REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The following report for the school year ending March 1, 1887, is respectfully submitted:

School No. 1. Two terms, taught by Miss Emma M. Forrest. Miss Forrest is a teacher of considerable experience. Her order in both terms was excellent, and the improvement made was of the highest order.

School No. 2. The summer term was taught by Jas. S. Mooney. Owing to the very small number of scholars attending this term, it was thought best not to continue it after the third week. The improvement for the time was very good. The fall term was taught by Miss Emma M. Forrest. In this school Miss Forrest maintained her former good reputation, and the school was a profitable one.

School No 3. There was one term, taught by Mrs. Emma J. Long. Mrs. Long is a fine scholar, and has a very pleasant way in the school-room. Her order was good, and the improvement made was very good indeed.

School No. 4. Two terms, taught by Elmer Towle. The first term of this school appeared well. The order was good, and the improvement made very fair; but we are sorry to say that the last term was not so profitable as we could wish.

School No. 5. Two terms, taught by Mrs. Fannie F. Knowles. Mrs. Knowles has formerly taught in this school

with good success, and we are happy to say that in these two terms she has more than maintained her former good reputation as a teacher.

School No. 6. The summer term was taught by Miss Millie R. Pearson. Miss Pearson has many qualifications which commend her as a teacher of children, and her success in this school was very good. The second term was taught by Miss Lizzie Libby. Miss Libby has taught several terms in this school with good success. We are happy to say that in this term both teacher and scholars were deeply interested, and the result was a very profitable school.

School No. 7. Two terms, taught by Miss Nora B. Allard. Miss Allard is a young teacher of considerable promise, and her services in this school were successful.

School No. 8. One term, taught by Miss Nettie E. Kenerson. This was Miss Kenerson's first school, and, the scholars being small and the number few, she did not have much chance to distinguish herself as a teacher.
