IN MEMORIAM

CHARLES WENTWORTH

"Charlie" Wentworth or just plain "C" Wentworth as his ads stated, was born July 10, 1871, in North Berwick, Maine. He was eighth in descent from Elder William Wentworth, one of the early settlers of Dover. Charlie was educated in the North Berwick High School and in 1897 came to Durham as telegraph operator at the B. & M. station. In 1900 he was appointed station agent at Durham, which position he still held at the time of his death.

In 1898 he married Evelyn Jenkins of Lee, to whom one daughter, Valerie, was born. In 1917 he was married a second time to Vesta Robinson of Newmarket. To this union, two daughters, Harriet and Ann Elizabeth were born. All three daughters and both wives survive him.

In March, 1904, he was elected Town Clerk and continued to be re-elected annually for thirty-nine years. He served in the state legislature in 1905-06 as the representative from Durham, and as secretary of the agricultural college committee, was instrumental in securing the appropriation for the old College Gymnasium, now New Hampshire Hall.

During some of the early days of his residence in Durham, Charlie managed to take a few special college courses in French, Mathematics and Drawing. Out of his instruction in drawing he developed the happy faculty of making cartoons, many of which adorned the pages of the early college yearbooks and other publications. He also was very adept in drawing sketches of his friends in characteristic poses and presenting them to them with a droll chuckle. Not the least of his accomplishments was his ability as a raconteur, espe-

cially of Scotch tales which he would tell with that twinkle in his eye and with his superlative "dry humor."

In addition to his art work and his duties as telegraph operator, station agent and town clerk, Charlie conducted an insurance agency and was a local justice of the peace. As one of his prerogatives in the latter capacity he performed numerous wedding ceremonies, and as far as is known all of these unions have held tight. He was affiliated with several civic and fraternal organizations, among them being The Grange, The Lion's Club, The Durham Men's Club and The Sons of Veterans. Some years ago he took an active part in the compilation and sale of the History of the Town of Durham.

Throughout the years Charlie Wentworth was the best known and the most known man in town. He was always considerate, courteous, honest and obliging in both his private and official transactions. His death came without warning and was a surprise and shock to the whole community.

On the morning of July 8, 1943, Charlie Wentworth was found abed with a smile on his face in peaceful death. The doctor's verdict was "angina pectoris." On Sunday, July 11, after largely attended services in the Durham Community Church, the body was interred in the family lot at Newton Junction, New Hampshire.

The following lines from our old Scotch poet, "Bobby" Burns herewith seem appropriate:—

"The honest man, tho' e'er sae poor,
Is King o' men for a' that."

IN MEMORIAM

JOHN HILL SIMPSON

With deep sorrow we mark the passing of John Hill Simpson—town officer and prominent citizen. Always friendly and faithful, trustworthy and respected, he was a man who will be greatly missed by the town and its people—and we pay tribute to him.

He was born in Madbury, the son of Arthur W. and Lydia E. (Hill) Simpson, but had made his home in Durham for the past twenty years.

He was elected a Supervisor of the Check List in 1934 and a Trustee of Trust Funds in 1937, offices he held continuously until his death.

For many years he has been a director of the New Hampshire Master Plumbers' Association. He was also a member of the Durham Community Church; Sullivan Lodge, No. 26, Knights of Pythias; Moses Paul Lodge, No. 96, A. F. & A. M.; Belknap Chapter, No. 8, R. A. M.; St. Paul Commandery, K. T.; Bektash Temple, A. A. O. N. M. S.; John Williams Chapter, No. 53, O. E. S.; Scammell Grange; Northern Colonists; Durham History Department; and Piscataqua Pioneers.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bertha G. Simpson of Durham; two sons, Leroy C. Simpson of Buenos Aires, Argentina, and Arthur E. Simpson, of the U. S. Air Forces; a brother, Roscoe H. Simpson of Madbury; and a granddaughter.

Quiet and unobtrusive, yet he was a man of loyalty and dependability that showed in the faithfulness of his service in whatsoever he was called upon to do. It seems particularly typical of his character that, even at the time of his death, he was on his way to give help where it was most needed. We pay honor and respect to his memory.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

MARCH 9, 1943

Two Hundredth and Twelfth Annual Meeting.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, A. D. 1943, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk (*Charles Wentworth, †Arthur P. Stewart), one Selectman for a term of three years (Edward L. Getchell), a Town Treasurer (Forrest H. Smart), a Collector of Taxes (Arthur P. Stewart), two Auditors (Leroy Higgins, Harry C. Woodworth), four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years (W. H. Hartwell, W. S. Rand, F. W. Knight, Leon P. Watson), one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of three years (Edmund W. Bowler), and one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of one year (William H. Hartwell), and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years (*John H. Simpson, †Wallis S. Rand).

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repair and maintenance of Town Highways and Bridges. Voted \$7,000.00.

*Deceased.

†Appointed to fill out balance of the year.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for current maintenance expenses, including County taxes as required by law. Voted \$9,270.00.

5. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Association, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$166.00). Adopted.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to complete payment for the new dump site and close the old one and start the new one. Adopted.

7. To see if the Town will vote to create a Board of Fire Commissioners consisting of three members, one to be appointed by the Selectmen, one by the University of New Hampshire, and one by the aforesaid appointees. The member appointed by the Selectmen shall serve for three years; the member appointed by the University shall serve for two years; the member appointed by the two aforesaid appointees shall serve for one year; and thereafter each member shall be appointed for three years. Each member shall hold office until his successor is appointed. Any vacancy shall be filled by the agency which appointed the retiring member. All members of the Board shall be appointed within thirty calendar days from the date of the adoption of this article.

No member of the Board shall receive compensation for his services but may be reimbursed for reasonable expense incurred in the performance of his official duties.

The Board shall establish such rules and regula-

tions and elect such officers as they deem proper and necessary for the conduct of their business.

The duties and responsibilities of the Board shall in general consist of: 1. Making recommendations to the Town and University officials for: (a) the employment of adequate and qualified officers and personnel for the Fire Department who shall, in turn, be responsible to the Board, (b) the purchase of new equipment and the maintenance of existing equipment; 2. Making and enforcing such rules and regulations relative to the operation of the Fire Department as they may deem necessary and proper.

Upon passage of this article, all regulations relative to the establishment and operation of the Fire Department now appearing on the Town records and which are in conflict with this article shall be repealed. Adopted.

8. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for the Town Officers required by law. Adopted.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes. Adopted.

10. To see if the Town will allow a discount of one per cent for prompt payment of taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1943. Adopted.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Voted to continue fact finding committee for one year, the members to be appointed by the Moderator.

Voted that when the ballots were all in and counted the meeting be adjourned.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

March 14, 1944

Two Hundredth and Thirteenth Annual Meeting

To the inhabitants of the Town of Durham, County of Stráfford, and the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall at Durham, N. H., on Tuésday, the fourteenth day of March, A. D. 1944, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for a term of three years, a Town Treasurer, a Collector of Taxes, two Auditors, four members of the Budget Committee for a term of three years, one member of the Sewer Commission for a term of one year, and all other Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To select one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, and one for a term of two years.
3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repair and maintenance to Town Highways and Bridges. (See budget.)
4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for current maintenance expenses, including County taxes as required by law. (See budget.)

5. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Association, the sum of one hundred and sixty-six dollars (\$166.00). (See budget.)

6. To see if the Town will vote to fix the compensation for the Selectmen as follows: Clerk of the Board two hundred dollars (\$200.00) annually and the other two members one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) each.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) for the purpose of constructing and erecting an Honor Roll for Durham men and women in the armed services.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) to provide the Selectmen with any necessary assistance in establishing timber assessment values in the Town. (N. H. Chapt. 144 of 1943.)

9. To see if the Town in co-operation with the University of New Hampshire will vote to create a Board of Fire Commissioners consisting of three members, one to be appointed by the Selectmen, one by the University of New Hampshire, and one by the aforesaid appointers. The member appointed by the Selectmen shall serve for a term of three years; the member appointed by the University shall serve for two years; the member appointed by the two aforesaid appointees shall serve for one year; and thereafter each member shall be appointed for three years. Each member shall hold office until his successor is appointed. Any vacancy shall be filled by the agency which appointed the

retiring member. All members of the Board shall be appointed within ninety days from the date of the adoption of this article.

No member of the Board shall receive compensation for his services but may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses incurred in the performance of his official duties.

The Board shall establish such rules and regulations and elect such officers as they deem proper and necessary for the conduct of their business.

The duties and responsibilities of the Board shall in general consist of: 1. Making recommendations to the Town and University officials for (a) the employment and wage rates of adequate and qualified officers and personnel for the Fire Department who shall in turn be responsible to the Board, (b) the purchase of new equipment and the maintenance of existing equipment: 2. Making and enforcing such rules and regulations relative to the operation of the Fire Department as they deem necessary and proper.

Upon passage of this article, all regulations relative to the establishment and operation of the Fire Department now appearing on the Town records and which are in conflict with this article shall be repealed.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 56 of the revised statutes of the State of New Hampshire (an act relative to municipal lighting and water systems) and authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Water Commission of three members to supervise the operation of the town water system; one member to be appointed for one year, one member to be appointed for two years and one member to be appointed for three years. Thereafter one mem-

ber of the Commission shall be elected at each town meeting for a term of three years. In the case of vacancies occurring on the Commission such vacancies shall be filled by appointment by the other members of the Commission, such appointments to expire at the next town meeting, at which meeting a member shall be elected to fill the unexpired term. The Commission shall file notice of such with the Town Clerk who shall incorporate such notices in his records. The Commissioners shall be sworn to the faithful discharge of their duties. All Commissioners shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified.

The Commissioners shall organize annually by choosing one of their members as chairman of the board. They shall appoint a clerk and a superintendent of the works and such other officers and agents as they may deem necessary, and shall thereupon furnish a certificate of such organization to the clerk of the municipality, who shall record the same in his records. The Commissioners shall fix the compensation of all officers and agents appointed by them, and all officers and agents shall be sworn to faithful discharge of their duties.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for the establishment of a capital reserve fund, for hydrant line extension, said funds to be kept in a separate account by the Trustees of Trust Funds as provided for in Chapter 160, N. H. revised statutes of 1943; until such a time as the Selectmen shall decide as feasible to use the funds for the purpose for which they were raised by this article.

12. To see if the Town will vote to furnish surety bonds for the Town Officers as required by law.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the Town will vote to allow the usual discount of one per cent for prompt payment of taxes if paid on or before August 1, 1944.

15. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE HAMILTON SMITH LIBRARY

TO DURHAM RESIDENTS :

During the last year the Hamilton Smith Library has seen many changes and much activity. The staff members giving service to the public now include Robert L. Martin, Loan Librarian; Jennie D. Lindquist, Charlotte Anderson and Margaret Owen, in the Reference Room; Caroline O. Barstow, in charge of the Periodicals Room; and Helen D. Abbott and Jean L. Drisko, in the Catalog Department. The Library has also many student helpers to supplement the work of the regular staff.

During Book Week in November Miss Lindquist told stories to the children at the Durham Village school. She has also talked with interested parents about their children's reading. Durham folks are invited to confer with her at any time.

The use of the Charlotte Thompson Room has remained approximately the same as heretofore, with 5,144 volumes circulated therefrom. Five o'clock has been set as the closing hour for this room for the children, but adults may have access to it at any time.

Since the lifting of the dimout it has been possible to reopen the stacks and the Newspaper Room in the evening. Last year's report spoke of the desirability of closing the Library Saturday evenings, an arrangement to which the Durham Library Association members and the selectmen agreed for the duration. No apparent inconvenience has resulted from this change in hours.

During the college sessions the Library is open

every evening but Saturday. But during college vacations it is closed at five except on Wednesdays, when (according to contract) it is kept open until nine in the evening. Its use on these evenings is negligible, so much so that it is recommended that the contract be modified to permit the Library to close on Wednesday evenings also, during the college vacation periods.

Among the many exhibits at the Library, two merit special mention. One, sponsored by the Durham Woman's Club with Mrs. Victor H. Smith as chairman, was called "The Armed Forces Around the World: An Exhibit of Objects They Are Sending Home." Interest in and appreciation of this exhibit were widespread.

During the year Mr. and Mrs. James C. Sawyer generously put at the disposal of the Library, for exhibition purposes, their outstanding collection of Americana. The selection of articles for showing has necessarily been limited by the problem of space, but several cases have been arranged of items of historical significance, of documents of local interest, of wooden ware of olden times. These exhibits will be continued from time to time during the year to come.

Circulation of books for the year for home use totaled 48,611, a figure that includes the loans from the Charlotte Thompson room.

A count of the volumes in the Library has been recently completed, giving an accurate record of cataloged holdings. The total (as of January 1, 1944) is 131,695 volumes, of which 12,174 belong to the Durham Library Association and 3,607 to the Durham Public Library. Three hundred and twenty-seven volumes were added to the Durham Library Association collection in 1943, and 190 were discarded. Durham Public Library books were increased by 131 new volumes, and decreased by 163 discards. As has been

done for the past several years, the \$300 derived from the town was all spent on children's books. In addition, many books badly in need of hospitalization were sent to the bindery. The number of discards is an index of the honorable service these books have given, and of the need for funds for replacements.

TOWN OF DURHAM—WATER DEPARTMENT

The long delayed purchase by the Town of the Durham Water Company has finally been effected within the terms of the authorization of the Town Meeting of March, 1939. Ownership of the property has been vested in the Town by mutual consent since July 1. It is expected that the formal, legal transfer of a clear title will be accomplished soon.

The present company has enjoyed a long successful life, having been organized in 1894, the same year as the Hoitt Water Company which it purchased in 1931. Water is purchased by contractual agreement at reasonable wholesale rates from the University for domestic and commercial consumption, hydrant service being furnished without charge to the Town.

The acquisition of the Water Company was expedited in no small measure through the efforts of the New Hampshire Public Service Commission whose findings and exhaustive reports made possible the determination of the assets of the Company. The basis for the purchase price was agreed to be the depreciated value of all fixed assets now in use. No value was assessed against wells, tanks and pumps retired when the purchase of water was made universal several years ago. It is to be noted that the price asked for the utility, the appraisal by the Commission, and the original authorization by the Town differed by slightly over two hundredths of one per cent. The estimated average life of the fixed assets which entered into the purchase price was computed to be 11.72 years.

No material change has been made in the service

or in the billing and collection procedures, these functions having been carried on as formerly at the direction of Mr. John Elliott, the administrator for the Luella Pettee Estate, the former owners of the company, all profits during the period of the transfer accruing to the Town's account. The Selectmen wish to express their appreciation of Mr. Elliott's assistance and that of the Public Service Commission.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY TOWN IMPROVEMENTS

January 31, 1944.

For the year 1944 the committee has made the following recommendations to the board of selectmen and the budget committee.

(1) That it is not expedient to carry on piecemeal sewer construction and that all necessary sewers should be constructed as one unit. This work to be undertaken at such time in the future as adequate funds are made available and the university system is adequate to handle the additional sewage.

(2) To set aside the sum of \$2,000.00 this year to be ear-marked for hydrant line extension. It is further recommended that the first project to be considered shall be a line to serve a hydrant at the corner of Madbury and Woodman roads.

This latter recommendation is in accordance with the report submitted to the town, February 23, 1942 (see annual town report, 1941) covering data on fire line extension.

(3) To initiate proceedings with the proper university authorities to make possible the continuing of Edgewood road from its present ending to Main street. The completion of this street makes possible better fire protection for the western section of the town.

The committee is forced to hold in abeyance any recommendation to the town regarding the relocation of the Main street sidewalk, due to a lack of funds to make the necessary survey.

In order to investigate the cost and feasibility of the various improvements and make recommendations to the selectmen and the budget committee, this committee should have a moderate budget at its disposal.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF DURHAM :

I have the honor to present my fifteenth annual report. As usual the statistics in the table are for the school year 1942-1943, but comments include the present school year.

Two changes in the teachers were made before school opened in September. Miss Jeanne Holt for Grade two succeeding Mrs. Delta Ham who resigned, as did Mrs. Dorothy Vincent, teacher of Grade five. Mrs. Vincent was succeeded by Miss Carolyn Eaton, a graduate of the four-year course of Salem Teachers College, and a successful teacher at Milton Mills. Miss Holt came from Littleton after two successful years in Berlin, N. H., and two years in Littleton. She is a graduate of the Wheelock College and is in line for her Bachelor's degree at New Hampshire University. After school opened Principal Arthur Gray was elected Principal of a similar school in Amherst, Massachusetts, at a substantial increase in salary. We regretted his leaving but were successful in securing Miss Charlotte Smith of Dover, who had served very successfully both as an elementary school principal, a junior high school teacher and later teacher at Dover High School. She hopes to make her home in Durham when an apartment can be secured. Miss Smith is a graduate of New Hampshire University with further study at Cornell, Boston University, Harvard, and the University of New Hampshire.

The school this year has the largest enrollment

since 1938-1939. We are still fortunate in being allowed to use the University Shops for Manual Training and to have the services of Mr. L. J. Batchelder.

You have six tuition pupils from Lee and Madbury. Two pupils from Durham are attending the Newmarket elementary grades. In the secondary schools the enrollment of tuition pupils is as follows:

Newmarket High School, 4

2 in Grade 12

0 in Grade 11

1 in Grade 10

1 in Grade 9

Dover High School, 58

12 in Grade 12

14 in Grade 11

12 in Grade 10

20 in Grade 9

The tuition rate at Dover has increased from \$89.79 last year to \$100.78, which is the state average.

By vote of the School Board the pupils of the following grades, one, five and eight will this year be given medical examinations by physicians. This is a forward looking plan and if such a plan had been generally adopted by schools of the immediate past there would be less rejections for the armed services at this time.

A hot lunch program is being maintained during the winter months with Mrs. Oscar Palmer preparing the lunches. She is assisted by Mrs. Dorothy Wilcox, teacher of Home Economics, in the preparation of menus and by the pupils in serving the food and washing dishes. No federal funds are used and the small sum charged for the one hot dish will help defray expenses. It is hoped that the District will continue to

appropriate the small amount necessary to carry on this worthy project.

The handicapped children of the District, two in number, are this year being taught by Mrs. Elsie Fisher in the home of the pupils.

The pupils have consistently aided in scrap drives and are continually collecting paper. The school has a well organized set up for selling war bonds and war savings stamps.

This year only one day has been lost to the rationing program when Book No. 4 was distributed. We are assured that no further loss of time will be needed for this program.

We miss the Parent-Teachers Association and hope that it will soon be functioning again.

The State Teachers Association held regional meetings in October and your teachers attended a meeting held in Rochester. Miss Smith was elected a member of the Educational Council. Your superintendent also attended the annual meeting of the New England Superintendents held in Boston and is planning to attend the regional meeting of the American Association of School Administrators to be held in New York February 22-25.

The meetings of the School Board continue to be held on the first Tuesday of the month. The Board has had the Auditorium floor painted and the old kerosene stoves of the Home Economics Department have been replaced by two electric stoves. Fortunately our school is well equipped and the shortage of materials has not seriously affected the work of the schools.

The superintendent continues to supervise Defense courses at the University as well as two others in Somersworth. Please note that the number of his visits to

the Village School has not decreased, although the length of such visits may have been shortened. The increased work is his contribution to the war effort.

The support of the School Board and citizens has been appreciated.
