On my first visit to this school I found 14 scholars, or should if they had been there; think 12 were present, all belonging to Greenfield. Asking the teacher to point me out my fraction of that school, she informed me it wasn't there, I learned that (13-14) thirteen-fourteenths of the scholars belong to Greenfield. Bennington has furnished \$36 06 for one scholar: Greenfield \$24.00, or about that, for 13 scholars. Well, what are you going to do about it?

REMARKS.

Our Prudential Committees have been very fortunate in the selection of teachers, they were all well qualified for the duties to which they were called. There must be different degrees of excellence in teachers, practice tends to make perfect. In district No. 1 we have had teachers of much experience. Mrs. Vinall is one of decided ability, a reader of human nature that makes very few mistakes, a faculty that teachers must possess to be successful. She kept a model school in every particular.

Mr. Stiles is a teacher of acknowledged ability, a man with his head full of practical knowledge which he is able and willing to give his pupils, it would read like a puff if we should write the praise due him for his faithfulness; his term of school will long be remembered by parents and scholars.

Miss Pettengill possesses the requisites for a successful teacher, and kept a profitable term of school; some scholars might think that nature had endowed her with too much dignity, but we have our doubts about that.

Miss Wason is a young faithful and practical teacher, her scholars made much progress during the first term, her second term closed without an examination, the school-house being destroyed by fire the day before the close of the school; the building was worth about as much for ashes, as it was for a school house.

Miss Lakin showed much skill in the art of teaching, think she is one that would put heavens first law in force in her school or there would be trouble, her school made much improvement.

We find in all of our schools a lamentable lack of practical knowledge, especially, in Grammar and Arithmetic. During my first visit to the Grammar School, I called for the first class pursuing that study. My first question was the following: what do you study this book for? one of the best scholars answered by saying, "that is what I would like to know?" they had been through the book, could repeat it word for word, but knew nearly nothing of the ideas they were meant to convey. A parrot could study grammar in that way. When scholars, yea boys, nearly ready to do business for themselves, are not capable of measuring a load of wood or a stock of boards; when girls, who will soon be called to furnish houses for themselves cannot tell how many yards of carpeting it will take to cover a floor, it is time for parents to take more interest in our schools. Practical knowledge is the thing to be aimed at in the education of our children, teachers must lay aside their text books, and spend more time in teaching,

and less time in hearing recitations. The blackboard is the place to teach grammar and arithmetic, the text book is a good tool but the tongue of the teacher is a better one if they know how to use it. Looking back over a period of thirty years I ask this question; do the improvements which are claimed to have been made in text books and modes of teaching, have a salutary effect upon our scholars? are they better qualified to solve the problems of life than those were who received their education years ago? if they are be thankful, if they are not, something is wrong, for "this is an age of progress." If we should work with as much interest to give our children education, as we do to give them dollars, it would be far better for them, far better for our country. The scholars in our common schools are our nations public property, there we can see the twigs that are to grow up and make the ministers, lawyers, doctors, senators, presidents, farmers, mechanics, merchants &c., of our country. Let us point these twigs in the right direction and sow broadcast among them that one great fertilizer of the mind, education.
