THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF PEMBROKE IN THE COUNTY OF MERRIMACK IN SAID STATE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN TOWN AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Elementary School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday the Twelfth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after September 1, 1963, on all unpaid poll taxes.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land.
6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in this Town.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to deed to E. David Swett that portion of the Town's right-of-way over his land which extends westerly from the end of the present roadway.
8. To see if the Town will authorize its Selectmen to transfer the sum of Two Hundred Ten Dollars (\$210.00) to the Town's Capital Reserve Fund, said sum being the proceeds of the sale of the Bombay Bridge.

- 8-A To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to purchase the lot of land west of the Fire Station on Union Street from Elizabeth Lea; and to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800.00) for this purpose.
9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to serve as a committee to meet with the Selectmen of the Town of Allentown to investigate the feasibility of combining the operation of some phases of the government of the two towns, in order to provide better services on a more economical basis, and to report their findings and recommendations at the next Town Meeting.
0. To see if the Town will vote to pass the following Ordinance.

MOBILE HOME PARK LICENSES.

1. No Mobile Home Park, whether newly constructed or presently existing, shall be operated after the date of the passage of this amendment, until it shall first have been licensed to operate by the Board of Selectmen.
2. Mobile Home Park licenses shall be issued without fee, by the Board of Selectmen, upon application of the owner of the Park, annually, and shall expire on the 31st day of March following their issuance. Such licenses must be posted in a conspicuous place on the premises at all times.
3. Applications for licenses shall be made annually and shall show the name and address of the owner, the location of the Park, the number of mobile homes presently located there, the number of spaces available and such other information as the Selectmen may require.
4. It shall be the duty of the owner of the Park to maintain at all times a register of all persons occupying mobile homes in said Park, showing for each the name and address, the license number of all mobile homes and the automobiles of the owners thereof and the date of entrance and departure. Failure to maintain such register shall be grounds for suspension of the Park License.

TOWN OF PRMBROKE, NEW HAMPSHIRE

ABSTRACT OF ACTION ON ARTICLES IN WARRANT
MARCH 13, 1962 TOWN MEETING

5. Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars, upon conviction, for each day such violation continues.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two hundred Dollars (\$200.00) as annual rental of the space in which the Town clock is located, to defray the cost of repairs and maintenance of the Clock Tower, said rental to continue as long as the clock is maintained in its present location. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee and funds therefor are included in the budget.)
12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a hydrant on Fairview Avenue, at a location to be determined by the Board of Water Commissioners; and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds therefor. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee and funds therefor are included in the budget.)
13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light at the intersection of Fairview Avenue and High Street Extension, and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds therefor. (This Article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.)
14. To hear the reports of Auditors, Agents and Committees, or of Officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the after-noon.

Meeting called to order by Moderator, Gedeon N. Petit, Jr., at seven o'clock in the afternoon.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. Voted to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. Voted to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
4. To see if the Town will vote to charge twenty (20) cents on and after September 1, 1962, on all unpaid poll taxes. Amended to December 1st, 1962.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the Town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of taxes, and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to the purchaser of such land. Article accepted.
6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 287 of the Revised Statutes Annotated relative to playing games of Beano in this Town. Voted on official ballots. Yes 480 - No 236.
7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated: Voted to accept.

- (a) The Henry T. Simpson Fund of Two hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Simpson Lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.
- (b) The John Sullivan Fund of Two hundred fifty (\$250.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Sullivan Lot in Pembroke Street Cemetery.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize its Board of Selectmen to file, on behalf of the Town, an application, in form and manner required by the United States, and in conformity with Public Law 560, 83rd Congress, as amend-

and to enter into such negotiations and do whatever else may be required for an advance, in an amount not to exceed Seventeen thousand (\$17,000.00) Dollars, to be made by the United States to the Town of Pembroke to aid in defraying the cost of surveys, reports and plan preparation for sewerage and sewage treatment facilities for the Town of Pembroke. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee). Voted to accept.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to make necessary repairs to the roof of the Town Clock Tower and to raise and appropriate the sum of Five hundred (\$500.00) Dollars for this purpose. (This Article is submitted by the Budget Committee without recommendation.) This Article was rejected.

10. To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee consisting of the Fire Chief, the Chairman of the Board of Selectmen and the Chairman of the Planning Board to investigate possible sites for use as a sub-fire station, said committee to report its findings and recommendations at the 1963 Town meeting. Voted and accepted.

11. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Road leading from old Route #28 to and across Bombay Bridge, so called, including Bombay Bridge, which road is now closed, as an open highway and made subject to gates and bars, and to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of said bridge to the best advantage of the Town. Voted and accepted.

12. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain a street light on Center Road to replace the street light which was removed by the Congregational Center. (This Article is disapproved by the Budget Committee.) Voted on and rejected.

13. (By Petition) To see if the Town will vote to install and maintain four street lights, comparable to lights located along Pembroke Street, to be located on poles at the intersection of Pembroke Street and Sherwood Meadows and in Sherwood Meadows at locations to be determined, and to raise and appropriate the necessary funds for the same. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee and the funds therefor are included in the Budget.) Voted and accepted.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer the sum of Twelve-hundred eighty-six Dollars and forty cents (\$1,286.40) being the balance of the 1960 appropriation for the Whittemore Bridge, to the Capital Reserve Fund. Voted and accepted.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Bi-Centennial Committee to expend the balance of its funds, being Three hundred thirty-two Dollars and thirty-two cents (\$332.32) plus interest, for the replacement of shade trees at

locations within the Town to be determined in conjunction with the Board of Selectmen. (This Article is approved by the Budget Committee.) Voted and accepted.

16. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or of officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto. Voted and accepted.

17. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting:

It was moved by Robert Plourde and seconded by Lorenzo Breton to reconsider Article 9. Moved to reconsider. After long deliberation of said Article 9, it was moved by Read Parmenter and seconded by Charles Whittemore that a vote be taken. And said Article 9 was rejected.

Moved by Reverend Hubert T. Topliff that the Town Selectmen be instructed to enter into discussion with the owner of the Clock Building to see what arrangement might be made as to preserving and maintaining the clock and Tower and be instructed to report their findings to the 1963 Town Meeting for consideration and appropriate action.

Moved by Read Parmenter that the Selectmen investigate and report to the Budget Committee in 1963 on the offer of the Merrimac Valley Realty Co., Inc. to match \$300.00 of Town Funds annually for the purpose of keeping roads subject to gates and bars as well as other roads essential to effective Fire Control as Fire Lanes.

Moved by Barbara Moseley and seconded by Arnold Anderson that the Water Commissioners of the Town of Pembroke thoroughly investigate immediately the condition of the Town Fire Hydrants to determine whether or not they are operable and to repair those that are not.

All newly elected officers present took the oath of office by Gedeon N. Petit, Jr., Moderator.

The Ballots were sealed and certified by Selectmen and Town Clerk.

Ballot Clerks sworn in were: Erwin Chase, Harold J. Jones, Robert Langford, Lorenzo Bates, Howard L. Berry, and Raymond V. Richotte, Assistant Town Clerk.

There being no further business It was voted to adjourn at 8:25 P.M. March 13, 1962.

Planning Board

February 19, 1963

ANNUAL REPORT

Regular meetings of the Planning Board on the fourth Tuesday evenings of each month throughout the year have been well attended by members of the Board. We were unfortunate in losing the services of Dr. Edward Colby in May, when he left for Hawaii. The Selectmen appointed Martin Ferry to fill this vacancy and Mr. Ferry is now the Secretary.

The Town Meeting of 1962 voted to raise \$1200 as its portion of the cost of the 'Urban Planning Assistance Program' as authorized by the 'Housing Act of 1954'. The object of participating in this program being the development of a Master Plan for the future growth of the Town. This appropriation in its entirety was turned over to the N.H. Dept. of Research and Development. It was augmented by State and Federal portions available for this purpose. The N.H. Dept. of Research & Economic Development is the spending Agency for this combined fund and therefore controls all payments to the Planning Consulting firm. The choice of the Planning Consultant rests with Town Planning Board and the firm selected by our Board was Economic Development Associates, Inc. of 230 Boylston Street, Boston, Mass.

Work on the Master Plan studies got under way in August and completion is expected by mid-summer 1963. Population analysis and projections have been made, which indicate that growth will probably continue at a moderate rate. The pattern of uses of land has been surveyed and is being mapped on new town base maps, prepared as a part of this study by the N.H. Dept. of Research & Economic Development.

The School situation has been reviewed, and long range enrollment estimates and facility need projections were made. A meeting that brought together the School Committee; School Building Committee; Planning Consultants and Planning Board was held prior to School Committee submission of warrant articles covering new school construction. Needs for other facilities such as police, fire, and library space have been surveyed.

Generalized maps of the water and sewer systems have been prepared, and analysis of water needs made. Meetings between Planning Consultant and Engineering firm preparing sewerage plans should assist in making sure a sewerage plan which both meets engineering demands and best serves the development of land. Street classification and condition has been surveyed and indicated on maps. Other maps have been prepared showing topography and land with limitations for development because of slopes or swamps.

During the spring and summer the Consultants and Planning board will be preparing a plan indicating how they feel the Town should be developed, considering all the information covered in earlier studies. This plan can then serve as a guide in determining the location of public facilities; in judging the merit of various utility developments; in amending, if need be; the Precinct Zoning regulations, and in considering the need for, or desirability of, zoning or other regulations for the entire Town.

Two recommendations were submitted to the Selectmen which should be considered at town meeting. One was to have the town acquire the property on top of Plausawa Hill owned by Everett. The cost of maintaining the road up the hill far exceeds the tax revenue, being approximately \$500 per year. The second was a town ordinance requiring a building permit for any new construction costing \$500 or more.

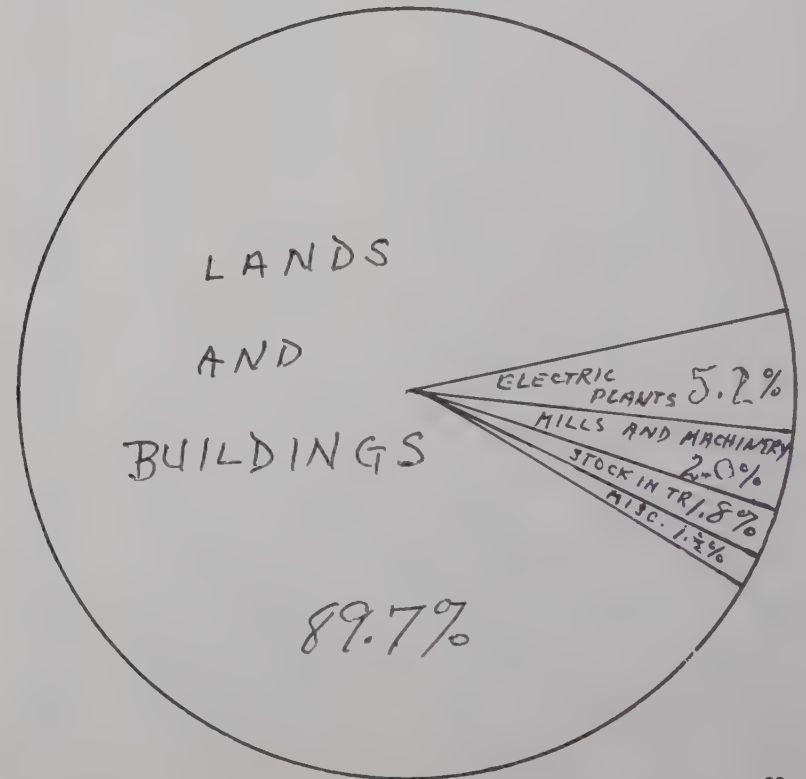
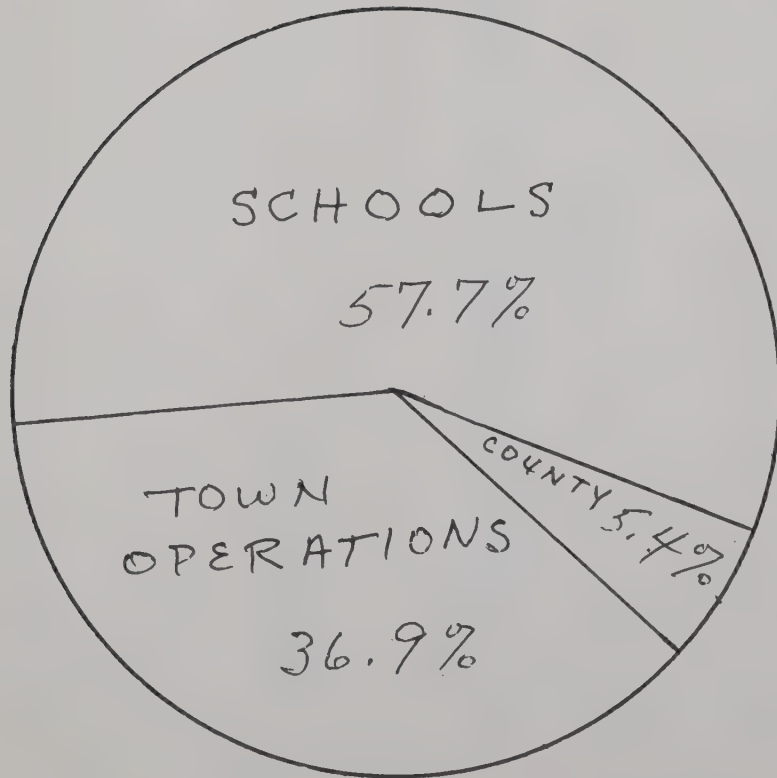

The year 1962 saw many new developments within your Fire Department. In July of 1962 Chief Metevier tendered his resignation after 10 years of devoted service. It was with deep regret that the members of the Department and Town officials accepted it.

The Ladder program started in 1957 has been completed. Your town now boasts a completely equipped modern ladder truck capable of meeting fire emergencies for years to come.

Under the direction of the Engineering Officer, Deputy Chief Oscar Plourde, a new 750 gallon triple combination tanker is being fabricated in the Town Shed. This, the newest unit of your Fire Department, will be placed in service by early spring.

Convinced that training is the key note to an efficient fire suppression force. Nine men completed a twenty-two week basic firemen's course last fall.

Pembroke has witnessed a rapidly increasing buildup in new housing. In the near future this will necessitate an overhauling and extension of the fire alarm system, originally installed in the early 1900's.

In conclusion I should like to remind you that fire prevention is everyone's business. The men of the Fire Department are at your call every minute of each day. However we hope we will not be hearing from you.

Don't let your home go to blazes.

Don't give fire a chance to start.

The Librarian and Trustees are very grateful for the interest the community has shown towards the library during the year.

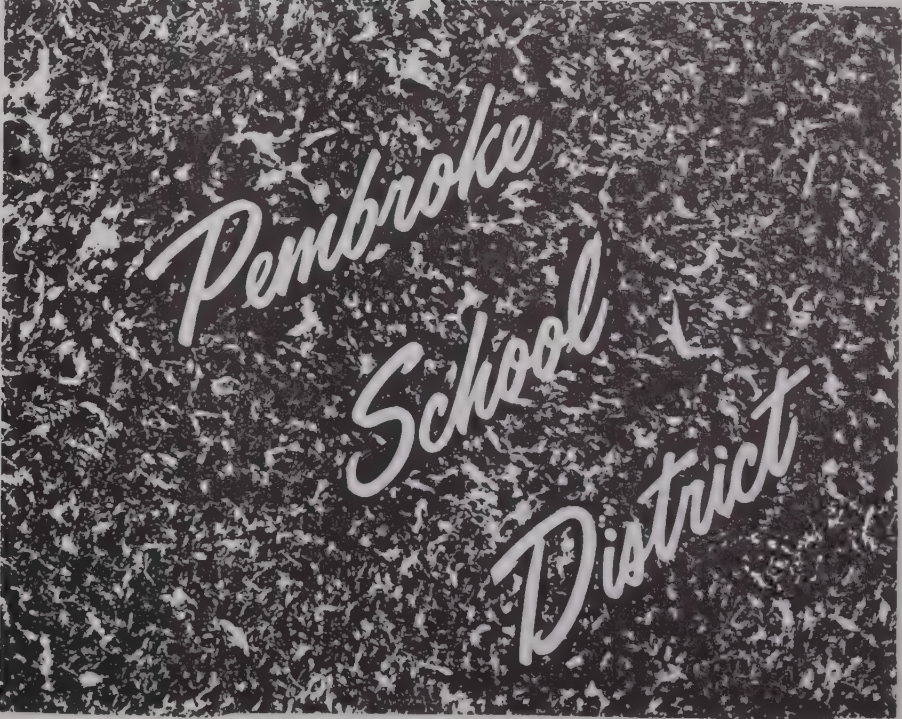

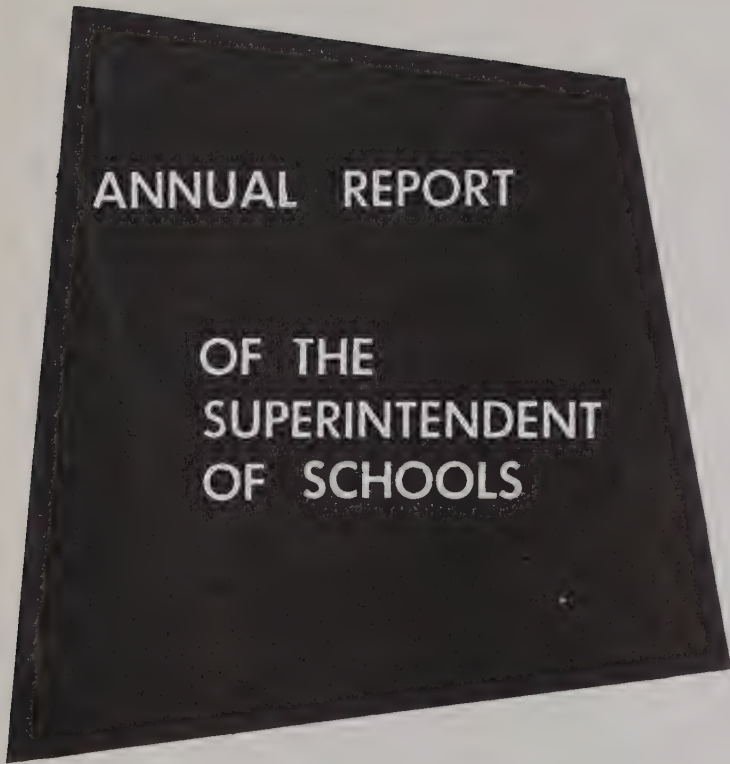

Pembroke's school problems center around at least two problems; 1. Rapid growth of its school population; 2. An inadequate tax base to properly accommodate this population, both as to housing and program. It will be noted that the enrollment in grades 1-8 has more than doubled in ten years and who is to say that it won't do likewise in the next ten? The average yearly growth has been about 8% and even at a smaller figure the net increase in the school population will be significant. A 5% increase of 500 pupils is greater than an 8% of 200. Various proposals will be submitted to aid in the housing problem which must be our first concern. To be practical, proper housing and a good teaching staff must come first.

If we grant that the school enrollment will double in the next ten years, it is doubtful the property tax base is sufficient to absorb the costs. It is my opinion that it is not, especially when weighed with other increasing school costs such as increased staff, increased tuition numbers and rates, not to mention other local town costs.

Pembroke's problems are becoming, and at a rapid rate, state problems involving much greater amounts of state aid than seem to be on the horizon.

In summary we have these problems:

1. An immediate housing need.
2. Continuing school problems of housing, staff, etc., due to an increasing school population.
3. The need of much larger amounts of state aid.

These problems are so basic and pressing that I do not wish to detract from them by adding anything more to this report than to say that you can be pleased with the school staff and your children.

Dear Mr. Cofran:

I am moved to begin this report with a word of thanks to the teachers and students who have worked together so well that even under the difficult, trying and crowded situation it has been and is a pleasure to be a part of Pembroke Academy.

ENROLLMENT

Our enrollment is, of course, the highest in our history. We have enrolled a total of 441 different students this year; and began the year with 433. We have now 415 because 18 students have transferred to other schools or dropped out of school.

Our present estimate is that we will have about 40 more students next Fall or a total of 470.

Our new building will provide very good quarters however and we should have good conditions for another three or four years before we need to add more rooms again. This is assuming that our growth continues and our neighbor to the south, Hooksett, doesn't build a high school.

If Hooksett should build a high school it would reduce our student body by about 68 students.

The interim commission has recommended regional high schools and has designated Pembroke as a logical location for one. The towns which are suggested are Barnstead, Pittsfield, Epsom, Chichester (partly), Pembroke, Allenstown and Hooksett (partly). If this idea should become a reality we would probably be part of a six or seven hundred student school.

MINIMUM STANDARDS

The State Board of Education has issued a new booklet explaining the new minimum standards for comprehensive high schools like ours. We are meeting all requirements at present with the exception of Art.

If we wish to remain a comprehensive high school we must teach Art as well as music. This we are planning to do by working with the Pembroke Elementary School and together hiring an Art teacher.

Another change is in class size. No class shall exceed 35 in number. The effect of this rule is to increase the number of class sections and thereby the number of teachers needed. We will need two or three more teachers next year with our increased enrollment.

Because of our crowded situation we had to combine class sections and therefore we had three or four classes with over 40 pupils in them. There are none over 40 at the present time.

Still another way we are meeting the new standards is with the addition of our new Memorial Library and a full time librarian next year.

SCHOLARSHIP

It is our intention to teach every child up to the limit of his capacity to learn. Some students attend school because the law says they must. These students frequently do not work as hard as they might or take advantage of the opportunities offered. On the other hand we have students who work near capacity and achieve high honors as well as having successfully completed many extra courses before being graduated.

We can and do prepare boys and girls for any college they may wish to enter. They must work hard and achieve good grades or they may not be accepted at the college of their choice. We offer three years of French and four years each of Latin, Science, Mathematics, English and Social Studies. No college requires more than this.

About twenty five percent of our graduates go on to four year colleges.

We also care for the seventy-five percent who do not go on to college by curricula in Commerce, Industrial Arts and Home Economics and this next year we will start Art.

For students who wish extra work in Mathematics we are using TEMAC Programmed material published by Encyclopedia Britannica. We also have used extension courses from the University of Nebraska.

We test the entire school each year with a standardized objective test called the Essentials High School Content Battery. The University of New Hampshire testing Service scores and tabulates the material. Thus we can compare our achievement and growth with national norms.

We also test all Sophomores in Reading and English and all Freshmen in Mental Ability, Reading, Mechanical Ability and Interests.

These test results are available for discussion by parents with our Guidance Councillor.

GRADUATES

Pembroke Academy graduated 31 boys and 23 girls in June 1962. Twenty six percent of this class is attending four year colleges. Three are enrolled at University of New Hampshire, three are at Plymouth Teachers College; two are at Notre Dame College; and one each at Skidmore College, Colby College, David Lipscomb College, University of Vermont, Northeastern University and Keene Teachers College.

Another thirteen percent are continuing their formal education in Business Colleges and Technical Institutes. This makes thirty-nine percent continuing their education.

Eleven boys have joined some branch of the service. Twenty-two students have gone into employment.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

We carry on complete athletic programs in Soccer, Basketball and Baseball. Our Central N. H. League has been broken up by the formation of fourth group in basketball, the Intermediate group. We are an Intermediate school and so we have joined with six other schools, Alvirne, Milford, St Johns, Penacook, Franklin, and Pinkerton Academy to form the Central Intermediate League. This league will start next year and is for Varsity and Junior Varsity boys only.

We are very proud of our girls basketball team which won the Central New Hampshire League Championship this year. They won nine games and lost one. This is the second year Mrs. Joan Tunnell has been the girls' coach.

We have played Soccer on Mr. Cling's field and are grateful to him for its use. We will play baseball there this Spring and Soccer too if our new field are not ready adjacent to the new school.

Mr. Munroe had served the Academy six years and was a very active and dynamic member of the faculty. His innovations in his social studies classes and his enthusiastic coaching will be long remembered.

Mr. Arthur Steenbergen of Plymouth Teachers' College was secured as his replacement.

EXPANSION

Pembroke Academy holds a unique place in the history of Pembroke. It has been in continuous operation since 1819. It is expanding to meet the needs of new generations and to teach all the children of all the people.

The Trustees have seen the need for expansion and have purchased land adjacent to the school for that purpose. A baseball field, a soccer field and a physical education area will soon be ready.

The new building contains a Memorial Library to the four girls killed in an airplane crash; a Commercial room, a Biology laboratory, six regular classrooms, one double class room and a dining room to enlarge the cafeteria.

The new playing fields and new building will give us a physical plant of which we can all be proud.

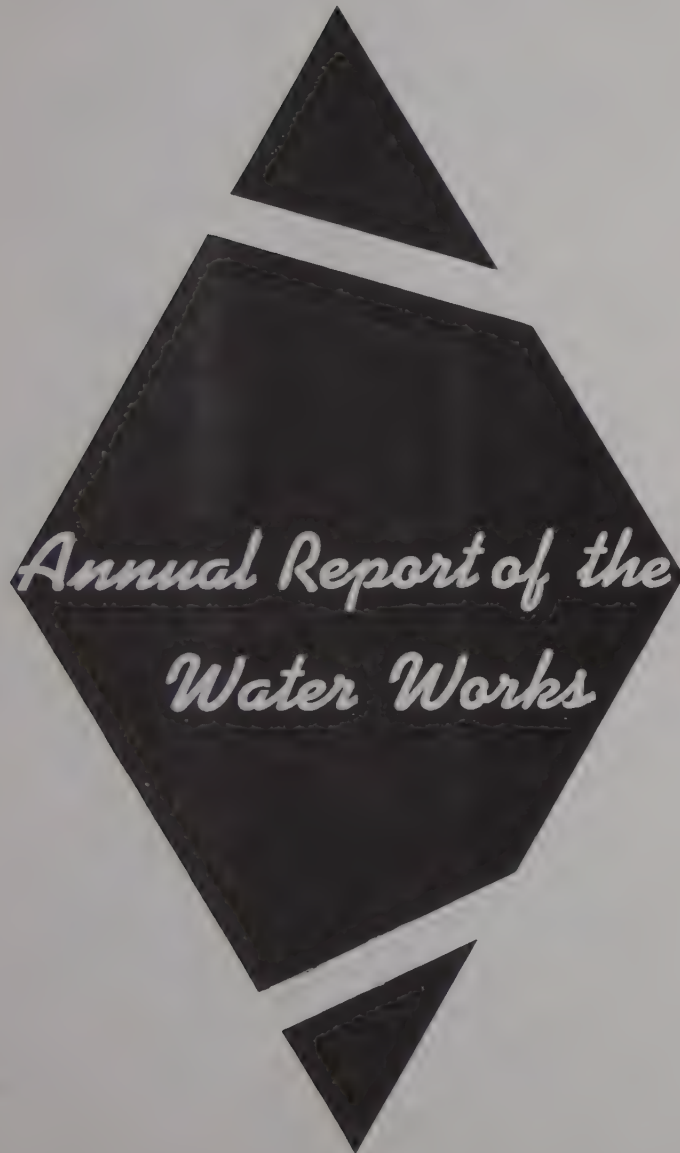
CONCLUSION

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD WATER COMMISSIONERS

During the year 1962 the water from the Glen McNamara residence to the Mrs. William Head's home was completed.

A new 6" main installation has been started for the Loso development which extends beyond Fairview Avenue. To date this project has required the laying of 466 linear feet of 6" pipe--the prospects are that this project when completed will necessitate the installation of approximately 2000 ft. of water main. In addition to the above just mentioned, an additional 180 feet of 6" main was laid on Ridge Road in Allentown for the new home of Mr. Richard Langford.

A total of twenty-four new services were installed during the year. Also twenty-two old services were relaid.

Every hydrants were inspected and the few found in need of repairs were fixed.

At present, a complete census of all the water consumers is being taken. This will enable the Water Works Department to bring their records up-to-date. We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for the courtesies that have been or will be extended to the census takers.

The Board of Water Commissioners and the Superintendent appreciate all those paying their water bills promptly, and want to take this opportunity to thank them. In the past this department has expended considerable effort to collect what is justly due, and you the residents and property owners of the Town of Pembroke who are the actual owners of this enterprise may rest assured that in the future this collection effort will continue.

Before closing this report we would like to welcome anyone who has any suggestions for the betterment of the water department to contact the board at its monthly meetings.
