To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tuftonboro in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Town House in said Tuftonboro on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March next, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Articles 1, 2, 3, and 4 will be voted on by Ballot on March 9th.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tuftonboro Central School on Wednesday, the Tenth day of March next, at 7:30 P.M. in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Tuftonboro Zoning Ordinance regarding the Wetlands Conservation as follows: YES NO

3.4.7 Delete the existing description of Wetlands Conservation (overlay)

and replace with the following:

"Wetlands Conservation (overlay): The intent of this overlay District is to provide protection for and appropriate use of wetland areas."

12.2 Delete the existing description of Area and replace with the following:

The Wetlands Conservation District is defined as those areas of "Type A Hydric Soil" and "Type B Hydric Soil" as defined by the Water Supply and Pollution Control Division of the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services. The limits of the Wetlands Conservation District are hereby determined to be areas of hydric soils one acre or more in size, or of any size if contiguous to surface waters such as lakes, ponds and streams.

12.3 Delete the existing description of Delineation and replace with the

following:

On site soils investigation is required to delineate the Wetland Conservation District boundaries for each lot submitted for subdivision and/or site plan approval. Said investigation shall be completed by a certified soil scientist. The subdivision or site plan plat submitted to the Planning Board shall contain a certification signed by the said certified soil scientist certifying that the wetland boundaries shown on the plat have been determined by on site investigation and are in conformance with the definitions of wetland contained in this ordinance.

12.4 Delete 12.4 in its entirety and re-number subsequent articles accordingly.

12.6.3a Delete the words "to any wetland" and replace with the words "laterally to any Type A Hydric soils or surface water, nor any closer than fifty (50) feet laterally to any Type B Hydric soils."

12.6.3d Delete the word "fill" and replace with the word "disturb" and

after the word "streams", insert the word "ponds".

 Are you in favor of adopting Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Tuftonboro Zoning Ordinance regarding permitted uses:

4. Are you in favor of adopting Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Tuftonboro Zoning Ordinance regarding secondary dwellings:

Any lot that can support a duplex residence without a zoning variance and without waiver by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Division will be allowed up to two (2) dwelling units. The second dwelling unit shall be subordinate in scope and scale to the main residential dwelling unity. The second dwelling unit may stand alone or be incorporated into an auxiliary structure such as a garage or a barn. The Planning Board, under the provisions of this paragraph, shall have the right to require New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Division approved septic system design without waiver from current standards for the proposed dwelling and for the existing dwelling unit. Further, the Town, under the provisions of this paragraph, shall have the right to require construction of said approved septic systems for the proposed dwelling and for the existing dwelling as a condition of approval.

- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty--five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00 for the Special for Tar Account. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) to be added to the Dump Closure Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be added to the Nineteen Mile Bay Beach Construction Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Piper House Renovation Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty-One Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$151,100.00) for a Revaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue to be completed for the tax year 1994. To authorize the withdrawal of Sixty-Three Thousand Two Hundred Ninety-Nine Dollars (\$63,299.00) plus any accrued interest from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance of Eighty-Seven Thousand Eight Hundred One Dollars (\$87,801.00) to come from general taxation. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.
- 10. To see if the Town will allow the Selectmen to dispose of Lot 74, Hidden Valley, Tax Map #69-2-74 acquired by the Town by Tax Collectors' Deed in 1987; either by a public auction, or by advertised sealed bids, pursuant to RSA 80:80. The Selectmen shall have the power to establish a minimum amount for which the property is to be sold and the terms and the conditions of the sale.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Library Trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year, in accordance with RSA 202-A:4-c.
- To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1993 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36A-5.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) as approved by the Budget Committee and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the current year and issue notes therefore, said notes to be repaid by taxes.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to take over the care and maintenance of the roads of Shirley Way, Abenaki Hill Estates. This article submitted by Petition and does not have the approval of the Board of Selectmen.
- 16. To see if the Town of Tuftonboro will vote to specifically direct the Selectmen to actively seek withdrawal of the Town of Tuftonboro from the Governor Wentworth Regional School District. This article submitted by Petition.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Seventy-six Dollars (\$676.00) to assist the Family Health Centre. This article submitted by Petition. This article was not approved by the Budget Committee.

- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be used to support the Tuftonboro Cooperative Nursery School. This article submitted by Petition. This article has not been considered for approval by the Budget Committee.
- To see of the Town will vote to affirm, alter or annul the following Ordinance enacted by the Selectmen on August 31, 1992.

Ordinance Regulating Commercial Picking of Rubbish and Removal of Rubbish from the Tuftonboro Landfill

Pursuant to the authority conferred by New Hampshire RSA Chapter 47 Section 17, and Chapter 149-M:13, in order to promote the general welfare of the citizens of the Town of Tuftonboro, and to regulate the operation of the Tuftonboro Landfill, the following ordinance is hereby enacted:

SECTION 1: Limitation on Commercial Picking and Removal of Rubbish From and after the effective date of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person, partnership, or corporation to pick, remove, haul or transport any rubbish, junk, or debris from the Tuftonboro Landfill for purposes of sale or resale, or redemotion.

SECTION 2: Penalty

Whoever shall violate the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and subject to a fine of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) and/or a civil penalty of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00). For purposes of this ordinance, each load hauled or transported from the Tuftonboro Landfill shall be deemed a separate offense.

SECTION 3: Effective Date

This ordinance shall be effective upon adoption by the Board of Selectmen, publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the community, and upon the recording of an attested copy of the same with the Town Clerk.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to be placed in the Piper House Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Lincoln Page and seconded by Thad Coleman to adopt article 4 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and

article was declared passed by the Moderator.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty 5. Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be placed in the existing Capital Reserve Fund for the Revaluation of the Town of Tuftonboro. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee. Motion was made by Ken Craigue and seconded by Helen Whall to adopt article 5 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and

article declared passed by the Moderator.

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) to be added to the Dump Closure Capital Reserve Fund, previously established. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Jack Widmer and seconded by Dick Newcomb to adopt article 6 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and

article declared passed by the Moderator.

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the 7. provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of Construction of a Town Beach at Nineteen Mile Bay and to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000,00) to be placed in this fund. adopt article 7 as read. Selectman Rollins read a letter from the State Dept. of Transportation stating where project stands. Thousand Eight Hundred Ninety-three Dollars (\$14,893.00) for a New Police Cruiser; and to authorize the withdrawal of Three Thousand Eight Hundred Twenty-eight Dollars (\$3,828.00) plus any accrued interest, from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. The balance to be raised by taxes in 1992. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

This article submitted by Petition. The Budget Committee approved One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for this program. The Budget Committee disapproved Five Hundred (\$500.00) for this program.

The Motion was made by Paul Thornton and seconded by Ken

Greenwood to adopt article 10 as read.

Motion was made by Earl Hobart and seconded by Susan Weeks to amend article to reduce sum to \$1,000. Sue Weeks explained why Budget Committee only approved \$1,000. As \$1,500. was the Total Budget proposed; the Budget Committee felt the Town should not support the entire Budget; that the private sector should be approached to provide some of the funding.

Amended motion to the article was in the negative with vote by show of

hands. Moderator declared amended article defeated.

Several spoke of the value of the program for their children.

Vote by show of hands in the affirmative on article 10 as presented and article declared passed by the Moderator.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Fifty-five Dollars (\$655.00) to assist the Family Health Centre. This article submitted by Petition. This article does not have the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by Annette Cram to indefinitely postpone action on article 11. Vote by show of hands to affirm action and the article declared indefinitely postponed by the Moderator.

12. To see of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) for the Special for Tar Account. This article has the approval of the Budget Committee.

Motion was made by Dick Newcomb and seconded by Ken Cralgue to adopt article 12 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to retain the unexpended portion of its 1992 appropriation. Such funds to be placed in a Special Conservation Fund in accordance with RSA 36A-5. Motion made by William Rollins and seconded by Fred Bauer to adopt article 13 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of Lot 44, Hidden Valley, Tax Map #69-2-44, acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed in 1988; either by a public auction, or by advertised sealed bids, pursuant to RSA 80:80. The Selectmen shall have the power to establish a minimum amount for which the property is to be sold and the terms and the conditions of the sale.

Motion was made by William Rollins and seconded by Ken Craigue to adopt article 14 as read. Selectman Rollins explained the size and condition of the lot. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal and state grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money. Motion was made by Norm Vittum and seconded by Annette Cram to adopt article 15 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than cash to the Town for any public purpose. This authorization in accordance with RSA 31:95-e shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of Town Meeting.
 Motion was made by Barbara Hull and seconded by Tim Brown to adopt article 16 as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by Moderator.
- To see if the Town will vote to affirm, alter or annul the following ordinance enacted by the Selectmen on July 17, 1991.

TOWN ORDINANCE

The Town of Tuftonboro Prohibits the Feeding of Waterfowl On Public Property in the Town of Tuftonboro. Violators will be prosecuted as prescribed by Law.

Barbara Hull motioned, Helen Whall seconded to affirm ordinance as enacted by the Selectmen be adopted as read. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for interest charges, as approved by the Budget Committee, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, for the current year and issue notes therefor, said notes to be repaid from taxes.

Motion was made by William Antonucci and seconded by Norm Vittum to adopt article 18 as read. The Selectmen request this article in case there was a need for the Town to borrow money. There has been no need to borrow since the Town adopted semi-annual collection of

taxes. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article declared passed by the Moderator.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same, the sum of Six Hundred Seventy-seven Thousand Seven Hundred Thirty-six Dollars (\$677,736.00) as recommended by the Budget Committee and such sums as may be required to cover the costs of any additional items voted at the meeting and in accordance with RSA 32:8. Motion was made by Ken Craigue and seconded by William Rollins to adopt article 19 as read. Selectman Rollins explained to Lincoln Page some of the Items in the Budget as requested. New State Code has changed several items. This year social security, retirement, and Blue Cross are covered under one item rather than under several items. Vote by show of hands in the affirmative and article was declared passed by the Moderator. The total Budget figure is \$856,129.00.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Motion made by Ken Craigue and seconded by Earl Hobart to adjourn meeting. Mr. Ewing brought before meeting that he would like to see additional speed signs placed on Town Roads.

1992 REPORT OF THE TUFTONBORO HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Snow squalls at the end of September had everyone thinking we might have a snowy winter—however we did have considerable snow in mid April, and lots of ice at the end of the year. The fifteen hundred (1500) yards of sand that was stockpiled for winter use was greatly needed.

This year in addition to the usual grading of dirt roads, roadside mowing, ditching, etc., significant road improvements were completed through Tuftonboro. On Wawbeek road, seven hundred (700) feet of underdrain and five (5) catch basins were put in and the road was rebuilt and paved. The Elm Point end of Cross Neck road had the final application of gravel and was also paved. The Boycroft end of the same area was paved and the ditches cleaned out. Fourteen hundred (1400) feet of Northline road was rebuilt and paved. A section of Sodom road was improved with logs and large rocks removed from just under the surface. Geotextile was then installed under eighteen (18) inches of gravel. On the Canaan Valley road a six (6) foot steel culvert was installed replacing the damaged aluminum pipe that was there. Large rocks under the road surface were also removed from Brown road and Tupeck lane. Guard rail was installed on the High street bridge area and nine (9) pilings were replaced on the town dock.

During the year some members of the highway department attended meaningful workshops and seminars. In May the University of Oklahoma sponsored the National Road and Street Conference, in June the NH Road Agents Association sponsored an excellent day of demonstrations, displays of new products, ideas and equipment at Waterville Valley. Also in Meredith, UNH and the T3 Center sponsored the National Highway Institute Geotextile design and Construction seminar. Following that, the Environmental Service and Department of Agriculture, and the T3 center held a conference and demonstrations in Moultonboro at the town garage dealing with road drainage and maintenance. All of these meetings, conferences, etc. were informative, interesting and well worth attending.

The Tuftonboro Highway department has installed two (2) way radio frequencies to communicate with the Fire department and Civil Defense when the need arises. The department also maintains close communication with NH Department of Public Works Division Three (3), regarding all road conditions at all times. Thanks EVERYONE for all your help, I really appreciate it. The Sheriff's department and the Tuftonboro Police department have been especially helpful monitoring the recurring and evasive icy road conditions.

TUFTONBORO POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Department had a busy year. From the end of April through Labor Day weekend, we had sixteen hours of patrol. This is the first year that we were able to do this. It is felt that, as a result of the extra hours, there were fewer accidents. There were a total of 790 motor vehicle stops with 118 summoned.

In April we required the services of the New Hampshire State Police Swat Team to assist in the removal of a wanted subject. The subject was wanted out of Concord for the brutal attack and stabbing of a couple in their home. The subject was removed without incident. In July, a citizen reported to our Department that he had discovered some suspicious looking plants on his property on route 109. After we investigated the incident we requested the services of the New Hampshire State Police Narcotics Investigation unit to assist in the eradication of twenty-seven Marijuana plants. The plants that were eradicated were potted when they were found and were approximately sixteen inches in height. This eradication effort was the result of on-going investigations into the illegal cultivation of cannabis crops in New Hampshire. Had the crop reached maturity, it could have had a street value of between \$50,000 and \$60,000.

In September we investigated an incident which appeared to be cult related. The investigation revealed that it was a copy-cat type incident and there have been no further incidents of that nature.

In December we had a large number of break-ins which appeared to have occurred between the 6th and 12th of December. The case is still under investigation and feel it could be related to break-ins in neighboring towns.

The Department now owns a video camera. Anyone wishing to have tapes made of their valuables for insurance purposes may contact the department for details.

Should you require the services of the Department, the numbers to call are 539-2284 or 1-800-552-8960. If anyone sees anything suspicious, please attempt to write down the description or registration numbers of vehicles that may be involved. This will greatly help in investigating incidents.

I wish to thank the New Hampshire State Police, Troop E, for their assistance throughout the year.

1992 was a year marked by volunteers helping out the library: Peggy Bashe continues to be a mainstay on Wednesday afternoons; Maggie Croteau is now working with the pre-school story hour, tending the desk when needed; Len and Midge Preston coordinate the art shows each month, Len arranges the hangings and Midge writes the press releases. A special thanks to Len for using his calligraphic talents to create a beautiful book that lists all who made donations to the Building Fund. A high-light of the many fine shows was having the paintings done by residents of the Mountain View Nursing Home, who visited the library to have lunch and see their work on display. Veronica Leipert and Barbara McClure continue to assist with the ongoing automation project and wherever they are needed; Pat Healy and Kris Kennison helped plan and put on our Pre-school story hour. All of these people donating their time so freely help to make the library a special place.

Major acquisitions last year include a Macintosh personal computer for patron use, paid for with money left in the Building Fund, and an antique needlepoint donated by Louise Mills of Melvin Village. The large cross-stitch shows Benjamin Franklin seated in his study, surrounded by some of the results of his fruitful life.

Some of the programs offered to the public were a presentation by children's author Amy MacDonald and a UNH sponsored baby-sitting course that was well attended by local young people. REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

December 7, 1992

1992 was below average for wildfires reported in our state. Our largest fire was in May in Rumney where a suspicious origin fire burned approximately 150 acres with a total cost of approximately \$30,000. The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted many other communities in wildland fire suppression as well.

Our fire lookout towers reported 289 fires, burning a total of 136 acres. Our major causes of fires were fires kindled without a permit, unknown causes and children.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done." Violation of this statute is a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are liable for all fire suppression costs.

Local fire departments are responsible for suppressing fires. The small average fire size of .47 acre/fire is a tribute to early detection by the public or our fire tower system and the quick response of our trained local fire departments. Please help your Warden and fire department by requesting and obtaining a fire permit <u>before</u> kindling an open fire.

The N.H. Division of Forests and Lands assisted 28 towns with a total of \$20,000 in 50/50 cost share grants for fire fighter safety items and wildland suppression equipment in 1992.
