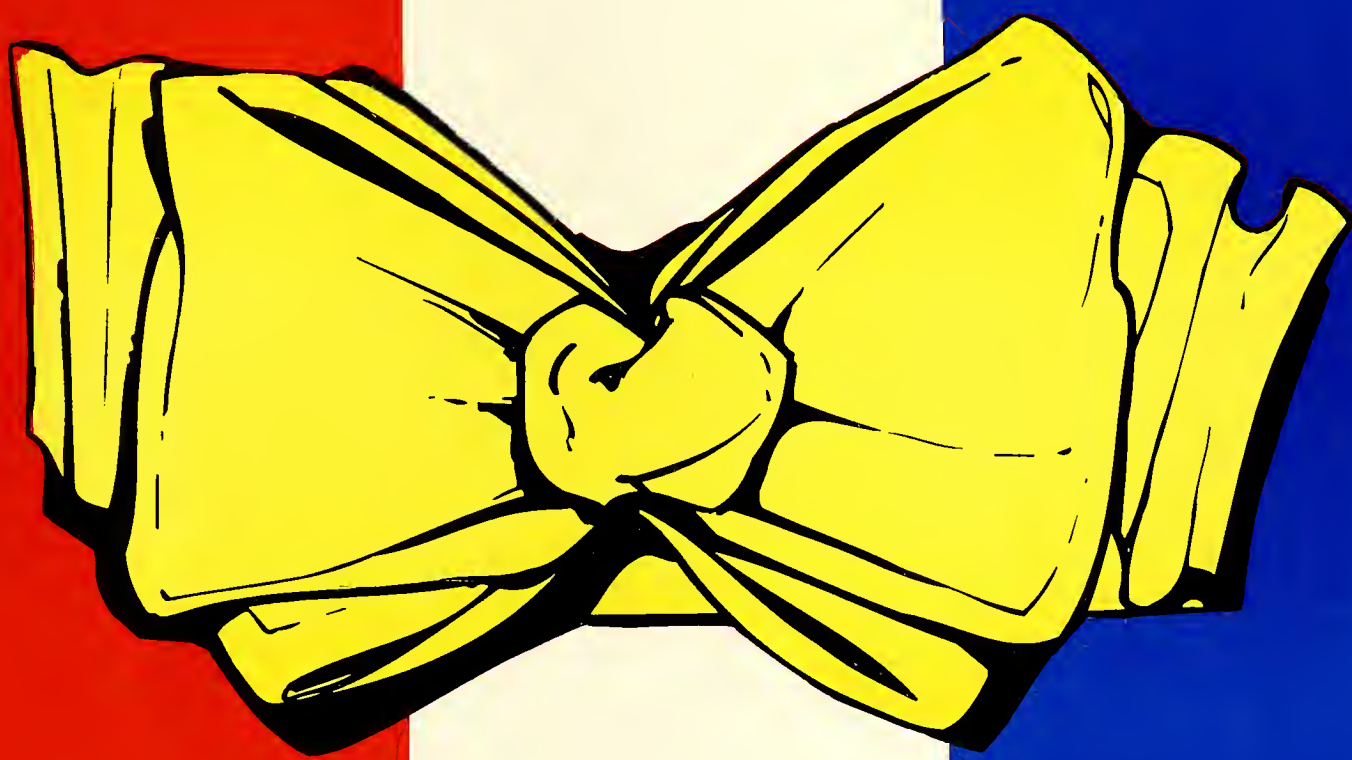

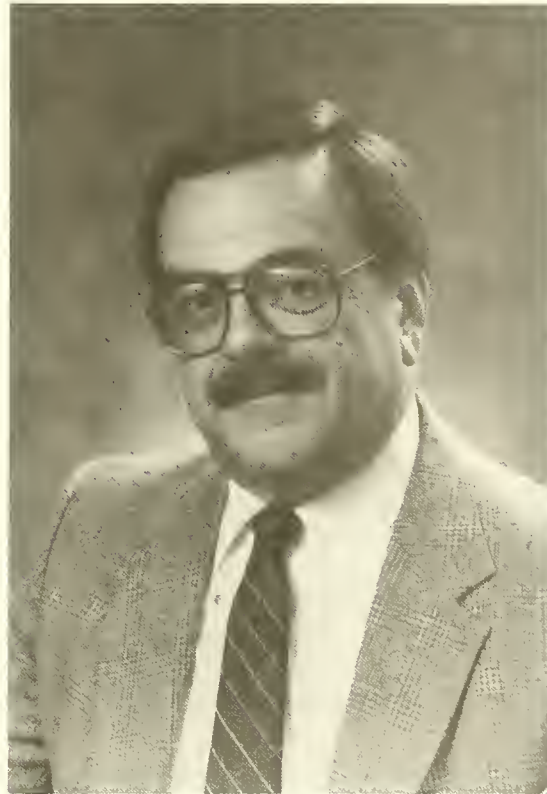

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING FREMONT, NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Fremont in the County of Rockingham in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

FIRST SESSION FOR VOTING - MARCH 12, 1991--FREMONT TOWN HALL--MAIN STREET--FREMONT, NH--
TIME: 10:00 AM TO 7:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 1:

To choose by ballot all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2: (On Petition of 29 Legal Voters)

To see if the Town will vote, by BALLOT, to rescind sections A through G of Article IX of the Fremont Zoning Regulations and insert,

A. All activities within the wetland and watershed district shall comply with the existing regulations and subsequent revisions of the New Hampshire Dep't. of Environmental Services-Wetlands Board.

(Not recommended by the Planning Board).

SECOND SESSION ELLIS SCHOOL MARCH 16,1991 5:00 PM

ARTICLE 3: (On Petition of 25 Legal Voters)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 (Four hundred dollars) to assist Seacoast Hospice, a non-profit organization. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee).

ARTICLE 4: (On Petition of 26 Legal Voters)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 (Two hundred seventy-five dollars) to support the Rockingham Nutrition Program's meals services for older, homebound older and handicapped Fremont residents.

ARTICLE 5:

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund and raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 (Two Thousand dollars) for the purchase of a rescue vehicle. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee).

ARTICLE 6:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 (Twenty-five hundred dollars) for repairs to the Rescue Vehicle. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee).

ARTICLE 7:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five thousand dollars) for the sealing of roads.

ARTICLE 8:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7500.00 (Seventy-five hundred dollars) to reconstruct 300 feet of Ridge Road.

ARTICLE 9:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 (Twenty-five hundred dollars) for the Rockingham Counseling Center.

ARTICLE 10:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$528.00 (Five hundred twenty-eight dollars) for the Women's Resource Center, a private non-profit organization, to assist in funding the Rape Crisis Intervention Program. This agency trains police on sexual abuse issues and helps sexual abuse survivors.

ARTICLE 11:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 (Fifteen hundred dollars) for the Richie McFarland Children's Center. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee).

ARTICLE 12:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1600.00 (Sixteen hundred dollars) for the Area Homemaker Home Health Aide Service, Inc. to help people to remain independent in their homes.

ARTICLE 13:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 (Four thousand dollars) to be added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 14:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five thousand dollars) to be added to the Riverside Drive Area Fire Station Capital Reserve Fund. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee).

ARTICLE 15:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 (Fifteen hundred dollars) to contract, review, change, and have accepted an updated revision of Part II of the Master Plan for the Town of Fremont.

(Not recommended by the Budget Committee).

ARTICLE 16:

To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take such action as the Town deems necessary.

ARTICLE 17:

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 18: (On Petition of 26 Legal Voters)

To see if the Town will vote to change the term of office of the Chief of Police from a term of one (1) year to a term of two (2) years commencing with the election to be held on March 10, 1992.

ARTICLE 19:

To see if the Town vote will take deeded title to the right of way and paved section of a certain street named Lyford Drive, Sleeper Circle, and Robinson Court located in the Lyford Glen subdivision from John Grammas, the present owner. The Town to hold a \$5,000.00 (Five thousand dollar) maintenance bond for 1 year after acceptance of the road.

ARTICLE 20:

To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 21:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the Town Meeting, money from State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year pursuant to RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 22:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collectors Deed at Public Auction or by advertised sealed bids.

ARTICLE 23:


To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.







PASSED by voice vote to combine the article.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,400 (thirty-four hundred dollars) for the printing of 10 (ten) issues of the FREMONTER, a newsletter, and mailing of same to every resident in the Town of Fremont. (Not Recommended by the Budget Committee).

Leon Holmes Sr. made the motion to accept the article as read. Peter Bolduc seconded the motion.

Peter Bolduc made the motion to accept the article as read. Leon Holmes Sr. seconded the motion.

ARTICLE PASSED BY VOICE VOTE.

ARTICLE 9:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five Thousand dollars) for the purchase of a computer system and associated software specifically designed to handle municipal accounts. These funds to be expended only after the Selectmen receive a report from a special committee consisting of a selectmen, member of the Budget Committee, and a Town resident knowledgeable in accounting and computer systems.

Leon Holmes Sr. made the motion to accept the article as read. Leonard Bonagura seconded the motion. Discussion followed.

The Moderator could not call the results from the vote, so he requested a standing vote.

Results of standing vote: Yes. . 45 Votes No . . 45 Votes

The Moderator announced that he would make the deciding vote and voted YES, making the results--

Yes. . 46 Votes No . . 45 Votes

Diane Rawding made the motion to reconsider the article. Jeff Lee seconded the motion.

PASSED BY VOICE VOTE TO RECONSIDER THE ARTICLE.

Robert Rydeen, Moderator, requested to step down as Moderator to offer his thoughts and Ray Bernier stepped in as Moderator for the remainder of the article. More discussion followed.

Leon Holmes Sr. called for the question and Robert Rydeen seconded the motion.

PASSED BY VOICE VOTE TO CALL FOR THE QUESTION.

A standing vote was taken -- YES . . 61 votes NO . . 31 votes

ARTICLE PASSED BY STANDING VOTE.

ARTICLE 10:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of (Thirty-five hundred dollars) to contract, review, change, and have accepted an updated revision of Part II of the Master Plan for the Town of Fremont.

Leon Holmes Sr. made the motion to accept the article as read. Peter Bolduc seconded the motion.

The Moderator could not call the voice vote and requested a standing vote at this time.

Results of standing vote: YES . . 23 votes NO . . 44 votes

ARTICLE DEFEATED BY STANDING VOTE.

ARTICLE 11:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 (Four hundred fifty dollars) for the Women's Resource Center, a private non-profit organization, to assist in funding the Rape Crisis Intervention Program. This agency trains police on sexual abuse issues and help sexual abuse survivors. (Not recommended the Budget Committee).

Peter Bolduc made the motion to accept the article as read. David Menter seconded the motion. Nan Dumm, a resident of Epping, and representative from the Women's Resource was given the opportunity to explain the center and answer any questions. It was requested the Police Chief, Neal Janvrin, be given the opportunity to speak on the issue. He stated that this center was advantageous to the Police Department. Further discussion followed.

Ray Bernier called for the question. Leon Holmes Sr. seconded. PASSED BY VOICE VOTE TO CALL THE QUESTION.

ARTICLE PASSED BY VOICE VOTE.

ARTICLE 12:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 (Twenty-five hundred dollars) for the Rockingham Counseling Center.

Leon Holmes Sr., made the motion to accept the article as read. Leonard Bonagura seconded the motion.

Leonard Bonagura read an explanation of the center.

Further discussion on the article.

The Moderator could not call the voice vote, therefore, requested a standing vote.

Results of the standing vote: YES...52 votes NO...19 votes.

ARTICLE PASSED BY STANDING VOTE.

ARTICLE 13:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 (Fifteen hundred dollars) for the Area Homemaker Home Health Aide Service, Inc. to help people remain independent in their homes.

Leon Holmes Sr. made the motion to accept the article as read. Peter Bolduc seconded the motion.

Leonard Bonagura read an explanation of the services of this agency.

ARTICLE PASSED UNANIMOUSLY BY A VOICE VOTE.

ARTICLE 14:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 (Four thousand dollars) to be added to the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund.

Leon Holmes Sr. made the motion to accept the article as read. Leonard Bonagura seconded the motion.

ARTICLE PASSED BY VOICE VOTE.

ARTICLE 15:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 (Five thousand dollars) to be added to the Riverside Drive Area Fire Station Capital Reserve Fund.

Leon Holmes Sr. made the motion to accept the article as read. Leonard Bonagura seconded the motion.

Discussion and explanation of the article followed.

The Moderator could not call the voice vote, therefore, requested a standing vote.

Results of the standing vote: YES...40 votes NO....27 votes.

ARTICLE PASSED BY STANDING VOTE.

ARTICLE 16:

To hear the report of the Budget Committee and take such action as the Town deems necessary. Leon Holmes Sr. made the motion to accept the article. Leonard Bonagura seconded the motion.

George Marquis requested an explanation of the substantial increases in General Government Buildings, Police Department, and Election.

George Baker, Budget Committee Chairman, explained:

(1) Election was increased due to the fact that there were three elections this year.

(2) General Government Buildings was increased due to work that needed to be completed in the cellar furnace room and other minor repairs to the town buildings.

(3) Neal Janvrin, Police Chief, explained the increase in patrol and training for the police.

George Marquis humorously requested again this year that perhaps the town should appropriate money for a muffler for the road agent's truck. Guerwood Holmes, Road Agent, informed the town that he purchased a new muffler.

George Baker answered other general questions regarding the budget.

PASSED BY VOICE VOTE TO ACCEPT THE REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE.

ARTICLE 17:

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

George Baker made the motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$592,568.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year. Leonard Bonagura seconded the motion.

Further discussion and questions on how that amount was calculated. George Baker explained the articles that were passed were added and the articles that were defeated were deducted from the Budget Committee's total amount.

Neal Beede made the motion to discuss the article line-by-line. Nancy Beede seconded the motion.

DEFEATED BY VOICE VOTE TO DISCUSS THE ARTICLE LINE-BY-LINE.

Further discussion followed.

George Marquis made the motion to amend the article to raise and appropriate the sum of \$595,568.00 and add the \$3,000 to the Fire Department. Leon Holmes Sr. seconded the motion.

Robert Rydeen, Moderator, announced this article was acceptable except the portion which added to the Fire Department. In fact, the Selectmen could use it elsewhere when amounts are added to the bottom line without going on a line-by-line budget.

Leonard Bonagura assured the residents that the Selectmen would add the amount to the Fire Department if this amendment passed. Further discussion followed.

Robert Waddell called for the question. Leon Holmes Sr. seconded the motion.

PASSED BY VOICE VOTE TO CALL THE QUESTION.

AMENDMENT DEFEATED BY VOICE VOTE.

ORIGINAL ARTICLE (\$592,568.00) PASSED BY VOICE VOTE.

ARTICLE 18:

To see if the Town will take deeded title to the right-of-way and paved section of a certain street named Ridgewood Drive located in the Ridgewood Developers subdivision from Richard Emerson, the present owner, a distance of approximately 1200 feet in length. The Town to hold a \$5,000 (Five Thousand dollars) maintenance bond for one year after acceptance of the road.

Leonard Bonagura made the motion to accept the article as read. Leon Holmes Sr. seconded the motion.

Guerwood Holmes, Road Agent, made the motion to amend the article to read: To see . . acceptance of the road. Shoulder work to be completed to town standards and final acceptance by the Road Agent and Selectmen when the work is completed. Leon Holmes Sr. seconded the motion.

ARTICLE AS AMENDED PASSED BY VOICE VOTE.

ARTICLE 19:

ARTICLE 26:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds at Public Auction or by advertised sealed bids.

Peter Bolduc made the motion to accept the article as read. Leonard Bonagura seconded the motion.

Discussion and explanation followed.

ARTICLE PASSED BY VOICE VOTE.

ARTICLE 27:

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting:

Leonard Bonagura made the motion to accept the article as read. Leon Holmes Sr. seconded the motion.

George Baker stated that on behalf of the town he would like to thank Robert Rydeen for the years of dedicated service to the town and his efforts are applauded. All in attendance agreed.

Hal Sherman stated that on behalf of the town he would like to thank all those who are leaving office and wish good luck to all of the replacements. All in attendance agreed.

There being no other business to come before this meeting, the Moderator announced that a motion to adjourn was in order.

Elizabeth Stanley made the motion to adjourn. Leon Holmes Sr. seconded the motion.

BOARD OF SELECTMEN REPORT

As we enter the 90's, we find the official population of Fremont to be 2576 according to the census report. Up 93% during the past ten years, indicating considerable growth for a town with no full-time employees. Due largely to the dedication of service by town volunteers, we were able to control town expenditures during the past year. Volunteers that serve in departments, committees, and commissions spend their personal time for the good of all and are an invaluable resource in our town.

Your approved purchase of our new computer system last year, has allowed us this year to automate the tax bills and typeset the town report savings over \$4,000.00 in time, supplies, and vendor services.

We implemented for the first time, the approval of private contractors to provide off-site improvements (Sandown Road) as part of their overall development project. This allowed the Selectmen to improve the road safety at no cost to the town (\$25,000.00 value). Similar off-site improvements are scheduled at Liberty Square (Sandown Road & Main Street) later this year.

"Numbering the houses" has finally come to Fremont. At the request of our health and safety departments--police, fire, rescue, and civil defense; the selectmen, with the help of the post office department computer will start numbering all homes in town. We realize this may not be a popular task. However, we must consider the importance of our emergency personnel reaching their destination in the earliest possible time. We can accomplish this now at no cost to the town.

Now, a word about property assessments--The assessed valuations for all property tax bills are currently established by the selectmen based on the full fair market value of the property, exclusive of any exemptions, on April 1, 1988 in accordance with New Hampshire RSA 75:1. All new construction, additions or other changes, assessed by the town appraiser, are also calculated as of this date. Taxpayers requesting adjustments under the current use law (NH RSA 79-A) or exemptions for veterans, elderly, and blind, must make application to the selectmen on or before April 15, 1991 to qualify for a reduction of their property tax liability.

Special thanks are in order at this time to those anonymous persons who have unselfishly donated their time, materials, and money to the betterment of individual lives in Fremont. Your efforts are gratefully appreciated by the children, elderly, underprivileged, and the Board of Selectmen.

Regular Selectmen's meetings are held every Thursday evening at 7:00 pm at the Town Hall and are open to the public with participation encouraged.

FREMONT POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

1990 was a very busy year for the Fremont Police Department. We have seen an increase in all of categories of reportable incidents. The Fremont Police Department does not have a 24 hour on-the-road patrol, however, we do have 24 hour coverage with someone on call at all times. We have increased the patrol hours with a special emphasis on a residential patrol. It is our belief that being in our neighborhoods helps to deter some of the problems that our bordering towns are facing. The increase of the residential patrol is not the only solution to the growing crime problem. Programs, like Neighborhood Watch, which is being sponsored by The Fremont Lions Club, is a great way to get involved. We urge all of our citizens to become more aware of our neighborhoods. One of the 1991 goals of the Fremont Police Department is a cooperative effort with the Fremont Rescue, the Fremont Fire Department, Board of Selectmen, and the United States Post Office in instituting a uniform address numbering system for the town. In a situation where every minute counts, the numbering system that is currently in place has caused substantial delays in the arrival of emergency personnel.

It is with great pride that I thank each member of the Fremont Police Department: Lieutenant Fred O'Brien, Sergeant Peter Lamb, Officers Steven Warnock, Clifford Emery, Timothy Vincent, Ronald Conant as well as members of the Fremont Fire Department, Rescue Squad, Highway Department, Town Office Staff and Board of Selectmen. Their personal dedication to the Town of Fremont has helped me do my job as Chief of Police.

RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT

During this past year, the goal of the Recreation Commission was to provide entertaining recreational activities for the residents of Fremont.

Activities in 1990 include the following: During the months of January through March, men's basketball, co-ed volleyball, and a youth basketball program, for boys and girls in grades 3-5, were offered. All of these events were well received and many people participated. In April, there was the Easter breakfast with the Easter Bunny. Approximately 75 children attended these events. In May, about 30 residents joined forces to clean the Memorial Park. A heartfelt thank-you goes out to all those who donated time and services. July brought the first annual Fremont Field Day held at the Memorial Park. Many of the town's organizations, such as the Fremont Athletic Association, the PTA, the Fremont Methodist Church, and more pitched in to make the day a success. Over 150 people attended to participate and/or watch softball games, baseball games, field events, and have good old-fashioned fun. Also, during the summer months, men's softball and co-ed softball were offered. This year, the youth recreational program was offered as a four-week program. It was again, a well-received program with daily activities including sports, arts and crafts, and field trips to places such as the Isles of Shoals, Castle in the Clouds, the Children's Museum in Portsmouth, and Pawtuckaway State Park. Approximately 50 children in grades 1-8 attended. September saw the reorganization of the "Friends of Fremont"--a group that works in cooperation with the Recreation Commission. Also, a boys' basketball program for boys in grades 6-12 was offered as an eight-week program with about 35 boys attending. In October, over 125 parents and children attended the Halloween Party. The Recreation Commission would like to take this opportunity to thank all the people who donate their time, effort, and services and for their continued support and involvement in the town's recreational development.

In closing, the commission recognizes the financial concerns of the town, and will make the greatest possible effort to offer affordable, enjoyable recreation in the coming year.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

First the good news-The Fire Department responded to 58 incidents during 1990. This figure is down from 75 in 1989 and I feel this is due to the homeowners being more fire conscious in and around their homes. The Department is also going out and checking the locations and what is to be burned when a burning permit is requested. The heating, electric and building inspectors are also on their toes and making sure everything is up to the safety codes. Sometimes people don't like this, but it pays off when you see a decrease in fire incidents that is reflected in this years report.

Now the bad news (fiscal woes). The State of New Hampshire has cut back funding the fire lookout towers. A result of this was shown when a fire in Shirkin Woods went undetected for several hours. This woods fire reached about 25 acres in size and cost about \$3,000.00 to extinguish with the help of several surrounding towns. The Fire Department budget has been cut back the last two years, depriving the Volunteer Firemen of several items that would make their job a little easier. This does not do much to increase the spirit of volunteers. I do not feel the Public Safety is the place for continued budget cuts.

The Fire Department welcomes new members first in the Fire Association, then as openings on the Department become available you can be advanced to the Department. Association members are welcome to train with the department in most cases except in hazardous situations due to Insurance reasons. The Association meets the 1st Monday of the month except when it is a Holiday, than the next Monday night.

The fire equipment is in excellent condition, but the building leaves something to be desired. There is no room to walk around and work on the apparatus inside the station. One cannot even open the compartment doors so you have to run them outside to work on them. I realize we cannot afford a new station at this time, but it is not to far down the road. There is a Capital Reserve Fund for this, but I wonder if it is keeping up with inflation.

I must again remind everybody that a PERMIT is needed for any outside burning when the ground IS NOT snow covered. However, we still would like to be advised when you intend to burn to save any confusion. This can be done be calling the Fire Chief at 895-2561 during working hours Monday through Friday 7:00 AM to 4:00 PM. On the week-ends call our dispatch in Raymond 895-4222 and the duty officer will call you back or visit your location with the permit.

I wish to thank the officers and members for the time they volunteer to make this Department the excellent organization that it is.

ROAD AGENT REPORT

I am proud to report to you that our Highway Department is strong and running smooth. We are a part-time department and all of the equipment is owned by us with the exception of the plows and sanders which belong to the town.

During the last 5 years as your Road Agent, a lot of good things have happened. I wish I could explain in detail, but my report would be too long. As you know, during the last 5 years, we have had the biggest building boom ever. We have been very lucky that the Board of Selectmen and Planning Board have written specifications for building good roads. We have all worked together with the developers and I think we have the best subdivision roads in the area. These roads will be practically maintenance free for years to come.

Our current town roads are another story. When they were built many years ago, tar mix and sand were used. In recent years due to increased traffic, the roads are rough and out of shape. It is a lot harder to rebuild roads than to build new ones. We are trying to rebuild our roads with the same specifications that are currently in place for developers.

Last year, the town obtained our own radio frequency. Now, the Police, Fire, Rescue, Highway, and Town Office can use this frequency. At no cost to the town, Leon Holmes Jr. and I purchased two radios to serve you more efficiently while we are in the plow and sand trucks.

I have accomplished the following major projects in 1990: rebuilt and hottopped 2100' of South Road; removal of a sharp and dangerous corner on Old Ridge Road; installed new and replaced existing culverts; rebuilt shoulders on various roads.

During the 1991 year, I am planning on completing the following projects: rebuild and hottop Sandown Road from the four corners to Sandown line; sealing of Pond Lane, Birch Haven, Riverside Drive, and Old Danville Road; surfacing a section of Old Danville Road from Beach Street to Pine Lane; surfacing a section at the end of Riverside Drive (approximately 200'); rebuild and surface with hottop on Ridge Road from Route 107 to new road (approximately 300'). When the town rebuilt a section of Shirkin Road approximately 2 years ago, the town was under the assumption that the state would be completing the first 350' off Beede Road because of the proposed changes to Route 101. Since that time, the state has changed their plans, therefore, I am also going to finish the 350' from Beede Road to the new pavement on Shirkin Road.

In closing, I would like to thank all of the town departments for their cooperation. Also, I would like to thank all of the people who work with me and the residents of Fremont for their continued support and cooperation.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

The Fremont Planning Board experienced notable changes in 1990. Significant losses in experience occurred when two major contributors, Thom Roy and Dot Carder resigned in March. Later in the year, Renee Richardson, a 1990 appointee left the board after clearly demonstrating the skill and motivation necessary to make a strong contribution on an all volunteer board.

The applications before the Board in 1990 reflected the changes in the current economy. Only one major subdivision occurred and there were several small subdivisions and minor lot line changes. Additionally, a 56 site mobile home park was created and two new gravel operation permits were issued. Other focuses were on the administration of site plan review regulations and the management of existing gravel operation permits.

In 1991, in addition to the above noted tasks, the Board plans to focus some efforts on the Master Plan re-write (due in 1992) and an administrative rewriting and amending of our present zoning articles. The Board will be seeking public input as part of the drafting process.

For much of 1990, there were perpetual vacancies on the Planning Board, thereby reducing the capacity of the Board to accomplish its tasks. Town government relies heavily on volunteerism and is in need of capable individuals to step forward and meet the challenge. The Fremont Planning Board meets the first three Wednesday evenings of each month. Interested individuals should contact the Board of Selectmen if they wish to become more involved.

Your ambulances are Brentwood and Raymond with an occasional assist from Epping when the other two are out with their own emergencies.

This year, we are hoping to start running a rescue vehicle. This will be a non-transporting van, which will be carrying equipment that is vital for automobile accidents and other emergencies where equipment is needed but not easily transported in a car. In no way will this vehicle delay our response to your call for help. The purpose of the vehicle is to have the equipment that is needed for a call at the scene. We would like to assist the Fire Department is carrying some of their rescue equipment that is taking up valuable space on a fire engine. This van was an ambulance and was purchased for \$1.00. There is minor work that needs to be done, some rust taken care of and repainting. We had been planning to purchase a new vehicle by putting some money in a Capital Reserve Fund until the necessary amount was reached. However, when this vehicle became available at a reasonable price, we purchased it.

LIBRARY REPORT

The trustees are pleased to report that book circulation increased substantially in 1990 to 4,335 from 3,590 in 1989. We feel this ia a reflection of the combined efforts of the librarian, Barbara Bassett and the assistant librarian, Marlene Emery, who make a visit to the library such a pleasant experience.

Efforts continue to sort through and discard obsolete books and materials in order to make room for current reference materials and literature. New book shelves were built and installed in one of the smaller front rooms, and we are in the process of moving all reference materials into this space.

The trustees want to thank Matthew Thomas, for offering the Fremont Library the first refusal of his large collection of New Hampshire Registers at an affordable price. This is a valuable addition to the library, and an invaluable addition for anyone interested in historical research or history in general. The Fremont Library is now one of the few libraries in the state to house such a collection.

Within the limitations of the library and town budgets, desperately needed minor repairs were completed in 1990: replaced broken storm door, replaced broken storm window, made all windows operational, moved flag stanchion to opposite side of front door, painted drop-off box, replaced leaking fuel tank.

The trustees extend their sincere appreciation and thanks to two young men, Matt and Mark Pitkin, for the superior job they faithfully performed in keeping the grounds surrounding the library well manicured during 1990. They also wish to extend sincere appreciation and thanks to Mrs. Maloof's 4-H Roses for planting blueberry bushes along the south side of the library. All of these young people exemplify qualities of good citizenship, dedication, and dependability and are to be commended.

FREMONT RECYCLING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Fremont Recycling Committee was instrumental in establishing a recycling program for our town which started on June 16, 1990. Cate's Rubbish Removal Services, Inc. was awarded the contract which calls for the recycling of eight different materials: glass (clear, green, and brown), newspapers, cardboard and brown grocery bags, aluminum and tin cans, and plastics. The collection of recyclables takes place every Saturday between 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. at the old landfill site on Rte. 111A and is entirely staffed by volunteers.

The Committee also arranged for the recycling of white goods and scrap metal in the spring and fall of 1990. The total for both collections was about 30 tons. Not only did the town save the \$3,000 it would have cost to bury this material, but we also helped save energy and the environment by recycling this material.

In the regular recycling program, the weekly average of materials collected is about 2 tons; more in the summer months, less in the winter months. This tonnage represents about 10% of the total trash collected in our town.

Fremont dumps almost two million pounds of waste every year (that's 1,000 tons) in the landfill. In 1990, it cost the town over \$45,000 in landfill fees alone to get rid of trash. The cost of picking up the trash added another \$63,000. That's about \$108,000 for getting rid of things we don't want.

In 1988 solid waste disposal made up 5.46% of the Town budget and cost \$23,027. In 1990 - just two years later - getting rid of the trash accounted for approximately 18% of the budget, largely due to the sharp increase in landfill fees and the high cost of pickup. With most of New Hampshire's current landfills expected to close over the next five years, we should do all we can to extend what landfill remains and keep as much as we can out of it.

This is why recycling is becoming a major component of most solid waste management plans. Recycling can divert a significant volume of waste away from costly landfills while reducing ground and water pollution associated with landfilling and air pollution associated with trash incineration. Recycling also conserves many valuable and often limited, natural resources; for example, recycling aluminum cans saves up to 90% of the energy required to extract the metal from bauxite; recycling 1 ton of glass saves 9 gallons of oil; reusable paper pulp from a year's subscription to one daily newspaper saves an acre of trees.

The State of New Hampshire has set a goal of 15% of trash to be recycled in 1991 and 20% in 1992. (Towns that do not recycle may be assessed penalties of up to \$25,000.) The Fremont Recycling Committee will work diligently to try to meet these goals and we hope everyone in town will recycle in 1991 and beyond.

In January, 1990, the District entered into a lease for office space at 86 Lafayette Road, North Hampton, NH and hired an Administrative Assistant. During the past year:

- * the office was furnished
- * computer hardware and software was purchased
- * a complete and comprehensive filing system was set-up
- * all accounting was transferred to a computerized fund accounting system
- * all necessary insurance coverage was purchased.

At the District's Committee meeting of February 22, 1990, the members voted to enter into a contract for ultimate disposal of municipal solid waste with Waste Management of New Hampshire. The Agreement represented the culmination of a six month process which began with the Districts request for proposals from the solid waste industry, and then finally negotiating with Waste Management of New Hampshire, the lowest qualified bidder. The highlights of the contract include the following:

- * A twenty-five year contract of five five-year agreements of guaranteed disposal capacity;
- * A flexible start date for member communities;
- * A tipping fee of \$47.50 per ton, escalating on an annual basis with the consumer price index;
- * Guaranteed disposal capacity to include expansion for new members of the 53-B District.

The contract was signed on March 7, 1990. Brentwood and Fremont began

shipping to the Turnkey Facility in Rochester, NH in July 1990, New Castle will begin in December and other Member Towns have shipping dates ranging from 1991 to 1993.

The Recycling Committee established a District Grant Program for education and public relations. Brentwood, Fremont, Hampton, Hampton Falls, Kensington, North Hampton, and Sandown applied for, and received, grants which totaled \$11,028.18. Congratulations to the Recycling Committees in all the communities for the excellent educational material they have produced. \$10,000.00 has been budgeted to continue this program in 1991-1992.

The Recycling Committee worked with SEA Consultants, Inc. to study and make recommendations for a Recycling Facility to be located at the Fremont landfill site. On August 17, 1990 RFP's were mailed to prospective vendors and on October 1, 1990 proposals were received at the District Office. After evaluating the proposals, options were presented to the Operating Committee on November 1, 1990. That Committee moved to forward to the District Committee the motion that the District build the facility at the Fremont site and contract with an independent contractor the operation of the facility. If approved by the District Committee, the new year will begin with this scenario moving forward.

Household Hazardous Waste is an on-going issue for the Recycling Committee. This year a sub-committee was appointed to study the challenges of, and possible solutions to, the household hazardous waste problem. For 1991-1992, funds have been budgeted for education and public awareness. This sub-committee will also be studying the feasibility of District participation, at some future date, in a household hazardous waste disposal program.

After studying all the information which had been generated by consultants for the District in previous years, the Landfill Committee decided that, with the signing of the contract with Waste Management of New Hampshire, no further studies will be conducted regarding a District owned landfill at this time.

The Septage Committee oversaw a comprehensive study of the Hampton Waste Water Treatment Plant conducted by Underwood Engineers, Inc. This study focused on the feasibility of and the ability of the HWWTP to handle septage from the 53-B Member Towns who are members of the Septage portion of the District. When the study was completed, with favorable results, the committee recommended that negotiations for an Agreement with the Town of Hampton begin. At this writing, an Agreement is in the process of being drafted for presentation and discussion with the Town of Hampton.

In September, 1990 the Town of Danville elected to withdraw from the District and Joseph Melville of Hampton Falls was appointed interim Treasurer of the District.

Walter Hill of South Hampton was appointed chairman of the newly formed Liaison Committee. This committee will be organizing and working in the coming year to establish stronger relationships with the Boards of Selectmen in the member municipalities, and improving communications with other 149-M towns.

The District owned brush/wood chipper is used regularly by several member municipalities. The chipper will be delivered and picked up at no charge to the member municipalities. The use of the chipper may be scheduled by calling the District Office or the Hampton Department of Public Works.

The District has an agreement with Waste Not, Inc. for stump grinding and wastewood/wood demolition disposal. This service is located at the Town of Hampton landfill and is available to all member municipalities. It operates three days per week and a fee is charged for the use of the service. Further information may be obtained by calling the District Office.

REPORT OF THE ROCKINGHAM COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM, INC.

Rockingham County Community Action Program Inc. (RCCAP) is a private, non-profit corporation. Our mission is to serve the multitude of needs of Rockingham County's low-income residents by assisting them in coping with the hardships of poverty, giving them the tools to lift themselves out of poverty, and seeking to eradicate the root cause of poverty. RCCAP has been addressing these needs for more than 25 years.

The Greater Raymond Community Action Center is an outreach office of RCCAP which serves residents of Fremont and 14 other communities, and as such acts as Fremont's central resource for information regarding all available human services. RCCAP also offers intake, clinic and distribution sites in over half of the county's thirty-seven communities for the application and provision of various services.

Community Action provides a wide range of services which are unduplicated elsewhere in the country. Most of these services meet immediate, critical needs and all have a direct and positive impact on people's lives. The following services were provided by Community Action to eligible residents of Fremont from July 1, 1989 through June 30, 1990:

- 51 households received Fuel Assistance, a program which provided a financial grant of up to \$450.00 to assist with energy-related expenses
- 1 home was weatherized through the Weatherization Program, which provides high quality materials and trained labor to weatherize homes in order to reduce heating costs and conserve energy
- 26 children were provided meals from private family day care home which participate in the Rockingham Family Day Care Program
- 2 child care referrals were arranged through the Child Care Resource and Referral Program, which compiles current data on all available child care options, provides child care referrals to employees of participating companies as well as to the general public, and expands the supply of quality child care by recruiting, training and assisting new providers
- 3 children were enrolled in Head Start, a comprehensive early childhood development program designed to meet the needs of low-income and handicapped children and their families
- 19 women, infants, and children received help through the WIC Program, which offers supplemental nutritious foods, nutrition education, breastfeeding support and health care referrals to pregnant women, nursing mothers, infants, and children up to the age of five
- 1 household at risk of homelessness received a security deposit loan through the Security Deposit Loan
- 90 food packages were provided through the Surplus Food Program, which distributes USDA surplus food to eligible households through periodic mass distributions
- 4 emergency food packages were provided through the Emergency Food Pantry, a program which provides a temporary emergency supply of non-perishable food to households facing economic hardship
- 1 household received Crisis Assistance, a program which provided a one-time financial grant for the payment of rent, mortgage, electricity, or fuel for those in emergency situations

In addition to these major programs, much of our staff time is devoted to working with people who come to us seeking help. During the past year, we received 104 calls or visits from Fremont residents, many of which were crisis calls involving fuel or utility needs. By working closely together with local and state welfare administrators, fuel and utility companies, other human service agencies and interested clergy and civic groups, we are able to link those in need with the services available to them.

Since the services we provide greatly relieve the towns we serve of the full financial burden of providing for the needs of their low-income residents, we ask every community we serve to make a financial contribution to our agency based upon the level of service we have provided to its residents. The amount we request equals 4.5% of the total dollar value of services we provided during the previous fiscal year, which means we request \$4.50 for every \$100.00 we provide in direct services.

From July 1, 1989 through June 30, 1990, Community Action provided \$56,402 in services to Fremont residents. We are, therefore, requesting the town of Fremont to contribute 4.5% of this amount, or \$2,538. The Town of Fremont has contributed to our agency for many years, and we extend our appreciation to you for your continued support.

March 24, 1990

The School District Meeting for the Town of Fremont opened at 7:30 p.m. at the Laurence Pettengill Hall, Ellis School, on March 24, 1990. Mrs. Maureen Burhman, Moderator, read the official School District Warrant.

ARTICLE I

To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Mrs. Susan Maloof, School Board Member, moved the Article as read. Seconded by Mr. Donald Ryan, School Board Member.

Mr. Retchless, Superintendent, gave the report, as requested at last year's School District Meeting of the comparison costs of educating elementary school children in the surrounding towns.

ARTICLE II

To see if the District will vote, under the provisions of RSA 198:20b to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend without further action by the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the 1989-1990 school fiscal year provided that such expenditures be made for purposes for which a School District may appropriate money and that such expenditures not require the expenditure of other School District funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

Mr. Douglas Murphy, School Board Member, moved the Article as read. Seconded by Mrs. Mary Stiner, School Board Member.

The School Board moved to amend the figure of 1989-1990 to 1990-1991, the correct year. The amendment was seconded and passed by voice vote.

The Article as amended passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE III

To see if the School District, pursuant to RSA 195:18 will vote to create a cooperative school district planning committee, consisting of three qualified voters of whom at least one shall be a member of the School Board; and to see if the District will vote to authorize the School District Moderator to appoint the members of the committee.

Donald Ryan moved the Article as read. Seconded by Douglas Murphy.

Mr. Retchless explained that this is the first step in the formation of a possible middle school district with Chester. Both committees (Chester has passed this Article on their Warrant) would meet during the year, at no expense to the town, to do research, to see if it is necessary, and to study the feasibility of such a move. If in agreement, they would write Articles of Agreement, which basically is what the two towns agree upon, population, how costs would be shared, grades involved, etc. Then the towns would vote on the Articles of Agreement, and if passed, would form a Middle School District. This would be a separate district and would be responsible for forming a budget, etc. The SAU is doing more research on this, but for now we are just forming a committee that will report at next year's District meeting.

Article passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE IV

To see if the District will vote to withdraw from SAU #14 and to petition the State Board of Education to approve formation of a new School Administrative Unit consisting of the Fremont and Chester School Districts.

Susan Maloof moved the Article as read. Seconded by Trudy Butler.

Mr. Ryan explained that since Chester had voted this Article down, there is no sense in pursuing it; we cannot do it alone.

Robert Rydeen moved to table the Article. Seconded by Robert Waddell.

Article is tabled.

ARTICLE V

To see if the residents of the Fremont School District find the State of New Hampshire to be negligent in the funding of Public Education, thus creating an undue burden on the local property tax payers. We demand that the State of New Hampshire Legislature begin in earnest to study methods for substantially increasing State aid to education.

Douglas Murphy moved the Article as read. Seconded by Trudy Butler.

Mr. Retchless opened discussion by stating that this Article was put in warrants across the State. Many feel this is an Article for a broad based tax. That is not the intent of the School Board. It is their intention to bring to the attention of the State that they have not made education a priority. The State currently pays 7% of the cost of education, which makes us 50th in the nation. Triple or more their efforts, and we'd still be 50th. This is simply to prompt the State to make education a priority.

Hal Sherman moved to amend the motion to read: To see if the residents of the Fremont School District find the State of New Hampshire to be negligent in the funding of Public Education, thus creating an undue burden on the local property tax payers. We demand that the State of New Hampshire Legislature begin in earnest to study methods, excluding an income or sales tax, for substantially increasing State aid to education.

Seconded by Donald Ryan.

Discussion followed on different taxes and how they would effect property taxes. Mr. Maloof suggested just voting this Article down rather than amending it.

The amendment came to the vote and was defeated by voice vote.

Further discussion followed on sales tax versus property tax.

The vote was called. Voice vote not being clear, a hand vote was called for. 78 no votes; 42 yes votes. Article V was defeated.

ARTICLE VI

To see if the District will vote to approve the cost items of the Factfinders Report dated January 9, 1990, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$189,903, \$63,235 of which is to be raised as a deficit appropriation for the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1990, and the remaining balance of \$126,668 to be raised as an appropriation for the 1990-1991 fiscal year. (Not recommended by Budget Committee.)

Mary Stiner moved the Article as read. Seconded by Douglas Murphy.

Mary Stiner moved to amend the Article by changing the three figures to the following: \$189,903 to \$187,215, \$63,235 to \$62,419, and \$126,668 to \$124,796. Seconded by Donald Ryan.

Mr. Retchless explained that the original estimates of Factfinder's Report were off, and these are the revised figures.

Mr. Sherman said if we raised this amount, it would exceed the 10% allowed by law. Mr. Retchless responded that according to Counsel, Mrs. Barbara Loughman, this Article has to be voted on in terms of yes or no. Because Budget Committee did not approve this, if it is voted in, it will have to go to Department of Revenue Administration to be acted upon.

There being no further discussion on the amendment, the Moderator called for the vote. The amendment passed by voice vote.

Discussion followed on Article VI as amended.

Mr. Rvan noted that the Factfinder's Report was not recommended by either the Budget Committee or the School Board, and that in the course of negotiations, the School Board had offered another 3% in addition to step increases, and this was turned down by the Association.

Mrs. Loughman stated that by law this Factfinder's Report had to be submitted to the District for a vote because the two bodies did not agree. If this Factfinder's Report is defeated, negotiations will have to begin again, at a cost of approximately \$1,500.

The figure of 9% raise this year and 9% next year caused quite a bit of discussion. It was also pointed out that the teachers received at least a 3% step increase every year whether the District voted for it or not.

Pertaining to whether the School Board acts as the District voted, both Charles Buhrman and Raymond Bernier asked about the \$35,000 warrant article last year requesting the District to pay the balance of the construction costs of the new addition. Defeated by the District, it was paid, nevertheless, by the School Board.

Mr. Retchless explained that the Town contracted services to build onto the school, and they were obligated to pay this bill. It was paid out of surplus funds upon advice of Counsel, to avoid law suits.

Benefits add a considerable amount to salaries. Medical coverage for a single person is \$1,996; for a two-person family, \$3,394; and for a family, \$4,582. Dental coverage is \$224 per year, and life insurance for the entire staff is \$129.63 a month.

Robert Waddell, as a former member of the School Board, said he was well aware of the low pay the teachers received, especially on the lower end, but he thought increasing the pay by 9% was out of line. If this Article passed, it would add \$3 per \$1,000 to the tax rate.

Mrs. Suzanne Maloof spoke in favor of the Article. She said that the Fremont voters were always willing to pay to build beautiful facilities, but were rarely willing to pay for the teachers who work in them. Teachers are due more respect and more money from the voters of Fremont, she said.

By petition, a secret ballot was asked for. Voting followed by the Checklist. The votes were counted by the Clerk, Barbara Baker, Matthew Thomas, and Peter Lamb. 154 citizens voted. No: 103; Yes: 51. The Article was defeated.

ARTICLE VII

To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Donald Ryan made the motion to raise \$2,067,052 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Seconded by Mary Stiner.

Donald Ryan moved to amend the Article to read \$2,081,193, for the support of schools, payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

Seconded by Douglas Murphy.

Mr. Ryan explained that the difference in this figure was the salary for a remedial reading teacher, a position already in existence. \$6,000 of the salary is funded by the Federal Government, and the School Board felt that this position was definitely needed.

Mr. Retchless added that the SAU had originally requested a remedial reading teacher and a math/media coordinator, but because of the necessity of making some administrative cuts, they eliminated the position of the math/media coordinator. However, when the figures were presented to the Budget Committee, they thought the figure was only for a math/media coordinator, and they eliminated the position. This amendment would reinstate the salary for the reading teacher.

Amendment was passed 78 to 43.

Mr. Jim Allen of the Budget Committee proposed amending the figure to \$2,038,752, which represents the figure of \$2,067,052 minus \$28,300.

Seconded by Robert Horsburgh.

Mr. Allen explained that the Budget Committee had gone over the School Budget line by line. The School Board had requested an increase in the hours of the physical education, music and art teachers, which amount to a 100% increase in salary, and the Committee voted to hold them to only step increases.

Mr. Retchless stated that the increase in hours for these three positions would make it possible for someone to supervise the children during the regular teachers' lunch hour, which is guaranteed in their contract.

Doreen Heselton stated that the Ellis School did not meet minimum standard for physical education, and Mrs. Murphy, School Secretary stated

that one physical education class had 50 students in it. Mr. Allen mentioned that some classes in the school had as few as 15 students per class, and that it might be more cost effective to have fewer teachers and pay them more money.

Mr. Retchless responded that in the seventh grade, one class had 11 students and the other 15, but that was because we had lost several students during the course of the year. The average class has 20 students.

The question was moved. A hand vote followed. 79 voted no; 47, yes. The amendment as moved by James Allen of the Budget Committee was defeated.

Further discussion followed on original Article as amended by the School Board. This figure represents a 9% increase over last year.

Mr. Marquis asked why the SAU figures usually increased by 16% per year.

Mr. Retchless stated that the figure of \$58,981, as shown in the budget, was an increase of 13% and is based on population, growth and assessed value of the town. Chester and Fremont between them carry approximately 50% of the cost of the SAU and Epping carries the balance. He mentioned, also, that there is a bill before the Legislature to change the way towns vote in the SAU, which would eliminate the effect of Epping's vote over Fremont and Chester.

Voting proceeded. The Article as amended was passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE VIII

To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Mary Stiner moved the Article as read. Seconded by Robert Rydeen.

Discussion arose on the problems with the addition and the additional costs. Was it possible to initiate a law suit against the Architect, whom most felt was at fault.

Mrs. Loughman responded that this was still being investigated by the SAU, and all the figures were not in. She added that if a mistake is discovered in time, such as the sprinkler system (which is a safety requirement), and you didn't have to pay more than you would have if it had been installed originally, then you haven't suffered any damage, and you do not have a case.

Mr. Maloof, who was a member of the School Board during construction, stated that the Architect cost us more money by his poor design, by his lack of knowledge regarding codes and approvals, and finally, he was, in Mr. Maloof's opinion, a very inadequate architect. He added that we don't have to wait for the facts; the facts are in.

Mr. Retchless felt that the addition to the school was a sore spot with this District. He then proceeded to read the figures concerning the construction, including all the change orders, which results in all the

additional expenses. Some of these were problems of design, some were asked for by the School Board, and some by the community, all at a cost to the Town.


After more discussion, Robert Rydeen made the motion that the Board seek legal redress against anyone guilty of malfeasance with regard to the building project. The motion was seconded.

After further discussion, Mr. Allen moved the question, and the amendment was passed by voice vote.

A record of all figures regarding the school construction is on file with the SAU and the School District Clerk, and is available to any taxpayer.

The Moderator asked for a motion to adjourn. Motion was made and seconded. Meeting adjourned at 11:20 p.m.

To the Members of the School Board

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Fremont School District and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 1990, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Asset Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Account Group results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Fremont School District at June 30, 1990, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the School District at June 30, 1990, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Children are our nation's most precious asset, and they are the most important people at the Ellis School. Our first priority is to help children feel better about themselves by improving their self-esteem. Most teachers work at this on a daily basis in the classroom while our guidance counselor works in this area with children who are in great need or reassurance.

As an observer during the past three months, it is my opinion that children are learning, and as more children from special education are being mainstreamed, their morale is improving as well as the overall morale of the entire student body. Interdisciplinary education continues to thrive at all levels and between most subject areas. The application of the whole language process continues to grow in grades one through five. Students in the fourth grade are being taught research skills and how to write a report. Children in grade five have been using their writing skills by communicating with some of our servicemen in Saudi Arabia. Children at all grade levels continue to use the time tested writing process. Novels are being read and integrated into the history units. For the second consecutive year, children in grades six through eight have participated in the Continental Mathematics League competing against several other schools and showing improvement each year.

We are extremely grateful to the many parents who have assisted us in correcting papers, working with some children discussing social issues and for the many donations of supplies and hardware. Additionally, the members of the PTA have worked hard to help the children at Ellis. We would also like to thank the Lions Club and members of the School Board for their help in bringing in the Skills For Adolescence program.

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOL'S REPORT

The 1990-91 school year was one that saw the SAU and Local Districts engage in a restructuring of the superintendent's office as well as the individual schools themselves.

An effort has been made to develop a collaborative model where our children are in the center and our decisions are based on student needs. In using this model we have worked very hard to have shared decision making between parents, school board members, administrators, and staff.

Our building principals and Dr. Brown, Assistant Superintendent, have been working on improving our curriculum and instruction in each of the districts. The result of their efforts is a clear long range plan which will continue to improve our schools.

The effort to improve the physical plants in each of the districts has resulted in accountability for the condition and cleanliness of the buildings. However, each of our communities need to plan for growth over the next five years.

Special Education continues to be an area that needs restructuring to bring students into the mainstream, improve programs and develop an accountability to the public. This past year, the position of Director of Special Education was removed from the local districts and placed in the central office directly under the supervision of the superintendent.

We are currently working administratively to develop a plan which will allow for more mainstreaming and less out-of-district placements. The final component the communities need to look at is public kindergarten which would address many of the developmental problems which later appear as special needs.

The office of the superintendent will continue to work with each of the communities to develop educational opportunities for their children and encourage parents and citizens of our communities to contact us with their concerns.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

The past year has been one in which significant changes have occurred. The school-age population in the district has grown almost explosively as the consequence of past housing booms. The property tax burden and budget requirements for providing education have not grown as fast. Although the increased size of the school board has increased the work load of its individual members, I believe eventually it will improve the representation and responsiveness of the board to its constituents.

Personally, I regret that the district and its teachers have as yet been unable to reach agreement on a new contract. One consequence of this failure has been an unrealistically low labor cost which distorts the proportions of the budget.

The board wishes to express its collective appreciation to all the members of the community who have taken the time and made the effort to make their views known and participate in the administration of our schools.
