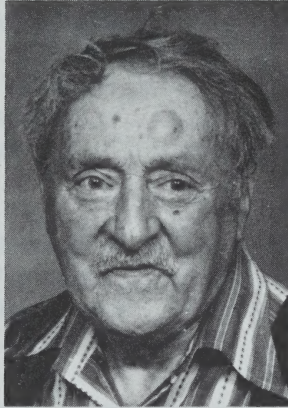

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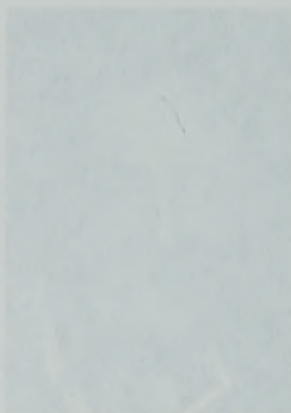
LEON S. TORSEY

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“STATE OF THE COMMUNITY”

In 1985, the Town of New Hampton finally took delivery of our new fire truck, as well as a new loader and 1 ton dump truck for the Highway Department, and a new cruiser for the Police Department.

The biggest single issue facing the Town this last year was a landfill closure plan mandated by the State to be completed in October. We asked for, and received, an extension until after this year's Town Meeting so that appropriate funds could be raised.

Over the next five years, we will be asking for an additional \$40,000.00 (approximately) per year, to be put into a capital reserve fund to cover the cost of the landfill close out. The projected cost of the close out is far greater than the original anticipated cost.

In the 1984 to 1985 period, New Hampton saw a 1.7 million dollar increase in property evaluations. This enabled us to keep our property tax rate increase to a minimum last year. We don't feel this will be the case this year, however.

Due to a projected increase of 19% in the school budget, skyrocketing insurance rates, and the expense of the landfill closure plan, our tax rate will increase significantly. Taking into consideration this year's warrant articles, and an estimated property value increase of 1 million dollars, we project an estimated \$6.00 per thousand tax rate increase in 1986.

It also should be noted that New Hampton is growing by leaps and bounds. Two large subdivisions in their preliminary stages are before the Planning Board at present. Although these are presented as retirement and secondary homes, it still will place an additional burden on our highway and police departments, and to some extent, probably our school system.

New Hampton Town Meeting

March 12, 1985

A. Alden Hofling was appointed by Moderator T. Holmes Moore to be temporary moderator for the March 12th Town Meeting.

At 9:50 A.M. March 12, 1985 Arthur Seavey, New Hampton Town Clerk, swore in A. Alden Hofling and at 10 o'clock A. Alden Hofling opened the Town Meeting and read the beginning of the warrant as follows.

State of New Hampshire. The polls will be opened from 10:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said New Hampton on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to cast your ballots for Town officers and for questions required by law to be on the ballots. Polls to close not earlier than 6:00 P.M.

The remainder of the Warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Saturday, March 16, 1985 at 10:00 A.M.

The Town Clerk signed and notarized the new check lists made by the Supervisors of the check list, Barbara Chase, Ralph Ness and June Smith at 9:45 A.M.

The polls were closed at 6:00 P.M.

There are 864 voters in the Town of New Hampton. 280 voted, 32% cast ballots. A warm rainy day. (40 absentee ballots)

We had three sets of ballot clerks and three callers — first: Hope Clement caller, Patricia Torsey, Barbara Chase, Doug Salmon; second: Leon Torsey caller, Ralph Huckins, Bill Clement, Ralph Ness; third: Bill Roberts caller, Kay Seavey, June Smith, Abbie Ahern.

March 16, 1985

To the inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton, in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in Town affairs.

March 12, 1985 we met at the Town House to vote on the Officers of the Town.

The remainder of the Warrant will be acted upon at the Town House Saturday, March 16, 1985 at 10:00 A.M.

Willis Ober was appointed by the Moderator to act as Moderator for this meeting. Moderator Ober opened the meeting with a United Salute to the American Flag. "America the Beautiful" was sung in unison accompanied by Mrs. Elena Phillips on the piano. Reverend Cleveland led us in Prayer.

The Moderator read the warrant and had Arthur Seavey New Hampton Town Clerk read the results of our March 12th election totals.

The Moderator then read Article #1 as follows:

To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

William Clement moved the article to raise \$96,575.00. It was seconded by Richard Hallberg.

There was no discussion so the Moderator reread the article and a unanimous aye vote was accepted.

Article number one was accepted.

Moderator read article #2 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the completion of the Town Office building project and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

Article was moved by Horace Boynton and seconded by William Clement.

Clement was recognized and explained what it was for.

Bernard Smith showed plaque to be given to the Library to be put in the Floor where Selectmen's Office had been.

After a short discussion the Moderator reread article and put it to a vote which was in the affirmative.

Article #2 was accepted.

Article #3 was read by Moderator as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500.00 for the support of the Fire Department.

Article was moved by Horace Boynton and seconded by Richard Hallberg.

After a short discussion Moderator reread article and there was a unanimous Aye vote.

Article #3 was accepted.

Article #4 was read by Moderator as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$58,032.00 for the support of the Police Department.

Richard Hallberg moved article and it was seconded by Horace Boynton.

Chief Salmon gave a concise explanation for this article. Moderator asked for a discussion. No discussion so Moderator reread article and received an unanimous aye vote.

Article #4 was accepted.

Moderator read article #5 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,850.00 for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser.

Chief Salmon moved article seconded by William Clement.

Moderator asked for a discussion.

Anthony Romano asked about warrantees, Paullette Maynard asked about Insurance, Pat Schlesinger asked about 2 cruisers, Salmon answered the questions and said no 2 cruisers this year. Mrs. Wendelboe asked about Rental or leasing of vehicles. Salmon in reply said they would have to lease 2 vehicles instead of one too expensive. After Mrs. Maynard Dana Torsey and William Clement discussed, the Moderator reread article and put it to a vote.

A unanimous aye vote was accepted.

Article #5 was accepted.

Moderator read article #6 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$128,500.00 for the support of the Highway Department.

Moved by Joseph Powers Jr. and seconded by William Clement.

Mr. Powers discussed the maintenance expenses of materials and parts, number of roads to be repaired.

Kenneth Torsey thought if the drivers of the Town machines kept them on the road we could save a lot of expense.

After discussion Moderator reread article and received a unanimous Aye vote.

Article #6 was accepted.

Moderator read article #7 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new 1 Ton Dump Truck for the Highway Department for the sum of \$19,000.00 by withdrawing this amount from the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

Article moved by Richard Hallberg seconded by Joseph Powers Jr.

In the discussion Powers explained that it was an 85 International diesel, Kenneth Torsey wanted to know how many Diesels in Town. After more discussion the Moderator reread article and received a unanimous Aye vote.

Article #7 was accepted.

Moderator read article #8 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new Front End Loader and raise and appropriate the sum of \$70,000.00 plus interest by borrowing on the credit of the Town, to be repaid over a period of three years with a first payment of \$23,000.00 plus first year interest due in March 1986.

William Clement Moved article and Joseph Powers Jr. seconded it.

In discussion it was told it was to replace a 1961 Loader. Richard Hallberg said this was an approximate figure not a bid figure. Chet Butcher, Bud Lowell, Anthony Romano, Joseph Powers Jr., Mrs. Wendelboe all asked questions such as options, leasing, prime rates, insurance, using experienced drivers, who is responsible for machine, hiring and leasing too expensive. Mr. Oswald asked about operator training. Bernard Smith after listening to pros and cons asked for and got the question moved. Ballot vote 94 voted 58 yes and 35 no 62 needed for a 2/3 vote. Article was defeated.

Moderator called for a recess till 12:30 as it was Noon.

Moderator opened meeting at 12:30 P.M. and read article #9 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 for cleaning, sand blasting and painting the underside of Central Street Bridge, providing the Town of Bristol raises a like amount.

Richard Hallberg moved question and Horace Boynton seconded it.

Hallberg changed the amount to \$4400.00 as Bristol raised like amount and Bill statement was the new bid.

Moderator reread article as changed and as there was no discussion a unanimous aye vote was given and article was accepted.

Moderator read article #10 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of Main Street, and authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund; the State to contribute \$10,000.00 for a total of \$15,000.00.

Richard Hallberg moved question and William Clement seconded it.

Hallberg explained it was to fix the storm drains which we have wanted done for a good many years and level road to raise the deep ditches. Mrs. Wendelboe, Ken Torsey, Tony Romano, Dan Sharp, Dana Torsey, Larry Blood all asked questions and received the answers. Moderator reread article and a unanimous vote of ayes was given but for one no vote by Ken Torsey. Article #10 was accepted.

Moderator read article #11 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$5,000.00 for the purchase of a used van to carry medical equipment and emergency rescue tools, and to authorize withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

Hope Clement moved the question and Tony Governanti seconded it.

Michael Drake explained why it was necessary. After discussion Moderator reread article and a Unanimous aye vote was cast.

Article #11 was accepted.

Moderator read article #12 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,735.00 as our share of the costs of operating the Newfound Ambulance service for one year and to authorize withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

William Clement moved article and Horace Boynton seconded it.

Mrs. Torsey, Tony Romano, Steve Drake, Tony Governanti, Leon Torsey, Pat Torsey all asked questions and received answers. Moderator reread article and an aye vote was given.

Article #12 was accepted.

Moderator read article #13 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be put into the Property reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund.

William Clement moved article, Arthur Seavey seconded it.

William Clement explained, the Moderator put article to a vote and a unanimous aye vote was given.

Article #13 was accepted.

Moderator read article #14 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the care of Cemeteries.

William Clement moved question and Richard Hallberg seconded it.

Hope Swain, William Clement discussed article.

Moderator reread article and put it to a vote.

Article #14 was accepted with a unanimous aye vote.

Moderator read article #15 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,284.00 for the support of Regional Associations: Community Action Program \$2,332.00; Bristol Community Center \$1,185.00; Lakes Region Planning Commission \$1,257.00; Newfound Area Nursing Association \$4,840.00; InterLakes Day Care Center \$670.00.

Article moved by Mr. Holman and seconded by Anthony Romano.

It was moved to delete \$670.00 from this amount but motion was defeated.

Fran Wendelboe, Governanti, Hope Clement, Kenneth Torsey, Tony Romano, Pat Torsey and June Smith discussed this article pro and con. Moderator put article to vote and it was accepted.

Moderator read article #16 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the New Hampton Community Kindergarten.

Eileen Kondrad moved article and Larry Blood seconded it.

Mrs. Wendelboe discussed and explained, moderator put article to vote and it was accepted.

Moderator read article #17 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for Patriotic purposes.

William Clement moved article, seconded by Horace Boynton.

No discussion, Moderator reread article and put it to a vote. Article #17 was accepted.

Moderator read article #18 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,875.00 for the purchase of a new copier and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount from the Revenue Sharing Fund (By Request).

Moved article by Chester Butcher seconded by Horace Boynton.

Discussion by Chet Butcher, Pat Schlesinger, Larry Blood, Horace Boynton, Tony Romano and Hope Clement. Moderator reread article and an aye vote was accepted. Article was accepted.

Moderator read article #19 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of Hospitals: Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, Franklin Regional Hospital, Lakes Region General Hospital, Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

Article moved by Dana Torsey seconded by Leon Torsey.

Discussed by Tony Romano in opposition, William Clement and Kenneth Torsey gave their opinions. Moderator reread article and put it to a vote. Article was accepted.

Moderator read article #21 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell a portion of land from the Town House lot consisting of one quarter acre more or less, to Nelson and Arlene Huckins and have the voters determine the worth of same one quarter acre (By request).

Moved by William Clement and seconded by Richard Hallberg.

Richard Hallberg explained article with Arlene Huckins. June Smith wanted to move article but was not accepted, Richard Hallberg and Horace Boynton moved and seconded a motion to have deeds searched. Arthur Seavey asked that price of deed search be added to price of land, accepted. Pat Schlesinger wanted to know how much land. Hope Swain and Tony Romano, Richard Hallberg discussed who owns land. After discussion moderator reread article and it was accepted, as amended.

William Clement moved that if the Town selected to cut the wood as necessary and keep the wood Dana Torsey and Horace Boynton both seconded the motion, Moderator received a unanimous vote in the affirmative.

Moderator read article #20 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to create a special unpaid committee to be known as a Regional Refuse Disposal Planning Committee consisting of three persons to be appointed by the Moderator pursuant to RSA 53-B:1. This committee shall study the advisability of establishing a Regional Refuse Disposal District, may not obligate the Town in any way, and report back to the Selectmen and the Town for further action at a subsequent Town meeting.

Horace Boynton moved question and it was seconded by William Clement.

Discussed by Horace Boynton, Tony Romano, June Smith, Bernard Smith, pro and con. Moderator put article to vote and it was accepted unanimously.

Moderator read article #22 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State Funds which may be made available during 1985. Further to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purposes designated with applicable Federal and State regulations.

Steve Drake moved article seconded by Barbara Chase.

Barbara Chase at this time said that she as a Supervisor of the Check list had researched and found Check lists of the Town from 1896 up to date and thought the Towns people should have this information for historical value. Moderator reread article and put it to a vote which was unanimous. Article #22 was accepted.

Moderator read article #23 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

Hope Clement moved article seconded by William Clement.

No discussion. Moderator put article to vote with a unanimous vote. Article was accepted.

Moderator read article #24 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of Taxes.

Moved and seconded, no discussion, Moderator reread article and a unanimous aye vote was accepted.

Moderator read article #25 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collectors deeds.

Moved by Pat Schlesinger seconded by June Smith. No discussion, Moderator reread article and put it to a vote. Article was accepted by a unanimous vote.

Moderator read article #26 as follows:

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade off or sell any unusable equipment or materials.

Moved by Richard Hallberg and seconded by Bernard Smith.

No discussion, article reread by Moderator and a unanimous aye vote was accepted. Article #26 was accepted.

Moderator read article #27 as follows:

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

It was moved and seconded that Pat Schlesinger was to attend meeting in Bridgewater. Tony Romano wanted the Selectmen to clarify who owns the land where the old route 104 road used to be. William Clement said Selectmen would find out. Police Chief Merritt Salmon read a good recommendation on his Officer Smith who under fast police work helped to arrest individuals who had been involved in a robbery in Concord. Katherine Seavey asked to give the Town Clerks hours and where we were since the new Office building was finished. Nine to nine Monday thru Thursday at our Home on the Old Bristol road. Friday and Saturday and Sunday if you have a problem call us by telephone for an appointment. William Clement asked for a vote to close the meeting, Moderator got a unanimous aye vote at 2:20 P.M. seconded by Horace Boynton.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said New Hampton on Thursday the second day of May 1985 at 7:00 O'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects: (Pursuant to Superior Court decree Dated April 15, 1985 authorizing the calling of a special Town Meeting with the same authority as an annual meeting.)

The remainder of the Warrant will be acted upon at the New Hampton Town House, Saturday, March 15, 1986 at 10:00 A.M.

4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,030.00 for the support of the Fire Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,720.00 for equipment for the Fire Department: \$7,020.00 for Pagers and \$1,700.00 for coats, helmets and boots.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for a new water tank for the 1974 fire truck.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$78,646.00 for the support of the Police Department.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$23,000.00 for the principal, plus the interest at a variable rate of 60% of prime, on the Highway Loader Note.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500.00 for shimming of Town Roads.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17,500.00 for oiling of Town Roads.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of Town bridges.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the repair of Main Street; the State to contribute \$10,000.00 for a total of \$15,000.00.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the repair of the Highway Department building roof.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the replacement of Ames Brook bridge on Ox Bow Road; the State to contribute \$24,000.00 for a total of \$36,000.00. (By Request)

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 to improve access to Route 104 from the East end of Town House Road. (By Request)

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,300.00, and authorize the withdrawal of \$15,000.00 from the Revenue Sharing Fund to be applied to this amount; \$25,300.00 for test wells and a closure plan for the Town landfill, \$15,000.00 to remove solid waste adjacent to and over the bank.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,262.78 for the support of Regional Associations: Community Action Program \$2,798.00; Bristol Community Center \$1,304.00; Lakes Region Planning Commission \$1,125.00; Newfound Area Nursing Association \$4,480.00; Inter-Lakes Day Care Center \$555.78.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in the Property Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund for the revaluation of the Town by the Appraisal Division of the Department of Revenue Administration.

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for repairs to the Town House.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,730.00 as our share of the costs of operating the Newfound Ambulance Service for one year.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to fund the Zoning Board of Adjustment if the Zoning Ordinance is passed.

26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the care of cemeteries.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the New Hampton Community Kindergarten.

28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 for Patriotic purposes.

29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$625.00 as our share for the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste Planning District.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the New Hampton Conservation Commission.

31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the support of hospitals: Mary Hitchcock Memorial Hospital, Franklin Regional Hospital, Lakes Region General Hospital, Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.

32. To see if the Town will vote to accept from Alfred Jenness a gift of a tract of land (6.3 acres) which contains the Cold Spring on Carter Mountain Road.

33. To see if the Town will vote to employ computers for the purpose of printing tax bills, ledgers, voters check lists and any other uses which may be necessary.

34. To see if the Town will vote to have Pinnacle Hill Road from Route 132 in New Hampton Village to the Meredith town line, and Meredith Ridge Road from Pinnacle Hill Road to the Meredith town line designated as Scenic Roads, pursuant to RSA 231:157, 231:158. (By Petition)

35. To see if the Town will vote to create a buffer zone of 300 feet back from the high water line on the Pemigewasset River to be dedicated for use of conservation and recreation. (By Petition)

36. To see if the Town will vote to prohibit and oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high-level radioactive waste in the Town and State, and further, to call on the Legislature and Governor to pass law that any New Hampshire radioactive waste agreements will be subject to approval by statewide referendum, and further, to call on Congress to investigate the prudence of the Department of Energy's present plans for nuclear waste disposal. (By Petition)

37. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the action of Town Meeting, March 17, 1979, Article 17, and to transfer the accrued account into a Capital Reserve Fund for Conservation and Recreation Development; the Conservation Commission to be designated agent for the fund.

38. To see if the Town will vote to require building permits.

39. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Regulations for Flood Hazard Areas to read:

Add Preamble: The following regulations shall apply to all lands designated as flood hazard areas by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in its Flood Hazard Boundary Map for the Town of New Hampton, dated April 2, 1986, which is declared to be a part of this ordinance.

Amend Section II: Add "The Building Inspector shall review proposed developments to assure that all necessary permits have been applied for and/or received from those governmental agencies for which approval is required by Federal or State law, including Section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1334. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to certify these assurances to the Building Inspector."

Amend Section IV: Add "Mobile homes shall be anchored to resist floatation, collapse or lateral movement by providing over-the-top frame ties to ground anchors. Specific requirements shall be that (a) over-the-top ties be provided at each of the four corners with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and mobile homes less than 50 feet long shall require one additional tie per side; (b) frame ties be provided at each corner with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and mobile homes less than 50 feet long shall require four additional ties per side; (c) all components of the anchoring system shall be capable of carrying a force of 4,800 pounds; and (d) any additions to the mobile home shall be similarly anchored."

Amend Section V: Add "The term "substantial improvement" does not include either: a. any project for improvement of a structure in order to comply with existing State or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions, or b. any alteration of a structure listed on the National Register of Historic Places or a State Inventory of Historic Places."

Amend Section VI to read Section VII

Amend Section VII to read Section VIII

Add New Section VI: 1. "The Building Inspector shall maintain for public inspection and furnish upon request, any certification of flood-proofing, and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been flood-proofed, the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was flood-proofed. This information must be furnished by the applicant." 2. "The Building Inspector shall obtain, review, and reasonably utilize any 100 year flood elevation data available from a Federal, State, or other source, until such other data has been provided by the Administrator, as criteria for requiring that (a) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the 100 year flood level, and (b) that all new construction and substantial improvements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or flood-proofed to or above the 100 year flood level."

40. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept on behalf of the Town any Federal or State Funds which may be made available during 1986. Further to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to make application for said funds and then expend the same for the purpose designated with applicable Federal and State regulations.

41. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

42. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.

43. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by Tax Collector's deeds.

44. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to trade off or sell any unusable equipment or materials.

45. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Annual Police Report for 1985

The demand for our services is becoming greater and greater each year. It is now time to add another Full time Officer to the force. During the year of 1985 we covered 62 motor vehicle accidents, 3 of these were fatal accidents, 18 of them had injuries to one or more people and 41 of them had a minimum of \$500.00 of property damage. We covered numerous other accidents with less than \$500.00 total property damage. This year I have a new reporting system and I will be able to tell you at next years meeting in more detail as to the coverage of accidents. On the phone log for the year, we received a total of 2,696 calls at Belknap County Sheriffs Office.

For the year 1986 I am asking for three items: first is that the town purchase a second cruiser. This will be a great advantage for us as well as the town. This cruiser will be set up the same as the present one, with the following exceptions, no roof lights, no POLICE and no phone # on the trunk lid. This type of vehicle is known as a Low Profile Cruiser. The vehicle will remain black and white in color and have the town seals on the doors. This vehicle is hard to spot and yet it is still considered a marked cruiser. The present cruiser is running very well and will have approximately 55,000 miles on it at Town Meeting time. In 1985 the cruiser cost \$876.15 to operate for the 8 months we owned it. This includes one full-engine tune-up, six tires, oil and filters. The oil and filter is changed every 2,000 miles and tires are rotated every 4,000 miles. The second item is \$750.00 to purchase a two year old mobile radio for the new cruiser. The last item is that the Town hire another full-time officer as of June 1, 1986. Amount needed \$12,350.00. This includes his pay, insurances, uniforms and some over-time. If the town does not hire this full-time officer \$10,200.00 will have to be added to the overtime section of the budget and an additional \$1,800.00 be added to the Specials section of the budget.

This next section is fairly new. It will tell you each year the amount of stolen property and property lost by fire. For 1985 the total of stolen and burnt property is \$83,289.00. The amount of recovered property is \$18,461.00, \$49,500.00 was a house that was burnt and is an arson case. This still leaves a total of \$15,328.00 worth of property unaccounted for.

The 1985 Budget is overrun by \$854.83. The reason for the overrun is that \$1,100.00 had to be spent in repairing the rear door and window of the cruiser due to a prisoner who damaged the door and window. This money is being paid back to the Town by the subject through the Probation Dept. at the Laconia District Court. If you deducted the \$1,100.00 from the total amount expended for 1985 I was under my estimated amount by \$245.17.

This year I have planned several things to be conducted in town: a dog clinic to be run in April and will be announced in local papers, a registry of elementary school and kindergarten children, and hopefully a movie or two for the school children with the schools permission on drugs/alcohol and strangers, hopefully a bike registry and safety inspection if there is money available.

New Hampton Fire Department 1985 Report

As probably everyone in town has seen at one time or another, we do have a new truck. It was delivered in mid-summer and since then we have had intensive training in the driving of the vehicle as well as in learning how to operate the pump in all its capabilities.

This past year was a good year in terms of fire losses for New Hampton. There were 63 fire related calls and of these, there were 2 structure fires, 12 automobile related calls, 6 smoke investigations, 18 chimney fires and 25 mutual aid calls. Over and above this, there were 8 forestry calls and 52 medical calls.

In reviewing the cost to operate your Fire Department over the last year, it has become apparent that we must ask for more funds this year. Insurance costs have skyrocketed and with 2 additional vehicles it more than doubled the cost of 1984.

Costs of radio and truck maintenance increased significantly and if the members did not do most of the vehicle maintenance, the cost would have been outrageous.

These costs for repairs have shown that we must replace our paging system and we should replace the water tank in our 1974 International. Also, we must replace some of the coats and boots which are worn out and do not afford adequate protection for the fire fighters.

A reminder again to those who may not as yet have Smoke and Heat alarms that their lives may be dependent upon them, and if not there, or not operable, it could be fatal.

Report Of Town Forest Fire Warden And State Forest Rangers

Between July 1984 and June 1985, we experienced more forest fires throughout our state than in any year in the last 50. Two of the leading causes of the 1,605 fires were children and fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden. Both causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call you Forest Fire Warden.

If you own forest land, you will become responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

Annual Report for 1985

The New Hampton Rescue Squad had it's most busy year so far with fifty three calls. We had four fatalities and quite a few major accidents. The remainder of the calls were for in-home medical emergencies.

The purchase of the Ford Econoline Van has helped cut response time in half. Many thanks to those who helped get the van ready or who donated money and equipment.

Four members of the department have gotten or are getting their EMT certification and we now have the services of a female LPN on the squad. This brings the total up to eight EMTs.

Our next major purchase will be a set of MAST trousers. In addition we are planning to form an area diving rescue squad, and are looking into the purchase of a small boat and motor. There are six certified divers in the department.

One of our major concerns is the traffic build up on Rt 104 due to the increase in businesses. There was a major accident there every weekend this past summer. Thought should be given to placing a stop sign instead of a yield sign on the I 93 exit. Also a reduction of the speed limit. The area is well patrolled by our police, but too many people are not looking where they are going.

Once again we thank the people of New Hampton for their support and assistance. We look forward to helping the community in 1986.

Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District Report - 1985

A very important problem to be studied and discussed should have New Hampton people thinking of the Towns future.

Last year, our Town Moderator T. Holmes Moore appointed me as chairperson of the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District Planning Committee for New Hampton. Mrs. Pat Schlesinger and Mr. Horace Boynton made up the rest of the Committee.

We are in a Waste District which has been going for at least four years. There are twelve Towns in this District none of which feel that their waste facilities are adequate for the next fifteen years. In a population projection of the Towns, New Hampton generates approximately 7 1/2% of waste per ton per year in the district. As a small town of less than 2000 we are calculated to have approximately 3.5 pounds of waste per day, per person. This is high but does not include any seasonable influx of population.

Campton, Danbury, Dorchester, Ellsworth, New Hampton, Plymouth, Plymouth State College, Rumney, Thornton, Warren, Waterville Valley and Wentworth were the towns used for this projection. Plymouth figures 18% and Plymouth State College 25%. New Hampton is about midway in this program.

We have recycling, incineration, refuse to energy and regional sanitary land fill. By breaking down these options to Cost, environmental impact and risk, which is the best option?

There are no waste energy plants in the Pemi-Baker district. The waste produced in this district does not warrant a waste energy plant, therefore there is no known price option at this time.

The second choice entails straight incineration. Plymouth has a small 20 TPD unit.

We have three basic options to discuss, #1 an ash land fill, #2 a transfer station for #3 recycling of bottles, aluminum and incinerated material.

If we agree to incinerate, Maintenance, operation and haul cost will be the responsibility of the respective towns.

The district made a list of expense to each town, and New Hampton was listed as \$33,000. capital expenditures, with \$14,700. as an annual operation, maintenance and hauling cost, which when broken down gives us a \$14.20 per ton cost.

New Hampton's refuse facility is located off river road in Bristol. The facility is leased by the town from Alfred Jenness. This facility is under the jurisdiction of the Selectmen. It serves only the New Hampton residents and businesses. Trash collectors are available on a private basis. The town is currently under contract with the land owner on a renewable lease which was signed in 1981 for 10 years. The solid waste management plan listed it as having a 5 to 10 year remaining design life. It is operated as a sanitary land fill. Deposited refuse is compacted and covered by a bull dozer. Cover material is trucked in as needed. The site is supervised by an attendant during open hours. Any expansion of this site would require ground water monitoring wells and a synthetic or clay liner.

Recycling is necessary if we want to incinerate in Plymouth.

We do have a serious problem. Lets talk about it.

New Hampton Conservation Commission

Dear, dear Alfred Jenness, forever giving of himself, has designated his sparkling Cold Spring on Carter Mt. Road, as a gift to the town. The wooded tract of 6.3 acres surrounding the spring will protect this wonderful water source. Alfred has asked that the land not be developed and the spring be available to the public. A truly wonderful gift for the generations which we would like to call: The Alfred Jenness Natural Area — Cold Spring.

The growing concern for the protection of water quality, future water sources and wildlife habitat has led to the beginning of a town wetlands inventory. Dave Erler would like help with the project from anyone with such experience or just interested in learning more.

The commission reviewed dredge and fill permits; with some modifications, the Wetlands Board granted all. One application, submitted in late fall, is to have a public hearing in Concord in February. The permit includes a culvert and road construction in the Magoon Brook wetland at the Pemigewasset River.

They have arrived! The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Reserve Battalion based at Grenier Field, has begun work in the Conservation Area, improving the logging road through the forest to the recreation area. On three cold fall weekends, they were able to make considerable impact. The project is a training exercise for the battalion, thus we're able to secure their services. A half-dozen men braved the November cold; however, in spring, 85 men and much heavy equipment will descend and it looks like all kinds of good things are possible. Plans include a baseball field, prepared by the Corps, but the finishing work done by the town volunteers. We are embarked on a two-year project.

Andy and Peter Blake and their Midnight Express played lively music for Old Home Day at The Farm, under the shade of the old and beautiful apple tree in the pasture. We look forward to a repeat performance.

Sarah Rice attended the Forest Society's Youth Conservation Camp. James Piper was to attend; however, the quota of young men was filled, so he will attend the coming summer session. Sarah was enthusiastic and found a newly-sparked interest in forestry. The second campership was given in memory of Aaron Jaffa, former commission member, who untiringly supported the commission's efforts to protect natural resources and provide green areas in New Hampton.

Dave Erler led a group, ages 5 to 85, on a nature walk. Armed with long-handled nets, the group "scooped" for insects amid the grasses on top of the esker in the pasture and put them into a collecting jar for closer examination. Special screen paddles enabled everyone to fish in both still and running waters for another wide variety of insects in various life stages.

We initiated meetings of representatives of the Pemi River towns to discuss a long range management plan for the river frontage. Responses were encouraging.

Our appreciation to those who are always at the ready to help us with expert, legal and technical assistance: Selectman Gordon Huckins; Jim Rollins, Lakes Region Planning Commission; and Bart Mayer, NH Municipal Association; Bill Phinney, NH Fish and Game Dept. Bud Nelson, NH DRED Forester, keeps an eye on the timber management program and has given us good grades thus far. We are working with Rick DeMark, US Soil Conservation Service and David Lorch, Belknap County Conservation District, on an environmental impact assessment and river management plan.

Watch for further announcement of Kite Day, May 4. Hope you will join us.

We approved 13 subdivisions involving 1,101.95 acres, creating 40 lots. There were nine pre-application hearings that have not been brought forward for final approval, also one application for an earth excavation permit. With this amount of activity, the Board has had a very busy year.

New Hampton's master plan was completed by Lakes Region Planning Commission and adopted by the Planning Board.

On behalf of the Planning Board. I'd like to thank all the citizens who took an active interest in the workings of the Board by attending our meetings throughout the year. Our regular meetings are held on the third Tuesday of each month at 7:30 p.m. and are open to the public.

Inter-Lakes Day Care Center and Nursery School

Report to the Towns

During 1985 the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center served 127 children from 98 families. Due to the increase in young children and low unemployment in the area our programs have been at or close to capacity for a majority of the year. The Inter-Lakes Day Care Center, Inc. is a private, non-profit, fully licensed, tax-exempt child care program incorporated in October 1971, and governed by a volunteer Board of Directors comprised of community citizens and parents. Our school is open on a year-round basis from 6:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. making it possible for parents to maintain employment. As a participant in the New Hampshire Child Care Food Program sponsored by USDA 8,096 hot lunches, 2,335 breakfasts, and 15,107 snacks were served during the year.

Our goals and primary responsibilities to working families are to provide a stimulating atmosphere with a program of social, emotional, physical, and cognitive development for ages three through twelve. The children receive creative and educational experiences, field trips, weekly movies, and many other enrichment activities. In addition we provide a full range of services of health care, nutrition, dental care, vision and hearing screening, child behavior and development with parenting education and resource availability for the entire family.

Programs offered include full and part-time child care, a Nursery School Program open to children of non-working parents, a Seven-Upper Program for school children before and after school and during vacation, individualized special needs for handicapped children or those in protection from abuse and neglect. A growing program we sponsor is a network of licensed Family Day Care Homes receiving federal reimbursement from USDA by serving nutritious meals and snacks while providing care for children of working parents in their homes. We currently have 23 homes under this program.

The total budget of the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center for 1986 is \$165,192.00. Of this we will be receiving in tuition paid by parents \$101,287, \$6,500 from N.H. Child Care Food Program (USDA), \$5,000 from N.H. Child Care Food Program (USDA) for sponsorship of Family Day Care Homes, \$2,713 from N.H. Job Training Partnership Act, and \$2,500 from United Way. This also includes the following: \$47,192 of which \$28,666 is Title XX and \$18,526 which must be raised in local funding. The money that is received from the towns is matched by the federal government under Title XX.

Area residents are cordially welcome to visit the Inter-Lakes Day Care Center and Nursery School at 11 Lang Street in Meredith.
