Passed by the City Council 1974

RESOLUTION TO VALIDATE ORDERS

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That pending the passage of the annual appropriation measure for the fiscal year 1974, the Mayor be and is hereby authorized and empowered to validate orders on the City Treasurer for all duly approved and properly classified claims in operating expenses of the City of Rochester or any of its municipal subdivisions.

RESOLUTION TO VALIDATE PURCHASE OF LACHANCE PROPERTY

WHEREAS, The Rochester School Board sitting in regular meeting of March 8, 1973 did request the Mayor to purchase land known as the Lachance property, located on Chamberlain Street, for use as a future school site, for the sum of \$15,000.00 (Fifteen Thousand Dollars), and

WHEREAS, the Mayor of the City of Rochester did purchase said land for the said sum of \$15,000.00 (Fifteen Thousand Dollars) by warranty deed for the City of Rochester, now

BE IT RESOLVED:

- That the above so-called Lachance property be accepted by the City Council, and
- 2. That the price of \$15,000.00 (Fifteen Thousand Dollars) for the above land is hereby approved, and
- That the actions of the School Board and the Mayor in this whole matter be ratified and validated.

Passed January 2, 1974 by two-thirds vote of City Council members present and voting by roll call with eight (8) affirmative votes and two (2) negative votes.

RESOLUTION TO PAY SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS FOR REGULAR ATTENDED SESSIONS

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That the following sum of money shall be paid to each member of the Rochester School Board in the amounts of \$25.00 for each regular attended session of the Rochester School Board.

That said monies shall be appropriated and included in the regular School Budget. This Resolution shall be retroactive to January 1, 1974.

That these monies are to apply against the expenses incurred by them in carrying out their duties, and payable on the order of the Chairman.

AMENDMENT TO THE CITY ORDINANCE, PLUMBERS LICENSE

RESOLUTION TO BUY PROPERTY FOR HIGH SCHOOL SITE

That the sum of \$50,000.00 be and is hereby appropriated for the purchase of the Trudel property.

Said property located on the western side of Wakefield Street adjoining and abutting the Spaulding High School land and consists of one large business building and one residential building with other building and land thereof.

That this property shall be acquired for the use and extension of a proposed new building of the Rochester High School or any other use deemed prudent by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester.

Said sum of \$50,000.00, shall be raised by the Finance Committee in a manner that it deems is in the best interest of the City of Rochester and in accordance with the New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act.

RESOLUTION ON TIME POLLS OPEN AND CLOSE FOR ELECTION OF DELEGATES TO NEW HAMPSHIRE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL:

That on Tuesday, March 5th, 1974, the Polling Places of the five Wards of Rochester shall be opened at 10:00 a.m. and shall close at 7:00 p.m. Eastern Daylight Time for the purpose of casting votes for the election of Delegates to the New Hampshire Constitutional Convention duly and rightfully called.

RESOLUTION TO PURCHASE ROBIE PROPERTY BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL:

That the sum of \$60,000.00 be and is hereby appropriated for the purchase of the so-called Robie Property. Said property located on the easterly side of Wakefield Street adjoining and abutting the property of the Rochester City Hall and running to Summer Street and numbered 37, 41, and 41-A Wakefield Street, Rochester.

That the said property shall be acquired for the use of a new central Fire Station or any other use deemed prudent by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester.

Said sum of \$60,000.00 shall be raised by the Finance Committee in a manner that it deems is in the best interest of the City of Rochester and in accordance with the New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act.

RESOLUTION TO REPAIR FIRE LADDER TRUCK BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL:

Whereas the ladder truck of the Rochester Fire Department is in need of a new Diesel engine and other repairs that the Fire Committee of the City Council be authorized to purchase the needed engine and supervise the needed repairs and,

Therefore, that a sum of money not to exceed \$10,000.00 dollars be and is hereby appropriated, said sum to be raised by the Finance Committee in a manner that it deems is in the best interest of the City, and in accordance with the New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act.

RESOLUTION TO SELL LAND ON COLUMBUS AVE., UPHAM ST. AND KNIGHT ST.

That the property known as the Railroad Round House property located on Columbus Avenue, Upham and Knight Streets is hereby authorized to be sold for the sum of \$50,000.00 dollars; further, that the Mayor and Finance Committee be authorized to complete the details of the sale and further that John Shaw, as Mayor of the City of Rochester, be empowered to execute and sign the proper instrument or deed to convey the property.

AMENDMENT TO TRAFFIC ORDINANCES

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

THAT Chapter XVI of the General Ordinances of the City of Rochester as revised and amended on May 6, 1952 and as further amended since said date be further amended by deleting therefrom the prohibition against parking on Bridge Street and on Granite Street and substitute the following therefor:

"Parking shall be permitted on the Southerly side only of Bridge Street between North Main Street and River Street from 8:00 a.m. to

4:00 p.m. while school is in session; and

"Parking shall be permitted on the Northerly side only of Granite Street between Charles Street and Sheridan Avenue from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. while school is in session."

RESOLUTION TO APPROPRIATE MONEY FOR THE EXPENSES INCURRED IN THE 1971-72 AUDIT BY THE STATE TAX COMMISSION

That, a sum not to exceed \$34,000.00 (Thirty-Four Thousand Dollars) be and it hereby is appropriated for the payment of the expenses incurred in the 1971-1972 audit by the State Tax Commission and that the said appropriation shall be raised by the Finance Committee in the best interests of the City of Rochester and in conformity with the New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act.

RESOLUTION FOR REPLACEMENT OF VACANCIES IN CITY COUNCIL

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That, the recommendation of the City Solicitor be and it hereby is adopted in respect to the existing vacancy in the Council Seat from Ward V;

That, there being no Chairman or Committee in said Ward on file with the City Clerk, as required by New Hampshire Law, and

That, the last Committee of record is dated in 1967, and the Chairman of record has moved out of the City;

Therefore, it is the opinion of the City Solicitor that any Republican who is a resident voter of said Ward V may file a declaration of candidacy directly with the City Council of Rochester, and

That, the City Council is the final judge as to who is to fill said vacancy in said Ward under the provisions of the Rochester City Charter, New Hampshire Laws 1891, Chapter 241, Sections 3 and 23.

RESOLUTION FOR BUILDING FIRE STATION AND IMPROVEMENTS IN CITY HALL AND OLD FIRE STATION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That a sum not to exceed \$1,100,000.00 (One Million, One Hundred Thousand Dollars) be and it hereby is appropriated for the following purposes:

- 1. For the purchase of a site and for the construction and equipping of a new Fire Station in the City of Rochester;
- 2. For the renovation of the said old Central Fire Station for use as a Police Station and a Court Room, and
- 3. For the renovation of the City Hall in the City of Rochester, and

Be it further resolved, that the expected useful life of all three of the above buildings and improvements is 30 (thirty) years or more; and

Be it further resolved, that the said \$1,100,000.00 (One Million, One Hundred Thousand Dollars) shall include the cost of erecting, equipping, furnishing sewer and water connections, including bonding and loan fees, architectural fees, and all other costs incidental thereto; and.

Be it further resolved, that said sum of money shall be raised by the issuance of bonds or notes under the municipal Finance Act of the State of New Hampshire by the Finance Committee at terms deemed by it to be in the best interest of the City of Rochester.

RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE EXECUTION OF MANAGERIAL CONTRACT FOR NEW FIRE STATION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That authority be given to the Fire Station Building Committee to execute a Managerial Contract for the building and the erection of a new Fire Station, for the renovation of the present Fire Station, and for the renovation of the basement and the first floor of City Hall.

RESOLUTION TO APPROPRIATE MONEY FOR THE EXPENSES INCURRED IN 1972 VOTER RE-REGISTRATION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That a sum not to exceed \$20,550.00 (Twenty Thousand, Five Hundred and Fifty Dollars) be and it hereby is appropriated for the payment of the expenses incurred in the 1972 Voter Re-Registration and that the said appropriation shall be raised by the Finance Committee in the best interests of the City of Rochester and in conformity with the New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act.

Passed March 6, 1974

RESOLUTION TO APPROPRIATE MONEY FOR THE EXPENSES INCURRED IN 1973 FOR REWIRING OF CITY HALL

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That a sum not to exceed \$19,715.00 (Nineteen Thousand, Seven Hundred and Fifteen Dollars) be and it hereby is appropriated for the payment of the expenses incurred in 1973 for the rewiring of City Hall and that the said appropriation shall be raised by the Finance Committee in the best interests of the City of Rochester and in conformity with the New Hampshire Municipal Finance Act.

Passed March 6, 1974

RESOLUTION TO ELIMINATE HEALTH PROBLEM BY EXTENSION OF 30" SEWER

Whereas, the sewage conditions now served by septic tanks in the Ten Rod Road area are grossly inadequate and a menace to the public health; and

Whereas, the sewage conditions now served by septic tanks in the Chestnut Hill Road area are grossly inadequate and a menace to public health: and

Whereas, the sewage conditions now served by septic tanks in the Willow Brook area are grossly inadequate and a menace to public health; and

Whereas, the Health Officer of the City has condemned said sewage systems; and

Whereas, there is a dire need to connect said areas to the City of Rochester sewage system by extension of a 30" pipe line; and

Whereas, the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Rochester appropriated Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) for preliminary engineering surveys of said extension on October 3, 1972; and

Whereas, the Honorable Mayor and City Council later appropriated the sum of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) for engineering specifications for the extension of said 30" interceptor sewer line, plus laterals, to alleviate the sewage problem in said areas on March 6, 1973; and

Whereas, the State of New Hampshire Water Pollution Board has done nothing to aid or help in preparation of these specifications and has persistently delayed in taking any action to alleviate said problems; and

Whereas, the State of New Hampshire Water Pollution Board has tried to combine this project into an overall study to include our present unworkable Lagoons; and

Whereas, said Lagoons as designed by Plans approved by said New Hampshire Water Pollution Board have never worked, do not work, and will never work; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Honorable Mayor and City Council as follows:

- A. That, the City of Rochester proceed to install said 30" pipe line, plus laterals, without further delay; and
- B. That, such 30" pipe line, plus laterals, be constructed independently of any other Plan or project pursuant to police powers of the City of Rochester as defined by RSA C. 47, P. 17; and
- C. That, due to the dire need for such extension, such construction start immediately; and
- D. That, a copy of the Resolution be forwarded to the New Hampshire Water Pollution Board for its information.

RESOLUTION REFERENDUM QUESTION:

Shall the City of Rochester Accept a Refinery as an Addition to the Economic Good of the City of Rochester?

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That the following question shall be placed upon the ballot as a referendum for the voters of the City of Rochester at a special election to be held on May 1.

QUESTION

Shall the City of Rochester accept
a Refinery as an addition to the
economic good of the City of
Rochester?

The above question shall be on a separate ballot with the outside dated and marked with the Seal of the City of Rochester and the words "Referendum — City of Rochester."

RESOLUTION TO APPROPRIATE AND BORROW MONEY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A HIGH AND VOCATIONAL SCHOOL AND TO BORROW MONEY FOR THE ALLEN SCHOOL ADDITION

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That the sum of Four Million, Seven Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$4,755,000.00) be and it hereby is appropriated for the construction of a High and Vocational School under the Area Concept Plan suitable to the needs of the City of Rochester;

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the said amount of Four Million, Seven Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$4,755,000.00) shall include the cost of additional land purchases; equipping and furnishing; sewer and water connections; and architectural fees;

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the aforesaid appropriation of Four Million Seven Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$4,755,000.00) and the appropriation of Two Hundred Ten Thousand Dollars (\$210,000.00) for the Allen School Addition, previously authorized by the Rochester City Council on August 7, 1973 shall be raised by the Finance Committee at terms deemed in the best interest of the City of Rochester by the issuance of Bonds or Notes, and that the authorization to borrow said money shall come under and agree with the Municipal Finance Act of the State of New Hampshire.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the expected useful life of both school projects is thirty (30) years or more.

RESOLUTION FOR AUTHORIZATION TO DISPOSE OF CITY OWNED LAND

That the Mayor and the members of the LEGAL AFFAIRS COM-MITTEE of the City Council are hereby authorized to dispose of a tract of land owned by the City of Rochester located on the northerly side of Oak Street in Gonic, New Hampshire, between Route 125 and Route 202:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Mayor and members of the LEGAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE be authorized to ask for public bids for the purchase of said land, and that the Mayor be authorized to execute such documents as may be necessary to dispose of and to convey title in said land on Oak Street in Gonic.

RESOLUTION TO ACCEPT BIDS ON HOUSE ONLY ON WESTERLY SIDE OF WAKEFIELD STREET

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

That the Mayor and members of the Legal Affairs Committee of the City Council be and they are hereby authorized to accept bids on a house, without land, located on the westerly side of Wakefield Street and abutting Rochester School property, said bid to be for the house only, with the consideration that the house be moved off the lot in one direction only. Permission cannot be granted to move said house on or across State Highway Route 16;

FURTHER THAT the Legal Affairs Committee also be empowered to grant permission to the highest bidder to move said house across School property to the Chestnut Hill Road and then northward, subject to ordinances on moving structures through the public streets and roads;

FURTHER THAT the Legal Affairs Committee be authorized to establish a fair value of said house, and that the Mayor be authorized to execute a bill of sale for said house.

ROCHESTER FIRE DEPARTMENT

TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER, NEW HAMPSHIRE.

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my annual report for the year ending December 31, 1974.

There were a total of 818 alarms in the City of Rochester in 1974, which consisted of the following: 244 box alarms and 574 still alarms. These include 51 car or truck fires, 38 engineer's calls (6-6) 79 brush fire calls, 55 false alarms (53 in Rochester and 2 in East Rochester). There were 20 chimney fires, 32 grass fires, 14 oil burner fires and 138 building fires. 109 miscellaneous calls, 59 smoke scares or honest mistakes, 104 first aid, accident or emergency calls and 64 second alarms or calls for more assistance. We had 55 permanent men's calls. There were no school cancellation alarms this year.

There were 40 alarms in East Rochester and 38 alarms in Gonic in 1974. 20 alarms were transmitted for out-of-town assistance from Rochester to other communities. These alarms are all included in the total alarms above.

We answered a total of 679 ambulance calls in 1974. These consisted of 80 accident calls, 465 home emergency calls, 14 transfer or convalescent cases, 76 calls to which the ambulance responded, but was not needed. 40 miscellaneous calls and 4 false calls were answered. 45 of the above calls were out-of-town.

The total number of ambulance calls and alarms answered by the Rochester Fire Department in 1974 was 1,497. There were 818 fire alarms and 679 ambulance calls. This is a total of 133 more calls than in 1973, in which there was a total of 1,364.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND MEMBERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL:

I submit herewith my report of the activities of the Department of Public Works for the year ending December 31, 1974.

For the first three months snow removal, sanding and salting required most of our attention. However, when the weather permitted we did considerable patching to streets, and started our regular patching program around the first of April.

Toward the end of the year we purchased two new 1974 Ford trucks to aid in snow removal, plowing, salting, and sanding our many streets and roads. Also purchased was a new 1974 Ford Stationwagon for the Department of Public Works Commissioner.

Around the first of April we were able to start our street sweeping program and continued this until the end of November when cold weather set in.

Bridges and culverts were repaired, due to the weather, on the Salmon Falls Road, Frank Cross Roads, Ten Rod Road, Franklin Street, Little Falls Bridge Road, The Foot Bridge on Dewey Street, Bridge Street, Winter Street, and Whitehall Road.

Our surface drains were cleaned in the spring and fall of the year, using our hydraulic Catch Basin Cleaning Machine. The drains which were not taking water were cleaned out with the aid of rods.

Street signs were replaced in different parts of the City. Signs were replaced on Glenwood Avenue, Nola Street, Anita Street, Hoover Street, and Yale Street.

Gravel was hauled to repair washouts and to improve our unsurfaced roads. Roads to which gravel was hauled were the Hussey Road, Havenhill Road, Lowell Street, Jefferson Street, Berry Street, Evans Road, Old Milton Road, Gilbert Hill Road, Ten Rod Road, Sampson Road, Sheepboro Road, and the Estes Road.

We hot-topped some streets and roads in the City during the summer months; such as Duquette Street, Lafayette Street, Lyons Street, Kendall Street, Bridge Street, Yale Street, Harvard Street, Charles Street, Haig Street, Maple Street, North Street, Chasse Street, Frank Cross Roads, and Sewell Avenue.

Oil was applied to control dust on streets and roads in the City; such as the Hussey Road, Lowell Street, the road to the Chlorinator, Chesley Hill Road, Chicken Farm Road, Evans Road, Streets off the Chestnut Hill Road over the tracks, Sheepboro Road, Janet Street, and the Dump Road.

Sidewalks were repaired on streets in the City which included, North Main Street, South Main Street, Wakefield Street, Washington Street, Central Avenue, Adams Avenue, Congress Street, Leonard Street, Plante Street, Chestnut Street, Hanson Street, Chamberlain Street and Union Street.

We installed and cleaned culverts on streets and roads in the City such as, the Frank Cross Roads, Ten Rod Road, Salmon Falls Road, Franklin Street, streets off the Old Dover Road, Portland Street, and Washington Street.

Water main extensions have been completed on the Old Dover Road, Old Milton Road, Forest Park Drive, Dodge Street, the Old Gonic Road, West Street, and off Main Street-Gonic; using 2,769 feet of 6", 731 feet of 8", 54 feet of 10", and 16,593 feet of 12" cement lined cast iron pipe.

Nine new hydrants were installed, making 511 in the water system.

Fifty-eight new water services were installed and twenty water services were relaid.

Sewer main extensions have been completed on Dodge Street, West Street, Nola Street, and Rochester Avenue using 1,140 feet of 6" sewer pipe.

Seventeen new sewer connections were installed, bringing the total to 3,566 services in the system.

Samples of our water were sent to the State Laboratory regularly for testing, and they report the continued high quality of our water.

I take this opportunity to thank Mayor Shaw, members of the Public Works Committee, and the City Council for their cooperation in assisting us in solving our problems; also to thank the employees of this department for their loyalty and assistance.

Together we are striving to make Rochester a better place to live for ourselves, our children and for the future generations to come.

REPORT OF DEPARTMENT OF BUILDING INSPECTION

TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCHESTER:

Sometimes actual figures and facts are not pleasant to read for the results prove to us that things are at a lower lewel than they have been for several years, but the fact is that the total estimated cost of construction for 1974 is almost \$2,000,000 less than 1973 and 1971 and almost \$3,000,000 less than 1972.

As I have reported throughout the year for 1974, construction was at a low ebb due mainly to the high cost of construction and mortgage money and low availability of money. These facts alone more than account for the large drop in construction in the City of Rochester.

Not only the new homes but the overall picture in construction has also gone slightly downhill for 1974. Things are improving for 1975 since some of the reasons mentioned above have improved. Federal and private statistics do tend to show that by the end of 1975 construction will start back toward the peak year of 1972. However, I think this will take more than a year to accomplish and don't look forward to reaching the high level of 1972, which was \$5,872,299, for total construction cost. This was, of course, the largest year the City of Rochester has experienced.

In final analysis, it is well to note that although we are down in total cost of construction we are higher than the surrounding areas, therefore, Rochester continues to grow even under poor economic conditions.

With the completion of the new facilities behind Spaulding the two buildings will provide a capacity of 2,800 students. Plans and procedures have been developed during the year which will prepare for the move to take place next December, Physical education facilities, because of the proximity of the two schools, will jointly use the various fields available. The Spaulding Schools will also house all students, grade 7 through 12, in both buildings and students of various grades will attend both buildings, depending upon subjects and grades. There has been a tremendous amount of time and manpower devoted to opening the new facility. For example, the identification of types of furniture, quality and selection and placement, particularly in the Vocational area, required many months. Also, curriculum planning, that is, reorganizing of present courses, planning and introducing new subjects, again particularly in the Vocational area, immersed total staff and administration into 12 months of planning. In addition, scheduling, identification of subjects to areas, staffing, and the selection of a maintenance and custodial crew were other formidable problems. To assist in the curriculum planning, the teachers of grades 7 through 12 attended workshops throughout the year for such things as school visitation, coordination of grades, and writing courses.

Workshops were also conducted at the elementary level in such areas as the language arts field; the area of communication; learning disabilities, to help teachers understand and work with children with learning problems; the teachings of music at the elementary level; and a workshop for kindergarten teachers in the city to help them coordinate their program with our grade one curriculum.

The budget process has been difficult because of inflation and will continue to raise havoc next year because of the continued rise in inflation. This will place new demands on both the education organization and the taxpaying public.

Each year we receive the results of the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills administered to the various grades at the elementary level. This year I am particularly pleased to announce that the average achievement over last year has been an increase above expectations of a half year. This does not mean that every grade in every school achieved this, but the significant aspect is the fact that students are expected to progress a year rather than a year and a half. It means, therefore, that the things being done in curriculum and inservice training are now beginning to show results in pupil achievement.

As you know, Barrington voted for their new Junior High School at the last annual district meeting. This will mean that the seventh and eighth graders will no longer attend Rochester.

Staff Development plans that have been developed over a period of three years were instituted officially starting July 1. This means that the local school district will be responsible for recertification of all professional staff. This will give the local community a better opportunity to have a hand in the kind of preparation teachers will receive; but it will require a considerable amount of record keeping and planning because each teacher will have to be handled individually. As a result however, all teachers will be recertified for a three year period only after they have acquired a minimum of 50 clock hours of additional work.

Ten days in the month of April were devoted to the pre-school clinic. This has become a very sophisticated operation. Screening tests for hearing and eyes and a test identifying such things as gross motor skills, communication skills and the like were administered.

Vandalism has been a serious problem in our schools this year. You need to know that it is costing the city many thousands of dollars each year to replace broken windows and other things that are damaged because of this. We have been working with the Police Department but to date I am sorry to say none of us have cut down on this serious problem to any degree. Hopefully the new City Ordinance will help.

I continue to enjoy the opportunity to serve the School Board and the people of Rochester. Although we have a way to go to provide the quality of education that we should provide and that Rochester is capable of providing, we have, in fact, made considerable progress during the last few years.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN OF THE ROCHESTER PUBLIC LIBRARY

TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR, CITY COUNCIL, AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ROCHESTER PUBLIC LIBRARY:

Gentlemen:

Please accept this annual report of the Rochester Public Library for the year 1974.

The past year saw greater use of the library. That increased use was reflected in circulation figures (up 8% over 1973) and in attendance to programs. Program attendance by adults was over 1600, and program attendance by children was over 5500.

More difficult to measure, but certainly evident, was the increased use of the library's growing reference collection. These specialized, non-circulation materials are being used by everyone, from students to retired people.

A visit to the library today will show a very busy place. Some people will be reading newspapers and magazines, or they may be using the reference collection. Other people are bustling in and out, borrowing and returning books. Upstairs, the children are reading, playing and learning. There is probably a meeting or program going on in the Community Room.

The increased use of the library is one of the library's goals, and for that we are very pleased. However, that increased demand is also beginning to exceed our abilities to deal with it, at our present level of support.

The fact that the price of books has increased while the library's funds for buying books has not increased resulted in a markedly lower number of new acquisitions,

Everyone is appreciative of library programs. Attendance has been very high. The fact that there are no funds to support these programs detracts from their effectiveness.

The reference books and periodicals, which are so popular, increase in price drastically every year, and every year they must be updated. Keeping them current is becomming increasingly difficult.

The year 1974, therefore, had its successes and its difficulties. The successes were the increased use of the library and the library's facilities. The difficulties were in keeping up with the increased demand for good library service.

Gentlemen:

1 submit herewith my report as City Solicitor for the year 1974.

The suit involving Harrison-Daddario and Green Engineering together with Fitzgerald and Vickery suits having been consolidated for trial in the United States District Court of New Hampshire were successfully settled without trial, without costs to the City.

The case of Bradbury v Mayor's Industrial Committee et al involving the New Hampshire Right To Know Law is pending before the Strafford County Superior Court.

The case of Barcomb v Herman is before the New Hampshire Supreme Court having been argued and a decision pending.

The suit of Green, Hussey et al v Shaw is still pending.

The case of Fisher and Fazekas v City is also pending.

With repsect to the criminal docket of the Rochester District Court, receipts increased from approximately \$68,041. in 1973 to over \$72,500. in 1974 which reflects the increase in criminal trials in our Court during 1974.

The leadership of Mayor Shaw has caused all city employees and personnel to cooperate with the City Solicitor which has made my task a pleasant one.
