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

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ABSTRACT OF THE 1983 TOWN MEETING

Article 1. Results of the Voting:

Article 1A. It was voted that the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43F for the adjusted elderly exemption from property tax. This statute provides for the following exemptions based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000, or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence.

Article 3. The Town voted to authorize the withdrawal from Revenue Sharing Funds the following amounts:

Article 4. The Town voted to dissolve the Capital Reserve Fund marked "Fire Station Lot" which was established April 10, 1970, and contained a balance of \$977.43 plus accrued interest. This was in accordance with State law since Capital Reserve Funds cannot be established for land acquisition.

Article 5. The Town voted to allocate any funds from the above amendment (Article 4) to be used to purchase a flush toilet & holding tank for the Fire Department.

Article 6. The Town voted to form a committee to look into repairs needed on the body of the 1965 International Fire Truck. The committee to report back to the 1984 Town Meeting. The Selectmen to select the three persons for this committee.

Article 7. The Town voted to adopt the following as a permanent Animal Control Ordinance for the Town:

"Animals defined: Animals shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, sheep, goats, cattle, horses and swine. "Whosoever, being the owner or custodian of such animal, shall allow such animal to be at large or unlawfully upon the property of another shall be liable for all costs incurred in abating the nuisance created by such animal. Costs incurred in abating the nuisance created by such animal shall be directly payable to the Town of Marlow.

"Whosoever, being the owner or custodian of a dog, shall allow such dog to be in violation of the 1979 adopted By-Law entitled "Dog Ordinance", shall be liable for all costs incurred in abating said violation. Costs incurred in abating the violation shall be directly payable to the Town of Marlow."

Article 8. The Town voted to ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U.S. Congress to:

"Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries."

Article 9. The Town voted to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Marlow and to the health and welfare of the people of Marlow.

Article 10. The Town voted to pass the following amendment:

"At any town, general, national or other election, and during the hours that polling stations are open, the following will not be allowed to physically campaign less than 50 feet in any direction from the exterior of the structure designated as the polling place:

a) candidates, their workers or representatives; or

 b) supporters for any amendment, resolution or warrant article appearing on the ballot.

"Further no literature, brochures, signs, etc. relating to either a candidate, amendment, resolution or warrant article shall be distributed or made available to voters in any manner within such 50 feet, nor shall such be affixed to any part of the structure designated as the place of polling."

Article 11. The Town voted to authorize the Selectmen to investigate the best possible financial arrangements for a possible reappraisal in 1985. The results of their action to be presented to the Town at the 1984 Town Meeting.

Article 12. The Town defeated an article asking for the Road Agent position to be an elected position rather than an appointed position.

Article 13. The Town defeated an article asking for a return to the once a year annual tax billing.

Article 14. The Town voted to include in its published Annual Report of the Town of Marlow, a Grand List of Property Owners (Land & Buildings), Assessed Value, Taxes Due, and Abatements Issued.

Article 15. The Town defeated an article asking to do away with the annual Inventory Report of Taxable Property (RSA 74).

Article 16. Vote of thanks was given to the Boy Scouts for handing out the Annual Report. And a vote of thanks was given to the Selectmen for doing a good job.

Article 17. Vote of thanks was given Jean Chambers for serving as Town Clerk this past year.

Article 18. A question was raised about flowers around the monument to our War Veterans. It was felt the money raised for Patriotic Purposed should include the planting of flowers around the monument out of respect for our war dead.

After the votes are counted, the meeting will recess until Saturday, the 17th day of March, at 10:00 a.m. in the forenoon, at Jones Hall to act upon the following subjects:

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing, and make appropriations of the same, as set forth in the following budget:

TOTAL REVENUE SHARING FUNDS AVAILABLE (Includes carry over and an estimated \$6,000 in new money)

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$6,000.00 plus interest from the Capital Reserve Hopper Sander Fund for the purchase of a hopper sand and salt spreader. (Note: as of December 31, 1983 there was \$6,000.00 plus interest in the fund.) There is \$3,000.00 budgeted as a capital reserve item for 1984 and if passed the sander would be procured by the Fall of 1984. This item was discussed in detail when the voters approved the capital reserve funds for 1983. (2/3 VOTE REQUIRED.)

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept the 1977 Dodge Van Ambulance (Vin# B35BF7X035988) procured by the Marlow Fire Department Ambulance and Rescue Squad during 1983, which replaced the Cadillac ambulance. (Note: sale of 1971 Cadillac was authorized at the 1980 Town Meeting, Article 7.)

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to have all property in the Town reevaluated/reappraised during 1984, at an estimated cost of \$17,900.00. To authorize the withdrawal of \$2,097.00 plus interest, from the Capital Reserve Reappraisal Fund; and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow not more than \$15,803.00 by the issuance of notes to be repaid over a three (3) year period for this purpose. (2/3 VOTE BY WRITTEN BALLOT REQUIRED.)

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to commence a special three (3) year program of cold-patching and asphalt sealing and sanding of the 6.8 miles of paved roads in the Town. The first increment to be 2.3 miles in 1984 and to authorize an additional \$12,000.00 for the Highway Department budget for this purpose.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to order the Selectmen to place a restraining order on dogs in the municipal limits of the Town, pursuant to RSA Chapter 466 Section 29-30, with a penalty of \$25.00 for second and subsequent offenses, and to make this a permanent ordinance.

Article 9. To see if the Town of Marlow will vote to authorize the Marlow Volunteer Fire Department to purchase a Tanker/Fire Truck, not to exceed \$10,000.00 as a replacement for the 1952 Reo military vehicle #106717 now serving as a tanker, and to authorize the sale or trade of the 1952 Reo with proceeds or credit going toward the purchase of a newer truck. (BY PETITION.)

Article 10. To see if the Town of Marlow will vote to withdraw \$6,263.00 plus interest from the Capital Reserve Fire Truck Fund. Capital Reserve Funds to be applied toward the purchase of Tanker Fire Truck. (BY PETITION.) (2/3 VOTE BY WRITTEN BALLOT.) Article 11. To see if the Town of Marlow will vote to authorize the Marlow Volunteer Fire Department to accomplish the necessary repairs on the 1965 International Fire Truck. The price not to exceed \$5,288.00. (BY PETITION.)

Article 12. To see if the Town of Marlow shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Marlow, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire. (BY PETITION.)

Article 13. To act upon any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Balance - December 31 172.90 (1983) Dear Neighbors,

We in the Selectmen's office have spent another year attempting to balance necessity against expense. The results are recorded in this town report. On these pages we describe some of the accomplishments of the past year, some of our concerns, and what problems and involvements loom ahead for the town in 1984 and beyond. Marlow is indeed growing, and the demands of growth must be met.

As indicated in the budget the items shown as Duncan, TRA. Highway Subsidy, no longer exist. During 1983 these programs were replaced by the new Highway Block Grant Aid Program, and allocated to the towns on a yearly basis. Part of the funds are allocated on the basis of one-half mileage and one-half population as the town factors bear on the state total. The rest is based on a formula using equalized valuation and Class V mileage to give the greatest benefit to the low valuation towns with high road mileage, similar to the TRA formula previously used. Further, the manner in which the funds are applied is left entirely to the individual towns to use as they see fit and no special reports are required, at the present. We have chosen to follow State standards on all highway projects and will continue to receive Department of Public Works assistance in planning and areas requiring engineering help. The cardinal rule is that the towns cannot use the funds to offset taxes, but, rather must apply them against equal or greater highway appropriations. So far we are very pleased with the revenues from the State under this new method of funding.

During 1983 the Selectmen, under the authority of RSA 231, added 1.42 miles of Class V roads to our inventory. This was reported to the Department of Public Works and Highways, Concord, for recording by Division 7 State Aid Supervisor. Included were about 1/4 mile extension to the Marlow Hill road beyond the Frank Hardy place (Old Foote Farm); about 1/4 mile of the so-called Short Road; and the Muster Field Heights Road. A member of the road Committee, the Road Agent, and a Division 7 engineer determined their acceptability. The additional mileage will provide for more Block Grant aid in 1986.

Unfortunately in 1983 the town had more than its share of nearly impassable roads during the Spring thaw plus subsequent washouts due to heavy rains. One of the worst areas was the Marlow Hill road from Route 10 to the Bailey and Jackson properties. We had hoped to delay the TRA project on the Marlow Hill road until 1985; however, the serious condition of this road coupled with the volume of traffic it accommodates, including the school bus, necessitated immediate permanent upgrading. A major portion of this road was brought up to TRA specifications. This included clearing and ditching; drainage improvement (new culverts and runoffs); widening the travel-way with shoulders; and substantial gravel buildup. Maximum use was made of Town equipment to reduce rental costs, plus we were fortunate to have the assistance of Division 7 personnel and an experienced retired State Highway Department section chief to supervise the work. Accomplishing this project necessitated overspending the highway appropriation by \$18,762.00. Fortunately, we had \$13,470.00 in escrow from prior year Duncan Fund and TRA carry-over which considerably reduced the financial drawdown.

A lot of time and effort were expended developing cost data and plans for improvement of Jones Hall and to finish the Fire House through Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Grants. We found that small towns were discriminated against since most funds are allocated to inner city or urban projects. Our concerns were made known, officially, to Senators Humphrey and Rudman, as well as to Congressman Gregg, to no avail. However, we drafted a Public Building Project for Jones Hall and the Fire Station for Community Development and Jobs Bill Grant totaling \$60,000. The program is administered by the State and their guidelines indicated that applicants must meet threshold requirements for low and moderate income families. Marlow's median income per family from the 1979 census (\$17,935) factored to 1983 level (33%) pushed it to \$23,907. Applying HUD and State point value for percentages of low and moderate income families that would benefit from the program, the resulting figure of \$19,125 was too high for a project to be scored. Further, we were also cut-out because of not being in a depressed area such as Sullivan County and Coos County. Perhaps some other avenue can be followed in the future when and if Jones Hall is placed on the National Historical Register.

Insurance was a major concern to us during 1983, particularly the level of coverage for Jones Hall, the Fire Station and Town Office; as well as a Police Liability policy and increased coverage for the 1977 Dodge Van ambulance, plus, a separate Workman's Compensation policy for the ambulance attendants and drivers. The latter was brought about by a new category of rating per ambulance. The Board of Selectmen felt that it was a Town responsibility to cover the ambulance just as it does the Fire Department personnel and equipment. The Workman's Comp policy for the ambulance carries a premium of \$1,315 annually and \$300 for the vehicle coverage. Since the Workman's Comp covers attendants from Gilsum, Stoddard, East Alstead, as well as Marlow while working on the ambulance, we also felt that those towns should share the burden of the premium. Alstead voted and gave the Marlow Rescue and Ambulance Squad \$1,000 last year and will probably do the same this year. It is understood that Stoddard is also proposing \$1,000 for the Squad in their Warrant and Gilsum is proposing \$350 for its share. By agreement with the Marlow Fire Department Ambulance and Rescue Squad the Selectmen authorized payment of the policies and when the Squad is in receipt of funds from the three towns it will reimburse the Town \$1,050, which is reflected in the proposed budget.

It is appropriate, here, to also extend thanks to the Ambulance Group for giving the Town the furnace and oil tank from the old ambulance shed. This unit was removed and installed in the Highway Garage by the highway people. It makes a safer and more efficient backup system to the work burning unit that is being used most of the time. As voters and residents know, the ambulance is now housed in the Fire Department building. As voted for at last year's Town Meeting, Revenue Sharing Funds were used to accomplish major repair and improvement of the Jones Hall and Town office building (red school). The roof of the Jones Hall was completely reshingled on the Rt. 123 side and substantially repaired on the Church St. side. Storm windows were installed on the Rt. 123 side. The red school received blown insulation on three sides and its cellar was completely insulated using fiberglass insulation.

We are suggesting that Revenue Sharing Funds again be voted to be utilized in continuing the repair and insulation of these valuable town buildings.

At this point in time we find it necessary to inform you that the spirit of volunteerism in Marlow is gravely ill and, barring an unforeseen turnaround, is likely to suffer its complete demise in the very near future. Unfortunate as this situation appears, it is never-the-less understandable. The demands placed upon individuals in our current society are legion and the dearness of one's time increases. Fewer and fewer are willing or able to give freely of their time and efforts to their community. Those who do serve expect renumeration. Fortunately our volunteer fire and ambulance personnel are a happy exception. However, at some point down the road small towns such as Marlow will undoubtedly find themselves employing professionals at competitive salaries to accomplish what had previously been accomplished by our neighbors gratis or for a token wage.

Selectmen in particular find the ever increasing demands of their office placed upon it by the complexity of laws, deadlines and general management functions require upwards of 15 to 20 hours a week from each member to fulfill. It is not inconceivable to consider that the performance of these tasks might be better accomplished by a paid professional in this field possessing the skills and expertise not readily available locally. In this regard we are currently investigating the concept of employing a "circuit riding" town manager in conjunction with neighboring towns. The cost of this position would be borne by the towns involved according to an agreeable formula. This method is already functioning on a limited basis in both Maine and New Hampshire. Obviously much more study is required regarding its feasibility for us, however, if and when a suitable plan can be developed along these lines we shall present it to you for consideration.

Another aid in improving the efficiency of town functions in the future would be a computer system. Storing all of our tax related information in a computer might greatly facilitate the preparation of our bills and the updating of our pertinent data. The Board has given this avenue cursory consideration, however, to date we are not satisfied with any available program. However, we hope to work out some arrangement with the Marlow School District for after school hour use of the grant-aid Apple computer package.

As those of you who keep abreast of regional concerns through the local media are aware, the future disposal of solid waste poses a serious, and at present unresolved, problem for southwestern N.H. in general and Marlow in particular. As mandated by legislature, New Hampshire was divided up into several solid waste

management districts. Marlow belongs to the Southwest Solid Waster Management District. The overall objective of the district is to find a viable alternative to the individual town dumps and landfills. This will undoubtedly be accomplished through a combination of methods which will probably involve segregation of materials, recycling, compacting and transporting to a central plant designed to convert burnable materials into energy. At present much has been investigated, but little has been resolved. What is certain, however, is the fact that the current disposal sites, including Marlow's, cannot go on indefinitely. Our dump, which we have taken for granted for years, and which costs around \$2,000 annually to run, will eventually be replaced by other means of disposal which may cost ten times as much to accomplish. And although we will probably be allowed to continue with our present system until alternative methods become available and workable, we must, unfortunately, look towards the day when the cost of disposing of our waste refuse will represent a major portion of our annual budget.

In closing we extend our gratitude and appreciation to all those Townspeople who gave of their time and energy, both individually and as members of committees, in helping us make small town government work. In particular we wish to thank the members of our Advisory Budget Committee who sacrificed a good many evenings at home in order to assist us in the development of the 1984 budget. Whether you accept it, alter and amend it, or simply reject it. please bear in mind that it was not arrived at lightly.

Please attend Town Meeting, participate in our deliberations and vote as your conscience and judgement dictates. This is our legislative process, your opinions and your votes do make a difference. And although to an outsider our meetings may seem quaint and archaic, this simple down-to-earth method of government does work. After more than two hundred years a better system has yet to be devised.

In September of 1983 the building currently known as Jones Hall in Marlow was nominated to the National Register of Historic Places. If accepted, this building will become eligible for future federal grants, if available. The nomination application and material were prepared by the staff of the Southwest Region Planning Commission and represented a great amount of time and research.

Those of us who call Marlow home have come to take our old Jones Hall for granted with little thought given to its past history. This is indeed a grave oversight; for the history of this venerable old building is, in essence, the history of Marlow.

We have, therefore, taken the liberty to reprint excerpts from the nomination documentation for the public interest.

"Jones Hall has played a major role in Marlow's successive stages of settlement as well as in the town's often turbulent ecclesiastical history.

"By 1792 the residents of Marlow Hill were able to exert sufficient influence in town meeting to authorize the building of a meetinghouse there. Despite this vote to build a meetinghouse, the town refused at this and subsequent meetings to raise any money for the building, mainly because Marlow was no longer primarily a Baptist community as sizable groups of Methodists, Universalists and Congregationalists had come to settle there.

"The building was begun in 1792, however it took at least eight years to complete due to the difficulty of raising money from private investors and the refusal of the town to appropriate money for this purpose. The Methodists eventually gained control of the Meetinghouse as their numbers increased, although occasional Baptist, Congregational and Universalist services were no doubt held there as well.

"By the 1820's a new group, known as the Christian Brethren, formed as an offshoot of the Methodist Church. By 1827 they gained control of the Meetinghouse through the purchase of pews, subscriptions for which originally paid for the construction. Throughout this time town meetings were also held in the building.

"By the 1830's a third village center developed along the Ashuelot river. Despite such derisive names as South Marlow, Poverty Plains and Sodom, which the Hill people used in referring to the new village, it grew and prospered at the expense of the Marlow Hill settlement. In 1840 a stormy town meeting, the last to be held on the Hill, adjourned to the new village where it was to be held from that point on.

"In 1845 the Christian Brethren, who had adopted the official title "Christian Union Society" moved their meetinghouse to the new village where it became known as the Christian Church, and was used until the 1890's by both the Christian Union Society and the Universalists.

"In 1890 the building was acquired by John Jones and his son, Elgin. After extensive renovation the building was deeded to the town in 1897 by the Jones family with the restriction that dancing be prohibited within it forever; a final reminder of the building's long and diverse religious tradition."

REPORT

REAPPRAISAL/REEVALUATION OF PROPERTY

Article 11 of the 1983 Town Meeting Warrant regarding reappraisal of property in 1985, was passed by the voters. The Selectmen were to investigate the best financial arrangements. Following the 1983 Meeting, invitations for quotations were sent to eleven (11) New Hampshire based appraisal firms/individuals as well as the Division of Revenue Administration (DRA), State of New Hampshire, which conducted the 1975 evaluation. In addition, one out-of-state firm, United Appraisal Company, East Hartford, Connecticut was also contacted. All firms/individuals were on the State approved list of appraisers. The results of the invitations afforded only two (2) quotations:

Division of Revenue Administration	\$21,550.00
United Appraisal Company	17,900.00

DIFFERENCE

Both proposals were discussed with DRA, as late as January 27, 1984 and assurance was given that United was considered a reputable firm with experience in New Hampshire having recently done work in Portsmouth, Amherst and others. Further, DRA will not lower their estimate to be competitive. Since the savings are significant, the Selectmen feel that the best financial arrangement is to go with United.

The contract will be reviewed and approved by DRA, and DRA will, in accordance with RSA 72-24A, oversee the contract working with the Selectmen. The aim would be to have all properties in the Town reevaluated with data completed for computation of the 1984 Tax Rate and second half Tax Bill. The suggestion to voters to do this reappraisal in 1984 is based on the fact that the Town's tax base is only \$7.9 million and the assessment rate is 58% of fair market value, comparing October 82 - October 83 sales. Since all assessments consider 1975 cost factors, assessments in relation to actual sales are distorted. Most sales fell between 50% and 70% with some properties as low as 25% to 30% of fair market value. No sales were at current assessment for tax purposes. Several are assessed at \$18,300, yet sold for \$60,000, or assessed at \$1,800 and sold for \$7,500. The general rule of thumb experience factor is that reevaluations will provide 1/3 of properties going up, 1/3 or more staying the same, and about 1/3 going down.

The reevaluation/appraisal requires \$450,000 increase in the tax base to make the proposal cost effective. Since there is the possibility that there would be at least a 1/3 increase it would result in a \$2.4 million addition to the tax base.

The Selectmen request that the voters give this matter their utmost consideration, and the article for reappraisal of property in 1984 be passed.

First of all we would like to thank all who donated to the Library - rugs, books, money and time. We are still looking for rugs and bookcases. We would also like a copier. We feel this would be a great help to everyone. We are trying to earn some funds through our coffee shops. Any additional help or donations would be most appreciated.

1983 has been a busy year. We received the bequest money of \$20,000 from the estate of Russell Perkins. We have spent some time exploring the possibilities for the use of this money with the advice of the Town's attorney. We are at the present time awaiting a reply on how the money may be spent. As you may remember, the will stated that this would be for the building of a new library. We have requested the Town's attorney, Douglas Green, to look into what "building" a new library constitutes - construction from the ground up or renovating a building making it "new". As the legal proceedings of contacting legatees is time consuming, we are still awaiting a reply. Our first step in this matter has been to clarify what "building a library for the Town Of Marlow" actually means. When this has been decided we will be choosing a committee to study all the possibilities. The check is in a bank account until such time as needed. Mr. Green has promised the estate lawyer the money would "wait" until the issue has been resolved.

The Trustees of the Library are busy putting together a list of names with various skills that we hope will be involved in a "New Library Committee". Our projected plans depend upon the outcome of the wording. We are also interested in applying for the different building grants or funds available for libraries. This will be time-consuming but we would welcome anyone willing to make the commitment to an in-depth study for our new Marlow Library.

This year the State closed its doors on the bookmobile program. Fortunately we were allowed to take about 700 of these books for our own Library. Still, the bookmobile out of operation does not give us the circulation of shelf books that we've enjoyed in the past. Also many of these "new to us" volumes are older books and we were unable to acquire many children's titles. The bookmobile service is one that will be truly missed.

Each year the Library tries to offer the community recreational and enriching programs. This past year is no exception. We held a knitting and crocheting class in the early part of the 'year thanks to Mrs. Gendron's skills. Unfortunately few people participated. However, she will be returning to try again. There is also a possibility of a quilting class in the near future.

In March the Library held another of its "Coffee Shops" where the Library raises funds and the community can socialize and enjoy a variety of goodies. The Library held an open house in April with Andy Davis from Acworth entertaining us with his folk music and ballads.

In June the Library was able to honor Pat Strickland, our Librarian, in a community dinner sponsored by many different organizations in respect to her and Jim's participation in our Town. This summer was our third year sponsoring a craft class for the children and our Pac-Man Summer reading program was a success.

The Cabin Fever Group of young children and their parents meet every other Wednesday morning, Perkins School students visit on alternate weeks and Marlow Pre-School also visit. We are very pleased with the numbers of books circulated by the elementary students - usually over 100 a week. We hope to continue their interest in reading as they continue through their school years and as adults.

Gerry Plotts volunteers when the school visits and Alice Scharf is a great help in continuing the Cabin Fever Group. Their interest and support of the Marlow Library programs is much appreciated.

We are thankful to have the excellent services of our RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Program) volunteer for another year. Irene Streeter from Surry spends several hours each week helping with library tasks. At present she is cataloging the bookmobile books which is quite a chore in itself. Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year. No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

They include 24-hour emergency service, day treatment and inpatient services provided in cooperation with Cheshire Hospital, specialized services to patients returning from long-term hospitalization as well as consultation and education services. Case Management services, psychological/psychiatric testing, and housing services are also services provided by Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service.

These services are primarily supported with state monies which, combined with local support and fees, make it possible for the agency to provide comprehensive mental health services to southwestern New Hampshire.

Effective January 1, 1984, New Hampshire Statute mandated that the ex-officio member (Selectman) should not serve as Chairman of the Planning Board of a community. In compliance with this statute, Joseph N. Feuer resigned as Chairman of the Board and I have accepted the post and am therefore submitting this report.

The residents of Marlow have indeed been fortunate to have had Joseph serve as Chairman. He has a love of community, a wealth of knowledge and a busy telephone to attest to his dedication to our Town. He will remain as a member of the board continuing, I'm sure, with his wise counsel. Charlie Strickland, of course, provides us newcomers with the same wisdom and sound judgement as Joseph. We are now working with a full complement of members, Michael Carlin having rejoined our board in 1983.

We had one major subdivision during 1983, that of Leeward Holdings, Inc. comprising over 1800 acres. A subdivision into 6 parcels was granted although there is a boundary dispute regarding one parcel.

In 1983 the Master Plan was adopted by the Planning Board after public review by the residents of Marlow. It will serve as our guideline in judging the merits of the future growth of Marlow. Copies of the Plan are still available at the Town Offices for a fee of \$5.00.

In conjunction with the adoption of the Master Plan and in order to implement its recommendations, the Board is now in the process of reviewing and revising the Zoning Ordinances. This is a long, slow process in which we are studying the recommendations of the Southwest Region Planning Commission, keeping in mind what is in the best interests of the Town of Marlow and its residents both for present and future growth. In 1970 Marlow had a population of almost 400. In 1984 we are fast approaching the 600 mark with continued growth almost a certainty.

Zoning ordinances are not designed to deprive anyone of their rights, but rather to provide guidelines for the orderly growth of the community while still attempting to retain the rural nature of the Town which so many of our residents have indicated is one of its prime assets.

All the members of the Planning Board urge your participation in this process. Call us on the phone, come to our public hearings, make your ideas known so we can better serve you in developing the revised ordinances. We need your input and your confidence. We are going forward with this process hoping to provide Marlow with Zoning Ordinances which, in conjunction with the Master Plan, are tailored to the needs and desires of the <u>majority</u> of the residents of our Town as it continues to grow.

REPORT ON MARLOW'S MEMBERSHIP IN THE SOUTHWEST REGION PLANNING COMMISSION

Marlow is a member of the Southwest Region Planning Commission which maintains offices in Keene and provides a diversity of technical assistance and services through its professional staff. The Commission has, traditionally, worked with Planning Boards, Boards of Selectmen and Boards of Adjustment in responding to the myriad questions and concerns relating to growth and development in its member communities. It has provided professional staff assistance in the preparation of master plans, zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations, site plan regulations and review, and has offered interpretations and opinions in deciding matters brought before these various agencies and boards. Marlow has called upon the staff for such assistance on numerous occasions, and is currently utilizing the talents of these professionals in rewriting the Town zoning ordinances.

More recently, the Commission has diversified its services to member towns in the establishment of such cost-effective programs as cooperative purchasing which brings together the purchasing requirements of many towns in order to have a greater impact in the marketplace and, thus, obtain better purchase prices. At present Marlow is purchasing its gasoline, #2 fuel oil and diesel oil through this purchasing agreement at substantial savings to the taxpayers.

The Commission is also coordinating and assisting the Southwest Solid Waste Management District, of which Marlow is a member, in its efforts to find a feasible solution to the area's garbage disposal dilemma as mandated by State law.

All these valuable benefits and services are covered by the nominal annual dues we pay as a member community of the Southwest Region Planning Commission, just another example of tax dollars well spent in making Marlow an affordable and desirable place to live.
