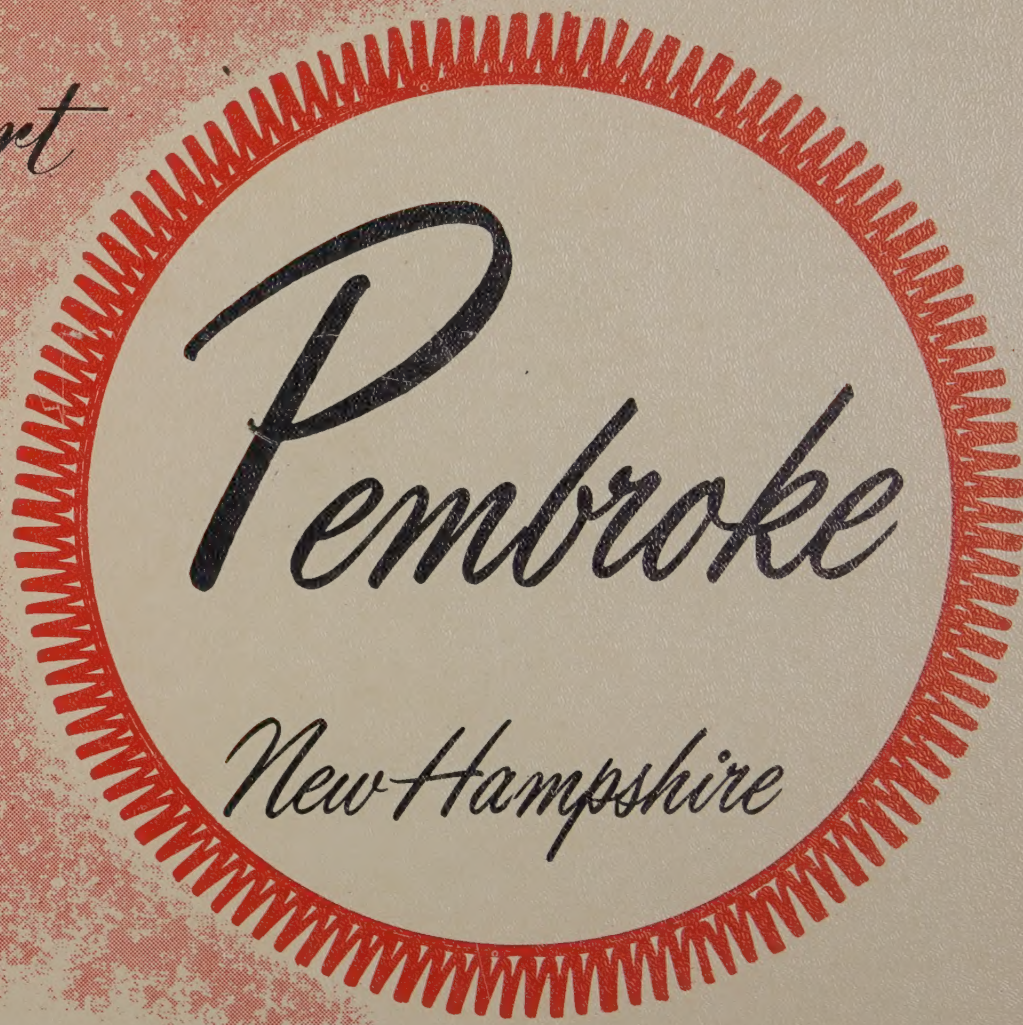

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PEMBROKE IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN THE TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after September 1, 1962, on all unpaid poll taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.
6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in this Town.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:
 - (a) The Henry T. Simpson Fund of Two hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Simpson Lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
 - (b) The John Sullivan Fund of Two hundred fifty (\$250.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Sullivan Lot in Pembroke Street Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application, in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amended, and to enter into such negotiations and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in an amount not to exceed Seventeen thousand (\$17,000.00) Dollars, to be made by the United States to the Town of Pembroke to aid in defraying the cost of surveys, reports and plan preparation for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of Pembroke. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to make necessary repairs to the roof of the Town Clock Tower and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five hundred (\$500.00) Dollars for this purpose. (This Article is submitted by the Budget Committee without recommendation.)

10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee consisting of the Fire Chief, the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen and the Chairman of the Planning Board to investigate possible sites for use as a sub-fire station, said committee to report its findings and recommendations at the 1963 Town meeting.

11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Road leading from old Route #28 to and across Bombay Bridge, so called, including Bombay Bridge, which road is now closed, as an open highway and made subject to gates and bars, and to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of said bridge to the best advantage of the Town.

12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Center Road to replace the street light which was removed by the Congregational Center. (This Article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)

13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain four street lights, comparable to lights located along Pembroke Street, to be located on poles at the intersection of Pembroke Street and Sherwood Meadows and in Sherwood Meadows at locations to be determined, and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds for the same. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the Budget.)

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer the sum of Twelve-hundred eighty-six Dollars and fofty cents (\$1,286.40) being the

sum of Twelve hundred eighty-six Dollars and forty cents (\$1,286.40) being the balance of the 1960 appropriation for the Whittemore Bridge, to the Capital Reserve Fund.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Bi-Centennial Committee to expend the balance of its funds, being Three hundred thirty-two Dollars and thirty-two cents (\$332.32) plus interest, for the replacement of shade trees at locations within the Town to be determined in conjunction with the Board of Selectmen. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.)

16. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or of officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

Planning Board Report

1961 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PEMBROKE PLANNING BOARD

The present Planning Board as currently organized was established February 1, 1961, and since then has held regular monthly meetings throughout the year, and several special meetings. Our Secretary, Doctor Colby, has kept a complete and thorough record of all the Board's findings; transactions and determinations. These are available to the Town's people for reference.

The work of the Board for the past year has resulted in nine recommendations which have been submitted to the Budget Committee. It is expected they will be included in the Town Warrant as Articles.

A brief explanation of each recommendation follows:

1). (Application for Federal advance for Planning Sewage and Sewage treatment facilities)

The increase in residential building starts together with several proposed large scale developments, makes it essential that immediate consideration be given this matter, not only to avoid the probable wholesale correction of improved facilities but in anticipation of the inevitable clean-up requirements of the State Water Pollution Control Commission.

2 and 3). (Town Roads)

A sub-committee of Planning Board made a tour of town roads and have recommended two sections to be improved this year. One is the elimination of deep ditch at edge of pavement on north side of Brickett Hill, road. The other is Borough Road. There has been a sufficient number of new houses built on this road to warrant its improvement.

4). (Bombay Bridge)

This bridge has been closed long enough to allow the Town to dispose of it and realize its salvage value.

5). (Sidewalks)

A five year priority list of locations for improvements has been presented to the Budget Committee, based on an annual appropriation of \$1,000 per year. They are:

- 1962 - On Front Street - (High to Exchange) - approx. 600 lin. ft.
- 1963 - On Maple Street - (High to Broadway) - approx. 1000 lin. ft.
- 1964 - On Prospect Street - (Maple to Union) - approx. 700 lin. ft.
- 1965-66 - On Pembroke Street - (Stanley Richardson house to Academy Road) - approx. 2500 lin. ft.

If this article is voted favorably, a new recommendation would be made each year in order to maintain the five year listing, and an orderly progress would be made on the most economical basis.

6). (Town Dump)

Since the existing dumping facility is limited, the town is faced with need to acquire a new site within the year. It is recommended that two sites be acquired, one for south end and one for north end of town. It is believed this will result in a saving of labor and transportation over the years that will more than offset first cost.

7). (Fire Sub-Station)

There has been much attention given this subject by several groups of towns-people including the Planning Board. The nature of some problems involved such as a sufficient number of volunteers to adequately man the station indicates more time is needed for solution. However, it is recommended that options be taken on desirable sites before prices become further enhanced by developments.

8). (Memorial Field)

The Town's investment in recreation facilities at Memorial Field has been somewhat neglected, and a recommendation has been made to put the ball field back in shape and to continue its proper maintenance. Planning adequate recreation facilities for the youth of the town should be considered an important responsibility of the towns people. In this case, however, the requirements of proposed plans indicating sewage lines and location of sewage treatment plant may affect the full use of Memorial Field for extended recreational planning.

9). (Planning Board's need for funds)

It has been found that the amount of time required to handle the various matters that are brought before the Planning Board for study, leaves little or no time to make the maps and collect the data essential to the development of the Master Plan. The Master Plan if fully developed, would show the Town's ultimate development as visualized by the Planning Board, and made valid by Town Meeting. The estimated total cost of this work is \$5,000. It is recommended that \$1,200 be appropriated this year to start the project. This year's appropriation would be used in part, to employ a Survey Party and to secure the services of a Planning Consultant, if necessary, on special problems.

Properly related to these nine recommendations, is the need for planning the orderly development of other aspects of the town's growth. In this connection the Planning Board recommends that the people of Pembroke consider the benefits that could result from a soundly conceived Zoning and Building Code Ordinance, to be applicable to the entire community.

As chairman for the past year, I wish to thank the members of the Planning Board for their attendance and loyal support, and the Board as a whole is grateful to Henry Munroe and his students at the Academy for co-operating in some preliminary plan preparations.

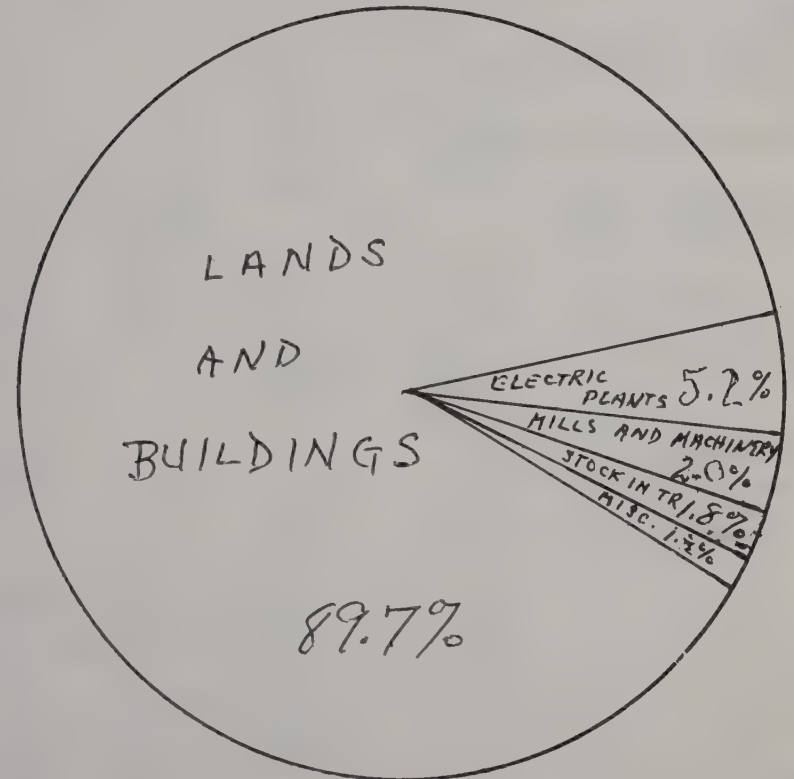
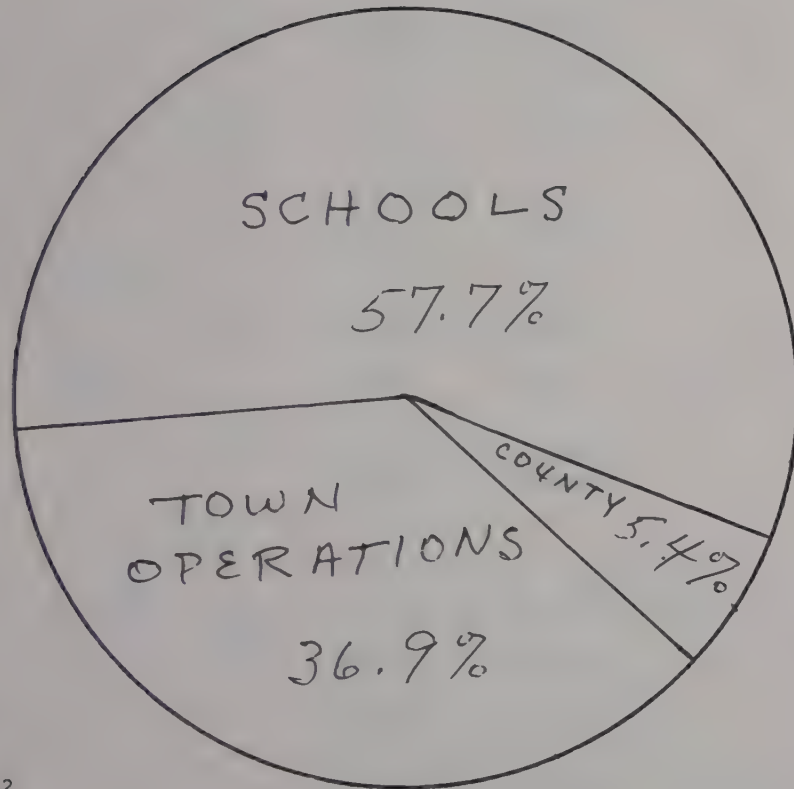

AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook - yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness - our carelessness. This, we - you - and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations - hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you -

1. Follow the warden's directions.
2. Secure the required burning permit.
3. Keep your fires under control.
4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
5. See that your children are properly cautioned.

Everyone will benefit by it.

OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

A true appraisal of Pembroke's complicated educational problems can not be made by one who has been your Superintendent for six months. On the other hand, first impressions are inevitable even if often incorrect. It is with considerable hesitancy and much modesty that I write this report. I actually feel that money spent for an educational survey by recognized experts would be money well spent.

Pembroke's educational system needs space to: 1. To replace inadequate rooms; 2. To keep class size at a reasonable figure; 3. To provide adequate cafeteria space which in turn would free the gym to be used for its natural purposes; 4. To provide for an increasing school population; 5. To eventually permit a broader educational program in grades 7-8 or 7-9, even if not an approved junior high school. Not unrelated to these problems are those of the Academy which faces similar problems with financial solutions directly involving the property owner. We hesitate to mention (and in fact will not) other desirable improvements in an educational program, because the problem of space is so paramount.

Not unrelated to Pembroke's problems are those involving expansion at the Concord Industrial Area, the future attractions of the low tax rate in Bow, the availability of many delightful building lots in Pembroke, and the lack of taxable industrial wealth. To realistically assess the educational space needs in Pembroke over a 20 year period is a frightening thing even for a non-taxpayer. A pupil census taken in September is not valid 6 months later.

SCHOOL CALENDAR - 1962-63

With the above circumstances to be considered, the State Foundation aid of \$24,657 and the 30% Building Aid of \$4,500 are most welcome. It can also be seen that much more of the same will be needed. In my opinion, there should be enough State Aid to at least stabilize the property tax rate and to permit better educational programs, some of which will need additional dollars.

It would seem desirable to purchase a significantly large site for a new school so designed that it can be easily and economically expended at whatever rate becomes necessary.

While this is being done we must not forget that the heart of a school program is the teaching staff and that we must be in a more competitive position as it becomes necessary to hire staff members.

At best the future of education in Pembroke looks most difficult and costly. In closing may I point out that a bond issue runs for 20 years but that we seldom think ahead more than half of that, and usually less.

With whatever we have we promise to work daily for an ever improving program.

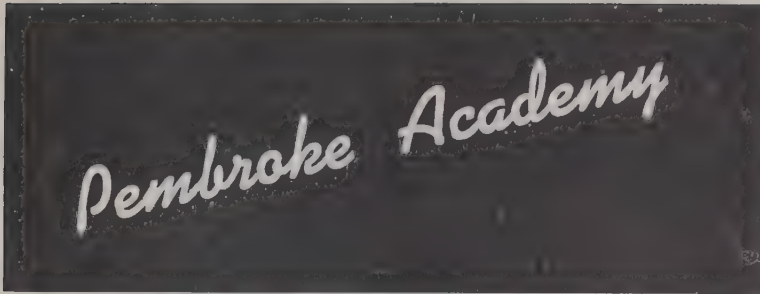

Dear Mr. Cofran:

Our enrollment jumped again this year so that we have now registered 372 pupils. This is 45 more than last year. Our previous experience would indicate that we would lose about 25 so that we would end up with 347. Actually our net loss to date is 8 and we have 364 still registered.

This means that where we planned on an increase of 25 for next year we may well have 45 more again. Our enrollment may well go over 400 for 1962-63.

An addition to our present facilities is a must if we are to maintain our present status. The plans presently under consideration by the trustees will take care of this enrollment adequately. These plans will also help us to continue to be a comprehensive High school by providing proper facilities for art and music and a library as well as additional class rooms.

We certainly hope the citizens of Pembroke and neighboring towns will support the Trustee's efforts in constructing this new building so that we may provide necessary, adequate and proper educational facilities for our youth.

Our estimate for the next five years indicates a school of 500 by 1966.

The new building would make it possible to care for 500 by using the music and art rooms.

ATHLETICS

Another of our immediate needs is the preparation of our playing fields by levelling and grading. If this were done we would play all athletics near our school and eliminate the problem of transportation. The construction of the new building will cut into our present baseball field so that we have to move to a new position this Spring.

We are grateful to Mr. Nat Cling for the use of his field for soccer.

We continue to operate our athletic program financially through candy sale, dances and gate receipts. The public responded most generously to our candy sale last Spring.

Mr. Peter Kaligian coached Baseball and Basketball. Mr. Francis Davis coached the Soccer team. Our soccer team won 4, lost 4, tied 1. Our basketball team won 12, lost 7. Our baseball team won 10, lost 6. We considered that our athletic program was very successful in that we are playing in our league and class and winning better than half our games.

The Booster's Club continues to take an interest in sports in Pembroke Academy and are encouraging participation in all areas.

STUDENT COUNCIL

The students have a part in the administration of the school through their Student Council. This is an elected representative group who decide the social affairs of the school, schedule dates for dances etc., operate the Winter Carnival and act as a clearing house for student suggestions. Mr. Henry Munroe is the advisor.

ALUMNI

The class of 1961 are now alumni. There were 55 in the class. Eight are at the University of New Hampshire; one at Plymouth Teachers College; one at St. Anselms; one is at Bowdoin College, one is at the University of Nevada, one is at the Hesser Business College; three are at New Hampshire Technical Institute. Two have entered nursing schools. Twenty-nine are employed in offices and mills. Five have entered the armed services; one married; one is taking a post graduate course in Concord High School.

A total of twenty are continuing their education in formal schooling. About 16% of our graduates are in four year colleges.

SCHOLARSHIPS

A school is known by the product it produces. It is our hope to help every child achieve at his maximum. To that end we test the students for both achievement and ability. We place them in groups where we think they can be best taught and then maintain a standard which they can achieve and of which we can be proud.

Our test comes in those who go on to college. We find that the change from high school to college is quite severe. The students have never had to study quite so hard or so independently. There are many new attractions and distractions.

Students who have achieved a "B" grade average in college preparatory courses have been able to do college work satisfactorily. Some students have been accepted in college without this background and have had difficulty. Our college preparatory curriculum is satisfactory and our teachers are well equipped to teach the required courses.

Our students at the New Hampshire Technical Institute are making a very commendable record.

Many business concerns are hiring graduates from our commercial courses and finding them very well prepared to do the work.

It requires about three hours of home study daily to be successful in the College Curriculum. More study hours would produce better grades usually.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Mr. Francis Clish is advisor to the Future Teachers of America which is composed of students interested in becoming teachers. Many of them have visited Plymouth Teachers College, Keene Teachers College and the University in an endeavor to assist them in choosing their future college.

Miss Phyllis Lankalis is advisor to the Future Home Makers of America. This group is interested in learning how to operate and manage a home. This activity is in addition to their regular class room work. Over forty girls are enrolled.

Mr. George Joseph is advisor to the Industrial Arts Club which is organized for the purpose of helping boys determine their future opportunities in this area.

Mrs. Elizabeth Morrill continues to be advisor to one of our largest and most active clubs, the Dramatic Club. This group produces two three-act plays and two one-act plays each year.

Mrs. Hazel Hounsell is advisor to the Academician, the Senior Year Book. This group is working hard now to maintain the high standard shown in the recent publications under her direction.



ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD WATER COMMISSIONERS

During the past year three new Hydrants were installed. One was placed on Turnpike St. in Allenstown near Pembroke Boats Manufacturers. The remaining two were installed in Pembroke, one at Sherwood Meadows, and the other at corner of Lindy and High Streets.

Thirty-two new services were added to the system; a total of twenty-seven old services were renewed. The main pipe on Skyview Terrace was replaced. This took a total of two hundred thirty one linear feet of 2" cement lined pipe.

New mains installed were as follows: In Allenstown a total of four such projects were made. On Granite Street, one hundred fifty five linear feet of 2" Cement Lined Main extension. On Ridge Road a total of two hundred fourteen feet of 6" Cast Iron Main. On John Dycus development an extension of eighty feet of 6" Cast Iron cement lined Main was installed for a new dwelling.

A renewal of approximately two thousand linear feet of 2" cement lined main is being installed to replace old Galv. line that starts at residence of Glen MacNamara and ends with water service to the residence of Mrs. William Head. This will be completed during the summer months.

In Pembroke on Fairview Avenue, an extension of three hundred thirty four linear feet of 6" Cast Iron Main was installed.

On Lindy Heights a total of four hundred fifty linear feet of 2" cement lined main was installed. New services on this line were completed at same time.

Many old Hydrants have been repaired and others are about to be replaced.

The Board of Water Commissioners and the Superintendent appreciate all those paying their water bills promptly. It will be noticed that this department strives hard to collect what is justly due. It will continue in this effort in the future.

Any suggestions for the betterment of the water department will be greatly appreciated by the board at its monthly meetings.
