvement of townspeople at public hearings and in its regular work. Please contact the chair or the Board of Selectmen if you are interested in participating in the important work of the Planning Board.

#### MANAGEMENT LETTER

#### Gentlemen:

In planning and performing our audit of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Rollinsford for the year ended December 31, 2001, we considered its internal control in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control. However, we noted certain matters involving the internal control and its operation that we consider to be reportable conditions under standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town of Rollinsford's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the general purpose financial statements.

#### Fixed Assets

The Town does not maintain records of general fixed assets such as property and equipment with

a life expectancy exceeding one year. The recording of fixed assets would fulfill the need to provide for physical dollar value control, and establish accountability for general government capital expenditures over the year.

With the recording of fixed assets, the related depreciation could be determined on an annual basis for the purpose of measuring the total cost of government services and evaluating the efficiency of programs. This was recommended in the prior year report.

#### Monthly Journal Entries

The bookkeeper prepares monthly journal entries, adjustments, corrections or reclassification entries. These entries are then posted to the general ledger.

It is recommended that the Selectmen review the monthly entries and sign that the entries were reviewed and approved.

Our consideration of the internal control would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be reportable conditions and accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above. However, none of the reportable conditions described above is believed to be a material weakness.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and the State of New Hampshire, Department of Revenue Administration.

The District is investigating all available grants, but a rate increase is inevitable.

## ROLLINSFORD WATER & SEWER DISTRICT OFFICER'S REPORT 3/26/02

The Rollinsford Water and Sewer District is facing a number of challenges on both the wastewater treatment and water supply sides of the District.

### Wastewater Treatment

The District serves a very small number of users. With only 458 homes, the treatment plant here in Rollinsford is one of the smaller treatment plants in the region. Unlike other towns and cities in the area, the District must sustain itself solely on the user fees collected from homes served by the District as opposed to other towns and cities where wastewater treatment is part of the tax base of the community. In addition, the treatment plant is over 30 years old and is beyond its expected life of use.

Despite these limitations, the District has managed to operate the system effectively with minimal increases in user fees for decades. With increased Federal and State standards for operation, the District is facing increased pressure to upgrade the treatment plant.

Currently, the District has a permit to discharge its treated wastewater into the Salmon Falls River which requires the District to reduce phosphorus and solids. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has mandated that the District invest a significant amount of money in upgrades to the plant to meet new standards by 2004. Despite the fact that the Districts outflow has a barely detectable effect on the water quality of the river, Federal and State standards necessitate these investments.

The proposed improvements are estimated to cost \$1.6 million. Because the District's rates are already higher than the average rates for similar services in other communities, the District is eligible for a grant of up to 30% to defray these costs. After the State grant, the users of the District would have to shoulder a cost of \$1,120,000. And even if this improvement would be the last improvement needed for the treatment plant, that would represent an increase of over \$45.00 per household per quarter (\$180.00 per year)1.

While this improvement would probably not be the last, the District has had to defer other improve-

ments and repairs in order to keep the user rates from increasing dramatically. Collection lines, manholes and other equipment are in need of attention. Like an older car, repairs and improvements cost more.

Now the District must face an expensive improvement ordered by State and Federal regulatory agencies of questionable value while much needed repairs and improvements must be deferred.

The Commissioners of the District are investigating grants to help defray this cost with Federal and State elected officials including Senator Smith, but success for grants is not assured.

Water Supply

After decades of supplying water to the users of the District from its existing wells, the District is examining alternatives because of new regulatory concerns and simple mechanics.

Approximately half of the water supplied to users comes from the Porter Wells located behind the American Legion on Foundry Street. These two wells are "deep rock" wells, more commonly known as artesian wells. Unfortunately, although they are smaller but dependable sources of water, they present a number of problems.

Over the past several years, trace amounts of benzine (known in the language of chemistry as a "volatile organic compound" - VOC) has been detected. Under a moderated pumping schedule, the trace levels have reduced to well below levels that are of concern. Further, when the water from the Porter Wells is blended in the system with water from the Gen. John Sullivan well, the amount of benzine becomes undetectable.

Of equal concern, however, is arsenic. Arsenic is a heavy metal that occurs naturally in the bedrock of the northeast. Since the water from artesian wells has been down there for decades if not centuries, the natural acidity of the water dissolves metals like arsenic into the water. In the past, the levels of arsenic in the water at Porter Wells has been below levels of concern (50 parts per million), but the Federal government recently lowered the acceptable levels to 10 ppm. The Porter Wells do exceed that new level even though, like the trace amounts of benzene, by the time water is blended with water from other sources, the level in user's tap water is below the limit.

The District is investigating a number of alternatives. The first is to install a filtering mechanism at the Porter Wells that removes both the arsenic and any trace amounts of benzene. The installation cost is approximately \$170,000 and has an on-going operational expense of \$10,000 to \$20,000.

Alternatively, the District is exploring an interconnection with South Berwick, Maine. South Berwick has a surplus of water, but has a complex and lengthy approval process for selling water to Rollinsford. Maine, unlike New Hampshire, has that State's Public Utilities Commission to consider as well as the voters of South Berwick's Water District. While an interconnect probably makes good sense if only for emergency purposes (large fire, catastrophic system failure), the cost of the interconnect alone is approximately \$170,000 and the volume of water for consumption of users is still to be determined. While many of the costs are still unknown and the process of establishing an agreement to provide water from South Berwick is long and complicated, many of the problems with water quality would be solved.

Several years ago, the District tried exploring for water in Scoutland. After expending nearly \$75,000, although an acceptable source was found and proven at 50 gallons per minute, the cost to construct the additional infrastructure was over \$200,000. The Commissioners felt that further pursuit of water in Scoutland was not economical.

In addition to these possible costs, the District needs to explore water conservation measures in its own system. Like any older plumbing system, leaks develop, valves don't work as well as expected and sometimes there are big breaks, especially in the Spring when the frost heaves the ground. All distribution systems have leaks, but the District needs to embark on an aggressive course to repair and replace portions of its system that are causing pumped water to be lost underground instead of being delivered to users' homes.

As for water supply, the District feels that the supplies it now has, issues of quality aside, are adequate, even in the face of significantly lowered rain and snow levels. Obviously, if supplies run lower than expected, District users may face appropriate water restrictions such as a ban on irrigation of gardens and lawn and washing of cars.

Putting an exact dollar value on each of these efforts is not easy. Funding it is even harder since the costs must be borne almost exclusively by District Users. As with the Wastewater system, the relatively small number of users means that expensive repairs or changes must be paid by a small number of users. As with the wastewater side of the District, we are exploring grants and low cost loans to help lighten the burden.

The issues facing the District are complex and often not completely in control of the Commissioners or even the voters of the District. New standards for drinking water or wastewater treatment are not formulated locally. Sheer acts of Nature such as a system failure or just old age of equipment cannot be predicted or necessarily prevented, even with the best preventative maintenance program. Voter involvement and assistance is needed now more than ever.

### ROLLINSFORD HISTORICAL COMMITTEE 2002 ANNUAL REPORT

The Rollinsford Historical Committee has been busy again this year with a wide variety of projects consistent with its mission to promote and preserve Rollinsford's unique and important history.

The return of the Col. Paul Wentworth house to Rollinsford has occupied a great deal of the committee's time. At the annual town meeting in March, residents voted to allocate land for the reconstruction of the house on its original lot, and to appropriate \$40,000 (to be raised from donations) to return the house from Dover, MA to Rollinsford. To date the committee has raised over half of this money, with the remainder to be paid back later this year. A variety of public meetings, lectures, field trips, and informational displays were made available to townspeople regarding the house, its importance to the town, and plans for its return. The media have been very interested in this unique project. A number of articles have appeared in local, in-state and Massachusetts newspapers, and New England Cable News aired a spot on the house this past fall.

During the summer months the historical committee, with the help of many volunteers, formed a subcommittee to create the Association for Rollinsford Culture and History (ARCH). The town received a grant from the Partnership for Effective Nonprofit to hire a consultant to assist with this process. ARCH will soon be an independent nonprofit organization, and will eventually take over the project and supervision of the house from the historical committee. The house was successfully dismantled as scheduled during the months of August, September, and October and has been returned to its native soil. In October, the committee received notification that the house, once appropriately restored, will be declared eligible to be elevated to the NH State Register of Historic Places.

In spite of the time devoted to the Wentworth house project, the committee has managed to remain active with its other projects and duties. The committee continued to oversee Salmon Falls Village Park and its maintenance. The park, completed in the fall of 2001, has been well received, and had frequent visitors throughout the spring, summer, and fall.

Providing information and education to the public about Rollinsford history remained a primary focus of the committee. Tours of the Village were once again co-sponsored with the Society for the Protection of New England Antiquities, attracting a wide audience from across New England to see our uniquely preserved mill village. Children learned about Rollinsford's agricultural heritage during the school's Summer Enrichment Program. The committee responded to many requests from across the country for genealogical information related to Rollinsford. It also cooperated with other Town boards, providing historical information for the Hazard Mitigation Plan, and the Historic Resource Survey for the Coastal Zone Management Grant.

This work would not have been possible without the many people who donate their time, talents, materials, and money to support the preservation of Rollinsford's history. The year's many successes are due to these volunteer efforts and the committee wishes to express our thanks on behalf of the town to all who helped. We hope many residents will again participate in our projects and programs in the months ahead. As always, the committee welcomes additional members and volunteers. Anyone interested in joining the historical committee or helping with one of its projects, may contact any committee member for more information.

### **ROLLINSFORD CEMETERY TRUSTEES 2002 REPORT**

The Rollinsford Cemetery Trustees in 2002 worked on several projects in the cemeteries.

The trustees had four dead trees taken down, one in the Old Town Cemetery and three on Roberts Road in front of the New Town Cemetery.

The trustees had 930' of roadway in the New Town Cemetery regraded.

A new steel gate was installed at the Silver St. entrance of the New Town Cemetery. This gate was installed to replace the chain that was being used at the entrance, to close the roadway from through traffic to General John Sullivan Way. The chain was replaced because of possible liabilities.

The trustees had the overgrown hedges along Morton Park cut back. These hedges were overgrowing out onto the cemetery property.

The trustees had some brush cutting and tree trimming done at the Doe Cemetery which is located on Sligo Road.

Along with these projects the trustees had to deal with a broken water line last spring in the New Town Cemetery. These old water lines are very brittle and the trustees feel that we will need to replace them soon.

The Trustees also spent some time uprighting some gravestones that had toppled.

In 2002, 40 graves were sold in New Town Cemetery for a total of \$14,000.00. \$7,000.00 of the grave sales goes into a cemetery trust account, and the other \$7,000.00 goes to the Town general fund.

In 2002, thirteen existing cemetery lots added perpetual care to their lots, which contributed \$7,350.00 to the cemetery trust account.

In 2002 the Town received \$150.00 for winter rental fees of the tomb, located in the Old Town Cemetery.

In 2002 some trees in the cemetery along General John Sullivan Way were damaged by a vehicle and not reported. These trees were replaced by Ed Charpentier at no cost to the Town. Ed also planted a tree in Old Town Cemetery. We would like to thank Ed for his many hours of volunteer work in the cemetery.

The Trustees would also like to thank Denis Drake for the many hours that he volunteered, repairing the broken water line and working on the installation of the gate.

Once again our thanks go out to Beverly Dionne, Kate Nesman and Elise Brellis who work at the Town office and process the necessary paperwork.

The Trustees would also like to thank Ron Brown, Bill Foxlow and Dennis Libby for the many hours they spend working in the cemeteries and especially for their efforts around Memorial Day.

To the voters of the Rollinsford School District:

In October 2002, we began our negotiations with the Rollinsford Teachers Association. We have signed an agreement for a 3-year contract, which the public will be voting on at the March 8th School District meeting. The following pay increases were agreed upon, the first and second year they will receive a 3.25% pay increase and they will pay an additional 1% of their medical health insurance. In the third year they will receive a 3.5% increase in salary and again pay an additional 1% of their health insurance. Under special projects we are proposing to replace carpeting in two annex classrooms, and insulate piping under the gym floor.

Our feasibility study on the grade school was completed in June of 2002. We held a public hearing to give all residents a chance to ask questions and listen to the results. Last year we established a Capital Reserve fund and contributed the first \$25,000.00 of surplus funds to this reserve. Establishing this fund will help us to pay for additions and renovations that will be needed in the next 3 to 5 years.

The school board meetings are held on the third Thursday of each month at the Rollinsford Grade

School and are opened to the public. Again this year, staff members from the Somersworth Middle and High Schools have been alternating months speaking at our School Board meetings. Their presentations are informative and welcomed. Also, at each meeting, we hear from our student representative about the wonderful things the Student Council is doing at the High School. Both school boards continue to work together as a team to bring the districts to new levels of respect, education, understanding and cooperation. I encourage all residents to attend our meetings so you can hear the positive feedback from Somersworth and Rollinsford schools.

In closing, I would like to thank the volunteers that help every day at the grade school, as well as the teachers, principal and support staff at Rollinsford Grade School, Somersworth Middle School and Somersworth High School for giving our children their knowledge, wisdom and support each day. And finally, I would like to thank the SAU56 support staff and the Somersworth School Board. We have come miles together to make the education of our children the very best it can be. I look forward to working with each and every one of you in the future.

### ROLLINSFORD EDUCATION FOUNDATION

The Rollinsford Education Foundation (REF) sponsored one enrichment grant this year. The grant is called "100 Book Club". This grant is an at home program to encourage students and parents to read together. This program is designed to help struggling readers to read more and enjoy reading. Students are encouraged to read 100 books from July 2002 through June 2003 and these books cannot include books assigned to them for school reading. Coordinators were selected and their responsibilities are to keep logs, create listing of local libraries, keep teachers informed of the children's progress, and plan celebrations on a quarterly basis. When a student completes reading 100 books a celebration is planned to include the family members, classroom children and the community to celebrate reading. ### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 2002

To the Residents of Rollinsford:

Due to the overwhelming success of last year's school-wide initiative to impress upon our students the value and importance of manners and other pro-social skills, the monthly assemblies and themes have continued this year. For example, the theme for December was "GIVING" and each class chose a specific cause or charity, set a goal and contributed in some way. One class raised funds in order to donate toys to a local toy bank. Another filled Christmas stockings for children residing in a nearby homeless shelter and still others raised funds for Heifer International to purchase livestock for families living in Third World countries. It was truly rewarding to hear the pride in their voices as the children spoke of their class projects.

Our School Improvement Team has made solid progress over the past year. We have written an overview and profile of the Rollinsford Grade School and have most recently identified possible goals which have been presented to staff for adoption. Meanwhile our staff has been researching Reading Comprehension and related Assessments during monthly early release days which began in January.

The School Improvement Team has reviewed data available as a result of: the State NHEIAP Testing which occurs in 3rd and 6th grades, The California Achievement Testing which is administered to all 5th graders, and other data related to the Annual Parent Opinion Questionnaire. This year on the California Achievement Test administered in November of '02, our entire fifth grade was scored as a group and their results compared to the national norm group. The Median National Percentiles for this group of 28 students indicate that the average student's achievement was highest in Science (74th percentile) and Language Mechanics (68th percentile) and lowest in Spelling (45th percentile). Overall the Total

Battery places our 5th grade group higher than 65% of the students in the National Norm Group.

We continue to be proud of the Volunteer and Community Service Programs which involve both parents and students at our school. We are always looking for new volunteers and would welcome senior members of our community who might be interested in regularly volunteering in one of our classrooms. ## MINUTES OF THE ROLLINSFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 9, 2002 Rollinsford Grade School Rollinsford, NH

Moderator Pro Tempore Charles Putnam called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. The Rollinsford School District Warrant, 2002, in the State of New Hampshire, was read by Mr. Putnam. Mr. Putnam then appointed four persons to be tellers for the meeting. They were Gail Flynn, Charles Dionne, Gary Fieldsend, and Joan Laliberte.

- Article 1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board (Chair \$300, two (2) members at \$250 each), Truant Officer (\$40), Moderator (\$50), District Clerk (\$50), Treasurer (\$400), Supervisor(s) of the Checklist (three (3) at \$15 each) for a total of \$1,385.00. Mr. Dionne made a motion to accept Article 1 as written, and Mr. Connolly seconded. There was no discussion. Voice vote. Motion carried.
- Article 2. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Mrs. Dionne moved to accept Article 2 and to waive the reading of any of the reports. Mr. Jacobson seconded. No discussion. Voice vote. Motion carried.
- Article 3. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Mrs. Clearly moved to accept Article 3 as written, and Mrs. Wasson seconded. There was no discussion. A voice vote carried the motion.
- Article 4. To see if the School District will raise and appropriate \$2,793,356 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for the school district official and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received to the district; the School Board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and appropriation, which balance is to be raised by the taxes in the Town. Mr. Dionne moved to accept Article 4 as written, and Mr. Jacobson seconded. Discussion as follows.
- Mr. Dagenais made a motion to reduce the bottom line of the school budget by \$53,000 to read \$2.740.356. Mr. Wasson seconded. Discussion as follows.
- Mrs. Cleary asked for more details regarding the reasons for the needed \$53,000 to fund the ninth classroom. Mrs. Knowles, chair of the School Board, explained that they are trying to reduce the class sizes in grades 1, 2, and 3. Based on research, the staff and the School Board agreed that the benefits of smaller class numbers in the lower grades help to build the strongest foundation to help students throughout their school careers.

Are there any grants available for this? Duane Ford, SAU56 Business Administrator, explained that any grant \$ currently being received is used for reading tutors in the lower grades but would not be applicable towards a new classroom.

- Mr. Nylund asked for comparisons between our class sizes and area towns. Dr. Ott, SAU56 Superintendent, stated that Somersworth's guidelines require a ratio of 18/1 in the lower grades.
- Mr. Jansen began looking at student/teacher ratios if all the specialists were included. He felt we could look at the ratios as being more like 15/1 or 12/1.
- Mrs. Salvati stated that the research this decision was based upon does not include any instructor but the classroom teacher.
  - Mr. Dagenais voiced his support of the amendment based on the economic times.
- Mr. Spencer made a request for this vote to be secret ballot. He passed in the required list of five registered voters present at today's meeting to make this official.
- Mr. Connolly moved that the discussion cease, and the vote be taken. Mr. Wasson asked that the voters be reminded that a yes vote would reduce the budget by \$53,000 and a no vote would allow the discussion for Article 4 to continue.

The result of the secret ballot vote was  $42 \cdot 42$ . Mr. Putnam determined that in the case of a tied vote, the motion is defeated, according to Robert's Rule of Order, and the original article stands.

Further discussion of Article 4 as follows.

- Mr. Nylund wanted an explanation of what would happen if Article 4 did not pass now. It was agreed that a new sum of \$ would be determined and then voted on.
- Mr. Putnam reread the original Article 4, emphasizing that a yes vote would support the proposed budget of \$2,793,356.

The result of the secret ballot vote was Yes - 50 and No - 41. Article 4 passes.

- Article 5. To see if the School District will vote to establish a capital reserve fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1-11 for the purpose of school building improvements. The School Board will be designated as agents to expend from the school building capital reserve fund. Discussion as follows.
- Mr. Jansen proposed an amendment which rewords the second sentence of Article 5 as follows: The Rollinsford Trustees of the Trust Fund shall hold said capital reserve funds in Trust, as provided for in RSA 35:10. The Trustees shall hold these funds until such time as a majority of the legal voters present and voting at an annual or special school district meeting vote to withdraw funds from this capital reserve fund for use in making school building improvements. Mr. Dagenais seconded. The School Board had no objections to this amendment. Mr. Putnam declared this a friendly amendment which passed with no formal vote. Discussion as follows on the amended Article 5.
- Mr. Wasson was against keeping the \$ in reserve instead of using it to offset taxes later in the year.

  Mr. Dagenais again emphasized that these are not solid economic times, and we can not afford to keep
  raising taxes. Mr. Rhode felt that having a reserve fund would allow "wants" to become "needs", as the

\$ would be too available.

Proponents felt it showed wise planning for the future and would eliminate the need for bonds. It is similar to the reserve funds the Town already has in place for equipment. Any expenditures from this fund would always be up for a vote. It is not a contingency fund. When questioned whether any capital improvements are already known, the cramped administrative area, an open nursing space, and a generally old building were mentioned.

Discussion ceased and a voice vote was called. Mr. Putnam could not recognize the voice vote. The tellers counted raised hands with the results being 52 - Yes and 33 - No. Article 5 passed.

Article 6. To see if the School District will raise and appropriate the sum of up to \$25,000 to be placed in the School building improvement capital reserve fund, with such amount to be funded for the year end undesignated fund balance (surplus) available on July 1 of this year.

Mr. Jacobson moved to accept the article as read. Mr. Connolly seconded. Discussion as follows. A motion was made by Mr. Wasson to reduce the amount in Article 6 from \$25,000 to \$0. Mrs. Wasson seconded. Discussion and questions as follows.

What is the usual surplus? Mr. Ford said approximately \$50,000. Tax impact? \$0.22/thousand. Mr. Connolly moved to end discussion. Seconded by Mrs. Putnam.

Voice vote on Mr. Wasson's amendment to Article 6 was not conclusive. The tellers counted raised hands with result of 37 · Yes and 46 · No. The amendment fails.

Mr. Connolly moved to end discussion of Article 6. Vicki Reishus seconded. Voice vote. Ayes had it.

Mr. Wasson requested a secret ballot for Article 6. He supplied a list of 5 registered voters present at the meeting.

The tally was Yes - 46 and No - 36. Article 6 passes.

Article 7. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting. Mr. Putnam called for any discussions. Hearing none, Mr. Connolly moved to adjourn the meeting at approximately 11:45. Mrs. Winter seconded. At this point Mr. Wasson tried to open the discussion again. Mr. Putnam said a motion was already on the floor and discussion had ceased. Mr. Connolly declined to withdraw his motion. A voice vote on Mr. Connolly's motion was not clear. The tellers counted raised hands with a result of Yes - 36 and No - 30. Motion passed. Meeting adjourned at 11:50.

### **AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION**

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Rollinsford School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2002as listed in the tabel of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general-purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by manage-

ment, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general-purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Rollinsford School District has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general-purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Rollinsford School District as of June 30, 2002, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general-purpose financial statements of the Rollinsford School District taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general-purpose financial statements of the Rollinsford School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general-purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general-purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

### ARTICLE II

Are you in favor of adopting amendments to the definitions found in sections 2.10, 2.10A, 2.10B, 2.11, 2.22, and 2.23 in the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance?

These amendments would update definitions in the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance relating to multiple dwelling units, single family dwellings, family, hotel and housing for older persons. The Planning Board has submitted this amendment and favors its adoption.

YES - 126 NO - 22

### ARTICLE III

Are you in favor of adopting proposed new definitions that would be codified at sections 2.5A, 2.8B, 2.8C, 2.8D and 2.38A?

These amendments would add new definitions in the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance relating to bed and breakfast inns, condominiums, and motels. The Planning Board has submitted this amendment and favors its adoption.

YES - 125 NO - 25

### ARTICLE IV

Are you in favor of repealing the definition found in section 2.24 of the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance and enacting new section 2.47B to take its place?

This amendment would repeal a definition relating to "lodging house" and add a definition relating to "renting of rooms". The Planning Board has submitted this amendment and favors its adoption.

YES - 125 NO - 24

### ARTICLE V

Are you in favor of repealing and reenacting section 6.9.A of the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance, relating to the table of permitted residential uses, in conformance with the revision posted by the Planning Board and discussed at a public hearing held on January 22, 2002?

This amendment would have the effect of revising and updating a portion of the "table of uses" within the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance. The Planning Board has submitted this amendment and favors its adoption.

YES - 122 NO - 24

### ARTICLE VI

Are you in favor of amending sections 8.1.1 and 8.1.2 of the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance, adopting new section 8.1.3 and repealing and reenacting section 8.3 of the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance?

These amendments would amend the "special provisions" relating to single family dwellings, multiple dwellings and housing for older persons to conform them to changes in the definitions proposed in questions 1-3 above. The adoption of section 8.1.3 would clarify the provision relating to the renting of rooms to require site plan review and to establish a numerical limitation in the number of persons to whom rooms could be let. The amendment of section 8.3 would clarify that such developments require all state and federal permits and conform to the provisions of the ordinance related to multiple dwellings. The Planning Board has submitted this amendment and favors its adoption.

YES - 118 NO - 22

### ARTICLE VII

Are you in favor of adopting a proposed new definition that would be codified at section 2.38A of the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance?

This amendment would define "new development" for purposes of enabling better administration of the impact fee ordinance. The Planning Board has submitted this amendment and favors its adoption.

YES - 112 NO - 25

### ARTICLE VIII

Are you in favor of repealing and reenacting section 2.23A?

This amendment would clarify that in some instances impact fees could be charged for the cost of upgrading the Town's wastewater treatment system. The Planning Board has submitted this amendment and favors its adoption.

YES - 105 NO - 34

### ARTICLE IX

Are you in favor of adopting a new ordinance provision relating to impact fees that would be codified at section 13.10 of the Ordinance?

This amendment would clarify that the Town may charge other lawful fees in addition to the impact fees authorized by state stature and the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance. The Planning Board has submitted this amendment and favors its adoption.

YES - 100 NO - 38

### ARTICLE X

Are you in favor of repealing section 6.8 of the Ordinance and reenacting it? Section 6.8 of the Rollinsford Zoning Ordinance was "reserved" when the ordinance was first adopted.

The amendment would add a section to clarify the legal authority granted to the Planning Board by state statute to deny certain applications found to constitute "scattered and premature" development. The Planning Board has submitted this amendment and favors its adoption.

YES - 113 NO - 25

### ARTICLE XI

To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Surveyors of Wood and Lumber

Stephen Roberts nominates the five current members. Albert England, Paul Janetos, Joseph Porter, Richard Wasson and Lucius Emerson are re-elected. (voice vote)

Fence Viewer

Richard Wasson nominates Paul Janetos. Paul Janetos is re-elected. (voice vote)

Tree Warden

Ed Charpentier is nominated by Marc Couture. Ed Charpentier is elected. (voice vote)

Parks and Recreation

Larry Larkin is nominated by Charlie Dionne. Larry Larkin is elected. (voice vote)

Judge Stephen Roberts swears in all elected officials.

### ARTICLE XII

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum equal to all revenues in excess of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) that maybe received from the Hydro Electric Plant to be placed in the Town's Hydro Electric Fund. (The first \$50,000 or any lesser amount that may be received will be used as offset against Town Budget expenditures).

Motion to accept as read made by Richard Wasson, seconded by Michael Jacobson. No discussion on Article. Article carries, (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XIII

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) and withdraw the same from the Land Trust Fund to finance land survey and related expenses that may be incurred in assisting private land owners who donate Conservation Easements and/or participate in the Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP).

Joan Laliberte, seconded by Carlton Spencer moves to accept as read. No discussion. Ayes carries (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XIV

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) to be added to the Town Equipment Reserve Fund previously established. (majority vote required)

Motion to accept Article as read made by Charlie Dionne, seconded by Michael Jacobson. No discussion on this Article. Ayes carries (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XV

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) to be added to the Fire Station Building Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (majority vote required)

Denise Knowles moved to accept Article as read, seconded by Arlene Boucher. Question was asked as to how much was in the Fund. Selectman Jansen said approximately \$30,000. No further discussion. Article carries (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XVI

To see if the Town will appropriate fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) to build up to 400 feet of roadway and utilities on Town land (Lot 2-14-1). The fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) would be derived from sale of subdivided land from Town Lot 2-14-1. (majority vote required)

Motion to accept Article made by George Dagenais, seconded by Carlton Spencer. Paul Connolly said that this Article has been on the warrant for several years with the same \$15,000 figure, and he believes this amount should be higher because of cost increases. He would like to amend the Article by changing the \$15,000 to \$40,000. Charles Bolian seconded the motion to amend the Article. Mr. Jansen explained that this would have no impact on the tax rate because the cost would be offset from revenue from sale of the lots.

Vote on the amendment to change the \$15,000 to \$40,000 carries. (voice vote)

Article XVI as amended carries, (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XVII

To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to construct sewer lines and a lift-pump station to provide future sewer service to the mini-industrial park and future highway facilities at the transfer station. (Revenue to fund this construction will come for lot sales in the mini-industrial park and surplus funds.)

Richard Wasson moved to accept as read. Carlton Spencer seconded the motion. No discussion. Ayes carries (voice vote).

### ARTICLE XVIII

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for road reconstruction and drainage upgrades. (majority vote required)

Larry Larkin, seconded by Ed Ross move to accept as read.

Question was asked as to what roads would be done. Selectman Jansen said Sligo Road, sidewalks in the village and drainage on General John Sullivan Way. Road Agent Craig Chabot said work on Sligo would be from Pinch Hill Road to Baer Road, and only as much as money will allow will be done. Article XVIII carries (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XIX

To see if the Town will appropriate sixty-five hundred dollars (\$6,500) for recycling equipment at the Transfer Station. (metal roll off containers) (majority vote required)

Motion to accept as read made by Carlton Spencer, seconded by Richard Wasson. It was stated that we have 2 large and 1 small containers now, and that this one would be for shingles and/or tires. Ayes carries (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XX

To see if the Town will appropriate forty-eight hundred dollars (\$4,800) for cemetery capital improvements. (majority vote required)

Charlie Dionne moves to accept, seconded by Ed Ross. No discussion. Article carries (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XXI

To see if the Town will appropriate four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a cruiser video camera. (50% of cost to be reimbursed by State Grant).

Motion to accept Article XXI as read made by Carlton Spencer, seconded by Denise Knowles. No discussion on this Article. Article carries (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XXII

To see if the Town will appropriate forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to dismantle and move the Wentworth Mansion back to Rollinsford from Dover, MA. (majority vote required)

Paul Connolly, seconded by Michael Jacobson, moved to accept as read. John Wastrom said it would cost \$200 a year for a storage container, but there is a slight possibility that the container maybe donated. Ed Charpentier moved to amend this Article by adding the following "Revenue to fund this Article will be reimbursed by private donations to be raised by the Rollinsford Historical Committee". Michael Jacobson seconded the motion. Denise Knowles asked if the \$20,000 that the Town usually puts into the Land Trust Fund, but did not this year in order to have this Article, would be placed back into that fund if the \$40,000 in this Article were raised. The Selectmen said no, not unless they were given authority today to do that, the money would go into the general fund. Mr. Jansen said that the people making these donations need to donate to a non-profit organization for tax purposes. So it would have to be donated to the Town or a Historic Trust. The Rollinsford Historical Committee intends to create a trust but it takes months to get all the paper work done, so it can't accept money because it doesn't exist at this time. The Rollinsford Historical Committee is appointed by the Selectman and is just an agent of the Town, so when they accept this money it is the Town accepting the money, so this body has to give authority to do that.

Ed Charpentier said it will be stored in a over sized box trailer, which will need to be bombed once a year for insects, and insured for a value of \$80,000, and it can be stored for several years.

The vote on Ed Charpentier's amendment adding to this Article, "Revenue to fund this Article will be reimbursed by private donations to be reised by the Rollinsford Historical Committee," carries. (voice vote)

Sonny Foss asked what would happen to the house if the \$330,000 needed to reassemble the house can't be raised. Ed Charpentier said the house would be sold.

John Wastrom said they have local electricians planning to donate their services to wire the house, Paul Connolly is donating engineering services, legal services are being donated, and Mr. Wastrom is donating \$40,000 of services and materials for chimney construction.

Article XXII as mended carries, (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XXIII

To see if the Town will authorize the Wentworth Mansion to be relocated on part of Tax Map 10 Lot 14. (majority vote required)

Motion to accept as read made by Stephen Roberts, seconded by Charles Bolian. No discussion. Aves carries (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XXIV

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement to transfer all Town interests in the Wentworth Mansion to a nonprofit Wentworth Mansion Trust and to authorize a 99-year lease for a portion of Lot 14 on Tax Map 10 to the nonprofit Wentworth Mansion Trust. (specific area of house site to be determined by survey funded by the Wentworth Mansion Trust). (majority vote required)

Richard Wasson, seconded by Charles Bolian, moved to accept as read. David Nylund asked how much land would be used for the house. Mr. Jansen said that the Selectmen would be meeting with the Planning Board, ZBA, Historical Committee, Conservation Committee and any other group that might be involved with this agreement. They are aware that there is a need for parking, and probably a host of other things that could not possibly be thought of today, but will need to be addressed. It would be difficult to say exactly how much land would be needed, the lot is 3 to 3 1/2 acres, but all ordinances will be met.

Article XXIV carries (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XXV

To see if the Town will vote to establish the Wentworth Mansion Trust Fund to hold any donations that may be received for the reconstruction and maintenance of the Wentworth Mansion. Selectmen would be authorized to transfer funds accumulated in the Trust to the nonprofit Wentworth Mansion Trust after it is approved by the State. (majority vote required)

Mr. Jansen said since this Article was written several weeks ago, he has talked to the Attorney General's office and has been advised that we do not need this Article, so we should not take action on it. Because it is private money not public money, the Selectmen already have authority to receive and hold it. The Moderator declared no action will be taken on this Article at the request of the Selectmen.

### ARTICLE XXVI

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million four thousand three

hundred nineteen dollars (\$1,004,319) which represents the operating budget. Sum does not include prior capital articles addressed.

Ed Ross moved, seconded by Paul Connolly to accept Article as read. Ed Ross moved to amend Article to add, "\$20,000 to the revaluation of the Town and \$20,000 to the Land Trust Fund". Larry Larkin seconded the motion. Denise Knowles reminded everyone that they would be increasing the budget by \$40,000 and with the uncertainty of when and if the Historical Committee can reimburse the Town, this \$40,000 would be committed. Mr. Jansen said he has concerns with this amendment because the Selectmen did not warn the public that they would like to set up a Revaluation Reserve Fund, and if this amendment is approved they have no place to put the money. During budget hearings this plan was cut in order to do the Wentworth Mansion.

Vote on amendment to add \$20,000 to the revaluation of the Town and \$20,000 to the Land Trust Fund is defeated. (voice vote)

Chris Reishus said there was concern expressed at the budget hearings in regards to what police officers were being paid and the share they would pay for benefits. Mr. Jansen replied that the number one and two officers will receive a \$4,500 pay increase. The third position is not filled. The Selectmen are studying the benefits and will be getting assistance from the NH Municipal Association and do a detailed study. There may not be any decision until July or later.

Motion made and seconded to amend the Article to increase the budget by \$20,000 to be placed in the Land Trust Fund. Amendment is defeated (voice vote) Article XXVI as originally presented (operating budget of \$1,004,319) carries. (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XXVII

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder, the surplus equipment and vehicles owned by the Town.

Mrs. Wasson, seconded by Gail Flynn moved to accept as read. No discussion. Article carries. (voice vote)

### ARTICLE XXVIII

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Denise Knowles wanted to know the status of the renovation of the upstairs of the Town Hall, and what will it be now another project is being started. Mr. Jansen said the Board has authorization to spend up to \$50,000 for the upstairs if the funds are raised from private sources. The handicap lift has finally been started and after the litigation from the first phase of the town hall is completed, and if there is money left that will be applied to upstairs.
