## TOWN WARRANT

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### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Raymond, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Odd Fellows Hall in said Raymond, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
3. To fix compensation for collecting taxes for the ensuing year.
4. To see if the town will vote to raise such amounts for highways as recommended by the New Hampshire State Highway Department.

9. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing snow fence.

10. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing a snow plow and tractor.

11. To transact such other business as may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

*To the Honorable Board of Selectmen of Raymond:*

GENTLEMEN:

We have been very free from contagious diseases for the past year. One case of diphtheria having been reported and one case of scarlet fever. No second case appeared from either.

Our sewerage problem is as heretofore reported. I think the inhabitants in general are awakened to the fact that sanitary surroundings are very necessary to the health of the individual.

Our water supply is still good. No disease has ever been traced to this source.

I would call the attention of the officials to the fact that they should be doubly sure that there are no leaks at the source of the water supply and that the standpipe should be cleaned as often as deemed expedient.

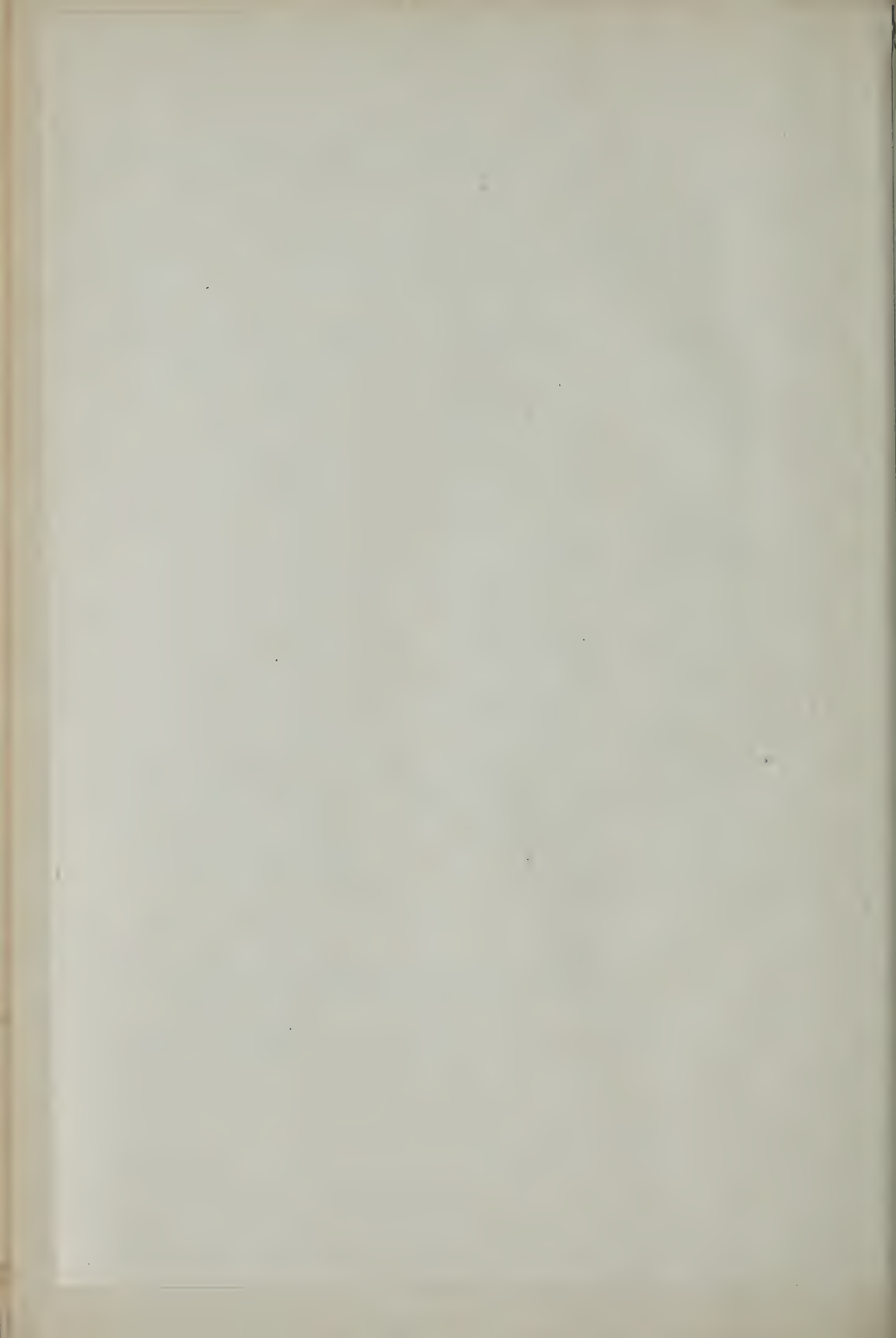

*To the Honorable School Board and Superintendent of Schools:*

As School Physician of the Town of Raymond, I beg to submit the following report:

I find the pupils in splendid condition. They are all neat and tidy and are following our instructions as to what children can do to keep themselves in good condition.

A large percent of the pupils have had their teeth attended to except those of the first grade.

I have endeavored to call the attention of the pupils and parents to the defects, that, in my opinion call for immediate attention.

Vaccination has practically reached one hundred percent. I find the pupils very orderly, showing evidence of the skillful supervision under which they are working.

As to the important diseases, namely, malnutrition, scrofula, tuberculosis, I find none. I think we have reason to congratulate ourselves on the general appearance of the future generation.

With our fine location, splendid buildings and fine corps of instructors, I feel that we are progressing in a very satisfactory manner.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

*To the School Board:*

In scanning the list of teachers, you will note that five out of nine teachers are new to us. Moreover, four of these teachers are having their first experience with us. Of course, even though graduates of college and normal school, such teachers exhibit in practice some of the faults common to young and inexperienced teachers. These teachers usually profit by careful supervision and become better teachers by the end of each year. Efficiency of instruction in any school system results from the diligent work of experienced teachers. Can we not bring it about that changes in our teaching force shall be comparatively rare?

It is to be hoped that the plans of the Board looking toward participation with other towns in the employment of a school nurse may be realized this year. The cost to the district for such service is no greater and the results are far-reaching and satisfactory.

In public education, at the present time, much attention is being devoted to instruction in the formation of habits of health and to character training. Our schools have a far greater duty to perform for our boys and girls than merely to teach the three R's. With a strong teaching force, well directed effort on the part of the teachers and intelligent sympathy and cooperation from the parents, we shall be able to lead the children of Raymond to the better features of intelligent citizenship.

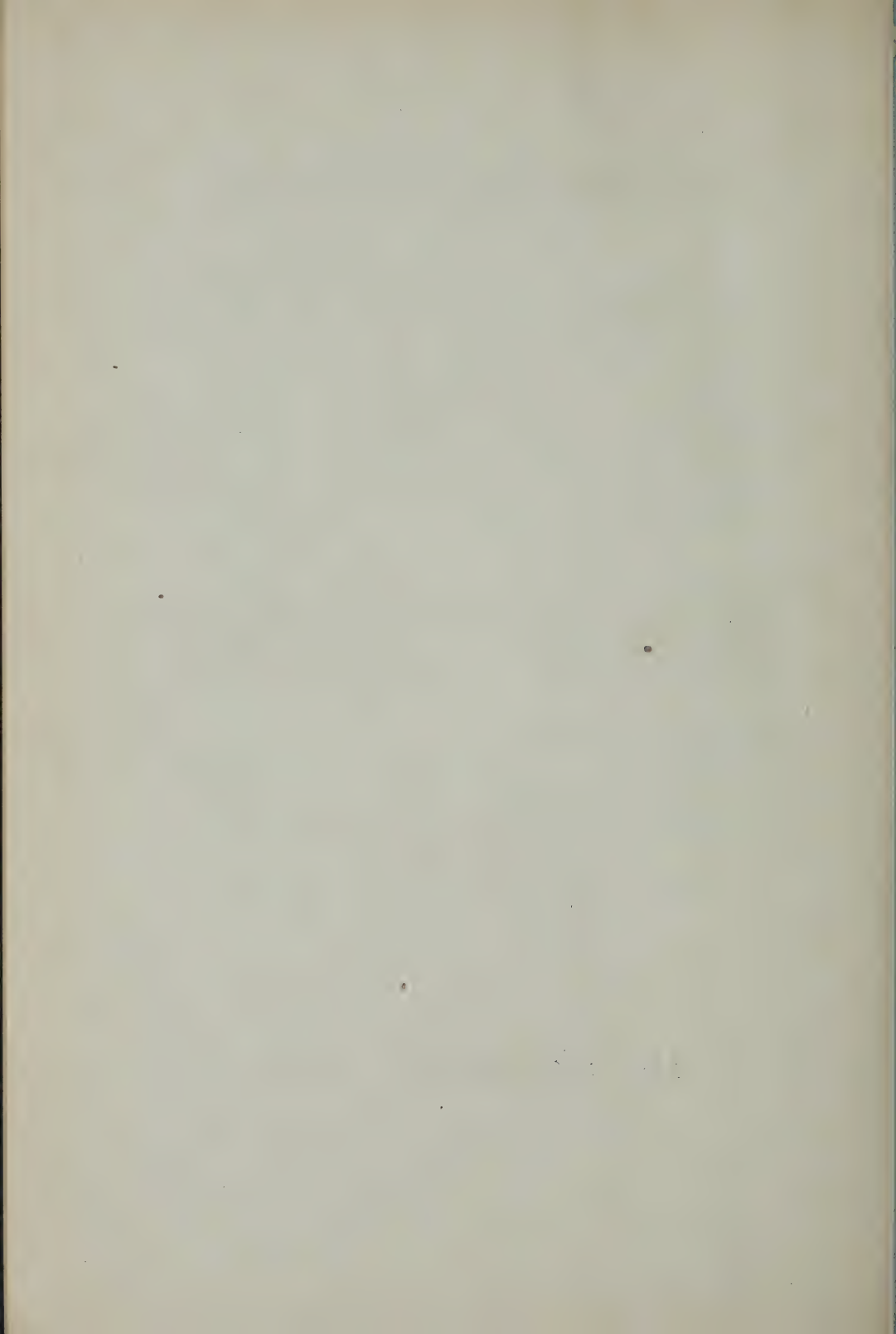
