THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Gilmanton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to (L. S.) vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Gilmanton on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necess ry to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. \$8,600.00*
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Town Libraries. \$241.43*
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the maintenance of the Iron Works Fire Department. \$300.00*
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the maintenance of the Corner Fire Department, \$300.00*

- 7. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day observance. \$15.00*
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to cooperate with the State in the control of White Pine Blister Rust. \$200.00*
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) towards the support of Laconia Hospital. \$100.00*
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) towards the support of the Wolfeboro Hospital. \$100.00*
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-One Dollars (\$71.00) to the Lakes Region Association. \$71.00*
- 12. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for breaking roads. \$3,500.00*
- 13. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise for repairs of Highways and Bridges. \$2,800.00*
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept T. R. A. and raise and appropriate the required amount for same. \$1,041.51*
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to retire Serial Bond. \$1,000.00*
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for payment on Province Road note. \$1,000.00*

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) on long term notes, for the Town's part of building the road from Gilmanton Iron Works to Gilmanton Corner, the State to contribute Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00).
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

PREVENT FOREST FIRES—IT PAYS

An average of 7,300 acres of woodland are burned over by forest fires in New Hampshire each year destroying many thousand dollars worth of property of all description. It costs many additional thousands of dollars and requires valuable man hours, taken from other essential work, to extinguish them. These losses affect the personal fortunes of the owners and town and state economies. Everyone loses because of them.'

Analysis of fire causes reveal the fact that more than 98 percent of all forest fires are, consistently, the result of human carelessness and are preventable!

We have been extremely fortunate during the past few years. Favorable fire weather and war time restrictions on travel which kept people off the highways and out of the woods have aided materially in reducing fire risks, keeping fires fewer and fire losses low.

We now face changed conditions. People can travel freely. Their love for travel and the freedom of the woods will bring them out in ever increasing numbers. This will step up fire risks materially. The accelerated cutting of the war years has resulted in additional thousands of slash acres. These factors, combined with a possible dry season and human carelessness could easily produce a catastrophe. Everyone must, consequently, be on their guard. They should

- 1. Be careful with fire or when smoking in or near woodlands.
- 2. Cooperate with the local forest fire warden and his deputies by
 - a. Abiding cheerfully with whatever restrictions it may be necessary to impose. They are intended only to be helpful.
 - b. Securing permits to burn debris when the ground is not covered with snow.
 - c. Seeing that others comply with requirements.
 - d. Promptly coming to the warden's assistance when needed.

If these few fundamental practices are followed it will be possible to PREVENT a large proportion of FOREST FIRES from starting—that PAYS!

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board, Parents, and Voters of the Gilmanton School District:

It is a pleasure to state conditions under which the schools have been maintained since the last annual report. The war-time hardships experienced in Gilmanton were, in general, less burdensome than in many places in New England. The Post-war period, into which we were thrust suddenly, may present more hindrances to good educational progress than the war years brought, because of the dearth of teachers.

Buildings and Equipment, Maintenance, Operation, Repair

Shingles have been provided for a neighborhood group to cover the Kelley Corner School.

The belfry of the Corner School was completely renewed during the summer.

A chimney was relaid at the Iron Works School.

To keep school buildings in good condition an adult janitor is essential. The Iron Works School is kept in excellent shape by Mr. Frank Dowst. The Corner School has not had the services of a man as janitor for several months, and one is needed.

Teachers and Supervisors

Mrs. Helen O. Page was unable to continue as upper grade teacher at the Iron Works School. Her position was filled for a while in the fall by Miss Myrtle A. Bean of Amesbury, Mass., and more recently by Mr. Theodore N. Flores, World War II veteran, of West Alton.

Gilmanton is fortunate to have retained the services of its other teachers.

Transportation

For conveyance of pupils to the Corner School, Mr. Frank McClary has been employed to carry those living near Jones' Mill and south of Loon Pond. Mr. Howard Langley transports those who live at Lower Gilmanton and near Twombly Corner.

At the Iron Works, Mr. George Nelson carries pupils from the Potter District; Mr. Ernest Goodwin transports those from Page Hill and Poverty Corner.

On the Guinea Ridge, no contractor could be found with a conveyance sufficiently large to seat fourteen pupils. The School Board, acting under the authority granted by the March 11, 1944 school district meeting ("... to purchase, maintain and operate school conveyances where necessary, to transport pupils to schools to which they are assigned ...") obtained a used 1935 GMC, 20-passenger bus from the Laconia Street Rail-

way for \$725. With repairs, the initial outlay was about \$500. Mr. George Nelson was employed to drive the bus, house it, and keep it in repair. The school board estimates that the total expense for the Guinea Ridge route will not exceed the charges for sending a private car two trips twice a day over the route and, at the end of the school year, the bus can be sold and the proceeds will represent net profit.

There are some advantages to having a school bus owned and operated by the school district:

- 1. There is no expense for registering the vehicle by the Motor Vehicle Department.
 - 2. There is a rebate of gasoline and oil taxes.
- 3. The tax on tires, or a municipal discount, is returnable.
- 4. The usual per mileage cost on a yearly basis is less for municipally-owned conveyances than for privately owned.
- 5. A municipally-owned bus can be used on other routes at a minimum of expense.

There are some disadvantages in the operation of a large school bus.

- 1. On some rural roads, a bus cannot be operated each school day because of poor road beds.
- 2. It is not always possible to obtain the services of a conscientious driver and caretaker.

A summary of the costs of the operation and upkeep of this school bus over the Guinea Ridge route for 1945-6 may indicate the advisability of the continuance of school bus transportation under district ownership. One family moved to a house near the Belmont-Gilmanton Town Line on Route #106. It was found to be less expensive to transport an elementary school pupil to Belmont and pay tuition than to carry the child to one of the Gilmanton schools.

For the protection of children in inclement weather, wooden shelters were erected on highway land at Jones' Mill, Poverty Corner and Camp Wingo road.

Health

The School Nurse states that there were no epidemics in Gilmanton last year, but mumps are now on the way. The pupils are in very good general health.

Very few clinics could be held this year. A tonsil and adenoid clinic was held last Summer at the Wolfeboro Hospital only because we were able to bring some of the help to aid in caring for the children. However, a Toxoid Immunization Clinic will be held soon to get more children protected against diphtheria. This will be available to all children from nine months of age through the fourth grade group. At the present time there are 63 unprotected pupils in the schools.

It was not possible to have hot school lunches due to the difficulty in getting help as well as the shortage of unrationed foods especially meats. Perhaps with the end of the rationing and the war this project can be undertaken. It would be very beneficial for many.

No bad problem cases came up this year. The usual routine work was done. The hearing was tested with the use of the Audiometer given by the American Legion for the use of the schools in this region. No very serious hearing cases were found. A first aid film was shown to all pupils to help teach them some of the simpler things to do in an accident.

Teachers' Retirement System

In the spring of 1945, the Legislature amended P. L. Chapter 135, Section 8, Revised Laws, to assess school districts a portion of the expense in the teachers' retirement system. The present rate is 4% of the annual salaries of member teachers. In 1945-6 the charges to Gilmanton for this system will be \$52.00.

State Employees' Retirement System

The 1945 Legislature established the State Employees' Retirement System and charges each school district in this school supervisory union a portion of the total expense for the superintendent's retirement. In 1945-6, approximately \$19 will be Gilmanton's share.

Improvement of Instruction Through Teachers' Meetings

During the war years and gasoline rationing, it was not feasible to hold teachers' meetings in which all teachers in the supervisory union engaged simultaneously. With the release of the restrictions, we may now continue our former custom of holding meetings for the improvement of instruction.

The first meeting in the 1945-6 school year was held in Belmont on September 4th. The topics discussed were current problems.

- 1. Ways of teaching international understanding and brotherly love.
- 2. Teaching through pictures.
 - a. In reading books.
 - b. By slides, films, and projected views.
 - c. In drawing lessons.

The second meeting was held in Tilton in conjunction with the Supervisory Union #59 Board meeting on November 14th. The points were:

- 1. Demonstration of Lip-Reading Teaching.
- 2. Devices to Correct Hearing Deficiencies.
- 3. Brief Histories of the Towns in Which We Work.
- 4. Geography All Teachers Should Know to Interpret Commonplace Scenes.

Conclusion

In submitting this sixth annual report, I express my appreciation again to the members of the School Board for their sincere consideration of school problems, to the teachers, nurse and other workers for their individual efforts to promote the school program.
